One might think that owning a brand new lawn mower would give a grown man the desire to get out there and mow the lawn, but I've just mowed my lawn for the first time this summer and I'm quite done with that already. Maybe it's the sheer steepness of my hills. Maybe it's the sheer laziness of my fat butt. Maybe it's just hating doing something that will look like it never happened in about five days. Boo. Needing no introduction, Cheap Trick's résumé includes 5,000 performances spanning four decades and 20 million records sold worldwide. As one of the most influential classic

rock groups of the past 50 years, hits such as "I Want You To Want Me," "Dream Police," and "Surrender" have cemented the group as one of America's top rock 'n' roll bands of all time and earned them a 2016 induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

Pablo Cruise racked up a nice handful of top 40 hits in the 70's including "Love Will Find A Way" and "Whatcha Gonna Do?" and despite many band member changes and an extended break-up, today's lineup is actually the original surviving lineup, so you're getting' the real deal.



Continuing a theme of creativity and sustainability, DubuqueFest will host a Saturday afternoon Art Slam, challenging participants to use junk items to create art. Organizers are collecting a variety of "junk" for the art competition, which will start at noon on Saturday. Anyone looking to participate should bring any tools or extra materials they think they might use (hammer, nails, glue, paint brushes, needle and thread, etc.) to the competition. The timed contest will award prizes for best creations.

Kids can also sell their own art projects at the Youth Art Fair Sale on



Sunday afternoon from noon to 3 p.m. (Grandparents take note!) Kids K-8<sup>th</sup> grade can sign up to participate in the sale by signing up on the DubuqueFest web site, [dubuquefest.org](http://dubuquefest.org). "We're trying to teach them a little bit of entrepreneurial skills but also the fun of just being creative and sharing your work with the public," says Stowell.

To accompany the festivities, DubuqueFest always offers a variety of food vendors and beverage options. Featured food vendors include Americana Concessions, Greek food from The Corner Grill and MM Concessions, corn dogs and funnel cakes from Chappy's Mobile Concessions, barbeque from The Chocolate Hog and Steve's Meat Shop, Korean-style steamed dumplings from Dumpling Darlings, falafel and their famous egg rolls from The Food Store, cupcakes from Retro Cakes and Cupcravery, and Aw Shucks, vending a variety of flavored roasted sweet corn.

Like last year, Jubeck New World Brewing will be creating a special Berliner weisse brew for DubuqueFest which will be on tap at the opening of the festival on Friday afternoon for as long as it lasts, which might not be that long.

DubuqueFest continues to offer a mix of new features and old favorites like yoga in Washington Park, group knitting, kids' inflatable rides, wheel thrown pottery demonstrations, a performance by aerial artists, and the popular and practical bike valet for those who wish to ride rather than drive to the event. It's all about engaging the community to experience and appreciate the arts.





# DINOSAURS UNEARTHED®

Life-sized animatronic dinosaurs, along with stunning fossil and skeleton specimens, take center stage at *Dinosaurs Unearthed*—a captivating exhibition where guests experience an in-depth look at dinosaurs from across Asia and North America.

*Dinosaurs Unearthed*, sponsored by American Trust and Savings Bank, is a 6,000-square-foot exhibit featuring five feathered animatronic dinosaurs and one animatronic primitive bird, offering a dynamic visual representation of prehistoric feathered creatures. Of the fifteen total animatronic dinosaurs, five feathered species and one primitive bird offer a visual representation of feathered dinosaurs.

We got the opportunity to see the exhibit before it opened to the public, and we can assume you that it is indeed very cool. Some of the dinosaurs are huge...and then they start moving and roaring at you! You'll feel like a kid again. And should you have any questions along the way, simply ask your kids. Science has proven that kids contain 473% more dinosaur knowledge than parents in addition to a far more dinosaur-based wardrobe.

The River Museum's John Sutter (our cover model) was extremely enthusiastic about the new exhibit as we got our sneak peek. "This is more than I expected. It's

really cool. I had no idea how big some of these animals were. Standing face to face with them is pretty awesome. I think people will be surprised by the colors of the dinosaurs and the sounds they made. There's scientific evidence in the exhibit that shows you how they know about the colors and the sounds. This is not make believe; this is science. People will also be surprised to see how many of these dinosaurs had feathers or fur."

Guests will also experience hands-on learning with interactive stations that explore dinosaur sounds, anatomy, and digestion. The kid's dig area offers an immersive way for amateur paleontologists to make their own fossil discoveries. An interactive console allows guests to control animatronic dinosaur movement and the roaring voice of the life-size *Stegosaurus*. Each of the lifelike animatronic dinosaurs has been custom designed and handcrafted for *Dinosaurs Unearthed* by a team of paleo-artists using the best available data from paleontologists. Accurate to how scientists believe each dinosaur looked and sounded, the animatronic dinosaurs are developed using technology that ensures smooth, lifelike motion.

*Dinosaurs Unearthed* is an experience that will inspire curiosity in guests and will capture the human fascination with dinosaurs at an exciting time in history. In what is being referred to as the second 'Golden Age' of dinosaur discovery, paleontologists are uncovering and identifying new species at an unprecedented rate. These new discoveries are continually challenging common understanding and this exhibition seeks to bring new information about the prehistoric past to light.

In addition to the new exhibit, the museum is adding *Flying Monsters*, a new 3D/4D movie about dinosaurs that took flight. The Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium's Summer Camp for kids this year is also dinosaur themed.

Admission to see *Dinosaurs Unearthed* is \$5 in addition to regular museum admission. Regular admission is \$15 for adults, \$10 for kids under 18 and \$13 for people over 65. The 3D/4D movie is \$6. This might be a great time to invest in a membership to the River Museum. A family membership is just \$125 per year and will get everyone in as often as they like all year round. The museum is open 9 a.m.–6 p.m. daily, and the *Dinosaurs Unearthed* exhibit will be on display through October 10. Visit [RiverMuseum.com](http://RiverMuseum.com) for details. ■

# MYSTIQUE GOES WILD FOR 'AN EVENING WITH SEBASTIAN BACH'

Spend a night living the rock and roll dream with Sebastian Bach and some fans naturally may worry about exactly where they might end up after the final encore.

"An Evening With Sebastian Bach.' No, that doesn't mean we're going to end up in the back of a police car," joked the Canadian rocker, one of rock's most notorious wild men.

Bach, the iconic former lead singer of metal giant Skid Row, will bring his rowdy, rebellious brand of rock to Mystique Casino & Resort's Cabaret stage at 8 p.m. Saturday, May 28. "An Evening With Sebastian Bach" will give fans two distinctive shows for the price of one ticket.

Cabaret's latest big name show will feature Bach showcasing his soulful side with an acoustic set including some of his powerful work, including Skid Row's signature ballad, "I Remember You."

He may not sport the perfect golden rock hair he had when he and the boys from Skid Row stormed onto the rock scene in the late 1980s, but there's still a lot of "Youth Gone Wild" in Sebastian Bach, who chronicles his flamboyant life story in his upcoming memoir "18 And Life On Skid Row" (available in late June).

Bach and the boys will also crank the amps to 11 for a speaker-searing electric set featuring songs from his latest album, 2014's "Give 'Em Hell."

"We want to do something brand new," Bach said of the move to perform both acoustic and electric sets for select dates on his 2016 tour. "Let's bring the music back to its purest form."

"You're going to get two sets for the price of one. We're going to open the show with

some stripped-down tunes, re-set the stage, and then come back with the Big Guns."

Bach is just the latest marquee act to headline the Cabaret. The Tri-State's premier entertainment stage also has these hit shows coming up in May and June:

America's favorite traveling tribute to Tom Petty delivers the power and passion of the man himself while bringing to life such vivid TP classics as "Refugee," "American Girl," "Running Down A Dream" and "Into The Great Wide Open."

**Red Sun Rising, Saturday, June 11, 8 p.m.:** A must for current rock radio fans, one of country's hottest new rock bands storms the Cabaret with a relentless energetic set featuring their recent Billboard No. 1 smash "Emotionless."

# MANNA JAVA WORLD CAFÉ REVISITED

This is going to sound weird. I am in Manna Java World Café for breakfast almost every Sunday morning and even I did not know of all the changes taking place here. So many things are different now since I reviewed this place in December, 2010.

Of course, some important things are still the same. Manna Java World Café has now been in the Roshek Building for six years. Georgia Mihalakis is still the Owner and Chief Baker and Frankee Moore is still General Manager. Georgia is from Dubuque and has been in the restaurant business since 2002. She learned her baking skills from the San Francisco Baking Institute. Frankee is a former restaurant owner and trainer of professional chefs. They are dedicated to the principle of Good Food for Good Health. Their menu is updated on a regular basis to insure all the menu items are delicious, varied, fresh and healthy choices.

When eating at Manna Java you are assured you are enjoying wholesome and nutritious food. Almost everything on the menu is made from scratch from natural ingredients. The burgers are formed from organically grown beef. The salads are prepared from fresh greens. The salad dressings are made in the kitchen and all pastries, breads and buns are baked from scratch in Georgia's bakery located in the Millwork District of Dubuque. You can even feel good about the eggs you eat here since they come from cage-free chickens. (Fun Fact: the USDA reports approximately 100 Billion eggs, yes, BILLION, are produced in this country annually!)



Of course I was aware of the most obvious recent change. This was the switch from full service to counter service. The new format shortens the time it takes to order, eat, and leave whenever you are ready.

Coffee is now brewed from expensive Italian blends. Choose your usual java or your favorite latte, cappuccino, breve or espresso. There are a couple of unusual coffees I did not see before: The White Mocha made with white chocolate and the Black Eye. This last one is a double shot of espresso in drip coffee.



Manna Java now has Smoothies! These are for real. There are no powder flavorings and only natural real fruits and vegetables are used. There are currently 5 smoothie choices:

- Slim – cucumber, apple, cherry, lime, ginger and avocado
- Detox – apples, carrots, lemon, sweet peppers, cucumber, celery, broccoli and beets
- Coconut/Esspresso – espresso, vanilla and coconut milk
- Energy Punch – broccoli, ginger and pineapple
- Tahini Beaney – raw cocoa, Tahini, banana, honey and almond milk. This one is low carb, low calorie and gluten free. I didn't know what Tahini is either. It's a condiment made from toasted ground hulled sesame seeds with the consistency of peanut butter.



If you like drinking something that is really good for you may I suggest you try the Golden Milk? This is a blended drink of turmeric, coconut, black pepper, honey, cinnamon and almond milk. The benefits of turmeric include:

- Anti-inflammatory to relieve aching joints
- Improves liver function
- Lowers cholesterol
- Protects against Alzheimer's disease
- Helps guard against depression

Are you wondering why there is black pepper in this drink? It's added because it makes it easier for your body to absorb turmeric. And besides, you don't taste it. Turmeric is a plant in the ginger family native to southwest India. The rhizomes (roots growing on top of the ground) are dried and ground into a powder. It is a common orange/yellow spice in Bangladeshi, Indian and Pakistani cuisine.

I have already mentioned coffee which is the Java part of this restaurant's name. So now I should comment upon the manna—the bread. The Manna Java bakery produces a variety of artisanal breads daily. They include Cranberry Walnut, Crusty French, Multi-Grain, Sourdough, Deli Rye, Olive Rosemary and Batard (a half-size French Baguette).

The pastries are European style: made from only the highest quality and most expensive ingredients. These include butter, heavy cream, milk, cream



cheese and a minimum of sugar. Many of them contain pecans or walnuts. Pecans are \$8 and walnuts are \$6 per pound. Now that I know this I eat all the little pieces that fall out of my pastry!

I love all the pastries:

- Cinnabuns – croissant dough, brown sugar and cinnamon inside with white sugar and cinnamon on the outside.
- Cinnamon Rolls – made from cinnamon dough and butter with pecans.
- Sticky Buns – a cinnamon roll with pecans, syrup and caramel on top.
- Chocolate Croissants – rich, buttery, flaky yeast dough, filled with chocolate chips.
- Morning Glory – Margie's favorite! – Croissant dough baked in a muffin pan with raspberry filling and raspberry frosting.
- Almond Croissant - a new one already the most popular. A croissant is cut open. Simple syrup and almond cream is put inside and then it is topped with more almond cream and slivered almonds.

Breakfasts are first class. They are served 7 to 11 on week-days and until 2pm on Sundays. I am in Manna Java almost every Sunday enjoying one of my many favorites:

House Burrito – sausage or bacon, hash browns, scrambled eggs and Cajun spice inside a tortilla. The sausage version contains cut-up pork breakfast links.



Santa Fe Omelet – sausage, red and green peppers, red onions, Cajun spice and mozzarella.



Spinach Omelet – spinach, feta cheese, red onions and mushrooms.

Europa – one flat egg, prosciutto, provolone cheese, tomatoes on white bread.

Rosada – scrambled eggs, green peppers, Swiss cheese and bacon on cranberry walnut bread.

French Toast made with cinnamon raisin bread and my all-time favorite Eggs Benedict are only available on Sundays.



The Manna Java version of Eggs Benedict strays a little from the traditional. This delicious rendition has two poached eggs (your choice soft, medium or hard) on Canadian bacon resting on fresh spinach leaves on top of toasted crunchy French bread instead of the usual English muffin. It is covered with a delicate Hollandaise sauce made from egg yolks, lemon juice and butter. If you love spinach as much as I do you will ask for the spinach to be sautéed and served on the side.

When I am having lunch I always try to remember to start with a bowl of soup. The French Onion is a house specialty and is available Monday through Friday. It is made with both beef and chicken stock, garlic, red wine and lots of onions. There is also a second daily soup which is always chef's choice and could be anything including chicken noodle or vegetable barley.

The salads are always healthy choices. There are currently 5 on the menu. The House Salad is a bowl of house greens, cucumbers, tomatoes, green peppers and red onions. The Greek Salad is always a favorite with house greens, cucumbers, tomatoes, green bell peppers, red onions, Kalamata olives and feta cheese. Another favorite is the Cranberry Tuna Salad with fresh made tuna salad with raisins on house greens.

Did you notice all these salads contain house greens? Well, these are a mixture of freshly chopped romaine lettuce, red cabbage and organic spinach.



Another new change is the addition of Paleo Bowls in the Grab- N- Go case. In keeping with the principles of the Paleolithic Diet these are salads that contain fewer

calories and fewer carbs. There are usually 3 choices: salmon, tuna or shrimp. The seafood is in the center of a bowl containing Kalamata olives, grape tomatoes, avocado, steamed carrots and asparagus, cucumbers, hard boiled eggs and house or Greek dressing on the side.



There is something new in the hamburger department too! The 1/3 pound patties are now made with organic ground chuck. My favorite is the PepperJack Jalapeño. They call it that because it is a burger with pepper jack cheese and fresh jalapeños. (It has an original name, right?) Bryce Parks, the 365ink publisher likes the Bacon & Egg. It has an egg cooked the way you want it, your choice of cheese, and bacon. (What's with this guy?—always with the bacon!)



There are also some new things going on with the pizzas. The dough is now prepared in the bakery and is formulated specifically for the type of ovens Manna Java uses. Mozzarella cheese is used instead of a blend. It is the number one selling pizza cheese in the nation. It is purchased in big blocks and shredded in the kitchen. My new found favorite is the Bruschetta. It has tomatoes marinated in olive oil, garlic, fresh basil, red wine vinegar and

mozzarella. The most popular is the Glorious Garden. This masterpiece is heaped with Italian sausage, Canadian bacon, red sauce, pepperoni, red onions, green olives, mushrooms, green peppers and mozzarella.



The Daily Two Slices and a Drink Special is a good deal, too! There are always 8 different pizzas in the pizza warmers. Seven of them are always the same and the eighth one is part of the Weekly Blue Plate special deals.

And while I am thinking of it, I should mention The Weekly Blue Plate Specials are also a good deal! Last week each day's special was a gourmet version of a Grilled Cheese sandwich. Two examples of these were Monday's Garlic Toasted Cheese on Olive Rosemary Bread and Wednesday's Garlic Toasted Mozzarella, Basil and Tomato. Just so you know these things used to be served on blue plates but they all broke.



Of course, a restaurant with its own bakery has to have fantastic sandwiches. A couple of examples are The Sophia made with chicken breast, Swiss and white cheddar, spinach, apple butter, cranberry citrus dressing on cranberry walnut bread. The Turkey

Tapenade is a deli turkey tapenade with tomatoes and mozzarella on olive rosemary bread. The tapenade is made in-house. It consists of finely chopped olives, capers, anchovies and olive oil. (Fun Fact: Tapenade is often confused with the olive salad contained in the famous New Orleans' Muffaletta. In fact the Muffaletta olive salad is really a giardiniera since it does not contain capers and does have cauliflower, carrots and celery.

In keeping with the principle of Good Food for Good Health Manna Java World Café keeps adding gluten-free options. Current choices are muffins, granola, brownies and chocolate cookies.

Georgia, I know you are of Greek ancestry but every time I come into your café I see all that bread and I am reminded of that old German idiom *Wes Brot ich ess, des Lied ich sing*: Whose bread I eat, his song I sing. ■

## PLUG INTO LIFE

The more I think about it, the more I've come to understand the importance of the growing up in the 1980s. We still had teen drama, braces, zits, drugs, sex, homework and the high-stakes college test as kids do today. What we experienced in our unplugged world gave us gifts and memories today's kids will be forced to find in other ways – if they find them at all. Being unplugged in the 80s allowed us to plug into life.

It's a miracle we made it out of the 80s alive? We ate lead based paint, drank from hoses and sat in the front seat of the car with no seatbelts. We would disappear outside for hours without telling our parents, who probably didn't even notice we were gone. When I wasn't going to the store to buy my dad cigarettes, I played endlessly and dangerously. A visit to the ER for a Tetanus shot, stitches or a broken bone was a badge of honor and our parents sure didn't feel any guilt or shame about it. I used to wonder if my parents even cared about me? I stopped wondering when they gave me lawn jarts for my birthday!

That type of parenting today would be considered alarming and probably illegal. I'm not blaming the parents and I know that being a kid in the 80s wasn't nearly as hard as our parent's childhoods because I never once walked five miles to school, uphill, both ways, in a snowstorm. We were forced to learn good manners and communication skills as we called friends on corded phones

and nervously chatted with their parents when they answered. We rood our banana seat bikes across town, without helmets and rang doorbells instead of texting. I still recall the thrill of slipping a written note, in cursive, on actual paper to a classmate four seats across from me without getting caught and I recall the humiliation of having a teacher intercept a love note and reading it out loud to the class. You just don't get those kinds of experiences with Snap Chat.

I'm afraid we are becoming so plugged in we don't have time to savor the moments. With on demand TV and music, we are Netflix-in' ourselves to death while scrolling through our feeds and texting a friend or six. My sister and I used to sit next to our silver boom box for 3 hours listening to Casey Kasem's Top 40 countdown, my fingers poised over the "record" and "play" buttons ready to record as much of our favorite song as I could. I remember that magical feeling when that song came on and time stood still for three minutes.

As a kid in the 80s, I didn't win a lot of trophies and I certainly wasn't the center of the universe. I learned to live with limits and didn't expect everything on demand. At times, I wondered if anyone even really cared about me. That was just life, unplugged. Even so, we savored and lived those moments. As an adult with kids of my own, I yearn for the simplicity of the 80s. When you could savor one three minute song. ■

# DENTAL “INSURANCE”—THE GOOD, THE BAD, AND THE UGLY....

As our population ages and more people are retiring, we are being asked more frequently for our opinion about whether or not people should purchase their own dental policies. I put the word insurance in quotes in the title because dental plans aren't truly insurance—they are more comparable to a pre-payment plan. And the difference is that you don't earn interest on what you've pre-paid. Instead, the company is often charging you 30% or more of your money to market the plan to you and administer it. Based on that alone, I usually encourage people to start a saving account labeled “dental expenses” and put what their monthly premium cost was going to be into that account. Over the years almost everyone will come out ahead. Beyond that basic fact, most plans for individuals (as opposed to a group plan for a company) have a staged benefit structure where for the first year or two, benefits are very limited. Again, the plan wants you to pre-pay for any benefits you might receive.

So, if you are offered a dental benefit plan at work and the cost is very low, it may be a great benefit for you. And if you are unsure, get a copy of what the benefits are and ask your dentist to evaluate it for you. Most dentists are very happy to do that for their patients, and, based on their experience dealing with multiple plans, their input will usually be very helpful for you.

But what about the *other* costs of dental coverage—the parts that are often overlooked. The biggest one that we see is the delay of needed treatment. I lost track long ago of the number of people who declined

treatment that they needed to have done “until they get their dental benefit plan.” That may be because they just changed jobs, or their plan is brand new, or they planned to go out and purchase it on their own when they learned that their treatment needs were extensive and, therefore, expensive.

Delay IS expensive. For most people dental health is comparatively inexpensive. For less than \$2 per day almost everyone can prevent the need for significant dental treatment. Thoroughly cleaning your mouth once per day and eating wisely can help keep your mouth healthy. Unfortunately, once problems have begun, they can become major all too quickly. And while having small fillings done isn't inexpensive, their cost is very low compared to having root canals and crowns done or to replace teeth if they are too damaged to be preserved.

So when your dentist urges you to be seen once or twice or even four times per year, it's truly in your best interest. Regular visits allow your dentist and dental hygienist to coach you on keeping your mouth healthy AND allow them to detect any problems at a very early stage when the solutions are simple.

And all too often, waiting six months or a year for treatment while a benefit plan becomes usable, can take that small problem and let it escalate until it's a really big deal. Even worse, it's about then that people often read the fine print and discover that a “pre-existing conditions” clause exists and that the extensive treatment now needed isn't covered anyway.

That's enough to make you want to see your dentist, huh...? ■

# FAIR TRADE: PRODUCTS WITH A PURPOSE

A lot of people wonder about Fair Trade.... What is it and does it really make a difference?

Fair trade is best described as a movement to help producers in developing countries get a fair price for their products, reducing poverty, providing for the ethical treatment of workers and farmers, and promoting environmentally sustainable practices.

“Trading of ethically produced handmade goods is based on an idea that sits at the heart of fair trade: relationships matter,” writes Rene Bowers, executive director of the Fair Trade Federation. “The connection-based structure of fair trade developed from the work of a few innovators who had a vision to alleviate poverty through the sale of traditional crafts. At this vision’s core was (and still is) the idea that trade should involve a true partnership between buyer and seller—one that empowers producers, builds their capacity to do business, and improves the quality of life for their communities.”

Hy-Vee believes in that concept as well—making a difference in someone’s life even if they are thousands of miles away. Hy-Vee grocery stores do that through sales of Fair Trade chocolate, coffee and other products. You can easily identify those products by the Fair Trade logo on the front of products.

The fair trade movement began in 1946 when Edna Ruth Byler, a volunteer for the Mennonite Central Committee, visited a sewing class in Puerto Rico. She discovered that despite the hard work of the local women, and

their extraordinary talent for producing handmade lace and other fabrics, they still lived in tremendous poverty.

Byler had the idea to carry these pieces back to the United States and sell them to American shoppers, returning the profits directly to the women producers. Her work eventually became more structured and led to the formation of Self Help Crafts. The organization, now known as Ten Thousand Villages, opened its first fair trade shop in 1958—eventually expanding into Canada in the 1960s—and is now the largest fair trade retailer in North America.

In its Caribou coffee shops, Hy-Vee offers holiday merchandise that was handcrafted in Kathmandu, Nepal, helping those artisans, by selling brightly colored wool felt animals.

Fair trade chocolates are all over the chocolate aisles at Hy-Vee and include Theo Organic Fair Trade; Pascha Organic, a product of Peru; Lily’s Dark Chocolate (Stevia Sweetened), Endangered Species Chocolate, Taza Chocolates Mexicano and Green & Black’s Organic, just to name a few.

The Endangered Species Chocolate urges consumers to “indulge in a cause” as 10 percent of net profits are donated to nonprofit partners that protect and preserve wild life. Taza chocolates are “direct” trade certified, cultivating direct relationships with growers and paying a premium over the Fair Trade price.

Hy-Vee also offers fair trade yellow-fin tuna in its seafood departments. ■



## EATINGWELL FROZEN MOCHACCINO

MAKES 2 SERVINGS (1½ CUPS EACH)

- 1 cup double-strength brewed coffee or espresso (see Tip)

# AND SO IT CONTINUES

Jennifer Wells' second book in the Confluence series, *Remanence*, and the sequel to last year's spectacular debut, *Fluency* is something to celebrate. For one thing it took everything from the first book and stepped it up a notch or two. This is Sci-Fi that harkins back to the days of the giants, Arthur C. Clarke, Edgar Rice Burroughs, Robert Heinlein, Isaac Asimov, and Ray Bradbury. Where the science part fully supports a story of characters caught in extraordinary circumstances, developed in three dimensions and basically introducing players you begin to like on many different levels and start to root for, even the aliens.

There are writers who write series books in such a way that you don't have to read them in chronological order. They are self contained units. You might be able to get away with it here as well but I'm going to recommend that you read *Fluency* first. If you don't have a chance to do this or if you read the first book a long time ago, Ms Wells has conveniently supplied a little primer on what happens in the first book. That is a very nice touch.

Since both books are interrelated I'm going to write a little bit about the plot of book one. For 75 years a giant spaceship has parked itself in our solar system. NASA has concluded it's a derelict and finally puts together a mission to find out what's up with the ship. Dr. Jane Holloway is a member of the crew and a Linguist. She is included because her expertise is building workable languages out of very little information and she will likely be needed to communicate with anyone who might still be alive or to communicate with the beings that sent the ship. They arrive to many surprises, most of them life threatening. The biggest surprise, however, is that there is one crew member who is alive. His name is Ei'Brai and he is the navigator. He is not a member of the race of beings who sent the ship, the Sectilians from the planet Sectilius. He is a member of a race of beings whose superpower, if you will, is the ability to navigate the galaxy using the stars, something that

is needed on their starships. They were sent to ask the Terrans (Earthlings) to help them in their war with a malevolent race of beings called Swarm. One glitch in the plans, a plague hit the starship which is as big as a city and carried thousands of passengers and killed everyone on board, well, killed all the Sectilians on board, except Ei'Brai. Apparently not being from Sectilius saved his life.

One thing leads to another and Jane volunteers to help Ei'Brai run the ship and they decide to take him and the ship back to Sectilius. NASA is not happy but Oh well.


*Remanence* is about that journey back to Sectilius and what happens when they get there. You are completely immersed in an alien culture. It reminds me of the creation of a whole civilization accomplish on Mars by Edgar Rice Burroughs in his Martian Series. Ms. Wells has created a whole world that is endless fascinating, cultural mores, politics, curmudgeonly characters and a host of curious anthropological features of the Sectilian race. I was glued to the page. It turns out that the plague hit Sectilius and its inhabited moon Atielle killing 95% of the population and throwing them back into a pre industrialized society. They don't know what to do with the ship so they let Jane and her crew have it. Jane and Ei'Brai decide that they will look for other Sectilian starships with beings like Ei'Bria and return them to their home planet. They are accompanied on their adventure by a few volunteers from the Atielle. That's when all the fun begins. No spoilers here get it and read it. The ending is very satisfying and leaves the door open for further adventures.

I have to admit that *Fluency* was the best Sci-Fi novel I read in 2015 and I'm just going to go out on a limb and predict that *Remanence* will be the best Sci-Fi novel in my little corner of the world in 2016. Be that as it may, Jennifer Foehner Wells is without question the best thing to happen to the science fiction genre in a very long time. ■


