Last week there was an updated article in the *Telegraph Herald* about the associated tax costs of new Five Flags. The article got it right and laid out the details, but especially in the first paragraph, though accurate, many people were quickly confused by what they read. Perhaps skimming the paper, the didn't read closely enough. But whatever the reason, some people freaked out a bit and were posting the story to Facebook with anger. So, being on the Five Flags commission and knowing the actual facts of the issue to some degree, I did my best to answer their questions and correct misconceptions. I should have just punched myself in the face and beat my head against the wall.

Before I continue with my "people want their opinions, not the facts" rant, let me just quickly point out that a new Five Flags is not going to cost you \$450 a year. So relax and breathe... very good. If your house is worth \$150,000, it'll cost you about \$6 per month in year one and \$10.50 per month in year four. That's a TOTAL of \$450 over four years. We'll get back to the later, but now, back to me beating my head against that wall.

Did you ever get into an argument with someone about something that's not hard to comprehend, like the fact that humans are affecting the change in climate? There's a boatload of science on the issue on one side, and like a coal lobbyist on the other side. So you start to explain it, but you quickly realize that you can't start from even ground and work up from there. You find out that you need to start your argument from much farther back because before you can get to the climate, you first have to get this person to agree that Earth is indeed, not flat. After five minutes of arguing that, you find yourself in a heated defense that 9/11 was not an inside job by the CIA. At this point you realize you just need to run... to a bar... and get a stiff drink.

So in this case, I post some details regarding the proposed tax situation with Five Flags, and I was surprised at just how much people did not give a crap what the facts were. They were just against it. I will interject that I agree that everyone has the right to be against any project or tax increase, of course. Some people are against any new taxes. I think they call them Republicans. :) But really, when asked to support arts and culture, they use the excuse, "I'm not paying for anything until we take care of the police and the firemen first." It's kind of a knee jerk response. But then when asked to pony up money for police and fire, they still say no, with the great idea of taking money away from existing arts and culture funding first. But if you then want to use something other than simple self-interest, or you think you are working in others interest, to justify you position, especially when it's something that's simply



false, I feel inclined to correct you. I know I'm not going to change your mind—I know that. But I don't want other people reading what I just read on your page to be swayed by false information and angry assumptions.

I call them assumptions because people really seem disinterested in checking the facts before forming their unswayable opinions. I must have written the phrase "READ THE REPORT" about 50 times this week. So many of the argumentative comments in the comment strings of these posts were incorrect assumptions that were easily dispelled by simply reading the CSL study. CSL is Convention Sports and Leisure, a consulting firm that specializes in researching the viability of buildings like this. Their data is not from opinions, and they're not paid to be "pro-building." They're paid to compile the facts and present options. It is a comprehensive review of all local data, comparative data from other cities, and years of experience in active involvement in these issues. If they were paid to lie, they would not have the track-record of accuracy to earn them business in the future. It's their ability to accurately forecast the viability of a project that makes them the best and most-trusted at what they do in the industry.

I read a comment like, "You know that once they pass this tax they're never going to take it away." And then 50 people "liked" the comment. Nevermind that it's literally impossible and illegal to continue a bond tax after the bond is paid. People just form a negative opinion and share it as almighty truth and all the other angry people point at it and say "yeah, that!"

So, I think in the next issue, I'm going to address the biggest questions or misconceptions that keep arising in these online rants and answer them to the best of my ability. Things like "why don't they just sell it and let a private company run it for profit," or "there's no parking," or "this is going to raise rent on poor people," or "It's still not going to big enough to get good concerts." All of these have smart answers, but it's really hard to answer them in a Facebook comment. So please come back next time and check it out.

Of course I want you to support a new Five Flags. But if you still don't, I just don't want you using false information to try to tear it down. Just vote no because you don't want us to pay to have nice things. That's a legitimate excuse. An unfortunate and nearsighted excuse, but a true excuse. Thank you.

"I like to find serious things and find the humor in them. Cancer is such a tense topic. It's just asking for release. It's just asking for comedy. Comedy also is about human beings facing things they are unequipped to handle. This is something we are unequipped to handle. As humans, the best we can do is laugh about it," said Nelson.

DIMENSIONAL **BREWING CO.**

Co-founded by Tom Rauen and Jeff Burds with brewers Shane Knipper, Joe Specht, and Grant Wulf, Dimensional Brewing Co. seems to be the result of the stars aligning.

Tom and Jeff both had an idea for starting a brewery. Jeff met Grant and tasted some of his home brew and introduced him to Joe. Tom already knew Joe for a long time and, well, let's just say it all started with a beer...or two

The vision for a community-based destination craft brewery was going to happen elsewhere until Tom learned the Atlas Power Fluid building was about to come on the market in the perfect part of town for a brewer-Old Main St. Following a huge undertaking to turn an old, run down building into a vibrant brewery and taproom, the first year of business exceeded

all expectations with more big things to come in 2020 including completing the beer garden, partnering with Flatted Fifth BBQ in Bellevue, IA to have a restaurant in the taproom, adding a canning line to introducing 16 oz. cans, and releasing the first of many barrel aged stouts.

We skipped over the fact that the venue itself is beautifully restored with great garage door-style openings to the street making for an amazing warm-weather extension into the outdoor vibrancy of Main Street. It's a wonderful addition to Dubuque both for local beer and entertainment lovers as well as for tourism. One more example of those amenities you only expect to see in big cities coming to Dubuque.

K.I.D.S. (KIDS IN DUBUQUE SKATE)

Perseverance is when you start fighting for something you are passionate about as a kid, and by the time you see it to fruition, you are almost old enough to have your

own kids. That is the root of the success of the K.I.D.S. organization, Kids in Dubuque Skate. With the help and guidance of some likewise impassioned adults, this group of youngsters were the driving force that made the new, nearly million dollar skate part at Flora Park in Dubuque a reality.

The story began more than a decade ago. A long time ago, the K.I.D.S. group formed, wanting to improve skateboarding opportunities for kids. They were active year in and year out, working directly with city staff and city council members to advocate for the venue until it finally became an officially noted City County propriety. Even then, getting onto the city's list of Capital Improvement Projects was not the end of the road as it got bombed from the list more than once. But they were tenacious and kept trying, even as members were growing up and leaving for college. A new generation got involved.

When presented with a financial plan where they were tasked with raising \$200,000 of an \$800,000+ proposed budget for the park, they were not deterred. These were kids mind you. With the help of their adult mentors, they did fundraising and grantwriting to fulfill their \$200,000. In the end, they ended up raising \$241,000.

Once the funding was in place, they placed an active role in choosing a location and developing the design of the park. Always present at all community meetings to talk with potential neighbors, the kids were engaged into a process to discover what it takes to make a dream a reality.

They were, of course, also heavily involved in choosing the elements and amenities they wanted to see in the park. simple things such as water, restrooms, and shade that they did not have before.

The kids always said this would not be just great for Dubuque community, but that it would become something that brings people to the community, and they were right. As highquality skate park amenities are in short supply in the region, license plates from all over the Midwest have been showing up in the parking lot, which also brings additional economic benefit to the community from visitors.

The park also allows for the growth of grass-roots programs like SheSkates, created by Isabella Mejia, which gets young girls involved in this exciting sport and bolsters self-confidence while creating new bonds of friendship.

"The big part of the project," says Marie Ware, City of Dubuque Leisure Services Manager, "is that they persevered over the long-haul. They got there and created something really special for our community."

MIKE MEYER

When you look at the civic success in Fast Dubuque, II through groups like the East Dubuque Greater Events Foundation, the Lions Club, East Dubuque **Business and Tourism** and the Tavern



League, and events like the fireworks, Wingfest, Cruisin' Thursdays, and more, there is a common thread that seems to run through all of these things, and his name is Mike Meyer.

Owner of The Otherside in East Dubuque and part of a family legacy of downtown East Dubuque entertainment, Mike is involved in EVERYTHING East Dubuque. "I'm for everything local," he says. "I just want people to be FOR this town."

In every organization there are lots of members who do their part to make things happen, but there's always a person or two who seem to carry the torch and do the heavy lifting. For so many community-service initiatives in East Dubuque, Mike Meyer is that guy. He walks the walk. And, of course, in talking with him. he never says "I," he only says "We." As in, we did this or we did that, when so often we is he. Though he is guick to share credit with his contemporaries in groups like the EDGE (the foundation) or the Lions Club, especially John "Digger" Digman, who should probably get to put this award in his house for a couple weeks a year.

Though many share the load, Mike leads the way in so many ways to create great events that promote East Dubuque and bring visitors to the community while also providing family-friendly activities for its citizens. And then they take all of the money that those events generate and give it all back to the community. The EDGE foundation has donated back \$40,000 in three years. Events like Wingfest, East Dubuque Cruisin' Thiursdays, East Dubuque Fun Days, golf outings, mini-golf outings, trivia nights, corn boils and whiffle ball tournaments have Mike at the epicenter of their success. The funds raised support local schools, the fire department training center, holiday lights, Boy Scouts, and more. The same could be said for funds from local Lions Club fundraisers that make things like the fireworks possible.

And that's without getting into the great things The Otherside does to support downtown businesses, from great customer appreciation nights every week, to providing live entertainment for Crusin' Thursday, to organizing bar owners to fight for their fair right to do business to the benefit of East Dubuque's bottom line.

"It's all about supporting local, and I'll always take a team award over a personal award," says Mike. Too bad buddy, you're not ducking this one.

The extensive deep root systems of the native and adapted plants thrive in rain gardens as a naturally effective way to manage rainwater runoff. The metallic train on the model's gown beautifully enhances the concept of the rainwater runoff. Pearce's collection of her fantastic figures in a style that has been described as imaginary realism. Although dedicated to the rigorous 16th century painting techniques of the Old Masters, she paints curious scenes of children interwoven with their toys and pets. The model wonderfully compliments this collection with a vintage, but youthful style gown, from the PS Styling closet. The DuMA invites you to visit our beautiful and charming museum. Curiosity is all you need to walk through our front doors. No education is necessary. Jessica Pfohl Paisley is a style professional and the founder of PS Styling, creating opportunities

for empowerment through image and style. Kate McIntosh is a beauty and wellness professional and the founder of Kate & Co., building confidence through beauty. wellness and the art of living simply.

Project lifeSTYLE is a collaborative effort between PS Styling and Kate & Co. to provide styling, beauty, and wellness services to women in need. By using their skills and experience, Project lifeSTYLE encourages women to overcome challenges and understand their own self worth. Image and confidence can be a barrier for those that are trying to grow in their professional and personal lives. Project lifeSTYLE's goal is to create an empowering environment and wellness focus for women in need, specifically those in shelters, that are utilizing community resources, and are unemployed/underemployed.

Project LifeSTYLE provides an environment and "retail" space where the women can benefit from their services and be able to shop with a style professional in their store FREE OF CHARGE, be professionally styled, and receive hair and make up services prior to a job interview or major event.

They have raised funds by hosting multiple fashion shows, with the most recent in December with a collaboration of PS Styling, Fig Leaf, Wardrobe Social, and The Midwest Girl. 100 percent of ticket sales went back to support their mission and the women they are working with at Project lifeSTYLE.

It will be inspirational to watch the impact these women will make on other women now and in the future.

RACE IN THE HEARTLAND: MIQUEL **JACKSON**

Race in the Heartland originated from a group of organizations who responded to a letter that was posted on a local

rental agency's property. The letter contained racial slurs and was made to appear as if the management had wrote it, but in fact was written by a disgruntled white resident. The Human Rights Commission along with various community organizations met to discuss the matter and to determine a course of action moving forward. From this meeting it was decided that we would have a Race Conference, which would include a community forum.

A first-of-its-kind conference in Dubuque, the goal was to create a lasting impact on all who attend. The mission was to host a conference in Dubuque that centered on race and equity, focusing on key topics: housing, education, criminal justice, and the work place. They sought to create an environment for positive dialogue that will equip those who attend the conference with the skills to feel comfortable being involved in discourse about racial inequality.

Miquel Jackson, the Coordinator for Race in The Heartland, is a Dubuque Human Rights Commissioner, the Vice President of the Dubuque NAACP, Chair of the Dubuque Community Police Relations Committee, and works as a Home/School Liaison at Lincoln Elementary for the Dubuque Community School District. He coordinates BBQ IN DBQ and the Annual NAACP Turkey Give Away, both meant to bring community resources to the "people" and foster community togetherness. Miquel has facilitated conversations on race relations and created a plan of action in the Cedar Rapids School District. This Race in the Heartland Conference is one more example of how Miguel is living an impactful life, to the benefit of us all.

"Race In the Heartland: The Past In the Present, is important because race and equity matter," explains Jackson. "We are in a time where people are wanting to understand what it means to be equitable and what it means to be inclusive. These same people either do not know how or are looking for ways to improve upon knowledge they already have. This conference is beneficial because no matter whether you are the CEO or the janitor, Race in The Heartland provides you with skills and best practices that can be utilized at all levels of any business/organization."

ROBERT WOODSTOCK BADER

Don't let the tattoos. the beard and dreadlocks fool you. There's noting to dread from working with Robert Woodstock Bader.

owner of Crow's Nest Tattoo and Retrospect Tattoo Removal in downtown Dubuque. Based on his actions, it appears the man is all heart.

"If you are in need of help, and it is within his means to do so, he will help," decrees one of the nominations for Woodstock for a 2020 365ink Impact Award. He's got his generous fingers in so many worthy efforts, the only way to cover them all (or those we know of) is to just list them out.

Every year towards the holidays he does a coat and food drive to get food into the hands of people who may not have been able to eat otherwise, this year to the tune of over 4,000 pounds of food. That's in addition to years of supporting the Marine Corps Toys For Tots with either boxes full of toys or big generous checks. He has helped collect money to build a playground for a daycare. He created a motorcycle ride where they used all the money made to buy school supplies for parents who could not afford them.

He drove supplies to environmental protesters of the Dakota Access Pipeline in Standing Rock, ND.

Mr. Bader uses his business to organize awesome events where he also helps with things like raising over \$4,000 for the Autistic Children's Department of Hills & Dales, Crow's Nest's Be Kind event raised over \$1,000 to donate to The Dubugue Resuce Mission. He also has donated and helped to work with suicide prevention through Hills & Dales through the The American Suicide Center. He regularly takes entire days worth of the shop's income-not iust profits—and donates to great causes like Opening Doors and Compass to Care.

Through the Crow's Nest, Robert has tracked over \$10,000 in gift cards given to hundreds of normal everyday folks trying to raise money for their loved ones for multitudes of reasons, usually medical. It's not "marketing" when a guy quietly donates \$1,000 to a tattooer in Platteville who lost everything to a house fire; it's compassion. "Woodstock" as most people call him, sponsors a stage at Vintage Torquefest and donates a check to one family whose child is dealing with a rare heart disease, the cause funded by the event.

Perhaps, most indelible (pun intended) is his promise to use his Retrospect Tattoo Removal business to remove tattoos that deal with racist or gang related themes and brands on those kidnapped and forced into the sex trade—free of charge. Each removal could be worth thousands of dollars.

"Then the most immeasurable and most important thing I get to do, the one that gets me and my client into tears, is being lucky enough to help change some of our clients lives," explains Bader. "By giving them something that most of them have yet to experience—a second chance."

This man could have a better life for himself but chooses to donate so much of his time and money to better the lives of those around him.

URBAN **BICYCLE FOOD** MISSION DUBUQUE: **MELINDA VIZE** Urban Bicycle Food

Mission Dubuque is a community outreach organization created by Melinda Vize which

delivers food to those who are food insecure in downtown Dubuque every Sunday, year round. UBFM Dubuque meets at the Dubuque Area Labor Harvest to prep and then serve those in need in Dubuque via bicycles. During the winter months, they still deliver, just in vehicles!

The group offers food like burritos. sandwiches, and fruit, as well as personal care items. They also use the opportunity to make connections with the people they help. Teams of at least four roll out with deliveries on designated routes. Since the program began in August 2018, they have served nearly 10,000 meals!



I nearly fell out of my recliner . A support group for serial killers. And that's in the first chapter. What a creative idea to juice up what has become a lackluster genre. JG Alva has done a wonderful job in his latest novel *The Bristol Savages*.

The group informally calls itself The Bristol Savages, so, a short explanation is called for. The Bristol Savages

was a real arts organization in the late 19th century and, in fact, I believe it is still going strong. The serial killer support group took the name because the arts group used to gather in a meeting room in the back of the inn across the road. The word "savages" meant something completely different as used by both groups.

One day the group hears that one of their own has died. A short time later another death in the group piques Anna's curiosity. When Anna was hunting and killing she mutilated the bodies in the same way and this became her calling card. The two deaths in the group were mutilated identically to Anna's handiwork. It has irony dripping all over it. A serial killer was killing serial killers and pointing death's finger at Anna Lewis.

Anna was not amused and neither was the Detective Inspector who headed the Bristol police department. He appointed a task force whose sole job was to find and apprehend this serial killer. Here is the wild, wonderful twist that makes Mr. Alva's novel so much fun to read. Anna is married to the Detective who is put in charge of the task force.

Anna has to find this killer before her husband does and we all know what she intends to do. If the killer is captured alive, the Bristol Savages will be on the front page of every newspaper in the U.K. As they say, a mutilated corpse can't talk, especially if the corpse is never found.

This, my friends, is a ripping good yarn. It is the first book in a series and I believe there are two more out this month. I will say that *The Bristol Savages* is a standalone, no cliff hangers. Anna has a great family and they know nothing of her hobby. Anna herself seems to be, in fact, a nice person right up until she uses a screwdriver to stab you in the eyes. In 1981 I came across



an interesting novel in the book store. I bought it and spent the weekend reading it. It was Thomas Harris' *The Red Dragon*. Seven years later he wrote a sequel that made a huge noise in the publishing business becoming a best seller the day it was published. It was the further adventures of the main character in *The Red Dragon*. The character was Dr. Hannibal Lector, more affectionately known as Hannibal the Cannibal.

The book, of course was *The Silence of the Lambs*. For 30 years it has been the gold standard for serial killer books. Everyone else's books seemed washed out and boring, that is until JG Alva happened along and managed to supply us all with a unique take on serial killers in a superbly written, ingeniously plotted novel filled with great characters. *The Bristol Savages* deserves a place on your bookshelf. I'm now on the hunt for the two sequels. ■







SEED STARTING AND MORE CURES FOR SPRING FEVER

Punxsutawney Phil, Seer of Seers, Sage of Sages, Prognosticator of Prognosticators and Weather-Prophet Extraordinary predicted an early fall this year. Whatever you call this "tried and true" weatherman, it certainly doesn't feel like spring to me, Mr. Phil. In fact, at the time of writing this, my thermostat shows a balmy -10.

But no fear! Here are a few things you can do to cure your spring fever.

START PLANTING (INDOORS ANYWAYS)

VEGETABLES

While some seeds like carrots, beans and salad greens, can be directly planted into the garden, many require a head start indoors. Depending on the germination time requirement, we are quickly approaching the right time to start veggies indoors such as tomatoes, peppers, eggplant and broccoli.

ANNUALS

Simply purchase a seed starting blend of potting soil, which is light weight, and put it in some sort of tray, ideally one with individual portions and a clear lid to act as a greenhouse. If you're a DIYer you can make one using some old egg cartons, egg shells with a small




