

Since the Fantastic Beasts movies (of which there will eventually be five) are preguels, we can also expect to see younger versions of some of Harry Potter's older associates (or their parents), but the character most teased has been young Aldus Dumbledore, the headmaster at Hogwarts, who will be played by Jude Law, who we'll also see as the villain in next month's King Arthur: Legend of the Sword.

He would star as German criminal Christian Gerhartsreiter, whose decades of fraud and deception climaxed in the 1990s when he pretended to be Clark Rockefeller, a (fictional) member of the famous wealthy family.

This week's news brings clarification that the new Labvrinth film will be set in the "world" of Labyrinth without being either a remake or a direct seguel. And the creative folks that will be developing the new Labyrinth are director Fede Alvarez and screenwriter Jay Basu. In addition to last year's horror hit Don't Breathe, Alvarez also directed another recent remake, 2013's Evil Dead. ■

Imagine the scene: Two hot rods on a dirt road, side by side, revving their well-tuned engines in anticipation of a drag race to finally settle the question of who has the fastest car in the county. The climactic scene of a 1950s "rebel" movie? Maybe. But this will be the reality at this year's Vintage Torque Fest. Ladies and gentlemen, greasers, gearheads, and pinup beauties, Vintage Torque Fest presents: Dirty Drags.

"I guess it was maybe six or seven years ago, this buddy of mine in Indianapolis, he said that we need to have drag racing at our show and it needs to be on the grass or something different," explains Vintage Torque Fest organizer John Wells. "Insurance wouldn't allow us to do it—I looked into it. So this year, we're able to work with the Fairgrounds and so we're going to use the front stretch of the dirt track to drag race."

That's right Torque Fest fans, not just the usual opportunity for hot rod enthusiasts to take laps on the Dubuque County Fairgrounds' dirt track with their vintage ride (which already makes this car show unique) but real head-to-head drag racing. The single elimination contest will advance winners to compete for the top prize in each of two classes, one to be held on Friday night and one on Saturday afternoon.

"Friday night will be Open Class, which is open to 1972 cars and older, which is not

typically what we are about, but we're going to open it on Friday night to allow all those cars in," notes Wells. "Then, Saturday, we're going to do the hot rod drag racing. So it's going to be even more things packed into one weekend."

The inclusion of vintage cars up through 1972, which would include a variety of classic muscle cars, is a bit of a departure from the main focus of Vintage Torque Fest. Occupying a unique niche, Vintage Torque Fest celebrates the "Golden Age" of do-it-yourself hotrods and customs gearheads were building in American garages before the introduction of the "muscle car" in 1965. But extending the boundaries for Friday night's Dirty Drags Open Class competition expands the opportunity for more auto enthusiasts to get involved.

Because the term "hot rod" can be interpreted pretty broadly, it should be noted that Vintage Torque Fest is limited to pre-1965 vintage-style hot rods, pre-1975 motorcycles, and one-of-a-kind customs. Let's unpack the concept a bit.

Vintage Torque Fest celebrates the hot rod culture that sprang up after World War II, when young soldiers returned and began using the technical skills they learned in the military to customize stock vehicles for fun and for racing. They chopped and modified them in all sorts of ways, mostly to make them lighter and more powerful. When the Ford Mustang was introduced in 1965 (well, actually mid-1964), it began the era of the muscle car, essentially taking the hot rod's game plan into the factory. While muscle cars are cool, Torque Fest (and other similar vintage hot rod shows) celebrate the original do-it-yourself aesthetic of that pre-'65 era.

Within that original hot rod and "kustom kulture" aesthetic, you'll see a range of cars at Vintage Torque Fest, from recently saved antique beaters just beginning their journey, to show-room-ready modified masterpieces, painted and pin-striped to the last detail, and everything in between. Yes, you will see some hot rods in progress, maybe lacking a finished paint job, showing visible welds, and even rust that acknowledges the history of the vehicle. But this is not a "rat rod" show. This is a vintage hot rod show that celebrates the DIY customization that can be traced back to the garages of the 1950s and early '60s.

Because the show celebrates kustom kulture, modification both mechanical and artistic is valued over pure restoration. Stock parts are not considered as important as period-appropriate substitutions or modifications. All of them reflect the personalities of the guys that saved them from the salvage yard and keep them running.

What you won't see at Vintage Torque Fest are "street rods" or "art cars." Street rods embrace later materials and technological developments that aren't authentic to the original hot rod style like billet (machined aluminum wheels and parts), airbrushed mural graphics, and digital gauges. Likewise, cars that feature more modern



equipment like independent front suspensions and electronic fuel injection generally do not fit the style, especially on fenderless or open engine cars. Kit cars and cars accessorized through the addition of catalog parts are not consistent with the vintage hot rod practice of scrounging scrap yards and swap meets for period parts and materials.

Art cars are a bit more difficult to define but can include cars painted or accessorized around a theme (skeleton, pumpkin, rat, etc.). If an accessory was added for shock value or humor, the vehicle might be considered an art car.

The show will not accept any cars produced after 1964, unless it's a model that maintained a pre-'65 body style into a later model year. Vintage Torque Fest will accept pre-1949 stock original or restored classics. Some might be surprised that Torque Fest is not all that interested in newer stock classic cars or classics that have been restored using original parts. Not that vintage hot rod enthusiasts don't have a great appreciation for anyone who has labored to preserve or restore an original antique vehicle, but like the later street rods or muscle cars, it's just not the style of this particular show. Keep in mind that the limited focus of this show is what brings hot rod clubs from around the country to Vintage Torque Fest.

In a similar vein, the "Motor Psycho" Round Up is a motorcycle show of vintage pre-1975 custom motorcycles, bobbers and choppers. The show is open to vintage bikes from the likes of Norton, Triumph, Harley Davidson, Indian, BSA, and even Japanese-made motorcycles that fit with the show's old-school/traditional aesthetic. Pre-1975 café racers and pre-1965 stock motorcycles are welcome. Art bikes, stock bikes, twin cam Harleys, and West Coast Choppers or OCC-style customs are not in the vibe of the show.

While newer stock and restored cars, street rods, muscle cars, sports cars and other performance vehicles will not be accepted into the "official" Vintage Torque Fest show, they are welcome at the event and will be able to park in the "Classic and Chrome" or VIP parking areas, in effect an extension of the main show. Likewise, OCC-style custom bikes, touring bikes and post-'75 Harleys are welcome at Torque Fest and will have a special parking area. And for vintage torque purists, Saturday's Dirty Drags competition will be all Vintage Torque Fest qualifying period-correct hot rods. (1964 or older. See Vintage Torque Fest entry requirements for details.) Only 40 cars will be accepted for Friday's Dirty Drags Open Class competition with the top car winning \$500 in a combination of cash and Summit Racing gift certificates. Saturday's Dirty Drags will feature 50 vintage hot rods, competing for the \$1000 purse—\$500 cash and \$500 in Summit Racing gift cards.

The addition of Dirty Drags packs even more activity into an already jam-packed weekend. Sharing the same DIY attitude and "kustom kulture" aesthetic of the hot rod community, Vintage Torque Fest also celebrates the tradition of custom motorcycle builders, from postwar bobbers up through the choppers of the early 1970s. But Vintage Torque Fest is more than just hot rods and motorcycles. It's a celebration of the broader culture with two days of live music from rockabilly to honky tonk country, a vintage parts swap meet, a model car contest, kustom kulture artwork, a variety of vendors, and an ever-popular contest for pinup girls.

As if all that were not enough, Vintage Torque Fest differentiates itself from other "park and sit" car shows by taking full advantage of the Dubuque County Fairgrounds' dirt track. A variety of vehicles have the opportunity to "do it in the dirt," from hot rods to mini-bikes, go-carts, and flat track motorcycles. With all the activity, fans familiar with Torque Fest might be worried that the event won't have time for one of the favorite dirt track activities introduced a couple years ago—chain racing. But rest assured. "We'll still have the chain racing, which is very popular at our show," Wells reports.

For the uninitiated, chain racing is sort of a combination of a stock car race and a demolition derby. Each team has two junk cars. The front car has a working engine but no brakes. The rear car only has brakes. The two are connected by a ten-foot tow chain. Between the two cars and two drivers, the team has to coordinate their acceleration and braking while racing the other teams. Organizers will be muddying up the track for chain racing to reduce both dust and speeds. Wells also reports that they expect more chain racing teams than ever before.

While a variety of vehicles kick dirt on the racetrack throughout the weekend, a busload of bands will be kicking out the jams on multiple stages.







The music starts on Friday at 5 p.m. and continues through the evening with five bands, from rockabilly to surf, to the Detroit rock-n-roll of Mean Mother.

Saturday's musical lineup is even more expansive, starting at 11 a.m. (immediately following the Miss Torque Fest Pinup Contest) and continuing through the day and evening with a variety of great acts from lowa's own Surf Zombies to the rockabilly of Belgium's Shorty Jetson, the vintage twang of Oakland's Jinx Jones, the old school country of the Palomino Shakedowns, the Celtic punk of Whiskey of the Damned, and a couple of co-headliners that Wells is particularly excited about.

"Everybody at Viva Las Vegas last year was going on and on about the Delta Bombers," explains Wells. "I have yet to see them live but based on the traction when we announced that they were playing I think people are going to come out and see all the bands. Real high-energy, not necessarily rockabilly but early rock & roll—say, Elvis before he went into the Army and Little Richard-real roots rock & roll."

The Delta Bombers will be followed by the heavy blues of Mothership. "I'm always happy to see Mothership coming to town," declares Wells. "There is a strong possibility that people should come out and see them (now) because they are probably going to be on tour with Metallica this summer."

Saturday's live music offerings will be even bigger this year with the addition of a third stage, focused on acoustic roots and Americana acts. Other new features include a RC (remote control) demo derby. We're imagining a mash-up of a demo derby and Robot Wars.

Recently added events like the Tuff Mudder Mini Bike Race are returning with even more participants racing their mini bikes through the mini motocross track in the Fairgrounds "back forty." The increasing numbers are all part of a broader trend toward a bigger and better Vintage Torque Fest. Numbers for preregistration, camping, and local hotel reservations indicate great attendance. Now in it's eighth year, Torque Fest is drawing hot rod fans and car clubs from around the Midwest and beyond. With less than ideal weather last year, the event had between 425-450 preregistrations and about 480 cars showed up. Going back to 2015, Torque Fest had only 350-375

preregistrations but with great weather, 800 entries showed up. "Everything is weather dependent, obviously, when you're looking at car count," observes Wells.

Still, Vintage Torque Fest 2017 promises more to see and do in one weekend than anyone could possibly take in. In addition to all the cars, motorcycles, music, and pinup girls, Vintage Torque Fest has even more to do and see with a range of vendors selling hot rod art, vintage clothes and furniture, swap meet car parts and accessories, and so much more.

Torque Fest always features a kustom kulture art auction with a variety of handmade paintings, pinstriping and other one-of-a-kind piece of art with the proceeds going to a medical trust fund for Hannah, daughter of John and Kim Wells and the inspiration for the Helping Hannah's Heart Foundation. Having endured multiple heart surgeries in her young life, Hannah is living proof of the support of the extended motor family. This year, the auction will feature a very unique item, donated from a diehard Vintage Torque Fest fan from Long Island: a rare mini-bike chopper from the late '60s.

While proceeds of the art auction go toward Hannah's medical trust, each year, Torque Fest selects a family to sponsor, donating money from the gate admission to help defray the expenses associated with the medical care of their child. This year's recipient will be the family of young Will Kohn.

"He's actually at Iowa City right now waiting for a heart transplant," noted Wells, adding that he hopes the boy will be able to survive long enough to see the benefit from Torque Fest, and obviously that a transplant will become available. "It's gut-wrenching," he admits. "That's who we're helping this year. Hopefully, people understand that it's a good time but it's also a good cause and this family is behind the eight ball as far as money. So we're hoping to raise a few thousand dollars and give it to them to help out with their bills."







CHAD'S PIZZA AND RESTAURANT



Some of my friends believe there should be three additional food groups on that plate. They are Pizza, Broasted Chicken and Hamburgers. And they insist one of the best places to get all three of these groups is at Chad's Pizza and Restaurant in Dyersville, IA.

Actually, this establishment was severing good pizza, fried chicken and hamburgers long before it was called Chad's Pizza. Leroy Ott opened Leroy's Pizza in 1978 and operated it for 21 years with his wife Duanne. In 1999 Leroy was fatally injured in a car accident so Duanne continued to run the restaurant by herself for a few more years. After she remarried, Duanne Ott Thiel sold the pizzeria to Chad and Amy Clouse. She not only sold the business to Chad but also all of Leroy's cherished recipes and his coveted pizza oven. More importantly Duanne continued to mentor Chad as he learned the business and introduced many new ideas.



For as long as he could remember Chad loved pizza and dreamed of one day owning a pizzeria. When he was young he used to have pizza all the time from Lerov's Pizza. When he was

older he and his sister both worked in a pizza place and Chad discovered pizza was his passion. When Duanne decided to sell her pizzeria Chad seized the opportunity and turned Leroy's into Chad's Pizza and Restaurant.

Chad is a passionate man. You can see his devotion and love for his business the first time you visit. He is almost always in the kitchen standing in front of his oven.

His enthusiasm extends to everything he does and his appreciation for his customers is full on display. Look at the cover of his menu. It has depiction of a baseball on it which is an acknowledgement of all his loyal local patrons and of the customers he has acquired from the nearby Field of Dreams and the development of All-Star Ballpark Heaven.

Even his logo is a display of affection for his favorite music group. The typestyle and lightning bolt are borrowed from the logo of AC/DC Australian Rock Band!





Chad's Pizza is in a word: excellent! I asked him to explain to me why it is so good besides the fact he is an avowed pizza enthusiast. Here are his reasons:

- 1. First of all, all the ingredients are fresh. Fresh vegetables are all diced as needed.
- 2. Only Cortona mozzarella cheese is used. It is shredded on the premises.
- 3. The pizza dough is made in the kitchen.
- 4. So is the tomato sauce. About 12 gallons of sauce is used per day.
- 5. Crumbled pork sausage is made according to his own personal, proprietary recipe. The sausage is made in 1800 pound batches.
- 6. All the toppings and sauce are spread to the very edge of the crust. He insures the toppings are evenly spread out on the pizza so every bite has some of each ingredient in it.
- 7. And most importantly the pizzas are baked in a well-seasoned oven. It is a Roto-Flex Commercial Pizza Oven purchased by Leroy Ott in 1977. This gas fired oven is renowned for cooking pizzas evenly in this case at a steady 625°F.

The pizza is available in five diameter in inches sizes:

- Mini 7
- Small 9
- Medium 12
- Large 14
- Jumbo 16

You can order your pizza custom built by choosing from a list of sixteen toppings plus a gluten-free crust. Or you can order one of the specialty pizzas. The most popular is Chad's Special heaped with pepperoni, home-made sausage, mushrooms, Canadian bacon, onions and green peppers.

The Hawkeye Pizza is a big hit with sports fans. It is loaded with sausage, pepperoni, Canadian bacon, mozzarella plus American and cheddar cheeses and black olives establishing the University of Iowa Black 'n Gold colors.

Taco Pizzas are also in great demand. If you crave the combination of tacos and pizza these 3 pizzas will be your favorites: Taco, Taco Supreme or Chili Taco.

Many locals either pick up or have Chad's Half-Baked pizzas delivered to them. These are the same great pizzas but are half-baked so that they are cooked in the special hot oven and baked on seasoned pizza pans. When you get them home you just finish the baking in your own oven and they taste like they would if you ate them in the restaurant.



The Broasted Chicken is outstanding! Chad is one of only about 5,000 Genuine Broaster Chicken Licensed Trademark Operators in the whole USA. This means he not only cooks in Broaster Fryers exclusively but he also uses Broaster batters and seasonings specifically formulated for use in broasters. (Fun Fact: In 1954 the Broaster Company combined the principles of a pressure cooker and deep fryer into one processor. Pressure frying seals in more of the food's natural flavors and seals out more of the oil resulting in much juicier meats without any oily tastes).



Over several visits I noticed many customers eating appetizers. They all looked like fun things to nibble on while waiting for dinner. The most popular appetizer is the pile of food affectionately called the Garbage Basket. It is a vast assortment of Onion Rings, Muncheez miniature mozzarella stix, Cheddar

Balls, Mini Tacos, Breaded Mushrooms, Jumbo Mozzy Stix and a couple of Breaded Dill Pickle Spears. Other notable appetizers are Chicken Strips, homemade Cheese Bread, and Hot Wings that are marinated and coated in a proprietary Hot Sauce.



Chili is served every day and there are two homemade soups. Some examples are Ground Beef Noodle, Chicken Noodle, Spicy Potato, Broccoli & Cheese and Chicken and Rice.

For light eaters a salad is always a good choice. The current menu has six iceberg lettuce salad offerings. The Chicken Salad is served with either Grilled or Crunchy Fried Chicken. The Tropical Crunchy Chicken contains green peppers, tomatoes, red onions, pineapple, croutons and mozzarella cheese. The Seafood Salad is a favorite of many loyal patrons. It is piled high with crab, eggs, tomatoes, red onions, American cheese and croutons.

Broasted Cod is always a big seller at Chad's. Here's why: Hand cut fillets are marinated for 24 hours then coated with a special batter made according to Leroy Ott's personal recipe. Then they are broasted to a crispy finish.

Both Broasted Cod and Broasted Chicken are sold in Tubs and Combo Party Packs.



Hamburgers are something special at Chad's too. One- third pound burgers are cooked on a flat top. You can order a plain burger or one of Chad's masterpieces. A member of my tasting team really likes the Funk Burger. It is served with bacon, mozzarella and American cheese, onion rings, BBQ sauce and a side of Funk Sauce (whatever that is!).



Other great sandwiches are the Flat Bread Chicken Sandwich with choice of crispy or grilled chicken and red onion, tomatoes, lettuce and melted mozzarella and cheddar

cheese with either honey mustard or homemade ranch dressing. The Steak Sandwich is my favorite. A half-pound of chopped beef is placed inside slices of Texas Toast along with sautéed onions, mushrooms, green peppers and cheese.



Lunchtime is always busy at Chad's. In addition to all the great sandwiches there is an all-you-caneat Lunch Buffet Tuesday through Friday. This always includes Chili, the soup of the day and salad.



BEER BATTERED SHRIMP WITH BROASTED POTATO WEDGES

There is always Pizza and Broasted Chicken on the buffet and usually a pasta dish or a casserole.

Chicken Strips, Beer Battered Shrimp and Broasted Chicken and Cod can be ordered in Baskets including French Fries and Cole Slaw.



The Dinners are all splendid satisfying meals. I particularly enjoyed the Spaghetti Dinner with homemade tomato sauce and tasty garlic toast. The other dinners are Beer Battered Shrimp, Broasted Cod and Broasted Chicken. Here is a little tip: The dinners include your choice of potato (Natural Cut Fries, Beer Battered Fries, or Broasted Potato Wedges), Texas Toast and Soup and Salad bar and they are only one to two dollars more than the baskets.

There is also an All-You-Can-Eat Dinner Buffet on Friday and Saturday nights and Sunday afternoons from 11am to 2pm and nights from 4:30pm to 9pm. The Buffet always has chili, soup, salad, pizza and Broasted chicken. On Friday there is Broasted Cod and on Saturday there is Beer Battered Shrimp. The Sunday Buffet is a traditional Sunday Dinner of Broasted Chicken, Homemade Chicken Stuffing, Mashed Potatoes and a vegetable like corn.

Chad's Pizza and Restaurant has Wi-Fi (password: HoHoHoHo) and sponsors a local softball and bowling team.

The restaurant is so successful the first franchise store recently opened in Cedar Falls, IA. Franchises are available for several more cities.





MILK BY THE GLASS

Walk down a grocery aisle today and you will find a lot of competition for cow's milk. Whether customers have a specific food allergy or just prefer the taste of one over another, customers are exploring their options. Let's take a closer look at some of the competition.

Soy: You'll get a protein boost, plus good percentages of calcium and vitamin D. Be sure to check labels because not all brands are generous in the amount of nutrients they add to their milks.

Almond: Good source of fortified calcium and vitamin D. However, much of the protein is lost in the process of making almond milk.

Cashew: Contains vitamin E, which helps your immune system. Cashew milk can be low in protein, so be sure to read the label!

Coconut: Contains a large proportion of lauric acid, a saturated fat that may help raise your good (HDL) cholesterol, but may also increase your bad (LDL) cholesterol.

Rice: Tasty alternative for vegans and vegetarians who are allergic to soy. Rice milk doesn't contain as much calcium or protein as cow's milk.

Pea: Has 8 grams plant-based protein. (8 grams per 8-ounce serving). Most plant-based proteins do not contain all the amino acids that the body needs to build protein.

What about good old-fashioned cow's milk? According to the National Institutes of Health, two types of

proteins in cow's milk—whey and casein—help preserve lean muscle mass. Cow's milk is an excellent recovery drink for athletes following a strenuous workout. Milk has three simple ingredients: milk, vitamin A and vitamin D. One thing to keep in mind is that milk does contain lactose, a sugar that some people cannot digest or tolerate.

Recent research has indicated that dairy food consumption, including cow's milk, regardless of fat content, may not be associated with an increased risk for cardiovascular disease. A recent study examined the association of dairy fat consumption from all dairy foods with cardiovascular risk among adults enrolled in three large prospective studies.* Results showed no association between dairy fat consumption and risk of cardiovascular disease, coronary heart disease and stroke.

Companies have also been keeping up with this research and have been producing products made with whole milk for customers. As you shop through the aisles at Hy-Vee, you may see more and more whole-milk products, including milk, yogurts and cheese. 
