WAGS AT THE FLAGS

Wags at the Flags is a new concept developed by the Five Flags Center. After noticing that there was not one place in the Tri-State area owners could spend time with their furry family members indoors, Wags at the Flags was born!

This indoor dog park will feature separate areas for small dogs (20 pounds and under), large dogs (20 pounds and greater), as well as a space for their owners. It will also feature Barka Lounge which will include food, drinks and adult refreshments. Some weeks will have themes, and there will also be Barkeoke where you can sing karaoke with your dog. Last, there will be four vendors featured at every event.

The Five Flags Center is also working alongside Whispurring Hope, an organization based in Dyersville, lowa that is a 501(c)(3) non-profit animal rescue that started in early 2014 by Vicky Ruefer and her daughter, April Hoskins. They are a state licensed, no kill rescue that works to give every animal a fighting chance. \$1 of every admission will be donated to Whispurring Hope.

Owners are legally responsible for their dogs and any injuries caused by their dog(s). All dogs must be on a leash to enter the facility and to be in the Barka Lounge. Dogs can go off leash in the controlled run areas. Aggressive animals will be asked to leave with no refunds. Puppies under four months old and female dogs in heat are prohibited. Owners are responsible for clean up of their dogs. Cleaning supplies and pick up bags will be available for your use. Owners who reside in Dubuque should have their dog registered with the City of Dubuque, fully-immunized, de-wormed and wearing rabies tags. Owners are allowed to bring toys and balls for their dogs. An adult must accompany children under 14: young children must be supervised.

OLYMPIC GOLD MEDALIST ANTHONY ERVIN: "MORALITY OF WELLNESS"



Three-time Olympic Gold Medalist Anthony Ervin, who won two gold medals in the Rio Games, will talk about his inspiring and incredible journey.

Ervin, 35, won the 50-meter freestyle and was part of the Gold Medal 4×100 freestyle relay in Rio. He also won a gold medal in the 50 freestyle at the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney and is a former world record holder in both the 50 and 100 freestyle. Ervin also qualified for the 2012 London Olympics in the 50 freestyle.

After winning Olympic gold in Sydney, two World Championships, and seven NCAA titles, Ervin retired at the age of 22. He spent several years traveling and exploring other interests, including his higher education, music, tattoos, teaching people all over the world about swimming, and tsunami flood relief. His vision is to use his experiences and his platform as a chance to give back and inspire people of all ages to live the life they love.

Ervin's story is especially unique in that he is the first swimmer of African



American descent, along with Jewish heritage, to make the U.S. Olympic team. He also grew up with Tourette's syndrome. Over the years, Ervin has grown to embrace his place in the world as an opportunity to reach out and give back. Ervin's memoir, *Chasing Water: Elegy of an Olympian*, was released this spring.



MOVIE BUZZ

According to The Hollywood Reporter, a recent lawsuit against the Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA) requiring movies with onscreen smoking to receive an 'R' rating, has been thrown out of court. The lawsuit was dismissed due to the lack of real regulatory power of the MPAA.

David Yates admitted that he had made a long-term commitment to Warner Bros., agreeing to direct all four of the Fantastic Beasts sequels. As J.K. 

ZORO'S GYROS

All great cities have little counter service eateries where busy people can stop in and get reasonably priced, delicious, fast lunches and dinners. One of the best of these places is Zoro's Gyros located at the corner of Central Avenue and 14th Street in Dubuque. This really good Greek-American restaurant is a great place for Gyros, Hamburgers, Hot Dogs, Salads, BLT's, Italian Beef, Chicken, Philly Cheese and Grilled Cheese sandwiches. You can eat-in or get take-out. If you choose to eat in the surroundings are comfortable and there is even free Wi-Fi.



Zoro's is owned by Manushaqe and Stefano Sulaj. Manushaqe Sulaj (pronounced Manu-shock Sul-eye) was born in Albania and moved to Greece with her family when she was 16. Her name is Albanian for Michele but

everyone calls her by a nickname: Chachi (pronounced Cha-chee). She immigrated to Chicago in 1996 and worked in restaurants. Chachi speaks English, Greek and Albanian.

She met her husband Stefano (just call him Steve) in Chicago. He is from Northern Italy and has now been married to Chachi for 22 years. Steve is an excellent short order cook and is proficient in several languages including English, Italian, Spanish, Greek and Albanian.

Chachi has always dreamed of owning and operating her own restaurant so she and Steve started searching

for a small restaurant they could purchase. They consider themselves very lucky they were informed Zoro's in Dubuque was for sale. They say they are so fortunate to have found Dubuque where the people were friendly and inviting and they would have a safe place to raise their two sons: Faz, age 20 and Sajmir, 14.

They took over Zoro's and opened on March 1, 2010. In July and August of this year, 2016, they did some extensive remodeling and purchased some new kitchen equipment.

The dining area is a pleasant space divided into two rooms. On one side a flat screen TV is usually on CNN. In the other room the TV is usually on Fox News. Sometimes patrons ask for ESPN or another channel in order to watch sporting events or other favorite programs.

I'll bet you can tell what the house specialty is at Zoro's Gyros. And yes, they are outstanding! Gyros is a Greek dish made of meat pressed into the shape of an upside down cone. The cone can be made from pork, chicken, beef, veal, lamb or any combination thereof. At Zoro's only high quality cones consisting of 20% beef and 80% lamb are used. The cones are roasted on a vertical rotisserie. When the meat is ready for serving it is sliced vertically into thin, crisp shavings. Then it is served on pita bread with tomato, onion and Tzatziki sauce. (Fun Fact: Gyros is a Greek word pronounced yeer-os. It means "turn" because the cones are turning on the rotisserie. It is also a singular word: the plural is actually Gyri (yeer-ree). In this country people call one sandwich Gyro (yeer-row) because an "s" on the end of the word usually means more than one. You can be forgiven for asking for one Gyro but would be correct if you asked for a Gyros).

At Zoro's the Tzatziki (zat-ZEE-Key) is home made. There are many versions of Tzatziki but in my opinion Steve's simple recipe is the best. It is made with strained Greek yogurt, cumbers and garlic. At Zoro's the Tzatziki is served on the Gyros. I prefer to order it on the side because I find a little goes a long way.







ITALIAN BEEF

There is also a Chicken Gyros on the menu which is quite good. Chunks of chicken breast are grilled with Greek spices and served on pita bread.

As much as I enjoy the Gyros I have to admit I frequently order the excellent Italian Beef. It is also a specialty of the house and it is every bit as good as the Italian Beef sandwiches I get in Chicago. Sirloin Ball Tips are roasted in house in Italian seasonings. This cut of beef is terrific when it is sliced thin and marinated in an au jus.

Zoro's slices the roasts every day so there is just enough for the day's sales. The au jus is made in-house according to Steve's own recipe. The beef is served on a fresh roll with Giardiniera.



If you are a burger fan you won't go wrong by getting your burger fix satisfied here. Quarter pound burgers are cooked on a flat top. You can order your favorite with cheese and other toppings. Or you might try one of the Zoro's special burgers:

Chicago Burger – grilled onions, green bell peppers, American cheese and lettuce, tomato and pickles.

Pepperjack Burger – bacon, pepper jack cheese and lettuce, tomato and pickles.

Greek Burger - Gyros meat and American cheese on a beef patty with onions, tomato and Tzatziki.

The Salads are healthy and are a satisfying meal by themselves. There are three to choose from: Greek, Gyros and Chicken Breast.

For those of you who like to order chicken it's available in so many ways: Chicken Gyros, Chicken Salad, Chicken Wings, Chicken Tenders, Grilled Chicken Breast, Crispy Fried Chicken Breast, or Chicken Philly Sandwich.



I also highly recommend you save room for Chachi's scrumptious Baklava (BACK-la-va)! This sweet pastry has evolved for centuries starting with the Assyrians and then the Babylonians. It became known to the western world after it reached Constantinople the capitol city of the Ottoman Empire. The current practice of stretching dough into thin sheets probably originated in the kitchens of the Topkapi Palace in Istanbul, Turkey.

Chachi's version of Baklava is made with layers of filo or the Greek phyllo (FEE-low) paper thin sheets of dough with pecans, sugar, honey and other secret ingredients. She bakes it slowly for one and a half hours then covers it with a honey syrup. (Fun Fact: for centuries only wealthy people could afford to eat Baklava. It was used to enhance romance because it was said to contain aphrodisiacs: cinnamon for women and cardamom for men. I cannot attest to the veracity of this claim, all I know is Chachi's Baklava is fabulous!)

Give Zoro's Gyros a try the next time you need a fast unbeatable meal deal. Save money when you order Lunch Specials available from 11 am to 2 pm Monday through Friday. Each day three different menu items are available at reduced prices.

MANAGING DIABETES WITH CARBOHYDRATES

November is Diabetes Awareness Month. Did you know that one in 11 Americans have diabetes or that someone is newly diagnosed with diabetes in the U.S. every 23 seconds? We also know that 86 million Americans are at risk of developing diabetes. There is no better time than now to prepare yourself for the upcoming holidays and to learn healthy eating strategies for lifelong behavior change to prevent, delay or manage diabetes. Managing diabetes is about controlling blood sugar levels. One method of meal planning to control blood sugar levels involves counting carbohydrates. To better understand carbohydrate counting (aka: carb counting) one must learn what foods have carbohydrates and their portion sizes.

Foods that contain carbohydrates and recommended to be counted:

- Dairy: milk and yogurt
- · Grains: bread, pasta, cereal, crackers, oatmeal, rice
- Starchy vegetables: potatoes, corn, peas
- Vegetable proteins: Beans (any variety), soy products
- Dessert foods/beverages: Regular soda, juice drinks, cakes, cookies, candy
- · Fruit: Fresh, canned, frozen and juice-based

To figure out how much carbohydrates packaged foods contain, look to the food nutrition facts panel. First check serving size, followed by total carbohydrates. Foods that do not have a food label will require an estimation of how much carbohydrate is in it. When planning meals as a diabetic, 1 serving of a carbohydrate food equals about 15 grams.

A few food examples with approximately 15 grams of carbohydrates:

- 1 tennis ball-sized fresh fruit
- 1 slice bread

- ½ cup cooked oatmeal
- $\frac{1}{4}$ large baked sweet potato
- 1 cup skim to whole milk
- ½ cup cooked beans, such as black, kidney, etc.

The amount of carbohydrates one needs will vary on the individual. A great place to start is 15 to 30 grams at snacks and 45 to 60 grams at meals. A person's carbohydrate amount will depend on many factors; an individual's activity level and prescribed medications will influence how many carbohydrates your body can handle to keep your blood glucose in a healthy range.

Animal-based proteins, such as chicken, eggs, fish, beef, healthy fats like nuts, seeds and oils, and non-starchy vegetables, such as lettuce, tomatoes, mushrooms, broccoli, cauliflower and peppers, have either no carbohydrates or contain little carbohydrate. These foods, especially non-starchy carbohydrates, should always be included on your food plates. However, it's generally easier to not focus on including these foods in your carb counting.

Whether you are a diabetic needing more assistance to manage your blood sugar, pre-diabetic or have never had your glucose measured, your local Hy-Vee dietitian is available to help you better understand. Call to ask about a complimentary store tour or, if you haven't had your glucose levels checked, ask to set up a biometric screening today. CHICKEN ENCHILADA-STUFFED SPAGHETTI SQUASH

MAKES 4 SERVINGS

All you need:

- 2 (8 oz each) boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 1 (2 ½ to 3 pound) spaghetti squash, halved lengthwise and seeded
- 1¼ c. red enchilada sauce, divided
- 1 medium zucchini, diced
- 1 c. Hy-Vee shredded pepper Jack cheese

All you do:

- 1. Position racks in upper and lower thirds of oven; preheat to 450 degrees.
- 2. Place chicken in a medium saucepan, add water to cover and bring to a boil. Cover, reduce heat to low and gently simmer until an instant-read thermometer inserted into the thickest part registers 165 degrees, 10 to 15 minutes.
- 3. Transfer the chicken to a clean cutting board and shred with 2 forks. Transfer to a large bowl.
- 4. Meanwhile, place squash cut-side down in a microwavesafe dish and add 2 tablespoons water. Microwave, uncovered, on HIGH until the flesh is tender, about 10 minutes. Alternatively, place squash halves cut-side down on a rimmed baking sheet. Bake in a 400-degree oven until the squash is tender, 40 to 50 minutes.
- 5. Use a fork to scrape the squash from the shells into the large bowl. Place the shells on a broiler-safe pan. Stir 1 cup enchilada sauce, zucchini, 1/2 teaspoon pepper and 1/4 teaspoon salt into the squash and chicken. Divide the mixture between the shells; top with the remaining 1/4 cup enchilada sauce and cheese.
- Bake on the lower rack for 10 minutes. Move to the upper rack, turn the broiler to high and broil, watching carefully, until the cheese starts to brown, about 2 minutes. To serve, cut each shell in half.

NO DOUBT ABOUT IT



Who invented detective fiction is argued by people who take themselves way too seriously. The British put it down to Wilkie Collins' novel *The Moonstone* (1868). If you are American, of course it was invented by Edgar Allen Poe's The Murders In The Rue Morgue (1841). Be that as it may, the whole argument is rendered mute because in 1887 the world was treated to an event that made everyone forget every other detective or private investigator. The world met for the first time a consulting detective named Sherlock Holmes. In my view, Mr. Holmes became, and still is, the gold standard. In addition to Sherlock Holmes, I have my other favorite, of course: Sam Spade, Philip Marlowe and Harry Bosch. It looks as though I'll be adding another name to that list: Jules Landau.

Mark Krulewitch's latest Jules Landau mystery is called *Doubt In The Second Degree*. It's the fourth book in the series and, as always, you need not read them in chronological order but it does help. Jules is in fine form and although his mentor and his father both advised him to stay away from murder cases, he has whopper on his hands.

If you are from Chicago, you will likely know that there is a road that stretches from north of the city and continues on its entire length called Lake Shore Drive. If you look at a map it's easy to see it runs north and south. However, for about three blocks. Lake Shore Drive actually runs east and west. At that point it is one of the most desirable addresses in Chicago, an East Lake Shore Drive address. Long ago, those buildings were luxury apartments but now they are all condos. The kind of luxury you think might exist in the world really does. I know. One of my relatives used to live in one of those buildings.

Jules gets a call asking him if he'd take a murder case. It seems a staggeringly wealthy widow who lived on East Lake Shore Drive was found bludgeoned to death, stuffed in a plastic bag and placed up on a shelf in a closet in her bedroom. The call came from the public defender who was representing the girl accused of the murder. The girl had a benefactor willing to pay for her defense and for an impartial investigator. In Chicago that usually means Not the Police. Jules, trying to balance a romance with a beautiful woman he met in a previous book, making sure his cat,



Punim, has enough raw chicken organs to eat, and trying not to get beaten up, has his work cut out for him. His new love provides him with a sounding board for his theories, Punim gets plenty to eat and Jules gets beaten up regularly.

One of the things I like the most about Jules Landau is the way he thinks. He gathers all the facts. Each little fact is like one of those small pieces in a 500-piece jigsaw puzzle. It's just fascinating to watch Jules put them all together to get the whole picture. He does this all in his head. It is very much as the master has said, "When you have eliminated the impossible, whatever remains, however improbable, must be the truth." Jules does that a lot, to the utter delight of the reader.

Jules is not like most other private investigators/detectives. He runs against the typical characterization of the hard-bitten, mournful detective battling against the forces of evil all by himself. He has a pretty nice place to live in the Old Town neighborhood of Chicago which doubles as his office. He has a cat not a Mastiff. He does not smoke or drink. DO SOMETHING GOOD

Late last month, a story in the *TH* stunned me with its tale of human cruelty. Its setting was not a bombed city in the Mideast, or a flooded island south of the equator. It took place in lowa, in an office. You can probably picture it: coworkers tapping at computers in cubicles, chatting in the hallway, gathering for lunch in the break room.

The workplace in this story, reported by the Associated Press, is the Coralville branch of Sedgwick Claims Management, a company that administers benefits for Wal-Mart employees. The work is probably tedious at times, but relieved by the relationships people form at work, where we learn just enough about each other to keep the daily labor tolerable, even fun. Such camaraderie is what retirees miss most, even more than the free photocopies.

This is why the newspaper story about 32-year-old Angela Avila, a U.S. citizen born to parents who immigrated from Mexico, was such a shock. Her coworkers might say "she started it" when she objected to Donald Trump's labeling all Mexican immigrants as drug runners, criminals, and rapists. He seemed to give permission for them to become unrestrained bullies.

Imagine finding your screensaver, on which you'd posted a picture of your little girl, changed to a photo of an angry Trump pointing his finger. Imagine changing it back, and having it happen again. Imagine hearing racist jokes that demean you and your family. Imagine your work "friends" gleefully signing you up for emails from the Trump campaign. Consider how you would feel when, as others planned a company potluck, you're told you can't participate because you are an "illegal," drawing laughter from your boss.

Finally, imagine your company retaliating, after you brought these incidents to their attention, responding not by disciplining your harassers and offering you support but by falsely accusing you of fudging your timesheet and firing you. Think how it would feel if your company joined the side of the bullies, mailing your belongings home in a package containing a nasty note reading "Illegal immigrants can't vote or work. Good luck finding a job."

On its website, Sedgwick highlights this trademarked claim: "Taking care of people is at the heart of everything

we do. Caring counts," and goes on to note that every year, their people "take care of the needs of more than 2.6 million who had something unexpected happen." Would that include this mistreated woman? Their site goes on to boast of impressive core values, mission, and diversity with such blithe pride it takes my breath away:

"When it comes to diversity at Sedgwick, our focus is on *uniqueness*: our colleagues knowing they are respected and valued for who they are. Inclusion at Sedgwick is about *belonging*: ensuring that every one of our colleagues understands their role in the success of their team, our clients and the organization as a whole." (Those are Sedgwick's italics.)

Sedgwick owes this woman a public apology. It should not take a lawsuit to teach people how to act. The company should be required to undergo mandatory staff education and to issue progress updates. They should vow to serve as a role model for turning around a toxic workplace. Other companies that have let such behavior occur should recognize and address it as well. Value statements should not be mere window dressing.

Maybe the lawsuit will be a learning opportunity for Sedgwick and for other companies where value statements are ignored and bullying goes on unchecked. Maybe management at the Coralville office will be held accountable—and fired—and the employees who carried out their reign of terror will be disciplined.

Many of us were stunned by the success of the candidate who missed no opportunity to ridicule and scorn millions of American citizens who did not meet his standards—war heroes who were captured, the media, women, Latinx and Hispanic people, African-Americans, American Muslims, people with physical handicaps, anyone not a "10," anyone LGBTQA+. Perhaps his insults were easy to dismiss in mostly white, mostly Christian Dubuque. Maybe it was easy to forget, somehow, his insults of the Pope ("disgraceful"), and how he asked, after failing to win our caucus, "How stupid are the people of lowa?"

People tend to throw up their hands when large numbers of people need support. The enormity of the populations he mocked and vilified—not to mention those whom he assaulted, failed to pay, or sued for no good reason—may have been so large as to make us feel we could not help in any way. How can I keep 11 million illegal citizens from deportation to Mexico? How can I protect Muslims who are just as kind and peace-loving as I am? What can I possibly do to protect all the girls who hear, from high places, that beauty means more than brilliance?

Journalist Nicholas Kristof has noted this dilemma: "People are less willing to contribute to a fund to save kids from cancer if the same amount of money is going to save not one life but eight lives." Instead we feel overwhelmed, not even giving money to charities that will do the hard work for us, supporting the poor, the handicapped, the refugee with no place else to turn.

So here is one person you can help. If even that seems too hard, then help one person. Help one person. It's a truism, but I will say it: It is better to light one candle than to curse the darkness.






