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

So, anything interesting happen in the news since last issue? Sigh... I thought about talking about it, but why? If you seriously can't decipher the difference between George Washington and Robert E. Lee or the Confederate Flag and the Statue of Liberty, I don't think anything I can write here will ever be able to impress upon you the concept of white privilege. #sad #makeamericanotcrazyagain

But since we're sort of on the topic, let's come a little closer to home and talk about something that might be making people who are uncomfortable with leaving their "safe place" squirm in their tighty whiteys. It's not statues, but it is art.

If you've driven through the Old Main portion of downtown Dubuque in the last month you have to be blind or have a very big problem with the whole driving and looking at your phone at the same time issue to miss the new murals going up all over the area. Where once stood brick or cinder block walls in varying states of aesthetic quality, now manifests bold and colorful feasts for the eyes.

The first ones went up last fall with rave reviews. Now that they are springing up all over, some people seem to be a little uncomfortable with all the change. I get it. Change is hard for some people.

I should have know when I found out Gene Tully and Sam Mulgrew, two of the creative minds behind the now legendary Voices From the Warehouse District, were going to be doing murals downtown, that they weren't going to half-ass it. Go big or go home. Make a lasting impact. You certainly cannot drive down lower Main Street and not be impacted. It's art. It should impact you.

Some letters to the editor and Facebook comments—not the tons that adore the new artwork but the few that don't seem to like it so much-have a variety of gripes about it. Some want the paintings to feature local landmarks and scenes. I understand the desire to localize the imagery. But I also know that you can see a bluff or a paddlewheeler just about anytime you want in this town. Do you really need a painting of those things? I see that at least one of the works features notable lowans in the work. But again, this is art. Knowing the Voices crew, if the projects were going to be super safe art, the kind of pictures you see hanging on the wall in a Perkins, they would not be interested in doing that. I suppose someone might be able to recreate a Grant Wood piece on a wall, but we've seen that. It's just tracing something that's already out there. It's not original work. The mission behind Voices is it's all about originality.

The other beef was about not using local artists. You might not know this, but you don't just crawl up on a ladder for the first time and paint a wall and have it turn out right. The artists that the Voices crew has commissioned to create these new artworks are well known in their field, the very specialized field of mural painting. At least one has recently been recognized as the best in America at what she does. These are professional artists. This is their craft. This is their livelihood. We're fortunate to have to agree to come to Dubuque and share their work. And lucky for us, Dubuque-native Andonia Giannakouros was selected to create a mural at Monk's on Bluff St.

I guess I can't help it if you don't like one or some of the works. Again, I don't believe art is intended to be loved and appreciated by all. I think art that's meant to make everyone happy is called "marketing." Art should challenge and inspire. It should not answer questions but ask them. I agree that public murals should not be offensive or off-putting, but I don't think any of these are like that in any way. I think some people are just really shocked to see so much color on those walls and in some cases, in a very avant garde or abstract way. It's hard to wrap their head around it.

I've not heard much about what the city officials think of them yet, but I'm sure that as soon as they get awards, you'll see them happily added to the roster of community accolades.

I think, when completed, the works will make for a great walking tour of Downtown Dubuque. People will come here to see our murals, not just because they're great but because there are so many. For the next decade, we will become know as the city of murals. And yeah, if the paint wears in 10 years, we can decide then if we cover them with new murals or remove them. Either is an option. Knowing they will not last forever is no reason to not do them. I know my 9-year-old rescue dog won't live forever either, but I'm thrilled he's mine for as long as I have him.

I hope you come downtown soon to check them out. We'll cover this in much more depth soon in *365ink*. They're scheduled to be completed by Labor Day. And they're not all big, nor in highly visible places. That's one of favorite parts. There will be some hidden gems that you'll have to seek out. I hope you seek them with an open mind and a creative spirit and see that these new works of art will bring vitality and energy to an already historic part of our community. Kudos to Gene, Sam, the Voices crew and all of the talented artists for you bold visions and actions.








"NAPKIN NOTES" AUTHOR GARTH CALLAGHAN RETURNS

When he was diagnosed with cancer a third time, he was worried he may not live to see Emma graduate from high school. But he wanted to continue the napkin note tradition. So he set out to write all of the notes Emma would need to see her through to graduation, just in case. He wrote 826 napkin notes in all. Not long after, his book has been featured on been optioned to be a Major Motion Picture by Reese Witherspoon's production Company through New Line Cinema.



Garth had such a profoundly positive experience in Dubuque the first time, he wanted to come back and talk to kids again, especially now that he's even better with the speaking than he was when fame was thrust upon him unexpectedly two years ago. That, and he really wants to see the Field of Dreams in the summertime instead of February. That's a good enough excuse for us!

MANNA JAVA "RISES" AGAIN AS THE MILLWORK BAKERY: FINDING FRIENDS AT INSPIRE CAFÉ BY BRYCE PARKS

If you were disappointed when you heard that Manna Java World Café was closing its doors in the Roshek Building, we're going to take a bit of the sting away. No, you can't have them make you a panini anymore, but you can still get that amazing bread they were known for and make your own. In fact, you actually might be able to have them make the sandwich for you, except from now on, the "they" will be the Inspire Café in Dubuque's Millwork District.

"My lease is coming to an end, and I lost my parents in the last couple of years," explains the woman behind the business and the amazing bread at Manna Java, Georgia Mihalakis. "I thought a lot about my life and what I want to do with it, and I don't want to work like that anymore. It's really a lot of stress, and I wanted to do something different. It got to be a real grind. You go home tired everyday and don't have a lot of enjoyment. Just work and sleep and work and sleep."

It wasn't that Georgia didn't love parts of her work, but it's the part that shifts to her when you find yourself in charge. After 15 years, she now gets to do what she likes most again. Thus is born the Millwork Bakery.

"I get to bake. I get to create. I always wanted to try new things in the bakery but never really had the time or the energy after I'm through with everything else. And the chance for some solitude now after working with so many people so much is good. It's healthy—cathartic."

Finding a new home was part going back to what you know and part making great new friends. That friend is Sara Post, owner of Inspire Café in the Schmid Innovation Center.

"We were talking as we were already involved in a couple of different things together," explains Georgia. "I helped her, and she helped me, and it got to be a mutually beneficial relationship. We like each other and work well together. So this is a good place for me to start again. I already have some wholesale clients in place from before I did this. It wasn't about finding a place to work from. We were just friends, and it just kind of happened."

"We're part of the women's collective group, too, and that really helped," adds Sara Post. "Mary Parkin brought that together. It was really an eye opener to see how many strong women business owners were actually in the downtown area. And Georgia just has so much experience in the business world. I started complaining to her about stuff, and she was there to have a shoulder, and that was a big help. And we just started talking about different business opportunities, and it's been a really fun relationship."

When you're in this business, no one else really understands what goes into it unless they're in it too.

"I started my bakery in Tim McNamara's building in the warehouse district when I opened at the Roshek Building ,and now I'm back here again," says Georgia with a smile. "The rent is cheap, and it's a nice,

quiet place to work. I'd eventually look at getting a retail outlet for my stuff, but right now I'm just going to do this and see how it goes, and if it goes well, maybe I never have to have a retail outlet. Maybe I can take advantage of existing outlets. I don't want to get back into the whole thing all over again. Right now I have low rent, limited payroll and very limited expenses, so it's good."

"I'd love to see her expand things," adds Sara, "and have a bigger display rack and sell more bread and more different things from the Millwork Bakery. I think it's really, really needed down here. A lot of the tenants across this whole Millwork area are starting to come in and buy bread, and now with the co-op gone, there's a need there."

One of those new things she wanted to try was donuts. And man, she's got game.

"The donuts were something new that I wanted to do, and I get immediate gratification. I just bring them over [to Inspire Café], and everybody eats them, and I make more. We'll have all of our breads here, too. We've got a deli rye, whole wheat sourdough, white sourdough, cranberry walnut, crusty French, multigrain, and we're going to keep adding new breads to our line. In October, we're going to add a new line of gluten-free breads that are made with real grains, not all that other stuff like xanthin gum and this and that. They look good





but don't taste good. These will actually taste good. Twenty-five percent of our population is gluten intolerant, so there's a big market for it. A lot of people will go out of their way looking for that kind of bread."

"They're going over great," Sara Post shares. "It's like a love-filled donut. I'm probably going to gain 20 pounds because of if but... you know when you get a filled donut and you take a bite and there's nothing there, there's just stuff in one corner of the donut. You take a bite of these and the whole thing is complete jam packed with goodness. It's just really exciting, they're so good. And I had customers yesterday that bought bread and then wanted us to make their sandwiches on the bread they bought. So we talked about putting her breads on our menu. So I'm going to be upping our menu, adding new ingredients and then using her bread for our sandwiches. "

Speaking of new things, Inspire Café has some great

changes on the way, too.

"There's so much that changes after you open. Our menu has grown quite a bit already. In the fall we're going to be switching up things, too. We're going to be adding vegan and vegetarian options as well as tofu and doing Buddha bowls (hearty, filling dishes made of various greens,

raw or roasted veggies, beans and a healthy grain) which are going to be unique. And we've got a lot of local events like hosting local art and speaker series. We're going to be partnering with the colleges to have theater performance coming down soon as well."

Maybe it's time you discovered Inspire Café and the Millwork Bakery, all in one convenient stop. Inspire Café is located at 955 Washington St., Suite 105, Schmid Innovation Center. HERITAGE CENTER IS YOUR

It feels like we were just

writing about the inaugural season of the University of Dubuque's amazing new Heritage Center just the other day, but apparently it's been four years already, as the stunning performing arts facility has announced its fifth season. However, back then it was a nine event season we were touting. This season, there are 21 incredible shows taking the stages—yes more than one—to the delight of Tri-State area residents and students of all ages. Prepare to be wowed!

As you'll discover in the following interview, like a duck on water, much of the work and impact of Heritage Center is happening where you can't see it, with on-campus students and thousands of Tri-State K-12 students who take in many performances and educational partnerships with the venue and its staff throughout the school year. Add in the amazing slate of high profile public performances, and the impact on the arts in the Dubuque community from the University of Dubuque is impressive. But as you might imagine with a successful organization, at least one person still thinks they can do more.

"A lot of it is a work in progress," said Thomas Robbins, special assistant to the president and executive director of Heritage Center. "I've always had the philosophy, with any program, if you don't continue to evolve it, it's going to die off. So every year we try to change things up and try new things, with the idea being that we want our core programming to reach out to younger folks, from little kids to college students who are our primary audience. With that said, we'd be foolish not to also appeal to the community, because Heritage Center is a wonderful facility and it allows us a great opportunity to do outreach."

"It's a delicate balance, and we're still trying to find what that balance is while also finding ways to compliment other performing arts venues in the area. We are finding our niches, and I think one of those niches is multicultural programming, which I think this year is a major feature on our season. The professional level family programming is another niche we're filling very well, where grandparents and grandchildren can come together and enjoy an intergenerational style of programming together."

The campus vision of Heritage Center is "Arts by Osmosis." There are many first generation college students without extensive exposure to the arts coming into the university setting. Anything Robbins and his staff can do to lure them in to the arts, even through subconscious exposure, is a win.

"We do things in the building where you don't have to come into the theater. We've got the Cyber-Café's Knapp Stage where we'll do a noon concert to

pique interest. We do meet-and-greets after most of our shows, trying to make the experience as interactive as possible. So it's not just people sitting in their seats having a passive experience. Though there's certainly something to be said for the live entertainment experience," Robbins said. "We do a lot with outreach in terms of workshops and master classes, lecture demonstrations, taking artists into the classroom and not just on our campus. We've been out to a number of area K-12 schools and will continue to do that this year because our primary mission is to inspire an interest in the arts among young people."

By simply having Heritage Center existing, the university has increased the probability of a UD student interacting with the arts substantially. There are places in the building that lend themselves to a happenstance experience with arts. If you walk by the choir room where the doors are often open, you will see and hear students performing. It's a main corridor that students pass through going from the residential to the classroom side of the campus.

"They're hearing the choir singing and looking down through the scene shop windows at sets being built," Robbins said. "The band room is viewable from the outside as it's completely glass enclosed. You can sit in the cafe and still enjoy the Bisignano Art Gallery."

Student engagement directly with the arts has increased exponentially, and it's showing in the numbers.

"For our CenterStage Series, we're pushing close to 25 percent of our audience being UD students. I think you would find that's almost unheard of on most college campuses. Overall, on average, we fill to about 2/3 capacity with most events," Robbins said.

With the theme of finding their niche, it's important to Robbins that there's not a lot of duplication with the kinds of things going on out in the community. So another niche they've carved out is with their schools series. The SchoolBus Performance Series is generally not open to the public, so you don't know it's happening all school-year-long, but they bus kids in from an hour radius of Dubuque for performances. Some shows have public performances and school showings, but some are actually for schools only. That practice has grown tremendously to the point where the first year's 3,000 participating students grew to 12,500 students attending last year.

Naturally, the growth of participation in the "Live at Heritage Center" SchoolBus Performance Series is in great part because the series went form three events in 2013–2014 to 10 events for 2017–2018. Sometimes an event receives multiple performances. For example, doubling as Family Series performance and SchoolBus performance.

"It's a great side benefit that these are local school kids being exposed to our campus and one of the nicest facilities on campus, and they'll remember that as the grow up," Robbins said.

With the fifth season, Robbins has been able to reach into a genre that's long been on his bucket list for the venue—Broadway!

"We have not done Broadway to date, but with this year's *Amazing Grace* performance we're dipping our toe in those waters," Robbins said. "It's a show that played on Broadway for 170 performances. We actually have an alumni connection to the show. B.J. Weber went through the University of Dubuque Theological Seminary in the '70s. He then went to New York in 1979 and met Carolyn Rossi Copeland, who was the creator and producer of this musical. Some of what went into this musical was a direct result of his experience here at the seminary. This will be the biggest touring production we've ever presented, with three or four trucks worth of set pieces and a labor call of 50 people to load it in. Hopefully it's a start of more like it."

That performance is strategically placed in the season on Fat Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday.

Heritage Center will be reaching out to area churches to fill the seats, possibly adding a second performance if necessary. The performance is the story of the lyrics behind "Amazing Grace," perhaps the most iconic Christian song in all of history. With a lot of local interest in faith-based entertainment in Dubuque, Robbins is excited about the possibilities for that show and is already in talks with other touring companies to continue the Broadway theme in following seasons. He's confident that John and Alice Butler Hall is the right venue for productions of this size and scope.

"One of the wisest decisions made in regard to the design of Butler Hall was limiting the venue to 950 seats in a large space. Bigger seats, wider aisles, more comfort, great sight lines. We're very fortunate with the acoustics. Obviously there was an acoustical engineer involved in the process and science behind it, but acoustics are an art and a science and there's some luck involved and we hit the jackpot. Whether you're attending an acoustic event or an amped event, the acoustics are excellent for any event," Robbins said.



From the beginning, Heritage Center has been eager to partner with other community arts organizations including The Northeast Iowa School of Music (NISOM) on their annual ChamberFest Orchestra Concert. The Irish Hooley's presentation of The Celtic Tenors and the Heartland Ballet/ Academy of Ballet on a production of *Giselle*." They have also made accommodations to work with the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra and the Dubuque Chorale. In addition, they have hosted presentations by Hempstead and Senior High Schools in Butler Hall as well as hosted high school band and choral festivals and served as site for annual DAYLC (Dubuque Area Youth Leadership Council) Ceremony.

This season, Heritage Center is fortunate to partner with the Dubuque Arts Council to participate in a program called the Arts Midwest World Fest where four amazing world music groups will visit the campus and community over the next two years.

"We're the only site in Iowa where these groups will appear," Robbins said. "We're one of nine communities in nine states participating. These groups will be out in the schools all week and will culminate in a big performance here on our stage at the end of the week. This year it's this Israeli group, Sofi and the Baladis, and in the winter we have the Taiko drummers Ondekoza. Next year, Manchu, a group from China, and the Unni Boksasp Ensemble from Norway will perform."

The Dubuque Arts Council already had a giant crowd for the Texas Tenors this year, and now they're bringing in the Vienna Boys Choir on Nov. 17 at 7:30 p.m. <u>in partnership</u> with the University of Dubuque.

Another new idea for the upcoming season is including the innovative Babka Black Box Theater in the featured touring performance schedule. The B.I.T.E. Size Theatre (Babka Intimate Theatre Experiences) will be general admission with stadium seating to the balcony level. Robbins said the new series has motivated Heritage Center staff to find programs that connect with curriculum.

"The first show, *The Kite Runner*, all of our sociology classes read *The Kite Runner*, and it just so happened that was a touring show we could bring in from the touring Literature to Life group," Robbins said. "*The Accidental Hero* has a link with our Sergeant Jeffrey B. Dodge Veterans Center through a World War II story and we have a ROTC program on campus as well. And then with aviation, we present *Charles Lindbergh: The Lone Eagle*."

"The last one is just for fun. 6 Guitars is one guy playing six characters: a blues guitarist, a jazz guitarist, a rock and roll guitarist, a country guitarist. The personalities are quite amazing. I've seen him do the show," Robbins said. "It's big on the fringe festival circuit. I thought Babka wasn't getting enough exposure as a performance venue. We do some of our student productions there, but we haven't done anything on a touring level in there until now."

The Family Series and SchoolBus Series have continued to be popular, proving to bring some of the fullest crowds each year. We mentioned these professional level theater companies performing children's theater earlier, as of the niche's Robbins is aiming to fill.

"STEM is a huge concept in the schools. I like to change it to STEAM, including the arts in the curriculum equation," Robbins said. "So our SchoolBus Series this year has three science based shows. The first is a tour through the solar system, which includes a live Skyped conversation with an astronaut through students' schools before they come to the show here. Another one is a story on the Wright Brothers, again with the aviation tie-in. But none of that is public, all behind the scenes with area schools. You can infuse arts in your teaching even if you're not an art teacher, and we're proving that here. Infusing creativity makes the subject matter less dry and maybe drives the point home a little bit better."

"One other niche we've tried to establish is being the only venue in the Tri-State area to regularly present professional touring dance companies and ensembles. For example, we have brought in Ensemble Español, Jump Rhythm Jazz Project, Step Afrika! and Pilobolus Dance Theater. These are world class dance companies. This year we continue the tradition by presenting FLY Dance Company. We intend to continue presenting at least one professional dance company each season in order to continue to build an appreciation for the often underrepresented art form."

From big time touring Broadway in Butler Hall to oneperson shows on the Babka Stage, the breadth and diversity of programming in a season is impressive. We assumed that sifting through everything that is out there to most effectively match programming with their mission can be daunting. Fortunately, this is where experience comes in handy.

"It's a lot of networking," Robbins said. "I've been booking for close to 25 years, and you build up a network, not only with other venues, but carving out meaningful relationships with agents and artists that endure over time. Black Violin, for example, is our opening event of this season. But it was also one of our grand opening events, however, the general public may not know that because it was an in-house event. It's an interesting dichotomy of classical music, hip-hop and R&B. String players with a DJ behind them, imagine that. We wanted to open our fifth season with that because it was such a hit with our students. So it's a back by popular demand attraction."

Robbins plans to attend the Midwest Arts Conference in a couple of weeks. He said that begins the process of booking the 2018–2019 season, even though he already has a folder full of ideas.

"That conference will start the in-depth meetings with agents or artists and start penciling in dates," Robbins said. "We want to have a balance. We want to have a mix, a variety that appeals to many different tastes and sometimes we have to do that over the course of multiple seasons. A lot of it is about relationships."

titled *Puppet Up! – Uncensored*. The show is a cross between Second City and the *Muppets*.

"It's one of those events that meets our criteria of what will the students like that will also appeal to the community," Robbins said. "We're always looking for crossover appeal. Not just student and community, but across generations and cultures. If the arts can't bring people together, what can?"

Heritage Center also boasts a Heritage Performing Arts Advisory Committee composed of students. Robbins said he wants students to have a legitimate and direct voice into the programming decisions.

"Seven students will be coming with me to the conference. We take their feedback very seriously. Perhaps they even develop an interest in doing the kind of work I do or the work of others in our staff after their college experience," Robbins said.

We didn't dig too far into the main stage shows for the season in this interview. You can find details on all of those shows on UD's website, DBQ.edu, and we will continue to highlight them in detail one at a time as they come up. We did provide a list on page 23 to this story to wet your whistle. But you may very much want to act fast and get you season tickets now to lock in great seats for all of the performances. Being a CenterStage Series subscription tickets holder also comes with a lot of added benefits, most notably discounted tickets off single ticket prices. Single ticket sales are now also open for the full season too, so pick your shows and reserve your seats now before it's too late!

With a couple of *America's Got Talent* acts on the slate this year and the return of UD's favorite son Tony Danza, I asked Robbins if any of the bookings for this season were particularly unique in how they came <u>about</u>.

"Ever since I found out Jeff Daniels was touring and doing this kind of show, it's been on my radar," Robbins said. "Our venue is larger than what he likes to play, and he generally doesn't do colleges. So I attended his show in Oshkosh because my buddy runs the venue and I thought, maybe if I meet him and get to talk to him and plead my case a bit it would help, and I think that's a big part of why we landed the show. It's an amazing show full of originals with wonderful storytelling that leads seamlessly into every song and also hilarious."

"More Broadway is still on my bucket list. I'd love to see that on our stage a couple of times a year. The bigger these shows get, the more difficult it gets. Touring theater is cost prohibitive on so many levels. If we do Broadway, we're going to be doing it as an investment in building an audience. And there's a danger in that because once you do a Broadway product, will people still want to see simpler straight-forward theatre productions like we had with *Great-Gatsby*, a wonderful show without huge production values? You have to remain sensitive to the market. You always want to bring a bigger name for the students, but 950 seats and big name tours don't always mesh. Blue Man Group would be a bucket list show for me. A perfect storm of the students and community enjoying it. And that could take us into a multi-night run of a show, making it economically viable to bring it to town."

Finally, I asked Robbins to reflect on the first four years of Live at the Heritage Center. What sticks on his mind? In addition to an example of his staff having to think quick on their feet to solve an unfortunate late cancellation (compiled with multiple layers of SNAFU complexity mixed-in) which, in the end, was a story of making good with a loyal audience, most of his memories are very good. Robbins' favorite moment so far was not on stage. In fact, it happened just before the first show ever staged at the Heritage <u>Center</u>.

"Tonight Show Bandleader Doc Severinsen was our first ticketed event in the facility. I'll never forget when Doc arrived here, he walked in and looked around, impressed with the venue, but he said, 'Do you have any good candy stores in the area?' I said, 'I've got just the place!' We hopped in University van, just me and Doc, and I took him over to Betty Jane Candies and he stood at the counter for literally 20 minutes. He carefully picked two pounds of candy, one at a time. He was oblivious that anyone was waiting behind him. He finally finished picking out his two boxes of candy and went to check out and he looked to the right and said, 'Oh, they got ice cream here, too?' He's got a double scoop in one hand and candy in the other, and we're walking out and Doc said, 'Well, show me around your town a little bit. I'd like to get to know Dubuque.' We went to the Fourth Street Elevator because it's the best view in town, and he was impressed, even mentioning it at the show that night. I don't think I've ever spent an hour alone with an artist in all of my history doing this. So obviously that stands out."

Overall, it's not really any one performer that sticks in Robbins' mind but the people who attend the shows,

"The events that I'm often most delighted with even more than the big names are things that people come to because they've developed a trust with our programming. They're not sure what to expect, but they walk out of here floating on air because they've had such a great experience. They experienced something new and they were elated. And people who go to the pre-show lectures leave that experience with a greater appreciation of what they're going to experience in the main theater. If you have a more informed experience you have a better experience. When people expand their horizons a bit, expand their boundaries with something new, that's very gratifying," Robbins said.



Just brewed coffee and fresh baked bagels are just so delicious together. Millions of people have discovered the pleasures of sitting down with a flavored coffee and a scrumptious bagel slathered with cream cheese.

Perhaps nobody understands this better than the owners of Caribou Coffee & Einstein Bros. Bagels. The parent company of both of these businesses is the investment arm of the Reimann family of Germany: JAB Holding Company (Johann Adam Benckiser) headquartered in Luxembourg.

The company has built a very impressive empire consisting of several fashion (Jimmy Choo Ltd) and beauty (Coty, Inc.) corporations and world class coffee, tea and baking enterprises. A partial list of its subsidiaries includes Jacobs Dowe Egberts Coffee and Tea Company, Peet's Coffee and Tea, Intelligentsia Coffee and Tea, Stumptown Coffee Roasters, Keurig Green Mountain and Krispy Kreme Doughnuts.

(Fun Fact: Last month JAB Holding Company finalized the purchase of its latest acquisition, Panera Bread for 7.5 Billion dollars!)

A few years ago the parent company decided to unify the knowledge and expertise of some of these coffee purveyors and bakeries and launched the concept of connecting Caribou Coffee & Einstein Bros. Bagels stores.

Dubuque's Caribou Coffee & Einstein Bros. Bagels is the sixtieth combined store. Another fifty will be opening soon throughout the United States.

Opening day for the Dubuque location was August 4, 2017. Already there are approximately 30

employees. The store offers free Wi-Fi and Dubuque's only coffee drive-through open at 5:00 am.

Except for the Daily Coffee all drinks are brewed when ordered and all sandwiches are hand-crafted to order. This means you might have to wait a few minutes for your sandwich. This is a casual dining establishment and not a fast food joint.




Joanne Hillery is the General Manager. She is a native Dubuquer and is a licensed social worker. She has been in retail management for over 20 years in several stores including Old Navy and The Gap. She worked in a Des Moines Caribou Coffee & Einstein

Bros. Bagels and lived in a hotel for almost 10 weeks while training for the GM position. (Fun Fact: Joanne is a singer and musician and is a regular cast member in many of the productions at the Bell Tower Theater.)

The rest of the leadership team is comprised of Assistant Manager Front of the House Karen Ellis, Assistant Manager Back of the House Kelly Allman and Certified Head Baker Cathy Moon.

Team Members are trained and certified for specific positions. Any Team Member can be certified for more than one job function including sandwich maker and cashier. Specialized training is provided for Baristas and Bakers.



The Signature Coffees are all brewed to order. Some of the specialties include a Turtle Mocha with caramel, whip and turtle topping and Campfire Mocha with toasted marshmallow, whip and chocolate chips.

The Classics include Mocha, Latte, Cappuccino, Chai Tea Latte, Hot Chocolate and the Northern Lite Latte.



All Signature drinks are available hot, iced or blended. All Classic drinks are served either hot or iced. When ordering any chocolate drink you will be asked to choose, milk,

dark or white chocolate. Caribou Northern Lite drinks are made with sugar-free syrups, espresso and skim milk.



The Blended Caribou Coolers, Coffeeless Coolers and Smoothies are really desserts in a glass. I really like the Chocolate Caribou Cooler and my favorite is the Brownie Coffeeless Cooler. This decadent concoction is made with brownie brittle blended with

chocolate sauce, half & half, and a signature shake mix topped with whipped cream and more brownies. I think I am committing a sin just thinking about having one of these!



Einstein Bros. Bagels are baked to exacting standards. They are slacked and proofed in a time sensitive carefully controlled temperature and humidity environment. They are baked in specially designed steam ovens.

On most days baking bagels begins at 2:00 am. Then fresh bagels are baked every 4 hours. At the end of the day leftover bagels are either donated to charity or discarded.

There are 17 Classic and 7 Gourmet Bagels on the menu. Five of the Classic Bagels are considered the standards and are always available. These are: Plain, Asiago, Honey Whole Wheat, Cinnamon

Raisin and the Everything Bagel. (Fun Fact: Ever wonder what is really on the Everything Bagel? Garlic, Onion, Poppy Seed and Sesame Seed.)

The Gourmet Bagels have their flavors baked in. If you have not tried these I urge you to do so because the flavors just seem to pop in your mouth. The Power Protein, Six Cheese, Cheesy Hash Brown and Apple Cinnamon are all very popular. I especially like the Cheddar Jalapeño, Spinach Florentine and Green Chile.

Bagels can be ordered plain, toasted, with butter, honey, jelly, hummus, Nutella or peanut butter. Of course, most true Bagel lovers will eat their bagels with a Cream Cheese Shmear.

The available regular Shmears are Plain, Onion & Chive, and Smoked Salmon. The Reduced Fat choices are Plain, Blueberry, Garden Veggie, Garlic & Herb, Honey Almond, Jalapeño Salsa, Maple and Strawberry. (Fun Fact: Shmear or Schmear is an American English word borrowed from the Yiddish language. It originally meant "cheese" and now refers to "anything that can be spread".)

It is always better to buy bagels here in quantity. They really are cheaper by the dozen or even half dozen. For example: a plain bagel is \$1.35, 6 for \$1.13/ bagel and 13 for \$.87/bagel. With shmear, a bagel is \$2.85, 6 for \$1.55/bagel, and 13 for \$1.18/bagel.

Gourmet Bagels are an additional 60¢ each.

If you only go to Caribou for coffee you are missing out on some terrific meals. All of the Einstein sandwiches are really good and most of them are bursting with unusual flavors. All the sandwiches are available from open to close. And all of them are made to order so you can customize them to suit your own preferences. In most cases ingredients can be substituted. For example, if you don't want cucumber or onion tell the cashier to leave them off or if you want avocado ask to have it added. Some upgrades including a second egg, gourmet bagel or extra cheese, for example, do require a slightly higher cost.

Each sandwich description specifies a particular bagel or potato roll. These are only suggestions. You can order your sandwich on any available bagel.

Lunch or dinner sandwiches are accompanied by your choice of a side of Potato Chips, Potato Salad or Fresh Fruit. These sides can also be purchased separately. Here are just a few of the outstanding sandwiches:

- Farmhouse cage-free egg, thick cut bacon, smoked ham and cheddar cheese. The Country Pepper Shmear is made in-house from cream cheese and cracked pepper.
- Southwest Egg White egg white, turkey sausage, pepper jack cheese with Tomato Salsa and Plain Schmear on a Thintastic Bagel. What is a Thintastic Bagel you say? It means your sandwich maker slices the bagel in half and cuts out some of the dough so you get a thinner bagel with fewer carbs.
- Ham & Swiss smoked ham, lettuce, tomato, red onion, mayo and deli mustard and Swiss cheese. (Fun Fact: This is called a Ham & Swiss. However I could order it with cheddar, mozzarella or pepper jack instead of Swiss cheese.)



- Chorizo Sunrise egg, a tasty chorizo patty, avocado, pepper jack cheese, Jalapeño Salsa Shmear on a Green Chile Gourmet Bagel. (Fun Fact: Chorizo (cho-REE-zo) is a highly seasoned cured and smoked pork sausage. Mexican chorizo is typically seasoned with vinegar and red chili peppers and Spanish chorizo is flavored with garlic and smoked paprika called pimentón. This is why they both have a distinctive red color.)
- Salmon Nova Lox Nova Lox, red onion, capers tomato and Plain Shmear open face on a plain bagel. (Fun Fact: traditional Lox is salt-cured or brined, sliced thin and never cooked or smoked. Nova Lox is from Nova Scotia and is cold smoked after the curing or brining process. It is exposed to smoke at about 80°F without being cooked so it remains moist and silky with a translucent pink color.)

Bagel Toppers are open faced bagel sandwiches on any bagel you choose. There are three on the current menu:



 Herbivore – cream cheese, arugula, tomato and cucumber.



- Spicy Devil Jalapeño Shmear, lots of crumbled bacon and jalapeño slices. This one is spicy hot and I love it!
- Nutty Monkey Nutella, bananas and almonds.

DEATH BE A LADY TONIGHT BY BOB GELMS

Well, I have to pass this along. According to Michael Poore in his latest, *Reincarnation Blues*, the whole "death" thing is nothing like we have come to expect it to be. First off, the moment you die you get an escort and not, surprisingly enough, the Grim Reaper, Death, the Pale Rider, or Satan.

In this case, Death is a woman named Susie who isn't scary at all and her job has been greatly exaggerated. She escorts you to see two old women, Mama and Nan. It is they who decide whether or not you have used your life to become one with the universe, gain total wisdom, or get it right. Apparently, you get 10,000 opportunities and then awaiting you is eternal oblivion.


Our hero, Milo, is eaten by a shark this time around. Milo had already used up 9,995 lives and Nan and Mama were more than a little impatient because Milo still hadn't figured it all out. They had a strong suspicion that he was doggin' it because, you see, Milo was hopelessly in love with Death.....sorry.....Suzie.

Nan and Mama figured Milo liked dying so he could be with Suzie for a while before he had to go back and try for total enlightenment one more time. He only had five chances left. Nan and Mama were so upset they started sending him back as a bug and other humiliating things but Milo kept putting himself in harm's way.

Among other methods of dying, Milo had had a steel girder dropped on him, was executed three times, beheaded in China, hanged, shot, crushed, speared, run over by a chariot, and died 14 times in combat. His favorite death, however, was when he was captured by the Turks and flung by catapult back over the wall at Vienna. Awaiting him at the end was his true love, Death.....I'm sorry.... Suzie. She was always waiting for him.

If you believe in evolution, please note: you don't come from dust, no matter what they say. You come from water and you go back to water when you die. Milo woke up by water virtually every time he died and Suzie was there waiting. She loved Milo. Together they hatched a complicated plot where they would go back together and live happily ever after. That wasn't working out too well. So, Suzie was prepared to quit her job. She was the only Death. There was no precedent.

As I hope you have guessed by now, this is a wildly imaginative novel after



the fashion of a 20th-century master, Kurt Vonnegut. In my opinion, Mr. Vonnegut's best novel is *Cat's Cradle* and Mr. Poore's book has a lot of the same themes in it. They both have different styles and Mr. Poore does not try to be Kurt Vonnegut. They both have very different strengths. They are both exceptionally funny. I laughed out loud a few dozen times at *Reincarnation Blues*, mostly at Milo's mischievousness. The book is an unequivocal joy to read.

I'm not sure Mr. Poore was saying anything cosmically profound through the characters of Nan and Mama, though come to think of it maybe he was. They seem to take the place of God. Death could very well be a woman and God could be two old biddies. Anything at all beats the portrayal of God in the Old Testament. Who the hell am I to say?

Milo is supposed to represent all humans and Death....sorry...Suzie represents part of immortal beings we know nothing about. After reading Mr. Poore's book I no longer believe in Death. I do however believe in Suzie. She is everything I want the Grim Reaper to be. I might, if I could, point out the obvious: there is absolutely no mention of hell anywhere in the book. None of the characters seem to have read Dante's *Inferno*.

Nan and Mama are the caretakers of humanity, surely it's a better job for God than the Supreme Threatener, the Almighty Smiter of Cities, the Celestial Bringer of Floods, or the Cosmic Vendor of Hellfire and Brimstone.

It would be utterly pointless for Mr. Poore to write a sequel, as this book is as close to perfect as you can get. Everything works astonishingly well and "a good time is guaranteed for all."

Enter at your own risk; *Reincarnation Blues* will not leave you alone. It will keep poking you in the chest until you finish it and then it will live on in vivid Technicolor inside your head." What a long strange trip it's been."
