Fleet Farm is apparently looking to move into the Dubuque market. Not Farm & Fleet. They're already here. This is Fleet Farm. Exactly the same only different. I wrote about Farm & Fleet coming into the market a few years back and why I thought that was an unnecessary, bad idea. If that was a bad idea, this is a terrible idea. A dumb and dangerous idea.

Once upon a time Fleet Farm, Farm & Fleet, and Theisen's shared a buying group and a gentlemen's agreement to let each prosper in their own regions. First Farm & Fleet bailed on that and then Fleet Farm was bought from the Mills family by a private equity firm called KKR. They're one of the mega billion dollar groups that buy and sell companies like energy companies, RJR Nabisco, and Toys "R" Us (R.I.P.). It's no longer about product; it's about stock price... and market domination, nay, suffocation.

It's not a move to give us another shopping option. It's a move to try to destroy Farm & Fleet and more importantly, destroy Theisen's. And unless you live under a rock, you already know there may be no other Dubuque-based company with deeper pockets and a bigger heart for its community than Theisen's. They don't have to be that way. They just are that way. Always have been and, if you know the new generation of leadership, you understand they always will be. Does everyone understand how enormously lucky we are to have such a successful lowa chain of stores based in OUR hometown? Supporting the invasive move by Fleet Farm is basically a vote to cut our own throats. Do you think you'll see a New Your Stock Exchange listed equity firm dumping profits into non-profits, schools, churches, and cultural improvements to our community? Fat chance. You'll get some token gift cards. That's how that works.

This is also an attack on customerservice-heavy smaller specialty retailers like Steve's Ave Home & Garden. The kind of people who know your name and your needs. This is big box trying to move in and take over the revenue flow of Dubuque from inside our community to Wall Street. We are not neighbor customers to them. We are widgets and dollars. Yes, this is America where they have the freedom to try to do this. I don't argue that. But this is also America, where WE THE PEOPLE completely hold the keys to our future. This is DUBUQUE where we can show them that they're not welcome and we don't need them here. Whether we stand up to stop this ridiculous and thinly-veiled takeover attempt now or sit quietly then refuse to give them our hard earned money after they built, it's our call.

The residents of English Ridge out on Highway 20 by Seippel Rd. likely don't want a store bigger than Wal-Mart building as close as 20 feet from their neighborhood. And if you are those people, don't let them scare you into believing that the other option is a massive, scary truck stop. You could get a big gas station with diesel pumps like you see in Peosta, but you're not getting an I-80 style tuck stop in Dubuque. Go ahead, build a Kwik Stop. I like Kwik Stop! That argument is just a threat to make you pick the store as the lesser evil. It's a bluff. Did you bite? And hey, you can't build a fence or plant trees to block having to look at it because buried gas lines between their property and yours doesn't allow it. Enjoy the view. Oh, and the thousands of extra cars on the streets accessing the neighborhood.

And why would you or could you resist the construction? Because the land is zoned C-3 for smaller commercial buildings like a strip mall. This place would need the land to be specially rezoned to change the rules especially for them and no one else. We would literally have to make a special consideration to allow a corporate giant to come in just so they can threaten our community's most generous and valued locallyowned retailers. Are we that foolish? Yes we are. They already re-zoned for them. Is allowing PUD zoning directly next door to residential the new standard in Dubuque? And if its not bad for us, why do all of this in secret, hiding the name of the retailer? You know why!

Which local business owners want to fight over 200 employees with this place? Unemployment is NOT a problem in Dubuque right now. Finding ANYONE to work is the problem. It's not sustainable. Hey, there's a buzzword. Dubuque is so hardcore about local cultural and environmental sustainability. Why roll over on local corporate sustainability?

If this was a Bass Pro Shops I would sing a different tune. Not because I fish or hunt, but because we don't already have multiple other large retailers specifically serving that market. It would be a new retail genre. This market is served. This market is already oversaturated. And now they're going to water it down even more. They have the crazy money. They believe they can hold out longest in a fight for the oxygen of our business. Nothing about this is good for Dubuque in the long run. The only person who profits locally is the guy developing the land. I don't begrudge that person wanting to make some money, but at what greater long-term sacrifice by all of us?

This is my opinion. I hope you agree. ■




CARMAN LEGACY TOUR 2019

Legendary Christian Artist Carman will perform at the Crossroads Community Church in Galena, IL on Friday. June 7 at 7 p.m. This is a free concert with doors opening at 6 p.m.

Carman, an Italian American, born in Trenton, NJ, spent years in military school and originally set out to be a boxer. In 1976 his life course was changed at an Andrae Crouch concert, and he began to write the songs that would forever alter generations of gospel song writers. Carman defied description and consistently operated outside of the box of Christian music, with innovating new and fresh ways to present the message. With 35 music videos, he reinvented the genre of the visual arts in Christian music and dance as an art form within the church.

Carman is gospel music's only stadium act, with over 10 million record



sales and 15 Gold and Platinum CDs and videos. He holds world records for the largest concerts—outdoors 80,000 and 71,132 indoors—and remains what is best described as a cultural phenomenon and a true American Original.


Emma Thompson is in talks for a mystery role in Disney's Cruella movie, the lastest in Disnev's string of







RISING STAR THEATRE COMPANY CELEBRATES A DECADE OF REACHING FOR THE STARS

For the members of Rising Star Theatre Company (RSTC), all summers are memorable. This summer, however, will be a truly special one.

At the Five Flags Theater in downtown Dubuque, local community members of all ages will come together to create quality theatre productions—and create a theatrical family in the process. The RSTC family will learn choreography, construct sets, design costumes, and entertain thousands of their fellow Tri-State citizens.

RSTC does all these things every summer, of course. But this summer, they will do them for the 10th time. This summer, Rising Star Theatre Company celebrates its 10th anniversary.

RSTC, a local nonprofit theatre company which offers summer theatrical opportunities to actors of all ages, was co-founded by Nick Halder and Megan Schumacher in 2009. The two had become friends as members of the theatre department at the University of Northern Iowa from 2002 to 2004, while Schumacher was pursuing an M.A. and Halder a B.A. in theatre. They were drawn together by their shared values, values which form the basis of the RSTC mission today: a dedication to hard work and high standards, as well as a belief in the importance of growth and education.

From 2004 to 2008, the two worked during the summers as directors for a Dubuque children's theatre program, but in 2009, they decided to take the leap and form their own company.

"We felt we had the skill set to do it, and we were used to working our tails off," said Halder, "so we thought, who better to work for than ourselves?"

The company's first show was *Godspell*, performed outside at the Alliant Energy Amphitheater on the Mississippi Riverwalk in 2009. That show set the standard for the 27 RSTC shows that have followed in the 10 years since. For one, it was the first of many RSTC shows to be performed in an unconventional space—other productions have been mounted at the Dubuque Arboretum, the Prescott Elementary School playground, and A.Y. McDonald Park. The show was also a theatrical opportunity specifically for high school actors, something unique in the Dubuque theatrical scene in 2009, which at that time only offered summer programs for youth.

"The idea of *Godspell* was to fill a void in the Dubuque arts scene," said Halder. This idea of "filling a void" and finding their niche has become a metaphor for the company's success over the last decade. As they've expanded their programming, they now produced three shows each summer and offer several week-long theatrical camps for local students ages 6–14. They've

worked hard to find a place in a community that is rich in theatrical offerings.

Halder and Schumacher have found that place, that niche, by staying true to their shared values: theatrical education, with a focus on the theatrical process and the importance of offering opportunities to all Tri-State residents. At its heart, community is what allows the company to do what they do, and their commitment to their participants is crystal clear. Many of the more than 1,000 community members who have been involved in the

company's productions call RSTC a "family" where old hands and newcomers alike are welcomed and appreciated. This summer, that family celebrates its anniversary by honoring the past while looking forward to the future.

The 2019 summer season begins with the area premiere of *Disney's Newsies*, an inspiring tale of the New York newsboys' strike of 1899. The show features a cast of 35 actors of all ages, who are currently rehearsing diligently to learn the show's intricate choreography and high-energy songs. Performances will take place at the Five Flags Theater on June 14–15 and 20–22 at 7:30 p.m. and June 16 and 22 at 2 p.m. Tickets, which can be purchased online or in person at the Five Flags box office, are \$16 for adults and \$13 for youth (facility and service fees may apply for all Five Flags shows).


In July, RSTC will be honoring the show that started it all with a production of *Godspell*. The 20-person cast consists of actors of all ages and even includes two members of the original 2009 *Godspell* cast. Schumacher, the show's director, says she's excited to revive the show this summer.

"It's neat to do the same show from a new perspective, where we are as a company now," she said.

Godspell will take the Five Flags Theater stage on July 12, 13, 18, and 19 at 7:30 p.m., as well as July 14 and 20 at 2 p.m. Tickets are \$16 for adults and \$13 for youth.

Finally, in August, the company will stage *Disney's Beauty and the Beast* as their annual August youth production. The youth production has been a staple of RSTC programming since 2010, and offers an opportunity for young actors which is unique in the Dubuque area: all students ages 8–18 who audition for the show receive a part. Halder and Schumacher said that the goal of casting all students in this youth production is to offer all young actors a positive theatrical experience, so that no child turns away from theatre after facing rejection.

"We believe in the power of theatre to inspire confidence, providing students with positive



experiences that they can take and use in their lives," said Schumacher. "Our youth production offers those experiences to every child who auditions."

Beauty and the Beast will feature over 200 area youth in two separate casts who will bring to life the classic "tale as old as time." Performances will take place at the Five Flags Theater on Aug. 8 and 9 at 1 p.m., Aug. 9 and 10 at 7 p.m., and Aug. 10 and 11 at 2 p.m., and all tickets are \$13.

RSTC will also hold three theatre camps for students ages 6–14, during the weeks of June 17–21 and June 24–28. Registration for all three camps is available online or in person through Dubuque Leisure Services. In addition to these productions and camps, RSTC will celebrate its 10th anniversary throughout the summer in ways both great and small. A series of e-newsletters has been chronicling the company's history since last August in preparation for the big anniversary season and will continue throughout the summer months. Plans are also in the works for a special 10th anniversary cabaret celebration during the summer.

All in all, it will be a 10th birthday to remember. Halder and Schumacher, however, while honored and eager to celebrate their first decade, are already hard at work planning the next one. Having found their niche in the Tri-State arts community, their future looks to be a bright one.

"We just have to keep growing," said Halder, adding, "We can always find new ways to challenge ourselves."

"Every year, we learn something, we improve upon something, we experience something new, we get better," Schumacher agreed. "My wish is that we just continue on that path to growth, and that we're providing positive experiences for community members for years to come."

ast issue we featured a cover story on all the great outdoor concerts coming up at Q Casino, and next issue we'll do the same to tell you about America's River Festival. But in between here, we thought we should finally shed some light on the biggest little concert series in the Tri-States. We'd call it the best kept secret in the area, but when 1,000 to 3,000 people come out every Sunday all summer long to the Dubuque Arboretum and Botanical Gardens for the magical Music in the Gardens series, it's anything but a secret and anything but little. Their biggest shows here, in front of throngs of lawn chair and blanket-wielding music lovers, play to crowds as big as the biggest venues in town. But out here they are free, everyone is welcome, and man, it sure is gorgeous.

A shared production of the Arboretum and the Dubuque Arts Council, the 27th season of Music in the Gardens, as the Arts Council counts it, is bigger than ever in 2019. Seven great performances sponsored by the Dubuque Arts Council are bookended by another six organized by the Arboretum, providing 13 weeks of stellar live music in a variety of styles but accessible and enjoyable by all. The details on every one of the Sunday shows is included in the accompanying piece to this main article. you might want to tear it out and stick it on the fridge. Thank me later.

We sat down with Sandi Helgerson, Executive Director of the Dubuque Arboretum and Botanical Gardens, for a little background information on the massively popular summer concert series as well as more in the venue itself.

"While a local grass-roots style of Music in Gardens program existed before the Dubuque Arts Council came on board, it was their arrival and investment in the series that really turned it into something on a completely different and much higher level and even that grew greatly into what the series is today," explains Sandi.

This is one of two major annual programs for the Dubuque Arts Council along with their long-running Artists-in-Residence which brings four live performance residences to the Tri-State area schools each year. The Arts Council's Educating and Entertaining mission is to provide diverse, multi-disciplinary, artistic, and educational opportunities to expand cultural horizons and improve the quality of life. These concerts certainly fit that bill.

"I feel really lucky that we have that partnership because it brings a caliber of bands that we didn't have the resources to provide. This year we feel that all the bands we're having, those sponsored by the Arts Council and those by the Arboretum, are pretty high-end bands. We've made our biggest investments ever with our shows including Johnny Rogers Show "Buddy & Beyond: The History of Rock & Roll" on June 2 and Ted Vigil's spot-on John Denver tribute on Aug. 18. This is probably one of the best lineups that we've ever brought to the table. You'll notice this year too that a lot of them a tribute bands, so pick your favorite artists and you can come out and sing along because you're going to know the songs because people enjoy songs they know."

Those tributes include nods to Buddy Holly, Elvis, Steely Dan, Johnny and June Carter Cash, Fleetwood Mac, The Beatles, John Denver, and Neil Diamond.

Dave Grable, president of the Dubuque Arts Council, tells *365ink* that since starting in 1992 and including this year, the Dubuque Arts Council has presented 176 free concerts in the Packard Pavilion with genres that include big band, symphony, rock, country, pop, tribute bands, Motown, and seven years with Kids from Wisconsin.



"Our mission is to provide free entertainment that the entire family can enjoy," says Dave, "It's great to see the patrons participate in the concerts. You see kids dancing, adults dancing, adults and their children and grand-children dancing. It's a wonderful picnic atmosphere, including friends sharing their meals and treats with each other. It has become the place to be on Sunday evenings."

According to Sandi, once you've been to a concert in the gardens, it sells itself. "For us, we don't even have to try to get people to come. They just come every Sunday. And the setting gets better and better. The trees have really grown over 20 years. It used to be the sun would hit the bands right in their faces and now the trees provide a wonderful canopy over people and guard from that sun. You'll find, even on super hot days that there's always a breeze and it's cool. Dancing is always encouraged. Intermission is also a good time to explore the more colorful areas of the gardens, and July is a prime time to check out the roses, if it ever warms up."

Cool is key because there are always a lot of older music lovers at the shows. This spring the park is adding a new row of handicapped accessible parking up near the venue to help with the parking issues people with mobility issues have in coming to the shows. They are also work with retirement communities, like Bethany Home, who send shuttles to set up special seating for their residents. They encourage care facility groups to call ahead. They often set up chairs actually behind the band, under the bandshell, protected from the sun, in a safe stable chair and even not in front of there speakers. All the things my grandma would appreciate.

"Parking is at a premium. If we ever got bigger, we'd have to start doing shuttles. We're busting at



the seams with parking as it is. Some people come in as early as 3 p.m. staking out their favorite spots."

With so much fan support and potential, you'd think one might try to milk that for revenue, but it is important to the Board of Directors at the park to keep this event free and accessible to everyone. Luckily and not surprisingly, sponsor support has been easy to find for the shows—and hugely appreciated. They include Conlon Construction, Dubuque Noon Lions, Friedman Insurance, Harris Golf Cars, Hy-Vee on Dodge, Morrison Bros. and Spahn & Rose Lumber.

"We don't really make a lot of money. We don't think if it as a fundraiser. We're proud that we're able to pay the bands what they deserve for their performances. As an art and culture organization we do receive some funding from the city of Dubuque and the State of lowa for operating. So we consider this as providing arts and culture for the

community. And we are a museum. Our collection is living things. So we're also educating the community on what they can grow in their own year. It's about providing quality of life for our citizens."

"The Arboretum just really enjoys being able to be the host of all of this. Oddly enough, our estate gifts (money that people donated to the Arboretum upon their passing) come from those concerts. It's the only thing we can figure out. We get gifts from people who have never been a member, we've never met them. These concerts touch people. This is like a tradition for so many people. A lot of the same crowd is there every weekend and then fans of each band or genre add in to the mix each Sunday."

"Our board is extremely proud of the fact that we do this series. Our board is involved with every single event we have out here, very hands on. Every intermission you'll see Jack Frick (Board President) and I shaking hands with everyone that we can. So many of our major donors are sitting out there. Our job is to be as self-sustaining as possible. We don't have one big angel donor. We only do a big fundraiser every three years. I've never seen such hands on people as our volunteers. Our ratio is one full time staff to every 340 volunteers who contribute to the park. That's pretty amazing."

Sandi's own position is basically funded through an invested endowment, so all of the money raised each year goes right into to operation of the park, to projects to improve the grounds. Memorial contributions, weddings, and the gift shop/welcome center are their main sources of income.

There is a freewill donation at the intermission, but it is not an admission. Both Hy-Vee and the Lions Club have always been extraordinarily generous with sharing their revenues from food sales at the event for which the Arboretum is extremely grateful.

Speaking of that, yes, there is always food available for purchase from Hy-Vee and, of course, the popular ice cream from the Lions Club. But patrons are also encouraged to pack what they like and bring it along. You can bring food and beverages and yes, even a bottle of wine if that's what you like. But don't forget lawn chairs and blankets! Bench seating is very limited, so you'll want to rely on yourself for your own comfort.

Looking to the future, Sandi noted that the park has little used hiking trails, so there are plans to next work on creating a Legacy Learning Tree Forest on their property closer to the Northwest Arterial. There will be 48 trees planted, ones that will one day grow to 85 feet tall. It will have educational and way-finding signage for people to go find the forest. It'll be great for school groups to get outside and learn about different trees or a destination for family picnics focusing on the arboretum side, different from the flower gardens. And one day, Sandi would love to see an event center built on site. Somewhere for special events and for those popular botanical garden weddings to be able to host their entire event on site. But that's down the road a bit.

"We think the arboretum is a place where you can come, slow down, set your stress suitcases down, and enjoy the beauty and nature that is around you. Most of us don't take the time. It's always free to come to the Arboretum. It's for everybody."

All shows are free to the public and open lawn seating. Concerts are all scheduled to run from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. For more information and updates, visit **DubuqueArboretum.net**. ■





The band is made up of vocalist Luke Ponce, guitarist Aaron Lutz, drummer Matt Millering, and bassist Jimmy Blankenship.

After one meeting with his fellow band mates, Dead Eyes' lead singer Zach Williams embarked on a 24 hour straight drive across the country. His goal? To escape circumstances at home which had come to leave him feeling complacent. This feeling of being trapped is what lead Zach to write "Prisoner." With the Deadkru, a fanbase turned subculture, growing rapidly, over a million combined streams between all platforms, and social media numbers that are growing everyday, Dead Eyes have amassed all of the necessary tools to take over the scene in 2019.

ALL RANGOONS ARE GOOD RANGOONS A PEEK INTO THE DUBUQUE RANGOON SCENE

Crab rangoons are a Chinese-American appetizer staple and always find their way to my belly whether I'm at a buffet or ordering a meal. For the uninitiated, a crab rangoon is a deep fried wonton filled with a cream cheese concoction. The wonton wrappers can be folded in various ways to seal in the piping hot filling which usually consists of cream cheese and imitation crab meat as well as seasonings and aromatics like garlic and green onions. Below are three fan favorites according to my highly scientific Facebook poll. We have 10 more places to cover in Dubuque, so stay tuned for more crab rangoon-age in the future.

Walking into Oolong Asian Cuisine, you wouldn't recognize it from is former life. Colorful glass lanterns hover over tables and booths while Top 40 hits serenade you through your meal. Although the menu is fairly small with six entrées and six appetizers, the rich flavors and passion behind the food are not lacking.

Owner Ken Lin wanted to offer the Dubuque community something different, and after cooking the typical sesame chicken and general's chicken fare for many years, he was ready for change too. A fairly new addition to the menu, Oolong offers lobster rangoons that are filled with equal parts real lobster meat and imitation crab meat. The wrapper is the largest I've seen and is on the thicker side. The rangoons are served with a side of Thai sweet chili sauce which is to say a fancier sweet and sour sauce. A top pick for many rangoon enthusiasts, Oolong's rangoons are on the bougier side without being pretentious.

Coming in at 4 for \$7, these rangoons are on the higher end of the price spectrum, but it only reflects the quality of the ingredients and, well, lobster!

I say this in the most loving way possible: if you're looking for "cheap Chinese," look no further than Great Dragon. Located in the strip mall next to Target, Great Dragon offers a lunch buffet and ginormous lunch and dinner specials (meals) in addition to à la carte pint and quart entrées.

Great Dragon's crabmeat rangoons are simple and sweet. They have a smaller, thinner wonton wrapper that doesn't shatter although they do feel fragile compared to their counterparts. They're kind of the Lay's chip of the rangoon world while most are thicker like Ruffles. The filling is very smooth and makes you wonder if there's even any crab inside, but something about its simplicity has me going back for seconds. Warmed sweet and sour sauce is provided or a variety of sauce packets are available. The lunch buffet is the way to go if you're looking for a variety of options and an unlimited supply of rangoons, but if buffets aren't you're thing, you can get a lunch or dinner special and swap two rangoons for the eggroll.

You can get 6 for \$5.35. I can easily down two or three during lunch and could probably eat all six for dinner if you dared me. (Please, someone, dare me.)

House of China is a longtime favorite of many Dubuquers with a slew of menu options and even a lunch buffet on Sundays (perfect for those hangover cravings). They have been serving the community since 1984 and have continuously been the winner of Hospice of Dubuque's BestFest Best Place for Chinese Cuisine every single year.

The crabmeat rangoons at House of China are average in size and are wrapped with a thicker wonton skin. This gives the rangoons a slightly bubbly appearance and add extra texture to an already crunchy delight. The creamy cheese filling is garlic-forward, and you can see a smattering of green onion dispersed throughout. You can dress the rangoons on your own with sweet and sour sauce, hot mustard, or my favorite: both. Although the crab is not the most prominent flavor, these were the top pick in my poll.

WANT TO BE A POSITIVE PERSON? DRINK MORE WATER!

Most people understand that hydration is crucial for health! It has been proven through all kinds of independent research. Regardless of this information, many people are walking around dangerously close to dehydration. According to CBS News 75 percent of Americans may suffer from chronic dehydration.

Approximately two-thirds of the adult human body is made of water and we only recently have begun to understand its role in the maintenance of brain function. Our brain is around 75 percent water. When we get dehydrated, our brain shrinks. Even mild dehydration has been shown to change brain function. Dehydration is known to contribute to stress, anger, headaches, dry skin, fatigue, and dizziness. These symptoms can cause you act in a negative manner.

A new study, led by Coleen Muñoz, found that the greater the water consumption, the better the mood a person is in. Tension, depression and confusion went down when water intake went up. Drinking more water also can decrease your appetite, prevent headaches, and make you less cranky. The standard rule of thumb is to drink either half your body weight in ounces in water or try to drink 8 glasses or 64 ounces of water a day.

I can't guarantee it, but if dehydration (and maybe your negative attitude) can be easily fixed by drinking more water, I suggest you give it a try. If your family, friends, and co-workers start offering you water all of the time, do me a favor and just drink it.

5 IDEAS FOR COOKING WITH YOGURT YOU LOVE IT AS A SNACK, BUT ARE YOU USING YOGURT TO ITS FULL POTENTIAL?

Yogurt is practically taking over the dairy aisle, and we're okay with that. Because in addition to being a high-protein, high-calcium breakfast, it can be used in everything from savory marinades to salad dressings to sweet homemade frozen yogurt.

When buying yogurt, look for one that doesn't contain artificial flavors or sweeteners. Chobani is a good choice for this since it only uses natural ingredients and doesn't contain preservatives. Whichever brand you choose, just remember that Greek yogurt will be thicker and contain more protein than regular yogurt.

BREAKFAST

The trick to making a breakfast that keeps you full until lunch is simple: Pair protein with fiber and a little bit of fat. For example, Greek yogurt is high in protein, berries are high in fiber, and nut butter is rich with unsaturated fat. And they just happen to be delicious when mixed together in parfaits or smoothies.

MARINADES

Use yogurt to marinate chicken. Not only does it contain enzymes that help tenderize meat, plain yogurt also has less sugar than most marinades, which tend to burn on the grill. Here's a quick recipe that works for 1 to 1½ pounds of chicken: Mix together 1 cup of Chobani plain Greek yogurt, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 3 tablespoons of olive oil, 2 minced garlic cloves, salt, pepper and any fresh herbs you like. Allow the chicken to marinate in the mixture for at least 30 minutes, but preferably overnight, before grilling.

MAYO SUBSTITUTE

So you love potato salad and pasta salad but want a lighter version? Use yogurt instead of mayonnaise. You get the same tang for your buck, without the extra fat. It also works well for chicken salad or egg salad.

FROZEN YOGURT

Flavored Greek yogurts make delicious desserts, especially when they're frozen. Two of our favorite ways to do this are to make frozen yogurt bark or frozen yogurt

pops. For the bark, spread 2 containers (5.3 ounces each) of flavored Greek yogurt on a parchment-lined sheet pan. Then top with fresh berries and cereal and freeze for at least 4 hours. Once frozen, break the bark into large pieces and serve. To make frozen yogurt pops, mix 1½ cups of flavored Greek yogurt with ½ cup coconut milk. Pour the mixture

into molds with a stick in the center of each and freeze for at least 4 hours.

BAKING

If you've ever made a French Yogurt Cake, then you know how delicious yogurt can be in baked goods. It adds a rich tanginess similar to buttermilk. In fact, yogurt works as a substitution for buttermilk, sour cream, and sometimes heavy cream in many recipes. Plus, the acidity of yogurt helps activate baking soda in cakes and quick breads. You can also use yogurt to replace some of the oil in a recipe. A good rule of thumb is to swap out half the oil and replace it with 3/4 the amount of yogurt. So, if your recipe calls for one cup of oil, use ½ cup of oil and ¾ cup of yogurt. ■

THE BIG SURPRISE

I have a tiny problem with the short stories and novels of Arthur C. Clarke. I haven't found even one lacking in the smallest way. I am thinking that my critical faculties left for Grand Cayman Island and forgot to inform me OR I am having a '60s flashback OR I have found the ultimate science fiction writer who ever lived and my critical faculties are finely tuned and as sharp as ever. Hint: it's the last one. LOL.

A huge preponderance of Mr. Clarke's readers and nearly all of the science fiction critics chiming in regard him as the best who ever lived. My only claim to expertise in this matter is that I think I have read virtually everything he has written. I have noticed something that keeps bubbling to the surface: Mr. Clark makes the typical themes in science fiction special.

Present in all his fiction are his main themes (see below). Many times Mr. Clarke weaves these ideas into the characters, the plot, the bad guys, the good guys, and the ending resulting in a rich musical-like story known as a space opera. Then comes *The City and the Stars* which is unlike any of Clark's other stories.

In 1948 he wrote a novella, Against the Fall of Night. He must have liked it because a few years later he reworked it, overhauled the story and expanded it. In 1956, he published it as The City and the Stars. (Mr. Clarke is known for mining his past fiction. The most famous example is a wonderful little story called The Sentinel. He gave it a total makeover and it was transformed into 2001: A Space Odyssey.)

In The City and the Stars he did something I can't recall any other writer doing. He set the story one billion years in the future on a planet called Earth that had absolutely nothing in common with the Earth of today. The people who lived in Diaspar thought it was the only city left on Earth and they were the surviving remnants of the human race

Clarke chose this stark setting because he didn't want any space opera stuff to get in the way of his main themes: the idea of magic being confused with god, and look what technology has done to our civilization. One of Clarke's three laws is, "Any sufficiently advanced technology is indistinguishable from magic" or by extension, he who owns this technology could easily be mistaken for a god.

Diaspar has been a domed city for millions of generations. The original

designers and engineers of the city created a computer that was galaxy-class. It had finally evolved to be able to



separate the body from the brain. There was no disease, no aberrant behavior.

The computer actually created people who lived for 1,000 years. Then, their DNA was stored in the computer's memory to be called up at another time to live another 1,000 years. Sometimes you remembered past lives.

Into this city was "born" Alvin. He was a Unique. In a million generations, there were only 14 Uniques. This was his first life. He was experiencing everything for the first time. He was also born with something that would forever change Earth. Curiosity. Eventually, Alvin gets help from the city's Fool. Yes, there was a job of Fool in order to put a little uncertainty into the society.

Alvin discovers another city, Lys, filled with humanoids who evolved very differently from the pure-thought humanoids of Diaspar. Alvin discovers that each civilization has different stories, essentially folklore, about how things got the way they presently were.

One city believes in a Master and five Great Ones. Alvin discovers the Master's starship and sets out to find this Master and his Great Ones who are scheduled to return. On his journey, Alvin runs into two omniscient, sentient beings. He also discovers that the Master is dead. Alvin returns to see about reuniting the two different species of humanoids only to discover they cannot interbreed so technically, they are not related as a species in any way. Evolution, after a billion years, has produced two brand new species on Earth.

The City and the Stars is so jammed packed I slid right off my lounge chair. Truthfully, reading Arthur C. Clarke is dangerous. The City and the Stars had the misfortune of being published three years after Clark's Childhood's End, which after 60 years is not only considered one of his masterworks, but the best science fiction book ever written.

However, *The City and the Stars*' reputation has risen after living so long in the shadow. A large group of people, and I am one of them, celebrate *The City and the Stars* as different but equal to *Childhood's End.* In its own way, *The City and the Stars* is a masterwork as well.




