

Well, if you like wine, I guess this is your issue. If you like wine a little too much, perhaps you have issues of you own. But that's your problem.

The growing popularity of wine seems to have no limit. The selections to choose from at the grocery store are staggering enough, let alone wandering into Van's or Family Beer and getting lost in the aisles of wine. You need to have an advanced degree just to drink the stuff or at least a friend who's a lot smarter and more sophisticated than you are. I tend to just go with whatever everyone else is having.

I'm not exactly a wine snob. I don't know a whole lot about choosing a great wine, but I do know when I like it and when I don't. Like many novices, I generally tend toward sweeter wines, usually whites. But not too sweet. I can't do the cherry wines and such. They're just too much. I've been working my way into drier reds. I think what I like are drinks that are not room temperature, so that's going to make it hard to become a dry red wine snob. If only there was help?

Ah, but there is. In addition to the big wine lovers event on the cover of this issue of 365ink, there are numerous other opportunities to sample wines in the area throughout the year to help you zero in on your particular taste.

Last week I attended the Family Beer Fall Wine Tasting. In a couple of weeks, I believe I will be attending the Van's Fall Wine Tasting (Nov. 12 at Timmerman's, see the ad on page 12 or the story on page 17... see what I did there?). You know, just to be sure I was right about the wines I picked at Family Beer.

I wanted to write this Inkubator about these events because both Tim Althaus at Family Beer and Jeff Jansen and Van's really go out of their way to create wonderful tasting opportunities, loaded with amazing wines, knowledgeable people and, of course, some kind of killer food. And they do it at a ridiculously affordable price. So for \$20-\$30, you can sample your favorites from among about 80 different wines from a huge price range. Tim's crew even had a selection of locally produced spirits and other specialty libations for sampling and Van's will also feature local

spirits and more too. You can't go out for dinner and enjoy what you'll get at these events for anywhere near that price.

And oh, the food! Fred Bonnet from Fried Green Tomatoes in Galena was on hand at Family Beer with a variety of tasty treats including nice medium rate tenderloin and a slate of appetizers that celebrated smoked salmon. And on the 12th, Jeff and the Van's staff have pre-planned a slam dunk by giving you open range on the famous Timmerman's Appetizer Buffet while you taste.



And then, they do it all again at other times of the year, in case you forget what you liked over the winter, I guess? You'll get smarter about your enjoyment of products and you'll do good things for great charities.



Dubuque Food & Wine on the River November 7-9 **Port of Dubuque**

Once we get past that initial shock of the cool weather which signals the changing seasons, autumn certainly has its charms. While it might be any number of pumpkin spice-scented or flavored things for some, for many it's crisp fall days, beautiful autumn colors and a sudden urge to fire up the stove in the kitchen. Yes, autumn is a great time to eat, whether it's a big pot of soup on the stove, a chicken roasted to perfection in the oven, or dinner out on the town. For wine lovers, it's also a great time to try some hearty reds or find the wine that pairs perfectly with whatever is on the menu for the evening. So the timing really couldn't be any better for the celebration known as Dubuque Food & Wine on the River.

Now in its second year, the festival will be held Friday and Saturday, November 7-8 at the Port of Dubuque, and Sunday, November 9 at Van's Liquor in East Dubuque. Presented by the Hotel Julien Dubuque, the event is a weekend-long showcase of gourmet food from Dubuque's finest restaurants and wine from co-organizers Van's Liquor Store and Stone Cliff Winery. Joining the festivities as celebrity judge,

Grand Marshall, and honored guest will be actor, comedian and chef Paul Gilmartin, who is probably best known as host of TBS's "Dinner and a Movie." Proceeds from the weekend events will benefit Resources

While everything seems to be falling into place for this year's weekend of events, Dubuque Food & Wine on the River was far from a sure thing.



"Last year, going into it was a complete unknown," admits Bob Smith of Stone Cliff, who enlisted the participation of Jeff Jansen of Van's. "(We were) promoting something we'd seen in other cities. We'd looked at it in Austin, in Chicago, San Diego had some great food and wine menus and we were trying to bring that to Dubuque to do a couple things. One, is to drive overall tourism and hotel



for Dubuque, and at the same time, supporting charities. To that end, it was successful. The first year, you never know how it's going to turn out and we had a nice

turnout – somewhere in the 600-person range. The hotel had some great bookings. And we gave some good exposure to the fine restaurants involved in it."

Van's Jeff Jansen agrees, "Last year was a phenomenal success. It came off with out a hitch. Typically, when there's an event, the first time there's always something that gets overlooked but yeah, we knocked it out of the park. We had tremendous feedback from everybody

Hotel Julien and those guys putting a package together - bringing in people from other communities, which is a goal for this event – we had people from Kansas City, Milwaukee, a lot from Waterloo, Cedar Rapids, and places like that, so it was great. (We got) positive comments from all those folks as well so we were very, very excited about how we pulled it off last year and how everything came about."

An added feature of the 2013 Food & Wine celebration was an appearance by actor Larry Thomas, best known as the "Soup Nazi" from the sitcom Seinfeld. "It was very fun working with the Soup Nazi," reports Jansen. "We teased for a minute







about bringing him back but two years in a row ... I think maybe we'll bring him back for like our 5th anniversary or 10th anniversary or something like that but yeah, he was a blast. And it worked out perfectly. We were going to do the soup anyway and we were kind of scratching our heads what to do for a celeb and all of a sudden I came up with the idea and one thing led to another and boom, we got the Soup Nazi here. What kind of perfect combo is that?"



Like a good recipe, Smith and Jansen are using what worked before, with a few subtle tweaks. "We're playing off that success that we had and we're ahead of where we were last year," reports Smith. "We've got some good sponsors with us this year, which is nice also. I think that support will grow as people understand what we are doing. We have a good charity with Resources Unite and I think that their involvement is going to help promote it and the bottom line is that it's going to drive more charitable contribution."

Like last year, Dubuque Food & Wine will start with a special Reserve Wine Tasting on Friday night, November 7 at 6:30 p.m. in the Mississippi Moon Bar in the Diamond Jo Casino. A more upscale tasting experience in a relaxed atmosphere,

the event will feature a selection of special reserve wines paired with gourmet small plates from the talented chefs from Caroline's Restaurant in the Hotel Julien, L. May Eatery, Pepper Sprout, and Woodfire Grille at the Diamond Jo Casino. The night will be hosted by Paul Gilmartin, who will also do a little bit of food and wine related stand-up to set the mood, with live music by Kristina Castaneda and Shawn Healy.

Jansen explains that the wines offered at Friday's Reserve Tasting are not your everyday wines, ranging in retail price from around \$25 or \$30 up to \$80 or more. "It's a chance to try some special bottles that are a little different," he said. "The average customer doesn't walk into the store and pick up a \$50-60 bottle, it's more like a \$10 bottle. For the value, it's a \$65 ticket to get in but we're going to have 12 different food features from Dubuque's finest restaurants and we're going to have in excess of 40 wines ranging from \$25-80. So really, a chance to try a lot of that stuff is a great opportunity."



Smith adds, "People should know that we have terrific food. We have the four top restaurants in the area. We have good quality food that they can sample, knowledgeable people serving it. And the wine – Van's Liquor Store has a wide array of high-quality wines. I think that's what they will experience."

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Saturday's festivities kick off at 11 a.m. (November 8) with a parade of wine lovers and revelers running from Stone Cliff at the Port of Dubuque, across the third street bridge, down Main Street and back again with Paul Gilmartin acting as the Grand Marshall. Those who would like to participate can join the procession at the beginning or jump on a trolley along the Main Street parade route.

Following the return of the parade to the Port of Dubuque at noon, the second of the weekend's Food & Wine celebrations gets underway at Stone Cliff Winery in the historic Star Brewery building. A bit more casual than the previous evening's event, Saturday's tasting will feature a range of wines more accessible to the everyday wine drinker with wines starting in the \$10 a bottle range.



"We're going to have another 40 to 45 wines on Saturday and that's going to focus more on that everyday kind of stuff, maybe in that \$10-25 price point," explained Jansen, "stuff that's a little more affordable for the average person. And a good mix - we try to run the gamut from sweet to dry, white to red and give people a full exposure."

The "Soup-Off" competition also returns with the four signature restaurants from Friday's event returning - Caroline's, L. May Eatery, Pepper Sprout, and Woodfire Grille – along with entries from Cremer's, East Mill Bakeshop, and Main Street Cheese Cakes. That's a lot of tasty soup! "L.May has been holding the coveted 'Golden Ladle' trophy that was

awarded to them last year," noted Jansen. "So this year, they're going to have some competition to try to knock that off." Guests can try them all with the judging and winner of the Golden Ladle announced by Paul Gilmartin at 2 p.m.

Saturday's event will also feature craft

beer from Millstream and Potosi Breweries and samples of spirits from Paradise Distillery and Blaum Brothers Distilling Co. Specialty foods samples will be available from Cremer's Meats, Dubuque Food Coop, East Mill Bakery, Galena's Main Street Cheesecakes, Roelli Cheese, and Stan's Coffee House.



The event will offer guests an opportunity to learn a bit more about some of the featured vendors with brief, informal breakout sessions from Cremer's, Blaum Brothers Distilling, Roelli Cheese, and Millstream Brewery, where representatives from each will explain a bit about their products and process and

answer any questions guest might have. Resources Unite will also have a table for those interested in learning more about their community-building programs.

And just to be sure the afternoon does not become too educational, as well as to remind everyone that this gathering is indeed a celebration, the Lonely Goats

> will be playing their eclectic mix of party music throughout the afternoon.

> Aside from a few extra vendors, the only big difference in Saturday's event from last year will be the addition of a large tent just outside Stone Cliff in the Alliant Amphitheater. With great attendance at last year's Saturday tasting, space inside Stone Cliff became a pre-

mium, making it a challenge at times for guests to circulate. Adding the tent outside in the amphitheater will effectively double the available space for vendors and guests and provide a more relaxed party space for the live music of the Lonely Goats. "The tent, we're calling 'the goat pen,'" joked Smith.

Jokes aside, Smith sees Dubuque Food & Wine 2014 as an incremental improvement on a successful inaugural event. "I think it's a refinement of last year," he said. "I don't think there are any major items that are new but it's a refinement, it's to smooth out any of the kinks we had in it. I think we'll have at least 25 percent more people and we'll be staffed for it. We found out what happened last year. I think we'll see a lot better activity down here, better organized, and we'll have a large tent set up outside and that's going to be nice."



Both Smith and Jansen emphasize that Dubuque Food & Wine is an opportunity to learn that should not be intimidating. "Some people hear 'wine tasting' and they think 'oh, it's out of my league, I can't do that," noted Jansen. You know, really that's kind of a thing of the past. It's a laid-back atmosphere. It's a fun atmosphere. So even if you don't know anything about wine or you've just made the transition from moscato to pinot noir and you're just start to dabble, this really would benefit you more than anybody else because it's going to give you exposure. If you have any slight interest in spirits, craft beer, craft wine and good food, this is it. This is a no-brainer."

In addition to the educational opportunities and underlining the "fun atmosphere" aspect of the event, Smith wants people to understand that this is a celebration. "People are there to party," he states. "When you take people that like to eat and like to drink, usually it's a pretty good crowd. Until closing time, then it can get a little ugly," he adds, laughing.



Dubuque Food & Wine on the River wraps up on Sunday, November 9 with an opportunity for guests to do some discount shopping to take home some of the best wines they tasted over the weekend. Van's Liquor Store in East Dubuque hosts, of course, with complimentary Mimosas or Bloody Marys, as well as complimentary pastries and scones from East Mill Bakeshop from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. "On Sunday, we give people an opportunity to purchase products sampled for the weekend," explained Jansen, "and we do some pretty good discounting so it's a great opportunity to stock up a little bit and purchase for the holidays because the prices are probably 15-20 percent off the normal retail, so it's a good chance to save some money, too."

Tickets for Dubuque Food & Wine on the River's Friday night are \$65 each and Saturday is \$45 with a weekend pass being offered for just \$99 per person. They are available at all participating restaurants, Van's Liquor Store, Stone Cliff Winery and online through the event website, dbq-foodandwine.com.









Flatted Fifth Blues & BBQ

Musicians will tell you the Tritone known as the Devil's Interval is called the Flatted Fifth. It is a discordant or dissonant sound that is quite unexpected when listening to otherwise harmonious music.

Flatted Fifth is an appropriate name for the new restaurant opened August 1, 2014 in the Potter's Mill, Bellevue, IA. When you hear the Devil's Interval it is so different and unexpected and yet so enticing. Just like the discovery of great BBQ, Southern food, Blues and Jazz music inside a 171 year old gristmill in Eastern Iowa.

Potter's Mill, which is on the National Register of Historic Places, was established in 1843 by Elbridge Gerry Potter making it the oldest flour mill in Iowa. It began operating in 1845, was powered by an overshot waterwheel installed in what became known as Big Mill Creek, and began selling flour under the Jasper brand



name. The mill was operated over the years by several different owners. It ceased producing flour in 1969.

It is currently owned by Dr. Daryll and Carolyn Eggers who purchased it at auction in 1980 and completely restored it.

Flatted Fifth is owned by Mark & Rachel Herman. Mark was a management consultant and church business administrator before becoming General Manager at Flatted Fifth. His wife, Rachel, MS, RN, CNP was and still is an instructor and Clinical Placement Coordinator at Winona State University, Rochester, MN campus. Rachel books the music venues for the restaurant and is usually the Hostess on Friday and Saturday nights.

Mark and Rachel are living their dream: capturing the soul of a Mississippi River City by providing the BBQ and Blues of Memphis and the Southern cuisine and Jazz of New Orleans. They maintain a full bar with 7 brews on tap and over 34 beers in bottles. The second floor is used for banquets and wedding receptions and the



third and fourth floors are a 4 room bed and breakfast. It's a great place to stay if you don't want to drive anywhere after listening to some wonderful music. Or perhaps you just want to hang out in the historic City of Bellevue, home of Bellevue State Park and Lock and Dam No.12 on the Mississippi River.

Flatted Fifth is all about Blues and Jazz on week-ends. However, the focus every day is on great tasting smoked BBQ and New Orleans style Southern cooking. (By the way, Louisiana natives call their most famous city Noo AWL-lunz and frequently refer to it as NOLA for New Orleans, Louisiana.)

I cannot say enough good things about Flatted Fifth's NOLA cuisine. It is excellent and is the accomplishment of a truly talented and creative chef. Executive Chef Andrew Weis is a 2006 graduate of Le Cordon Bleu College of Culinary Arts in Mendota Heights, MN. He was a chef at Eagle Ridge Resort, Bittersweet

on the Bluff and Woodfire Grill in the Diamond Jo Casino before becoming Executive Chef at Hotel Julien Dubuque. When he accepted the position of Executive Chef at Flatted Fifth he came full circle having started his cooking career in the very same kitchen as a Potter's Mill prep cook in 2002.

Chef Drew has received many accolades for creating extraordinary tastes. Recently he received both the Professional Panel and People's Choice Culinary Awards at the Iowa Restaurant Association's Dine Iowa Grand Tasting Gala.

When you dine at Flatted Fifth you are missing out if you don't start your meal with one of Chef Drew's appetizers. Try the Fried Pickles: quick process pickles otherwise known as 8 hour pickles are used. Basically they are cucumbers, coated in a thin batter and fried just long enough so they don't dry out. The Fried Green Tomatoes are awesome! Slices of green tomatoes are hand breaded, fried and topped with Comeback Sauce and chilled crab meat salad.

Both the pickles and the green tomatoes are served with an impressive homemade Comeback Sauce. You say you have never heard of Mississippi Comeback Sauce? It's a cross between a rémoulade (ray-moo-lahd) and Thousand Island dressing made with mayo, sweet chili sauce, ketchup, mustard, vegetable oil and Worcestershire.

The Smoked Salmon is also exceptional. Jail Island Atlantic Salmon are farm raised in their natural environment in the Bay of Fundy between the provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia on Canada's





365

My favorite appetizer is the Pork Belly Cracklings. These are cubes cut from uncured pork belly. The pork is simmered to render out most of the fat and then is deep fried in very hot oil. These cubes are not to be confused with bacon rinds which are also called cracklings but are fried pig skins that puff up during cooking. Fun Fact: Pork Belly is uncured, Pancetta is cured and Bacon is cured and smoked. Prosciutto is a cured ham and is not at all like bacon.

The Smoked Meats are all tremendous. Pork Shoulder, Saint Louis Style hand trimmed Rib Racks, Angus Brisket and Marinated Half-Chickens are all hand rubbed with Chef Drew's special dry rub made from his own blend of seasonings.

The smoke is derived from food grade hickory wood pellets. They do not contain fillers or binders that might contaminate the food. The pellets are automatically fed into the smoker as needed which is helpful in allowing the meats to cook at controlled temperatures. In the hands of a skilled chef the meat remains tender and juicy and the use of a wet mop or sop is not required.

I have also found the BBQ sauces are not needed either because all the meats are so good without them. However, the three sauces are homemade and they are all terrific. They are:

- Vinegar Ketchup and vinegar based... tasty on pulled pork.
- Red BBQ -Tomato with a little sweet and just a touch of heat.
- Mustard Smooth golden mustard with a little black pepper and lightly sweetened with brown sugar.

The smoked dinners come with cornbread muffins. They are drizzled with honey and are quite tasty. In case you are wondering about the colors in the muffins they are bits of red bell pepper and parsley giving them a festive appearance.

The side dishes include Baked Beans, Potato Salad, and Red Beans & Rice. The French Fries are unusual because they are sprinkled with a smoked seasoning. I recommend the Corn Maque Choux (mock-shoe). This dish contains corn, green bell pepper, tomatoes and onions braised in a pot with chicken stock.

The Southern Specialties are all New Orleans Style comfort food and are outstanding. The Shrimp and Cheesy Grits contain a number of sautéed shrimp in a light sauce on top of roasted vegetables and White Cheddar Cheese Grits. The Chicken Pot Pie contains smoked chicken in a filling of onions, celery, carrots, peas and corn. On a recent visit Julie, one of my taste testers, said she



really enjoyed the New Orleans Bouillabaisse (boo-yah-behss): a stew of tomato broth and onions, tomato, white wine, olive oil, garlic and saffron and fresh scallops, shrimp, little neck clams and whitefish.

Other taste testers raved about the Jambalaya, Red Beans & Rice containing smoked rope pork sausage and andouille (an-DOO-ee) sausage and Blackened Catfish fillet topped with crab meat and lightly drizzled with Béarnaise sauce.

Then there are two chicken dinners I highly recommend: Chicken Étouffée (ay-TOO-fay). A breast in a creamy roux of butter and flour and chopped celery, onions and green bell peppers (the

holy trinity) served over a bed of rice. And Chicken Tchoupitoulis (chop-a-twoliss). This one has 2 blacked chicken breasts served over diced potatoes, smoked ham, onions and peppers and topped with Béarnaise

After enjoying a sumptuous meal you just have to finish

it off with a scrumptious dessert. During our tasting session we enjoyed Cherry Cobbler, Bourbon Bread Pudding and an Ice Cream Sandwich (actually this last one was a bowl of very rich ice cream and two chocolate chip cookies)!

CLARKE STUDENTS & STAFF LEAD THE SUSTAINABILITY WAY

Sustainability has always been a priority at Clarke University, and the composting program started by Clarke University Dining Services is the latest example.

The program, in which visitors to the Dining Hall discard their refuse in one of three bins – recycling, compost and garbage – has helped Clarke keep a lot of food out of area landfills.

"We are filling two more city bins than we used to," said Miles Breed, Clarke's director of Dining Services. "We are now up to five 65-gallon bins for compost, emptied twice a week."

Keeping food out of the landfill might not seem like a big deal, but according to the EPA, 20 percent of all solid waste is food scraps.

"The program really helps raise awareness on how much food we're wasting," said Breed.

The fact that the city of Dubuque now allows meat scraps to be composted as well has helped the effort. Full

Circle Organics opened in 2012 in Epworth, lowa. They are a commercial composting facility that can take meat scraps. According to Cori Burbach, Sustainable Community coordinator for the city of Dubuque, the city currently has a contract with Full Circle to dispose of the food scraps picked up curbside. In addition, Clarke also uses compostable napkins, paper cups and silverware.

"All our to-go stuff is also compostable," said Steve Neese, Clarke's executive chef. "And napkins are compostable, as are our ice cream cups. We're composting everything we possibly can. And not having to separate the meat scraps has been important."

In 2008, Clarke eliminated trays in the dining hall, saving the water it would take to clean them, and encouraging people to take less food. Composting is the next step in the effort to further the sustainability of dining services.

"These are two very important parts of our Resource Management sustainability principle," Burbach said. "We try to teach folks to reduce their consumption first so there isn't waste to manage in the first place, and eliminating trays has been shown to do that as students take smaller portions. To now be composting is a fantastic next step, finding a beneficial use for a product that was previously wasted. Congrats to Clarke!"

"We've come a long way," Neese said.
"We're very happy, very excited. A very small portion of our waste is going to the landfill."

Other sustainability programs at Clarke:

- Oct. 16 was World Food Day. The lunch menu in the cafeteria consisted of 100% locally sourced food, and there was a "mini farmers' market" for students to interact with different vendors. The Rescue Mission had information about its huge community garden, and the Food Co-op provided information about its student-rate membership program.
- Clarke's student sustainability group, CLEAN (Clarke Leading Environmental Action Now) has been exploring a number of activities, including a student canoeing trip at the Mines of Spain, and partnering

- with the BVMs who work with the group TerraCycle, which recycles non-traditional recyclable consumer products (the BVMs focus specifically on recycling oral care products like old toothbrushes, used toothpaste tubes, etc.).
- At our CONNECT orientation program
 this year, an entire afternoon was
 devoted to sustainability activities
 on campus. Students divided into
 small groups and worked on various
 projects: building rain barrels,
 upcycling old clothing for other
 purposes, hanging tree sweaters,
 building bird houses, and repainting
 recycling bins to make them more
 eye-catching around campus.
- Clarke's garden continues to be tended by student interns, who work with the ISU Extension office's master gardeners to plant/harvest seasonal crops.

There are other things Clarke is doing every day to be stewards of the environment, from energy-efficient infrastructure such as low-flow toilets and showers in dorm buildings to LED lighting options replacing old outdated light fixtures all over campus. All these little things add up to help our environment!



Pop Up A Halloween Treat

Creating a healthy Halloween holiday may seem challenging at times, especially since kids often have multiple celebrations: at school, with friends and in the community trick-or-treating. However, celebrating Halloween doesn't have to be about giving up all the treats, just bringing them into balance.

Teach your kids that "treats" can fit into a healthful meal after all the other food groups have been consumed. Eat candy as part of a well-balanced meal instead of as a snack between meals.

Have your children eat a good meal before they trick-or-treat. Serve your child a nutritious meal or snack before going trick-ortreating so he/she won't dig into the bag of candy before he/she gets home.

Divide candy into weekly and daily portions - when it's all gone, they need to wait until the next day or week. Let your kids pick out a few of their favorite candy pieces to have each day.

A good rule of thumb to remember: parents are in charge of what kids eat and when they will eat the candy.

Candy can be frozen to help with portion control. Halloween is a fun night for kids, so enjoy small portions of candy.

Popcorn is a great low-calorie snack option at only 31 calories per cup for air-popped and 43 calories for butter-flavored microwave popcorn. This poppable whole grain contains a good source of fiber, which is great for overall gut health and helps control appetite.

Ooey-Gooey Popcorn Balls

Serves 10 (1 ball per serving)

All vou need:

1 (2.7 oz) bag Orville Redenbacher's® SmartPOP!® 94% Fat Free Butter Microwave Popcorn, 1/4 cup butter , 4 cups miniature marshmallows, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

All you do:


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I Got the Blues in Chicago?

In this issue I have the unmitigated pleasure of telling you what a splendid time I had reading *Maxwell Street Blues* by Marc Krulewitch. He is a Chicago writer with the windy city wound up in his DNA. I grew up on the South Side of Chicago and I had great fun placing the events in the book on the streets and in the neighborhoods where they happened. Chicago, as you may know, is the home of the blues and the epicenter is a little strip along Maxwell St. near Halsted where, for an eternity, a flea market and outdoor food vendors vied for the attention of hungry shoppers. Providing the musical backdrop to all this were bands of musicians setting up in the street, in the alley, and in your face and they were playing the hottest most authentic blues music anywhere on the planet. It was a mecca for musicians from around the world and a few from the South Side of the city trying to broaden their horizons. This is the backdrop for a large chunk of the book.



Jules Landau is a private eye, newly minted and somewhat untested in investigating murders. The murder in question is one Charlie "Snooks" Snook, a friend of Jules' family. Especially Jules' 80-year old father, Bernie Landau. Bernie, as the book opens, has just done a 16-year stretch in some unnamed charm school (read prison) most probably in Joliet. He shows up at Jules' place with a wad of money and the info that Snooks took two bullets in the head and was dumped on a pile of construction debris at Maxwell and Halsted Streets. Bernie wants Jules to find out who killed him and then do the right thing. *Maxwell Street Blues* is the story of how Jules goes about doing that.

Jules decided to forego the family business, mid-level gangstering, and go a little straight -- just a little, not too much. Life was pretty good for Jules as a private eye, with all the business he could handle from husbands and wives behaving badly. But Snooks was his first murder so he enlisted the help of another family friend, Sid Frownstein, an old school private eye who had recently retired to a lakefront condo and a hobby of restoring antique cars.

Along the way Jules meets a wild assortment of characters that all have something or other to do with a big deal, obscenely expensive construction project happening at the corner of guess where -- yup, Maxwell and Halsted Streets. There's something fishy in the air and it's not coming from Diversey Harbor. Jules uncovers plenty of red herrings that lead to nowhere but there is one thread piloting its way through the whole story.....BIG MONEY.

In Chicago, big money construction contracts attract all kinds of people looking to dip their beaks in the public money pit. There are gangsters, cops, University Presidents, tattoo artists, politicians, an annoying newspaper reporter and Charlie Snook, although Snooks' involvement keeps changing throughout the book. You see, Charlie Snook was an accountant with a genius for laundering money. He knew everybody and everybody knew him. Mr. Snook, obviously, knew too much for his own good.

So Jules sets out to solve the crime with very little experience in the ways of murder and big city corruption. Pertinent advice from family friend Sid, and an attitude with a mouth to match results in Jules' face being rearranged a bit with a well placed fist and a lead pipe, not to mention a few broken ribs.

Maxwell Street Blues is a hit (no not that kind of hit) and you may as well get in on the ground floor because it is the first book in a planned series of books featuring Jules Landau. By the way, you don't have to be from Chicago to enjoy Maxwell Street Blues, it's just that if you are you will recognize a lot of the city that forms the intricate environment for the story. I had a superb time reading it and I'm absolutely sure you will to. Today if you go to Maxwell and Halsted you might hear the sound of a slide guitar and a ghostly voice wailing, "I got the Maxwell Street Blues ."

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Night People

One thing I love about Facebook is keeping current with news about Davenport, my hometown. No matter how often I visit, it remains jam-packed with a profound nostalgia that only grows stronger as time goes by.

Take the Draught House, a place on the Mississippi that used to be where the Dock restaurant also used to be. My friend Kathy and I spent far too many Saturday nights there, dancing to music, flirting with boys. The music was live, so we flirted with the band members, too. Never mind that they were ten, maybe fifteen, years older than us. Never mind that we were barely teenagers when we started going there, and far too young to partake in a "draught" of anything stronger than ginger ale. Her sister usually drove us there, until we got licenses and our own clunker hand-me-downs.

In the 60s, two bands played regularly at Davenport's Draught House and Col Ballroom. The Night People were four cute guys, Beatles look-alikes mostly playing covers of British heartthrob songs. The Loved Ones were more sophisticated, playing blues and featuring a talented chick singer.

You can probably guess which band I pledged my love to. The Night People spoke to me, with their long hair and endless covers of songs by the Beatles and the Byrds. I had a full-blown crush on Mike Stroehle, the guy at the keyboard. Had I met him, I know (I hope!) he would have gently sent me home to my mother, but I could dream. When he sang the band's version of "Billy Boy," I thought he was singing straight to me.

Back then, our Saturday nights began with a trip across the river to a hole-in-the-wall Mexican restaurant for the best tacos ever. I had a completely unjustified bias against the Illinois side of the Quad Cities, but I knew the way to the Acapulco. Then we'd zip back to Davenport and make our grand entrance to the club. We never called it a club, but I suppose that's what it was.

There were boys there, of course, but back then – do they do this now? – girls just got up and danced with each other to the fast songs. If a boy came along for a slow song,



we could hang onto them and make small circles on the floor, and if not, we'd sit that one out.

I met at least one boyfriend there. His name was Monty, and I have no idea where he lived or which school he went to. I have a couple of pictures indicating he was at least a head taller than me, but then, who wasn't?

When I went off to college, I left The Night People behind, never giving them much thought until a few weeks ago, when a story appeared on my Facebook news feed. I'm a fan of a Quad Cities news station, as well as a page called Retro Q-C, so I'm always getting yanked back in time. But this headline really astonished me. "The Night People: Fifty Years Later and Still Going Strong." Not only were they alive, they were still playing? I was floored.

According to the article, the band started playing together in the early 60s, and did their first gig at the Draught House in 1965, when it opened. Any of you students of ancient history might know something about a bit of flooding that year. That's when Dubuque decided to build a flood wall, and Davenport, well, Davenport decided not to.

As band member Rob Dahms recalled, "The flood of 1965 was the worst we ever had. There were rats and mice, tables and chairs, everything was floating around there. When the water finally receded, there was a main ballroom, a great big ballroom, and a big stage." They got college students to clean the place up, and a nightclub was born.

My cousin Cheryl posted on Facebook that she and her husband would be attending a Night People anniversary concert last weekend. My comment? "Jealous!" She never saw them when she was young; as she put it, "My parents wouldn't let this young, innocent Catholic girl go, geez!"

I'm older than her, but not by much, and I have no idea why my parents let me get away with all the things I did. Maybe they had a limited memory of their own youth. Maybe they just wanted me out of the house. Maybe they figured that since I kept getting As in school, my weekend activities didn't matter.

A band member addressed this, noting, "An article came out in the newspaper saying the Draught House was a den of iniquity."

My big crush, Mike, added, "All the kids snuck down there. They wouldn't tell their parents. It turned out to be a mecca for all of the schools in the area." To meet, not to mention dance, with kids from different schools was the best kind of diplomacy. There was more to these nights than just fun and music.

It's not like there were many other options back then. We could "ride the ones," driving east on 3rd Street and then west on 4th Street until we got dizzy, hoping to find cute boys we could smile at but easily get away from. Drive-in movie theaters abounded, but for a girl, they just weren't as safe.

I have an idea about why my parents let me go out dancing. Hanging on my living room wall is a terrific piece of memorabilia. Inside the frame is a black-and-white photo of my parents, Mom wearing a flower, both of them grinning. The fancy script below proclaims "Club Flamingo, 1359 West Madison Street, Chicago." Back before they were parents, it turns out, they were night people, too.

Dear Erma,



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
