

### The Great Draw

A Sidewalk Art Competition Saturday, September 17

4th & Bluff Streets (Cable Car Square) Outside the Lines Art Gallery presents 17 The Great Draw, a sidewalk art competition the morning and afternoon of Saturday, September 17 on 4th & Bluff Streets. The competition is open

to all ages and will serve as a fundraiser for creating a visual arts scholarship for a Dubuque Senior High School art student. The event will also feature international street artist, Julie Kirk-Purcell of Ontario, California who will create an original street mural in chalk.

The sidewalk art competition is open to everyone, regardless of age, amateur or professional artists included. Over \$900 in cash and prizes will be awarded in four categories, plus a People's Choice Award. John Mominee, UW-Platteville artist will be judging the competition. There will be three amateur categories - Youth (kids up to age 12), Teens (13-18 years of age) and Adult (19 and older), plus a fourth category for working artists. The entry fee is just \$5 for Youth and Teens, \$10 for Adults and Artists.

The Great Draw is free for spectators who are encouraged to watch the competing artists work. The event will feature live music by the Dubuque Senior High Jazz Combo and there will be a kids play zone for children who might be too young to enter the formal competition. Note that no food vendors will be present and dogs are discouraged.

Spectators, family and friends can vote for their favorite artist by buying votes (a common practice in Illinois) toward the

People's Choice Award with a single vote for \$1 and six votes for \$5. All money collected through voting sales will go toward funding the art scholarship. In addition, Outside the Lines Art Gallery will donate 10 percent of all of the day's sales to the scholarship fund.

The scholarship will be given to a deserving visual art student from Dubuque Senior High School who plans to pursue the visual

> arts following high school graduation. Applicants will be required to submit a short application and to present a portfolio of artwork.

> Gallery owners Connie Twining and Stormy Mochal conceived the idea of using the Great Draw competition as a means


to sponsor the art scholarship. Both Connie and Stormy had both long imagined creating a scholarship for visual art students. An online encounter with a street artist began to take shape as an opportunity to incorporate a street art demonstration with a competition and fundraiser.

"Pretty soon we had a street artist coming to Dubuque to do a demonstration on 4th Street, surrounded by people of all ages competing for prize money," explained



A world-renowned street artist, Julie Kirk-Purcell has been street painting for 19 years. She has traveled extensively to create on location, throughout the United States and Europe, the Middle East and Asia. Some of her clients include Disney Imagineering, Disney Entertainment and Disney Studios, as well as Universal Studios and the Chrysler Corporation. Kirk-Purcell holds an MFA in painting from California State University Fullerton and is currently a tenured professor at Irvine Valley College in Irvine, California, where she teaches painting and life drawing. She is also the author of the book Sidewalk Canvas.

Kirk-Purcell will be creating a large, original street mural during The Great Draw to



In addition to The Great Draw, Julie Kirk-Purcell will be working as an artist-inresidence at Dubuque Senior High School and will host a workshop that is open to the public. She will be working with Senior High art students during two full days of classes on September 15-16, demonstrating the medium of pastel chalk and providing insight into the life of a working artist.

She will also host a public workshop for students 14 and up and interested community members Friday, September 15 from 6:30-8:30 p.m. on the large front sidewalk of Dubuque Senior High. This workshop is for students and community members who want to get a more in-depth experience with the artist. Note that registration is required for participation (by September 1) and a small fee will be charged to cover artist's expenses. Scholarships will be available to any student with a financial need.

"Our goal is to present an opportunity for youth to witness a professional artist in action," explained Twining. "It's an art form they can absolutely relate to; it's all over the internet. This woman is a professional, international street artist and she makes a living at it. Our goal is to show kids that you can make a living as an artist."

Entry forms for The Great Draw are available at Outside the Lines Art Gallery, The Dubuque Art Center, River Lights Book Store, Dubuque 365, and Monks Kaffee Pub and should be returned with the entry fee (\$5 for 18 and under and \$10 for adults) to Outside the Lines Art Gallery. Though the entry deadline is September 1, Twining said they might still accept late entries, space permitting. A basic chalk set is provided with entry, though some artists might wish to supplement their supplies. 

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

**Dubuque Oktoberfest 2011** "Lederhosen on the River" Saturday, September 10, 2 p.m. - 10 p.m. Alliant Amphitheatre, Port of Dubuque

Imagine the crisp, autumn air carrying the cheerful sounds of polka music as the smell of bratwurst wafts through the huge festival tent. As you raise your glass to taste yet another of the available range of fine craft beers your eye catches a handsome couple (maybe not unlike the pair appearing on our cover) caught up in the moment and spontaneously beginning to dance. Maybe you're only part German. Maybe you have no German heritage at all. But somehow, this seems right. Prost! (Cheers!)

And right it will be at this year's Dubuque Oktoberfest "Lederhosen on the River." The returning event celebrating German and Eastern European heritage is scheduled for Saturday, September 10 from 2 to 10 p.m. This year Oktoberfest will be held rain or shine under the huge "Festspiele Zelt" (festival tent) at the Alliant Amphitheatre in front of the Star Brewery at the Port of Dubuque. A fundraiser for Camp Albrecht Acres, the event will feature German food, a beer tasting, ethnic dancers, and live music of the German variety, as well as headliners Wicked Liz & the Bellyswirls.



















Oktoberfest organizer Terry Mozena is excited about the move to the amphitheatre. "First of all, it's a beautiful festival ground," stated Mozena. "What a great place on the banks of the Mississippi! It's a million dollar view. We're going rain or shine. It's going to be under the fest piele zelt, the largest festival tent in Dubuque ... that we could find, anyway! We think that's the right place to have the festival."




The whole thing gets underway at 2 p.m. with plenty of German food and cold beer available, with polka music provided by the Americana Band. Come hungry, as there will be bratwurst, sauerkraut, frankfurters, hamburgers, German potato salad, German soft pretzels, and homemade pies and cakes from the Sherrill Methodist Church. Yes, pies!



At 2:30 p.m. the Guttenberg German Band ups the oompah ante on the main stage. For those who are inspired to dance but aren't sure how to get their polka on, the crew from Ballroom by Jennifer will be offering polka lessons at 3 p.m. So there's no excuse not to dance.

For many, Oktoberfest truly hits its stride at 3:30 p.m. with the beginning of the Drie Straaten Bierprobe (Tri-State Beer Tasting). Scheduled from 3:30 to 6:30 p.m. the Bier Tasting will feature a variety of brews from some of the region's best craft brewers. "We've got some great breweries coming down," said Mozena.

For an extra \$10 (\$15, including festival admission) beer lovers (or should we say bier lovers for this event?) will get a special Oktoberfest tasting glass and an opportunity to taste brews from Capital Brewing, Back Pocket Brewing Company, Galena Brewing Company, Goose Island, Great River Brewery, Millstream Brewing Company, Potosi



Brewing Company, Stevens Point Brewery, and Summit Brewing Company. Don't be late. The special Oktoberfest bier tasting glass is limited to the first 500 tasters, but you can still participate in the tasting.



A fun addition to the festivities comes in the form of "Hammerschlagen," a traditional Oktoberfest game played with hammers around a large stump or log placed on end. "You compete against your buddy," explained Mozena. "You're each given a hammer and a nail. You take turns hitting your nail and the first one who gets their nail into the stump wins!" Seems straightforward enough. "But the hammerhead is really small and narrow," adds Mozena, "so the more you drink ..." Okay, we're seeing the comic potential of this now. Mozena expects there might be some side wagers involved with the competition.





Live entertainment continues through the afternoon into the evening with a performance by the University of Dubuque German Band at 5:30 p.m. and a dance performance by the University of Northern Iowa International Dance Theatre at 6 p.m. Just when you think you can't take any more accordion music, headline performers Wicked Liz & the Bellyswirls take the stage with their upbeat brand of highenergy rock-n-roll at 7:30 p.m. Wicked Liz will be getting her Oktoberfest on until the festival's end at 10 p.m.

The third year for Dubuque Oktoberfest, the event began as a block party on the 1000 block of upper Main Street. The success of the first event inspired organizers to think bigger. At the same time, organizer Terry Mozena who is also a board member of Camp Albrecht Acres was looking for a signature fundraising event for the non-profit camp. Mozena first became involved with Albrecht Acres as a summer camp counselor and later executive director in his college days. He's been a board member now for six years.

As Oktoberfest appeared to be the perfect vehicle for an Albrecht Acres fundraiser, Mozena and the group planned for a big festival at the Port of Dubuque last year.



Everything was set for a great event. Then, it rained. But not just a little rain, there was a big, nasty storm.

"Last year we had some pretty scary weather so we made a decision to go inside Five Flags," explained

Mozena. "I'm not sure we got the word out enough. Five Flags is a wonderful venue and they were wonderful to let us sneak in there at the last minute, but this is a festival that needs to be held outside. With having a large tent up, even if it's raining out the party goes on."

Mozena hopes that people attend Oktoberfest in traditional German outfits like lederhosen and dirndls (as those fearless souls on our cover), or other traditional Eastern European clothing of their ancestors. "It's a cultural thing," he notes. "If you're German, Slavic ... anything! Come on down rain or shine. Enjoy good music, good


dancing, good food, and good beer, all for a good cause."

### **Music on Main Post Party** featuring the Spazmatics

On Main Street, begins at 5 p.m.

On September 17th, hundreds of athletes and spectators will converge on Galena, for a full day of adventures - both muscular and musical. The fun begins at noon with the start of the 7th annual Fever River Adventure Triathlon and continues through the day with paddling, biking, and running, events, raffles and drawings, and culminates with an awesome after-race party featuring the Spazmatics!



The Fever River Adventure Triathlon began seven years ago, when the members of Fever River Racing –a group of Midwest adventure racing enthusiasts began looking for ways to give back to their community. Since their passion was involved in demonstrating that preparation and the synergy of teamwork can overcome individual limitations, the team was naturally drawn to Special Olympics and their efforts to provide growth opportunities to mentally challenged individuals through athletic competition.



The race features three challenging events, a six-mile paddle on the Galena River followed by a 17 mile bicycle race through the hills surrounding historic Galena and



finishing up with a 3.1 mile run along the Galena river Trail. All three events start and end at the Galena River boat dock area below the highway 20 bridge, making the event transitions easy for athletes and allowing spectators to view the culmination of each leg of the race from the same vantage point.



Racing begins at noon and competitors may compete in either Adventure (Standard) class or Competitive class. Additionally there will be Masters classes for athletes over 50 as well as Standard, Competitive and Corporate classes for teams. Competitors in the standard classes must use either mountain bikes or hybrid bikes and canoes







or kayaks which are seventeen feet in length or less and weigh 40 pounds or more. In the competition classes, racers may use road or triathlon bikes and are unrestricted in their choice of boat other than it must comply with U.S. Coast Guard regulations for flotation. Prizes will be awarded for the first three finishers in each group and class.

The fun continues after the race with raffles and silent auctions, the awards ceremony and a Galena Music on Main post party hosted by Fever River Outfitters, Galena Brewery and JoCarrol I Energy. The grill will be hot, the beer cold and the streets of Galena filled with the sounds of the 80s provided by the energetic and everentertaining Spazmatics from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m., with opening music by Just One More at 5 p.m.. A rain site is set-up at Turner Hall, but we're not going to beed that, right! 
### The Canned Film Competition! Plan It. Cram It. Can It.



Craig Gillespie is attached to direct Pride and Prejudice and Zombies.








### ASIA featuring John Payne Saturday, September 3, 8 p.m.

### All The Way Home Conference A Quick History: How it Started

"What are we going to do for the veterans? We have to be ready when the veterans come home."



After 911, Betty Allen, Executive Secretary at Mental Health America (MHA) of Dubuque County, continued to prod MHA professionals and staff, the local veteran community, the Iowa Legislature, and anyone within earshot. Betty was concerned about the challenges facing returning veterans and their families. Allen's primary focus was on funding the additional education and training so that enough nurses, doctors, psychologists, psychiatrists, physical therapists, physical trainers, and all other professionals would be ready as veterans returned to their families. Betty knew that veterans and their families would need community and professional understanding and support to piece back together their forever-changed lives. Betty Allen never stopped trying to bring attention to the coming home issues.



In 2007, Allen and John Curtis, President of Mental Health America of Dubuque County, met with Charlie Brimeyer, Executive Director of the Dubuque County Commission of Veterans Affairs. The conversation led to the development of a written guide for returning veterans and their families to find their way through the maze of possible alternatives to resolve coming home issues. The guide is now in its second



printing. Curtis was also thinking about a peer-to-peer conference for mental health professionals to be held in the fall of 2007 or the spring of 2008.



In June of 2007, Dubuque was named an All American City. That August, a presentation of a video documenting the preparation for the All American City competition and the competition itself was presented at a community breakfast event. After the event, Tom Howe, a national board member of Veterans and Military Families for Progress (VMFP), was walking across the gathering space toward an exit. A man he did not know, heading in the opposite direction,

said, "Isn't it great to be an All American City?" Howe replied, "If we really are an All American City, we must give an All American response to veterans and their families." The stranger said, "Can I quote you?"

The quote was published the next morning in a Telegraph Herald newspaper article about the All American City award gathering. Before noon that day, John Curtis called Howe, which led to a lunch attended by Curtis; Howe; Carolyn Pettit, Coordinator, Wellness Center, Hillcrest Family Services; Todd Lange, board member, National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI); and Lynette Howe of Oak Tree Counseling Services. After a few minutes of discussion, Curtis announced an intent to alter the preparation for a peer to peer conference, and to focus instead on a conference directly involving veterans and military families. Although not yet named, the All The Way Home Conference was born.

Curtis invited Craig Kowalski, board member of Mental Health America to play a leadership role. Brimeyer and Kowalski co-chaired the planning meetings, which began in September of 2007. The planning committee grew to 53 members from a variety of sponsoring organizations. Local funds were

raised, and the VA from Iowa City partnered with the community to provide its expertise and support at the initial May 17, 2008 All The Way Home Conference.



The conference is a showcase of federal, state, and local programs and services specifically geared toward veterans' issues in returning to civilian life ... coming home. It is a grateful community's way of thanking its veterans and military families for their service and sacrifice. It is an opportunity for all citizens to learn about the issues of coming home, solutions for the problems

encountered during initial and long-term transition to post combat military and civilian life, and the important role of the general public in understanding and supporting veterans and their families. Please join us between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. at Five Flags in Dubuque, September 24, 2011 for All The Way Home III. How many of you have been to Goldmoor Inn & Dining? This beautiful inn looks like a castle and is situated on immaculately manicured grounds overlooking the Mississippi River. The Goldmoor is a member of the prestigious 400 member Select Registry and is recognized as one of the most romantic Distinguished Inns of North America. It holds the Top Rated Inn of Illinois Award from the American Bed & Breakfast Association (AB&BA). It is also rated Number 1 of 25 restaurants in Galena by TripAdvisor.com.

Patricia and Tom Smith, Owner/Innkeepers, (pictured top right) have developed a magnificent and elegant getaway that most certainly exceeds the dreams of the Goldmoor's founder, James (Goldy) Goldthorpe. Today the full service inn has 12 Grand Deluxe Suites in the main castle, three beautiful cottages and two authentic log cabins. There is also a climate controlled gazebo for intimate gatherings and a large covered pavilion for weddings, reunions and private parties.





The Dining Room opened in December, 2007. It serves full breakfasts to the guests of the Inn and is open to the public Thursday through Monday for delicious gourmet dinners.



The kitchen is under the command of Nick Puls (right), Executive Chef. Nick discovered he had a passion for cooking when he was very young and just starting out as busboy, dishwasher and short order cook at the Village Inn in Dubuque. He then graduated from Kendall College Culinary Arts School in Chicago. After doing an internship at Jacky's Bistro in Evanston, IL he returned to East Dubuque to become a chef in the kitchen of legendary Chef Jim Terry at the Captain Merry. He then went to California to further develop his skills cooking in

several prestigious restaurants including Napa Valley Grille, Model Bakery, and the famous JoLe in Calistoga.

Nick produces his artful and imaginative menus with the able assistance of his Chef de Cuisine, Taylor Harkness. Taylor is a graduate of Le Cordon Bleu in Minneapolis and acquired experience at Eagle Ridge prior to Goldmoor Dining.



The current menu has a wonderful collection of culinary creations to explore. For starters, the Cheese Chutney Plate offers an assortment of artisanal cheeses. On a recent visit the board was adorned with Blue Cheese, Fontina and Smoked Gouda. They were accompanied by chutney made from raisins, raspberries, cranberries and blueberries blended with cinnamon. nutmeg, oranges and orange juice.



The Crab Cakes are made from fresh crabmeat coated with Panko breadcrumbs and deep fried. They are served with an Aioli made from mayo, dried tarragon, lemon zest, garlic and lemon juice.



Another tasty appetizer is Arancini. These are Italian Risotto Rice Balls stuffed with fresh spinach, artichokes, goat cheese and cream.



On a recent visit my guests discovered some intriguing soups. The Celeriac was made from celery root, onions, leeks, garlic and a potato simmered in a vegetable stock. The Corn Chowder contained grilled chicken and corn added to chicken stock mixed with bacon, potatoes, garlic and the holy trinity (chopped onions, celery and green peppers).





All the entrees are served with a salad of fresh greens. They are all handsomely presented with a crostini. This is a thin slice of toasted bread drizzled with olive oil.

The entrees all looked so good I found it necessary to have dinner at the Goldmoor more than once. I had to ask many questions and I must say my servers, Kris Wubben (pictured with the desserts) and Sue Bell, were both very gracious, attentive and knowledgeable of the menu's offerings.



served with a coconut rice and Curry Beurre Blanc. This white wine, butter and lemon juice reduction complimented the snapper very well (pictured below).





The signature dish is Beef Wellington (pictured above). A USDA Choice Tenderloin Steak is seasoned and grilled and then wrapped in a puff pastry with a wild mushroom assortment of shitake, oyster, crimini and portabellas. This is topped with a demi glaze of roasted veal bones, cabernet wine and a mirepoix (coarsely chopped onions, carrots and celery).

There was also a Pork Tenderloin wrapped with pan seared bacon (pictured atop the next column). It was served with spinach, mashed potatoes and sun dried Tomato Risotto with a Peach and Blue Cheese Cream Sauce. Another enticing entrée was the Red Snapper En Papillote. This simply means the fish is steamed in parchment paper. It is

The Grilled Shrimp Linguine (pictured top left of facing page) was just what it says. Jumbo shrimp are grilled and placed on top of fresh made linguine topped with a spicy tomato marinara sauce.

Of course, fine meals practically beg to be finished with fine desserts! There is always an assortment of fresh baked delights. On my visits there was Lime and White Chocolate Raspberry Cheesecake, Chocolate Cake. Two additional creations were specialties personally prepared by Chef Nick. The Chocolate Ganache is a rich blend of chocolate and heavy cream. It's placed on a bed of homemade butter crunch toffee and dry roasted peanuts and drizzled with chocolate and caramel sauce.



Then there is Crème Brûlée Nick prepares the old fashioned way. First he mixes egg yolks, cream, vanilla bean and sugar and strains into individual ramekins. Then he bakes them in a water bath until almost, but not quite, firm. When the rich custard has cooled he tops them with crusts of caramelized sugar.

I have described all of these menu items just to give you an idea what you have been missing. The new autumn menu will replace the current one on September 22nd. You will find the same creativity and professionalism only this time utilizing fall season fruits and vegetables. Expect to see things like red and golden beets, pumpkins, spaghetti squash and zucchini.

Don't forget to ask for the wine list. There are over 65 fine wines carefully chosen by Patricia and stored in the climate controlled wine cellar.



The dining room offers fantastic views of the Mississippi River and awe inspiring sunsets. However, on my next visit I am going to try something different. Some of my friends and I are going to sit in the kitchen at the Chef's Table (which seats 8 by the way) where we can watch the chefs





preparing our dinner. The photos above are of a couple doing just that.

Once you have discovered Goldmoor Inn & Dining you will want to return often because there are always things to do. For example there are the First Friday BBQ's held during the summer months. The last one this season is September 2nd from 6 pm to 9 pm in the outdoor pavilion. If you can make it you will enjoy All You Can Eat BBQ Country Ribs, Grilled Chicken, a Baked Potato Bar, Corn on the Cob, Watermelon and dessert.





### **Exhibit Opening** Saturday, September 10, 7:00 p.m. Exhibit continues through October 7

10 "My dream for Dubuque is to create a destination for the arts," said Gene Tully, director and founder of Voices from the Warehouse District, now in its seventh year. "Getting people together to talk about art, being amongst art, really does affect life in our community in such a profound way."

The work of twelve artists will be featured in the month-long exhibit, located in a cavernous warehouse at 10th and Jackson streets in Dubugue's Historic Millwork District. An additional eleven artists will contribute to a special show-within-a-show to commemorate the 9/11 terrorist attacks.

At the Voices opening reception, scheduled for Sept. 10, 2011, from 7:00 to 11:00 p.m., Tully envisions a participatory gathering of collective thought that will promote beneficial energy in the community. "It's a community identity, a unique opportunity for people to come together to talk about art."

Highlighting the opening reception, Rogue Citizen of the Minneapolis/Twin Cities area will share their live performance art set to music, with roots in urban street graffiti. Tully said, "I'm thrilled by their guerrilla nature. Rogue Citizen exemplifies what I hold as a driving energy, getting community together to do something that's going to change our community for the better. to create a world in which we want to live."

One bay in the enormous 15,000 square foot gallery space will be devoted to a remembrance of the 9/11 terrorist attacks, offering social commentary from contributing artists. Exhibit visitors will enter this "sacred space" through massive 8½ foot tall rock columns, a gateway created by Tully himself, sandblasted with nine icons of modern religion, and bearing on the opposite side, the unifying slogan, "All are one."

"I feel strongly that if we were teaching our children about art, our conversation wouldn't be about discrimination, wouldn't be about war. It would be about creative energy and about love. That's exactly the energy we need to counteract terrorism, to counteract violence in the streets, and riots. If children in London were to be educated in art, in culture, they wouldn't be out there burning down their neighbors' shops and cars."

Only a block away from the Voices location, presiding over the Millwork District from a perch at the top of the building that also contains his studio, stands Tully's "Warehouse Grotesques," another piece designed to promote positive community energy. Four raptor-like "grotesques" use their powerful wings to suppress hate, greed, violence, and addiction. By letting positive energies rise up, Tully hopes these grotesques impact the Voices building and everywhere, promoting hope, love, togetherness, forgiveness, and peace.



Visitors to Voices from the Warehouse District VII, in addition to experiencing spectacular original art and an exciting array of special events scheduled for Sept. 10 through Oct. 7, 2011, gain a rare opportunity to appreciate one of the massive old structures in Dubuque's Historic Millwork District. "I'm really encouraging people to come and experience both the art and the old architecture, before it changes rapidly, in the historic millwork district."

### **How a World Champion became** a Champion for the World:

A Voice from the Warehouse: Photographer, Artist and Storyteller of Hope

### Mike McCaskey of Chicago Illinois By Brad Parks

There are a dozen good reasons to be attendance at the open night of Voices this year but let me give you four more. Four stories of hope and endurance that transcend destiny itself, each made possible by one remarkable man's choice to leave behind every advantage of wealth, education and status over 30 years ago to serve those who had nothing but their own courage and will to succeed.

If you find the time to make it to the opening event for Voices, you may have the chance to hear these stories from photographer and former Peace Corps volunteer Mike McCaskey. Mike is one of the amazingly talented and inspiring "Voices" of the arts whose works will be on exhibit all this month during the Voices season.

After graduating from Yale Mike joined the Peace Corps which lead him to a school room in Ethiopia where, as middle school teacher, he came to understand the hopelessness and poverty of the region as well as the inner strength and dignity of its embattled and financially strained people. It was the story of his students and how their work is transforming Africa that encompassed most of our conversation.

After spending nearly an hour talking with him earlier this week while he was hanging his own exhibit for Voices I could hardly place the photographer that is Mike McCaskey in the same thought as the Champion and scholar that shares the same body. Knowing his past, even once standing in his offices surrounded by the ghosts of his family's legacy, I can see how it may be easy for some to get caught up in the story of the man behind the camera instead of focusing on the story from the man though his art.

From his acclaim as an academic while a professor at Harvard Business School, to his roles in the National Football League where he remains an owner and retired Chairman of the Chicago Bears whom he lead to a Super Bowl Championship in 1976, he has an impressive record of success indeed. However, don't expect to hear any of that from him.

It is clear that his preference is for you to hear the story of the boys from his 8th grade class of students and what has become of their lives - young boys whose group photo looks as if it could have been taken anywhere in the US, yet came from a small African village. Without the work of the Peace Corp and volunteers like Mike McCaskey, who gave two years of his life to educate and befriend complete strangers, they would have had no chance at the lives they now enjoy. Worse, the world would not have had the benefit of their work. One is now a PhD in Zoology leading the World Wild Life Fund's mission in Kenya to relocate and save the endangered rhinoceros, another a successful business leader, one an international jet pilot, and the last a Professor of English Literature at one of Ethiopia's most prestigious universities.



But that is a story for Mike to tell and if you miss the chance to hear it, it would be your loss. The only story I can tell is the story of the artist I met. I spent over a decade in the world of professional sports as an underwriter for Lloyds of London so I know that the world he will share this weekend with Dubuque though his art is as distant from Soldier Field as was Ethiopia from Yale.

Pro sports is a world that defies description and for which I am glad to be gone, as I have seen it ruin as many souls as it has elevated heroes. Like all communities of people, I have met men of honor, character, education and courage in the NFL, as well as men without any of those traits. However it is rare indeed to meet a man who has all of the traits you could hope for in a champion yet who's most obvious traits, perhaps even because of his challenges in football, are clearly his humility and genuine kindness.

While Mike McCaskey the Bear has fans and foes in the world of sports he deserves only the best of friends and fans in Dubuque. As for Ethiopia, his retirement from football has also given them back Mike McCaskey the artist and leader as their Champion. Through his camera's lens one more much-needed Voice for hope and change is now brought to the world, this weekend to our world. Where will vour Voice be?





Live Paint by Rogue Citizen Voices Gallery Opening Reception Saturday, September 10, 7:00 p.m. ReVolt: Voices from the Warehouse District VII

Enjoy the collaborative live painting of Rogue Citizen, to be showcased at the Voices from the Warehouse District opening reception on Sept. 10, starting at 7:00 p.m. A crew of four artists from the Twin Cities, Rogue Citizen will generate a work from inception to finish during the event. "The work we're creating at Voices will be on a large surface with acrylics, ink, collage, and whatever else makes its way on. The goal is to be finished by the end of opening night."

Consisting of midwesterners Shawn Dalsen, Eric Mattheis, Matt McGorry, and Matt Wells, Rogue Citizen's visual art has evolved under the influence of video games and urban street graffiti, tossed with raw social commentary. A collaborative exhibition held this spring in Minneapolis, Execute Rogue Citizen, focused on themes of imprisonment and the American justice system, and ended with the planned destruction of unsold works.

An art collective since 2009, Rogue Citizen creates live art that springs from the group vibe and hinges on observer feedback. "Usually the audience does not directly participate, but conversation and interaction is


really valuable, and there have been a few occasions where folks are invited to tag and paint on a surface we're working on."

With three formal art degrees amongst the four-man crew, the merging of their individual efforts results in a dynamic group style. "One artist is usually designated to be the lead and prepare ideas and imagery before the event. During these projects all of us bring our technical strengths, keeping communication as open as possible to get a final product we're all satisfied with." Their joint work reveals an affinity for science fiction, with bold robotic images, superhero-esque humans, and otherworldly dreamscapes of action.

Emerging as collaborative artists when offered the opportunity to create live paintings during concerts, Rogue Citizen has gained acclaim for urban murals. "The first outdoor mural we all worked on as Rogue Citizen was 60ft long on the side of Shuga Records in northeast Minneapolis over a three-day festival, and with minimal preparation. It was a pretty spontaneous collaboration made more interesting with free beer and heat stroke. Since then our outdoor walls have been more calculated, although there's always plenty of room for improvisation."

In addition to sharing the collaborative live work to be generated during the Voices Gallery opening reception, each of the four artists will also display a 4ft x 8ft interpretive self portrait. "Rogue Citizen is excited to get out of the Cities for the first time as a crew, and show everyone there how we do it in the 612 [the Minneapolis telephone area code]. It should be a lot of fun, and we look forward to visiting other cities in the midwest soon." Look for more information about Rogue Citizen at Lizardman Art or on their Facebook page. After all, pets die, both the puppies and the kitties. It's sad. It's really sad. Sunshine can cause migraines and skin cancer. Flowers fade and fall. Nice people can have a bad day, snapping at their most beloved friends. And summer afternoons sometimes carry thunderstorms, breeding hailstorms and tornados.

So, no. I'll never be Pollyanna Pam. But even at my darkest – like last week's column, a letter for my children to read after I die – there is love, and care, and deep appreciation for this light and dark thing called life.





### Enjoy a colorful fall season...

The cool temperatures that help welcome autumn are just around the corner. As a landscape designer, bold fall colors are something that many people request to be incorporated within their yards. The old standby Dwarf Burning Bush is certainly tried and true, but with today's yards becoming smaller and more compact, many don't have room for such a large plant. Here are a few smaller options to consider...



- 'Little Henry' Sweetspire- This little cutie not only offers fragrant white blooms mid summer, but its fall color is second to none. It prefers full sun to part shade. Size: 2-3'tall x 2-3' wide.
- 'Mount Airy' Fothergilla- This leathery leafed plant loves to grow in tough soils and can thrive especially in wet soils. It can grow in just about any light although it prefers at least part sun. Its fall colors mimic that of the sugar maple, bright oranges and reds. Size: 4-5' tall x 3-4' wide.
- · 'Fiesta' Forsythia- This variegated beauty known for its impressive spring blooms also offers spectacular deep burgundy color this fall. It likes to grow in full sun to part shade. Size: 2-3' tall x 3-4' wide.
- 'Wings of Fire' Weigela- Not only does this new shrub offer beautiful spring blooms but its fall color is equally impressive. It fits nicely into most sunny landscapes. Size: 3-4' tall x 3-4' wide.
- · 'Magic Berry' Coralberry- This gracefully weeping shrub offers a beautiful show of bold pink dime sized berries that stay with the plant into the winter months. Definitely an overlooked plant in the landscape, this one is a great conversation piece in the fall. Size: 3-4'tall x 3-4'wide.

### What I am doing in my garden this week:

Late summer is a great time to prune. Last weekend, we quickly filled up two pickup truck loads of clipping from our front yard alone! Be careful to not prune plants that flower in the early spring (Rhododendrons, Lilacs, Forsythia, etc.) though, or you won't get to enjoy those beautiful blooms next spring.

As you begin to harvest your late summer veggies, be sure to clean up any debris to prevent fungal and insect problems next year.

Begin to plan your fall bulb plantings. A little effort this fall and just when you have the worst case of spring fever, voila! The crocus and daffodils will offer a cure. I like to plant in a circle directly around my other perennials. That way I know where they are located and they are in an impressive cluster.




