






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The 365ink crew... faces you already know!

So what exactly does it mean to be 365? What kind of odd and special situations do we find ourselves in? I'll try to recall a few instances to make my point.

Years ago we had an intern named George. If I say his name is G.T., then many people out there probably know exactly who he is. Now he's married with kids and taking on the management world. Back then he was a scrappy Web content go-getter. One day I was pulling out of Eagle on Locust and I looked up and saw the Saturn blimp. I don't think there's ever been a blimp in Dubuque. Turns out I was right. I called G.T. right away and said, "Get the camera, there's a blimp over town." G.T. started laughing and retorted, "I'm in it, bi#ch!" Of course you are, I said. I still have no idea how he managed that. That pretty much sums up the kinds of odd opportunities that come to 365.

One other day I got a call from Jim Rix, who was opening the new Grand Harbor Resort in a few weeks. He said to get the camera and get down there ASAP. A few minutes later I was talking to Bono. Yes, that Bono. While the media were kept outside as a special meeting was held with area doctors, I got to go in as the "official hotel photographer." I remember he said to me, as we inexplicably had about 30 seconds together, alone, outside while everyone else was gathering their stuff, that a frozen Dubuque reminded him of Dublin and then he called the Mississippi "the river Jordan" in some kind of magical Bono verse -- and then, as everyone came out, we got a photo together. I'm pretty sure he treasures it and has it on his fridge at home. I should mention Ashley Judd was there too. I mean, how could I forget? Yeah, way hotter in person.

From punk kids 10 years ago to older punks today. Governors and Senators know our names. We've met a lot of presidential candidates, and Kevin Bacon too. We go backstage for big rock stars we love and for country music stars that we have no idea who they are (so we shoot photos of the guys holding the Sharpie markers as they're the ones signing autographs). We get calls for advice and input from people way above our pay grade and we appreciate the respect for our insights. We've been knee deep in most of the biggest cultural, civic, and economic development related happenings in Dubuque in the last decade; it's been both rewarding and challenging. And for the most part, a blast. But I gotta admit, I think I'm getting too old to keep up the "Midwest distributor of involved" pace. Looks like it might be time to pass the torch. No, we're not quitting. We're just sending someone younger to take photos of the country music guys so we can sleep.

So thanks for reading. I mean really, really thanks for reading and letting us almost make a living doing this thing we love to bring a little entertainment and culture into your lives. We love it and we hope you love 365ink too. We're not sure what the future holds, but rest assured we'll be up at 2 a.m. writing about it.

In his own words, a Dubuque legend signs off.

My earliest memories of radio are sitting in our little family room at 1264 Mt. Loretta listening to programs like Abbott & Costello, Ozzie & Harriet and Bergen & McCarthy. Late afternoon always brought The Lone Ranger, Sgt. Preston, and other adventure shows to my imagination. And Saturday morning was time for No School Today with Big Jon and Sparky and Space Patrol. I liked the stories, but, what impressed me most were the exciting introductions provided by the announcers. "High adventure in the wild vast reaches of space. Missions of daring in the name of interplanetary justice. Travel into the future with Buzz Corey, Commander in Chief of the "Space Patrol."

Wow! That was exciting stuff.

I was about 10 years old when the music programs hosted by announcers like Bill Thomas and others started to interest me. I had a little phonograph and some 78rpm records that I would announce and play on an imaginary radio station. I'd even cut advertisements out of the TH and read them. Dad noticed my fascination, and one day presented me with a microphone that he had built from part of a broomstick mounted on a round board with a Ball fruit jar lid covered by a piece of window screen.

I had a little kit-built crystal radio in my bedroom and would spend many late night evenings listening to programs that would come miraculously into the little headset. Every evening was a different experience. Sometimes it was KDTH's "Stairway to the Stars." Other times KAAY in Little Rock would come blaring in with the pop tunes of the day. WGN came in regularly with big band broadcasts from Chicago hotels and ballrooms.

A job carrying the Dubuque Buyers Guide and later, the Telegraph Herald and delivering Fuller Brush catalogues through most of the north end of Dubuque helped me save for my ultimate goal: a tape recorder and real microphone. I finally had enough when I was about 12 years old. That's when the real practice for my radio career began.

Hours of recording, listening and self critiquing followed. With one of my school buddies, Denny Oeth, a wired radio station (KHOS - The Hemmer-Oeth System) was created using heavy electrical wire stretched between our homes. I suppose it was the original cable radio station. Denny was the engineer. I did the programming, which included my disk jockey show, some original comedy routines, and live piano music played on our old Cable upright. Eventually we added another neighbor to our network of listeners. It was great fun.

During those same years, me and a few of my friends discovered that we could visit the local radio stations during the daytime hours to watch the announcers from observation rooms. We spent many hours observing Bob Gribben, Bill Thomas, and others from the KDTH studios. WDBQ had a large observation room above the old First National Bank at 5th & Main. And, when

we visited on weekends, the college age part time DJs would invite us into the studio to watch them.

That was it. My fascination with the radio business was incurable.

I was 15 and determined to get a real radio job. So, I sent a sample tape to Phil Kelly, General Manager of WDBQ. Much to my surprise, he called me for an interview and offered a part-time event of a rain-out, I became a deejay. I prayed for rainouts.

Soon I was given a Sunday evening 6 p.m. - 12 midnight shift of my own. In those days there wasn't a playlist of tunes, so I could program whatever I wanted. Consequently listeners heard everything from pop tunes of the day to big bands, and comedy routines. It was great fun. The tough part of the job was reading the sponsored 10 p.m.



job. Because I was tall and looked older, he didn't ask my age. Within a few weeks I was operating a real radio control board during the stations broadcast of White Sox baseball. My duties included sweeping the floor, emptying the wastebaskets, answering the phone, and reading the local news when the game ended. And, in the

newscast. Management was never too thrilled about my newscaster abilities, but it was late Sunday night, so I got by.

The next few years became a learning experience with guidance from men-





Understanding that recovery efforts

While beginning a New Year always offers people an opportunity at a fresh start, it seems more people are tending to shy away from "official" New Year's resolutions. The common perception is that declaring resolutions are an even greater opportunity to fail, especially if one has decided to undertake a fitness program that requires jogging outside at a time of year in which the thermometer often dips into the sub-zero zone.

Well, what about your dog? No, not his New Year's resolutions. (Except for the extra mooching opportunities provided by the passing holidays, I doubt your dog has noticed anything different that would indicate a new year.) But your dog could probably use a new fitness plan, especially when cold weather allows little more than a quick stroll around the block or a few minutes in the back yard to do his business.

Undoubtedly, there are many of our canine companions that suffer the same boredom and inactivity that we do if we allow ourselves to be cooped up inside during the cold winter months. If only there was a place to take dogs to get some exercise in a fun, safe environment. There is and it's called FidoFit, a new exercise gym and dance studio for dogs and their people. Yes you read correctly – dance studio. We'll get to that in a bit.

"A dream of mine has always been an indoor gym for people and pets," explains Mary Erschen, who together with her husband Mark Erschen has founded FidoFit. "I've always been enthusiastic about exercise myself and I've incorporated that into my love for animals."

More than just a dream, Mary Erschen brings a background in animal husbandry and years of experience to FidoFit. The business grew out of her natural love of animals and understanding dogs' need for regular exercise and mental stimulation. Already operating a holistic dog grooming business out of her home (using natural and organic products), Erschen began FidoFit as a mobile business last year. With a need to supplement family income in a challenging economy, it made sense to invest in the hobby she loved.

"With the economy I needed to be creative and find a way to do what I do everyday which was exercise with my own dogs and find a way that we could actually help ourselves as well as others," she explains. "So I started FidoFit in 2008 as a mobile business."

Erschen added to her knowledge base by working with area veterinarians and trainers like Tory Topping of Stone Hollow Dog Training in Cascade. "He would go with me on long walks, sometimes (with) up to five dogs on a lead at a time like you would see in New York City," she relates, "and he perfected my skills at conditioning dogs on hills, and he taught me a lot about working with dogs at different temperatures and the equipment that we would use for that – cooling collars and cooling backpacks – pretty much perfecting the style."

She also worked with nationally known dog trainer and doggie dance (also known as canine musical freestyle) pioneer Sandra Davis. Doggie dance is an extension of other canine agility training, incorporating a variety of movements synchronized to music. It really has to be seen

to be believed. (Look them up on youtube if you want to see dogs having ridiculous fun with their trainers).

Erschen began the area's first nine-member doggie dance team in October, performing at Christmastime for Dubuque Nursing and Rehab.

"There are different dance steps that are done to music," she explains, "so it's all synchronized and you can do performances. We want to do volunteer performances. We want to go into nursing homes, special needs situations, wherever we might be needed to perform or to do benefits."

The group also has a doggie drill team

which performs different tricks, utilizing agility work and other aspects of the fitness programs incorporated into a synchronized drill. It's all part of the FidoFit plan to make exercise fun for both pets and people.


"There's another lady in Arizona that has a dog gym as well as people gym, and she is helping me right now put together an indoor aerobics and walk-fit program so we can actually work out with people and their pets on lead, so the people are also getting a workout as well. We're really promoting health and wellness," says Erschen. "Our target market is the working class family, we want to make this a safe environment and an affordable environment."

With a small but functional space at 1464 Central Avenue, the Erschens now have a place for dog lovers to bring their pets to exercise, practice agility training, and interact with other dogs, all in a safe, structured environment. The first dog gym in the state of lowa (The state will model their licensing requirements on the facility) FidoFit will soon be opening a swimming pool in the basement of the building.

"There's a real need for it, because in the winter we have very cold temperatures, so we need a place indoors where people can continue to exercise with their pets and meet," Erschen explains. "In the summertime as well, we have fairly hot summers here."

Martin Zellar, Friday, January 22

Legendary singer-songwriter Martin Zellar returns for what promises to be another standout show Friday, January 22. Austin, Minnesota-based Zellar is of course best known as the songwriter and leader of the Gear Daddies, the late-'80s band that was making country-tinged roots rock before most people had even heard of the term alt-country. Big Blue Sky Saturday, January 23

Songwriter Jon "Hawkman" Stravers brings his latest incarnation of his band Big Blue Sky to The Bank Saturday, January 23. Described by sometime band member Denny Garcia as "eco-folkanrock" the music of Big Blue Sky is a mix of original folk, blues, and bluegrass, most often with an environmental theme. However, our friends at the National Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium are just getting started with winter thrills. For the sixth year in a row, the Museum is just about ready to host its annual IceFest, a three-week festival scheduled for its final weekend this coming January 22 - 24. John Sutter, the Museum's marketing and sales director, was able to take some time out of his schedule to sit down with us and discuss this year's happenings.


"IceFest started as a way to get people to enjoy the Museum in the winter-time," he says. "There's a lot of winter history in this area with the river -- in years past, it was used for many purposes. For example, the Ice Harbor was used to protect boats during the winter months. There's a lot of heritage with the Mississippi River."

"We have so much to offer, there are several opportunities, so it's really key for us to run the full three weekends," Sutter explains. "That way, if a family can't make it during one weekend, there are still two others that they can hit"

So, what is IceFest, exactly? There are a multitude of different activities scheduled for the three weekends, meaning that there's something for everyone. Throughout IceFest, the Museum will hold a wide variety of winter-related programming, including historic film footage of harvesting ice from the Mississippi River and polar exploration, indoor exhibits, snow and ice sculpting and more.



Specifically, the final weekend of Ice-Fest will feature bald eagle viewing, the Dubuque ThunderBirds meet-and-greet during which the players will be available for photos and autographs, as well as demonstrating how to fire off the perfect slapshot, the Chill Out Chili Cook-Off, snow sculpting and arctic bowling. (And if you can't find something in that list to enjoy, you're positively un-American.) All events will be held at the National Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium. 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Sorry, But I Can't Critique Your Poem I'm a poet. I write poetry, I read poetry, I have a master of fine arts in writing poetry. Why husband even introduces me, every so often, as a poet. Words are important to me – not only what they mean, but their rhythm, how they sound when they're strung together into lines. So I guess it should be no surprise that sometimes peoples end me their own poems and ask what I think of them. Oh, if they only knew. I must confess, my heart sinks when I open my inbox and find another poem from another nice person who just wants me to tell him or her if it's any good. Because, let's face it, that's not what they really want. I want to encourage yet another road more to fall to my knees and cry, "My God! This is the best thing I've ever read!" or at least not tell them to keep their day job. I'm sorry. I feel entilly revealing. Let me count the reasons: 1. Done well, critiquing a poem is neverally want to know your opin form the lation of the strong that dissect one poem by T.S. Eliot, sure, you do not. I don't want to make you cry. 2. If it's good, I'm just going to be jealous. There are so few places for a poet to be published these days wants me to tell him or her if it's any good. Because, let's face it, that's not what they really want. They want me to fall to my knees and cry, "My God! This is the best thing I've ever read!" or at least not tell them to keep their day job. I'm sorry. I feel entilly revealing. I'm sorry. I feel entilly revealing.

I'm sorry. I feel guilty revealing this, but I believe I am speaking for many writers when I say: The next time you read something you admire, please, please, resist the urge to send that author your own work.

Why? Why in the world can't I just spare a few minutes to give a fledgling writer a few tips, a crumb of encouragement?

I'll tell you why, and I hope I don't sound harsh. I mean, you see this all the time in the movies, don't you? Starving writer, waitressing at some L.A. dive, encounters famous screenwriter at her table, slips him the script she's been working on for years along with the bill, and before you know it, her name is in lights.

But we're talking about poetry here, where only a few make it big, like Maya Angelou or one of the poet laureates. But even Billy Collins, a two-term laureate, peppers his poems with snide references to "the intolerable poetry" (his words! not mine!) of others. If he's insecure, how can I be expected to be kind and helpful?

So why won't I critique your poem?

- 4. People pay good money to take courses in poetry. My MFA degree cost more than a hybrid car, and that's with leather seats and heated outside mirrors. Why should I hand out for free the kind of education other people pay for? I'd be suspicious of any advice that doesn't cost an arm and a leg.
- 5. Critiquing a poem requires a workshop. In a writers' workshop, a bunch of wordsmiths sit around a table, coffee and snacks at hand. The poet whose work is under discussion is required to shut up and listen while the rest of the gang have at it. Every line break, every comma, every word choice is up for grabs. A workshop leader once told my group that, in her considered opinion, every poet should get a lifetime limit of five colons, and we're not talking body parts here. I disagreed vehemently, but kept it to myself because she was the one with the literary prizes and the agent and the contract for her third hardcover book. What did I know?
- 6. I didn't go to grad school to become a teacher. Many people do, but I just wanted to learn to write better.

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The Book of Eli - A Film by The Hughes Brothers (Menace II Society, From Hell)

In the not-too-distant future, some 30 years after the final war, a solitary man (Denzel Washington) walks across the wasteland that was once America. Empty cities, broken highways, seared earth--all around him, the marks of catastrophic destruction. There is no civilization here, no law. The roads belong to gangs that would murder a man for his shoes, an ounce of water... or for nothing at all. But they're no match for this traveler. A warrior not by choice but necessity, Eli seeks only peace but, if challenged, will cut his attackers down before they realize their fatal mistake. It's not his life he guards so fiercely



but his hope for the future; a hope he has carried and protected for 30 years and is determined to realize. Driven by this commitment and guided by his belief in something greater than himself, Eli does what he must to survive-and continue. Only one other man in this ruined world understands the power Eli holds, and is deter-

mined to make it his own: Carnegie (Gary Oldman), the self-appointed despot of a makeshift town of thieves and gunmen.

The Book of Eli is something of a schizophrenic film, not unlike Mad Max without all the fancy car chases. Its timing is unfortunate, too, given the glut of postapocalyptic movies we've been seeing lately, most notably The Road. That said, however, the movie oozes style, thanks to the direction of the Hughes Brothers. Denzel Washington, charismatic as always, does the best with what he has in the underwritten role of Eli, alternating between heavy-handed preaching and old-time religious moralizing, and kicking lots of ass. Gary Oldman is his usual entertaining self, as well. Unfortunately, the aforementioned preaching ultimately dominates the film, which drags it down from its full potential. It might be worth a rental, but not full price at a theater.



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Extraordinary Measures (Jan. 22)

From his working class roots, John Crowley has finally begun to taste success in corporate America. Supported by his beautiful wife Aileen and their three children, John is on the fast track. But just

as his career is taking off, Crowley walks away from it all when his two youngest children, Megan and Patrick, are diagnosed with a fatal disease. Currently, sessions can be arranged by appointment by calling Erschen at 563-582-5160, which can include transportation to and from the facility (within the city of Dubuque). "It can also be used as a doggie daycare, but it's a structured doggie day care," she warns, "which means the dogs are going to be in a learning environment the whole time that they're here. We've kept the fees very low for people. It's \$10 an activity pass. You can come in, you and your family and your pet can work in the swimming pool, you can work with agility (training), you can work on the treadmill (they train dogs to run on treadmills!), vou can take a fitness class. We want something that with this economy, families can afford to do that's fun and also promotes health and wellness."

FidoFit also hosts a regular Saturday morning "Agility Fun Day" Humane Society benefit at the Central Avenue location from 9 to 11 a.m. Any dog can participate regardless of size, breed, age, or experience. The fee is just \$10, with proceeds from the Saturday morning sessions going to support the Humane Society. Last Saturday, the assembly included people from a mastiff rescue group. "I just think that it's great for any type of dog, but mastiffs are more of a generally shy dog," explained Kari Tilton, a member of the mastiff rescue crew, "this kind of helps bring them out and it develops that bond."

In addition to the work Erschen and her group of dedicated volunteers does with the Humane Society and rescue groups, the FidoFit team works with area nursing homes and is developing a program to work with kids who suffer from autistic spectrum disorders. In the future, the gym plans to host workshops targeting specific issues or areas of learning, such as socialization, responsible pet ownership, canine good citizenship, and dog training from puppies and other

beginners through intermediate lev-

Another program in the works, probably for sometime in late winter or early spring, is a workshop in self-defense for both dogs and their owners. Working with an instructor with experience in both military and police canine training, participants will first learn basic human self-defense training, followed by a workshop for both people and their pets. "He's going to teach how to react to confrontation," explains Eschen, "whether it would be an aggressive dog or possibly a person who's acting aggressive." The third workshop is an advanced program teaching participants and their dogs how to disarm an assailant with a weapon.

The opportunities for people to interact, learn, and play with their pets seems to resonate with dog lovers.



So they're going to have the dogs there from the Humane Society on the days that we perform and promote adoption. ... It's been incredible. We've had individuals, as well as a church donate money so that we could have radio advertising. Everything has pretty much been donations and volunteer work because there's so much support for this idea – a safe environment, a structured environment."

"They said, 'We have a place, it's not big, but it might give you the start that you need,' and that's how that actually came to be." She added, "I want to thank Julie and Jim Gross, because they actually have allowed us this space to work in and promote the business and have been very instrumental in supporting this idea."

It's clear from watching Erschen interact with the dogs on a recent Saturday that she truly loves the animals she works with. FidoFit is a way for her to share that love with other dogs and their owners. "It's important to me, because not all dogs know how to act socially in a group, so this is a safe environment," she says. "There's structure, but yet there's activity and fun, and I guess that's a concept that I'm really trying to get out there and promote. If you're not a candidate for a dog park setting, there are gyms and now we have one."

APPY DAY RADIO

During my college years I continued working vacation shifts on WDBQ and began recording some late night music programs for the new WDBQ-FM. Program Director Terry Dorsey liked what I did and worked me more than 40 hours a week all summer. As I recall the pay was \$1.25 per hour. I supplemented that with Friday-Sunday evenings playing organ with the Timmerman Club Trio at that popular East

Dubuque restaurant.

After college graduation I chose to stay another year to get my Masters in Music Education and continued part time work in radio. In mid-summer of 1967, Bill Mason, the morning personality at WDBQ announced his intention to retire from the booth to devote fulltime to radio sales. I was offered the job and accepted. I sincerely appreciate Phil Kelly's faith in me and the job he provided for the next 34 years.

I'll never forget that first morning show on August 15, 1967. I had to be at the station by 5 a.m. to turn on the transmitter and be ready to go by 5:30.

The day always began with our National Anthem followed by a hymn (usually something from a Tennessee Ernie Ford album of religious favorites), a march (mostly Sousa) and the weather forecast. The newsman would take over for 15 minutes at 5:45 and then it was into "adult" popular music - no rock and roll. There were many live commercials, a few jokes, music, etc. And, slowly I began to try to emulate the style of my idol at the time: Wally Phillips of WGN-Chicago.

The years rolled on and I enjoyed the company of so many wonderful individuals including Dave Lange, Al Sampson, Bill Alfredo, Larry Cramer,



Poo-Tee-Weet?

I am profoundly conflicted at the publishing of 14 previously unpublished stories by Kurt Vonnegut Jr., titled *Look At the Birdie*. One the one hand Vonnegut let these stories sit in a drawer for 50 years with no apparent desire or intention of ever having them published but on the other I'm deeply grateful to have something new to read from one of my favorite authors.

One of Vonnegut's friends, Sidney Offit, wrote a foreword to the book. In it he says, "Unpublished is not a word we identify with a Kurt Vonnegut short story. It may well be that these stories didn't appear in print because for some reason or another they didn't satisfy Kurt. He wrote and rewrote, as his son, Mark, as well as agents and editors testify. Although Kurt's style may seem casual and spontaneous, he was a master craftsman, demanding of himself perfection of the story, the sentence, the word."

Well, Mr. Offit seems to have a firm grasp of the obvious in more ways than one. Any number of other great authors, Thomas Pynchon, F. Scott Fitzgerald, Mark Twain, Tom Wolfe,

or even the celebrated writer of simple words and short sentences, Ernest Hemingway could have taken the idea of Cat's Cradle and easily turned it into a 400-page tour de force. It is a mark of Vonnegut's genius that he chipped away all the unnecessary words and ended with a 192-page masterpiece.

He was an incredibly discerning and meticulous writer; which leads me to the reason I'm intensely angry this book has been published. From all information I have been able to gather, it is evident that these stories come from early in Vonnegut's career. More than likely, then, they were written and shelved by Mr. Vonnegut in the 1950's. There is absolutely no evidence either verbal or written by Mr. Vonnegut that he wanted any of these stories to see the light of day. There was nothing in his will about his unpublished writings. He had 50 some odd years and countless opportunities to have these stories published and any number of publishing outlets both book and magazine would have jumped at the chance and paid big money to publish them. It is very difficult to come to any other conclusion than Mr. Vonnegut did not want these stories published. Another big clue referring to that conclusion comes from the copyright information. All of the stories were copyrighted by the Kurt Vonnegut Jr. Trust. In other words, they were copyrighted AFTER Kurt Vonnegut died when he, presumably, would have had a somewhat difficult time expressing his opinion. These stories should have never been published and I'm very afraid that we might not have seen the last of the unpublished short fiction of Kurt Vonnegut Jr.

When reading them there were two things that were very clear to me. One, these stories could not have been written by anyone else. They have Kurt Vonnegut's fingerprints all over them. Two, they are very early in Vonnegut's career. Instead of blowing with a force five Vonnegut hurricane they puff with a gentle summer breeze.

Having said all of that, I was waiting at the bookstore before it opened the day Look At The Birdie was published. I rushed home like an addict carrying his last fix. This isn't Vonnegut writing at the peak of his powers. This is a very good writer writing clever, interesting and entertaining stories. They would still be worthwhile reading even if we didn't know they were written by Kurt Vonnegut Jr. Without sounding too pandering, a mid level, mediocre, Kurt Vonnegut story is worth a top of line story by any writer working today. They are interesting from the critical standpoint of seeing how some of Vonnegut's writing techniques were developed and grew.



Vonnegut was famous for his "Rules For Fictional Composition" and the most important one for him was "Use the time of a total stranger in such a way that he or she will not feel the time was wasted." In that sense Look At The Birdie was very well done indeed.

Considering however, that it is unambiguous to me he never intended that these stories be published I think it's fitting to give the birdie the last comment.
