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

My man-love for my tiny little Toro snowblower was tested this month when the blizzard-o-rama of aught-fifteen hit last week.

When we got our house about eight years ago, Mom and Dad gave me their old snow blower. It's a little two-stroke Toro that eats a small swarth of snow but spits it out about 30 feet, which is great when you don't want to build up mountains of snow next to the driveway. I have one of those drives where, at the top, there's really nowhere good to go with the snow.

Halfway through battling the foot of snow last week, it crapped out on me. First it stopped throwing snow farther than a little bit at a time, and then the paddles stopped turning all together. I had to finish by hand and even with the help of my wonderful wife, it still sucked and my back paid the price the rest of the week.

Thinking I actually knew what the hell is what inside the workings of a snowblower, I opened it up and started looking for the problem. Amazingly, it was quite obvious. The drive belt came off. So, I bought a new one to replace the worn one and reinstalled. Voilà. Feeling rather manly and accomplished, I roared the little beast back to life where it promptly still didn't throw snow except for the first 1/4 second that the paddles hit the snow. I call bull\$%&%1#! Two problems at the same time is not fair!

So, I went to the internet and made a call to a friend for advice. The gods say the paddles are worn out, leaving too much of a gap in the blower for snow to pack up. I'm skeptical. Even if they're worn, why would they just all the sudden stop working barely at all? But I went in to get new paddles. There's apparently a wear guide on the paddles to tell you when to replace them. I didn't know this as, also apparently, my paddles were worn so much that the wear guides were worn off. Oops. I'm going to do this fix they say to do because they're experts, but I have a gut feeling that there's something else to this.

So, I'm now \$80 into my repairs with purchases. Just gotta swap out these paddles. No problemo, right?

Somewhere in an Old Farmers' Almanac or a feed store wall, there's surely a sign that says, "Nothing slows a man down like rusty nuts."

Taking things apart is supposed to be the fast part. Ugh, whatever. I guess 15 years of wetness and salt and sitting on a garage floor took their toll on my nuts... and my bolts. So, I got new replacements for those, too.

And why do they make things where, in order to reassemble it, you need to put your fingers in a space that does not accommodate for the size of human fingers? How can I start a nut on a bolt if I can't get the nut into the space where it has to be held to meet the bolt? I had to concoct a duct tape/wrench device and then go with down ass luck hoping that eventually the bolt would just accidentally slip into the threads. Is there still a third problem I didn't know about??? That would be REALLY unfair. Can there be a torque-loss issue in the engine itself, even if it seems to be running just fine? I don't know these answers because I don't know jack squat about small engine repair. I guess I need a fresh snow to find out. That said, I'm fine waiting until next year to find out. For now, I consider my man card punched for the week. \blacksquare

The Dubuque area is spoiled by how big and diverse the live music scene is in our community. Not only are there performers of every genre who call the tri-states home, but there are also venues in every corner of our region who celebrate these performers on their stages.

From the hardcore live music torchbearers like the Cornerstone in Galena, The Mississippi Moon Bar, Eronel, The Lift and The Sandy Hook Tavern (which graces the cover of this issue) who all host live music multiple times a week, to the neighborhood pubs for whom s live band is a special occasional treat, the availability of options for all of us to take in great music is venues that we already love to frequent just makes going out all the better.

We're not going to guild the lily too much. The purpose of this story is pretty simple. We want you to know who hosts live music in town and what you might expect from that bar or venue when you get there, in case it's your first visit. We know that not every bar

that ever has a band is included here. We also did not include many venues that only feature music in the Summer months. We'll revisit those great hotspots at a warmer time. But today, we're shining a spotlight on those places where, chances are, you're gonna find a live band performing on a night very soon. Give em a look and then get out there and support live music in your community. Try a place you've never been. Until you find your next favorite band, they're just another band you've never seen before!

The New Diggings General Store & Inn, located "miles away from the real world" in the rolling hills of southwest Wisconsin, is a destination that should be on the list of anyone who hasn't visited it yet and the live music, generally hosted on Sunday afternoons at 3:30 PM (with the occasional Friday or Saturday night) is the perfect excuse to make the journey. Not that you need an excuse, as part of the New Diggings experience is the trip to get there and the rich history once you arrive. Founded by lead miners as "Natchez" in 1824, New Diggings was an early outpost of westward expansion and a settlement for miners even before Dubuque was opened for settlement in 1833. The first structure to exist on the foundation on which the General Store now sits was built in 1844. The current building was built in 1890 after the original structure was partially burned down in 1889. It served as a bar and grocery store on the first floor and a bordello upstairs up until Prohibition. Fast forward to the present day and you have a beautifully rustic piece of history with great food and cold beer, with guest rooms upstairs if you should want (or need) to stay the night. Pool table, foosball, pinball, and various arcade games serve as worthy diversions but if it's your first time, you'll probably spend more time looking at the signs and antiques decorating the historic space.

Restored in the '80s, the mill has served as home to a variety of businesses but has sat vacant in recent years until the Hermans fell in love with the site and refashioned it into both a great restaurant and live music venue. Chef Drew Weis, a Bellevue native nails the Cajun, Creole, and barbeque menu, making the food alone worth the drive to Bellevue. Add a great list of craft brews, cocktails, and live blues and jazz performed by a range of regional talent and you've got a winning combination. With plans for a Bed & Breakfast in upper floors, a new deck, and an onsite outfitters, it's only going to get better.

HAPPY'S PLACE

In 1956 Freeman Hancock and his wife, Doris, purchased a small bar on Rockdale Road in Dubuque. Freeman's nickname was "Happy" so they renamed the bar Happy's Place. Six years later they sold it to their son, Jack Hancock and his wife Gayle. After twenty six years Jack and Gayle sold it to their nephew, Mark Hancock and his wife Pauline who operated Happy's Place for another twenty six years.

Over those fifty eight years the Hancock family kept improving and expanding the business. It went from being a bar to a bar and restaurant to a bar, restaurant and the area's premier banquet hall.



In December, 2014 Andy and Kristin (Leonard) Bertsch purchased Happy's Place. Andy and Lauren Leonard, Kristin's sister, handle the day to day operations and Kristin manages the business end. Andy and Kristin must believe in the old adage "if it ain't broke don't fix it." That's

because Happy's Place continues to be the same as it was during the 58 years before them. In fact, it can be said Happy's Place is still run in the tradition of the Hancock family. Kristin worked there from age 14 until she was 22. Lauren is the Kitchen Manager, who also started working there when she was 14 and has been with the restaurant for ten years already.

Even though the Hancock's no longer own the business, they still have an active role in the daily operation. Mark and his brother, Kenny, are present daily and Pauline is only a phone call away assisting whenever needed.

The banquet hall consists of two private dining rooms and one of those can be divided. There are three large bars with available bartenders and a dance floor with bandstand. Total occupancy is 454 people so it is not unusual to find there are dinners going on in one or more rooms several times each week.



Andy, Kristin and Lauren are experienced in offering party planning assistance for both buffet and family style dinners. They host wedding receptions; funeral dinners; banquets for anniversaries, business and club meetings; and company and class reunions almost on a daily basis.



Lauren prepares the food. She is an extremely talented cook and has been cooking at Happy's Place since she was 18. She also had the advantage of being trained by experts: former owners Gayle Hancock and Pauline Hancock. Lauren and her kitchen staff prepare daily sandwiches, soups and salads and delicious luncheon specials. At the same time she is often cooking up exquisite banquets for up to 300 people!

At this point I should mention you need not be concerned if you arrive at Happy's Place and the parking lot looks full. There could be over 100 cars parked there but you will find you will always be offered a table or be able to take a seat at the bar.

Andy and Kristin are also continuing the tradition of Happy's involvement in community affairs. They do many fund raising activities, trivia events and church breakfasts throughout the year.



They are particularly proud of their hosting of the annual fundraiser for Research For The Kids (RFTK) **(dbqrftk.com**). This organization raises funds for brain tumor and heart defect research programs at the University of Iowa Children's Hospital. To date, RFTK has contributed almost \$571,000 for this research.

The bar menu is a complete listing of tasty soups, salads and sandwiches. All these items are available at lunchtime and during dinner hours.



The quarter pound hamburgers are made from 80/20 Ground Chuck. The extra fat content makes the burgers a little sweeter and juicier. According to the menu burgers are available with cheese, bacon and mushrooms. Andy told me you can request other ingredients, like olives, hot sauce, and different cheeses if you are looking for a little more variety. The Carmichael is an exceptionally flavorful specially seasoned beef patty usually accompanied by grilled onions and Swiss cheese. Then there is the Steak Sandwich which is a chopped sirloin served with grilled onions and mushrooms. The Bacon Wrapped Hot Dog is just a wiener but bacon



wrapped around it makes it a real treat. Speaking of treats, the Chili this time of year is so satisfying. They make a rich powerful sauce with pinto beans and large quantities of ground beef.

I noticed many ladies like to order salads. You can choose Ham, Chicken, Egg or Tuna Salad. If you prefer the ones with greens you can choose Grilled Chicken, Buffalo Chicken or Chef Salad to munch on.



My favorite sandwich here is without a doubt the Pork Tenderloin. Six ounce fresh pork tenderloin is hand coated with a specially seasoned breading. Then it is deep fried and served on a fresh bun with mayo, lettuce and onion. I ask for mine with onion, pickles and mustard and then I chew slowly savoring every juicy bite!

Happy's Place perfected the Pork Tenderloin many years ago. In fact, Mark and Pauline Hancock were honored by the Iowa Pork Producers' Association as 2nd Place Winner of the 2010 Best Breaded Pork Tenderloin contest.

While there are some standouts on the menu, make no mistake, the regulars keep coming back for the Daily Luncheon Specials. The most popular is the Baked Chicken Dinner available every Wednesday. The chicken is dipped in flour batter, fried, then baked and served with mashed potatoes, gravy and corn. There are standard Friday Specials too. They are:

Goulash - ground beef browned with onions, celery and green peppers (The Holy Trinity!) along with tomato sauce, stewed tomatoes, mushrooms and homemade seasoning blend.

Tuna Noodle - No-yolk egg noodles, tuna, cream of mushroom soup and milk baked with a topping of potato chips and butter.



Spaghetti - Covered in a homemade meat sauce. In the USA this popular dish is called Spaghetti Bolognese and I must say I enjoyed it in this "non-Italian" restaurant very much. The sauce is tomato based with the addition of copious amounts of ground beef.

Every Friday during Lent is Fried or Baked Cod day. The fish is hand breaded and served with fried potatoes. These are not French fries. Fresh Idaho potatoes are sliced and baked before being lightly fried.

On Tuesdays and Thursdays the Luncheon Specials are Chef's choice. They are always fabulous! For instance you might find Roast Beef and Mashed Potatoes. The beef is so tender because it is roasted for 10 hours and the potatoes are mashed from real potatoes. Or perhaps it is your lucky day and Lauren has prepared Swiss Steak. In this dish tenderized Top Round which is always fresh, never frozen, is dredged in homemade flour breading, then grilled on the flat top. Then it is oven baked in beef broth, house seasonings and mushrooms. Lauren's recipe does not call for tomatoes which is just the way I prefer it.

By the way, how many of you know Swiss Steak did not originate in Switzerland? Yeah, I know, right? The Swiss Steak name comes from the term "swissing". It's a procedure of softening the meat by beating it with a tenderizing hammer or rolling it between a set of bladed rollers.

It's also a lucky day when you find Pepper Steak. This is made from the same tenderized Top Round. It's coated in homemade flour breading then browned on the flat top, then cooked in a homemade seasoning blend along with green peppers, stewed tomatoes, beef broth and covered with a thickened beef broth gravy.

Other Luncheon Specials you might find are Meatball Sandwiches, BBQ Ribs, Baked Smoked Ham, Polish Sausages, Chicken Pot Pie, Beef Stew, Meat Loaf, Roast

Pork and Dressing, Beef Tips and Noodles or Reuben Sandwiches.

I would be remiss if I didn't mention Happy's Place sensational pies. Each morning at least 6 to 8 flavors of pies are baked from scratch. Lemon Meringue, Coconut Cream and Apple pies are baked every day. Other possible choices are blueberry, cherry, peach, pecan, or chocolate pies or possibly even HoHo cake. These are sold by the slice and every day the staff serves over eleven pies. They go quickly so it's best to arrive early for lunch or your might miss out on your slice of the pie!





EMILY ANN, SALINGER, AND HARPER LEE

I haven't reviewed any children's books in a while so we will in this issue, along with the republishing of J. D. Salinger's very first three published stories. In addition, Harper Lee of To Kill a Mockingbird fame has a new novel coming out. Let's get to it.

My favorite children's books are The Stinky Cheeseman, Walter the Farting Dog, The Polar Express, and James and the Giant Peach. Taking its place alongside those classics is a book written by a local Dubuque, Iowa writer, Aria A. Mathews. Emily Ann in Ucanotland is nothing short of adorable.

The land of Ucan, where the sky is blue and the colors are grand, is visited by a not-so-nice wizard who casts a spell on the land: no one was happy or giddy. And besides, the wizard speaks with a sneer.

Now it so happens that on the edge of Ucan lived a magic girl named Emily Ann. She comes to the rescue and casts her own spell with some help from her friend the blue beaglebee. Everyone lives happily ever after.

There is a great moral in the book that was written for the 3 to 9 year old set. You should buy it and read it to your kids or grandkids. I have a feeling the blue beaglebee is bound for stardom.

The book is illustrated by Bleu Anna K. Bennett and the illustrations are stunning, the figures almost joyous. The colors are vibrant; the pictures are extremely pleasing to the eye, and even the wizard is clearly a bad wizard but isn't going to give anyone nightmares. If that isn't enough, 10% of the proceeds are to be donated to the Iowa City Children's Hospital and Schools.

Run to your favorite bookstore and get Emily Ann in Ucanotland.

J. D. SALINGER

J. D. Salinger's Three Early Stories are just that. They are the first three stories the budding writer published and the first we have heard from Salinger in 50-some odd years. Somehow these stories escaped being copywrited by Salinger or his estate.

Salinger himself was vehemently opposed to any of his stories being collected and republish so one can only guess that he would be a very unhappy camper with the appearance of Three Early Stories. It is somewhat

meaningless now as Salinger is dead. Meaningless too, with the knowledge that his estate will be bringing out major works in the next five years.

Three Early Stories is something of an oddity. They are all written before the war with the first two appearing in 1940 and the third story in 1944. He didn't make his arrangement with the New Yorker until 1948 and Catcher in the Rye didn't come out until 1951.

The stories themselves are dazzling. These stories are not the work of an amateur. What has really impressed me is that the "Salinger" voice is already there. If you are familiar with his short stories about the Glass family, these first three efforts on his part will fit right in with stories he wrote in the late 50's and early 60's.

I can't decide for myself if people other than Salinger fans will enjoy these stories. They are firmly rooted in the world before the war so they are a little dated but, on the other hand, there is a certain charm to that. I have no problem recommending them to you especially since there will be novel-length offerings coming from the Salinger estate in the near future.

HARPER LEE

In the late 1950's Harper Lee wrote a novel. It was about a man named Atticus Finch and his grown daughter Scout. The publisher liked the flashbacks that told a story about Scout growing up. So, the publisher sent the novel back to Ms. Lee and told her to rewrite it from young Scout's perspective. That book became To Kill a Mockingbird, published in 1960.

Recently, Ms. Lee's lawyer was sifting through a safe deposit box and came upon that first novel. Ms. Lee thought it had been lost and was delighted to find it again. It was sent to a number of readers to see if it was publishable and the answer came back with a resounding, "Yes!"

It's called Go Set a Watchman and is set to be published July 17th. The preorders at Amazon and through the publisher, Harper Collins, have turned it into a best seller already and it isn't even out. I've ordered mine, how about you? I predict a best seller, another Pulitzer Prize, and a blockbuster movie.

CLOUDS IN MY COFFEE BY PAM KRESS-DUNN

My son called me from his grocery store in Omaha last summer. I'd given him an ice cream maker for Christmas, and he was searching for the whole milk his recipe called for. Finally, we figured it out. "Is this it?" he asked. "Vitamin D Milk?" Bingo. It seems regular, high-fat milk no longer dares to go by its old name.

I grew up drinking whole milk. It was good and creamy, and gave me and my sister strong bones. My dad, who always carried a thermos of black coffee to work, stirred a splash of milk into his tea at supper. Mom gave us some kind of dessert every night, and her cookies were a great way to finish off my glass of milk, while other desserts—apple crisp, chocolate pudding cake—became even more delicious when served in a bowl so I could surround it with a moat of milk.

I must have been about ten when skim milk entered my family's life. Maybe Mom was on a diet, or Dad's doctor told him to cut down on the fat. My sister and I eyed this transparent liquid suspiciously and, after our first disgusted taste, took to calling it "skin milk." Yuck, we said. Spare me.


Eventually, I got used to two-percent, and, finally, its distant cousin, onepercent. But now that I'm the cook, when a holiday (any holiday) approaches, you'll find cream, both half-and-half and whole, sitting in my fridge. You can't serve holiday dessert without coffee, and most of us like a little half-and-half with our home-ground Starbucks. And who wants pumpkin pie without whipped cream? Or, for that matter, gingerbread?

The trouble is, even after the holidays, I sort of got used to having some form of cream in the house, especially once I started making chai.

I tasted my first authentic chai at the Maharaja restaurant in Madison, the one on Odana Road right next to the Indian grocery store. It was creamy, and steaming, and sweet. I learned to pace myself, since they poured free refills if you didn't refuse, or I would become so full of creamy, sweet tea that there wasn't much room for the 47 other dishes in their noontime buffet. A little chai goes a long way.

Finding myself craving this perfect drink once I got home, I invested in a couple of Indian cookbooks and learned to make it myself. At first, I did it from scratch, heating the tea leaves with cinnamon, cardamom, ginger and cloves, then adding the milk and bringing it all to a simmer. Yum. This is the real thing, not at all like the stuff they make from a mix at your local coffeehouse. That kind tastes like watered-down spice cake batter. Not that there's anything wrong with licking the beaters after you make a cake, but I'd rather not have it for breakfast.

Then my grocery store started carrying chai tea bags, so I brought some home to try. Thus my chai-making became a streamlined affair, just a matter of heating the water with the teabag in it, letting it steep four minutes, and adding



Once a year, like any intelligent person who wants to live past her fifties, I get my lipids checked. I also find out how my blood sugar and thyroid are doing. I don't weigh much, and I exercise, so every year I've had good numbers. Nothing for me to worry about. Nope, I'm not mainlining bacon morning, noon and night; I'm not eating chips and a candy bar at lunch every day the way I used to. (Don't get me started on the way I used to eat. One of the greatest insults of age, I've found, is not being able to get away with all sorts of things I used to do without a thought.) (Let's pause for a big sigh here.)

I noticed certain numbers on my lab test had gone up this year, but I still took my results in, dutifully thrusting them at my internist. He was concerned, maybe even surprised, until I spilled the beans. "It might be the chai I have every day," I murmured. "The chai I make with three ounces of half-and-half."

Ha! There I was, hoist on my own petard, and if you don't quite know what that colorful saying means, go ahead, look it up. It's even worse than it sounds. Talk about a ticking time bomb. Skim milk, he ordered. Skin milk? Either way, I'm doomed. I LOVE creamy things. I HATE fake half-and-half. For one thing, it's full of weird ingredients (Carageenan, anyone? Dipotassium phosphate?), and for another, it does not taste creamy at all. I tried it. I poured the ruined chai, and the remaining pseudo-cream, down the drain.

When my elderly mother went to live in a beautiful assisted care mansion (really), I stopped by one day and was invited to stay for a snack. We sat in the sunlit dining room, and the wonderful woman who had opened her home to old people brought us fresh raspberries from her garden, piled into crystal goblets and sprinkled with sugar. Then, as if it were nothing, she brought out a pitcher of cream, pouring it over each berry. We ate them, Mom and I, with spoons.

I plan to do that again, maybe on my birthday. Surely a half cup of cream annually can't hurt anything, can't shove my numbers up into the Emergency category. After all, that's an entire serving of fruit! Fruit is good for you, and so, I must insist, is the occasional splendid indulgence. ■ —pam2617@yahoo.com




