Notes from the Publisher... Fostering Ideas, conversations and arguments.

I may have mentioned in the past that I have a bit of an addiction problem. The street name for the drug in Audible.com. You start listening to a book and you find that you consider each part of your day and weigh whether or not it would be appropriate to listen to books during that part of the day. While doing layout design, yes. While writing a cover story, not so much. In the dentist chair, maybe (sorry Kuttlers and crew). At a funeral... depends who died. But basically, any time I don't physically have to generate coherent sentences, I think the answer is maybe yes.

I avoided fantasy novels for a long time but was running out of historical religion based Indiana Jones style fiction options and had to go somewhere. But I can't try to learn anything with a self help book because I need it to be sort of background and I don't want to get depressed reading political or social commentary novels. So fantasy it was.

I've been through Middle-Earth and the Song of Ice and Fire. This year I started reading books by Brandon Sanderson. In a short time, I had read them all and loved them all. I even read his books written for kids. His first book was in 2005, and he's been prolific to say the least since then. His Mistborn Trilogy was simple fantastic. Elantris, Warbreaker and the first novel in what promises to be an amazing epic Stormlight Archive series, The Way of Kings, was great.

I saw that he was tapped to finish the Wheel of Time series by author Robert Jordan. For the uninitiated, Wheel of Time is a famed sprawling 14 book fantasy series, à la Tolkein and George R. R. Martin. I had avoided the series because, well, it was 14 books long and each installment was a War and Peace level tome. But having been hooked on Sanderson, I started to read the series, just so I could get to the final three novels on the series which were written by Sanderson, working from Jordan's notes. (Note to G.R.R. Martin fans, when he dies unexpectedly before finishing the Game of Thrones books, pray they get Sanderson to finish them).

The first book was pretty good. The Wheel

of Time world was established as were the main characters and the general goal to be accomplished. The second book wasn't quite as good but still had its moments. More characters, good plot progress. But by #3 things started to drag. A bazillion characters and a whole lot of doing nothing much. And some characters had multiple names. Ugh. Calgon, take me away. I have to read 11 of these before I get to Sanderson's saving grace at the end?

I'm seven books into the series now, barely hanging on at about 900 pages each. Brandon Sanderson has a new book out called Steelheart. I took a break from Wheel of Time to read it. I'm ten chapters in and already it's like a breath of fresh air. Whereas I could really give a crap about what happened to Rand Al Thor and his crew is magical misfits from Wheel of Time, I can stop listening to Steelheart. I'm wondering now if I can just read the wiki synopses of the next 4 books in Jordan's series and skip to what has got to be a way better ending under Sanderson's pen.

Sorry Robert Jordan fans, the guy is basically a Days of Lives writer trapped in a Tolkein vocabulary. I feel like if I skip four books, I will be able to pick up pretty easily where things have progressed within a couple chapters at the beginning of book eleven. I think I need a whole separate column to discuss our college foray into Day of Our Lives. Needless to say, 20 years later I imagine Stefano DiMera is still causing problems and Marlina Evans is probably back in another hostage pit with John Black to the rescue. At least they only have a handful of characters who take turns getting kidnapped, possessed by the devil or falling to amnesia. Wheel of Time has so many characters that it has websites dedicated to keeping them straight. And what kind of bastard has main characters named Elayne, Egwene and Moraine at the same time. It's worse the Sauron and Sauruman.

When I finish these, I want a badge or a medal or something. I just hope I don't end up wanting 12,220 pages of my life back. At least I'll have spent them doing other things at the same time and not just sitting there holding a book. I still love you Audible.com.

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Dubuque Food & Wine on the River Festival

November 8, 9, 10 - Port of Dubuque

No soup for you! Those words and the character who barked them at non-complying customers are instantly recognizable to fans of TV sitcom Seinfeld. So why is the "Soup Nazi" on the cover of 365ink? And really, no soup? Relax. Not only is there soup, but also more food, wine, beer, chocolate, cheesecake and even more wine. As for the Soup Nazi, well, we'll get to that in a minute.

The important thing to note at the moment is that all the while Dubuque has been reinventing itself as a great place to live, work and play, it's also been

working on becoming a great place to eat and drink wine. Recognizing that fact but realizing that it might be a best-kept secret, even among those tourists that frequent Galena, Bob Smith (above - back row, right) of Stone Cliff Winery contacted Jeff Jansen (back row, left) of Van's Wine & Liquor to do something about it.

"I approached Jeff probably six or seven months ago and what we've seen over the last few years is Galena has been very successful in building ongoing events that are drawing from the

Chicago market, from the Madison market," explained Smith. "Even though Dubuque, with our revitalization of the waterfront and our tourism, we haven't been able to pick up on the food and wine industry clique that Galena has. It's just a perfect fit for them. And I think that Jeff was kind of feeling the same way so we put our heads together and said, 'We can do this.'"

"Bob called me and said, 'Let's get together and talk,'" Jansen adds. "He said he'd been watching what was happening in Galena as far as their Wine Lovers' (Weekend), their Nouveau Festival and he said, 'We need something like that in Dubuque.' Kind of a light clicked on. Well, yeah, I guess there is nothing like that."

So Smith and Jansen created the

Dubuque Food and Wine on the River Festival. The inaugural event, scheduled for the weekend of November 8, 9, and 10, is going to be jam-packed with a variety of opportunities to taste great food, great wine and have a whole lot of fun. Even better, the event will benefit the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival.

The event starts off with one heck of a decadent night of wine and food tasting at the Mississippi Moon Bar at the Diamond Jo Casino on Friday, November 8 at 6:30 p.m. Guests can enjoy gourmet food prepared on site by L.May Eatery, The Woodfire Grille, Pepper Sprout, and Caroline's from the Hotel Julien Dubuque. Pairing with the mouthwatering line-up of spectacular eats is a reserve wine tasting to die for. Bring tissues because you're taste buds are going



to be crying tears of joy. Live music for the night will come from the sultry-voiced Kristina Castenada and friends. It's a Grand Tasting, Dubuque style.

"Friday night is geared a little more upscale, kind of reserved tier," explained Jansen. "We've got approximately 35 reserve wines – really killer stuff – from probably \$30 to \$80-90 retail. And then the Woodfire (Grille) and L.May (Eatery) and Pepper Sprout and Caroline's restaurant will all have two to three items for sampling. I mean we've got four phenomenal restaurants there – really good wine, really good food, it's the perfect combination."

"We approached the high-end restaurants in town, and sat down and talked to them and they said, 'This is great. This is just what we've been looking for,'"

relates Smith. "So kind of pushing that along we said, 'Let's make it a weekend.'"

And a full weekend it is. Following Friday's indulgence, Saturday is a full afternoon of celebrating food and wine, hosted by Stone Cliff Winery at the Port of Dubuque. The afternoon starts with a parade, Nouveau style, down Main Street in Dubuque, across the 3rd Street Bridge to Stone Cliff Winery (arriving at about 1 p.m.) where the celebration continues.

"It's kind of a combination of Oktoberfest and Nouveau, whatever you wanna throw in there," says Smith. "It's a fall festival. We've never been purists from the standpoint that Nouveau has to happen on the 22nd or on the third Thursday and Friday of November. We look at it kind of like Oktoberfest. It's a time to

celebrate and have fun."

That time arrives about 2 p.m. with the beginning of a second wine tasting hosted by Van's Wine & Liquor in Stone Cliff's party room. "We'd all like to drink a \$100 bottle of wine every night but unfortunately that's just not in the cards," explains Jansen, "so Saturday is kind of a little more focused on everyday type of wines. We're going to have 35-40 wines, more affordable stuff, maybe in the \$15-20 range, even a lot of stuff around the \$10 range. Then we've got Potosi Brewery and Millstream Brewery onsite sampling their wares, some really good quality stuff."

Along with the wine and beer tasting, the event will feature gourmet samplings of top-shelf treats from some of the Tri-State's favorite places. "On the food side of things, we've got Cremer's doing homemade sausages, turkey brats," Jansen continues. "Stam Chocolaterie is going to be sampling their chocolates and I think are going to be doing a port and chocolate pairing with Stone Cliff. Nan (Smith) was just bottling her port today. (The day we conducted the interview.) Nick and Emily (Puls) from East Mill (Bakeshop) are going to be sampling some stuff and they're going to be doing a mini breakout session on champagne and desserts. The thought is to do not just a sampling but

bring a little touch of education as well. Like Teresa from Millstream is going to be talking about the brewing process or what you should be tasting in beer, that kind of thing. It's pretty neat stuff."

Despite the educational opportunities, Saturday's event is supposed to be a celebration, so in that spirit The Lonely Goats will provide live music for sipping, eating, and especially, dancing from 2:30 to 5 p.m. (Wine, beer and music sometimes inspire that sort of thing.) It's all adding up to be a pretty fun time, right? Well hold on there kid, we're just getting started.

Just to prove that this is no gathering of wine snobs, the fun really kicks in as Larry Thomas, the one and only "Soup Nazi" from Seinfeld, will be there, in-person, to host and judge a soup battle royale between L.May, Woodfire Grille, The Pepper Sprout, Caroline's Restaurant and Cremer's. HUHOT MONGOLIAN GRILL

In the 13th Century Genghis Khan was known as the Great Khan. He was the Supreme Ruler of Mongolia, one of the greatest empires the World has ever known. According to legend, after a long day of hunting Genghis Khan and his warriors would make camp and prepare their evening meal. They would prepare thin slices of meats, mix them up with whatever vegetables and spices were available, and proceed to grill them on their upturned shields over a flaming hot fire. This style of cooking became known as Mongolian BBQ.

HuHot Mongolian Grill has developed this cooking method into an art form. Their restaurants provide us with all-you-can-eat stir-fry prepared from fresh vegetables and a variety of meats and seafood.

HuHot Mongolian Grills, LLC is located in Missoula, MT. Their first restaurant opened in Missoula in 1999. Their first franchise opened in Omaha, NE in 2002. The company's CEO/ Founder, Mr. Andy Vap, named his restaurant in honor of HOHHOT (pronounced who-Hot) the capital of Inner Mongolia Autonomous Region of the People's Republic of China. He chose the name as a way of commemorating the tradition of Mongolian BBQ. Also because it is similar to a Hunan style of either mild or spicy cuisine cooked on a very hot grill.

That hot grill, by the way, is a 650,000 BTU



multi-burner gas griddle weighing 2,200 pounds. The Grill Warriors (cooks) carefully monitor the cooking temperatures to ensure they are maintained between 550° to 750° F.

The Dubuque HuHot is owned by Restaurant's Inc. headquartered in Omaha, NE. This is a Professional Management Company whose family of restaurants includes Old Country Buffets, Stokes Grill and Bars, Twisted Fork Grill & Saloons, Smashburgers and Ryan's Bistros. They also own all of the HuHot Mongolian Grills in Nebraska, Kansas, South Dakota and Iowa.

Running a restaurant is never easy. However, you can't help but notice the Dubuque HuHot operates very smoothly. This is largely due to the talent and experience of this restaurant's General Manager, Rita Lyster. She is eminently qualified having begun her career in food

service 27 years ago at the Garden Gate Restaurant which was part of Dick's Supermarket. She went on to manage the Platteville Golf and Country Club and then the Platteville Pizza Hut. She next went to Naples, FL where she was General Manager of a Tijuana Flats, one of the stores of a fresh Tex Mex chain. Lucky for us Rita returned to Dubuque to be closer to her family. She was then appointed Assistant General Manager of the new HuHot at Kennedy Mall in Dubuque which officially opened exactly 4 years ago in October, 2009. Rita was promoted to General Manager a couple of years later.



You can order beer, wine and sake from the bar. When you are seated you are given a card listing the fountain beverages available. These are all of the flavors dispensed by the new Coca Cola Free Style System. You may have used this at a few fast food restaurants where you serve yourself by pushing buttons on a touch screen. HuHot is the first chain to offer full-service on this system. The card lists 130 flavors you can choose from. However, you can ask for a combination of flavors such as requesting half ginger ale and half raspberry. So actually your total number of soda choices is 180!



HuHot is all-you-can-eat so you can go back to the food bar as many times as you like. So I recommend you take your time and start out by ordering appetizers. Choose Krab Rangoon, pork and vegetable Eggrolls, chicken and vegetable Potstickers or a combination of these.



You can also order Egg Drop or HuHot & Sour soup and Asian, Garden or Chicken Teriyaki Salads. At lunch time the soup and salad are á la carte. Either a soup or salad is included with your dinner.





The Grill Meals are fun to play with. You proceed to the Food Bar, take a bowl and fill it with a variety of raw, thinly sliced meats, seafood and vegetables. You will find pork, chicken, beef and mild or hot sausage. Don't worry if some of the meats appear to be a little frozen. It's perfectly ok to cook frozen food as long as it is cooked thoroughly. The meats are so thin and the grill temperatures are so hot all the meats are well cooked. In fact the flavors are intense and sealed in since the entire cooking process is accomplished so quickly.

The seafood choices change according to season and availability. Right now you can add Crab, Alaska Pollock and Swai (pronounced sw-eye). You may not be familiar with this last one. It's actually a catfish that is native to the rivers of Southeast Asia. It looks like a shark and grows to 4 feet in length and just under 100 pounds in weight. Swai has a milder flavor and more delicate texture than US native channel catfish. You will also find shrimp on the food bar on Wednesday and Friday nights.



Now you can add some noodles to your bowl. There are Chinese noodles, Yakisoba and Pad Thai. Yakisoba are Japanese ramen-style noodles, and Pad Thai are made from soaked and dried rice noodles commonly sold with street food in Thailand.

Next you pile on the veggies. There are currently about 21 items to pick from. These include common ones like cabbage, broccoli, tomatoes, carrots, spinach, onions and green peppers. Also included are some more unusual ones such as water chestnuts, baby corn, bamboo shoots, bean sprouts and mandarin oranges.

Once your bowl is full of stuff it's time to move to the sauce



bar. HuHot has 12 Signature Sauces plus a special sauce of the season. These sauces are the reason HuHot stir-fry is so good! Each sauce has been carefully formulated to add a slightly different taste to your bowl of goodies. The best part is you get to not only choose your own sauce but you get to make it too. For example if you want Hot Sauce you add to your bowl 2 ladles of Kung Pau, 2 Szechuan, 1 Garlic and 1 Sweet chili oil. If you want to experience more Asian Flavor mix into your bowl 2 ladles of Hoisin sauce, 1 Thai peanut oil, 1 Ginger and 1 Sweet chili. There is even a special sauce for kids made from 2 ladles of Sweet and Sour, 1 Teriyaki and 1 Lemon juice. By the way, I was informed it's always better to throw in a couple extra ladles of oils. When you have a bowl with 6 or 7 ladles of sauce there is no chance your meats and veggies will dry out on the super hot griddle.



Now that your bowl is overflowing hand it to the Grill Warrior. He will carefully pour the contents into a space on the griddle. Watch him expertly mixing all of your selections and sauces together. It only takes a few minutes to stir-grill your meal. Then he will plate it and hand you back the same contents of the bowl you gave him!

While you are eating take a look at the Mongolian themed murals adorning the walls. These were hand painted by talented Folklore Artist Laura Blaker. Laura was born in Chicago, graduated from the Colorado Institute of Art in Denver and now resides in Missoula, Montana. She is the contract muralist for HuHot. Laura attended a summer workshop at the Florence Academy of Art. For months she worried how she was going to come up with the money to go to Italy. Three months before her scheduled departure her husband, Don Kukla, won \$200,000 in the Montana lottery! Laura's beautiful artwork is available for purchase at www.LauraBlakerFineArt.com.




Eating at HuHot is all about eating healthy: no preservatives, food additives or MSG are used. If you have problems with allergies tell your server and special precautions are taken. The griddle spaces are always cleaned after each use. If you have an allergy the grill warrior will cook your meal in an extra wide space so there is no chance of your choices touching another diner's order. In cases of severe allergies sauces are provided from the kitchen so there is no danger of cross contamination at the sauce bar.



You can also review the Allergy & Nutrition information on the HuHot website or ask to see the Allergy Book. This information will guide you in picking safe ingredients and mixing the sauces that are right for you.

Saving room for dessert can be difficult when your meals are all-you-can-eat. However, keep in mind the NY Cheesecake is wonderful; Khan's chocolate cake is decadent and my favorite: the cheesecake filled Rangoons are awesome. The kids will have fun making their own S'mores at your table with their own campfire!

HuHot Mongolian Grill is the kind of place you can't help going back to again and again. So be sure to sign up for their Loyalty Card so you can earn a point for every dollar spent on food. Every 100 points gets you a \$10 discount.







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Tea for - One

Once I get this written, I'm going to treat myself to a mug of chai. Not chai made from a vile powdered mix, but the real thing. Chai made from tea, and seasonings like cardamom, cinnamon and cloves, and piping hot water. Chai finished off with cream, by which I mean half-and-half, except around the holidays, when there always seems to be some leftover whipping cream that really should be used up. Chai brightened with a heaping spoonful of sugar. Ah.

"Chai" means "tea" in Hindu. If you ask for "chai tea" in an Indian restaurant, your server may stifle a smile as he hears you request "tea tea." There are rare white teas picked off mountain tops in Tibet, and sturdy British Breakfast tea that soldiers in World War I drank even in the trenches, as often as not served with sugar cubes and milk. Those were the days, when even war was civilized, or tried to be.

I never thought I'd be a tea drinker. In our house, Dad was the one who drank it. Every night, just before dinner was served, Mom would run fresh water into the Revere kettle and fire up the Chambers stove. When we heard it whistle, we knew it was time to come to the table. Dad drank it with milk, which I thought was weird. Once I was old enough to consume coffee, I took it plain.

In college, I had a friend named Robin who drank tea. He freaked us all out every time he would take the tea bag, still steaming, put it into his mouth, and suck on it briefly (and, surely, painfully) to get every bit of liquid out. You could say he was thorough, or you could say he was nuts.

Coffee began to disappoint me around that time. It was decades before Starbucks put a coffeehouse on every corner, serving concoctions so dolled up with flavored syrups and mounds of whipped cream it took five



minutes, and a spoon, to get to the actual liquid. My favorite thing from a new-age coffeehouse is a mocha, which is to coffee as chai is to tea. At least I can point to an entire civilization that considers chai its national drink.

It's not that I won't drink tea plain. I love the tea they serve at Chinese restaurants, and finally thought to ask what it was. Green jasmine, I was told, and promptly went out to buy some.

But I think the main reason I love having tea is the ceremony. I don't mean the Japanese tea ceremony, about which I know pretty much nothing, except that it's served by geishas, and they do all the work. When I order tea, it's usually for two reasons: I'm starving, but I don't want to ruin my appetite with the soup du jour or, for that matter, the Buffalo wings du jour. I just want something warm to fool my tummy into thinking it's being fed.

Secondly, I want something to do. Of course, the personal tea ceremony really depends on how the restaurant brings it to the table. Some places plunk down a cup of hot water and a Lipton tea bag and, if you're lucky, a pale wedge of lemon. Okay, that'll do. But other places bring you a mahogany box laden with all sorts of flavors, looking a little like a throwback to a library card catalog – only with cards you can steep and sip.

The water may arrive in an actual

tea pot, in which case I might slide two bags out of the box, reserving the second one for later. The idea of making one bag last through two cups of hot water seems awfully stingy to me. I mean, if you get a second cup of coffee, do they run more water through the same wet grounds they used for the first cup? I don't think so.

I love tea shops. You can shop for tea and you can drink it, all in the same place. (You can't shop for bait and go fishing in a bait shop, can you?) I've been to tea rooms in Wisconsin, Michigan, even San Antonio. The one in Texas was so genteel, they wrapped the lemon wedge in a square of cheesecloth and tied with a ribbon. It took me a moment to realize what it was, and why. You could squeeze out however much lemon juice you wanted, and the seeds would remain inside their wrapping. How clever. How nice.

My favorite tea place is in Milwaukee.

Named Watts Tea Shop, it's on the second floor, on top of a store filled with china sets, aprons, fancy vases, and, no kidding, wedding gowns. I go for the tea, and the adorable strainer that fits right over your cup to catch the loose tea as you pour. Just to make you properly thirsty, they serve Sunshine Cake, a three-layer sponge cake with French custard filling and 7-minute boiled frosting – plus an edible flower. I always eat the flower. It's better than a sprig of parsley, and a lot more fun.

I don't like winter, but I love an excuse to drink something hot. My hands get really cold, even inside the house, and nothing feels better than wrapping them around a warm mug. Maybe coffee, if there's enough cream in the house. Maybe hot cocoa, if I'm feeling a bit sorry for myself. Or maybe chai, which, for me at least, seems to cover all bases. If I find a bit of cake on the kitchen counter, I won't even need lunch.



**Trick or Treat?
Your Choice!**

The “magic” night is almost here, and if you are not an actual ghost or goblin, you know that Halloween is THE night for children to be on the prowl for treats — mostly high sugar ones! And that means that parents and grandparents need to be ready to deal with the onslaught of candy and hyper kids.

Are there dental consequences? Absolutely! Are they gigantic? Probably not IF there are some steps taken to minimize the issues. First (and this isn't a news flash) sugar isn't good for us — not for our dental health and not for our total health. Keeping sugar usage minimal and raising kids to like fresh fruits and vegetables is key.

But Halloween will arrive, and the kids will come home with bags of goodies. I know some parents who take it and parcel it out over the next several days or weeks. I know others that let their children eat all they want for a day or two and then get rid of the rest. (I even know some parents who've been known to “save” their kids from all that candy by eating it themselves!)

While I understand the logic of both approaches, the latter one is actually better from a dental perspective. Exposure time to sugar (even one bite!) is the main issue to the potential of cavities developing. Every time someone consumes sugar or other carbohydrates, the sugars provide

enough nutrition to the bacteria to keep them generating acid for at least a half hour. If the substance is retentive (sticky), it stays in the mouth longer, and the acid exposure time is also lengthened.

If people eat all the candy they want for a day or two, the exposure time totals a couple of days. They are also hopefully sick of it by then. If the candy is parceled out over days or weeks, the exposure time is very likely to be greater. It's also more likely to create a habit where the person wants and expects candy each day. (Please note that I'm not addressing the impact that amount of sugar has on the child's systemic health which is also NOT positive!)

The accompanying graphic says much of this better than I can. Candy, baked goods, and pop produce problems. But if anyone is going to consume it, there are things that can be done to mitigate the damages. Eating candy with meals at least restricts the exposure times. Have it for dessert! Brushing and flossing after consuming sugar also reduces the exposure times since it eliminates things sticking around. Using fluoride toothpastes will help remineralize the tooth structure that has been demineralized by the acids produced by the bacteria.

So, what's the bottom line? I believe “moderation in all things” and “timing is everything” are good mottos to live by. As a dentist I'm just glad that Halloween only comes once a year! We'll be giving out tooth brushes at our house....

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




Flip for Fiber!

Most Americans are trying to consume more fiber these days. Unfortunately nine out of 10 Americans fall short of the daily recommended fiber intake. The average American eats only half the daily recommended amount of fiber which is 30–40 grams of fiber/day depending on your age and most Americans average only 14 grams of fiber/day. There are numerous health benefits to getting your daily dose of fiber including lowering your cholesterol, providing a feeling of fullness, and adding healthy bacteria to your gut.

Fiber is the non-digestible part of plant foods found in grains, fruits, vegetables and legumes. Undigested fiber provides friendly immune-boosting bacteria through a process called fermentation. There are two main types of fiber – soluble and insoluble. Think of soluble fiber as a sponge; it collects and removes toxins including bad (LDL) cholesterol from our bodies. Foods containing soluble fiber include oatmeal, apples, pear, legumes and barley. Soluble fiber adds bulk to stools while insoluble fiber increases movement of the bowels. Insoluble fiber, or roughage, works like a broom in a sweeping or cleaning motion of the intestines. Examples include wheat bran, some whole wheat products, fruits and vegetables.



WHOLE GRAIN vs. FIBER

Don't be fooled by whole grain and be sure to FLIP for FIBER. This means turning over the label to make sure the claim is true. If a product claims to be 100% whole wheat, then the first ingredient most likely is whole wheat providing at least 2-3 grams of fiber or more per serving. If a package reads wheat, natural, multi-grain or whole grain, you must check the first ingredient on the ingredient list to verify

that whole wheat is the first ingredient listed and then that the fiber grams/serving are at least 3 grams or more. If the first ingredient reads "enriched" or "refined," then chances are the fiber grams per serving are equal to or less than 1 gram and the beneficial fiber has been removed in processing. Make the time to check your bread label and see how much fiber you are eating.

• A "good" source of fiber = 10% Daily Value or 3 grams per serving

• An "excellent" source of fiber = 20% Daily Value or 5 grams of fiber

HOW TO ADD MORE FIBER TO YOUR DIET

• Try to have at least one fruit and or vegetable with each meal

• Leave the skin on fruits and vegetables

• Serve hummus instead of high-fat dips

• Include a whole grain at each meal and snack

• Add beans to soup and casseroles

• Prepare a whole grain for breakfast such as quinoa, steel-cut oats or barley

Work at a place full of people you are proud to know and people you admire. Choose friends who love and respect you and make your day a little brighter simply by being in it.


Here are three things you can do if the people you spend the most time with are not very positive.


