



"We knew there would be some initial sacrifices right off the bat," Kaiser admits, "but we also knew that it would be worth it in the long run to provide that kind of experience not only to our guests but also to locals who have expressed a desire for a downtown lounge setting where they could enjoy after-work cocktails and appetizers. While we anticipate that there will be a real change on Friday and Saturday nights, we hope that we'll make up for that during the weekdays."

The repositioning of the bar was an overall change of attitude, focus and features of the venue from drinks to food to entertainment, all intended to cater to an upscale, professional clientele.

"So far we've been receiving excellent feedback. People have really been enjoying the food, the live music, and the craft cocktail menu is a huge hit. A company called Bittercube out of Milwaukee, Wisconsin came to our hotel and put our bartenders through a mixed drink bootcamp. The training was intense. Bittercube also developed a completely custom cocktail menu for the lounge, focusing on signature drinks but also adding unique twists to standard favorites."

Having been there for the invite-only opening night, I can say for sure that not only have I never previously seen the inside of a drink glass smoked before it was filled, I've also never seen the juice of the outside of an orange peel lit afire and be squeezed under pressure onto a drink. Attention to detail seems to be the key to everything we saw going on behind the bar. They even try to incorporate Iowa based Templeton Rye whiskey into a lot of the signature drinks because of the storied AI Capone connection to the landmark hotel.

There's also a new signature wine dispensing system at the bar they call the Riverboat Vino Dock. The system can dispense a variety of wines by the ounce, storing each selection at its perfect temperature in an argon gas system so the wine always stays perfectly fresh. Customers can use a smart card to choose their wines and how much they'd like on each pour, from a taste sample to a full glass of the 16 wines always available in the Riverboat Vino Dock. It's a great way to try different wines and see what fits your taste.

Great food has also found its way upstairs to the Riverboat Lounge to tide you over until dinner, or perhaps, for dinner.

"We receive excellent feedback on our menu in Caroline's Restaurant and encourage all to try out some of our new entrée selections," shares Lyndsey, "but if you're looking for an appetizer and an after-work drink, the Riverboat Lounge is the perfect setting. We are hearing great things about the new plate-sharing menu. The Barbeque Pork and Pineapple sliders are a favorite as is the Beer Cheese with Pretzel Breadsticks. My personal favorite is the Wild Mushroom and Goat Cheese Flatbread."

And finally, an impressive dedication to live music puts another stamp on the quality Dubuque live music scene. The Riverboat currently features live music Tuesday through Saturday, focusing on solos and smaller group acoustic acts. Music was a big focus with the repositioning in the minds of Hotel Julien Dubuque leadership. The performers are earlier in the evenings, at least on weekdays, focusing on the after work hours, generally starting around 7 PM.

You can read about it all day long, but it's probably best if you just go find out for yourself, don't you think? Check out the live music calendar in the centerfold of this issue to who's playing live this week at the Riverboat. Gather some friends and check it out!

Oh, and there's more to come, we're assured! 2015 is the 100th anniversary of the hotel's re-opening following the historic 1915 fire, and they have lots of fun planned to celebrate. Special dinners in the River Room at the back of the Riverboat Lounge are coming soon including a Cigar and Scotch Dinner and a Wine vs. Beer Dinner. Plus, the outdoor patio in the Riverboat Lounge will begin featuring live music on May 1st to take advantage of the beautiful weather and the view of the Ice Harbor. And don't forget Fish Fry Fridays at Caroline's going on now as well as their famous traditional Easter Sunday Brunch on April 5th!

THE TRADITION OF EASTER SUNDAY **BRUNCH** *at* HOTEL JULIEN DUBUQUE

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GINA'S RESTAURANT & BAR

Lately I have been taking the 30 minute drive from Dubuque to Platteville a lot. That's because I have discovered Gina's Restaurant & Bar. Well, ok, I didn't discover it. The truth is I was told there was a great new place to eat in Platteville by 365ink publisher, Bryce Parks. That guy likes to eat so he always knows where all the good places are.

Gina's serves Contemporary American Cuisine with French influence. It features two menus in one: an upscale casual bar food menu on one side and outstanding, unusual fine dining entrées on the other.

It's in a really interesting building too. The newly restored Fritz Hoppe Building was built in 1907 in the style of Greek Revival architecture. Mr. Hoppe was the owner of the Platteville Brewery on Mineral Street. He opened this building on Second Street as a bar so patrons could sample his brewery's beverages. Back in those days, the bar was known as a Tied-House. The term came from Great Britain's pubs which were drinking establishments formally called Public Houses meaning "open to the public". In the United States pubs were often called saloons and many of them were Tied-Houses. Breweries usually had exclusive contracts with the saloons so they could only serve beer from their contracted supplier. In effect the saloon was tied to the brewery. Fritz Hoppe's bar only served Platteville Brewery beer.

The building continued to be a bar right up until the time it was purchased by Yag Jha and his wife Regina Pauly. Then Yag and Gina took three years to completely renovate the entire building. They installed all new electrical wiring, plumbing and a new commercial kitchen. Gina, who has been a librarian at University of Wisconsin Platteville for 15 years, researched the décor and designed it to look the way it would have been in

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1907. She was able to keep the original bar (but added a new granite top), the tile floor, the back bar, and the tin ceiling. A part of that ceiling had to be duplicated and that was expertly accomplished by Brian Greer's Tin Ceilings from Petersburg, Ontario. The tapestry on the wall is a tribute to Yag's Indian heritage. The building is now listed in the National Register of Historic Places.



Yag and Gina officially opened their restaurant on March 15, 2014. Yag named it in honor of the most important person in his life. Yag was destined to become a great chef. He was born in New Delhi and moved with his parents to the Bronx, New York when he was 3 years old. When he was 12 he began working as a busser and dishwasher at Dominick's on Arthur Avenue (Little Italy) in the Bronx. Margie and I have been to Dominick's several times. It is considered one of the best Italian restaurants in New York. Yag was promoted to cook and remained at Dominick's for five years.

He moved to Platteville to study at the University of Wisconsin where he received his degree in Business Administration. While at UWP he lived in the upstairs apartment in the Fritz Hoppe Building he now owns. While there he formulated his plan to acquire more culinary experience and then turn the bar downstairs into a restaurant. He cooked at both the French Country Inn and Abbey Resort in Lake Geneva, WI and then did eight years at the now closed Grenadier's in Milwaukee.

I have fond memories of dining at Grenadier's. It was a black tuxedo and white glove formal French restaurant. It was considered one of the finest restaurants in the Midwest and was the recipient of a Michelin Star. Yag trained under renowned Executive Chef Knut Apitz. Yag served as the youngest Captain the restaurant ever had.

Fun Fact: Michelin Stars are highly coveted by chefs all over the world. Some find it amusing they are awarded by Michelin, the tire company. But the fact is Michelin published its first guidebook in France in 1900 in order to encourage people to travel in their cars and wear out their tires. The Michelin Travel Guide has a full time staff of anonymous reviewers and does not accept consumer reviews. Most restaurants in the guide receive no stars and only superior ones are awarded 1 to 3 stars.

Yag continued his culinary journey by cooking at The Edgewater and Nadia's both in Madison. At Nadia's he was protégé of the celebrated Executive Chef, Abdul Bensaid.

Chef Yag's cuisine is fabulous and you can say it's because he has had some excellent training. But it's also because he possesses a talent for cooking only a privileged few possess. Well, it's all that and his exquisite application of seasonings he learned from his mother. In all of Yag's creations his use of various flavor are always in harmony.

Take his soups for instance. The Curried Carrot is a subtle blend of carrots with fresh cream with toasted pumpkin seeds on top. His Baked French Onion combines rich beef broth with sherry, garlic croutons and Grand Baby Swiss.



The appetizers are all masterpieces. The Coconut Shrimp combines the flavors of coconut with pineapple relish and sweet Thai chili sauce. The Crab Cakes are accompanied by a Mango Salsa and his own version of Remoulade (ray-muh-LAHD). This is a mayonnaise based sauce flavored with Dijon mustard, capers and herbs. It is not quite traditional because it does not include chopped gherkins or anchovies Yag deems unnecessary. Gina's Deviled Eggs are my favorite appetizer. The egg yolks are delightfully smooth and just the right amount of bacon and ranch dressing is added so as not to overpower the taste of the eggs. Mushrooms are stuffed with herb cream cheese. Crimini mushrooms are used because they are more intensely flavored than typical white buttons.







The bar food is decidedly upscale too. The Chicken Italiano sandwich contains grilled chicken covered with a Pesto Aioli. Eggplant Parmesan is a sandwich made with fried eggplant, provolone, garlic, and crushed oven-dried tomatoes. Even the Grilled Cheese is a splendid use of flavors with Cheddar and Swiss Cheese, Bacon supplied by Weber Meats, Canadian Bacon, caramelized onions, and tomatoes on sourdough bread. Then there is Yag's Burger: Angus Beef, Avocado, Balsamic marinated onions, bacon, and blue cheese on a Brioche (bree-osh) bun. This is French yeast bread enriched with eggs and butter.



unusual as they are delicious. The Macaroni and Cheese with Scallops is an outstanding dish. Seared Divers Scallops from Chesapeake Bay are never frozen. They are served with a cheddar cream sauce with White Truffle Oil mixed into Cavatappi (kah-vahtap-pee) pasta. Fun Fact: Cavatappi is Italian for corkscrew.

All the entrées are as

The Pork Flat Iron Steak with Bourbon Apple Cider Glaze is fantastic. I have never seen this cut of pork on a menu before. Chicago Meat Authority is the first and only company to

supply restaurants with Pork Flat Iron Steak. I am so impressed with it I spoke with Alana Heber, Marketing Manager, at this Chicago company. She explained these gigantic pork steaks are carefully cut from the pork picnic which is the lower part of the pig's shoulder. Only top quality lean, premium pork is selected resulting in tender, juicy steaks that taste best when grilled.



At Gina's the Ribeye Steak is not just a plain steak. It is served with Truffle Butter. A truffle is the fruity body of an underground fungus that grows near certain tree roots. It is sort of like a mushroom and is very expensive. Some truffle species are highly prized as a delicious food. In this case fresh, high quality creamery butter is infused with finely chopped pieces of truffle to make Truffle Butter.



The Walleye is crusted with cornflakes and served with Maple Lemon Butter. The Mediterranean Chicken combines chicken breast with tomatoes, artichoke hearts, Kalamata olives, feta cheese and fresh oregano over fettuccini pasta. The Shrimp Linguini combines tomatoes, Kalamata olives, spinach, garlic, basil and parmesan over linguini pasta.



The desserts are all made in-house. They are the tasty Apple Crisp, the marvelous Austrian Cottage Cheese Cheesecake, the magnificent Chocolate Flourless Cake and the most splendid Crème Brûlée I have ever enjoyed.



Indian Cuisine night is every Wednesday. In addition to the regular menu Yag prepares a dinner specialty from the country of his ancestors. Last week I enjoyed tender, exotic spicy curried lamb chops served with cranberry and slivered almonds couscous.

Friday night is Fish Fry. Cod is coated with breading made from the recipe courtesy of former Timbers Restaurant owners Suzanne and Keith Buchert. Savory Prime Rib is served on Saturday nights when you might want to stay late to listen to live entertainment from 10 pm to close.



Sunday Brunch is served from 9 am to 2 pm. Here you have an opportunity to visit a cool place thereby turning any Sunday into a holiday. Order the Gina's Classic: eggs, bacon or sausage and roasted potatoes, or a Ham and Cheese Omelet. Or be more adventurous by trying the house-made Crepes with Nutella, Quiche Lorraine with goat cheese, Shrimp Linguine, Mediterranean Salmon Salad, or Mac and Cheese with White Truffle Oil.



The real stars of the Brunch are the Eggs Benedict. Choose the Classic with Canadian Bacon, or the Crab Cakes or the Steak. The Benedicts are drizzled with a truly elegant Hollandaise (ohl-lahn-dez) French sauce made from the emulsification of butter, egg yolks and lemon juice. Only an expert chef can produce Hollandaise this good.

Gina's Restaurant & Bar has only been open a year and already it has a reputation for Exceptional Cuisine. It won't be long before Yag fulfills his dream of receiving one of those highly prized Michelin Stars!

Want to make your Pinterest Gardening Dreams come true? Join us for a beginners workshop teaching you the basics of growing your own square-foot garden or other small space. The class is FREE, but if you'd like to start seeds and need assistance, you just pay for materials. Less is more. We want you to be

successful, but it you start too large, it is easy to become overwhelmed with your garden. My personal garden space for veggies is all of 4 feet by 8 feet and I manage to grow a lot of food for my family out of that small space.

Raised gardens are the way to go. The main reason people struggle with their first gardens is because the soil is not ideal for growing. In many cases we don't know what the previous folks who used our land put into the soil. With a raised bed you completely control the soil quality and composition.

Gardens don't need to be fancy. I think the initial barrier to success for many new gardeners, especially that enjoy researching ideas online, is the idea that your garden needs to be beautiful. You literally can create a raised garden by collecting a pile of soil in an area and planting. I would suggest containing that soil in either a rock wall or wood structure, but ultimately it can be whatever you prefer from an aesthetic or budget prospective.

Most vegetables want as much sun as you can provide. Place your garden in an area of your yard that gets around 4 or 5 hours if you can. Limited sun? Veggies like salad greens, broccoli, cauliflower, peas, beets, brussel sprouts, radishes, swiss chard, kale, and beans will grow successfully in dappled shade. In fact, if you have a lot of direct sun, I would

suggest growing cucumbers or other vining plants on an elevated trellis to provide some relief to those veggies

You don't need to start seeds indoors to have a successful garden. This is another barrier to success I see often with my well intentioned clients. They try SO hard to get veggies started indoors in these little seed trays, only to time them wrong, water them too much, or too little and end up with failure. If you are just starting out, I would suggest skipping this step. Instead, plant quick germinating seed directly into the soil once the chance of frost has passed. Others plants, like tomatoes and peppers are available in many varieties as plants in the garden center. I would recommend choosing healthy 4 packs or larger individual plants as an alternative to struggling to grow your own plants. especially for the first few years.

Do not expect vegetables to look perfect. Minor blemishes are a natural part of gardening. If you have regularly visited farmers markets or organic sections of grocery stores, you may realize that this is quite common in gardens that are not heavily sprayed. A few leaves with some spots or damage is often not a major concern, however, it is good to observe what is happening in your garden. If you are concerned about an insect or disease affecting your crop, try diagnosing whether it is a significant problem. Often a little soapy water will solve your pest problems. If you can't figure out the problem, stop by your local garden center, ahem, and ask. We are here to help you become confident in your gardening skills.

IT'S NOT ALL IT'S CRACKED UP TO BE! BY DR. WILLIAM KUTTLER, DDS, KUTTLER DENTAL TEAM

"You crack me up" is an old saying meant as a term of appreciation for someone else's sense of humor or ability to tell a good and funny story. It's a positive statement. But when it is applied to teeth, it isn't funny any more. Teeth often develop cracks and those cracks sometimes result in the tooth breaking or splitting—not a good thing. That can lead to the loss of a tooth or, at the very least, an extensive filling or a crown (cap). Unfortunately, unlike bones, when a tooth cracks it stays cracked. By that I mean that it does not repair itself. The crack may remain the way it is or it may progress, but it never heals.

"Why does this happen?" is one of the more frequent questions I'm asked. And while there isn't any simple answer, there are several possibilities that probably make up the large percentage of causes. One of the leading causes is people chewing on hard objects such as pens or ice cubes. If you don't chew on ice, you probably can't imagine anyone doing it. But for many people, it is "normal". And essentially what those people are chewing on is equivalent to chewing on rocks. No wonder, over time, their teeth give up and crack or break.

Another common cause of cracks is people who either clench their teeth together or grind them. Some people do that while they sleep but others may do it while they are doing things they find stressful or when they are physically exerting themselves. Examples of that might be lifting weights, driving in heavy traffic, or concentrating intently. Again, the relatively constant stress applied to their teeth ultimately causes cracking and breaking.

Perhaps a more subtle cause, but one I suspect happens more than we might suspect, comes from eating or drinking alternating hot and cold foods. I learned at an early age not to take a dish from the refrigerator and place it in a hot oven. It broke—the temperature shift was too great for it. Yet I have been known to eat ice cream while drinking hot coffee and haven't thought much about it. That places a huge amount of stress on our teeth over and over again...and over time, can lead to cracks or breaks.

Ironically, if your tooth breaks, the solution is fairly simple. If it is repairable, your dentist will restore it as best she or he can. That may involve a filling or restoring the tooth with a complete crown if the damage is extensive. And, unfortunately, if the damage is too extensive, the tooth will need to be removed and then you and your dentist can decide the best way to replace it.

The greater challenge for your dentist, if your tooth is cracked but not broken, is to decide what treatment, if any, to recommend. If it is bothering you, you will want some type of treatment to make it feel comfortable. But if it isn't, there are choices ranging from doing nothing to crowning the tooth. And there are a lot of variables that make that choice a complicated one.

I am currently involved with a four year study that involves dentists around the country evaluating cracked teeth, deciding what is the best way to treat them, and then monitoring those same teeth over the four years to attempt to determine which alternative worked the best. The study is done under the guidance of the National Dental Practice Based Research Network whose mission is to research topics that will be immediately relevant to dental practitioners and the people they serve—you. As a practitioner, the decision I make is sometimes easy—the crack is severe enough or has decay around it that it must be repaired. But other times it is very uncertain. In those situations there probably aren't any "wrong" answers, but it is often not clear what the "right" or "best" answer is. I

hope this study will help us all learn what that is so I can assist my patients and other dentists in making the best decision possible to deal with what is occurring and the best way to treat it.

When the results of the study start coming in a few years, I'll share what we have learned! Until then, try to prevent cracking them up. If you chew ice or other hard objects, STOP! If you clench or grind, talk to your dentist about



mouth guards to help protect your teeth. And give your teeth a break (the good kind!) by not biting into super hard foods and not alternating hot and cold foods and beverages in close proximity to one another. Prevention IS still the best approach!


Teen Tech Club & Contest




COMMUNITY EQUITY PROFILE: WHAT HAVE WE LEARNED SO FAR ABOUT ECONOMIC WELLBEING IN DUBUQUE?

In February, Inclusive Dubuque's community equity profile focused on economic wellbeing. At seven community dialogues held throughout Dubuque, approximately 70 community members provided their their input on such areas as employment and income. In addition to these dialogues, 286 community members also participated in an online survey.

"I was encouraged by the openness of the dialogue. People seemed comfortable expressing their concerns, even when we discussed difficult topics like discrimination, inequity and unfair hiring practices," said Jason Neises, member of the Inclusive Dubuque network and a community dialogue facilitator. "People shared their experiences and honest feedback about equity and inclusion in Dubuque. Openly discussing these real problems is the only way we'll ever be able to make progress."

Dialogue attendees explored economic wellbeing data including the workforce composition of Dubuque, and how it changed from 2000 to 2010. Similar to the population of Dubuque overall, the diversity of the city's workforce has increased. The most notable change has been the growth of the Hispanic/Latino population, which increased from 0.5% to 1.5% of the total labor force.

According to the online survey:

- 65.89% of respondents believed their workplace to be an equitable and inclusive business.
- 46.55% of survey respondents believed there are not enough quality jobs in Dubuque.



Discussion at community dialogues revealed that a quality job means something different to everyone. Here are some examples of how individuals defined a quality job in Dubuque:

- Being able to pay the bills
- Having benefits, insurance, incentives, etc.
- Opportunity for advancement
- Having a quality life with free time for family

Dialogue attendees also discussed unemployment rate, which has varied for different groups from 2000 to 2010. Those who identified as White, African American/Black, Hispanic/Latino, two or more races or some other race all saw an increase in the unemployment rate from 2000 to 2010. The Native American/Alaskan Native, Native Hawaiian/ Pacific Islander and Asian populations all saw a decrease.

SPICED BREAKFAST QUINOA

Makes 2 - 1 cup servings

All you need:

- ½ cup quinoa
- 1 cup Hy-Vee low-fat milk
- 1 cup water
- ½ tsp Hy-Vee ground cinnamon
- ⅓ tsp Hy-Vee ground nutmeg
- 1% tsp Hy-Vee ground ginger
- Pinch of salt
- 2 tbsp honey
- ½ tsp vanilla extract
- 1 large egg white
- 2 tbsp currants or raisins

All you do:

- Place quinoa in a fine-mesh sieve and rinse well with cold water. Heat a medium saucepan over medium-high heat. Add quinoa and cook, stirring, until the grains are separated and smell fragrant, 2 to 4 minutes. Stir in milk, water, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger and salt. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat to maintain a simmer and cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until the quinoa is tender, 20 to 25 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in honey and vanilla.
- 2. Whisk egg white in a small bowl with 1 tablespoon of the hot cereal. Repeat with 5 more tablespoons until the egg white is completely incorporated. Stir in currants (or raisins). Return the cereal to the saucepan and cook, stirring, over medium-low heat until thickened slightly, 1 to 2 minutes.
- To make ahead: Cover and refrigerate for up to 1 day; serve cold or reheat over low heat or in the microwave; thin with water or milk as desired.

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DUTCH TREAT BY BOB GELMS

Going Dutch by Joseph Rigo is a novella. For all practical purposes that means it is a very long short story or a very short novel. If you are a Lit major it means novellas posses characteristics of both novels and short stories and usually are meant to be read in one sitting.

Call it whatever you want. *Going Dutch* is a terrific book. If you like your crime fiction with a splash of Mickey Spillane or Dashiell Hammett, *Going Dutch* is a double shot of excellent bourbon.

The crime is a nasty one and perpetrated by the frick and frack brothers of crime, George Robert Thatcher and Ernie Whitmore They decided to rob Jacob Hawkins' store. Thatcher would go in and rob the joint while Whitmore waited outside in his Ford, driving the getaway car. During the commission of the crime Thatcher fires his pistol and wounds Hawkins. He also kills Hawkins' little girl who was hiding at the time. It was an accident; Thatcher didn't intend to kill anyone. Well, at the trial Whitmore turns states evidence and gets a long prison term while Thatcher is convicted of killing the little girl and gets the chair.

The opening scene is the death chamber where Thatcher is strapped into ole' Sparky. Mr. Rigo sets the scene perfectly. In a novella you have to get to things fairly fast and this story takes off like a rocket. The characters are all finely drawn, especially the gangsters, and the story packs a punch like a slug from a .45. There is way more to *Going Dutch* than a guy being fried for murder.

This is Joseph Rigo's first published piece of fiction and it is only available as an e-book. It belies the fact that the story is told with the sophistication and bravado of a much more seasoned storyteller which, I think he is. He should have started writing fiction 20 years ago. I wonder what he thinks about that. As I write this he is at work on a second tome that looks like it will be much longer. Maybe long enough to be printed on actual paper. But back to *Going Dutch*.

In most self respecting crime stories the execution of the perp comes at the end. Mr. Rigo puts it first. I was thinking when reading, "Where is this going now with the big plot moment already having happened?" Well, not to fear. Mr. Rigo has more than one trick up his sleeve and it all plays out wonderfully.

Just when you thought you had the crime pinned down, sorry Charlie!

Just when you thought you had the title figured out, nada.

Just when you thought you had the ending figured out, Bazinga!

There are plenty of "Oh Wow" moments in *Going Dutch*. Every time I was sure I had figured out something and then found out that I hadn't, my overriding thought was that this guy Rigo is real good. The revelation of all the plot twists and turns were just delightful. Not once did Mr. Rigo disappoint me. It all turns out as it should and that is that his version of things was far more complex, witty and, clever than anything I came up with as the reader.

All of these elements are handled very deftly and with enough competence that you might think you are in the hands of a seasoned crime writer. Well, I'm going out on a limb and say that you are-even though I only have one example to point to. The writing is crisp and to the point. The sentences are rather short and flow from one to the other with ease. That's supposed to be, in good stories, almost undetectable. The ease of reading Going *Dutch* coupled with the ingenuity of the plot makes for one enjoyable experience. I, personally, will be on the lookout for Mr. Rigo's second offering and I'll let you know when it gets here.

I got fed up with "Downton Abbey" midway through the last season. I'd grown weary of the suspense-Would Mary find a mate? Would Daisy find a life? Would Thomas stop lurking in the shadows? Who cared?

Bob and I had been dedicated fans since the beginning, when "Downton" commenced at the same time as a new edition of "Upstairs Downstairs." I was sad when the "UD" producers bowed out, since I'd loved the original "Upstairs, Downstairs" when it aired back in the 70s. (And yes, the new one omitted the comma. Talk about modernizing!)

The same shattering event looms large in both series. To the folks at Downton Abbey, the sinking of the Titanic means the death of Lord Grantham's cousin and his son, either one of whom could have been Robert's all-important heir. Now the burden falls upon Mary, the eldest of Robert's three (alas!) daughters, who must find a husband, and be quick about it.

While the Granthams shed no tears for their kin on the doomed ship, only the most hardened "Upstairs, Downstairs" viewer could help mourning lady Marjorie, a lovely woman we'd just gotten to know. When the butler presents the family with a cable she sent from the S.S. Titanic, we know before they do what it means. Arriving early in season three, it came as a shock to all, including me. Then a junior in college, I wasn't a big TV watcher, and it was a new tactic, back then, to kill off a major character so early in a series.

I remember talking with Neil, my English professor and advisor, the day after that episode. He, too, had watched it-hadn't everyone?-and I confessed how devastated I'd been. When I told him I felt silly for crying, he assured me it was perfectly natural. "It's a soap opera, after all," he noted. "They're designed to tug at your heartstrings."

A soap opera? Now I was even more chagrined. I was not one of those women who spent my afternoons eating bonbons and sighing over "As the World Turns." My grandma planned her day around what she called "my stories," but not my mom. There were too many other things to do. I will confess, though, to one summer at college when I fell down that rabbit hole. As part of the dorm-cleaning crew, I spent my days

cleaning, having lunch, cleaning some more, then joining the housekeepers in what was evidently a regular ritual, watching whatever soap was on between 2:00 and 3:00.


"The Edge of Night"? "All My Children"? Its title, not to mention its harrowing plots and tragically fated characters, are lost to the mists of time. All I know is that we student workers were hooked, no matter how devoted to our studies of science, literature, or math. We had to know what happened next, and we became just as addicted as the housekeeping staff. But a summer of that was enough. I began to feel a bit sick at the way I was wasting my time, and was happy to go back to working in the library for the rest of my time at Coe.

Still, I remained a fan of "Upstairs, Downstairs" until its bittersweet end. I told myself I was learning about another time, another place. Surely this was an education, one that went down a lot easier than some of the classes I was taking.

So, too, with "Downton Abbey." I was quickly caught up in the story of the polite but angst-ridden upstairs nobles-the ones who get to wear the sumptuous dresses and morning coats, the ones who take each meal at a yardslong table, served silently by footmen who come at the ring of a bell-and the downstairs staff, who know their place, who live to serve, and do so in plain but functional outfits. I noted quickly how the servants came to attention with a collective gasp any time a lord or lady descended to the kitchen to announce some weighty news.

The news, of course, is what drives the drama. The heir has died! Lady Mary is engaged to Matthew! Matthew is dead! But first, Lady Sybil dies in childbirth! Does this make "Downton" a soap opera? When an interviewer pointed out to Julian Fellowes, the show's writer, that "there are not many plot developments, and then there's a wave of them in the finale," he replied, "It's a reluctance on my part to allow a real-or 'realish'-narrative to develop into a soap opera." If a soap opera is, as he says, a show with "many, many incidents," I have to wonder. After all, Lavinia dies of the flu! Isis (the dog!) dies of cancer! Mr. Bates, and then his wife, are hauled off to prison! For a crime I'm pretty sure they didn't commit!

Dramatic things do happen in real life. When too many happen at once, we're inclined to mutter, "My life is a





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
