
Every summer Saturday a different artist will set up a mini-studio on the gallery's grand front porch, demonstrate their artistry, and spend some low-key quality time



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


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






Vietman Veteran Book Signing Born on the 5th of July: **Memories of Frontline Nurse Captain** Saturday, August 3rd, 1-2 p.m. **River Lights Bookstore**

Reconstructive surgery as a child left Fred Phelps (No, not the Westoboro chruch idiot, but rather the hero) with a love of nursing, but unfit for military service. Hi nursing skills eventually caught the notice of a Vietnamera Pentagon drive to enlist male nurses, then about 1% of the profession. By July 1967, Captain Phelps found himself at An Khe, 340 miles north of Saigon, assigned to a medical field hospital. The year-long diary he kept is the subject of this book. Phelps remained in the Army Nurse Corps for 22½ years with assignments at various military hospitals. Retired in 1989, he continued work as a staff nurse at small hospitals around his hometown in lowa, where he lives with his wife, Ellen. 



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


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University of Dubuque's Heritage Center

With the University of Dubuque's recent announcement of Live at Heritage Center, a series of signature events at the school's new performing arts and campus center, and an upcoming Open House, the 365 crew took the opportunity to tour the facility and learn a bit more about the facility and the upcoming series from Heritage Center Executive Director, Tom Robbins.

"The Heritage Center is kind of a combination of buildings," explained Robbins at the beginning of our tour. "It's a student center and a performing arts center. You'll find as you walk throughout the building that it isn't evenly split down the middle, it's very intentionally integrated. The idea is that students who are walking through the building on their day-to-day activities, whether it's visiting the convenience store or café or going to get their mail or the ice cream parlor, that they will observe artistic activities as they are going throughout the building."



Robbins pointed out interior windows that provide a view from the hallway into the theaters' scene shop so passing students can observe sets being built. Likewise, students passing outside the building can see other arts activities being practiced inside the structure's huge exterior windows.

"If people are going from the north part of campus to the south part of campus, this is going to be kind of their connector, if you will. It's really the central hub of campus," noted Robbins. "So they pass by the choir classroom and hear the choir singing, or the art gallery downstairs, which is just adjacent to the café and see an art exhibit. Our band room up



front is surrounded by floor to ceiling windows so people walking by will see a rehearsal in progress. Hopefully, that will pique their curiosity enough to want to come in and listen. UD sort of prides itself on attracting first-generation college students, some of which don't have a lot of exposure to the various forms of art, so we figure this is a chance to establish that appreciation before they go off into the 'real' world."

As Robbins noted, the approximately 80,000 square foot facility was designed to integrate the functions of day-today student life – with a Cybercafé and lounge, convenience store, ice cream parlor, and campus mail/copy/print center - with an expanding focus on the fine and performing arts. Interspersed between the main theater hall and smaller black box theater, are classrooms, practice rooms, including dedicated choral music and instrumental rehearsal rooms, a visual arts classroom and an art gallery.

The functional spaces serve the University's new fine and performing arts major, a recent addition to the curriculum, which along with the Heritage Center itself, underlines the school's renewed commitment to the arts.

"We have a fine and performing arts major, which is very broad-based but (students) can pick an emphasis. It can be an emphasis in music – choral or instrumental – or it could be theater, dance, we're working on a visual arts component as well," explained Robbins. "This building is kind of the reverse of what you would see with most institutions, where they were building to meet a need. We're building to create a need. The arts at UD at one time were a very integral part of the university and then the university went through a series of changes and the arts were eliminated. Starting in the early part of this century, they gradually started to rebuild the arts program. This building is kind of the end of the strategic plan. Now it's time for a new vision for the next ten, twenty, thirty years. But the arts obviously are becoming more core



to the mission of the university at this point."

That renewed focus on the arts is reflected in the design for the Heritage Center, with its integrated campus life and arts components. While the larger spaces in the facility are designed to host public performances and exhibitions, Robbins envisions much of the smaller spaces as a hands-on "laboratory" for arts students to explore and learn their craft.

"I think a lot of it is kind of part of the university's mission is to develop the whole person," offers Robbins. "We have had a significant emphasis on athletics and on other areas of the University but the arts are vital to a liberal arts core curriculum. We want to bring it into balance. Again, if people can walk out of the university with at least an appreciation (for the arts), it will enhance the rest of their lives."

That commitment to enhancing the role of the arts in students' lives is matched by a broader goal of offering arts experiences to the entire community. "First and foremost our primary focus is how we can enhance campus life through the arts and then secondary to that is how we can do outreach into the community and how we can provide a quality of life enhancement for the community, as well," explained Robbins. "We will be starting a small series of events where we are bussing school children in for performances. We are going to take 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar,' 'Charlotte's Web' and actually the taiko group too - we're going to do school day performances where we're bussing kids in, along with the public performances."

Those public performance and exhibition spaces open the Heritage Center and indeed, the University of Dubuque campus to more interaction with the broader Dubuque community. Configurable to a variety of functions, the 200-250 seat Babka Black Box Theater can host theater events.



from traditional to experimental, as well as dance and other performance. "Black box is a very flexible space," noted Robbins. "I think the architect came up with five different configurations on how to do seating in here."

While the entire structure, inside and out is something to behold, the gem of the Heritage Center has to be the main theater, John and Alice Butler Hall. With fixed seating for 953, the hall has some additional space that allows extra seats to be added to accommodate 1000. The theater has a configurable orchestra pit that can accommodate up to 50 musicians and function in the traditional recessed manner or be raised to the level of the stage. The hall itself can be "tuned" acoustically to a certain extent, using the orchestra shell on stage and giant curtains along the sidewalls.





"They originally had plans to fit 1200 seats in the room and somewhere along the line – I don't know if it was an architectural decision, I think it came from our campus folks that for us, comfort is key," explained Robbins of the theater seating. "People are coming to performances, we want to be

sure that they have the best possible experience. They cut a couple hundred seats out. So the idea wasn't 'Let's try to jam in as many as we can and try to sell as many tickets as we can.' Really, comfort was very important. The seats are a little wider than a typical theater seat. The aisles are a little

bigger than the typical. There's good acoustics, there's great viewing; you don't have any obstructions. People have said it's very comfortable, it's very welcoming, it's very warm and inviting. It just has a lot of features that just draw you in and that's the idea. It's all about the experience. If they have one good experience, we know they'll be back."

Adjacent to the airy, open atrium space of the south entry is a historical display, which illustrates the 160 years of the school's existence from the founding by Rev. Adrian Van Vliet to the completion of the Heritage Center. Video monitors display a time lapse video of the two-year construction of the center. The display was designed and built by Jeff Westrom of J.W. Morton and Associates of Cedar Rapids (you probably know his work from the Platinum and Roshek Buildings, as well as the Star Brewery) who was able to use the University's extensive archive of materials and artifacts in the display.

"There was a book written a few years ago called 'The Child of the Church,' and so the authors of that did a really good job of writing the story, first of all, but also finding the best photography," Westrom shared. "I came to the project,

really, with an optimum situation, where unlike the Star or Roshek's – where we had to hunt for stuff all the time – this stuff was all readily available."

The display overlooks the Heritage Center's Bisignano Art Gallery. One of the gallery's two glass walls faces the hall adjacent to the Cybercafé, again offering students and guests an opportunity to experience art directly. The gallery currently hosts an exhibition of intaglio prints by noted lowa City printmaker Mauricio Lasansky from his Great Thinker Series.

Designed by Straka Johnson Architects, the Heritage Center is not only a brilliant study in functionally integrative spaces but a beautiful expression of art in itself. An architectural motif of five horizontal lines representing a musical staff is featured in a variety of design elements throughout the structure. Another curving motif, suggestive of a treble clef or the body of violin or cello continues the music theme in the building's larger curvilinear shapes and smaller details. The building's main south-facing entrance on Bennett Street

overlooks the university's Chalmers Field, with a drive-up awning reminiscent of the lid to a grand piano. A palette of earth tones gives the various spaces a warm, inviting feel and blends harmoniously with the brick and stone of the existing buildings on campus.

Robbins, a Hempstead graduate with a masters in arts administration, accepted the role of Heritage Center Executive Director in August 2012 after 12 years of managing another multipurpose art center with a 600-seat theater, art gallery, a school of the arts in Hartford, Wisconsin, near Milwaukee. He's clearly excited about the new Live at Heritage Center series of events, as well as the potential the facility holds.

"We've got nine touring events this year and I'm hoping to see that grow. I'm hoping to complement other things that are going on in the community," Robbins said. "The intent is not to bring in what the Moon Bar brings in or not to bring in even what the Grand Opera House is doing. We want to do programming that complements what they are doing, find a niche in the community and the niche is something that has curricular ties with what we're doing on campus but also has some broader appeal."

In addition to the Live at Heritage Center series of touring shows, the facility will host performances by the University of Dubuque's Fine And Performing Arts Department as well as performances both opening and closing its season by the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra. Frank Bang and the Secret Stash

Frank Bang describes his new album, Double Dare, as "driving music — something to get you from point A to point B." For this 11-song thrill ride of a disc, that's got a double meaning. Songs like the slamming title track and the spanking riff rocker, "Lose Control," certainly keep the pedal to the floor, but more contemplative numbers, like the slide guitar ballad, "Wonder Woman," and the celebration of life's simple joys, "This Is What It's All About," also bridge the points between life's connections — romance, family, joy. "The things you really need to get you from point A to point B," Bang observes, chuckling.

Bang's own journey has had many stops on his way to becoming a vibrant songwriterguitarist and frontman, including a fiveyear apprenticeship as guitar foil for blues legend Buddy Guy. And they all fuel Double Dare, a set that finds Bang at the creative zenith of his composing and performing powers, riding a raw and original line with his band the Secret Stash straight through the rock, blues and country that he's absorbed as a musical traveler.

"There isn't one thing on this album that isn't true," Bang relates. "There are stories about my family, about my life and experiences, about things that have struck me as funny or interesting. Even the guitar sound goes right back to the buzz I got plugging an electric guitar in for the first time — getting that real pure tone and letting it rip." Frank Bang & The Secret Stash have opened for Johnny Winter, Dickey Betts, Umphrey's McGee, Dick Dale, Hank Williams Jr, Galactic, Little Feat, Back Door Slam to name a few.

Beauty & The Beef

If you are in Dubuque and you are looking for a new place to pick up a quick, inexpensive, delicious lunch you are in luck! That's because Dubuque's first food truck is probably just around the corner. Beauty & The Beef has been operating in and around the city since April and already has a following of 1,442 likes (and still counting) on Facebook. It's easy to see why. The sandwiches are all made from fresh ingredients, cooked to order and served hot.



Beauty & The Beef is the brainchild of longtime friends Kathy Kordell, an attorney and Teri Link, a former Director of Junior Achievement. Neither one of them has previous food service experience but they both have 4 kids and are used to cooking for large groups. In fact, Teri has hosted a number of parties for more than 50 people at a time; she loves to cook and she is really good at it.

The two moms knew the people of Dubuque were ready to enjoy the culinary delights already provided by food trucks in many major US cities. They carefully planned their operation for months before opening and even designed their own food truck. Well, OK, it's really a 14 foot by 7 foot trailer. It was built by a Florida company specializing in food service vehicles to Kathy's and Teri's



specifications. It is a full commercial kitchen equipped with freezer, refrigerator, flat top griddle, four burner stove with oven, two basket fryer, three compartment sink, hand washing sink, hot water heater and food storage cabinets. The trailer is a restaurant on wheels and must conform to the same health and safety standards adhered to by all restaurants. There is a requirement all food must be prepared in the trailer and it is subject to inspection by Dubuque Health Services at any time.

Beauty & the Beef operates two to three days per week and is usually open from 11:15 am to 1:15 pm. On the days it is serving lunch a message is posted on Facebook between 10 and 10:30 am advising their location. This late notice is necessary because Kathy and Teri must drive to their desired spot and make sure parking is available before they "drop anchor" as they like to say. By the way, this



metaphor is appropriate. When three people are working in the trailer it has a tendency to rock and sway like a boat!

Now I know what you are thinking. You are probably saying what a cushy job these people have, they only work two hours a day, two or three days a week! Well, wait a minute. Actually kitchen prep begins at 8 am and cleanup isn't finished until about 5 pm. Then, too, there are private parties for local companies and groups on other days. It's also in the plan to be operating all year. Of course, a winter schedule will be weather permitting.



On most days there are about six lunches to choose from. There are a number of standard items and sometimes other sandwiches are put on the menu board to keep it interesting. The signature item is The Bombshell (all the sandwiches have catchy food truck names) with tender slow cooked specially seasoned pot roast placed between layers of melted pepper jack cheese and grilled on rustic country bread (above).







The Southern Belle is good old fashioned comfort food – grilled cheese sandwich consisting of bacon layered between slices of cheddar cheese. The Hula Girl is shredded chicken on provolone cheese topped with a pineapple ring, slivers of green apple and touch of balsamic vinegar on rustic bread.



The Pin Up is on the menu by popular demand. Tasty pulled pork, bacon and a little spicy Chorizo sausage are stuffed into 2 soft flour tortillas and topped with crisp coleslaw, salsa verde and crumbled Mexican cheese.



My favorite is called Chicago Beauty (above). Thinly sliced Italian beef is dipped in a flavorful au jus and placed on a bed of provolone cheese on a Chicago style roll.

You can choose hot or mild giardiniera to enhance the flavor even more.



On a recent visit I enjoyed The Other Woman. This is a great vegetarian sandwich of seasoned ripe tomato slices enclosed in a double layer of melted mozzarella on rustic bread. I overheard someone order this with bacon. Now I'm thinking this takes a great grilled cheese and tomato sandwich and elevates it to a food fit for a king! So guess what I'm ordering next time!



The menu is always subject to change. Supplies on a mobile food truck are limited. And sometimes new entrées or stand-by specials are available. For example they might have The Hot Chick shredded chicken with fresh Bruschetta served on romaine. Or maybe the Hey Baby Doll which is two slammers filled with tender slow-cooked pulled pork smothered in homemade BBQ sauce.

There are also some tantalizing sides you can add to your order. These include French fries, fried pickle spears and these wonderful jack and bleu cheese sticks.

Gluten-free bread is also on hand if you need it.

Beauty & The Beef is available to cater private parties, birthdays, company picnics, family reunions and weddings. If you are planning one of these or similar



events you should know several options are possible. For example, you can specify menu items and have your guests pick up their food whenever they want. Or you can use a ticket system to better control costs. Your guests simply present tickets for items they desire. Or you can specify dinner entrees to be served at a designated time. No matter how you plan your party your caterer brings not only the food to your location but the whole kitchen as well.

The Skin of Our Teeth

There's nothing better than a real summer tomato, raised outside your doorstep or on a local farm. When you see those round red globes on tables at the farmers' market, you know summer is really here. But every time I slice one up for dinner, I get homesick for my mom's kitchen. It wasn't so much what she did with the tomatoes she grew – we mainly had them sliced, then sprinkled with salt and pepper, or, when that got boring, with sugar. It was the fact that she served them peeled that made them utter perfection.

I know a lot of nutrition-mad foodies say you have to eat the skin of any fruit or vegetable to get all the vitamins and enzymes and Super Magic Crystals inside the produce in question. It makes me feel like the little boy in "The Emperor's New Clothes" any time I point out, to a dining companion, that the skin of the most glorious tomatoes is tough. I find myself cutting the slices into bite-size pieces to avoid having to grind away at the skin with what's left of the sharp edges of my teeth. This is especially problematic when serving a BLT. Excuse me, please, while I attempt to bite into this slice of tomato, leaving only a BL behind.

The easy way to skin a tomato is by scoring an X into the bottom and then immersing it briefly into boiling water. Once retrieved and cooled under cold water, the skin slips right off. Easy, but who wants to boil water when it's 85 degrees in the kitchen even with the AC blasting?

We didn't have air conditioning when I was growing up, and even if Mom knew about this cheater-peeling tip, she would have scorned it. All she needed was her paring knife. Some people in my family may be tired of hearing this, but my mom was a genius with a knife. With that little straightedge, she could take the skin off anything in a trice – tomato, potato, turnip, tangerine. Well, no, not a tangerine; those are self-peeling fruits, bless their little hearts.



Everything else, though, she could strip down just like that.

Me, I have to resort to one of those apple corer-peelers if I want an apple pie. It's a great little device, and I find it hard to stop peeling once I've got it set up, but if Mom were here, she'd laugh. Then, I suppose, she would sigh to see her daughter, all thumbs in the kitchen, using peelers and mandolines or, God forbid, an electric food processor just to skin a carrot. Sorry, Mom. I guess it wasn't in the genes.

I think, sometimes, it was just as much in the knife as in her genome. Mom had a giant butcher knife she used for other tasks, like cutting up a whole chicken in about the time it takes me to eat a drumstick. That knife was so cool, it had its own little bed to rest in, crafted out of wood by my dad. Any time it became dull, she would holler, "Harold! The knife needs sharpening!" and he would run it down to his basement workshop, where he honed it with some kind of power tool until it could slice a nickel in half. I never tested this; I just knew it must be true.

Julia Child knew the value of a good knife. Not only did it make her a great chef and the author of an amazing cookbook which even I can cook from (just try my cherry clafouti sometime), it was the basis for one of her deepest friendships. The whole saga is laid out in the 2010 book "As Always, Julia," a delicious collection of letters between

Child and Avis DeVoto, whose husband, Bernard, wrote books and, most importantly, columns for newspapers and magazines that Julia read when her own husband's career landed them in Paris. Upon reading Mr. DeVoto's diatribe in Harper's about the infuriating American knife – beautiful, rust-proof, and also edge-proof (that is, unsharpenable) – she took pity upon the man and sent him not only an admiring and sympathetic letter, but also a small French knife. Avis was her husband's letter handler, and thus began a world-class friendship, and a flurry of entertaining correspondence.

Julia, too, had been unable to sharpen her American knives, telling DeVoto, "I am therefore wondering if the average American housewife really wants a sharp knife in the kitchen, as many of my compatriots accuse me resentfully: 'But your knives are so sharp! They're dangerous!"

Au contraire. Any chef knows it's a dull knife that's apt to debone the cook's finger, as she saws away ineffectually. A dull knife won't even cut into a tomato, let alone remove its skin. My mom did not consider herself much of a cook (although she was), but even she knew the importance of a honed edge.

Last weekend we made a trip to Madison, stopping at my favorite fruit/wine/cheese/what-have-you store for a first bag of what the store likes to call "chin-drippin' peaches." I sliced one up for lunch today, and while the flesh within was superlative in both flavor and texture, I wished my mom were around to cut off the unyielding skin.

She used to do that for us, before dropping slices onto vanilla ice cream for dessert. If we missed a bit of fiber, so what? There is something to be said for food that can be savored, not fought with. All it takes is a good knife, and a certain kind of skill. My mom an ordinary cook? Hardly. I wish you could have seen her peel a peach.

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

Healthier Food-On-A-Stick

The weather is hot and sticky and the smell of fried food is wafting through the air, which could only mean one thing... State Fair time! Food is a main attraction at many state fairs and food on-a-stick has become increasingly popular not only at State fairs but also on food trucks. Food on-a-stick is often deep-fried and has a reputation for being unhealthy. Traditionally popular items like deep-fried Twinkies, corn dogs, bacon on-a-stick and even deep-fried butter are often the first foods that come to mind when food-on-a-stick is mentioned. However, there are increasingly healthier options for food on-a-stick so even the most health-conscious won't miss out on this fun trend.

After visiting the State Fair or if you are unable to attend this year, you may feel inspired to make food-on-stick at home. There are many delicious, healthy recipes that skip the deep fryer. You can begin your day-on-a-stick by making breakfast-on-a-stick. Start by toasting a frozen waffle, cutting it into slices and skewering it along with strawberries and any other pieces of your favorite fruit. Fruit-on-a-stick is a great way to get a healthy snack into your day and a fun way for children to enjoy fruit. Adding a yogurt dipping sauce makes fruit-on-a-stick even more enjoyable.

Ditch the boring, traditional sandwich at lunchtime for a more exciting deconstructed sandwich-on-a-stick. Skewer deli turkey or chicken along with pieces of whole wheat bread, cheddar cheese cubes and grapes. There is also the "Elvis" version of a sandwich-on-a-stick; a peanut butter sandwich is cubed and threaded along with slices of banana. This could even be grilled to toast the bread and to melt the peanut butter and warm the banana. Even salad can be put on-a-stick by simply making iceberg lettuce chunks and adding diagonally cut carrot slices, cherry tomatoes and cucumber with the lettuce to a skewer - and dipping it into your favorite salad dressing. The possibilities are endless and sure to get your creativity flowing!

Oven-Fried Chicken-On-A-Stick All you need:

- 1 tablespoon kosher salt
- 2 teaspoons paprika, divided
- 1 teaspoon onion powder, divided
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder, divided
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1.5 lbs. boneless, skinless chicken breast
- 2 cups coarse dry whole wheat breadcrumbs
- 2 tablespoons canola oil
- 2 large egg whites
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- Freshly ground pepper, to taste

All you do:

- Combine kosher salt, 1 teaspoon paprika and ½ teaspoon onion powder and ½ teaspoon garlic powder in a large bowl. Add buttermilk and whisk until the salt is completely dissolved and the spices are dispersed in the liquid.
- Cut chicken lengthwise into about 1-inchwide strips. Add to the marinade and combine for 30 minutes but no longer, so that the chicken does not get too salty.
- Combine breadcrumbs, the remaining 1 teaspoon paprika, ½ teaspoon onion powder and ½ teaspoon garlic powder in a large shallow dish. Add 2 tablespoons oil and toss well to coat.
- Whisk egg whites and mustard in a second large shallow dish and season both the breadcrumb and egg mixtures with pepper.
- Preheat oven to 350°F. Line a rimmed baking sheet with foil and thread chicken onto six 12-inch bamboo skewers, dividing evenly. Dip the chicken into the egg mixture, coating both sides. Place in the breadcrumb mixture one at a time, sprinkle with crumbs to cover and press so the coating sticks to both sides. Gently shake off any excess crumbs and place skewers on the prepared rack.
- Bake the chicken, turning halfway through, until golden brown and the juices run clear, about 25 minutes.
- Enjoy with your favorite dipping sauce! Source: EatingWell Magazine




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

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Paradise Lost

You can say a lot of things about Dan Brown's new novel Inferno and in a minute I will. One thing is perfectly clear. It hits the ground running like some kind of purposeful cheetah with only one thing in mind and that's to get to the end the quickest way possible. Along the way, if you can keep up, you are in for a wild ride.

It bears remembering that nothing is as it seems and no one is who they say they are. People are motivated by other than what they are telling you and even a benign institution like the World Health Organization (WHO) can take on sinister qualities.

You need to read Inferno with a modicum of care if you want to keep things straight.

Inferno is not unlike Dan Brown's other books. The main character, Robert Langdon, is presented with small mystery after small mysteries and he solves them one by one building a pyramid of information that leads

him to a conclusion. It is only when standing on top of that pyramid that he and we can see the big picture and that happens, coincidentally enough, at the end of the book.

I am going to leave out any major plot summery because some things we are told in the beginning of the book are reversed later on to serve the final plot pieces. I will tell you this. The ending is one of the best endings I've read in a long time. It ends exactly how it should end. It ends exactly the way the whole book has been pointing toward. It is a very satisfying ending whether or not you like Dante or Milton or Dan Brown.

Dan Brown and Inferno have taken it on the chin relating to scathing critical reviews that point to the fact that Mr. Brown isn't much of a literary writer. Within reason I would have to agree. It's just that I don't care. I'm not looking for Dante's Inferno or John Milton's Paradise

Lost. I am looking for a wiz-bang thriller that hits the ground running catapulting itself forward at breakneck speed. Leaving me little room to take a breath and conjuring up these little puzzles that seem almost intellectual in nature and makes me feel a little like a scholar even though I didn't solve any of them.

I have never been to Italy although I have read Dante. I am not familiar with any of the buildings in the book beyond reading about them. I don't know many if any of the artwork that appears in the novel. I wasn't able to solve many if any of the puzzles presented to Langdon. One nice think about that, the solutions to the puzzles were very satisfying and easy to understand. I could readily see how they moved the plot forward. Mr. Brown

made darn sure I was not left out.

As expected Inferno has sold massive numbers of copies, is on all the best sellers lists, and Tom Hanks is set to reprise his role as Robert Langdon in the movie version to come out at the end of this year or early next year.

I only have one thing to complain about. Inferno

is too much of a good thing. There is too much subterfuge; too many clues; too many reversals; too many characters; too many bad guys; and, too many times Langdon is allowed to escape the clutches of the evil guys. If Mr. Brown had cut about 15% of these things I think he would have had a perfect thriller, something he is perfectly capable of writing. More is not always better. Even though a James Joyce he is not I liked Inferno and had a good time reading it and I think you will too.

You have an opportunity now to read the book before the movie comes out. My advice is to do just that since I can almost guarantee that the movie will be easier to understand after reading the book. As we are talking about the Inferno which is part of Dante's Divine Comedy it would do you well to arm yourself with as many weapons as possible so you will get the joke. The movie will never be as good as the book.

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


