Notes from the Publisher...

Fostering ideas, conversations and arguments.

Last fall and this spring I've piled leaves, branches, and other natural yard waste in my garden. Now when I walk back there looking for the energy to begin the gardening process for the year, the spark just isn't there, not yet anyway. Either I need to bag all this stuff up or I foresee a small backyard inferno in my future. But I think the city may frown upon a garden inferno. I'll need to be stealthy. I hope no one reads this....

There are a number of obstacles to my enthusiasm to start my garden this year. I even have the tiller I borrowed like two years ago and still have not given back yet. That should be a check mark in the pro-garden column, but it's not registering very strongly.

First of all, I have a CSA box. Do you have a CSA box? You should, they're wonderful. There are a couple of ads in this issue for CSAs and they're both great ones. Check 'em out. They're almost too great. Why? In my household, it's just Christy and me. No kids, no dogs. These CSA shares are huge. We get a big box of seasonal veggies every single week. We try our best, but there's no chance we can ever eat all of that in just a week. And some things, like squash and zucchini just start to accumulate in the fridge. Need some? So the point is, with the cornucopia of veggies delivered every week, all summer long, why plant my own? The only thing that makes sense is to just plant stuff you could never have too much of. In that case, I'm converting my whole yard to sweet corn production. Surprise sweetie!

I already mentioned that the garden is full. It needs to get empty before I can plant anything. That's a problem. I'm feeling lazy. So we'll skip that one.

For a short time I had this great idea (actually Christy had the great idea, I'm starting to loathe it) to re-do the gardens as a raised garden or a series of raised gardens. We no more than had the idea when someone offered us raised garden frames made of telephone poles. Then I finally got around to thinking "how am I going to fill three raised gardens with

dirt"? My raised bed area is two significant terraces above by house. So if I bring in any dirt, it's going to have to go from the truck to the top terrace one wheel barrow load at a time. That's just an awful idea.

To make the raised garden idea worse, we planted garlic last fall. It's already growing. Even more importantly, my asparagus that has been developing for four years now is also in the old garden. How do we destroy the old garden in favor of a raised one and save these things that are already going? I don't want to have to wait four more years for decent asparagus (even though it's been worth crap in the first for years).

I'm betting, in the end, we probably go with a cover crop. That's fancy talk for let the weeds take over and just mow it all off. Even when I do plant a nice garden, it always consists of about 20 hours of work in the first week. Then I water it and care for it for a month, and by the time it produces, I've stopped caring, or Christy has been dismantling some other part of the house. And this year her list is as long as ever.

I'm hoping that the weather will finally go back to the lovely 80 degrees that we've come to enjoy in March and the green spring in my step will return in earnest. It would be nice to have an endless supply of onions and tomatoes out there.

Maybe I should have one of those downtown apartment dwellers, who dreams of having a garden but doesn't have a yard, come up and manage my garden. They can get their garden-on and I can look out the window with a sense, however false, of accomplishment. Perhaps I can take my plot rental fee in basil and garlic. They're as good as currency in our house.

But I'm still liking the conversion of the yard to sweet corn idea. Move over Frank Fincel, urban corn is coming!

Now, who's taking the little red can down to the gas station for me so I can get the tiller started?

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
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All My Sons

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



Vintage Torque Fest returns! Roaring back into the Jackson County Fairgrounds at the east edge of Maquoketa, Vintage Torque Fest 2012 brings the best of hot rod culture the weekend of May 4-5. The sprawling event utilizes the better part of the Jackson County Fairgrounds with an exhibition of hot rod art, a swap meet, a model car contest, on-site camping, live rock-n-roll, cold beer,

and of course, loads of classic hot rods and motorcycles, some of which will be taking laps on the dirt track. This year's expanded event features even more cars, more bikes, more music, and a Pin Up Contest.

Moving to Maquoketa last year to better deal with the overwhelming attendance of the first year's event, Torque Fest 2011 proved no different. Maquoketa tourism officials estimated a crowd of 5,000 to 6,000 people attended over the weekend to take in the festivities and see the 545 cars and 80 motorcycles on display in the "official" Vintage Torque Fest and "Motor Psycho" areas. On top of that, the Maquoketa-based Coronado Car Club had an additional 100 or so cars in their VIP muscle car show area.

Vintage Torque Fest 2012 promises even more classic hot rods and customs, choppers, bobbers, and other vintage motorcycles – with an even better, spectator-friendly layout. The new map allows for an expanded swap meet organized by the Tin Butchers and an expanded art show with a special 2012 series of custom "Rat Fink" paintings created by a range of custom artists honoring the spirit of Ed "Big Daddy" Roth.

In addition to the other cars in attendance, many from hot rod and custom car clubs from around the country, Torque Fest 2012 will feature an appearance by the Voodoo Kings, a car club that specializes in hot rods that shoot fire from their engines or tailpipes. "After the bus racing, we're going to have the

Voodoo Kings get out there and they're going to do their ring of fire," explained Torque Fest promoter John Wells.

Wait ... bus racing? Yes, unlike other somewhat boring car shows Torque Fest takes advantage of the Fairgrounds dirt track with bus races, an exhibition by Midwest Jalopies, and a vintage flat track motorcycle racing exhibition by Flat Track Minnesota. In fact, Vintage Torque Fest is one of the few car shows in the world that allows individual hot rod owners to take their car for a few laps on the dirt track.



The hot rods won't be the only ones to rev up their engines. The motorcycle riders will have their own "burnout pit" to crank some RPMs and make some noise. "Everybody wanted to do that last year," noted Wells.



Sponsored in part by Biltwell Helmets and Cycle Source Magazine, the motorcycle area of the show will feature some notably unique vintage bikes. Antique motorcycle collector and vintage flat track racer Mike Lange will be in attendance with his 1929 Harley-Davidson factory built class "A" race bike with "Flexi" side car – the only known example in existence. "There's only one left and he owns it," says Wells. "His collection's insane."



Mike Wolfe of American Pickers fame will be bringing his Von Dutch XAVW. Von Dutch is the trade name of legendary mechanic and pinstripe artist Kenny Howard who was a master of pinstriping and pretty much started the hot rod custom painting craze in the '50s.

"Harley-Davidson made an experimental bike for World War II. Von Dutch actually owned one," Wells explained. "He and his buddy were making a bet and this guy said he couldn't take a VW engine and put it in this motorcycle and get it running in a year and Von Dutch was like, 'I can too!'" Von Dutch successfully built the bike in less than a year.

"So Von Dutch sold the bike, or traded

it depending on who you talk to, to Big Daddy Roth and Big Daddy traded it to whoever – it was somebody who had a shop in Southern California. They retired and moved to Tennessee and the bike was gone. Nobody knew where it was," Wells continued. "Then Mike Wolfe got a call saying, 'Hey we got this bike that Von Dutch built.' Mike was like, 'Yeah, right.' Well he goes out and looks at it and it's the real deal and the title is still in Big Daddy Roth's name. So he was like, 'Yeah, I'll buy it.'" The legendary custom motorcycle's first show appearance will be at Vintage Torque Fest 2012.



Music has always been part of Torque Fest and this year's event has more than ever, expanding to two stages. While Torque Fest has in the past focused on original rockabilly and surf reminiscent of the classic hot rod era and punk which shares the custom car culture's DIY aesthetic, Wells explains that the motorcycle guys tend to favor more hard rock and heavy metal.


"If you like Black Sabbath, you're going to like Red Desert coming down from Minneapolis," Wells says. "If you like southern rock, we've got Mean Mother from Detroit. We've got Federation of Horsepower from Kansas City. So we've got these bands that are going to cater to both segments now."

Torque Fest will feature a mix of traditional rockabilly, psychobilly, western

swing, honky tonk country, and surf on one stage with hard rock and heavy metal on a second stage in the motorcycle area. Wells is especially looking forward to the Friday night show featuring Cat Club, a rockabilly band from Spain, and national rockabilly revivalists The Reckless Ones. "You're going to have two really great rockabilly acts that are going to be together on Friday night," he said.

While most of the bands come from outside the immediate area, Wells reserves a space for Iowa City rockabilly surf band The Surf Zombies in part because they fit in with the overall vibe of the event but also because they have a song called "Torque Fest."

All in all, Vintage Torque Fest 2012 is a show not to be missed, but of all the new or expanded features of the event, none has inspired more interest and anticipation than the new Pin Up Contest. "The pinup contest is going to be the same kind of thing (as Torque Fest), as far as vintage attire," explained Wells. "The girls are not going to be showing too much skin. It's going to be a cheesecake



kind of thing from what you would see in classic pin ups like Betty Grable, Rita Hayworth, Bettie Page. We're limiting it to 20 entries so that way we're going to try to pool the best from the region and we're hoping that the sponsorship that we have – we have about \$500 cash and another \$500 in gifts and photo shoots and stuff like that – that it will bring some national names."

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Vintage Torque Fest Hot Rod & Motorcycle Qualifications

So what is this Vintage Torque Fest about? And does your classic car qualify for entry? Because the term "hot rod" can be interpreted pretty broadly, it should be noted that Vintage Torque Fest is limited to pre-1965 vintage-style hot rods, pre-1975 motorcycles, and one-of-a-kind customs, though classic car and motorcycle owners and enthusiasts of all kinds are welcome to attend. Let's unpack the concept a bit.

Vintage Torque Fest celebrates the hot rod culture that sprang up after World War II, when young soldiers returned and began using the technical skills they learned in the military to customize stock vehicles for fun and for racing. They chopped and modified them in all sorts of ways, mostly to make

them lighter and more powerful. When the Ford Mustang was introduced in 1965, it began the era of the muscle car, essentially taking the hot rod's game plan into the factory. While muscle cars are cool, Torque Fest (and other similar vintage hot rod shows) celebrate the original do-it-yourself aesthetic of that pre-'65 era.

As such, some of the cars at Vintage Torque Fest might look a bit rough to those used to seeing showroom-perfect restorations at other car shows. You will see some beautifully detailed customs, but you will also see hot rods with simple, flat paint jobs, visible welds, unfinished surfaces, and even rust that acknowledges the history of the vehicle. Stock parts are not considered as important as period-appropriate substitutions or modifications. All of them reflect the personalities of the guys that saved them from the salvage yard and keep them running.

What you won't see at Vintage Torque Fest are "street rods." Street rods embrace later materials and technological developments that aren't authentic to the original hot rod style like billet (machined aluminum wheels and parts), airbrushed mural graphics, and digital gauges. Likewise, cars that feature more

modern equipment like independent front suspensions and electronic fuel injection generally do not fit the style, especially on fenderless or open engine cars. Kit cars and cars accessorized through the addition of catalog parts are not consistent with the vintage hot rod practice of scrounging scrap yards and swap meets for period parts and materials.



The show will not accept any cars produced after 1964, unless it's a model that maintained a pre-'65 body style into a later model year. Vintage Torque Fest will accept 1949 stock original or restored classics. Some might be surprised that Torque Fest is not all that interested in newer stock classic cars or classics that have been restored using original parts. Not that vintage hot rod enthusiasts don't have a great appreciation for anyone who has labored to preserve or restore an original antique vehicle, but like the later street rods or muscle cars, it's just

not the style of this particular show.

In a similar vein, the "Motor Psycho" Round Up is a motorcycle show of vintage pre-1975 custom motorcycles, bobbers and choppers. The show is open to vintage bikes from the likes of Norton, Triumph, Harley Davidson, Indian, BSA, and even Japanese-made motorcycles that fit with the show's old-school/traditional aesthetic. Pre-1975 café racers and pre-1965 stock motorcycles are welcome. Art bikes, stock bikes, twin cam Harleys, and West Coast Choppers or OCC-style customs are not in the vibe of the show.

While newer stock and restored cars, street rods, muscle cars, sports cars and other performance vehicles will not be accepted into the "official" Vintage Torque Fest show, they will be able to park in the event's special VIP parking area away, effectively creating an additional show. For muscle car lovers, the Coronado Car Club will host a separate "Classic and Chrome" show area featuring muscle cars of the classic era from 1965 to 1972. Likewise, OCC-style custom bikes, touring bikes and post-'75 Harleys are welcome at Torque Fest and will have a special parking area. 

In addition to the show cars on display inside and the range of hot rods and customs in the Vintage Torque Fest outdoor area, the Coronado Car Club will host a separate "Classic and Chrome" show area featuring muscle cars of the classic era from 1965 to 1972. So your lovers of Challengers and GTOs won't be left out. In addition, there will be a VIP parking area for newer model Mustangs, Camaros, Corvettes, and other performance autos.

To end any confusion over entry fees (last year had different entry prices for spectators and hot rod owners), this year's Torque Fest entry is just \$10 per person either for spectators or those entering cars.

Other than the prizes for Miss Torque Thrust, the Pin Up Contest winner, Torque Fest does not give out any awards except for those sponsored by individual car clubs. This year Dubuque resident Noel Mauer will be giving out the Mauer & Willis Longevity Award to the hot rodder who has owned his car the longest. Hot rod pioneers in Iowa, Mauer himself built his green custom '32 coupe (featured on the cover of last year's Torque Fest issue of 365ink) way back in 1961 and has owned it ever since. The winner will have to qualify according to the Torque Fest rules and has owned his car for 20 or more years. (Full rules are on the web site.) Mauer will be exhibiting his other classic hot rod this year, a white chopped 1931

"We realized there's no car show without the hot rod guys bringing their cars, so why penalize them for bringing their rides?" explains Torque Fest promoter John Wells. "So we're charging everybody just \$10 for a weekend pass and there's no charge for parking. You get the whole thing for just \$10 for the entire weekend. So \$10 for 16 bands is a bargain, right there. Then you get the art show, you get the swap meet, you get the vendors, the motorcycles, the vintage racing, the bus racing, the ring of fire, it goes on and on. So hopefully people will come out and enjoy both days."

In celebration of true hot rod culture of that classic era, Vintage Torque Fest 2012 will host a classic Pin Up Contest, Saturday, May 5 from 1 p.m. in the main show building. Like the hot rods and custom cars that are a part of Vintage Torque Fest, the Pin UP Contest will have specific rules as to who can enter and what kind of dress is appropriate for the contest.

First and foremost, contestants should understand that this is a pin up contest,

not a wet T-shirt contest and there will be no stripper pole in sight. Contestants should try to recreate the look of vintage pin ups of the classic era – the kind of thing you might see in a GI's locker on a calendar in a '50s garage. Sexy? Sure, but demure as well. Contestants should be dressed in period-correct style clothing. Anything too modern or too revealing will not be allowed. Organizers remind us that the stag films of the late '50s were the equivalent of today's Victoria's Secret commercial, and that is altogether too much for the Pin Up Contest. After all, they claim they are trying "to class up the joint with some pretty women."

Classic Pin Up Contest Rules:

Historic Millwork District Complete Streets Project

With a roadmap for redevelopment in place in the form of 2009's Historic Millwork District Plan and an understanding that municipal investment in the aging infrastructure was essential to leveraging further investment in the buildings of the district, the City of Dubuque began to work toward funding the repair of streets, sidewalks, and the infrastructure underground.

It just so happened that on February 17, 2009, the day after Dubuque's City Council approved the Historic Millwork District Plan, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 was signed into law by President Obama. Designed to jumpstart the national economy by creating jobs while at the same time addressing neglected infrastructure, the legislation would prove fortuitous for the City of Dubuque and the redevelopment of the Historic Millwork District.

Through the United States Department of Transportation, \$1.5 billion in Recovery Act project funding became available in the form of the Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) program. The US DOT's first ever competitive grant program based on national goals, applicants were required to demonstrate how projects would stimulate economic competitiveness, improve public safety, enhance livability, and develop sustainable transportation options, among other things.

With a definite need and a solid plan in place, it would seem that Millwork District infrastructure would be a strong

candidate, but Dubuque was not the only city or state in need of funding. The TIGER program received over 1400 applications from all 50 states asking for nearly \$60 billion.

The City and district partners crafted a TIGER proposal based on the Complete Streets concept. What could become a pilot program for Dubuque, the Complete Streets model would create streets and sidewalks conducive to use by a range of users – drivers, pedestrians, bicyclists, public transportation and riders, and by people from young to old, including people with disabilities. The Complete Streets concept was consistent with the goals of the Master Plan for a mixed-use, livable, walkable Millwork District and matched the DOT's goals for the TIGER program.

Despite the fierce competition for funding, Dubuque was awarded a \$5.6 million in TIGER Grant in March of 2010. Funding would be used to redesign and reconstruct the network of streets in and around the Millwork District with connections to the rest of downtown and the Port of Dubuque. Within the district, underground utilities would be replaced and upgraded and Complete Streets concepts would be employed in the design of Washington, Jackson, Elm, 8th, 9th, and 10th Streets.

Senator Tom Harkin, sponsor of 2009's Complete Streets Act, said of the TIGER Grant, "This funding goes to the very heart of Dubuque's mission to transform the city into one of the best places to live and do business. ... In the end, residents will see reduced traffic congestion and improvement

in the ability to walk to work or take public transit. The area is expected to provide much needed housing for working families with jobs downtown."

In keeping with the Master Plan goals for sustainability and green practices, the Millwork District Complete Streets design is using a mix of recycled brick from the area in sidewalks and bump-outs and permeable pavers to manage storm water runoff in the streets. Demolished concrete is being crushed on site to use as construction fill.



Energy-efficient lighting is being installed in historic lampposts that honor the district's industrial past. An additional \$150,000 from an Iowa Great Places Grant is being used for streetscape beautification with artistically designed benches, waste receptacles, planters, bike racks, and other design elements.

With the official Historic Millwork District Complete Streets ground breaking not occurring until March of 2011, workers had a tight timeline to have 10th and Jackson Streets completed in time for the September opening of the Voices art exhibit in the Wilmac Warehouse building on the corner of those two streets. Mission accomplished, the art event provided a great opportunity for a public unveiling of the first portion of the attractive, pedestrian-friendly Millwork District Complete Streets project.

Work is currently ongoing with further street reconstruction planned through the summer toward a target completion in fall, 2012.



Gordon Kellenberger and Tom Kelly Outside The Lines Art Gallery Opening Reception Friday, May 4

Outside the Lines Art Gallery presents a new exhibit for the months of May and June featuring new work by artists Gordon Kellenberger and Tom Kelly. OTLAG owners Stormy Mochal and Connie Twining will host an opening reception for the show, scheduled for Friday, May 4 from 7 to 9 p.m., providing guests with an opportunity to meet the artists. As always, the casual reception is free and open to the public. The exhibit will be on display through June.

Amana, Iowa artist, Gordon Kellenberger draws inspiration from that which he knows best: the landscape of the upper Midwest region, offering an endless variety of changing light, color and countryside. He simplifies his subjects and infuses them with bright and fresh colors. The resulting intensity and richness convey his delight in painting and desire to express "something good about rural life."



Kellenberger's pastel on paper paintings begin as a simple, solid sketch with a strong focal point with patterns and shapes that are repeated throughout the arrangement. He places warm colors against cool, soft

edges against sharp edges, and organic against geometric shapes. The familiar features that emerge are vividly colored compositions pared to their basic forms; vibrant landscapes that he hopes will give the viewer an experience that is "familiar in a new way."

Paired with Gordon Kellenberger's paintings are the folk art carvings and paintings of Mineral Point artist, Tom Kelly. They will capture viewers attention, imagination, sense of humor, and heart. Kelly was destined to become an artist. Fond memories of walking through the woods with his grandmother as they gathered plants for dying her hand-spun wool established his lifelong love affair with color.

Kelly's bright palette is playful and innocent. Expect to find sheep flying through a starry sky, trilling birds perched atop an assortment of iconic objects such as strawberries, pears, houses, pigs and onions. His trademark images will pull viewers into his canvas and take them on adventures they thought they'd left in childhood.

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KITCHEN BUFFET

Luck be a lady tonight. And your lady is very lucky when you take her to the Kitchen Buffet inside the Diamond Jo Casino! When you enter look beyond the soup and salad island and the first thing you will notice is the beautiful rotisserie and the char-grill in the center of the serving line. Then you will



see the display cooks preparing more than 60 entrées and side dishes right there behind the serving counter. For this is a live action all-you-can-eat buffet where at least one chef supervisor and ten display cooks are busy cooking small batches of food right where you serve yourself. The idea is simple: cook the food where you serve it and only enough to satisfy a few people at a time. Then keep cooking and replenishing the serving pans as needed to insure every single item is fresh and delicious. The concept is simple, yes, but the execution is anything but.

First, the Diamond Jo executives committed financial resources to install state of the art kitchen equipment along the serving tables. Then they had to staff the buffet with talented and experienced managers. Overseeing the operation is Diamond Jo Director of Food and Beverage Jeff Holder. Jeff owned and operated two Café Italia Restaurants and three Finney's Bar & Grilles. He has over 26 years experience in the food industry and has been a director at the Diamond Jo since 2008. Doug Cady is the Kitchen Manager and Buffet Chef and is the man responsible for implementing the live action small batch cooking concept. Doug has 18

years experience as a fine dining chef and was a chef in the Diamond Jo's Woodfire Grill for 3 years before taking on the challenge of introducing the fine dining experience to the buffet. Katie Lang is in charge of the front of the house and has been with the Diamond Jo for almost 14 years. She is the Food Service Manager and has held that position for the last 8 years.

These dedicated professionals are the first ones to admit controlling the serving of fresh high quality food prepared from scratch cooking recipes in small quantities for up to 1200 people per day with little advance notice is a formidable exercise. They all acknowledge it is done well only because of the full support of upper management and the diligence of loyal and senior staff many of whom have been in place for at least four years.



Indeed it is a beautiful sight to watch the cooks prepare for the start of the buffet. Five minutes before the buffet opens the serving tables are practically empty. As soon as diners start moving towards the line all of the food items are put in place as if by magic. There is no need to rush to be in line at the beginning of service. You will find fresh food waiting for you when you get to each station. Before I describe food I have a few suggestions:

- Arrive at the buffet really hungry. You will want to sample so many different things.
- Look over the entire buffet before you choose. Then you will be sure to have room for the items you really enjoy.
- All non-alcoholic beverages are included in the price. You can request refills from your server as often as you like.
- Bottled beer and wine by the glass are available for a small additional charge.
- If you prefer mixed drinks just ask your server to call a cocktail waitress to your table.
- You can visit the Kitchen Buffet two or three days in a row and find a lot of different items. That's because there are three menu rotations so most of the food you choose on day one will not be on the tables again until day four.
- However, there are some standard items that are so popular they are available every day. These include fried chicken, mashed potatoes, catfish, baked ziti, meatballs and seared fish specialties to name a few.
- You will notice each section has side dishes that are compatible with the entrees in that section.
- If you are wise enough to have achieved senior citizens status be sure to ask for your senior discount.

OK. So now we can talk about food! There are so many possibilities, where do we begin? Well, for starters there is the soup and salad island. There are always 3 soups; when I last visited there was chicken noodle, creamy potato & bacon, and vegetable barley. There are fresh fruits in season



so right now you will find melons, oranges, strawberries and pineapple. Then there are several salads including cucumber, potato, macaroni, compound salads like Caesar and mix-your-own greens.

After you have your soup and salads go up the counter and take a clean plate from any one of several locations. You can go to whichever section you like because there are no lines of people like you find in a cafeteria. However, most people do start at the right side of the serving counter.

Now you will begin to see the cooks in action right in front of you. There are six stations of culinary delights and starting from the right they are:



Pizza. The dough and sauce are made from scratch. Semolina flour is added to the dough to enhance the chewy texture. There are usually three or four thin crust pizzas fresh out of the ovens. If you don't see the type of pizza you like you can request the cook make you one with whatever toppings you like. You won't have to wait long; they bake in only 3 to 4 minutes.

International. There is a different theme each day so it might be Italian or German for example. You will always find pasta dishes because there is a pasta cooker behind the counter. Check it out; it looks just like a deep fryer. You might find Chicken Cacciatore or Chicken Marsala which are both excellent. So are the Corned Beef and Cabbage, Bratwurst and Sauerkraut with roasted apples, Baked Ziti and Irish stew.

American Bounty. Here you will be impressed watching the cooks sear Tilapia or Salmon on the flat top grill. Depending on the day you might find pork chops either char-grilled or smothered with fresh mushrooms and onions in a cream sauce. These are



really good and so are the Meatloaf and Meatball Stroganoff. The Chicken and Biscuits are one of my favorite dishes. I also load up with fresh green beans or steamed broccoli.

Carving Station. The carving chef is right in front of the rotisserie and grill. The carving board

is heated from below and you will always find at least one meat on it. Try whatever is on the board: Ham, Pork Loin, Rotisserie Chicken, Brisket, and Roast Beef. Whole chickens are dusted with a house specialty season blend and are then roasted on the spit for two and a half to three hours. The brisket is also seasoned with a secret spice blend and slow cooked for eight hours. Take a minute to check out the induction cooking pot next to the carving board which is used for making sauces and gravies. An induction system uses an oscillating magnetic field that induces an electric current in a flat bottomed cast iron or stainless steel pot. The electric current produces resistive heating causing only the pot and its contents to get hot. The cooking surface is made of a glass ceramic material and remains cool. This type of cooking allows for precise control and consistent heat.

American Heritage. This station offers a plethora of American cuisine favorites. Here is where you find catfish, macaroni and cheese, green bean casserole, chuck wagon beans, fried chicken and mashed potatoes just to name a few. The fried chicken is my favorite food here. All purpose flour and corn flour are mixed with a house specialty spice blend. The fresh chicken parts are hand breaded and fried in a Henny Penny pressurized fryer in small batches. This means the pieces you choose are always hot and fresh. I always have mashed potatoes with my chicken because they are so good! Fresh Russet Burbanks are steamed and then mixed with butter and buttermilk.

Asian. Here you will see three woks in action. You can watch the cooks make all the sauces and cut all the meat and fish then stir-fry it up. You will find chicken, shrimp or plain fried



rice. Perhaps you will be able to have Mongolian Beef and Broccoli, egg rolls, Chicken or Shrimp Chow Mein or the delicious Orange Chili Chicken fried with Mandarin oranges, garlic, orange juice and a little chili sauce. You

will always find a Sweet and Sour dish with pork or shrimp or chicken. I prefer the chicken because it is dusted with rice flour before it is fried with chunks of pineapples, green peppers, carrots, pineapple juice and corn syrup.



By now I am sure you get the fact that there is way more food than you can possibly eat and its all yours for a very reasonable set price. But if you think this is a good deal wait until you try the Sunday Brunch! In addition to all the regular lunch items you also get a complimentary glass of champagne or mimosa, a Belgium waffle and omelet to-order station, Eggs Benedict, scrambled eggs, hash browns, sausage and bacon, breakfast pizza and pastries.

As if there were not enough food choices already, the Kitchen Buffet always gives you reasons to keep coming back. There are many themed buffets during the year and several are fast approaching.

On that day you will feast on chicken enchiladas, smothered calabacitas, pulled pork carnitas, tamales, stuffed poblano peppers, chili Colorado, grilled steak fajitas and tacos, and rotisserie chicken with Veracruz sauce. Memorial Day, May 28th will be the beginning of the summer BBQ buffet featuring beef ribs, pork ribs, BBQ chicken and pulled pork on Friday and Saturday nights.




Brian Clegg can get you over the (PUNALERT) speed bumps in his new book How to Build a Time Machine the Real Science of Time Travel. It turns out that time travel is possible. We travel through time into the future at the rate of one second per second. Anyone traveling on the Concorde knows the feeling of arriving in New York two hours before you left London. You can travel into the past in your memory which is a valid way to go but you can't change anything and if you are really in the past then it is in only a philosophic way.

yet? It could mean that traveling back is much harder than traveling forward or it could mean something else. It could also mean that we are the ones to build such a machine and that it hasn't been done yet either in the future or in the past.



Clegg's description of a Time Travelers Convention is thrilling and not so farfetched as to be tossed in the garbage with the plans for a perpetual motion machine.


This book is brain candy. It is just delightful. Clegg seems to be able to take complicated ideas like St Augustine's idea of "time" and write about so we all can understand it but, mostly, this is a book of imagination, a flight of fancy that is sure to come true at some point in the future. Like the ancient Roman author Pliny writing about a trip to the moon in a capsule. No kidding, he really did.

It will push your head around a little bit and make you think and the effort will be well worth the ten or fifteen "OH WOVS" you are going to get. Like traveling back in time might not work farther back than when the time machine was invented. So, you couldn't go back in time to kill your father unless, in my case, the time machine was built in the 1920's. However, I might be able to go back far enough to beat up Johnny Martin for stealing my lunch money.

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The Other Kind of Lottery

A friend of my daughter's interviewed me the other day for a history class on the "military action" in Vietnam. I said I'd be happy to talk, but I didn't have much to contribute. None of the boys I knew was drafted, and only one member of my family enlisted. I hadn't participated in any anti-war protests. She said that was fine; she just wanted to know how it affected someone who lived through that era.

First question: What's the first thing you think of when you hear "Vietnam"? My reply: "Stupid war." Her follow-up question, "Not the country?" took me aback. How strange! And how sad. I think of Vietnam the country only when it's put in that context; when I'm reading about it as a travel destination, or when I meet someone who emigrated from there.

When the first draft lottery was drawn, I was a junior in high school, so you can bet I paid close attention. The first date drawn was September 14. Think about that: if you were male, born on September 14, and between the ages of 18 and 27, you would have been drafted, unless some physical failing kept you safe. Just think of all those boys over there with the same birthday.

It was the next lottery that swept Dave Crawford, my best friend's boyfriend, up in its steely arms. Maybe he wasn't number one, but number two, or three. My boyfriend was way down the line, but Gail's was not, and we were terrified.

I grew up reading the paper more than watching the TV, and at some point in the late 60s, I began noticing articles about this place called "Vietnam," with maps

of a country looking like a shrunken South America. An article here, an article there. I asked myself if I should read these articles, and my answer was, No. It sounded so far away, and I wasn't interested in armed conflict, and surely this war-not-called-a-war would end soon.

When I got my first car, I affixed my first bumper sticker to its back window. A lot of right-wingers, angered by young men fleeing to Canada to avoid the draft, were driving around with stickers reading "America: Love it or Leave it!" I was proud to have found one with the retort, "Vietnam: Love it or Leave it!"

Of course, we weren't there out of love. We were there because the north was Communist, and the cold war was still on, and the "domino theory" prophesied that if we, the greatest democracy on earth, allowed one more country to fall into Communism's clutches, even more would fail.

In the beginning, I let myself believe this. In the beginning, it didn't seem like we were at war. Southeast Asia was so far away; I'd only traveled to Minnesota. We had no shortages, no ration books for gas and sugar, no Victory gardens. But gradually, my generation (yes, the Baby Boomers) grew older, and began to question things. When the lottery geared up, it suddenly felt very personal. My husband has noted that if there had been a lottery for the Afghanistan war, that war



would have been over years ago, and we would not have gone to Iraq at all.

The average age of a U.S. military combatant in Vietnam was 19. (Type "Vietnam 19" into YouTube for the heart-stopping song about that.) That's probably how old my cousin Dave was when he enlisted. I remember seeing him at a picnic after his return, tanned and talking dismissively of "gooks." He fell for it; how could he not? I knew better than to wear my peace necklace – the one that said "War is not healthy for children and other living things -- around him."

Dave got no welcome-home parade. You may have heard the stories of returning soldiers changing out of their uniforms on the plane, so no one in the airport would spit on them or call them "Baby killer!" – an outcome of the horrifying events at My Lai, when U.S. troops murdered up to 500 unarmed civilians, mostly women, children, and the elderly. It happened in March 1968 but did not become public knowledge until the following year. Yet even today, we hear of shameful episodes like that still happening.

Back then, we did not talk about Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, and the military certainly didn't screen for or treat it. Many Vietnam vets stuffed their memories down deep, needing desperately to talk about it, but claiming they did not want or need to.

Three of my own memories failed to surface during

the interview, but luckily, my daughter – my emergency backup memory – was there. She reminded me of the day she came home from second grade, pleased as punch with her new plastic tote. Everybody got one, and they all said "ARMY." I was, she recalled, outraged, taking it away and telling her I would buy her another, less militaristic, one. She also remembered that on her brother's 27th birthday, I declared that now I could breathe a sigh of relief, because he was too old to be drafted. Was there a war going on in 2008? Oh, yeah, you bet.

The third thing I'd forgotten was Allison's question at the beginning of the first Persian Gulf war, in 1991. "Is this like Vietnam, Mom?" she asked, and I quickly replied, "Oh, no, honey. Back then, we lost 20 boys every day."

Being reminded of that – both her innocent question and my appalling answer – brought tears to my eyes. For someone who was "not involved" in the Vietnam war, I sure had a lot to say. Like so many in my generation, I still regard "Vietnam" more as a searing experience than a country of beauty and grace.

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

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What is Chiropractic?

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National Asparagus Month

May marks National Asparagus Month; here are ideas from your Hy-Vee dietitians to help you enjoy the "aristocrat of vegetables."

How to select and store asparagus:

- Select bright green asparagus with closed, compact and firm tips. Also look for cut ends that are not dry.
- Keep fresh asparagus clean, cold and covered. Trim the stem end about 1/4 inch and wash in warm water several times. To maintain freshness, wrap a moist paper towel around the stem ends, or stand upright in two inches of cold water. Refrigerate and use within 2 or 3 days for best quality.
- If storing in the freezer, blanch in boiling water for 1-2 minutes and then cool in ice water immediately. Drain well and pack in plastic freezer bags or containers leaving no excess air space. Use within eight months for best quality. Source: www.asparagus.org

Health benefits of asparagus:

Folic Acid: Asparagus is a good source of folic acid, providing up to 33% of your daily needs in a half-cup serving. Folic acid is one of the B vitamins that helps the body produce and maintain new cells. In particular, red blood cell formation is dependent on adequate levels of this vitamin. It may also help cells resist changes in their DNA associated with the development of cancer. Folic acid plays a very important role in pregnancy by significantly reducing the incidence of birth defects known as neural tube defects (malformations of the spine and brain).

Digestion: Asparagus is rich in fiber, containing about 3 grams per cup! It also contains a noteworthy amount of protein (about 4-5 grams per cup). Both protein and fiber help stabilize our digestion and keep food moving through us at a desirable rate. Asparagus also contains significant amounts of the nutrient inulin, which is referred to as a "prebiotic." Inulin bypasses the first segments of digestion and arrives at the large intestine undigested. Because of this, it is an ideal food source for certain kinds of "good" bacteria in our intestine that are associated with better nutrient absorption.

A few quick serving ideas:

- Add chopped asparagus to salads, omelets, rice, quinoa and pasta dishes.
- Coat asparagus with olive oil and season with kosher salt and fresh ground black pepper. Roast in a 400-degree oven for 25 minutes. (You can also season with any additional spices you prefer, or try coating in grated Parmesan cheese for a real treat!)
- Fire up the grill! Marinate asparagus in olive oil, coarsely-ground pepper, kosher salt, minced garlic and a bit of balsamic vinegar for about two hours. Thread 6-7 asparagus stalks into a row, onto two bamboo skewers, piercing the asparagus toward the top and bottom of the stalk. Barbecue at a medium-heat setting for a total of 5-6 minutes.



Asparagus with Creamy Tarragon Sauce

Serves 4. Time: 15 minutes

All you need

2 bunches asparagus, tough ends trimmed
1/2 cup low-fat plain yogurt
6 tablespoons reduced-fat mayonnaise
4 tsp chopped fresh tarragon or 1 tsp dried
1 tablespoon Hy-Vee lemon juice
1 tablespoon water

2 teaspoons Hy-Vee Dijon mustard
Salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste

All you do

- Bring 1 inch of water to a boil in a large saucepan. Steam in a basket until tender-crisp, about 4 minutes.
- Meanwhile, whisk yogurt, mayonnaise, tarragon, lemon juice, water, mustard, salt and pepper in a small bowl. Drizzle the sauce over the asparagus. Serve warm or cold.


