St. Patrick's Day Weekend: **Little Dublin Celebrates**

Ah, St. Patrick's Day ... that annual celebration of Irish heritage, whether you happen to have any in your family ancestry or not... Just as the celebration is not limited to those of strictly Celtic lineage, the celebration itself need not be restricted to the traditional March 17 holiday, especially when it happens to fall on a Monday as it does this year. In fact, the timing of the holiday provides a perfect opportunity for Dubuque area Irish and lovers of a good party to start things off a wee bit early by celebrating an extended St. Patrick's Day weekend, right through to the proper holiday.

In that spirit, the team of organizers behind the Dubuque Irish Hooley and the Dubuque County Division #2 Ancient Order of Hibernians have joined forces to create a new celebration, the St. Patrick's Day Street Party. Scheduled for March 15, the Saturday before the "official" holiday, from 4 to 10 p.m. in Cable Car Square, the event kicks off Dubuque's celebration of the St. Patrick's Day weekend with live music, food, and beverages befitting the Irish festivities.

With some time off to rest up on Sunday, the celebration returns on Monday, March 17 with a special St. Patrick's Day concert by renowned Irish music group Cherish The Ladies in historic Five Flags Theater at 7:30 p.m. (Learn more about that in the accompanying article.)

But let's get back to this street party! "The Dubuqueland Irish, which was a club in Dubuque for 30-some years, was famous for putting on a great St. Patrick's Day party," explains Michael Lange, lead organizer of Dubuque's Irish Hooley. "There were multiple locations through time, the last few years it was out at the Fairgrounds. As that group has kind of retired from organizing things, two groups have stepped in to take their place. The nice thing is many of the members are children of the old Dubuqueland Irish folks. So, we're sort of taking the baton and trying to run with it."

Lange explains that he and the other organizers behind the hugely successful Irish Hooley, held each year in late August, are trying to expand their programming beyond the annual summer festival. "We had Liz Knowles and her trio, Open the Door for Three, play down at the warehouse district in October and now we're trying to get involved in some things celebrating St. Patrick's Day," he notes. "We hope to continue moving forward doing different things."

For the St. Patrick's Day Street Party in Cable Car Square, Lange and the Hooley organizers are teaming up with the new Dubuque chapter of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, an extension of the Dyersville organization that puts on that community's popular St. Patrick's Day Parade each year.

"We're working with the Ancient Order of Hibernians, which has been in Dubuque County for a long time but has just has recently opened a new division here in Dubuque, proper," explains Lange. "So we've teamed up with them to put on what we hope is a new, fun St. Patrick's Day party. We want it to be downtown. We're doing it this first year on Saturday, March 15 right below the Fourth Street Elevator, which is an area that was known for a long time as Little Dublin. You've got Shamrock Imports and Shamrock Jewelers right there. It seemed like a great place to do it and the more we talked about it and got feedback from people, the more the idea of doing it outside under a tent, even thought it's March, started to make sense to us."



From 4 to 10 p.m., the big tent in Cable Car Square will be the gathering place for the festivities, with food, beer, and live music by The Lads, Wylde Nept (pictured above), and an appearance by the pipers and drummers of Dubuque Fire Pipes & Drums. "The tent's ordered, the bands are booked and we're hoping for some good weather and a great day," said Lange. "It's five dollars to get in. We'll have beer. We'll have food. The Lads are opening for us as the first act and then we'll switch to Wylde Nept, which is a great pub and party band. So it should be great music and a great time and really there's nothing else like this in Dubuque."



Timed to take advantage of the St. Patrick's Day weekend and to follow the popular Dyersville St. Patrick's Day parade that Saturday, the Street Party will undoubtedly draw many local Irish revelers. But Irish heritage is not a prerequisite to attend, Lange assures us. "A lot of people want to celebrate



their Irish-ness on St. Patrick's Day weekend and lot of people want to be just Irish for the day and so we're giving them a place to do it," he declares. "It's an experiment but we think it's going to be a lot of fun. I can't imagine better music, really, for this sort of thing than what we've got – a really great local band and a really great pub band that would play 'til midnight, if we let them. So it should be fun. I think it's a prelude to bigger and better (things) in the future. If we have a good turnout, we'll plan on something bigger next year and we hope the Irish Hooley and the Hibernians can work together on other events throughout the year."

So what is this Ancient Order of Hibernians? Officially established in America in 1836, the roots of the organization go back hundreds of years to secret societies that defended Irish Catholics from the oppression of the Church of England under Queen Elizabeth I. As the Irish immigrated to America, those societies became fraternal organizations here in the States.

"The idea was with all the Irish immigrants coming over it was dedicated to helping the Irish getting established in America," explained Lange. "There is a Catholic component to it as well, so it's just a great Irish Catholic organization that now does mostly charity work, scholarships and whatnot. The Hibernians group in Dyersville puts on the parade and party there every year and now, by establishing a chapter in Dubuque, we hope to be able to do more of the same. There's been talk about bringing back the Dubuque parade. We're going to start with this St. Patrick's Day Party and we hope there will be more cultural events going forward and that as the group grows we can do more in terms of charitable work and scholarships and things like that, which really are what the group is about today."

The contemporary mission of the Hibernians fits well with that of the Irish Hooley – to promote and preserve Irish culture. The overwhelming success of the Hooley would indicate the summer festival is doing that quite well but Lange is one to always look for ways to expand or improve.

"As the Irish Hooley has grown we've been challenged by our space a bit and I think that everybody is aware of some of the issues we've got down at the amphitheater," he notes. "It's a tight venue for 5000 people so we've struggled with how to do other things down there and I think we finally came to the conclusion that we're not going to worry too much about that but instead we'll do other things through out the year."

One of those things is bringing internationally renowned Irish music act, Cherish The Ladies to Dubuque, a performance for which Lange is understandably excited. "They were the first all-female Irish traditional touring band and Joanie Madden, their leader, is a world champion whistle player," he raves. "They bring dancers and singers – it's a fabulous show. You don't even have to be Irish to like it. To be able to bring them in on St. Patrick's Day was a real coup for us. So we're having a show at Five Flags Theater, which is a beautiful theater and a great, great place for

sound. The Ladies have been here before – they played with the Symphony about five or seven years ago – and we wanted to bring them back. We thought it would be great to have them for St. Patrick's Day."

The Irish Hooley has other plans in the works as well, including a planned expansion of the summer festival itself. "Again, we've struggled with the venue a bit and we've been thinking about how to grow the Hooley and we've decided on a plan for this year where we're going to add a Friday night show,"

explained Lange. "The Hooley will begin Friday night (August 22) at the Mississippi Moon Bar. We'll have kind of an acoustic set Friday night there and then we'll also have the traditional Irish Hooley on Saturday

(August 23). The bands that are playing on Saturday will also be playing on Friday night but they'll do a different show. They'll probably play together on Friday night. It will be a much more intimate kind of thing."

Being a much smaller venue than Saturday's festival in the Alliant Amphitheater, the Moon Bar show will have a limited number of tickets available. Fans will be able to purchase tickets to either event or a weekend pass for both.

"It should be a really fun, really different sort of way to go at it and allow us to grow out on the edges of the Hooley," speculates Lange. "We have the Red Hot Chilli Pipers coming back and Skerryvore and a new band called The Screaming Orphans and also a new band from Ireland called the Kilkennys. So that's our basic lineup with some more things still in the planning phase but it should be a spectacular day with a lot of good music."



The St. Patrick's Day Street Party, sponsored by the Dubuque Irish Hooley and the Dubuque County Division #2 Ancient Order of Hibernians, will be held Saturday, March 15, from 4-10 p.m. under the big festival tent in Cable Car Square on Fourth Street at the intersection with Bluff Street. Admission is just \$5. Food and beverages will be available for purchase, with live music by The Lads, Wylde Nept, and Dubuque Fire Pipes & Drums.

Town Clock Inn Restaurant & Bar

There is no doubt the people of Dubuque know what they like. And when it comes to delicious pizza and tasty sandwiches they obviously love the ones they get at Town Clock Inn Restaurant & Bar (TCI). They have been finding their way to the lower level of the Nesler Centre at Town Clock Plaza in Dubuque for 44 years!



Rita and Chick Schueller opened this restaurant with 2 other partners in 1970 in the basement of what was then the Montgomery Ward building. Chick bought out his partners and then sold the business to Rita several years later. During that time all 6 of their children worked in the restaurant. Their daughter, Stephanie Nelson, purchased TCI in 1985 and operated it for 26 years while raising her 3 children on her own. Her son Scott grew up in the restaurant and then moved to another state for awhile. When he came back to Dubuque he did concrete construction during the summers and helped his mom in TCI's kitchen during the winters. Scott Nelson always knew he would be the owner someday. He waited until the time was right and finally he and his wife Irene purchased the business



from his mother in May, 2009. Scott and Irene are committed making steady improvements to the premises little by little. They are dedicated insuring their customers continue to receive the same food at reasonable prices that is expected after 4 plus decades. Their 3

sons, ages 13, 11 and 9 help out and it is their parents' fervent hope at least one of them will continue to uphold the family traditions far into the future.

The Town Clock Inn has several specialties. First and foremost are the pizzas. The dough is made in-house, in small batches daily so it is always fresh. There are eleven deep dish specialty pizzas such as BLT, BBQ Chicken, Spicy Chicken, All Meat, Taco, Bacon Cheeseburger and the Matador. This last one contains sausage, Canadian bacon, pepperoni, bacon and jalapeño. Of course, there are over 15 toppings to choose from should you decide to build your own.

The Noon Hour Specials include the all-you-caneat soup, salad and pizza bar. There are only a few pizzas on the bar at one time. This is because they do not contain any preservatives and Scott insists his customers deserve better than warmed- over pizzas. During lunch the pizza trays empty quickly. Not to worry, though: these trays are replaced with full ones every few minutes. The pizzas are baked in ovens at approximately 615°F so they keep coming one right after another.

When you don't see your favorite pizza combination, just ask your server. The kitchen will make it up and have it out on the bar in the time it takes you to eat a cup of soup or sausage chili. Even better, you can call ahead in advance and your specialty will be brought out upon your arrival.













It's also a good idea to call ahead if you are with a party of eight or more coming all at once for the buffet. When the kitchen knows what time you are arriving they make sure to have enough pies on the bar to satisfy your group.



The most popular pizzas are the ones containing pork sausage. The sausage is excellent! It is made in-house according to an old family recipe. There is no other sausage in Dubuque like it and Scott says that's because he mixes in Schoen (pronounced Shayn) Seasoning provided by Dubuque native John Schoen. The seasoning is powerful so it is carefully blended into the sausage which is cooked twice.

There are pizza nightly specials too. On Tuesday and Friday any 16" family size specialty pizza is only \$21.00 and on Thursday and Saturday nights any specialty 12" large pizza is only \$15.00.

Did you know that Town Clock Inn originated the Take-N-Bake pizza in Dubuque? Scott's grandmother, Rita, started selling "We Make You Bake" pizza in 1981. At this time you can get a special deal: When you purchase 4 you get the 5th one free!



One of the other specialties is an original pasta dish called Cavelli (below). It is TCI's own version of Cavatini. It's prepared with shells instead of the usual rotini or rigatoni and contains that fantastic homemade sausage instead of ground beef and pepperoni.



Another specialty is the Italian Grinder sandwich (2nd from left at the top) made with that same wonderful sausage, tomato sauce and mozzarella cheese.

Other house favorites include the TCI Burger covered with mushrooms and mozzarella (3rd from left at the top); the Philly Steak Deluxe with grilled sandwich steak, Swiss cheese, mushrooms, onion, and green peppers; and the Taco Melt Deluxe which is essentially a taco with melted cheddar cheese, lettuce and tomato in between slices of fresh baked bread.

The Reuben (top, right) is also a top notch specialty. This sandwich contains top round corned beef sliced in-house with sauerkraut on marble rye bread. The 1000 Island dressing is served on the side so the sandwich doesn't get soggy.

I recommend you always save room for TCI's Sweet Endings. These are 8" Dessert Pizzas in apple, cinnamon or cherry with streusel topping and icing. Each one serves 3 to 4 people and is the perfect finish to a fine lunch or dinner.





TCI is a great place to watch your favorite game. There are several flat screen TV's strategically located throughout the bar area and dining rooms. Recently

my tasting team watched some of the Olympics while munching on a large assorted basket of jalapeño poppers, chicken tenders, cheese cubes, onion rings, mozzarella sticks, mini tacos, mushrooms and seasoned waffle fries.



When you are visiting take some time to check out the pictures on the walls in each of the rooms. They are very interesting scenes of Dubuque from the 1880s to the 1940s.

Did you notice I said "each of the rooms" as in plural? TCI has several party spaces and can accommodate parties of up to sixty people.

Even though this restaurant is on the lower level of Nesler Centre those in wheel chairs are cordially invited. Just use the Nesler Centre entrance and follow the signs to the Town Clock Inn elevator.

Town Clock Inn will be closed for remodeling March 9 thru 12. During those 4 days the bathrooms will be updated with new doors, floors, sinks, grab bars and baby changing stations. There will be some repainting and the replacing of some of the ceiling tiles and light fixtures.

That last thing you want to have after your big day is a list of regrets. Few events in you life give you the opportunity to be as prepared in advance as your wedding day. 2. Wasting Money


The wedding industry is just that - an industry. So while

4. Not Knowing the Master of Ceremonies

They are the emcee of the ceremony (often the officiant) and the emcee of the reception (often the DJ or band leader.) Let's face it. If your officiant is boring and dry, your wedding ceremony is going to be boring and dry. And if your DJ is super cheesy, you're going to be doing the chicken dance. Are you planning your wedding for a holiday weekend when most of your in-town guests wish they could get out of town? Are you having your reception hours after the wedding? Many people will be coming from out of town or have other things to do with their weekend. Making everyone commit their entire day to you is a lot to ask. Even if you have an acceptably short break between the ceremony and the reception, would a few Gardettos at the tables for those waiting for you to get there kill you?




9. Not Involving Your Better Half



Dubuque Symphony Presents **Mozart & Beethoven** March 15-16

Five Flags Theater

The Dubuque Symphony Orchestra presents works by Mozart and Beethoven on Saturday, March 15 at 7:30pm and Sunday, March 16 at 2:00pm at the Five Flags Theater. Violinist Miriam Fried will be the featured soloist in Beethoven's Violin Concerto in D Major, one of the most graceful and challenging concertos in the violin repertoire.



Fried has been recognized for years as one of the world's greatest violinists. She has performed with virtually every major orchestra in the United States and Europe, and is heralded for her intensity, emotional depth and virtuosity.

She has been a guest with the principal orchestras of Boston, Chicago, Philadelphia and New York, as well as the Israel Philharmonic, the London Symphony, the Royal Philharmonic and the Vienna Symphony. In addition to being a concerto soloist she is an accomplished recitalist and chamber musician

This will be Fried's second appearance with the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra. She

performed the Brahms Violin Concerto in February 2012.

"Miriam is one of the greatest musicians with whom I have ever worked," said Maestro William Intriligator. "She has incredible musical instincts, as well as vast musical knowledge and experience. Making music with her is a privilege."

Prior to Fried's guest appearance the orchestra will perform two works by Mozart. The concert will open with the Overture to Cosi Fan Tutte. This bright and sparkling overture sets the tone for the lighthearted symphony to follow. Named after the Austrian town, Mozart's "Linz" Symphony was composed in just four days. It is a testament the composer's genius.

Discounted \$6 student tickets will be available in the theater lobby one hour prior to each performance.

The symphony asks that everyone be in Five Flags Theater by 6:50pm so that rehearsal can start promptly at 7:00pm. The audience will be invited to visit and enjoy snacks with the musicians at the rehearsal break scheduled at approximately 8:15pm. Maestro Intriligator will also present a free pre-concert lecture in the Five Flags Theater at 1:15pm on Sunday.

YOU CAN HELP CREATE A MORE SUSTAINABLE DUBUQUE

Who has the best ideas about how to make Dubuque's neighborhoods sustainable? The residents that live there, the non-profit that serve those residents, and the business owners and employees that work there. That's why in 2013, the City Council created the Sustainable Dubuque Community Grants program to fund creative, impactful ideas that had energy behind them but just needed a little bit of funding to be launched.

The Community Grants program began in April 2013, and was intended to be easy enough that anyone could apply. The only requirements? That the proposed project address one of the twelve Sustainable Dubuque principles and that it include a component of community education and/or engagement. A citizen committee reviews the applications on a quarterly basis.

When we sent out the first press release, we had no idea who would apply. We couldn't have been more pleased with the results. In four rounds of funding, we have received 54 applications. I can truly say most have them have been impressive; we have stretched the dollars as far we could and have been able to fund 27. Here are a few of the amazing projects we've been able to support:

- The establishment of the Washington Neighborhood Community Garden.
- Circles Family Fun Night, incorporating art projects and education about healthy eating habits.
- The screening of So Right, So Smart, a film making the business case for sustainability, hosted by the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival.
- · LED lighting retrofits for VOICES.
- Equipment for Clarke University's pro bono Geriatric Wellness Program.
- All Africa, a community-created initiative to bring the African community together to celebrate the history, culture and people of the 56 countries of Africa and invite Westerners to learn more about African culture.
- Planting edible landscaping at Loras College.

Each of our grantees is asked to report back and tell us about the impact they've made in the community. Here's some of the amazing results:

Dubuque County Iowa State Extension hosted the first annual Tri-State Farm Crawl & Farm to Table Dinner. Over 250 attendees visited five area farms, growing the local understanding of where our food comes from. \$1,500 in proceeds from the sold-out Farm to Table Dinner went to the expansion of the Dubuque Rescue Mission Garden.

An unexpected result of the grant program has been making connections for applicants that we can't fund, and seeing them achieve their ideas anyways. Through a partnership with The Jule and the Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque, Project Concern launched Project Pass, and in the first two quarters of its existence provided over 940 rides to low-income residents.

I'm also excited to see capacity building in the community. Driftless Dirt hosted the first tri-state area trail run at Mines of Spain last fall, and then created a zero-waste event guide that we can share with other organizations in the future. After Circles's successful family event, they're partnering with Green Iowa Americorps to make all of their meetings zero waste.

While the funding for the 2014 fiscal year has been exhausted, folks are already dreaming up projects for the next round of applications which will be due July 1, 2014. Find the application and more information on the previously-funded projects at www.sustainabledubuque.org.





The Tournament of Books

The folks over at the Carnegie-Stout Public Library are about to rev up their second annual Tournament of Books. They were kind enough to ask me to be a judge and I said, "Yes," before they could change their mind. Here is how it works. There are 16 books and 8 judges. In the first round we all read two books with the idea that one of them will be recommended to go to Round Two. We are all paired up with another judge. I'm paired up with Megan Gloss from the TH. We then swap books, she reads my recommendation and I read hers to see which book will go to round

three. This requires delicate negotiations between Megan and me. No weapons are allowed. We go through eliminations like this until we reach the winner. You, dear reader, get to go to the library and register your guess as to which book will win. You might have to read a couple of them, which is the whole idea. You can win all kinds of nifty

prizes. In the spirit of full disclosure I'm going to write about my choices in these pages, which brings us to Round One.

My first two books are *The Tenth of December* by George Saunders and *The Ocean at the End of the Lane* by Neil Gaiman.

The Tenth of December is a collection of short stories by George Saunders who is regarded by a lot of people as the best writer of short stories alive. Someone, I don't remember who, referred to the stories in this collection as "little joy bombs." For the most part they are but laced with a goodly

amount of sadness, horror and a little twisted humor thrown in to good effect.

"Victory Lap" is about a young boy, Kyle, who is faced with a life and death dilemma. He sees his former friend, Alison, get kidnapped and he has to decide whether or not to get involved no matter how scared he is.

"The Tenth of December" is a story about a man who is trying to kill himself by freezing himself to death. He sits outside on the 10th of December. He is interrupted in the middle of things. This is one of and maybe the best story in the collection.

Another story vying for best in collection is "Escape from Spiderhead." It is a kind of Science Fiction Horror story. Jeff has been sent to an experimental prison, the inmates of which are at the beck and call of a sadistic warden named Abnesti. The warden develops pharmaceuticals and tests them out on the inmates. The type of drug and the experiment left me slack-jawed and wide-eyed with my socks going up and down. It's not the kind of story you "like" because of what happens at the end but I tell you it is absolutely riveting.

Up to this point The Tenth of December

was, certainly, one of the best books I read all year. That is, until I read Neil Gaiman's *The Ocean at the End of the Lane*. It might be unfair to try and compare these two books because one is a novel and the other a collection of short stories. I have a preference for longer forms of fiction so Mr. Gaiman had the edge there. It was the story that did it

for me. The Ocean at the End of the Lane is a much stronger story than any of the stories in The Tenth of December.

Mr. Gaiman's novel is spellbinding, almost literally. It concerns a man who is about 40 years old. He goes back to his hometown to

attend a funeral. He has some time to kill so he takes a ride around town coming to rest at the place where he grew up. He starts to have these memories of the extraordinary women who lived up the lane from him when he was a kid. There was a grandmother, a mother and a daughter. He starts to remember an astonishing

adventure he had that involved all three of the women but especially the daughter. As the afternoon progresses he has reverie after reverie remembering minute details of his adventure, particularly the horrific scary parts. You'll get no spoilers from me on this one. Go and read *The Ocean at the End of the Lane*. It will amaze you. I don't ever use the word awesome (to inspire awe) to describe anything because it's overused so I'll use a simile. The book is breathtaking and that is why I chose it to go on to Round Two in the Tournament of Books.

I love reading letters to the editor. Sometimes I agree, sometimes I disagree, but every time, I feel good that someone has taken it upon herself (or himself) to publicly voice an opinion. I used to do a lot writing to editors. I wrote to the local paper, and to the one I always thought of as lowa's paper, the Des Moines Register. I wrote to magazine editors. I even wrote to the editor of the New York Times.

The cool thing is, every one of those letters was published. I have no idea how many people, if any, agreed with me, but I liked to think at least a few did. Nowadays, I know, people write fewer letters and many more "comments" to the web sites of papers and magazines. I find it hilarious when commenters start arguing among themselves. It becomes a kind of online "Sez who?" "Sez me!" punching match, and can be entertaining to witness, even if the original point is completely lost. Posting comments anonymously only dumbs down the discussion.

Over the years, I have peppered the Dubuque Telegraph Herald with my opinion on a number of issues. They fall all over the map, including:

The city's homophobia, which prevented too many good people from living a full and loving life. Thankfully, things are better.

The problem that arises when a young person wants to check out a book from the public library but her parent, standing next to her and in front of the bemused library aide, tries to pry the book from her child's hands.

The difference between the National Endowment for the Humanities and the National Endowment for the Arts. When you're seeking a grant, it's a big difference, and the paper got it wrong.

The outrageous cost of street repair that falls on homeowners' backs. When it happened to me, I was a single mom of two, barely getting by.

My consternation over some school board candidates. Take the guy with two DUIs

and one domestic violence arrest – please.

Defending a police chief from another letter writer's ill-advised excoriation

Supporting the best candidate for county attorney. I knew him from my days as the poster child for domestic violence prevention, when he was solidly on the side of justice.

Misuse of the word "comprise," which everyone seems certain means "compose." Take it from me – or any dictionary. It doesn't.

Some of these letters were so long, I submitted them as "My View" op-eds. Does the TH still print those? I haven't noticed any lately.

It doesn't take much to get me going. Back when I lived in Colorado and a story about the U.S. ski team ran in the magazine Outside. My ears steamed when I learned that their official car was a Subaru, which is not an American car. (I no longer have a leg to stand on, since I drive a Toyota and my husband drives, yes, a Subaru.)

My biggest coup was the letter that got into the New York Times Magazine on Sunday, September 11, 2005. They had run a long story a few weeks earlier, all about women who fall in love with men in prison. The writer found the phenomenon fascinating, and struggled to make sense with it. For Pete's sake, I said out loud. I know why it happens. I sat down and pounded out my letter. It started like this: "It's obvious what women see in men behind bars: most of the murderers and rapists have one thing in common, and it's not just that they are convicted perpetrators of hideous crimes. They are - duh - famous."

There was more, but you get the idea. I was especially disappointed in the article because the writer was Daphne Merkin, whose writing I've admired for years. I guess we all have our blind spots. And maybe I should have called those criminals "infamous," but once it's in print, revisions can't be made.



I also wrote a letter to Library Journal, way back in 1991. Someone had written that librarians probably deserved their dowdy image because, after all, it wasn't like they were out there raking in money as CEOs or saving lives the way doctors do . Those were fighting words, and I sent my letter as soon as I'd finished reading.


