





Galena is known for its mines. We often think of the mines as worked by white pioneers and immigrants. In fact, the origins of mining in our region date much earlier. Long before the white man made his way to Galena, Native Americans were digging into the soil to find what minerals they could. Phil Millhouse will present "Native American Mining in the Driftless Region" on Saturday, April 14 at 7 p.m. at the DeSoto House Hotel ballroom as part of the Galena-Jo Daviess County Historical Society's lecture series. Native Americans have utilized and exchanged galena from the Upper Mississippi valley for thousands of years. The arrival of European colonial powers created an enormous market for the mineral. From the late 1600s until the late 1820s, the Miami, Meskwaki and Ho-Chunk mined, smelted

and traded lead on an industrial scale. Millhouse's presentation will give an overview of this tradition and the critical role it played in the historical trajectory of the region.





The Mighty Short Bus celebrates the release of the Madison band's fourth CD, The MSB Family Band, with a release performance at The Lift Friday, April 6. Known for their roots-influenced rock and country, MSB has taken a left turn for this new collection of 11 songs, unplugging to explore the collective sound of acoustic instruments and voices together in one room.

"The concept behind the record was energy," explained singer and guitarist Frank Busch. "We wanted to capture the pure energy that musicians create the first time they play a song together - the positive nervous energy that comes from listening as much as playing."

Rather than record rhythm tracks and overdub vocals and solos in a recording studio as most contemporary recordings are created, the band - Busch, Nic Adamany, Rob Junceau, Dan Ryan, plus friends Kenny Leiser from The Lucas Cates Band and Josh Smith from the Eugene Smiles Project (both Madison bands) pursued a much more direct approach.

"We took all the acoustic noisemakers we had and holed up in a 100-year-old barn between Elizabeth and Savanna over two days in late fall," explained Busch. "Everyone received a demo of the songs recorded on a phone two weeks prior, but no practices were had until the first day of recording. We set up a bunch of mics in a circle and pressed record. All reverb was provided by the barn itself. What we turned out was an Americana bluegrass record that we all agreed was the best thing we had ever worked on. The experience was so great that we decided to call it The MSB Family Band."

Scheduled to be released on March 30, the CD is already generating a buzz with the lead track "Tonight" landing in regular rotation on Madison's 105.5 WMMM. Fans of MSB's electric side can look forward to a new rock record sometime in late 2012.







Millwork Redevelopment: The Backstory

Anyone who attended the Voices From The Warehouse District art exhibit last September could not help but notice the new streetscape and some pretty major construction occurring just across the street in the Caradco Building. What is going on there? Well, in this series of articles, 365 will explore the redevelopment of the Caradco Building and the Historic Millwork District in which it is located.

In this issue, we'll begin by looking at a little of the history of the Millwork District, its unfortunate decline and how the Dubuque community came to re-imagine the area as an opportunity for redevelopment.

Below and bottom of facing page are artist renderings of the finished space.

The area that is now known as Historic Millwork District developed during Dubuque's period of industrial growth in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Access to a ready supply of wood transported down the Mississippi River positioned Dubuque for growth in lumber and millworking, including the production of windows and doors. By the turn of the century, the Millwork District was an industrial and economic powerhouse, the nation's largest window and door manufacturing district and home to dozens of companies employing approximately 2,500 workers.

Of the many Millwork District companies, the Carr, Ryder & Adams Company, later known as Caradco, was one of the largest. With roots that stretch back to 1856 with the business partnership between William Carr and W.M. Austin, the company went by many different

names over the years, based on various mergers and partnerships. Encyclopedia Dubuque explains the company's size and reach:



Caradco was a manufacturing company of over thirty million doors and fifty-five million windows. Once one of the nation's premier millwork companies, Caradco products were used in the White House in Washington, D.C.; West Point Military Academy in New York;

Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois; and the University of Iowa. In 1966 company officials estimated nearly half of Dubuque's downtown buildings displayed Caradco products.

The three-story Caradco Building itself, built between 1880 and 1906, was the Carr, Ryder & Adams Company main plant building, which covers an entire city block. It was part of Caradco's manufacturing campus that continued to grow through the mid 20th century to a million square feet of floor space.

But as the Midwestern lumber supply dwindled, Caradco and the other manufacturers of the district had to rely on lumber shipped by rail from resources further and further away. By the 1960s, demand for products had dropped as labor costs had risen. Another Millwork District powerhouse Farley and Loetscher Manufacturing Company closed in 1962. Caradco held out until it was purchased by Scovill Manufacturing Company in 1968. Scovill moved window-manufacturing production to an Illinois plant in 1976.

Over the intervening years, as millwork business shut down or moved to more modern facilities, the district's large warehouse and factory buildings were put to other uses – warehouse storage, office and retail space – but usage was never as robust as during the district's manufacturing heyday. While some saw potential in the area, for the most part the district was largely ignored and in some cases buildings began to fall into disrepair.

In 2005, potential reuse for the district got a shot in the arm. Artist Gene Tully, in partnership with warehouse owner Tim McNamara and the Dubuque Museum of Art, mounted a huge art





exhibit, Voices From the Warehouse District in a vacant 10,000 square foot warehouse space. That same summer, the Dubuque Area Chamber of Commerce and the Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque with funding by the Dubuque Racing Association launched Envision 2010, an initiative to engage the participation of the broader community in a vision and planning process toward building a better community in the following five years.

wasteland but an untapped resource, ripe for redevelopment. With one million square feet of historic warehouse space ideal for urban mixed-use development, the district had potential not just for housing, but also space for retail and service businesses, as well as non-profits to serve potential residents.



immediately began working toward a redevelopment plan that would transform the Historic Millwork District from an aging industrial legacy into a thriving, dynamic urban neighborhood that honored its historic past and built a more sustainable future.

When you are partying to 2 o'clock in the morning it is good to know you can still go someplace for a delicious dinner. The kitchen at George & Dale's in East Dubuque, IL serves their full menu right up to 2:45 am and even then you can still get their famous chili dog right up to closing time at 3:30 am.

George Young and his brother Dale were in the bar business and understood there was a demand for late night nourishment in East Dubuque. So 35 years ago they opened George & Dale's Sports Bar and Grill. It quickly caught on because its purpose was to serve good food and drink for lunch, dinner, supper and late night snacks. George's son, also named Dale, had cooked in several supper clubs and finally joined his dad 15 years ago. About a year ago Dale became the sole owner when his father was elected Mayor of East Dubuque.



So now Dale is carrying on the tradition of being one of the few late night entertainment hot spots in the Tri-State area. Dale's entire menu is available day and night so if you want a hamburger or chili dog at 2:30 in the morning it's yours and if you feel like a 4 piece fried chicken dinner or 2 lbs of ribs at 11 am you can have that too.

All the meals are surprisingly good. The Foot Long Beef and Pork Chili Dogs are covered in a tasty chili and topped

with cheese. The burgers are all made from Black Angus ground chuck. You can order regular ones in either 1/4 or 1/2 pound sizes and add all your favorite toppings. Then there are the Monster Burgers made with two half pound burger patties. Dale's creation, the Big "D", half pound burger with ham, lettuce, mayo, pickle, tomato, Swiss cheese and onion and the Build a Burger with one pound of burger with bacon or ham or roast beef and mushrooms, jalapeño or grilled onions round out the burger options.

When you look over the menu you will notice right away there are several items with roast beef. That's because the beef is slow roasted Flat Bottom Round basted in special seasonings and is a house specialty.

Dale is so proud of his beef you can order it as a Roast Beef Sandwich, or George's World Famous Roast Beef Deluxe with Swiss cheese, grilled onions and mushrooms. Or how about the Roast Beef Bacon Cheeseburger: a cheeseburger with bacon, and you guessed it, roast beef! And then there's my favorite, the Hot Beef with mounds of roast beef on white bread and mashed potatoes and gravy.





There are so many wonderful burgers and roast beef menu items it's easy to overlook some of the other delicious menu entrées. The Steak Sandwich, for example, is hand cut and flame grilled to your specifications. The Fried Chicken is fresh, never frozen, hand breaded with a homemade beer batter. I particularly like the flame grilled locally made specially seasoned brat patty.

satisfying and real good deals considering the prices are only \$6.95 to \$12.95 for the deluxe.

For those of you looking to add a little adventure to your lives try ordering from the Man versus George n Dale's section of the menu. Here you will find the One Pound Double D Burger with 2 half pound

Sometimes you might not want to have a big dinner and would rather watch a game and munch on a few snacks. Here again Dale has you covered. There are about 19 different appetizers including fried pickles, chicken strips, onion rings, mini tacos, chicken wings, fries with cheese sauce, fries with chili and potato teasers just to name a few. Since I usually can't decide which ones to order I just order the Munchie Basket that has a whole assortment all for just \$7.95!

George & Dale's is a full-on entertainment destination. Several times during the year there are awards banquets for many local organizations like firemen associations and basketball teams. A dart tournament was held there just last week-end and starting April 1st there will be live music on Sunday afternoons from 3:00 to 7:00 pm. A beer garden is a work in progress and already people are enjoying good food and drink under the stars.

This will be the 4th year George & Dale's has sponsored Gary's Graffiti Nights. On Thursday evenings from mid May to mid September come down and see the weekly cruise for cars and trucks manufactured in 1972 or before. There are always 150 to 250 vehicles on display and their owners are only too happy to show you all their customizing and restoration accomplishments.

While you are having all this fun don't forget dessert! Dale knows many of us have a sweet tooth so he has teamed up with the Chocolate Shoppe from Madison, WI. They make ice cream with 14% butterfat and cream supplied from farms in Southwestern Wisconsin and Northeastern Iowa. Their super-premium ice



The Reuben is sliced- to-order slow roasted corned beef brisket with Thousand Island dressing and sauerkraut on a nice rye bread. Whole pork tenderloins are cut into half pound slices and butterflied in-house and served either deep fried or grilled. You seafood lovers have your choice of beer battered cod or shrimp dinners.

Of course no self respecting sports bar and grill would be without pizza. Here they are made from scratch when you order them and come in 9 and 12 inch sizes. They are truly

patties, 2 slices of ham and other toppings. Other items are the Two Pounds of Chili Cheese Fries and the Homewrecker which is a monstrous half pound all beef foot long hot dog topped with chili, cheese and onions. And lastly, for the super heroes seeking a new challenge: the Two Pound Cheeseburger served with one pound of fries. Eat it all in ten minutes or less and you get your face memorialized on the wall of fame. Oh, and by the way, so far no one, not one person, has been able to do this.





Spring Bloomers

With spring coming on exceptionally early this year, it seems people are even more excited to learn how they too can have these wonderful colors incorporated into their own private oasis. As a landscape designer, my goal for many clients is to bring color into their yards all year long. Here are a few of my favorite picks for early spring color...

1. Forsythia - These yellow beauties were staples on many large farms and acreages throughout history. Today these beautiful plants have been developed for our more average sized yards as well. 'Bronx' Forsythia only grows approximately 1' tall and 3' wide making it a lovely plant to be used in a grouping below a specimen tree.

2. Redbud - A perennial favorite, this tree simply glows with a bold lavender color along the trees branches prior to it leafing out. Although we do see a sprinkling of them throughout our city, it can be a challenging tree to grow.

3. Ornamental Cherry - While visiting family in Portland, Oregon last year, I was fortunate to see the cherries in bloom. While these trees are gorgeous, they are unfortunately not a great tree for longevity. They are regularly attacked by borers which eat them from the inside out. During mild winters like we just experienced, these trees produce a beautiful bloom the following spring. During regular Iowa winters these buds don't fair as well and will often not bloom at all.

4. Crabapple - One trip down South Grandview in the spring and it's easy to know why crabapple trees are so popular. Their bold colorful blooms are showpieces. Unfortunately many have been frustrated by the challenges of growing some of the older varieties due to disease problems that plague these trees. However, many new cultivars have been introduced to combat these concerns. Varieties such as 'Prairiefire' and the compact 'Coralburst' rarely experience any problems.

5. Ornamental Pear - Have you driven past our 32nd Street location recently? Our beautiful 'Chanticleer' Pears are in full bloom and every year we get tons of phone

calls about them. Their beautiful upright pyramidal shape makes them an excellent tree for the boulevard or a smaller front yard since they only grow about 16 feet wide. Although these trees do get some very small fruit, we have them planted along our sidewalks and never have seen the fruit drop to the ground causing a mess.

6. Lilacs - Although lilacs have been used for many years, it has been in recent years that newer cultivars have been developed for the smaller yards. A couple of years ago 'Bloomerang' made its way to the market and as the name implies, its big claim to fame is that it repeats blooming all summer long. When these initially arrived in our nursery, it was difficult to tell if we were going to be impressed. Once they were planted, however, many of our customers have been pleasantly happy about the success of this plant.




7. Brunera - As the Hosta capital of the Midwest, we often overlook other shade perennials that can offer us unique features. Variegated Brunera specifically is one of my personal favorites. Each spring this mound of beautiful bold cream and green foliage is covered in a halo of baby blue blooms making it stand out in a shady space early each season.

8. Rhododendron - These incredible broadleaf evergreens look almost tropical when they bloom. Use them in a protected area though; they tend to dry out in high wind situations. Also plant them in a shady location as the afternoon sun is not their friend. 'PJM' is one of the best varieties for our climate.

What I am doing in my garden...

- The old saying, "fertilize when the forsythia are blooming," is true. And although that happened earlier than usual, it is in fact time to consider applying a crabgrass preventer/ fertilizer combo.
- Remove any remaining growth from last years perennials. Most are already showing signs of growth. Refresh mulch that has broken down or discolored from last season
- Get those containers ready for fun summer annuals by filling them with fresh potting mix.

Bargain Book Bin Bonanza



With the proliferation of the Dollar Stores and their clones, bargain book hunters like me are having the times of our lives... almost. I used to be able to find a book or two at a buck apiece every time I went into one of those stores. Nowadays I usually find 37 versions of the King James Bible and Mitch McConnell's book which vomits all over its readers whatever happens to be on McConnell's pea sized brain. I keep going back though. Hope springs eternal and all that but sometimes a few months go by with no bargain book clutched in my hand while I'm driving a little faster than I should so I can get home to start reading it. That is when I have the thought. Maybe these trips to the discount stores aren't worth the time. That's, usually, when I come across a little gem and, boy, did I find one.

It is called *The Last of the Tribe: The Quest to Save a Lone Man in the Amazon* by Monte Reel. The loggers and the cattle ranchers have almost free reign if there are no Indians living on the land they want. So, when the loggers and the ranchers find these indigenous people they run them off the land and don't report them to the government. Sometimes, they send out death squads to kill them off permanently getting rid of the problem and the evidence. You try finding a body in the Amazon rainforest. After a few weeks there is nothing left to find because all those little rainforest critters are very, very efficient at doing their job. There is some conjecture that the Lone Man's tribe fell victim to one of these death squads and somehow he alone escaped.



That is all I am going to tell you except to say that the chance that this has a happy ending is one in a million and sometimes somebody does win who richly deserves it. To paraphrase a judge named Carlos Ayres Britto who was commenting on one of the final legal decisions in the case surrounding the Lone Man, loggers, cattle ranchers and the indigenous people of Brazil living in the rainforest when he said, "With this decision, Brazil will be able to look at itself in the mirror of history and not blush with embarrassment."

Remember, I found this terrific book in the bargain bin at the Dollar Store. It's what keeps me going back to all of them there dollar-like stores and checking out the Bargain Book Bin. Now you can strike up a chorus or two of Kumbaya. Sing it loud and sing it proud!



Dubuque Symphony Season Finale Features Gilbertson's Newest Work for Orchestra and Juilliard Grad Euntaek Kim

The Dubuque Symphony Orchestra concludes its 2011-2012 classics season with composer and Dubuque native Michael Gilbertson's newest work for orchestra on April 14 and 15 at the historic Five Flags Theater. The piece, titled *Tragedy Tomorrow*, was co-commissioned by the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra and is a bold and dramatic showpiece for a large orchestra.



In Gilbertson's words, "*Tragedy Tomorrow* is a musical portrait of New York City in the 1920s: the Hindenburg looming above the city, the sunburst design of the Chrysler Building, traffic on Fifth Avenue, a dark, romantic club. The intention of the piece is not to conjure up these images, but to capture the era's fragile spirit of optimism and abandon."

Gilbertson's career has continued to flourish since audiences heard his last Dubuque Symphony Orchestra-commissioned work *In Search of Lost Futures* in 2009. Now a master's student at the Yale School of Music, Gilbertson is receiving commissions and performances by orchestras and chamber ensembles across America.

Following *Tragedy Tomorrow*, Juilliard graduate Euntaek Kim will perform Prokofiev's Piano Concerto No. 2. Previously Kim has performed at the Juilliard in June concerts to benefit the Northeast Iowa School of Music. "Euntaek is a phenomenal



musician! He is so good, he is fearless. The most difficult piano pieces don't scare him, and that explains why, when I invited him to do a concerto with us, he chose to do the Prokofiev Piano Concerto

No. 2," said conductor William Intriligator. "This piece is regarded, among great pianists, as one of the most difficult concertos of all. The solo cadenzas are considered by some to be unplayable. Yet Euntaek is going to eat this piece for breakfast!"

Closing the performance is Tchaikovsky's Fourth Symphony. Written during a time of great turmoil in Tchaikovsky's life the piece explores the idea of a fateful force preventing one's urge for happiness. That fateful force is represented by a loud fanfare heard at the very beginning of the piece and reoccurs throughout all four

movements. In the end happiness prevails and the finale is one of great joy—concluding the season in a blaze of great celebration.

Performances are Saturday at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday at 2:00 p.m. Single tickets range from \$12 to \$46 and can be purchased in person at the Five Flags Center box office, at any Ticketmaster retail outlet (including the Hy-Vee on Dodge Street) or by visiting www.DubuqueSymphony.org. Discounted \$6 student tickets will be available in the Five Flags Theater lobby one hour prior to each performance.

Pills of Rage?

As you may know, I get headaches. Chronic, daily migraines. Hence, I've tried a lot of remedies.

Some of these cause side effects. The good, the bad, and the ugly, you could call them.

In the medical world, these unwelcome consequences are known as "adverse effects." If you've ever had a prescription filled, chances are you've received a helpful list of do's and don'ts and "Oh, by the way, this could happen while you're taking this drug." Adverse effects range from anorexia and asthenia to tachycardia and tardive dyskinesia. In street terms, these mean 1) lack of appetite to the point of starving, 2) severe loss of strength, 3) overly rapid heart rate, and 4) the one I fear the most: repetitive, involuntary, purposeless movements, such as grimacing, tongue protrusion, lip smacking, puckering and pursing of the lips, and rapid eye blinking. Once you have it, even going off the drug does not make that adverse effect go away. No thank you.

I take - let's see - six different medications to prevent migraines, some up to four times a day. I also have two "rescue" medications to take, by shot or by pill, if the preventives don't work. "If" - ha. The first time I put syringes with 1.5-inch needles into my purse, along with little vials of Toradol, I really felt like I'd arrived. Let's hope I remember to clear them out before trying to board a plane.

The whole point of going into a Michigan hospital's Head Pain Unit was to be hooked up to an I.V. so the doctors could, in their words, throw everything they've got at my headache to see what might work. Once they come up with a cocktail you can tolerate, you are released back into the world. So, for example, the meds that made me faint upon standing were swiftly dropped, while the ones (the few, the proud) that seemed to sort of work were added to the sheaf of prescriptions I took to the pharmacy before leaving town.

Over the two years I've been getting health care in Michigan, some drugs that once worked lost their effectiveness, while others did more harm than good. One, which shall go unnamed because it probably helps some people enormously


and I don't want to scare them, made me feel so nervous, I had that dreadful butterflies-in-the-stomach feeling all day. Another, which is helpful, overall, has slowed me down just enough to be annoying. While I used to be the fastest walker on the sidewalk, now people pass me by. How dare they!

But the worst side effect by far came from something I started last fall. Like many anti-migraine pills, it was created as a drug for people with seizures. Depakote, for instance, started life as an anti-seizure drug, and then, when researchers discovered that it helped moderate the intense mood swings of bipolar disorder, doctors began prescribing it "off-label" for that purpose. When people taking it for seizures or bipolar noticed it relieved their migraines, it took on a third life. The fact that nobody really knows why these things work makes me nervous, but when you're desperate, you'll try just about anything. I will, anyway.

So I started on a drug we'll call Brand X. I've been keeping a headache diary for years, and I can show you how one day, I had terrible pain, but beginning the next day, about the time I was up to 500 mg., the pain went away. Took a trip. Disappeared. I hardly knew what to do with myself. Life was good, and getting better.

There was just one problem. One tiny complication. No change in my heart rate; no tremors or tics. This was something else. This wasn't a physical problem so much as, well, a personality change. Suddenly, I was angry. I was mad, and I wasn't going to take it anymore. I emailed angry screeds to my best of friends. I lobbed heated words at my darling daughter. (My son was lucky to be away at school.) I was mortifyingly rude to a lovely friend at church. I saved my best, or rather, my very worst, for the man I live with. The one who drives me the eight hours each way to my appointments, and gives me shots when I need them.

About the time I found myself yelling at one of the nicest guys I know at work (reducing him to asking plaintively, "Pam, why are you



So I went off the pills, and the rage went away, and the headaches came back. Crushing, throbbing, daily headaches. Even when my boss kindly put in an order for light-blocking shades in my office (light is my worst headache trigger), still they came. I was no longer angry, but defeated.


At our next clinic visit, my doctor suggested putting me back on Brand X, but only half a pill, at bedtime. Warily, I agreed. The migraines, I'm happy to report, have receded a bit. The anger, so far, has not reared its ugly head. So far, so good. It's an uneasy truce, but even one day without head pain feels like something to celebrate. And celebrating feels a lot better than being constantly infuriated. If you were among those I may have offended, I humbly beg your pardon. It wasn't me; it was the drug. The one drug that works.

arguing with me??"), and my daughter was getting ready to ask my husband what was going on, I figured it out. Brand X was causing my anger.


The next day, at work, I looked it up. There it was, among a slew of other possible "effects" - hostility. Boy, did that make me mad!



- 1/4 cup roughly chopped spinach
- 2 oz thin-sliced deli ham (2 to 3 slices), chopped*
- 4 whole wheat tortillas
- 3/4 cup 2%-milk shredded mozzarella cheese, divided



All you do:

1. Whisk eggs and milk in a bowl. Pour mixture into a skillet and scramble over medium heat until nearly cooked. Add chopped green peppers and tomatoes and finish cooking.
 2. Remove from heat and add chopped spinach and ham.
 3. Heat a griddle pan over medium heat. Place 1 tortilla on pan and heat for 15 to 30 seconds. Flip over and add one-fourth of the egg mixture on one half of the tortilla. Sprinkle 3 tablespoons cheese over eggs. Fold tortilla in half. Cook for 1 to 2 minutes; flip and cook an additional 1 to 2 minutes. The tortilla should be golden brown and the cheese should be melted.
 4. Repeat with the other three tortillas.

YOU Can Help Beat Cancer

The American Cancer Society's (ACS) recent statistics on cancer mortality tell a promising tale. For the last several years, ACS has reported mortality declines for some of the most prominent cancers including breast and prostate. Experts attribute the success to such important factors as improved and earlier diagnosis, better treatment modalities, and expertise garnered from years of intensive research.

Several of the largest and most conclusive research programs were conducted by the ACS itself in concert with health providers across the country. The CPS studies (CPS stands for Cancer Prevention Studies.) began as far back as the 1950s and involved hundreds of thousands of subjects. Key findings from those studies include:

- The substantial effect of cigarette smoking and the secondhand smoke on lung cancer and premature death, leading to the US Surgeon General's report, warning labels on cigarettes, and numerous smoke-free legislative measures. As a result, smoking rates in men have dropped from 50 percent in the 1950s to about 23 percent today.

- The link between larger waist size and increased death rates from cancer and other causes, even among people considered to be normal weight.

- The first to show the significant impact of obesity on the risk of dying from cancer.
- The benefit of regular physical activity and harmful effects of too much time spent sitting in relation to cancer, cardiovascular disease, and mortality.
- The considerable impact of air pollution on heart and lung conditions, which motivated the Environmental Protection Agency to propose more stringent limits on air pollution.

To respond to this knowledge gap, the ACS has embarked on its next major study, CPS-3, and is recruiting at least 300,000 men and women, 25 percent of whom will represent a racial/ethnic minority population from geographically diverse locations across the United States.

A Great Reason to Participate in Relay for Life

The American Cancer Society has selected Dubuque as one of the sites in Iowa to serve as a registration site for CPS-3. Reg-

istration for CPS-3 will be held at the Dubuque Relay For Life, being held Friday, June 1, at the Port of Dubuque. The CPS-3 study will be an expansive examination of the lifestyles of a racially/ethnically diverse population – with as many as 300,000 adult Americans participating over a 20-30 year period. Participation is open to persons aged 30 to 65 years old; of all shapes, sizes and lifestyles; who have never been diagnosed with cancer (except basal or squamous cell skin cancer); and who are willing to make a long-term commitment to the study, which includes completing periodic surveys at home.

In the in-person enrollment, interested parties will be asked to:

- Read and sign an informed consent form;
 - Complete a brief baseline survey that asks for information on lifestyle, and other factors related to their health such as behavior;
 - Provide some physical measurements; and
 - Give a small blood sample (similar to a doctor's visit – seven teaspoons total). The blood sample will be drawn by a trained, certified Phlebotomist.
- Entire Process is 45 minutes

Those interested in participating can register only at the Dubuque Relay For Life on June 1, between 5 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Confidentiality in the study process is of the utmost importance and the American Cancer Society has perfected its procedures to safeguard personal information. As director of the Wendt Center, I was honored to be selected to lead the local recruitment effort, along with Jodi Feder-spiel from ACS. I am also a lifelong Dubu-quer, and many of our residents who have battled cancer have come through the Wendt Center doors. I am proud to say that many left as survivors. However, there are still far too many tragic cases of grandparents being taken from grandchildren, mothers from daughters, children from parents, and friends from friends. As medical professionals, it's our staff's job to remain objective. But we do become at-tached to our patients, and it hurts deeply when one loses the fight.

Yes, it's personal.

Is There Hope for Headaches?

Migraines are the most common reason for calling into work, and more adult women (17%) suffer from migraines than adult men (6%). A migraine is caused by the enlargement of blood vessels and the release of chemicals that coil around the vessels. And as anyone who has ever suffered from a migraine knows, the pain can cause nausea, light sensitivity and can basically put a stop to one's daily activities. With so many people suffering from migraines, is there hope of helping (or even eliminating) migraines?



According to Dr. Jack Hinderman, DC, of Family First Chiropractic Wellness Center, there is help available, and the best treatment doesn't even involve medication.

"Migraines are often a result of subluxations in the spine, so it makes sense that a chiropractor could help this condition by making the proper adjustments," he said.

Migraine headaches are typically classified in two ways: "migraine without aura," formerly called common migraine, or "migraine with aura," formerly known as classic migraine.

Although the pain is similar, the differences in the two migraines are based upon the presence (or absence) of neurologic symptoms prior to the onset of headache. The aura may consist of flashing lights, or zigzag lines, or may manifest as blind spots in the vision.

"When people have these auras, they are usually down for the day unless they can get help," Hinderman said. "My patients know to come in and see

me in my office right away so they can get relief. They either drive themselves or find a friend or colleague to drive them to my office so we can get them adjusted and feeling better."

A recently published study revealed that the prevalence of migraine headaches has increased over the past 10 years among adults. The study took place over an 11 year interval, and found that at the start of the study 12.1 percent of the group met the criteria for having migraine headaches. After 11 years, 13.2 percent of the participants met the medical criteria for having migraine headaches.

Not only are migraine headaches causing adults to call in sick for work, but children are starting to suffer from these painful headaches, too. And research is showing that children are suffering from migraines due to the same reasons adults are: poor diet, environmental factors and stress.

There are some practical ways to protect yourself from getting migraines, such as eliminating MSG from the diet, as well as caffeine, season salt, processed foods and more.

Environmental factors have been cited as possible causes to the increase in migraines. One of those factors is the increased exposure to flickering light. If someone is sensitive to light, computers, florescent lights and other visual disturbances may trigger an attack.

"While some of the triggers are avoidable, others are not. So, it makes sense to know a good chiropractor who has experience with helping migraine sufferers find relief. I have seen patients go from having migraines that lasted 3 or 4 days, to only 10 minutes after being adjusted," Hinderman said.

Next Up at the Global Smart City Summit in Taiwan

Following Mary-Ann Schreurs, Deputy Mayor of Eindhoven, Netherlands (see last article) was the fourth summit presenter, Lars Thunberg, Deputy Mayor of Helsingborg, Sweden. Lars also serves as the Chairman of the National Association of Swedish Eco-municipalities.



Lars shared a bit about his city of Helsingborg, which has a population of 130,000, with 8,000 employed in the municipality. Its economic base is primarily trade, transportation and tourism. Major employers include IKEA, McNeil, Unilever, Kemira Chemicals, and the Port of Helsingborg. Helsingborg is the third fastest growing region in Europe which takes pride in its 14 universities and colleges. According to Lars, the city has a long tradition of strong political will, and, like Dubuque, is fortunate to have broad political unity on goals for sustainability! The challenges being faced and addressed in Helsingborg include promoting health and health equity; integrating a segregated city; fighting negative environmental impact (air pollution, greenhouse gases, traffic noise, lack of biodiversity); development of the southern

harbor area, establishment of a permanent connection (tunnel or bridge) to Denmark; and profiling the City's closeness to water. Sweden's national strategies are focused on health and the environment, with cross-sector work ongoing on programs that assist healthy aging, healthy living habits, security & safety, children & teenagers, work and education, housing and urban development, and environmental quality. Forming a basis for decision-making, Helsingborg has broad participation from politicians and administrators, the public, and businesses and has remained a top environmental award-winning City since 2009. Like Dubuque's Green Vision Education Schools, Helsingborg provides pupils with the opportunity to be educated about environmental issues and to take part in climate exhibitions in the city. The City also provides workshops for business leaders about environmental issues and legislation. Helsingborg has a systematic program for environmental quality in place which includes having organic food in schools, and having municipal vehicles run on biogas. Lars shared that the area's landfill became a net reducer of CO2 and the reduction by citizens in household waste continues to rise. The biogas plant is producing vehicle fuel out of organic waste, fueling 100 buses and public/private cars. Lars concluded that the City's transport system is crucial; the lack of biodiversity is underestimated; that education begins with our children; that an integrated economic model that engages the citizens will make the difference in the future. The next speaker was Scot Wrighton, the City Manager of Lavasa, Mulshi District, Maharashtra, India. His presentation was different from the aspect that Lavasa is an "experiment" for building new cities in India that will be environmentally, socially and financially sustainable, from the beginning. With the rapid urbanization developing in Asia and Africa, they are seeking to develop a strategy that effectively manages satellite townships and subdivisions developed on the periphery of existing cities; and



build new medium-sized cities to take the development, housing, environmental, food supply and infrastructure pressure of existing mega cities. In other words, with existing cities in the countries strained, new cities are needed. Key strategies include (1) well-placed medium-sized replicable cities; (2) "Livable" Smart Cities that apply the right technologies, and are managed from agreed-upon

performance outcomes; (3) aggressive use of public-private partnerships springing from economic planning; and (4) early resolution of governance questions. The Master Plan is to integrate Lavasa with the landscape, 12,500 acres of development across plotted land, apartments, retail, hotel, event and convention centers, education, information technology, biotech parks and recreation facilities. An intranet GIS website or Citizen Call Centre will provide residents with construction status, utility, environment, city management services, etc. online. The primary question in their planning was, "Since the Earth is a closed ecosystem, how do cities (as aggregated organic systems) help retain necessary balances in the ecosystem in a manner that allows a good quality of life, social harmony, financial solvency, and reasonable development? A Sustainable City Action Plan was developed with goals out to 2020

and the ability to measure all aspects of the programming. As Scot shared, the challenges he faces is that the government there is risk averse; they are deeply suspicious of unintended consequences and the worst case scenario. To realize the vision, Lavasa's value proposition has four elements focused on good governance, measurable sustainability initiatives, community added-value elements (education, culture, technology and leisure opportunities not readily available in the average Indian city); and community quality of life in basic municipal services, pace of daily life, ease of mobility, cleanliness of the city, sense of security and community, and social connectedness.

Dear Dad,


Of course they do. It was probably Casual Sex Friday.
