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The 365 Impact Award (below) winning DuRide program needs more drivers for 2012!



Do you love to drive and have some spare time on your hands? Think about how fun and rewarding your help and companionship would be to a senior who can no longer get behind the wheel.

Many seniors withdraw from their communities and their families and friends if they can't get around and get around safely and affordably. DuRide has been developed as a private, non-profit system of ride sharing that provides seniors with a safe, dignified and consistent way to get around. It keeps them healthier, more active and contributing to their communities. Dubuque is an All-America City and The Most Livable Small City in the U.S. DuRide is an innovative program that will keep seniors involved in our communities - and you can be part of it.

If you become a DuRide volunteer, you will be giving your time to drive seniors to their local destinations. You can volunteer on your own terms. Drive when you can. Make it work within your schedule. Volunteering is simple. You'll need a current lowa driver's license, proof of adequate insurance and pass a routine background check (sorry Steven Schleuning).



You can use your own vehicle. You will be reimbursed for your mileage if you want; you can bank the miles you drive for your future transportation needs, or you can donate your miles to someone else. You'll receive a periodic statement that shows the hours you volunteered and the miles you drove for your own tax purposes. Yeah, write it off, baby!

All of us have a stake in helping to ensure that older adults in Dubuque can remain active

and independent once they stop driving. DuRide offers safe rides in cars, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year (366 this year). DuRide is available in Dubuque, Asbury and East Dubuque.

Seniors can call DuRide to arrange for transportation whenever they need it, for whatever local trips they need to take, such as: Appointments, errands, grocery store, meals out, church services, visiting friends and relatives, taking a class, recreational activities movies, concerts, plays, casino, exercise... you get the idea. No, they won't pick-up 20 or 30 somethings who had too many beers on a Saturday night (Sorry Steve Schleuning).




If you can't drive but are now suddenly intrigued as to how you can become a DuRide, uh, rider, YOU CAN!

You will pay a small annual fee of \$45 when you sign up. For each ride you take, you will pay a small pick-up fee for that trip. No money will exchange hands. You don't need to tip any driver. You will have your own Transportation Account, which will keep track your rides. You'll receive a monthly account statement and pay it like any other bill. Through grants, donations and local sponsors, approximately half of the total cost will be covered by funds other than yours. This keeps DuRide affordable for Dubuquearea seniors, and low income residents may qualify for assistance upon request.







On Friday, March 2 from 7 to 9 p.m., Outside the Lines Art Gallery at 409 Bluff Street in historic Cable Car Square will host an artist's reception to celebrate new whimsical drawings by Keith Huie of Sun Prairie, Wisconsin, and hand crafted kaleidoscopes by Clermont, Iowa artisans, Steve and Peggy Kittelson. This show will be on display in the gallery's featured artist space through April 2012. The reception is free and open to the public. Complimentary hors d'oeuvres and beverages are offered.

Keith Huie likes to draw in black and white. He likes the comfort and familiarity of looking at antique photos, old movies and the comic books. Huie's father drew in black and white to keep him quiet in church, and the books he covertly read as a kid with a flashlight under the covers were illustrated in black and white. Huie states, "My life has been full of grand situations and bigger than life individuals. It seems every story of growing up contains some element of magic, a little twist or piece that makes it all mine. The best way I have found to capture those people and times is on paper in black and white."

Peggy and Steve Kittelson have been creating fine handcrafted kaleidoscopes since 1986. They are known for their classic two-mirror imagery, and the highest quality optical reflections defined by the display of miniature glass sculptures found in the object chambers. Each kaleidoscope is a collaboration of both artists. The exterior of their scopes are of kiln formed glass or lathe-turned hard-woods, combined with

Steve's fusing skills result in clean, crisp definition of design often requiring multiple firing and annealing, and his optics using front-surface mirror create images of the highest standard. Peggy's flame-sculpted glass pieces floating in the oil-filled object chambers are among the most beautiful to be viewed through a kaleidoscope. Their award-winning kaleidoscopes are shown and collected across the country.

Art Gumbo, the quarterly soup dinner that supports local art projects with communitysupported micro-funding, is now accepting applications from arts groups or organizations for the spring funding cycle. Applications for Art Gumbo mini grants for the spring funding cycle are available now through the application deadline, Thursday, March 15. Hosted by local arts activists Paula Neuhaus and Megan Starr, the next soup dinner and grant funding event will be held Thursday, March 22 at St. Mark Community Center, 1201 Locust Street. The dinner serves as both the fundraiser and grant review session for this quarter's Art Gumbo mini grant.

As was implemented last fall, quarterly Art

Gumbo events are split between funding cycles for individual artists or arts organizations. As this month's event is for arts groups or organizations, individual artists are not eligible to apply. The first seven eligible applications received by 11:59 p.m. on March 15 will qualify to compete for funding.



Organization project leaders must be present at the March 22 Art Gumbo Soup Dinner to win and should prepared to present a brief verbal pitch of the group's proposal. No visuals (or collaborative partners) will be allowed during pitch. As usual, Art Gumbo attendees pay \$10 to review the grants, slurp soup, and vote for their favorite proposal. All proceeds collected go into that evening's Art Gumbo microfund with the top two proposals with the most votes splitting the proceeds 70/30.





### dso goes to scotland



#### DSO: Sounds of Scotland March 17 & 18 Five Flags Theater

In a performance featuring a modern percussion concerto, the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra will showcase range and versatility in its "Sounds of Scotland" concert on March 17 and 18 at the historic Five Flags Theater. In addition to Mendelssohn and Beethoven, the program includes works by two of today's composers including a modern percussion concerto. "We can

play great Mozart and Bach, and we can play edgier newer music, and it all can excite and move you," says music director and conductor William Intriligator.

As the concert title suggests, the program has a strong Scottish theme starting with Mendelssohn's Hebrides Overture. It is a short tone poem

inspired by Mendelssohn's visit to the world-famous Fingal's Cave, particularly the turbulent sea voyage he took to see the rock formation. "The music will take you to another place and time," explains Intriligator. "If you listen to it closely, you can see the midst and feel the waves of the sea of the Scottish coast."

Beethoven's Symphony No. 8 follows. The least performed of Beethoven's Nine Symphonies; the piece is lighthearted and brief. "The slow movement imitates the sound of the recentlyinvented metronome," says Intriligator. "This music shows us a side of Beethoven that wasn't all torment and political upheaval."

The second half begins with "An Orkney Wedding, with Sunrise" by English composer Peter Maxwell Davies. He is England's "Master of the Queen's Music," a title granted to only one living composer by the Queen herself. The piece depicts a Scottish wedding, ranging from the arrival of guests amidst a storm to a reception party with drunken guests. Bagpipes are featured at the end of the piece, symbolizing the rising sun after the night-long celebration.

The final piece is a percussion concerto titled "Veni, veni, Emmanuel" by Scottish composer James MacMillan. Begun on the first Sunday of Advent and completed on Easter Sunday, the piece has a liturgical basis. It has been performed hundreds of times throughout the world since its premiere in 1992. Intriligator describes the piece as being "incredibly emotional with outcries of passion and dances of wild rhythms."



The entire front of the Five Flags stage will be covered in an array of percussion instruments with soloist Kyle Brightwell playing all of them. Brightwell was featured in the first two "Juilliard in June" concerts put on by NISOM. He graduated from Juilliard and will begin as a section percussionist with the Boston Symphony Orchestra in September 2012.

Performances are Saturday at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday at 2:00 p.m. Single tickets range from \$12 to \$46 and can be purchased in person at the Five Flags Center box office, at any Ticketmaster retail outlet (including the Hy-Vee on Dodge Street) or by visiting www.DubuqueSymphony.org. Discounted \$6 student tickets will be available in the Five Flags Theater lobby one hour prior to each performance.

Friday Open Rehearsal Open Rehearsal is scheduled for Friday, March 16. This event is free and open to the public. The symphony asks that everyone be in Five Flags Theater by 6:50 p.m. so that rehearsal can start promptly at 7:00 p.m. This is a great opportunity to watch how the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra fine-tunes a piece of music before presenting it concert weekend. It is a working rehearsal during which the orchestra will stop to rehearse certain sections of music that need refinement, or even repeat or omit movements.

In a Sunday Pre-Concert Lecture, Maestro Intriligator will also present a pre-concert lecture at 1:15 p.m. on Sunday March 18. A concert ticket is required to attend. You are welcome to sit anywhere in the theater during the lecture, and then move to your assigned seat for the concert. For more information, visit www.dubuquesymphony.org.





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
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### The Art of Making an Impact: JDIFF and Impact Award Creator Gene Tully

When 365 began contemplating hosting a program of community-based awards five years ago, which ultimately became our annual Impact Awards, there was really no question who we would commission to create the award trophies. That person would be Dubuque sculptor and metal artist Gene Tully. Tully took up the challenge and created not only a compelling award trophy but an iconic expression of what the Impact Awards honor and symbolize.



Since that first round of awards in the winter of 2009, Tully has handmade each and every Impact Award, as he is again for the 2011 Impact Awards to be presented on Tuesday, March 6. This year, in addition to a slight redesign of the Impact sculpture, Tully has also taken on the challenge of creating an award trophy for the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival. We visited Gene Tully in his Millwork District warehouse studio to talk about the awards, his inspiration, and how metal can serve as a means for expression.

We met Tully outside the Wilmac warehouse in the Historic Millwork District, which serves as home to his studio and metalworking workshop. "When I come down here and pull into this parking lot, I have a sense of gratitude," he explained, "and I'm grateful for access to the district, and for the Wilmac Property Company, and Dubuque, basically. I've

got such opportunity here for a creative life."

We walk up the 21 steps to the second floor, through the dark warehouse to the heavy rolling door that opens to the Wilmac workshop that also serves as Tully's sculpture and metalwork studio.

"When I moved from Colorado there was no longer a sense of mystery in my world, of new discovery like when I used to go into the mountains," Tully explains as he unlocks the door, "but each time I open these doors I look through here and something's changed because it's not all mine; it's cooperative with the Wilmac Property Company. There's new stuff going on, there's my stuff messing up the place ... How fortunate can I be that I can have all this? Even my art seems subordinate to the sense of place in which it's placed. It's incredible."



In his studio, adjacent to the workshop, Tully points out his library of books on art and metalworking amidst the sculptures, furniture, and various hunks of metal and stone.

Back in the workshop he points out the tools of his work and the piles of aluminum dust from the centerpiece decorations he recently completed for the Elisha Darlin Award. Tully seems to draw inspiration from the shop, the materials, the tools and even the warehouse space itself. It all seems very organic to Gene.

We take the walkway bridge across to another, much warmer, warehouse building, which serves as Tully's yoga studio where he teaches three classes a week.



"Much of my work is based in spirit," Tully observes. "It's based in reaching for higher things, higher energy and a higher cause beyond a mundane world of just interpreting or perhaps making art that is just saleable. I've kind of moved into a recognition of the value of my work as an expression of my beliefs as an opportunity for people to see the world through what I hold important."

I ask him how he came to be an artist and why metal became his medium of expression. "I think I was always an artist, but I didn't have a medium to express what I wanted to say," he answers. "When I found metal, it had the strength to convey, it had the strength to support the message that I wanted to record – the "om" signs, the warriors, the grotesques on the top of the building ... Metal to me – it takes so much force, energy, BTUs – but yet it will yield. It's soft enough to convey that message."

Originally from Dubuque, Tully spent about ten years living in Colorado before moving back to Dubuque in 1987. "I was thinking that I wanted to raise a family here," he said of his return. "I wanted my children to be around my parents and that worked out really well."

Tully bought his dad's business, which he said has served very well for his material needs, and eventually allowing him the opportunity to create. He began the process of rediscovering his community through friends like Fran and Ellen Henkels and Tim McNamara, owner of Wilmac Properties. Both avid skiers and bikers, Tully and McNamara began to host competitions and parties with their likeminded friends, which eventually led to Tully's entry into sculpture.

"All of my sculptural expressions came from awards because of offshoots of the things

that we were doing," Tully explains. "We started doing ski races, Telemark races, so we built awards for that. We put on bike races so we built awards for that. They were always just a great energetic investment. So we put on these funky little Telemark races out at Sundown, we'd build 13 awards and we'd have 13 racers so everybody got these cool pieces of work."

At some point the trophies became something more. "Somebody said, 'This is art,' and I said, 'No, I'm a craftsman,'" Tully recalls. "I tried to brush that off as long as I could until Ellen Henkels came along and said, 'You and I are going to do a show together.' Really? That was the first time I started to brush off the title as a craftsman and go, 'I'll accept and I'll be brave enough to step into the title of an artist.' Because that's a big move. When you call yourself an artist, you're saying, 'Well this comes from my heart. This doesn't just come from my brain, this comes from my heart."



With painter and art educator Ellen Henkels' prodding, the two shared an exhibition at the Rocco Buda Art Gallery in 2003. "It took me until I was 46 or 47 to call myself an artist," Tully admits. "It was a brave moment because it wasn't just saying, 'Take a look at this work.' It was 'Take a look at my heart.' I think if you take a close look at my work, you'll see what's important to me. Often times that's not articulated or demonstrated in a daily practice, but my art holds the truth and it doesn't lie."

That authenticity in expression is mirrored in the Impact Award sculptures – both in their form and what they represent. "I love the Impact Awards," Tully states. "After working with people who give their life – people that

> volunteer aren't just giving their time; they're giving their life. That's a huge commitment, a huge awareness, and for that, (I'm) eternally grateful. Being a bit of a leader in some of these things I find the most precious thing you can do is to say 'thank you,' to recognize. Thank you. Thank you for your life."

Tully is moved by the people who contribute to the growth of the community and is honored to be a part of recognizing those contributions. "I really do get chills, thinking about all the people who have made this community what it is," said Tully, "and from where we've come to where we are and where we'll

go. I think the Impact Awards are really, really significant. Making the awards for them ... you know, I don't make work for sale. I make work because I want to and this is one of the great gifts I have as an artist. I make work because I want to. I want to make those awards. I want to make awards for the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival because that IS where I place my life. This is where I want to invest my life, into these things that are progressing in our community and in our world."

In creating the original Impact Award design, Tully found a means to express the ideals embodied in the award. "That was just perfect," he said of the now iconic concentric circle design wrought in quarter-inch steel. "The perfect blend of my medium and the word 'impact,' and beyond that, the gratitude, the 'thank you.' The concentric circle appears in my work occasionally. Somebody told me one time that the concentric circle accepts and gives

at the same rate. It can't take in any more than it can give out because it gets filled up and it has to give out. So the concentric circle is meaningful to me. It's meaningful in a metaphysical way and a spiritual way. It also has the perspective of a ripple, where we can touch one thing and it affects beyond what we could predict."

In fact, Tully sees the medium itself as a great metaphor for the contributions awardwinners make to their community. "The 365 Impact Awards lend themselves so wonderfully to steel because for someone to make an impact, truly to make an impact, to give their life to make an impact on their community takes a lot of power, takes a lot of energy, takes a lot of commitment," he observed. "Once you do that, once you offer that to the universe, to your community, to yourself, to be able to give at that level, it doesn't go away. It reverberates. It's the fabric of our culture. It's the fabric of the universe. It's the progression of humanity. I celebrate in the longevity of steel, just like the longevity of your contribution ... and it will live on."



Tully has approached the design of the awards for the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival in a similar fashion, taking inspiration from the feather in the organization's logo and recreating it in aluminum. "I love those awards. I love picking them up," he said. "The figure of this feather, this piece of metal – aluminum – made light and it's reflection of light, and it's own weight ... but in relation to the Julien International Film Festival, it's the freedom of expression, it's going with the wind, it's floating, it's not weighted down by expectation."



Mike Hard doesn't sing his lyrics so much as he does force-feed them into your life. He barks in utter terror about apocalyptic visions, conspiracy theories, brainwashing, mental illness and religious fanaticism and he does it all while sweating through a three-piece suit.

OFF MAJOR

After nine years, four highly praised albums, and a handful of singles on the Minneapolis-based Amphetamine Reptile Records, Hard's band the God Bullies broke up due to, like so many other important and influential bands, inner-turmoil. Within a year, Hard had a new band with a new album, and in 1996, Thrall's Chemical Wedding was released, a successful blend of paranoid psychedelia and heavy rock that built upon the noisy, pounding dissonance of the God Bullies. Musically more straightforward in terms of simple rock and roll, Hard's dark and foreboding presence persevered.

> Then, as quickly as they were formed, Thrall disbanded Since then, Hard has re-formed Thrall multiple times and recorded two more albums under the Thrall

moniker, each time changing lineups and record labels. He even reunited the original God Bullies twice and formed a couple of new bands with original Thrall bassist Karen "Queen Bee" Neal: The Brain Saw and Th3yN3v3rSl33p, the latter of which featured drummer Adam Berg and guitarist David B. Livingstone, both ex-God Bullies. He plans on releasing a solo record in 2012 that will no doubt show he's remained both aggressively active and true to the original impetus of his demonic charm.

Almost a decade after the last anyone had heard from Thrall, Hard has again reformed the band and embarked on a tour that will include a stop in Dubuque at Off Minor on March 14. Do yourself a favor; check this show out while there is still wind in Mike Hard's sails. Appearing with Thrall will be the spazzy hardcore of Iowa City's Cop Bar and Dubuque's very own death metal darlings The Tapeworm Trend.

You have probably driven on Old Highway Road in Dubuque on the way to the Dubuque County Fairgrounds many, many times. When you did you passed right by Rhody's Food & Spirits. So did you stop in for some find food and drink? Yeah, me neither. Locals living in the area have often said I was missing out on a good thing. They would tell me Rhody's, located just 4 tenths of a mile East of the Fairgrounds, is one of the few places left where you can get good meals with a lot of food for not a lot of money.

Rhody's Food & Spirits was established in 2004 by Donna Miller. She named the restaurant after a long ago imaginary friend. And now, six years later, she has fulfilled hew dream of providing delicious home cooked style, made from scratch, meals to regular folks living on tight budgets.



Rhody's offers a casual atmosphere with an affable staff. Donna is proud to say her business is family owned and operated. Her Mom, Roberta Oberhoffer, helps keep things organized and her daughter, Melissa Miller, a recent college graduate, is both a cook and a waitress. She does a great job because after all she has been doing it since she was 15!

To be sure Rhody's is not a fancy place. However, as soon as you enter you are immediately treated like family. You can expect a warm welcome from Donna, Roberta and Melissa and the entire crew: cook Rita Sullivan, bartenders



Jim Gulyash and Rick May and all the waitresses. They are all very friendly and accommodating so it really doesn't matter if you are served by Hannah Heir, Joyce Freiberger, Sara Watter, Janet Engelken or her sister Jane Geselbracht.

The kitchen opens at 11:00 am and gets busy right away. It's easy to see why. The burgers are hand formed, choice grade, and fresh (never frozen) ground beef mixed with special house seasonings. The Bacon Cheeseburger is very popular but those in the know choose the Mushroom & Swiss with added bacon (pictured above). If you are really hungry though, the Big Kahuna is 21 ounces of ground beef with your choice of two toppings served on Texas toast. All burgers come with fries and either coleslaw, macaroni salad or potato salad. You have a choice of fries, too. The regular fries are coated with a light batter or you can have waffle fries sprinkled with house made seasonings.



When I visited during lunch I noticed a lot of Philly Steaks were being served (above). This sandwich was full of sirloin beefsteak covered with sautéed onions, mushrooms and green peppers and topped with Swiss and American cheese. I also noticed there were many orders for the Chicken Bacon Ranch Wraps (below).



Crispy chicken is mixed into lettuce, cheese, tomatoes and onions and wrapped in a fresh flour tortilla. For those of you who don't usually do wraps the Grilled Chicken Club is a very tasty alternative. A grilled chicken breast is topped with bacon and Swiss cheese on a hoagie bun. This sandwich is intriguing because it is served with Cusabi dressing. Cusabi is a combination of cucumber and wasabi Japanese horseradish. When made into a dressing it offers a tantalizing flavor.

The daily lunch specials taste like they are home cooked and are full meals for hungry eaters. They remind me of going to grandma's house for lunch. The Monday special is Cook's Choice and might be a hamburger steak or a pork loin dinner. Tuesday is an all beef meatloaf with mashed potatoes and vegetable. On Wednesday the special is 2 pieces of Fried Chicken cooked in a Henny Penny fryer at low temperature under controlled low pressure. A Taco

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Bar is set up on Thursday and Friday is an open face Roast Beef. The beef is especially tasty because Inside Round is slow cooked and twice roasted with specially prepared in-house seasonings. Friday specials of baked or fried cod or catfish are also available during Lent

Rhody's is a great place for dinner. I just found this out but apparently the local citizens have known this for years. When I arrived one recent evening I didn't think I would get a table since the parking lot was nearly full. I needn't have worried, though, because during several lunch visits I didn't see the side room. It's open for dinner except when it is used for private parties. It accommodates up to 55 people in a warm, cozy atmosphere.



Dinners at Rhody's are surprisingly good. For starters there are the usual Hot Wings, Nachos, Garlic Bread and Nacho Supreme Platters. My party of 4 decided on the Combo Platter consisting of French fries, onion rings, mushrooms, cheese curds, mini tacos and chicken strips. Bryce Parks, my dinner companion and 365ink publisher, suggested we substitute the Chicken Lips for the chicken strips. I thought this was because Bryce just has a thing for lips but it was actually a good decision. Chicken Lips are Melissa's recipe for very thin sliced chicken breast lightly hand breaded with just a little spicy buffalo sauce and served with a Budweiser Blue Cheese dipping sauce. I had to beat Bryce at Indian wrestling in order to get the last one! There are several enticing dinner entrees. The Rib-Eye is hand cut, always fresh and grilled on a flat top. The Fried Chicken is juicy and coated with a tasty batter. All you have to do is look at that Hamburger steak at the bottom of the page to know you've made a wise decision.

The Ribs are Baby Backs seasoned with secret ingredients and baked for at least three hours before being covered with

a house BBQ sauce (pictured ar right with fried chicken and potatoes). The Ham Steak is a huge hickory smoked bone-in slice of ham. Particularly popular during this Lenten season is Deep Fried Cod or Shrimp and Cod combination. I am looking forward to my return visit to try the Shrimp Scampi consisting of two skewers of 5 shrimp each covered with Creole seasonings and grilled in a garlic butter and oil sauce. My favorite, though, is an outrageously large hand formed Hamburger Steak totally covered with mushrooms and grilled onions.



Hannah, our waitress, did a superb job catering to our every need and insuring our dinner was properly served. However, she outdid herself when she brought us the dessert tray



and presented us with a terrific assortment of pies. Louise Johnson is an extraordinarily accomplished baker. Donna exclaims she is without a doubt the best pie and cake baker in Dubuque! On any night you have at least seven or eight pies and cakes to choose from. They are all made from fresh ingredients. You might find Coconut Cream, Lemon Meringue, Chocolate Silk, Grasshopper, Chocolate Cream, Lemon Cream, Pumpkin, Pumpkin Cream, Butterscotch, Chocolate Butterscotch, Strawberry, Cherry, Apple, Peach, Pecan, or my new found favorite: Sour Cream and Raisin.

Rhody's Food & Spirits is off the beaten path. But it is easy to get to and well worth the drive when you want fine food and made from scratch pies at reasonable prices.



The book talked about the joy of planting colorful plants in the garden and went into detail about the various ways to achieve such color including starting flower seeds indoors and keeping an eye on the fall bulbs that should be peeking through the soil soon. It also talked about an often overlooked category of gardening, planting summer, non-hardy bulbs like Dahlias, Calla Lilies, and Ranunculus. After seeing my daughter light up at the colors within the book I thought 'What a perfect way to begin sharing the gift of gardening with my young family!'

Many people have tried planting these bulbs in the past only to wait and wait and wait. Often they end up disappointed because it takes so long for the plants to actually grow. If you begin planting these bulbs indoors, you will find that these incredible plants can offer you beautiful color all summer long.

Tips for Starting Summer Bulbs Indoors from www.bulb.com:

1. Select bulbs (true bulbs, tubers, rhizomes, roots) that are firm to the touch.

2. To get earlier blooms, pot them up indoors to start growing about six weeks before your planting-out date, the date in your area when the threat of night frosts is past. Choose clean containers with drainage holes. Good drainage is essential. Use a commercial potting soil mixed with equal parts peat moss and a drainage material such as sand or Perlite.

3. Place bulbs in the soil mix, following the planting directions suited to that type of plant. Different types of summer bulbs

require very different planting methods. Some are planted barely covered with soil, others deep, others laid in horizontally, some concave side up. For specific details related to planting depth and positioning, look for instructions on www. bulb.com (Summer Flowering Bulbs) or on bulb packaging.



4. Warm humid settings are optimal for growth. Keep soil moist, but not wet.

5. Once the threat of frost is past, transplant tender bulb plants to the garden or outdoor containers. Summer bulbs prefer warm soil, close to 60° F. This soil temperature is generally reached once nighttime temperatures have stayed at/or above 60°F for about two weeks.

For a list of summer bulbs that are recommended to be started indoors pre- season visit www.bulb.com.

Bulbs such as gladiolas have a shorter time needed to produce blooms and can be successfully planted directly into the soil.

When purchasing summer bulbs, you will often find other roots, rhizomes, and tubers on the same shelf. Asparagus, garlic, shallots and horseradish can be purchased in the spring to be planted directly into the ground once temperatures allow the soil to be worked.

I hope you too can learn the joy of planting these beautiful summer bulbs, color that can last all season long.

### **Killing Alex Cross Might Be a Good Idea**

I'm not conflicted about James Patterson at all. He has transformed himself from a writer of very popular, fun to read detective thrillers into a hack. With or without his rather large band of merry collaborators he is becoming more and more unnecessary as a bright spot on everyone's literary radar. It has gotten so bad for me that I no longer read anything he has written with the exception of the Alex Cross books.

I am, however, very conflicted about Alex Cross. He is one of my favorite characters in all of contemporary fiction. He is a loving father and grandson, an attentive husband, and, at one time, one of the most accurate profilers anywhere. He is whip-

lash smart and brave beyond the call of duty. Not to put too fine a point on it, he is one of the most popular black characters doing business on the national scene in the context of the books he appears in. It's not hard to understand why any young

man black or white or brown or yellow would not want to grow up to be like Alex Cross. That is, until now.

The last few Alex Cross books have been dropped on the unsuspecting public with a reverberating thud. Not, I think, because Alex has gotten boring, brainless or silly but because Mr. Patterson has gotten boring, brainless, and silly. I'm very afraid to say that Mr. Patterson's latest Alex Cross novel, Kill Alex Cross, has been jettisoned from Patterson's

> word processor for what seems to be no other reason than money; or maybe bragging rights to be the only living author to have published 1,768 novels in the last 12 months. I exaggerate. It is more like a couple of dozen. Seriously!


Kill Alex Cross has two and a half stories running concurrently and the half story is the only one that makes any sense. A homeless girl comes to live with the Cross family, never mind how or why. This is heartwarming and kind and forms the counterpoint to the other two stories in the book, the kidnapping

of the President's children, and the plotting of a most heinous terrorist act on the people of Washington D. C..

For some reason that has to do with symmetry and interconnectedness I wanted those two big stories to have something to do with each other. NOPE. Seems like Mr. Patterson had these two ideas and couldn't bother to spend

more than a few minutes trying to orchestrate a full novel out of each one since even an illiterate boob can see how each idea can and probably should have been given their own books to live in.

The bad guys are the worst part of Kill Alex Cross where, you are noting going to believe this, none of the bad guys actually tries to kill him!!!! Mr. Patterson has created a whole host of bad guys that are the stuff nightmares are made of not the least of which is Kyle Craig or Gary Soneji. The guys in this book are more like Wile E Coyote in the Road Runner cartoons. Nana comes off a little harsh and shrill instead of her usual loveable curmudgeon.



The kids are all right but I will never understand why Patterson doesn't give a larger place in the books to Sampson. He is interesting, competent; one of the few people Cross pays attention to in the investigations. Cross's love interests come across more like wallpaper that real lovers, and Mr. Patterson seems to have dumbed down Alex in this book: something that has been happening

in the last few Cross books.

The books plot, even with all these flaws, moves along very quickly kind of like a Mazda RX8 instead of an F-14 but it does move along and it's a very quick read. The chapters are still very short so BPB breaks are easy to find (Bathroom, Popcorn and Beer), and, I liked the cover. OK now I'm trying especially hard to be nice here.

Having said all of that, I still like Alex Cross enough to have read the book and have gotten some enjoyment out of seeing where he is these days even if where he is is a little boring, brainless, and silly.

#### Midnight at the Oasis

Sensing my lack of, shall we say, enthusiasm about things lately, a good friend asks, "Where do you find joy in your life?" JOY? I want to squawk. What in the world is THAT? Thus proving my friend's diagnosis might be too close for comfort.

Comfort, in fact, is what I feel is needed, more than joy. So I've been eating a lot of – well, I've been eating a lot. Chocolate tends to dominate – it's as close to a sure thing as I know of – but I've been having trouble delineating the times for meals from the times for not having meals. Emotional eating, they call it, shoveling in the comfort food. In part, this is a good thing, because one my medications shut my appetite off so sharply last year, it was all I could do to shove a miniscule piece of lasagna into my mouth before saying miserably, "I'm full."

That wasn't good. But I wasn't prepared for the counter effect of the new drug my neurologist prescribed, in her ever-hopeful quest to make my head pain-free. Hoo boy, did this one whet my appetite. Where I used to eat a square inch of my pork chop and either sneak the rest back into the serving dish, or give up all pretense and just plop it on my husband's plate, now it's me battling him for the last heel of garlic bread. Those Betty Jane chocolates in the heart-shaped box aren't going to last long.

But enough about food. My friend was talking about real joy, not a bandage to cover up the bruises from crawling through the desert too long. I had to think hard about this. What is joy? Is it zest? Delight? Euphoria? Does it go so far as bliss? Elation? Rapture? Transport? Or is it less manic, more subtle, a knowledge that dawns on us that this, right here – this is what I needed?

My husband used a different word to talk about it. He said everyone needs "oases" in their lives. That jazzy song by Maria Muldaur sprang to mind, because my mind is like that – easily overtaken by ear worms. But this concept he was describing wasn't jazzy, or zesty, or euphoric. In fact, it felt a lot more like the word I started with: comfort. Which, another friend tells me, means "courage." My courage could definitely use some boosting.

Maybe you're lucky, and you don't feel the need for an oasis. But its opposite

- the desert - is a metaphor for all kinds of joy-draining moments in our lives. Enduring the long board meeting. Driving that dreary stretch of interstate. Returning home to a dark house, alone. Hearing bad news on the phone. Overseeing the care of a sick family member. Bearing a chronic illness yourself, and feeling progressively invisible and hopeless. Think about your own deserts you've probably had your share. You may be longing for respite even as you struggle with your obligation to be the good mother, good son, good neighbor.

True oases often surprise you, appearing where and when you least expect them. But you'll know they are real by the way they buoy your spirits. That's how you know they're not a mirage

So here, in no particular order, are some of the oases that have given me comfort, some short-lived, others more enduring:

• Browsing book stores with my daughter.

- Picking up the phone and hearing "Hi, Mom!" from my son, who calls me about as often as most grown sons call their mothers.
  Reading books of poetry the way you read a novel, from front to back.
- Flowering trees in full, knock-out bloom.Family. See above.
- Friends. Ditto.
- Libraries, preferably those where I don't know the entire staff.

• Deanne's chocolate sauce, made and consumed all by myself. Some pleasures should not be witnessed.

• My Aunt Ethel and Uncle Albie's house, where we spent so many holidays. Now I can only go there in memory.

• My corner of the sofa, with a stack of magazines.

• Music. John Mellencamp. Five for Fighting. Joni Mitchell. The Allman Brothers. I used to put "Hitching Post" on every time I was at home alone

• The cottage in the woods in northern Wisconsin. Every spring, we spend almost a week there. Every time we leave, it gets harder to close the door. So I need to focus on the being there. Mindfully. Joyfully. Maybe I'll see another bear this year! And hear my favorite bird, as high up in the trees as he is on the scale.



• Eating Indian food, from just around the corner. Thank you, Hot & Spicy.

Driving to Madison for food, films, family.
Non-holiday days. No special food, no tiresome traditions. Just another day requiring no pomp or circumstance.



People are generally not born either optimistic or pessimistic. It is learned behavior. Because this behavior is learned, it can be unlearned. You can choose to look at



#### STRETCHING

Popular beliefs tell us in order to stay fit and healthy we need a fitness program that includes aerobic exercise to improve our cardiovascular health and burn fat, along with weight training to build lean muscle and stay strong. routine should always follow exercise or a warm-up. Simple warm-ups include; walking, a light jog, jumping jacks, or a few trips up and down a flight of stairs. Even a warm shower or a soak in a hot tub can be used to warm your muscles up before you stretch.

- When you stretch:
- Warm-up before you begin.
- Start slowly.
- Exhale as you perform the stretch.
- Stay within your comfort zone.
- If it hurts, ease up or stop.

Stretching should not be painful:

- Ease into the stretch. Do not bounce up and down! Bouncing can cause injury. • Hold each stretch for 20-30 seconds and
- perform each stretch 2-3 times.

#### **General Rules:**

• If you spend most of your day seated, you should try to focus more of your attention stretching the muscles of your lower back (erector spinae), the front of your hips (hip flexors) and the back of your legs (hamstrings). These muscle tend to become tight with prolonged periods of sitting and should be stretched a couple times each week.

• If you run or walk for exercise, try to focus on the larger muscles of the legs (gluteals, guadriceps, hamstrings and calves) and your lower back (erector spinae). These stretches should be incorporated into your cool down period and should be performed after each exercise session.

• If you are a weightlifter, stretch each muscle group that you targeted during your workout, as part of your cool down. Stretching after resistance training will lead to less muscle soreness and can also lead to faster strength gains.



The Dubuque Jaycees Community Garden was founded in the spring of 2011 to offer the public an opportunity to grow their own gardens to great success. ### The Global Smart City Summit: Part Two... A Cultural Introduction

We arrived in Tainan City, Taiwan at 5 a.m. on

December 14th, following an amazing 37 hour trip from Dubuque! After checking in and making our way to our room at the Tayih Landis Hotel, we fell fast asleep, awaking several hours later to a beautiful welcome gift on the desk!

The card read, "Dear Mayor Buol, Tainan City Government welcomes you to the 2011 Global Smart City Summit in Tainan. There are fruits on the table which are locally grown in Tainan ...grape-tomatoes, bell fruits, and oranges. We hope you enjoy your stay in Tainan. From the Tainan City Government." The inscription on the card, in both Chinese and English read, "Tainan, Capital of Culture ...This is a good place for people to dream, work, fall in love, get married, and live carefree."

We hurried to freshen up to meet our hosts in the hotel lobby for an afternoon that would introduce this culture of which they were so proud, beginning with a tour of the Chi-Mei Museum, followed by a tour of the Chilin Technology Co., Ltd.



There to greet us was the young lady, Cathy, who had been our email contact since accepting the invitation in August from Dr. Chin-Teng Lin, Dean of Academic Affairs of the National Chiao Tung University and host of the Summit. As we learned on the way, the Chi-Mei Museum in Tainan is the private museum of the Chi-Mei Industrial Corporation. The museum's collection is divided into five categories: Western Art (including painting, sculpture, decorative arts and period furniture); Musical Instruments; Natural History; Arms and Armor; Antiquities and Artifacts.

The wealth of the collection encompasses different eras and geographical areas. Experts recognize the Chi-Mei Museum as one of the most prestigious private collections in the world! Forbes magazine, in its February 1996 article on private collectors in Asia, called Chi-Mei Museum "one of the world's most surprising art collections." And, notably, the museum is open to the public, free of charge!

Upon arrival, we met Lars Thunberg, the Deputy Mayor from Helsinborg, Sweden who would also be presenting at the Summit. Our escorts for the tour were Tainan City Deputy Mayor Charles Lin, Deputy Manager George Cho of the Chi Lin Technology Co., Ltd. And Richard K. F. Soon, the Director of Chilin Technology Co. Ltd.



We were treated to a highlighted tour of an extensive collection that spans the history of European art, from the Roman mosaic and frieze, the religious art of the Middle Ages, and painting and sculpture of the Renaissance and Baroque periods to the Romantic and Impressionist movements, Art Nouveau, and abstract works of the 20th century.



We also experienced something quite unique in the collection of a wide-range of violins, violas and cellos made by the most famous and important Italian violin-makers from the 17th Century, including Antonio Stradivari, Joseph Guaneri del Gesu and Nicolo Amati. The objective of this collection which is unique both in quantity and quality within the Asian region, is to restore the life of those instruments.

In addition to its collection of rare violins, The Chi-Mei Musical Instrument Collection contains historical instruments from various time periods and locations. Many world renowned musicians have visited and utilized the Chi-Mei Music Instrument Collection,

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including Yo-Yo Ma. A more expansive Chi-Mei Museum is under construction and is due to open in 2013. And, it will remain open to the public, free of charge!



We left the museum, to travel to Chi-Lin Technology Company which we learned had been involved with optoelectronics since 2000 and has built up its flat panel display components building. Lars and I enjoyed being able to google our homes on the



interactive extra large flat screen map to show our country, then state, then city, and finally our street and homes to our hosts! We were treated to a demonstration of a new back light technology that allows the light



that typically shines into a room in a specific area, to be redirected to light the entire room. Chi-Lin is a world leader in the development of energy-saving green building products.

We were treated to coffee and a pastry following our tour which included a steamed bread, shiny and white, filled with a barbecued shredded pork on the inside...fabulous! It was time to return to the hotel to get ready for the host city's opening reception!

#### Dear Art Lover,

Use an insulated length of 10 to 14 Gauge, 20,000 Volt wire as a jumper to connect the chicken to the power source. Connect a second terminal to a metal rod implanted in the earth about 6 feet away. This can be cleverly hidden under a shrub or a small flowering plant. I recommend a Hawker Odyssey military grade tank battery for their overall ruggedness and dependability. 
