Around 365 we're also gearing up for another edition of the Impact Awards, our 9th annual. If only you knew how last minute some of the past shows have received their last coat of paint before getting rolled out. But never mind the man behind the curtain.

We started the Impact Awards almost 10 years ago because we, as having a unique and diverse view of so much of what happens in the community, wanted to make sure that the people doing great things or even doing normal things but doing them very well were told that they were doing great things.

Big-time civic impacts will always get their deserved due in our community. I just saw that the estate of a great man, Mr. Ed Babka, just endowed \$60 million in scholarships at the University of Dubuque. Wow! I'm thrilled to have known Ed and so proud of his many impacts on our community. But there are people in the Tri-States who can't give a big monetary gift or save a life or win a World Series who still do things everyday that change the face of our community. These are the people we look for when deciding where Impact Awards go. Call them unsung. Say they're just doing their job. The truth is, there are a lot of people in the community who are actually just doing their jobs. In comparison, the people truly are special.

It's so hard to narrow down the list every year. The easiest part is removing the people who already have an Impact Award from a previous year. Naturally they are the kind of people that come up again and again for recognition, but their nominator just didn't know they already had one. The hard part is having 60 or 70 options and trying to cut it down to 20. I'd love to give out 60, but we'd be

there for two days, and I don't think our artists—this year it's the amazing metal sculptor Gail Chavenelle—really want to have to make 60 pieces of original art.

That's another thing that's special about the Impact Awards for me. If you are going to do something unique and special to make our community better, we're not giving you a plaque. You're getting something unique back, a real piece of local, original art to proudly display for years to come. We love that there are over 200 pieces of great original art around the Dubuque area now from the Impact Awards. Thank you to Gene Tully, Kyle Regan and Gail Chavenelle for their beautiful work over the years.

365 is once again appreciative of the support of The Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque, an organization so in-line with the concept of making a community impact that their own grant program awards are, in fact, called Community Impact Grants. They provide funding to people and organizations with the next big ideas to make positive change in Dubuque. The University of Wisconsin-Platteville's College of Liberal Arts and Education and Department of Human Resources are collaborating with the French-American Cultural Exchange Tournées Film Festival and the Avalon Cinema in Platteville to host UW-Platteville's annual International Film Festival. All films are free and open to the public.

The theme for this year's film festival is "Humanity, Love, and Equality in French Cinema," and will include three films for the remaining three dates of the festival that deal with issues of diversity and inclusion, sexuality, nationality and race in French cinema. The purpose of the festival is to generate discussion and

dialog between university students and employees, as well as the broader Platteville community about these issues.

Prior to each film, a UW-Platteville faculty member will provide a brief introduction about the film and after each film screening, he or she will lead a discussion about the film's themes.

The Young Irishlanders comprises eight consummate performers who have Irish traditional song and dance running through their veins, including acclaimed Irish fiddler, Colin Farrell. The artists have toured as lead performers with Riverdance and Michael Flatley's Lord of the Dance, and they have shared the stage with Bono, Sting, and Ronnie Wood of the Rolling Stones.

Although still in their 20s and 30s, The Young Irishlanders have achieved more than most people would aspire to in a lifetime. Between them, they have performed for many heads of state including those of Ireland, the United States, England, China, Monaco, Japan, and Russia. Members of The Young Irishlanders have performed with The Chieftains, Frankie Gavin & De Dannan, the Dubliners, Martin Hayes, Máirtín O'Connor, Lúnasa, Michael McGoldrick, and other leading names in Irish music. Dancer Siobhán Manson was the principal dancer with Riverdance for

over 10 years and, in 2014, continued that role during a 5-month-long tour of China.

The sound the band creates is best described as eclectic, where traditional Irish music, Celtic music, folk music, world music, jazz music, country music, and popular music come together to give rise to a unique and multi-faceted sound. The Young Irishlanders also sets out to reflect an Ireland of today where many of Ireland's exponents of Irish traditional music are second generation Irish or reside outside of Ireland.

A free Cyber Café Knapp Stage pre-show concert from 6 to 7 p.m. featuring Ballyheigue, a local five-piece family Irish band precedes the performance.

DOWNTOWN MURALS

After 11 years of groundbreaking art exhibits in the Historic Millwork District, Voices Productions is taking it to the streets, literally. Dubuque residents and visitors alike were intrigued by the creation of large-scale paintings on the sides of downtown buildings in the fall of 2016. "The first phase of this new strategy is to curate a series of murals in downtown Dubuque, which we refer to as the Voices Mural Project," said Sam Mulgrew, president of Humanities Iowa and one of the five directors of Voices Productions.

The three downtown murals completed in 2016 are just the beginning of the larger Voices Mural Project, which will officially begin in 2017 and ultimately include about 15 murals by regionally and nationally known mural painters. "In essence, we will be creating an outdoor gallery but all on the walls of privately owned property," Mulgrew said. "Some of the murals will be highly visible, but some will be obscurely presented, hidden in alleys and back lots."

Sponsored by Runde Auto Group along with Humanities Iowa, the Voices Mural Project will eventually be part of a public art walking tour. "The murals that we completed in Sept. and Oct. were just to get us started, dipping our toes in the water before we dive in next year," Mulgrew said. "All vibrant communities have some degree of public art adorning their public space. Dubuque has greatly lagged in this area of creative expression. It is the intention of Voices Productions to move the needle, and get people in Dubuque involved in discussing and engaging in all forms of public art."

WAGS AT THE FLAGS

Five Flags Center has given many Dubuque dogs and the people who love them something to look forward to through the cold months of winter. Wags at the Flags! On Wednesday evenings Nov. through March, pooches of all sizes find a warm, friendly place where they will not freeze or get covered in mud, playing ball and catching frisbees or running zoomies all around both the small or large dog areas. And others just chill. But one thing's guaranteed: everyone goes home pooped.

The creative Five Flags crew saw a need and opportunity to open the doors to a new audience, keeping the venue filled and functional even more than is has been in a very-resurgent 2016 for the vital civic facility. And they made it a fun place for dog owners to mingle too, with cold beers in the Bark-A-Lounge Bar. They have even dedicated a portion of the proceeds from the events to help local shelters. The weekly meet up has been such a hit, that 100 to 150 dogs show up each week. With new management comes new ideas, and dog lovers are grateful to Five Flags Center and SMG for thinking outside the box on this one. And kudos to The-sien's for supporting the event with great toys for the pups!



COMMUNITY TO COMMUNITY RESOURCES UNITE

Last year Resources Unite created the “Just Add Water” campaign to help bring clean water to the residents of Flint, Mi. The initial goal was to collect 25,000 bottles of water. Over the course of six months and after eight trips to Flint, Resources Unite had delivered 600,000 bottles of water.

Water donations came from everywhere throughout the Tri-State area. All walks of life were involved. One 10-year-old boy single-handedly collected two pick-up truck loads of water. The smallest towns in Southwest Wisconsin were shipping water to Resources Unite’s office on a weekly basis.

Green Acres Storage generously donated all of the space to store the water until it was delivered, and companies like Hirschbach, Theisen’s, Simon’s Trucking and more donated the use of their semis to help transport the donated water and supplies.

More than 50 volunteers joined RU’s team on trips to Flint to go door-to-door to deliver the water to the most at-risk residents. The experience was life changing for everyone involved.

The campaign reinforced what Resources Unite believes: that at the end of the day, everyone wants to make a difference. It doesn’t matter how much money you make or how many things you collect along the way; it’s that you made an impact. Sometimes people don’t know where to start. RU is that starting point for our community.

GRAND VIEW UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

Compelled to go where no one else was in order to have a life-changing and world-changing impact, the Grand View United Methodist Church, led by Pastor Tom C. Shinkle, entered into a long-term partnership with the UWC and the village of Damka in Nigeria.


All of the work they do in Nigeria has a solid starting point: not what do we think they need but what have they expressed as true needs. Their needs included education, clean water, health care, peace and security. Their goals were straightforward: to make a difference and change the lives of people so that their living and experience of life is better; to be a positive and caring influence in the lives of both Christians and Muslims in a remote area of Nigeria; to expand the education of children in the area (both Christian and Muslim children attend the school that Grand View funds); to help the village find ways to enter the market-economy; and to be a model for other churches in Iowa.

In a time when it feels like religions are being generalized, misrepresented and pitted against

one another on a world stage, Grand View UMC is working to help their partners understand that all people are children of the living God, that all lives matter, and that peace in their country can begin when the Christians and Muslims living life together in that village respect and care for one another.

Educationally, they hired six teachers and three support staff as well as a soccer coach and an adult education teacher. Their next step is helping the village construct classrooms with corrugated tin walls and roofs to replace the classrooms made of cornstalks. Next will be providing books and materials approved by the Nigerian Dept. of Education. A long-term goal is to bring two students, every four years, from the Damka School to the United States to receive training in a trade school, then return to Damka. Entering the market economy will sustain the school and better their lives. This includes identifying entrepreneurs in the village and working with them in the areas of agriculture and livestock production.

All of these efforts combine to bring peace and better living standards to Damka, Nigeria.



MUSIC

TRACEY RUSH, NORTHEAST IOWA SCHOOL OF MUSIC (NISOM)



Years ago, Tracey Rush had a vision. Tired of teaching music lessons out of her home, she imagined a music school where aspiring musicians, both kids and adults, could learn from experienced musical teachers.

In 2001, she realized that vision with the opening of NISOM, the Northeast Iowa School of Music, in the newly renovated Fountain Park complex. A nonprofit organization, NISOM is a certified member of the National Guild for Community Arts Education, meeting rigid criteria, such as employing qualified faculty and staff, offering a sequential curriculum that responds to community needs, operating a well-equipped facility, and serving students at various levels of aptitude, with access to financial aid.

A thriving community music school, NISOM not only provides lessons in a range of musical instruments but also hosts groups like the Dubuque Community String Orchestra; the Encore Chorale and The New Horizons Band, for older singers and musicians; L&MOP (Lollipops & Music for Our Preschoolers), for our youngest music fans; Chamberfest, a series of notable chamber concerts; and Jump Start, an immersive music camp for grade school kids created in partnership with the Dubuque Community School District.

NON-PROFIT INNOVATION

THE RED BASKET PROJECT ANN MCDONOUGH & BETH GILBREATH



Where in Dubuque would a homeless woman go to find a tampon or sanitary pad? It's not the kind of basic necessity that comes to mind first when you think of a person in need. But if you're a woman, you instantly understand the dilemma and the dignity related to this issue.

In June of 2016, Ann McDonough and Beth Gilbreath co-founded the Red Basket Project to answer that question. The organization provides tampons and pads to the overlooked homeless women and girls in our community

by placing actual red baskets filled with the supplies in the ladies restrooms at the Dubuque Rescue Mission and at the Dubuque Food Pantry. They also partner with concerned citizens to collect donations and find locations where women in need will find supplies.

They have also created Period Packs of supplies for one monthly cycle. These are distributed by the school guidance counselors to help girls attend school every day. And, of course, it's absolutely free and discrete.

SPORTS & RECREATION

RUN4TROOPS / HODGE



Created by and organized by Hodge in 2009, Run4Troops has quickly become one the area's premier community events. What started out as a grass-roots effort to bring awareness to the men and women in uniform, has grown into an event that now attracts over 850 participants from across the country.

The marathon, which boasts Boston-qualifying status, spans along the picturesque Heritage Trail from Dyersville to Dubuque, IA and can be run as an individual or as a relay team of up to 12 members. While the race provides a sense of competition for participants, it means much more for those involved. The relay-style format has brought together the local business

community like no other, and companies have chosen to rally their employees to join in Run4Troops heartfelt mission: to support Tri-State military—past, present and future.

In its 9th year, Hodge and its army of employee volunteers have helped raise more than \$100,000 with Run4Troops through registration fees, sponsorships and individual donations. These funds directly support Tri-State military through causes such as: The Veterans Freedom Center, Dubuque ROTC, Honor Flight, and the Local National Guard, to name a few.

The event returns on June 24, 2017, and Hodge expects this year to be its best year yet! Join in on the cause. You'll be sure to get a "Dose of Freedom."

SUSTAINABILITY - FOOD EQUITY
ASHLEY NEISES

Ashley Neises serves as the manager of the Urban Farm and Healing Gardens at the Dubuque Rescue Mission, working with residents at the Mission, as well as area students and volunteers who want to learn about growing food in the city setting and how it promotes good health and sustainability. In her position, she oversees the farm's greenhouse and gardens which provide fresh food year-round for the Mission's free community meal program. She launched the "balanced plate" initiative there and also started production of microgreens in the greenhouse. Once the project was set up, she offered training to one of the Mission residents as job development who now grows microgreens in his basement and sells to local retail grocers and at the Winter Farmers' Market to help pay his rent.

She has also served as the Market Manager for Dubuque Farmers' Market, setting up the Double Up Food Bucks dollar for dollar match for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. Ashley formed the Dubuque Community Garden Coalition to create a network for garden managers along with a website for people who



want to find out how to volunteer in our seven community gardens. She established and organizes an annual Sustainability Fair at the Mission Urban Farm and established and hosts the "Rooted Chef" curriculum that provides hands-on training and Safe Serve certification for disadvantaged persons who have interest in employment in the food service industry. She serves on the Local Foods Working Group and Farm to Table organizing committee. She has collaborated with Green Iowa Americorp, ISU County Extension, Crescent Community Health Center, and other organizations to provide community education and outreach about food access through urban agriculture.

Ashley is a champion of sustainable growing and food scrap recycling. And, she does ALL of this with a tireless spirit and a humble heart.

SUSTAINABILITY
**CONVIVIAM
 URBAN
 FARMSTEAD**

Convivium is the Latin word for "feast." It is the idea of coming together in celebration around food. The mission of Convivium Urban Farmstead is to create community around food—growing, preparing, preserving and, of course, enjoying food. Convivium shares its mission through educational and community outreach activities for both children and adults.

The new non-profit is located on Jackson St, in Dubuque's north end and consists of two 1920s era greenhouses, (the old Hopper's Greenhouses) which house a coffee shop, event center, educational space for hands-on classes and a training kitchen for cooking classes and extensive outdoor garden areas.



The facility has been rehabilitated with an eye toward sustainability. It is powered by 100 solar panels and heated through a geothermal system. It also features an innovative insulation system, a rain water abatement plan, partial green roof and entirely edible landscaping. SUSTAINABILITY
**BEE BRANCH /
 CHANGE
 PROGRAM**

On its own, the \$219 million Bee Branch Flood Mitigation Project is worthy of recognition for Sustainability. With \$160 million in grants, efforts to offset the threat of over \$500 million in looming future flood damage estimates center around a beautiful linear park design. Fifty percent of the city population lives or works in the Bee Branch coverage area. Not only does this community-friendly design come in at half the cost of burying a new flood mitigation system, but the attractive limestone features enhance the area, bringing community orchards, gardens, play structures, and hike and bike paths also.

But the vision of the city took this opportunity to revitalize an entire community to another level. An \$8.4 million federal grant created the Bee Branch Healthy Homes Program positively impact over 730 houses, acquiring dilapidated multi-unit homes and converting them back to single homes. This will decrease density of the neighborhood, improve the appearance and livability of the property and the city will sell them back to a low or



moderate-income family. The transformational program will help reverse the 70 percent rental occupancy of the area, which is flip-flopped from the neighborhoods elsewhere in the city.

But there's more. The other component of the CHANGE program is contracting with an agency to serve as a "home advocate" determining if there are other things with which these new homeowners need help, from unemployment to substance abuse or mental health support. So it's not just about fixing houses, it's an overall approach to helping families succeed over the next five years.

In a year where it seems that solving America's problems means focusing on actions that just treat the symptoms and erode the foundation, our city is seeing things from all angles and taking action from multiple fronts, not just treating the symptoms, but working to eliminate the problem before symptoms arise, giving Dubuque a strong foundation for the future.

SUSTAINABILITY
PAUL SCHULTZ

Many of you may already know Paul Schultz and the significant impact he has had on our community from establishing the guiding principles of Dubuque's Sustainability to creating the award-winning curbside collection program that was decades ahead of its time. Paul currently serves on the Green Dubuque Board. He is a Built Environment Ecologist who has made contributions to the Wasted Food Reduction Campaign, Dubuque Area Recycling Network, Dubuque 50% by 2030 GHG Reduction Plan and Green Vision Education.

Paul is retired from the City of Dubuque where he worked as the Resource Management Coordinator on projects including the Dubuque Green Asset Map, Curbside Food Scrap Collection Program, zero waste and event recycling initiatives, compost processing infrastructure development, Waste Diversion Road Map, conversion from sludge incineration to anaerobic digestion at Dubuque's Water and Resources Recovery Center,



IBM Smarter Discards Research Project Partnership, Pay As You Throw, Sustainable Dubuque Taskforce, and the ICMA/US Department of State Climate Fellows Exchange with China.

Paul has also given volunteer service to the League of Women Voters, Dubuque Food Co-op, Dubuque Eats Well, Governor's Green Advisory Committee, Catfish Creek Coalition, Iowa Recycling Association and Dubuque Area Congregations United.

In addition to his tangible contributions to environmental and social justice, one of Paul's greatest contributions is his role as a mentor. So many of the active young leaders in our community were able to count on Paul for advice, support and sometimes even consolation.

VOLUNTEERISM

IOWA MISSION OF MERCY DENTAL CLINIC / DR. HEYO TJARKS

In 2016, the Iowa Dental Association's Mission of Mercy came to the Five Flags Center in Dubuque. The Mission of Mercy consists of a literary army of dentists, assistants and volunteers, all donating their time and talents, completely free to provide dental care to anyone who comes to the event in need. From simple to procedures, to x-rays to surgeries, this skilled group of professions spends a weekend in a different Iowa city each year to make a huge impact on the smiles of Iowans in need. This year's clinic completed 1,368 patient encounters and provided \$867,724 in free oral health care to the citizens of Dubuque, Iowa and beyond!

Since 2008, the Iowa Mission of Mercy has treated almost 13, 000 patients and provided nearly \$8.5 million in free dental care! The 2017 Iowa Mission of Mercy will be held Sept. 29-30, 2017 at the US Cellular Center in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Locally, Heyo Tjarks rallied the Iowa Dental Association to bring the IMOM to Dubuque, chairing the local committee her put together. He and his crew recruited volunteers, solicited funds and in-kind donations and canvassed the community they felt were most in need, to create awareness among possible patients. Heyo's also been involved in volunteering for the IMOM since its inception.



BUSINESS IMPACT
HUMACH

Perhaps better known locally as WS Live, Humach is a company that strives to make an impact in the community with a workforce of employees who give back. Whether supporting nonprofits, providing input to make our community a better place to live, work and play, supporting local schools and children or helping community members recover from unexpected disasters, Humach is always ready and willing to lend a helping hand.

The company created a Random Acts of Humach Foundation in 2016 and launched a 1:1:1 initiative where the company pledges 1% of its time, 1% of its product and 1% of its equity to help those in need. Humach employees contribute to a range of nonprofits and community initiatives including Dubuque Days of Caring, the Mission, the River Museum and the VNA, Prescott Elementary, Hillcrest's Reflections in the Park, and Dubuque Main Street's Puttzin' Around Downtown. They organized



multiple blood drives to support the Mississippi Valley blood bank, collected hats and mittens for local school kids, collected food items for the Food Pantry, held a Books for Burma drive, raised money for Stand Up To Cancer, participated in Adopt a Highway, held a Law Enforcement Appreciation Day, donated to and supported Shop with a Cop, collected donations to assist the students impacted by the Loras fire, donated needed items to the Theresa Shelter, conducted numerous random acts of kindness acts in throughout the community, and much more.

INDIVIDUAL IMPACT
SUSAN GORRELL

Susan Gorrell has been a part of the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival since the very beginning, winning an award for *One Million Spokes*, her documentary on RAGBRAI. Seeing the potential of the film festival, she became a volunteer, working from the inside to constantly improve the growing event and ultimately becoming the nonprofit organization's executive director.

With her vision, enthusiasm, and seemingly tireless effort, the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival has become a truly nationally and internationally known film festival. Last year's film festival received over 600 submissions from around the world, drawing a range of filmmakers, directors, producers, actors, and other film industry professionals. The festival has been named one of *MovieMaker Magazine's* 25 coolest film festivals as well as "one of the top 50 film festivals worth the submission fee."



The four days of the film festival generate an estimated economic impact of somewhere between a quarter- and a half-million dollars. Mayor Buol has said, "The Julien Dubuque International Film Festival is integral to our city's vision, bringing local, national and international audiences to Dubuque and is rapidly becoming the one of the premier Midwest film festivals."

Susan would be the first to point to her volunteers and sponsors in the ongoing success of the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival, but it's not without the individual impact of her leadership and vision.

ORGANIZATIONAL IMPACT

GALENA CENTER FOR THE ARTS, CAROL SULLIVAN AND JAN LAVACEK

Developed from the Galena Vision 2020 initiative, the Galena Center for the Arts has created a cultural impact, shining a spotlight on the arts and music of the Galena area. The center hosts exhibits of artwork by local and area artists, which are open to the public weekly, and serves as the stage for local play productions, including radio shows. The Center for the Arts also hosts a Songwriters' Showcase, the third Thursday of each month, highlighting the original music of local and area singer/songwriters. Presentations of poetry and prose, films, classes and workshops are examples of the further range of events hosted by the Galena Center



for the Arts. But none of it would happen without the organizational efforts of Carol Sullivan and Jan Lavacek.


BEST IDEA

MISSISSIPPI RIVER ART WORKSHOPS BLUFF STROKES PLEIN AIR PAINT OUT EVENT

Mississippi River Art Workshops was organized by Wes Heitzman in 2014, under the Dubuque County Fine Arts Society, with a goal of establishing Dubuque as a destination for artists who travel to participate in workshops and art events.

Following four successful workshops in 2015-16, Jillayne Pinchuk chaired the group's second venture, Bluff Strokes, a plein air paint out. Paint outs are competitive painting events and have become major community events around the country. All work must be completed outside during the timeframe of the event. Art is judged at the end of the week, then exhibited and sold to the community. The event was sponsored by Hirschbach Trucking, Premier Bank, Andy and Debi Butler, Tim Conlon, Gronen Properties, McGoo's Pizza, and Spahn and Rose, with Steeple Square providing a beautiful space for exhibiting the finished art.

Bluff Strokes 2016 attracted 45 artists from Iowa, Wisconsin, Illinois, Minnesota, Missouri, and Kansas, all wowed by Dubuque. Art sales totaled \$43,000, and \$10,000 was awarded in prizes. In addition, Dubuque residents were given the opportunity to engage with artists in their community and to see Dubuque through artists' eyes. Several young adults were



inspired to make their first purchases of original art and expressed interest in returning to buy more next year. Mississippi River Art Workshops is now planning for Bluff Strokes 2017.

In addition to art workshops and Bluff Strokes, Mississippi River Art Workshops has launched "Paint Dubuque," a website providing photos and information on suggested locations for artists to paint, and Plein Air Painters of Dubuque, an informal group of local artists who paint together weekly in and around Dubuque.

Additional committee members include Betsy Badger, Morgan Kolwes, Sarah Conlon, Sue Davis, Dawn Eikamp, Bob Felderman, Paul Opperman and Sara Willett.



Throughout the collection, Currington exudes the easy going charm that has become his trademark yet also possesses a maturity and confidence that comes from a decade of churning out hits and earning accolades. He won the “Hottest Video of the Year” honor at the fan-voted CMT Music Awards for “Must Be Doin’ Somethin’ Right” in 2006, the same year he received an ACM nod for Top New Male Vocalist. His hit duet with Shania Twain, “Party For Two,” earned nominations from both the CMA and ACM, and “People Are Crazy” proved to be a career-defining hit that earned Grammy nominations for Male Country Vocal Performance and Best Country Song in addition to being nominated for Single and Song of the Year from the Academy of Country Music, as well as Single, Song and Video of the Year from the Country Music Association.

Currington cites “Hey Girl” as one of his favorite songs he’s ever recorded. “I was drawn to that song because of the amped up energy it has,” he says. “It was written by a couple of friends of mine, Rhett Atkins being one. I love that guy and he’s from Georgia. I always wanted to record one of his songs. He’s one of the first concerts I ever went to in Nashville. When I got the song and I had a choice. I could choose any producer out there to work this song. I thought Dann Huff would be perfect for this song, and he was. You hear that guitar in it. You hear the power of the drums. Everything about that recording—I’ll take a little credit, not much—but Dann Huff is the reason.”

In the decade since he made his debut with the top ten hit “Walk a Little Straighter,” the Georgia native has parlayed his rich, emotion-laden tenor and unerring song sense into some of the country format’s most memorable hits, including such No. 1s as “We Are Tonight,” “Hey Girl,” “Good Directions,” “Must Be Doin’ Something Right” and “People Are Crazy.”

The Georgia born artist spent his early years on Tybee Island before his family moved inland to Rincon. The sea is in Currington’s soul and is a constant presence in his life and music. He recalls his parents playing vinyl records by Willie Nelson, Waylon Jennings and Kenny Rogers. His mom took him to see Rogers in concert when he was 10 and it proved to be a pivotal moment. “It was there that night I remember thinking, ‘man I’d love to be that guy. I’d love to be doing this,’” says Currington. “It was an amazing show, the energy in there and everything about it I never forgot.”

Like many country entertainers, Currington began singing in church. “I met this preacher when I was 17. I heard about this church and just went there. They had a rocking little band,” Currington remembers. The preacher invited him to sing the next week and Billy made quite an impression. Some of his musician friends from church asked him to sing with their band and then had to sneak the underage singer into clubs to perform. “It just started happening so fast,” he says. “The next thing you know I’m playing in a band and the preacher is taking me to Nashville.”

We Are Tonight finds Billy Currington in peak form. The songs are sometimes whimsical, often poignant and always compelling. Seasoned by time and peppered with experience, his distinctive voice has never sounded better and he’s a young man who appreciates the road he’s traveled. He’s humbled by the successes of his past yet always looking forward. “It’s like you work so many years to get it and you finally got it,” says Currington, who once again makes his home on Tybee Island. “I feel so blessed.”





MR. FRIDAY NIGHT HEATS UP MYSTIQUE

Off stage, Eric Paslay is a mild-mannered, soft spoken true Southern gentleman, ala the great George Strait. On stage, the fiery red-haired Tennessean is a hellraising wildcat, a soul-stirring music machine famous for winding crowds into an infectious frenzy.

"I'm more of an introvert than anything," Paslay told Rolling Stone of his Dr. Jeckyl to Mr. Jive transformation when taking the stage, "but you learn how to shake it a little."

MAGOO'S PIZZA

Sometimes it's hard to tell if Mr. Magoo is a person or a dog. One thing is for sure, though, he sure knows how to make really good pizza! Mr. Magoo was born in Grundy Center, Iowa at Century Farm Breeders. He is a playful Cavachon (cav-ah-chon) and his favorite human food is pizza. I am told he regularly advises the chef's at his namesake restaurant on how to improve their already excellent pizzas. (Fun Fact: a Cavachon is a cross between a Cavalier King Charles Spaniel and a Bichon Frisé (BEE-shon free-ZAY).

Magoo's Pizza is located on University Avenue in Dubuque in the space many Dubuquers remember as the teepee home of Nanny Goats Ice Cream. However, Magoo's building is much older than that. There is still a sign on the building indicating it was once Western Brewery Hall.

According to the Encyclopedia Dubuque Mathias Tschirgi of Switzerland arrived in Dubuque in 1846. He constructed a brewery in at least two buildings

Dr. Bernie Saks is from Los Angeles. He received his MD Degree from UCLA and is a Board Certified Radiologist. Radiology is Bernie's profession but cooking is his passion. When he is not working he enjoys perfecting his recipes and baking pizzas.

Magoo's Pizza also has a professional staff. Chef William Jester calls Bentonville, AR his hometown. He has over 26 years of experience in the culinary industry. He began his career working for the Hotelier John Q. Hammons Corporation. He was Banquet Chef at Holiday Inn Des Moines, Executive Chef at Holiday Inn Chicago and moved to this area to become Sous-Chef at Thunder Hills Country Club. He then spent ten years at the Dubuque Golf and Country Club as Sous-Chef and for the six years prior to coming to Magoo's he was Chef de Cuisine at Champagne in the Mystique Casino.

Chef Allison Pusateri is from Edgewood, NM and holds a Bachelor of Science in Food Service Management and Culinary Arts from Johnson & Wales University College of Culinary Arts, Denver, CO. She is an accomplished Baker and Pastry Chef and has managed bakeries for Whole Foods in Denver, Boulder and Madison.

Sharif Rahim is a Manager and barista at Magoo's Brew the beverage shop next to and part of the Magoo's Pizza operation.

Magoo's Pizza was designed to have a retro style with a 1950s and 60s look. Priority is given to cleanliness. You will notice there are no waste receptacles. The staff is trained to buss and sanitize tables as soon as patrons leave.

Another interesting concept is the absence of TVs and Wi-Fi. Customers are encouraged to talk to each other.

The heart of this restaurant is the Wood Stone Brand Oven. This highly acclaimed (and expensive) oven is manufactured in Bellingham, WA. Wood Stone ovens are impressive because they have one piece dome ceilings and floors and can easily maintain accurate temperatures of over 800° F. Magoo's oven is a gas fired, open flame beauty. Pizzas are baked at 650° F and only take 3 to 5 minutes hence giving new meaning to the term fast casual service.

When you enter this restaurant you go through a line where you can pick out your toppings or order a specialty pizza or salad and watch it being prepared. All the ingredients are farm to table fresh and almost everything is made from scratch.

where Magoo's is now on what was then known as Julien Avenue. After selling that company he formed Western Brewery in 1854 and by 1880 it was producing 300 barrels of beer per week. (Fun Fact: By 1869 the City of Dubuque was home to 9 breweries. There were many more outside the city limits).

Magoo's Pizza is owned by Susan Farber and her husband Dr. Bernie Saks. It is a fast casual counter service restaurant offering exceptional pizza and fresh salads. Magoo's Pizza opened on Jan. 30, 2015 and seemingly overnight it became a huge success. This is not surprising since the owners are both accomplished professionals.

Susan Farber is a native of Dubuque. She has a BA degree from Georgetown University, an MBA from George Washington University and is a graduate of the Harvard Business School's Advanced Management Program. While an undergraduate at Georgetown she became Sous-Chef for her friend and classmate Lisa Yockelson. Lisa is now a well-known food writer and cookbook author. She has written over 10 cookbooks including the award winning *Baking by Flavor* and *Chocolate Chocolate* and more recently *Baking Style*.

Susan lived in France and Belgium for eight years and attended Le Cordon Bleu in Paris. Susan also is a designer and owns the Red House and the Cable Car Square Building near the Fourth Street Elevator in Dubuque. She has won several Historic Preservation Awards from the City of Dubuque and the State of Iowa.





PIZZAS

All the pizzas are personal size. This is advantageous because every person can chose a pie that is just right for them. The crust is made from scratch and is cold proofed. If you require gluten-free you can request a special crust made from a proprietary blend of flour.

The cheese on the specialty pizzas is a mozzarella and provolone blend.

Ground beef, pork and grilled chicken are all cooked on the premises. The sausage is ground pork seasoned with a house blend of spices. The meat is supplied by Cremer's Grocery and Meats in Dubuque.

All the sauces are home-made from simple recipes and are made fresh daily.

The pizzas are sprinkled with a delicious seasoning just before baking. After tasting scores of herbs Susan and Bernie selected a seasoning blend supplied by a Spice Company in the Pacific Northwest.

You can choose from eight Specialty Pizzas or select the ingredients for your own customized version. The Specialty Pizzas include:

Margarita – my favorite with marinara sauce, tomato, basil, garlic, fresh mozzarella and parmesan

Chicken Alfredo – Alfredo sauce, chicken, spinach, feta, parmesan

Greek – olive oil & garlic sauce, artichoke, tomato, olives, red onion, feta and parmesan



Meat Lovers – marinara sauce, Canadian bacon, ground beef, pepperoni, sausage, mozzarella provolone blend and parmesan. This is the favorite pizza of 365ink's publisher, Bryce Parks. His favorite food is always the one with any kind of bacon.

If you choose the Build Your Own Pie option you select from a long list of vegetable toppings and meats.

You also decide on the cheese:

- Mozzarella/provolone blend
- Parmesan
- Fresh Mozzarella
- Feta

And the sauce:

- Olive oil & garlic – just what the name implies
- Alfredo – made with butter, olive oil, garlic, cream and parmesan cheese
- Olive oil & pesto – pine nuts, basil, olive oil and cheese. The basil is supplied by FarmTek in Dyersville and is hydroponically grown.
- Marinara – a simple recipe of tomatoes, onions, garlic and herbs. (Fun Fact: marinara sauce is an Italian word for Mariner's sauce. It originated in Naples, Italy and was first prepared by cooks on Neapolitan ships or by wives of Neapolitan sailors when they returned to port).



SALADS

Salads are prepared with fresh ingredients. The current menu offers 6 Specialty Salads including:

Chicken Caesar – romaine, chicken, parmesan, croutons, Caesar dressing

Italian – romaine, tomato, pepperoni, banana pepper, fresh mozzarella, vinaigrette dressing

Spinach Vegetarian – spinach, tomato, olives, roasted peppers, vinaigrette dressing

Greek – cucumbers, tomato, olives, red onions, feta cheese and balsamic dressing

Here again you have a Build Your Own Salad option so you can enjoy the salad with just the toppings you prefer. There is a large variety in the following categories:

Lettuce (spinach or romaine), vegetables, meats, cheeses and dressings.

If you are like me you probably enjoy a glass or beer or wine with your pizza or salad. So may I suggest you don't overlook the nice assortment of craft beers and wines? These offerings change frequently because Dr. Bernie is constantly looking for good values at reasonable prices. You might notice many of the wines are from Washington State. After Dr. Bernie completed his internship and fellowship programs he practiced Radiology in Walla Walla, WA. He developed a number of contacts in wineries in the Walla Walla Valley Washington Wine Country. They keep him apprised of the latest premium selections.

Magoo's Pizza does not only have outstanding pizzas and splendid salads. There are also two fabulous desserts! They are baked in-house from proprietary recipes. The mini Chocolate Chip Cookies are soft and chewy and are a delight. The Brownie Bites are made from rich dark chocolate and melt in your mouth.



Magoo's Pizzas are in such high demand Susan and Bernie knew early on they would have to take their show on the road. So Mr. Magoo's Magoo Mobile is now ready to roll. The food truck has a pizza assembly area almost identical to the restaurant and features the same open-flame oven only in a slightly smaller version. The Magoo Mobile is available for prearranged catering events and private parties including birthdays, retirements and graduations. ■

PISTACHIO-CRUSTED TUNA STEAKS

MAKES 4 SERVINGS

All you need:


- 1 tbsp thinly sliced shallot
- 1 bay leaf
- ½ cup white wine
- 3 tbsp reduced-fat sour cream
- 2 tsp lemon juice
- 2 tsp chopped fresh dill, divided
- 1 tsp whole-grain mustard
- ½ tsp salt, divided
- ¼ cup coarse dry breadcrumbs, preferably whole-wheat (see note)
- ¼ cup shelled pistachios
- 4 (4 oz each) tuna steaks, 1 to 1¼-inches thick
- 1 tsp Hy-Vee Select extra-virgin olive oil

All you do:

1. Place shallot, bay leaf and wine in a small saucepan and bring to a boil. Reduce until the wine is almost evaporated, about 5 minutes. CLOCKS STRIKE THIRTEEN

There are all kinds of things that are extraordinary about *Himself* by Jess Kidd. The fact that this is her first novel defies all literary conventions. It reads like she is a well-seasoned writer working on a book after perfecting her art for decades. It's not at all surprising to me that Ms. Kidd is Irish and her book is right smack dab in the center of many Irish literary traditions.

Irish writers have carved out a niche and have a style all their own. They have been using a literary technique for hundreds of years that is very similar to magical realism. (And that's not meant to take anything away from astonishing books like *One Hundred Years of Solitude* by Gabriel García Márquez.). The central character is more than a little roguish. Ancient myths might take on a contemporary form and be treated by other characters in the book as though they are as normal as a spring shower. The writing approaches poetry in terms of how each word is packed with meaning. This list gets longer but let me stop here and say, finally, that most Irish novels are witty, not merely funny. They are, occasionally, material for a good belly laugh. Ms. Kidd's book is all of this and more.


The Irish language sometimes expresses itself in odd ways to our English-speaking ears. For example, and little known, is that there is no word in Irish for "yes." Irish speakers always answered questions by affirming the verb of the question. "Bob, are you going to the store?" "I am." Oh, I forgot. There is no Irish word for "no" either. Modern Irish speakers use slang words for yes and no but those words are not strictly part of the language.

Another linguistic twist in the Irish language or in English spoken by an Irish person, is using the word "Himself" as a proper noun. And that brings us to Ms. Kidd's novel. In Irish it's, "Well, if it isn't Himself, the Lord of the manor!" and almost always used as a compliment. It conveys a larger-than-life impression. That sums up Ms. Kidd's main character splendidly.

Mahony is a devilish man full of mischief and naughty behavior. He gets away with it because he's capable of charm that makes women think wicked thoughts and men want to be like him. He's a former (maybe) car thief from Dublin. He was abandoned at a orphanage there as a new born. At the age of 26 one of his old caretakers who raised him, a nun of course, died and left him a cryptic note about his mother and something strange that might have happened to her when he was born.

Mahony decides to do a little sleuthing, showing up in Mulderrig, the village in County Mayo where he was born. (All of my people are from County Mayo and mentioned in the book are the villages where they were born. That was a bit of a kick.) Mayo is in the wild west of Ireland. Go any further west and you are in the Atlantic Ocean with only the Aryan Islands between you and Nova Scotia.

This is where folks learn English as a second language. This is where everybody thinks leprechauns are foolish children's stories and nobody believes in them. BUT, mention a Banshee and you might see fear in their eyes. Stories of Selkies are not treated out of hand. Selkies are said to live as seals in the sea but shed their skin to become human on land. Lots



of folks think the great Irish Hero, Cú Chulainn, in English Cuhullin, was a real man. I'm one of them.

Mahony enlists the aid of Mrs. Cauley, an actress and full time anarchist, in his search for clues to the mystery surrounding his mother. This is a town with plenty of secrets that residents all want kept buried under plenty of peat. As Mahony gets closer to the truth, nature becomes disturbed. Strange, almost magical, things start to happen. The villagers see this as an ominous warning and sometimes as an occasion for scathing Irish humor.

Mahony finally falls to the great Irish writer Oscar Wilde's bon mot, "The only way to rid yourself of temptation is to give in to it." He has an assignation with one of the ladies of Mulderrig. She falls madly in love and he, at first, not so much. The investigation turns the village upside down, almost literally.

It's a grand mystery told with verve and lots of panache. It's thoroughly entertaining, and very funny. In fact I think I'll pour myself a dram or two of Old Bushmills and read it again. Sláinte. ■

Move over, Steve!
Do it yourself advice from
a new mom who knows how...

Here are a few tips on how you can make your garden a success this spring whether it is your first or your 50th...

Less is more. We want you to be successful, but if you start too large, it is easy to become overwhelmed with your garden. My personal garden space for veggies is all of 4 feet by 8 feet and I manage to grow a lot of food for my family out of that small space.

Raised gardens are the way to go. The main reason people struggle with their first gardens is because the soil is not ideal for growing. In many cases we don't know what the previous folks who used our land put into the soil. With a raised bed you completely control the soil quality and composition.

Gardens don't need to be fancy. I think the initial barrier to success for many new gardeners, especially that enjoy researching ideas online, is the idea that your garden needs to be beautiful. You literally can create a raised garden by collecting a pile of soil in an area and planting. I would suggest containing that soil in either a rock wall or wood structure, but ultimately it can be whatever you prefer from an aesthetic or budget prospective.

Most vegetables want as much sun as you can provide. Place your garden in an area of your yard that gets around 4 or 5 hours if you can. Limited sun? Veggies like salad greens, broccoli, cauliflower, peas, beets, brussel sprouts, radishes, swiss chard, kale, and beans will grow successfully in dappled shade. In fact, if you have a lot of direct sun, I would suggest growing cucumbers or other vining plants on an elevated trellis to provide some relief to those veggies mentioned above.

You don't need to start seeds indoors to have a successful garden. This is another barrier to success I see often with my well intentioned clients. They try SO hard to get veggies started indoors in these little seed trays, only to time them wrong, water them too much, or too little and end up with failure. If you are just starting out, I would suggest skipping this step. Instead, plant quick germinating seed directly into the soil once the chance of frost has passed. Others plants, like tomatoes and peppers are available in many varieties as plants in the garden center. I would recommend choosing healthy 4 packs or larger individual plants as an alternative to struggling to grow your own plants, especially for the first few years.

Do not expect vegetables to look perfect. Minor blemishes are a natural part of gardening. If you have regularly visited farmers markets or organic sections of grocery stores, you may realize that this is quite common in gardens that are not heavily sprayed. A few leaves with some spots or damage is often not a major concern, however, it is good to observe what is happening in your

garden. If you are concerned about an insect or disease affecting your crop, try diagnosing whether it is a significant problem. Often a little soapy water will solve your pest problems. If you can't figure out the problem, stop by your local garden center, ahem, and ask. We are here to help you become confident in your gardening skills. ■




My husband and I will be celebrating our 50th wedding anniversary this March. How should we celebrate?
