

While each issue of 365ink has traditionally been somewhat of a whirlwind of chaos until we finally put a cork in it on Wednesday night and have a finished product, one thing that usually is not my problem to solve is dishing up a tasty food review article. In fact, each of those is usually a treat for me because all I have to do is reap the rewards off eating another fine meal. The work for that column has always gone to my good friend Rich Belmont. With the last issue, I'm sorry to say that Rich has to hang up his fork from full-time food writing, and we are all the less for it.

I first met Rich Belmont more than a decade ago through the Captain Merry restaurant in East Dubuque. When it came time for me to look for a "foodie" to help me tell the stories of local food, Rich came immediately to mind. If only I could have know then how much I knocked it out of the park with that connection. Since then, Rich has penned almost 200 completely original, creative and unique food review columns for 365ink under the name Argosy's Food For Thought.

For almost every one of those 200 food reviews, which I avoided doing the hard part of writing about it, I did get to go out to dinner with Rich and his wife, Margie, to partake of the goodness he was writing about. Through those many dinners together we have become great friends. Along the way we have collected a crew, or a "dining team," to accompany us on each visit. When you have six, eight or ten people dining, you get a great variety of photos to support the articles. And we generally all try each others food throughout the meal so by the end, everyone at the table is well versed in the flavors of each venue. Many people have been able to be part of the team over the years, maybe you were one of them. But the core of the team has always been Rich Margie, Kristina from 365ink and myself. My wife, Christy, and my mom, Fran, have also been regulars on the journey. And Rich would always pick up my mom on his way to meet us for dinner. Thanks Rich!

Being mostly retired, Rich has the flexibility to really pour his time and energy into these articles, something I could never do myself with my frenetic schedule. And as if that were not enough of a great benefit to me, Rich never asked to be paid to write the articles. When I could afford it, I tried to pick-up the check, but in 200 issues, I'm sure he got as many as I did. I don't think it was ever about the money as much as it was about the experience. And Rich was amazing at finding experiences I'd never have had without him. I'm a better person, if a bit fatter, for it. Rich always made us get dessert, you know, for the pictures!


We have eaten at places that I've never heard of, and some of them are right in my backyard. From the hidden gems like Spruce Harbor in Bellevue to lavish nights of food porn like Goldmoor near Galena, my eyes were opened to dining opportunities that were soon to be opened to everyone who picked up a copy of 365ink.

Rich is fine by the way. His doctor just made him make some big changes to his diet that makes doing in-depth food reviews very difficult, and Rich never half-assed his articles. So rather than write about food he can't eat, he's chosen to lay down his pen and his french fries. Rich didn't just drop into a place and write it up; for a week, he would descend on a restaurant like a one-man locust swarm and absorb all that was to be known about it. He would eat there two, three, four times, including the team dinner where we would take photos. He would interview owners and chefs and research the history of the businesses, the buildings, the communities and even the history of the food styles they served. This on top of what he already knows about food, which is extensive. He's the Cliff Clavin of food trivia. This comes from a long career as a traveling salesman who because a professional at taking clients to dinners across the country. By the time he retired, not only was he a pro, he was also teaching food service skills to area restaurant staff.

Rich always finds the best in each place we go. If he thinks a place sucks, well, we just don't write about them. If a place is not great but has a few high points, he will focus on the high points. He will also be blunt with the owners and give them advice whether they want it or not. These are often people with a lot of pride, so I imagine they don't always love it. But once they sit and think about it, the input Rich gave them is for the betterment of their venue. But those helpful comments or criticisms don't make it to the columns. He tries to present each restaurant in the best light possible, as he's always on the side of food entrepreneur, wanting to see them all succeed. As we've reviewed 45 places that no longer exist, you can see that this is not an easy business in which to make a go of it.

Moving ahead, I will be sharing food writing duties with two great new foodies. Yes, I think it'll take three of us to keep up with the high bar Rich set. Sunil Malipati and Danny Fairchild are food experts of sorts in their own rights. Well, I know they love good food and are both fantastic writers, so we can't go wrong. And I'm hoping that now and again, Rich and Margie can still join us as part of our tasting teams because this tradition is not about writing food stories anymore; it's about catching up with family on a regular basis.

So let me say thank you Rich and Margie too. Thank you for putting your passion into your work and consistently doing so issue after issue for so many years. Last In Line (featuring Dio's Vivian Campbell and Vinnie Appice) takes the stage at the Mississippi Moon Bar inside Diamond Jo Casino on Friday, April 20 at 8 p.m.

The band Last In Line takes its name from the second Dio album released in 1984. Vinny Appice, Jimmy Bain and Vivian Campbell (yes, that Vivian Campbell) were Ronnie Dio's co-conspirators and co-writers on the Holy Diver, Last In Line, and Sacred Heart albums. These records have gone on to become part of rock history.

During that first jam it was apparent that the chemistry of the original band was very much intact, even after a 27



year hiatus. Hearing Andrew's interpretations of the original Dio songs was a revelation, and the inspiration to move forward as a band. Last In Line's debut album, *Heavy Crown*, was released in February 2016, hitting No. 1 on the Billboard Heat-Seekers Chart, with the singles "Devil In Me" and "Starmaker" leading the charge. 2017 and 2018 bring Last in Line into the studio to record *Last in Line II*, an even stronger mix of original songs, again produced by Jeff Pilson.







Last year, with the unique power of social media, I had the great opportunity to connect with Matthew Dowd. Most people know Matthew as Chief Analyst for ABC News. Matthew is also the founder of four companies and ListenTo. Us, a community of independent-minded folks interested in common sense leadership. And last March, he published A New Way: Embracing the Paradox as We Lead and Serve. I asked Matthew if he'd come to Dubuque for a book signing, and just a few short minutes later, he said, "YES!"

In the evening, he will be the keynote speaker at the Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque's 15th Anniversary celebration at the Grand River Center. The event starts at 5:30 p.m. with cocktails and heavy hors d'oeuvres, followed by Dowd's presentation at 6:30 p.m. Tickets are required and can be purchased at dbqfoundation.org/CFGD15. I recently had the honor of interviewing Matthew to talk about his book, happiness, leadership, and advice for people wanting to make a difference in our world. In A New Way, Matthew, inspired by turbulent times in his own life, shares his model for leadership, including breaking down eight paradoxes an innovative leader must embrace: fear and love, heart and head, big vision and local action, and more.

"To me, I've learned that the pursuit of happiness is kind of a fiction," says Matthew. "When we pursue happiness, we often don't achieve it. For me, happiness or joy is a result of something

else. It's a result of a pursuit of a life that has meaning—relationships that have meaning. The things that I'm doing that are of purpose or of service, and the result of that is moments of joymoments of happiness. There's many things that give me joy. Spending time with my children. My faith gives me a great sense of peace and joy. But I think all these things are outcomes of a bigger, broader purpose, which is a search for meaning, a pursuit of meaning."

"I think what people should be doing is thinking, 'What gives my life meaning?' And then as the result of finding what gives your life meaning-that could be service, that could be the people you're in a relationship with...whether it's family or friends, or whomever, it could be many things—the happiness or moments of joy will result from that."

From my personal experience, so many of us walk through life doing the same things every day. We go through life, go to work, go home, and repeat the same thing day in and day out. It's almost like we're robots, programmed to do the same things. So many of us are walking through our lives searching for what makes us happy, and we are also looking for a true leader, whether it be in our job, or even in our current state of our country.

"Leadership, to me, is both a combination of leading and serving," continues Dowd. "But I think that there are some values that define good leadership. Some of the values include integrity, that what you think and what you say and what you do are in alignment. That you're able to both delegate—and it's one of the things I talk about in the book—that the capacity to delegate, and hold others accountable. But that's a two-way street. Most of the time, many leaders delegate and then hold people that work for them accountable, but they don't get that they are supposed to be held accountable to the people that work for them, by the people that work for them. Integrity involves the ability to speak truth in what you're doing. Leadership is how do you bind people together in an organization for a common purpose. The best leaders have a knack to set a big vision but then make the steps in small ways.

Another thing I point out in the book is the idea that you must set a big vision, big enough that people can dream or aspire to. We too often shoot lower than the mark we should, so set a big vision but then act and understand the power in small steps."


When asked about his advice for someone who wants to make a difference in our world, Matthew suggests: "Figure out what breaks your heart and what frustrates you as you walk through life... What really frustrates you? Whatever is causing that, that is your calling, your mission. I think if you figure out what really gets you going, what really frustrates you, what really breaks your heart, then your mission is somewhere in there."

Lastly, I asked Matthew why he accepted my invitation. He has expressed his excitement at returning to Dubuque

and has been to lowa several times in the past 15 years for political events.

"First of all, I know the great things you've been doing, and the activities you've been involved with in your community have helped lift people up. So that's a huge thing that I want to contribute to in any way that I can, which is showing up for you and putting a light on good things people are doing. It's very hard for people to reach out to me because they see me from a distance or see me on television. So, I know it takes strength and I know it takes courage for people to ask that. I try as often as I can to respond."







VINTAGE TORQUE FEST

Occupying a unique niche, Vintage Torque Fest celebrates the "Golden Age" of do-it-yourself hot rods and customs gear-heads were building in American garages before the introduction of the "muscle car" in 1965.

Vintage Torque Fest is a fundraiser designed to help families that have children with congenital heart defects. It accomplishes this disguised as an unbelievable festival that brings together people from around the country that have a passion for keeping the traditions of the past alive. This means keeping the music, cars, clothes, and art alive. This is what Vintage Torque Fest is about. Hot rods from around the country, artists from around the world and vendors from east and west coasts are joined by bands that have toured the world several times over into one location, as always, the Dubuque County Fairgrounds. This year Vintage Torque Fest takes place on May 4 and 5.

It's a celebration of the broader culture with two days of live music from rockabilly to honky tonk country, a vintage parts swap meet, a model car contest, kustom kulture artwork, a variety of vendors, and an ever-popular contest for pinup girls.

As if all that were not enough, Vintage Torque Fest differentiates itself from other "park and sit" car shows by taking full advantage of the Dubuque County Fairgrounds' dirt track. A variety of vehicles have the opportunity to "do it in the dirt," from hot rods to mini-bikes, go-carts, and flat track motorcycles.

Look for drag racing, demolition drag racing and even cars that shoot flames on Friday night.

"Last year we were super close to breaking the 1,000 entry mark on cars and motorcycles," explain event founder and organizer, John Wells. "It was insane. Spectators numbered nearly 7,000. It was far and away the best show we've ever had. It just shows how the weather can play into an event. The year before was less than 3,000 spectators and 400 cars on a rainy weekend. Good weather brings out twice as many people. It costs a lot of money to put this show on. We have 20 bands and advertising and insurance. It's a rain or shine event. We really hope people support the event regardless of how the weather is."

"After last year's record turnout with both spectators and cars and bikes, we have been able to bring back some top-notch musical talent that has been on people's list for a while. The biggest of those is Dale Watson who played the show three years ago. Literally the second he got off the stage I had someone ask me when he is going to play again. He's such a great entertainer and we're thrilled to have him back as part of the show. There will be a few hundreds fans here just because Dale [The Texas Troubador] is coming all the way from Austin."

"We've got Sarah Shook, one of the best outlaw country artists in America today. She's got a new album out and was nice enough to work us into her tour schedule. I imagine this time of year next year, everyone's going to be oohing and aahing about Sarah Shook from North Carolina."

Another band that everyone asked about, Phat Cat Swingers, is making a return to Torque Fest. This is a swingin' 9-piece band out of Los Angeles with a full horn section. They are a real throwback to the big band/jump jive heyday of the '50s.

"It's a really power-packed music lineup this year. I hope people understand that we don't just have cars at the show, it's a much bigger deal."

"We're bringing the heavy later on Friday and Saturday nights. Bonehawk from Detroit brings stoner riff-oriented rock and roll and Hyberion on Saturday is full on thrash metal. They toured with Red Fang. For people who know what that means, they know these guys are the real deal. Dubuque's own Teleconnetic Yeti wraps things up on Saturday night."

It should be noted that the festival has three stages, so if you're not digging what's on one stage, you have two others to choose from featuring all different kinds of musical styles from old school country and bluegrass to garage music, rockabilly, punkabilly, metal and more. By design, the event is created to keep people with short attention spans like John's entertained!

So much interest revolves around the goingson down at the dirt track and much of your favorite activity there is returning for 2018. Watch real head-to-head drag racing by vintage cars. The single elimination contest will advance winners to compete for the top prize in each of two classes.

"The main thing that everyone is jazzed for this year, something that's never even been to lowa before, is the thing called Demolition Drag Racing. We're going to be drag racing scrap cars on the front stretch. Two cars will line up like we do with the dirt drag racing, but with the scrap cars, they have to hit each other at least once between the start and end of the drag race. The first round is single elimination. Then we go three wide on the track in round two with the same rules. But here's the thing: all of the cars have to hit each other once, so the cars on the outsides must touch during the race. When there's a car between them, it tends to get a bit nuts. It's going to be mayhem. If there's any cars left after the three wide, we're gonna go four wide. It'll be interesting."

Bikes (of all sizes) get into the fun, too. Sharing the same DIY attitude and "kustom kulture" aesthetic of the hot rod community, Vintage Torque Fest also celebrates the tradition of custom motorcycle builders, from postwar bobbers up through the choppers of the early 1970s. They've added mini bike racing.

"Some of these mini bikes can go like 80 miles an hour. A guy in Wisconsin runs and entire mini bike drag racing circuit, and he got involved this year. Mini Bike Weirdo is the main group we work with for











the mini bike action already. With these two contingents of mini bikes coming together, look for pint-sized big thrills. There will even be a mini-bike parade around the festival grounds on Saturday, something that has not been done before."

The Tuff Mudder Mini Bike Race is returning as well, with even more participants racing their mini bikes through the mini motocross track in the Fairgrounds' "back forty."

In celebration of true hot rod culture of that classic era, Vintage Torque Fest hosts "Miss Vintage Torque Fest," a classic pin-up contest, Saturday, May 6 at 10:30 a.m. For this year's Pin-up Contest, the first 40 contestants to sign up were entered into the "online" round of the competition, with the top 20 being picked via Facebook voting for the contest on Saturday of Torque Fest. "Miss Vintage Torque Fest" wins the grand prize, a \$500 cash prize and a \$500 photo shoot with a nationally-known pin-up photographer.

Now in its 9th year, Torque Fest is drawing hot rod fans and car clubs from around the Midwest and beyond. A lot of what you expect at Torque Fest will stay the same, a great swap meet with vintage parts only, no Tupperware here. The artists are coming out from Texas, Pennsylvania, Californina, Florida and more. This is a national show right here in our backyard.

Torque Fest always features a kustom kulture art auction with a variety of handmade paintings, pin-striping and other one-of-a-kind piece of art with the proceeds going to a medical trust fund for Hannah, daughter of John and Kim Wells and the inspiration for the Helping Hannah's Heart Foundation. Having endured multiple heart surgeries in her young life, Hannah is living proof of the support of the extended motor family.

While proceeds of the art auction go toward Hannah's medical trust, each year, Torque Fest selects a family to sponsor, donating money from the gate admission to help defray the expenses associated with the medical care of their child. You can contribute to the fundraising effort by just paying admission to this year's Vintage Torque Fest, Friday, May 5 and Saturday, May 6.

John Wells also runs the Retro Rewind at Five Flags in January as well as the huge Iron Invasion, a season-ending bash in October in the Chicago suburbs. So celebrating the culture is a year-round passion for him.

"The most important thing at the end of the day is that we'll be donating money this year to a family from Dubuque. 13-year-old Eli Barkhurst has had open heart surgery and will need more in July. We know from our own daughter (Hannah) who's had two open heart surgeries and other procedures, that it's financially draining. Eli's mom needs our help, and we're happy to have them be a part of the show. We hope people understand that when they go to the gate to enter, those proceeds help this family. And if you show up at 2:30 p.m. on Saturday in Building B on the art stage, you will see Eli himself, on stage, getting the money in person. You will see whom you are helping. For me that is the heart of the show. For those who have attended and witnessed it in the past, they can tell you that that's what keeps drawing them back. Two of the five families we've adopted have had a child pass away. So it's a very serious life or death situation with them. Once you make an emotional connection with a child, you see the greatness of the cause."

Admission to the event is \$15 on Friday and \$20 Saturday. A \$25 Weekend Pass available through April 24 or \$30 on the weekend of the event.

Advance Weekend Passes will not be sold after April 24. Children 13–18 are \$10, and children 12 and under are free as are active military personnel with a valid ID. \$5 discount entry coupons for Saturday are available at different locations in Dubuque.

A pre-party will take place on Thursday night. Join for a classic car parade downtown followed up by a live band and campfire at the Dubuque County Fairgrounds.

JULIEN DUBUQUE INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL

APRIL 26–29 DOWNTOWN DUBUQUE

The Julien Dubuque International Film Festival returns the weekend of April 26–29, to downtown Dubuque. Dedicated to enriching the community and bridging cultures through the education and promotion of arts through independent film, JDIFF acknowledges emerging filmmakers from around the world and supports diverse and cause-related films. In 2016 and 2017 the festival was voted as one of the Top 50 Film Festivals worth the submission fee by *MovieMaker Magazine* from over 3,500 film festivals.

Awarding over \$30,000 in cash and prizes, films will be shown in different venues throughout Main Street in downtown Dubuque. You can purchase individual film tickets or an All Access Pass, depending on how many films and events you want to see and attend throughout this 4-day event.

In an office that looks like a mini war-room plastered with post-its and calendars, Julien Dubuque International Film Festival Director Susan Gorrell is juggling the schedule of multiple screenings of more than 100 films, a half dozen major feature festival events, a handful of special one-time-only screenings, panel discussions, coffee talks, concerts and more. All she has to do with her staff is fit them all into a weekend. No problem.

If she's working hard to wrap her head around all of this amazing film industry entertainment, how do we have a chance? Her answer is to start at the beginning.

"Come to the meet and mingle event at Five Flags on Wednesday night to get a head start on your programs and to map out your weekend plan. If this is your first festival or you've been to them all, this is still a great idea to prepare for the festival."

Their website, **JulienFilmFest.com**, also has a well organized list of all of the events, times, screening times for films, trailers and more. Let it be your guise to what to see when and where.

"We have six world premiers this year and two American premiers," starts Susan. "I'm very excited about that. We have 115 shorts, documentaries and features and about 60 to 70 percent of the filmmakers or actors will be here to support those films. For example, Margaret and the Moon is a film coming with its director, Trevor Morgan. He's also a working actor you will recognize from films like The Patriot, The Sixth Sense and Jurassic Park 3. Its star Haley Alexader is also coming."

Filmmakers from all over the United States and various countries are coming to Dubuque, including representatives from the Czech Republic, Germany, France, Mexico, Australia, and more. And they want all the people clocking to Dubuque



for the event to attend and meet these people—Dubuquers, too! The festival is for you.

"The festival is open to the public to be celebrated by everyone. The films are coming. The filmmakers being here is just a great extra benefit. But they're here for you to sit and ask questions and for you to get to meet them. This is for the community. Film is an art form. It's either educational or it creates emotion. People can come and enjoy it for those things. Don't be afraid to come down and discover. You don't have to dress up for films and most events. I'm wearing jeans all weekend. It's for everyone!"

"In fact, Runde Free Day on Thursday means you can see any and all the films you want for free [on Thursday]. And there is a student free day on Friday as well." The panels are free, too. You get to sit and learn how films are made and why. We have a writer from *Variety Magazine* coming for example. You get to learn what interests them as filmmakers."

Trust us, there is a *lot* to do. But the great part is, the films themselves, the reason the event exists, play multiple times. All films screen at least two times though most screen three or four times. Nominated films are screening four times. So, it is possible to catch a lot of films without missing out on anything that's on your "gotta see it" list. If you think you want to hit everything, get the All Access Pass. It's easy and gets you into anything and everything you want by just showing your pass.

Most events are pretty self-explanatiory. One event that some people may not understand well is the awards night event.

"It's only abut an hour but has great music and our great host is Steve Hemmer," explains Gorrell. "It's where we honor the winning films from the festival that have been judged in advance by a select crew of reviewers. The awards are followed by an amazing awards after party for about two and a half hours in the Five Flags Arena, with free food from East Mill Bakery, a cash bar and music by Ceili Rain. There will be dancing and music all night long!"

When the festival descends on the lower Main Street portion of Downtown Dubuque, it's a little like being somewhere else, having all of these interesting characters walking around and doing fun stuff.

"It's like if you went on vacation. People from the west side of town even come down and get a hotel room and have a staycation to take it all in and not have to go back home. It's about the movies, but we want to create mingling opportunities, too, so you can hang out with producers and directors."





"One woman with a bucket list to visit every state in the nation chose lowa and Dubuque and the film festival as her lowa bucket list trip. She spent an entire week here. She didn't know anyone but thought the website looked fun so she came, on her own, and met a lot of friends with her All Access Pass. She had a blast. We're still Facebook friends."

And Dubuque is a unique stop for these filmmakers, too. In addition to our history, we do have some film history of our own in films like *F.I.S.T., Take This Job and Shove It* and some baseball movie. Filmmakers always want to visit the Field of Dreams and

shuttles are planned, but many find it on their own. They reportedly all also want to hit all three states with the round trip over the bridges. And, naturally, it seems everyone gets a selfie at Paul's Tap during their stay. They will also enjoy the happy hour events on Thursday from 4 to 7 p.m. at Stone Cliff Winery and Saturday from 4 to 7 p.m. at The Smokestack.

Putting this massive undertaking is a year-round mission for Susan Gorrell and for her legion of volunteers. It starts off in August and September the year before. They had nearly 700 films submitted. Susan screens them all and makes the first round of cuts. Then they go to volunteer screening teams who make a second round of cuts, and for round three, they go to a whole new team of screeners to cut down to the goal of about 100 films. This year it's 115. It's not easy getting selected. So for any film, it means something just to be accepted to the festival, to any festival. And then there's all the work to be done once the festival starts.

"The screeners are amazing," Susan tells us. "We have nearly 100 volunteers that work very hard for four days with guests and behind the scenes that are just as passionate about it as I am about making this happen."

Attending and winning at the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival has been responsible for films getting to the next level in the cinema world. The winning film *Reparation* has noted Dubuque as a door-opener to get them into bigger film festivals around the nation. Last year, the film Diverge that won is on VUDU now. They said winning here and the money that came with it allowed them to move forward with the distribution of their film. One filmmaker who came to JDIFF had just lost a \$19,000 grant before visiting the festival and just happened to win in two categories in Dubuque, with cash prizes totaling \$20,000. This allowed her to move ahead with her next film project that she thought she lost. That film is now completed but just missed this year's festival deadline. So she will bring it to next year's festival.

The Julien Dubuque International Film Festival is the real deal, folks. Don't let it pass by without becoming part of the magic. 

FUJI ASIAN BUFFET

If fickle Dubuquers are supposed to swarm a new restaurant when it opens and then lose interest after a month, then fickle Dubuquers did not get the memo on Fuji Asian Buffet in Wacker Plaza across from Kennedy Mall. Two months in we made our most recent visit to the restaurant at 1:30 p.m. on a Saturday afternoon—and there was a 10 minute wait to get a table. Apparently, people like what they're finding here.

Following the demolition of the Asian King Buffet in Wacker Plaza in 2017, new construction brought other new dining options to that location. But just across the parking lot, a large portion of the exiting strip mall complex was renovated into an all new Asian buffet featuring a variety of new features that combine many popular modern Asian cuisine options together under one roof.

The decor is quite nice. So many Asian buffets have kind of a weird hodgepodge decor, but Fuji has a very modern, clean decor with great lighting, glass accents, and well-spaced seating including tables and booths. With two large dining areas to either side of the restaurant which is divided by the entrance and bar area, the restaurant also has a side room with additional seating which could also be used for groups or other private functions.

The central feature of the buffet is, of course, the buffet itself. Spread across three long double-sided buffet display tables, each one features a dozen different dishes covering a wide rage of entrées. Many of these are the staples you have come to expect from a Chinese buffet, like General Tso's chicken, chicken and broccoli, chicken with mushrooms, green beans, pork with green peppers and onions and more. We particularly like black pepper chicken. You can find a number of non-deep-fried, sautéed entrées featuring chicken, beef, pork and seafood. The buffet offers white and fried rice as well as lo mein noodles and rice noodles as a base to build your meal around, if that's how you roll. There are also multiple Asian style soups to choose from.

While there are many of the items you expect to find on an Asian buffet and a very good selection of those, there really aren't especially unique options. It's a very

traditionally Americanized style buffet. And we don't say that as a negative. We just want you to know what to expect. If you like Chinese buffets, we think you will like this one very much.

The non-sauce fried options on the buffet are all collected together on the third buffet line and include crab rangoons, chicken wings, egg rolls, fried spring rolls, sweet and sour chicken, and more. The pan fried dumplings were very

good. They take the time to actually pan fry them to crisp the bottoms as you would expect from a nice Chinese restaurant. There are also some very good chicken skewers that were went back for on a second trip.

There are a few odd things on the buffet which reminded us of the old Asian King location. We're not sure why macaroni and cheese, chicken nuggets, fried donuts, onion rings and garlic bread are on an Asian buffet, but perhaps this is something that kids and completely non-adventurous types who got dragged along to the Chinese restaurants against their will would enjoy. We didn't try these options.

There is also a larger dessert buffet across the back wall featuring fruit, puddling, cream puffs and ice cream, but lets be honest. Have you ever been in an Asian restaurant anywhere where the dessert was something to celebrate? It's not their fault. There just seems to be no such thing as great Asian desserts, unless you have a serious fried banana fetish. But what was there was fresh, attractive and plentiful. Though they do have traditional style scoop ice cream with eight flavor options which was nice. Plus, if you are like us, crab rangoons qualify as dessert.



One of the two big features at Fuji Asian Buffet that you don't find at other local buffets is the selection of fresh made sushi. To the side of the main buffet area is a selection of a dozen or more sushi rolls being continually made fresh by the Fuji staff. They're not complex rolls, but there are many options from vegetarian to rolls with raw fish and sauces. We tried four or five different kinds. It's not Ichibanlevel sushi, but it's pretty good overall and a nice departure if you want to avoid fried buffet options.

Next to the sushi area is something we do not normally see in a buffet: a Hibachi grill. With a salad bar style selection of ingredients featuring lots of fresh vegetables, meats and sauces, you can build you own stir fry bowl, and a member of the Fuji staff whips it up right in front of you, Mongolian Grill style. This may be a great option for people with dietary restrictions wanting to know exactly what they're eating.

We found shrimp options on the buffet with all of our visits. The dinner buffet had multiple shrimp options and they were not the tiny salad shrimp. These were all decently sized and the dishes heavily featured the shrimp, not just included them as a garnish. If you want











shrimp, you'll get shrimp. Imitation crab was also featured on the buffet.

With the continued popularity of the buffet, you might want to consider the timing of your visit. Peak dining hours, and especially Friday night and weekends, tend to be quite busy. But we did get seated pretty quickly when we were told there would be a 10 minute wait. And note that once you are seated, you can almost immediately head to the buffet and be eating minutes later. It was a full house when we were there, but there was no problem getting anything we wanted on the buffet. We can't speak for all experiences at all times, but in three visits, we found the selection to always be fully stocked and fresh. One thing that comes with a full house is a fast turnover of food. This is great news for the customer as the crunchy stuff stays crunchy and things that tend to dry out never get a chance to do that. One thing that is often a disappointment on an Asian buffet is when fried items in sauces get soggy or fried items simply get cold. We were very pleasantly surprised to find the simple deep fried chicken for the sweet and sour to be very hot and fresh with a good crunch and moist chicken inside. The General Tso's chicken had texture, not just mush as you might expect. That was a big plus.

The atmosphere is fairly frenetic. There's a lot of activity and people moving as they go to and from the buffet, but at no time did it interfere with our dining experience. It was a bit noisy but more like an overall hum of activity than a distinct noise, and it was fine with us. You have to have realistic expectations going in. This is a Chinese style buffet with fast service and high turnover. It's not fast food, but it's not fine dining either. There were all types of people dining with us, from big families utilizing the booster seats available, to young couples on dates and elderly couples doing the same. We chose to pop-in for a buffet before a movie at Phoenix Theatres.

That leads to the last thing that Fuji Asian Buffet really has going for it, which is the price. With a lunch buffet for \$8.99 and dinner for \$12.99, it is priced right along the lines of other Asian buffets but offers a lot more entrée options and extras like sushi and hibachi. The value is certainly there; it's up to you when you say when. Kids eat at a two-tiered discount. For lunch, kids 3–5 are just \$3.99 and kids 6–9 are \$5.99. Lunch hours are 11 a.m.–3 p.m. Dinner prices for kids are \$4.99 and \$6.99 respectively. All beverages are \$1.69. Bottled beer and wine are also available at additional cost.

In the greater landscape of westernized Asian/Chinese buffets, we think Fuji Asian Buffet stands out nicely. It's a good value with lots of diverse options to serve different tastes and levels of healthy eating, in a clean, new atmosphere. With a soda, it was \$11 well spent for lunch.



CELERY: THE "HOW-TO" GUIDE TO ENJOYING THIS NUTRITIOUS VEGETABLE

April is Celery Month and it is time to celebrate! Celery may be an afterthought in the produce aisle but it is a simple and inexpensive vegetable to add to your daily meal plan. This low-calorie vegetable is a good source of Vitamin C and Vitamin A.

When selecting celery, you want to choose the stalk that is straight and rigid with fresh leaves. You want to avoid celery that is limp and smells mushy. Once you have selected your celery and get it home, it can be stored in the refrigerator unwashed for up to two weeks.

Celery isn't just for Ants on a Log. It can be used in a variety of ways and recipes. Celery stalks can be eaten raw, stir-fried, baked, steamed or microwaved. When planning to use celery, you will want to rinse the stems thoroughly before preparing as dirt can be found between the ribs. Next you will want to make sure to cut the root off the stem and throw away.

Here are the Top 10 Ways to Eat Celery

- 10. A Quick Appetizer. Stuff stalks with low-fat cream cheese and sprinkle with paprika.
- 9. Can You Eat the Leaves? Yes, you can! Instead of throwing the leaves away, use them in soup, stuffing, salad or other cooked dishes.
- More Veggies for Your Stews! Pump up the nutrition in your soups and stews by adding chopped celery. Adds a little crunch too.
- 7. Tacos! That's right! Celery adds just a little more crunch to your tasty tacos.

- Celery & Spinach. Do something different with your spinach salad. Combine diced celery, shredded carrot, cooked pasta, bell peppers and corn. Serve over a bed of spinach and top with your favorite low-calorie dressing.
- Texture for Tuna. Add a little texture to your tuna or chicken salad. Mix together chopped celery, mayonnaise or mustard, and tuna or chicken. Serve over whole wheat bread or a toasted English muffin. For an extra kick, add a dash of hot sauce to the mixture.
- 4. An Easy Side. For an easy side dish, braise celery in vegetable stock and season with your favorite herbs or a little bit of salt and pepper.
- 3. Celery Salsa! Heat oil and stir in garlic, tomato, celery and onion. Pour in tomato juice and bring to a boil. Cook until onions and celery are tender. Stir flour into salsa to thicken. Season with salt, pepper and hot sauce. Serve with baked tortilla chips.
- Stir-Fried Celery? Absolutely! Use celery in your next vegetable stir-fry. Heat a little olive oil and sauté chopped celery, carrots, broccoli florets, onions and bell peppers. Add reduced-sodium soy sauce and serve over brown rice or in a whole wheat pita.
- Ants on a Log. Add peanut butter to the inside of celery and top off with raisins for a quick, fun and nutritious treat for your kids! Also, try switching hummus for the peanut butter.

Move over, Steve! Do it yourself advice from a new mom who knows how...

What is going on around here? In March I was feeling quite behind when it came to yardwork, and today the forecast is calling for 2 to 9 inches of SNOW! While Mother Nature keeps us on our toes, here are some things to gear up for when the weather begins to feel more like spring:

As young plants begin to emerge on the warm sunny days, watch the forecast. If the weather looks like it will be below freezing, cover any "special" plants with a sheet and give them a good watering the day before and morning after the cold temperatures. Tough perennials like hosta and daylilies don't love the ups and downs, however, they are more than capable of overcoming the cold without much help.

Wait to purchase flowers, especially tender annuals, until we are closer to Mother's Day when we typically are clear of frost warnings. If you can't resist buying that beautiful bloom, be sure to bring them indoors at night and outdoors when practical during the day.

Can't wait for a little color? Pansies make an excellent early blooming touch

of color to fill your pots until it's time to think about geraniums and petunias.

While thinking about purchasing plants, be mindful that if you buy a shrub or tree now that if fully leafed out, it will

go through shock if you plant it in the ground while we are having such extreme high and low temperatures. I suggest only purchasing these plants if they are developmentally along the same lines as you would see in your neighbor's yard at this time of year.

Every year I get lots of questions about tulips and daffodils and other spring blooming bulbs. Sorry folks, those need to be planted in the late fall and live outdoors all winter in order to appear in the early spring. If you are one of these people, mark your calendars to plant them in the fall so you don't forget!

Although spring hasn't hit quite yet, you can be better prepared for your yard by stocking up on needed supplies like lawn fertilizers, shrub fertilizer and proactive spray for your fruit trees to prevent bugs throughout the season. It's also a great time to make sure your tools are clean and sharp and your garden gloves are ready. After all, spring will happen sooner or later!

ANY DAY OF THE WEEK

For me, reading a book by Robert A. Heinlein is a special treat. He never fails me. He always delivers a novel with interesting characters spiced with social criticism set in wonderful places that are certainly exotic. His plots serve the story and amplify the destinies of the main characters. They never overpowered what the characters are going through.

Fans of Mr. Heinlein think he is the greatest science fiction writer to have ever lived. The who's-the-best discussion has been going on since the late '50s. Almost as many people think it is Arthur C. Clarke and there are a few voices crying out in the wilderness for Isaac Asimov. The three writers themselves, when asked who's the best, agreed to say the other two. I think we can say that they are all tied for first. It helps that they all have distinctive styles and wrote about very different things.

Mr. Heinlein has won the Hugo Award more than any other writer. He won his first one for the controversial novel, *Starship Trooper*, and the controversy always followed him around. Well, you know what they say, if they are shooting at you, you must be doing something right. His second Hugo was written a year later, the masterwork, *Stranger in a Strange Land*, which became one of the great novels of the 20th century. The third Hugo winner was written six years later, *The Moon is a Harsh Mistress*.

Heinlein's books were constantly being nominated for scads of awards. This is an indication of how influential he was. Robert A. Heinlein influenced EVERYBODY from the late '50s right up to his death in 1988 at the age of 81. The novel we are looking at in this issue, *Friday*, is one of his later works. It was published in 1982 and was nominated for a Nebula, a Hugo and a Locus Science Fiction Award.

I am enchanted with this book because of the central character. She is a young woman in her '20s, pretty but not beautiful. She is astonishingly bright, with an almost supernatural ability to process numbers in nearly every possible way you can think of... all in her head. Oh yes, she is the most dangerous person you might ever meet. She doesn't need a weapon to kill you but can easily do that with either hand, either foot, or her head.

Sometimes her name is Marjorie Baldwin, sometimes it is Friday Jones but most often it is just Friday. I almost forgot, Friday is not human; she is what is called an artificial person (AP). She was,

um, in a word, manufactured. She was designed in Tri-University Life Engineering Laboratory. Her, uh, I guess you'd have to say, inception was formulated by Mendelian Associates,



Zurich. All of her senses are heightened and she actually has an eidetic memory.

Humans think they can tell the difference between a human and an AP but they can't. Friday looks human, all of her parts are biological and if she went to a doctor and had an X-ray he couldn't tell the difference.

Friday had a contract with an individual to train as a doxy (middle English word used a lot in the Canterbury Tales; means prostitute). A man Friday only knows as Boss bought her contract and spent large amounts of money educating and training her as a courier for his business. It was a perilous job and Friday was perfect for it.

Some terrible political upheaval in the distant past caused complete border changes in North America. Now each little section is its own country. It involved an assassination for what apparently was no reason. No one knows what's going on. Getting across borders is difficult at best. If you are a courier you have to figure this out. It affects your job.

Artificial humans are widely resented and are subjected to racism. Friday spends far too much time and energy in the book trying to keep her situation from slipping out, hiding it from everyone. That is thorny because she has been genetically engineered to be far superior to humans in every way possible and sometimes it's tough to keep that under a bushel basket.

Heinlein published one of the first sci-fi novels with a woman as a main character. Although Friday is not human she is somewhat empowering...wouldn't you say?

Friday by Robert A. Heinlein is a joy to read. I might have a little crush on Friday even though she isn't a human. Hmmmmmmm.

You might not understand this until you have read the book. From another one of Robert Heinlein's bigger than life characters, Scar Gordon from *Glory Road*, "Logic is a way of saying that anything which didn't happen yesterday, won't happen tomorrow."




