

Well hello there!

When we celebrated our 365th issue of 365ink in March we never thought it would be our last issue for a couple of months, but here we are. We're back, and the world is suddenly a different place. And just because we're publishing again doesn't mean it's over or that it won't come back even worse again at a later date. But like everyone, we're adapting as we go and doing what we can to continue to be who we are and do what we do. But doing what we do just got a whole lot more interesting and difficult.

There's one truth at the core of 365ink. Without the businesses, organizations, and talented people who make up the cultural fabric of our community, we are nothing. If there are no events to promote, if we can't come together to celebrate, to socialize, to eat, and to learn, there's no reason for there to be a 365ink. So like you, we waited, we stayed home, and we used social media to share real and helpful information about being safe and getting to the other end of this terrible situation. Well, most of you. Some people love to look at reality and decide it's all a big lie.

I completely understand the extreme frustration of businesses who have been completly shut down because of COVID-19-I'm one of them. But how anger at not being able to do business became an affront to civil liberties to wear a mask to protect others is simply beyond me. The herd-stupidity of a whole segment of the population is not just maddening, it's depressing. All we had to do was stay home for a couple of weeks, and wear a mask if you had to go out, and people just ignored it. There are so many parallels to make between this and arguments that so many "patriots" make about freedoms. Soldiers risk their lives to protect us, but you can't wear a mask because you're an American and can't be told how to live your life. You need a good guy with a gun to save people from a bad guy with a gun, but when asked to wear a mask to also protect a life, it's unconstitutional? I saw the Republican Governor of North Dakota in near tears begging people to stop mask-shaming. So, I know it's purely not a Republican/Democrat thing. But there is a completely unnecessary and unhelpful divide over this issue, and if ever we should be on the same team for something, keeping us all alive should be it. To do anything else is purely ignorant, selfish, and shameful behavior. Opening up is something we all should strive for, but we can open and still be mindful. So as we open, and you forget there was a problem, when you do see a person who still chooses to wear a mask, please

respect their choice. It's bad enough that some won't play ball, but shaming someone who is is unconscionable.

I want bars and theaters open too. You have no idea how bad I want that, It's my lifeblood after all.

Without those businesses open and thriving, I have advertising that keeps our lights on. But my ethical considerations go beyond that. Just because we CAN open, should we? Is it my responsibility to promote social gatherings? Or when is it safe for me to do so? The day things can open? A week later? A month later? I don't know the answer, so I've just used my best judgement, watched the numbers, and took into consideration the wishes of our readers and advertisers. After all, most of you will only read this issue because you went out in the public and found a copy. Should I be enticing you go out in public to get your 365ink if you may be at risk? It's so hard to know the right thing to do.

But obviously you are reading this issue, and we have started printing again. Even that's hard because there's simply still not a whole lot going on event-wise, and there likely will not be for some time. We won't see new move releases until July or I hear that even September is now a possibility. Performing arts venues are just staying dark until fall, and many festivals have simply pulled the plug for 2020, even if they're not slated to happen until late summer. So what do we write about if there's no staged theatre or large scale concerts? We tell stories too, but mostly we are about events and things you can get up and go do. If those things are not happening, my job is not just hard, it's not very fun either. But like you, even at a time when are jobs are harder than usual, we do them anyway as best we can.

Thanks for picking up the new issue of 365ink or finding it online. And please look closely at all of the advertisers in this issue. They are my heroes. Without every one of them, we could not come back today. And we're still losing money being open, but not as much as we would if we did nothing. If your business has the means to promote in today's economic climate, we'd love your support as we support those who were hardest hit by the shutdown.

I know I didn't talk about the racial tensions happening in America right now. It saddens me as much as the wave of change it is causing inspires me. But I know there are voices much better suited than mine to properly express the same feelings I have about it all, and I hope to give them some voice in upcoming issues. It's a weird time all around. But I'm glad to be here, and I'm glad you are here with me.

Be safe. Be smart. Be respectful. Be the best of Dubuque. Happy Independence Day from the whole crew at 365ink.







"This challenge was completely unexpected and affects literally everyone in the world," explained Cory Jacobson, owner of Phoenix Theatres. "We have faith in the human need to interact with one another and the art we present at the movies. It is unique to our American experience, as movies are one of our greatest cultural contributions to the world. Our business is both local and very social by nature and uniquely disadvantaged in a pandemic crisis."

The movie industry is not only closed at your local theatre, but all production has stopped on new feature films as well. The film studios have responded by literally rescheduling all films beginning later this summer and in some cases 2021. As the film industry grapples with these unprecedented problems, Phoenix Theatres decided to proactively shift their focus to offer solutions that could make a difference.

"Our management group has spent the past few months working on developing a comprehensive plan with CDC guidance to carefully re-open our theatres," Jacobson said. "We are hopeful that all of our locations will be able to open by July 24 to support the return of Hollywood's summer blockbuster movies to the big screen with Walt Disney's *Mulan*."

Phoenix Theatres has used the time since it was allowed to technically re-open to train local management and employees on their new protocols and make upgrades to their ticketing system that will allow the computer to automatically practice social distancing inside each auditorium by implementing reserved seating.

Phoenix Theatres plans to incorporate both CDC and our local government standards on how a theatre should safely operate. Working closely with the National Association of Theatre Owners and with the help of their management and employees, Phoenix Theatres has established new safety protocols for every aspect of the theatre:

 Social distancing guidelines in all the common areas and most importantly in the theatre auditoriums. The seating layout will automatically be configured within the reserved seating computer software, so that customers will not be within six feet of other guests not in their family group.

- Each employee will wear masks and other protective equipment.
- Streamlined transactions at the ticketing and concession stand to further minimize touch points.
- In between each showing, Phoenix Theaters will use a food grade disinfectant spray on all seats that removes 99.99% of all viruses on surfaces within 30 seconds.
- Using this disinfectant spray on high touch points throughout the building including the restrooms and concession areas.
- Hand sanitizer stations will also be provided for customer use throughout the theatre.

There is no doubt that the coronavirus has wreaked havoc on the movie industry in ways that are visible to us. However, theatre owners all over the country remain hopeful.

In the past several weeks, the movie industry has received some very hopeful news with Solstice Studios announcing a July 10 opening for their new Russell Crowe film *Unhinged*, Walt Disney Studios opening their long awaited *Mulan* on July 24, and Warner Brother's following with their new Christopher Nolan film *Tenet* on July 31.

"It is our sincere hope that our society can safely return to a normal routine of enjoying our lives and love of movies. The experience of living through this crisis has certainly been very humbling for all of us. I want to personally thank many of you that have called us and took the time to send us letters of support. These little niceties are just a little more appreciated than ever and prove to us that it's incredible customers who have supported us the last 20 years."

VINTAGE TORQUE FEST 2020 HOT RODS, MUSIC, PINUPS, & ART

JULY 4-5
DUBUQUE COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS

365ink has been promoting Vintage Torque Fest for more than a decade and to be honest, we've mostly sold the sprawling festival on the sexier aspects of the "kustom kulture" celebration—hot rods, motorcycles, rock & roll, and pinup girls. But in a year where we have all had to step back and reflect a bit, it's pretty clear that VTF is all about community.

The annual event has always been about what organizer John Wells calls his "motor family" and their shared love of hot rod and kustom kulture. And in case you weren't paying attention over the years, it's also been about fundraising to help families of kids with congenital heart issues. Again, community.

That shared camaraderie, the higher purpose to it all, has always been part of the charm of what the unfamiliar might simply consider a "car show." But in 2020—a year that will long be remembered as one of major upheaval—that sense of community has never been more important. We're all in this together, folks.

Originally scheduled for the first weekend of May, Vintage Torque Fest had to be rescheduled due to limitations placed on social gatherings as a result of COVID-19. When faced with the decision to cancel or reschedule, Wells worked with the Dubuque County Fairgrounds to find new dates that might work.

"We had such strong support to keep the event going that we just choose to do it and go forward," Wells explained in a recent interview. "If the state comes in and shuts it down, that's the way it goes. Hopefully, people will come out and support it."

With hopes that the rescheduled festival will proceed, Wells and Fairgrounds organizers hope to host a fun and safe event, despite the challenges of the current age.

"We want everyone to feel safe. We want everyone to understand that we are going to try our best to do the social distancing," Wells explains. "Masks are encouraged but not required. You will see people wearing masks and we hope that everyone will be respectful to those that are wearing masks because they might have some kind of situation at home that tells them that they have to wear a mask. And so please, be respectful and don't be that jerk that is making fun of other people. Because some of us might have our moms at home who are on oxygen and are compromised and we can't bring that home."

At the time Wells and Dubuque County Fairgrounds organizers were contemplating rescheduling, the July 4 weekend was the only dates available at the Fairgrounds. "It was these dates or we don't have the show," recounts Wells. "At the time we made this decision, we only had these dates available."

Wells also acknowledges that the Fourth of July weekend is for many, a family holiday. "Bring your family to the show!" he suggests. "Haven't you been in quarantine with them for the past three months? You've been with your real family for months. Now come out and be with your 'motor family' for a couple of days."

Still, at the time of the decision, Wells and Fairgrounds organizers opted for a Saturday and Sunday show rather than the usual Friday and Saturday schedule to avoid any conflict with the annual Radio Dubuque/ Jaycees Fireworks and Airshow, which was originally scheduled for Friday, July 3. The Fireworks and Air Show have since been rescheduled to Saturday, Aug. 22.

"We were told by the Fairgrounds, by the Visitors Bureau, by other people who kind of know what's going on in Dubuque, DO NOT put your event on the same time as the Airshow and Fireworks because you're only going to shoot yourself in the foot," noted Wells.

With Friday, July 3 now open, the date will serve as the Vintage Torque Fest pre-party and cruise, which will stage at the Dubuque County Fairgrounds at around 1 p.m. leaving for the cruise to Galena, IL at about 1:30 p.m. After allowing some time spent in Galena, the cruise will return to Dubuque, cruising through downtown about 6 p.m. The cruise will return to the Fairgrounds by about 7 p.m. for the pre-party, which will feature Milwaukee-based DJ Fish spinning classic vinyl on the turntables. (Find Vintage Torque Fest on Facebook for more details about the cruise.)

Those interested in seeing a selection of hot rods and other cars are encouraged to find a viewing spot along the cruise route. "The cruise is open to all cars, always has been," notes Wells. "If anybody wants to show that new Mustang or whatever and wants to cruise with everybody—cool, come on out."

It should be noted that show buildings at the Fairgrounds will not be open on Friday as organizers will be setting up that afternoon and evening for the opening of the show on Saturday morning.

With the shift to Saturday and Sunday for the main show at the Fairgrounds, some changes in the "usual" schedule of events have occurred. While VTF typically has drag racing on the Saturday of the weekend show, that activity will be moved to the Sunday around noon of this year's weekend. There will be other track activities scheduled for Saturday, including the return of Chain Racing, which will probably begin around 8 p.m.

For the uninitiated, chain racing is sort of a combination of a stock car race and a demolition derby. Each team has two junk cars. The front car has a working engine but no brakes. The rear car only has brakes. The two are connected by a tow chain or cable. Between the two cars and two drivers, the team has to coordinate their acceleration and braking while racing the other teams. Mayhem ensues.

Wells admits that this year's schedule is a work in progress with so many aspects of the sprawling event still in flux. He asks everyone to be patient with changes and still evolving schedule. "We're probably not going to know those things until the week of the event," he notes.

As with the schedule of events on the dirt track, the live music schedule is still being finalized, a process Wells describes as "a challenge." He typically begins booking bands months in advance but now is scrambling to reschedule bands and find replacements in a mere five weeks. Even bands that could accommodate the change in dates might have to reschedule to a different time over the two-day duration of the show.

Still, visitors can expect the variety and quality of live music for which Vintage Torque Fest has become known. "We definitely have some interesting bands lined up," states Wells.

Some might remember Oklahoma-based honkytonk and rockabilly artist and Ameripolitan Award Winner Jimmy Dale Richardson from his performance at this January's Retro Rewind, the annual winter warm-up for Vintage Torque Fest. Also returning will be honkytonk/outlaw country artist Dallas Moore. "People have been requesting to have him come back for the past two years," relates Wells, "so he's going to be the headliner."

As usual, Vintage Torque Fest will host three stages of live music and entertainment, with somewhere around 15 different bands performing. In keeping with tradition, one of those stages will host the Miss Vintage Torque Fest pinup contest—a chance for ladies to wear vintage-inspired clothing, hair, and makeup in the pinup style. "That's obviously a big part of the show," says Wells. "People love seeing the girls in the classic outfits."



The pinup contest, sponsored and organized by Peak-a-boo Pinups, is scheduled for 11:30 a.m. on Saturday, July 4 at Stage 1. With the popularity of the pinup contest, available entry is already filled.

"Yeah, the past couple of years we've filled that up in literally under 30 minutes," explains Wells. "We make the announcement and these ladies are always waiting to get in because Peak-a-boo Pinups do a top-notch job. I think the reason why our event draws people from St. Louis, Kentucky, Minneapolis, Michigan is because we do put on a really good contest. They want to be able to say that they competed in our contest when the go back home. We've had national recognition with that over the years."

Despite the contest already being filled, Wells encourages any local ladies to come out dressed in vintage or pinup style. "Absolutely! Come out and please be a part of it," encourages Wells. "We always have everyone that's in vintage attire come up on stage



HELPING HANNAH'S HEART FOUNDATION **VINTAGE TORQUE FEST 2020 BENEFICIARY**

There is a spirit of community that runs through the Vintage Torque Fest "motor family" and nowhere is that more apparent than with the Helping Hannah's Heart Foundation, a major beneficiary of proceeds from the annual event. A 501(c) 3 nonprofit, Helping Hannah's Heart Foundation helps to support kids with congenital heart defects and their families. Each year, the foundation chooses one kid and family to be the recipient of funds raised at the event. This year, that kid is Benny Stoll.

Benny was born 10 weeks premature along with his twin sister Ellorie. Not only did Benny have the hurdles of a premature baby, he was aslo diagnosed in utero with Transposition of the Great Arteries (TGA), a rare heart defect where two of the major vessels (Aorta and Pulmonary Artery) that carry blood away from the heart are switched. Being premature, the surgeons were unable to perform corrective surgery until Benny was about two months old. He had a very long recovery and was able to go home three months after he was born.

As Benny was getting older, he still struggled with pulmonary hypertension, eating issues, and had to be on a steady regimen of medication. In the spring of 2019, Benny experienced episodes where he

collapsed, going into cardiac arrhythmia and passing out. Doctors found that Benny had issues with his coronary

artery and underwent a bypass surgery in December 2019. He continues to be under the care of a cardiologist. He is seven years old and is the type of kid that always has a smile on his face and lives everyday with no regrets. He is a tractor loving, car crazy heart hero.

The Stoll family will be on hand at Vintage Torque Fest on Saturday, July 4, where at about 2 p.m. they will be presented with a donation check.

"We hope that people understand that that is what this whole thing is about," explained VTF organizer John Wells, "supporting a family. We've helped raise over \$60,000, (donated) directly to these families. They will be onstage and if you want to come up and give them money directly, we totally encourage you to do that. That's what it's all about. We're trying to help these people out. As a 501 (c) 3, of course we have to pay for port-a-potties, and the sheriff, and the bands and all this stuff. That's what a festival is. But at the heart of it, it's helping people out. If you can't get behind that, you're at the wrong show."





at the end of the contest. We take the group photo, so please feel free to be a part of that." For pinup fans, a mix-and-mingle (with appropriate social distancing, of course) is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. at Stage 2, providing further opportunities for photos.

The only thing hotter than pinup girls might be flame-throwing cars. A popular feature at VTF, vintage cars spitting fire from their exhaust pipes seems somehow appropriate for the Fourth of July. "We have fireworks every year at Vintage Torque Fest," boasts Wells, "and they're called flame-throwing cars." The flame-throwing car exhibition will be about 9:15 p.m. on Saturday, July 4, following the chain racing

Flame-throwing cars are just one of the sub-groups of vintage hot rods you might see at Vintage Torque Fest. Celebrating the golden age of DIY hot rods and customization that gearheads were building in backyard garages before the introduction of the first "muscle car," the Ford Mustang in 1964, VTF focuses on cars of that earlier era. Though the show has been consistent about the rules of entry-pre-1964 hot rods and customs, 1974 and earlier motorcycles—this year the KTBF group will have a special featured area of invite cars and customs that might be somewhat outside the typical parameters of the show. "So if you see some cool '70s van set up at the show by their booth, you'll know it's part of their area," notes Wells.

With the rescheduled date and ongoing challenges of a pandemic, Wells expects attendance to be down a bit this year. Typically, the show has drawn nearly 1,000 cars and motorcycles and over 6,000 visitors in attendance over the weekend. But with the challenges presented this year, it's not expected to hit those kinds of numbers. Still, Wells hopes that people will come and support the event and enjoy the show.

"I don't want to say that everything is going to be normal, because it's not," said Wells, "but we're going to try to have things be as normal as possible for what we've been given. We hope that everyone will have patience and understand that while you might see things that look a little bit different, you'll understand. So we hope that with this change, people will give us a little bit of grace and understanding because it's very needed this year. We're just happy to try to have the event, just so people can come out and see each other. I think that's going to be the great thing is just getting together." Community.

Admission to Vintage Torque Fest is \$20 per day or \$35 for the weekend. Discount cards for \$5 off admission are available at the Dubuque County Fairgrounds and several other area locations. The show goes on rain or shine. Because planning is ongoing, there may be changes in the published schedule. For the most up to date information, follow Vintage Torque Fest on Facebook. ■

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STATE OF THE CITY

"It was the best of times; it was the worst of times. It was the age of wisdom; it was the age of foolishness. It was the epoch of belief; it was the epoch of incredulity..."

While this opening paragraph of the *Tale of Two Cities* by Charles Dickens references a different scenario in world history, the similarities to what we are experiencing as a City and nation today cannot be ignored. Dickens tells of a time of despair and suffering on one hand, and joy and hope on the other.

In Dubuque and around the country, we are gripped by uncertainty of what lies ahead as we respond to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

In Dubuque and around the country, we also are struggling with emotions in response to the tragedy of George Floyd's death at the hands of law enforcement in Minneapolis...the latest in a long list of injustices experienced daily by people of color around the United States.

COVID-19

My City Council colleagues and I are working with City Staff and dozens of community partner organizations and agencies to provide individuals and families, as well as businesses and organizations, the support and resources they need to respond to and recover from the physical, mental, and financial impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. Likewise, each of us has a personal responsibility to this community we call "home" and it is simple. Follow the educated direction of our healthcare professionals and medical experts.

If you must go out for essential supplies, healthcare, or to work, follow the social distancing guidelines to stay six feet apart; plan ahead to minimize shopping trips; do not invite friends into *enclosed* areas to socialize; wash your hands; and refrain from touching your face.

We recognize the damage this pandemic is forcing upon our local, regional, and national economies. While the long-term impact is unknown, the short-term impact is already devastating to our small business owners, families, non-profit organizations, and more. One of the greatest sources of encouragement and optimism is that our citizens are rallying to support those businesses where possible.

This reaction represents the "unity" in our community, and for the foreseeable future, we must continue to look for ways to work together because all indications are this will be a long-term, economic recovery effort.

I want to convey the collective gratitude of our community to all our healthcare professionals, and to all essential businesses and organizations providing the critical services and goods we all need to survive. I likewise want to thank our first responders: our emergency dispatch, fire, and police departments and our public health staff. Finally, I want to acknowledge our "unsung heroes" managing our water and wastewater system, trash and recycling, and public transit for providing those critical services, as well as City staff and Dubuque's non-profit community and partner agencies who continue to serve our most vulnerable residents.

BLACK LIVES MATTER

We must first acknowledge that incidents of police brutality and other acts of oppression and harm that occur hundreds of miles away do have local impacts. Those incidents are not representative of a majority of our nation's law enforcement officers... but they do create mistrust, fear, sadness, and anger locally.

We also know that we are not perfect. I want to remind our residents that the City of Dubuque takes police misconduct seriously, and we have a forum for complaints against the Dubuque Police Department. This forum, facilitated by the Community-Police Relations Committee, exists through a memorandum of understanding between the City of Dubuque and the Dubuque Branch of the NAACP and includes community members of diverse backgrounds.

I want all Dubuque residents, especially our Black and Brown residents, to know that we hear you, we see you, and we care about each of you. We recognize that you face daily challenges that most of us do not realize or even understand, but we must listen and seek to understand if we are to create an environment of mutual respect and trust.

This is the crux of the "Black Lives Matter" movement—not a denial that all lives matter, rather, it is that for far, far too



long, Black lives have not experienced the same care for their lives that so many of us take for granted every day.

I also want to acknowledge the peaceful protests and rallies that continue to be held in Dubuque. The conduct of those groups and involvement of local law enforcement has been exemplary and showed how engaged residents can come together and effectively make their voices heard, both peacefully and powerfully, in a time of extreme pain, crisis, and anger.

The Dubuque City Council is committed to acknowledging, to listening, and responding to our community members' thoughts on what our community needs to heal, what it needs to meet the needs of our families, and finally, how best to develop ways to work together to create the long-term actions that will benefit the Dubuque community.

We also are committed to the actions already underway to disrupt racism and to promote equity and inclusion in our community. These include continued support of partnerships and initiatives like Inclusive Dubuque, the Equitable Poverty Prevention Plan, City staff efforts to create equity plans specific to the services each department offers, supporting the Police Chief's Forum, and continuing intercultural competency training for all City employees.

The City of Dubuque will continue to pursue our vision to make Dubuque a "sustainable and resilient city and an inclusive and equitable community" and we will support the Dubuque Police Department's mission to enhance community livability by providing equitable community service and protection through integrity, compassion, and competence.

It has been said that in a crisis, the character of a community is revealed. Even Charles Dickens saw a ray of light...

"It was the season of Light, it was the season of Darkness, it was the spring of hope..." ■

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


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HOW ARE YOU FEELING?

How are you feeling? I'm not talking about a cough or a fever...how are you really feeling? This year has brought on many new realities for all of us. Realities such as working from home, temporary unemployment, home-schooling of children the last few months, cancelled vacations or celebrations and lack of physical contact with other family members, friends and colleagues. Each one of these realities may negatively impact our well being. Even as we reenter a new norm within our community, feelings of isolation, anxiety and overall depression may continue. So much remains uncertain without a specific timeline. Despite all this, we try our best to carry on and look out for those we care about. Adapting to lifestyle changes while managing the fear of contracting the virus, worry about people close to us who are particularly vulnerable, and planning for the future is challenging to say the least. It's particularly difficult for people with mental health conditions.

In our community we have struggled for years to have the right resources and bandwidth to support the mental health needs of those battling depression, anxiety, PTSD and addiction. Even if you haven't personally experienced these conditions you for sure know someone who is living with one or more of these. During this vulnerable time there is a risk for each of us to have increased feelings of isolation, depression and anxiety. Though you may never have had those feelings before in your life you may now be experiencing additional stress. Some may find that their normal way of coping or managing has also changed due to COVID-19 restrictions.

At Float and Fly Wellness Studio, we help many that struggle with stress, depression, anxiety, chronic pain, and

PTSD by regular float therapy sessions. Despite float therapy being around since the 1950s it is relatively new in Dubuque. Float therapy is clinically proven to help in conjunction with other therapies. Clinical research investigating float therapy has reported largely beneficial effects across a range of different stress and pain related conditions, including: hypertension, chronic tension headaches, chronic muscle tension pain in the back and neck, and stress-related pain with "burnout depression." Thus far there have been several studies focused on individuals with clinical anxiety, including generalized anxiety disorder, post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), panic disorder, agoraphobia, and social anxiety disorder, with many patients presenting with comorbid major depressive disorder. The evidence published suggests that float therapy is a safe technique for rapidly reducing levels of stress, pain, and anxiety. Clinical trials are currently underway in America, Germany, and Sweden investigating the long-term impact of floating in patients with anxiety disorders, anorexia nervosa, chronic pain, fibromyalgia, and insomnia.

Since our reopening mid May we have seen a decline in the overall mental health of our community. We want to let you know that we are here to help. We pride ourselves in providing a safe and clean space free of crowds and judgment, which allows you the space and time you need to heal on your terms. We encourage you to come visit us in historic downtown Dubuque at 1344 Locust St. for a free consultation if you are feeling stressed, overwhelmed or depressed due to the new realities imposed by COVID-19. 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


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THE VAULT: FINDING NEW WAYS TO DRESS

It is hard enough to start a new restaurant, even in the best of times. Try doing it in the midst of a global pandemic when everything is shut down and social distancing replaces social gatherings, the heart and soul of the restaurant industry. It takes guts and nerve... and a lot of community support. Luckily for them, Jesse Elliott and Mark Giunta, the owners of The Vault Restaurant, seem to meet all the requirements.

Jesse and Mark have owned and operated the 3 Mile House, the supper club in Hazel Green, WI, for the past three years, and when the owners of the old Bank on Main Street in Dubuque approached them about a restaurant, it did seem like a no-brainer. A great location in a revitalized downtown, a space rich with history and good bones to build upon, and a community that will come out for good food and drink. Jesse had experience at various places like The Ground Round and Red Robin. Mark used to own The Silver Dollar at this location and once donated a lot of old artifacts from the place to the Matthias Ham House. They decided to pay homage to the space by calling it "The Vault Restaurant" and added little touches like a penny top bar, wall hangings studded with pennies, old Dubuque photographs and such.

Jesse's wife, Heather, worked on the cocktail menu and named them after big names from the prohibition era. You can find your Gin Rickey's and Tom Collins' hanging out with Mary Pickford and White Lady—it's quite the Lavender Bee's Knees, I tell ya... OK, I got a little carried away there. I tried the French 75 named after a French gun—the combination of cognac, citrus and champagne was delightful on a warm summer evening.

When it came to the food menu, the owners, together with manager Toby Rhodes and a team culled from the 3 Mile House, put together a wide variety of dishes aiming to please a wide variety of customers. Jesse mentioned to me that they wanted things to be freshly prepared and not just frozen and thawed. They also wanted items



that did not duplicate what you could already find in the many establishments in and around town. The menu as assembled suggests an idiosyncratic American bistro with some deft touches. The filets are hand cut on site with the ends repurposed as tenderloin bites served with blue cheese and horseradish sauce. Many of the appetizers such as onion rings and jalapeño poppers are assembled and deep fried to order.

Let us talk about those poppers. A typical popper is a jalapeño, deseeded and stuffed with cream cheese and maybe cheddar, breaded and fried. The Vault version is a giant cheeseball made with cream cheese, cheddar, fresh and pickled jalapeños and a little pickle juice for added flavor; coated with Panko and deep fried. I must commend the deep frying technique-every deep fried item I had was perfectly crispy and not greasy, with a pleasing golden brown color. The poppers are then drizzled with hot honey and served with a spicy bank sauce and a ranch sauce-vou can increase or decrease the heat level as you wish. A word about heat: this is actually hot, like Southwest Hot, not what I derisively call Midwest Nice Heat; something that pretends to be hot, but is as dramatic as beige is to white.

Indeed, the heat carries over to the Ghost Burger where multiple chilies collude to provide drama—think flashing red. There is the habanero incorporated into cheese, jalapeños marinated in atomic sauce, a mini version of the jalapeño poppers showing up as coins, and ghost sauce aioli on the bun. I asked for the burger to be cooked medium rare, and the combination of heat and beef was divine. A slightly different version of the popper can also be found

on the sandwich menu as the Jalapeño Popper Grilled Cheese. Roasted jalapeños, bacon and a creamy jalapeño habanero cheese blend between a baguette are grilled and served with a spicy black currant dipping sauce that also provides a sweet counterpoint to the heat. The smokiness of the roasted jalapeños pairs especially well with the berry notes of the black currants.

While I tend to focus on the dishes with heat, there are plenty of offerings for those with a more Midwestern palate. There are the loaded nachos, a giant pretzel, and hand-breaded onion rings. There is also a nice Midwest Cheese Tray with their signature 3 Mile cheese, fresh cheese curds, shaved prime rib, and sliced summer sausage, all served with crackers, horseradish cream sauce, and blue cheese dressing. The crab stuffed mushrooms could almost be a main dish-four large button mushrooms stuffed with a creamy crab and cheese filling and served with horseradish cream sauce and cocktail sauce. The earthy meaty flavor of the mushrooms pairs well with the delicate seafood with the crispy breading on top adding a nice textural note.

The sandwiches and salads have a lot of variety to choose from, with all sauces made in the kitchen-I can always tell a freshly made ranch from the preservative-laden versions you typically find in diners. The honey mustard dressing has the right mix of sweet and tang, and the texture is creamier than the usual store bought sauce. The Caesar dressing is especially good with bright salt and sour notes balancing the umami of anchovies and garlic funk.

There are a host of main course options with chicken, beef, and seafood. As the restaurants start opening up (more on this below), they have added weekend specials. When a group of us dined in last weekend, they had a pan-seared salmon with a rice pilaf and sautéed peppers that was splendid. I usually dislike salmon, but I had more than one bite from my friend's plate! The flaky fish had a deep rich citrus glaze, and the rice pilaf was light and flavorful to provide the right backdrop for the salmon. I ordered the filet and chicken special: the filet was medium rare like I asked for and came with a tangy béarnaise sauce. The breaded chicken cutlet had a romesco sauce that was a



hair salty for me. One of my friends had a pasta dish that was also salty, and our server was kind enough to take the dish back and exchange it for another dish.

The Saturday night we visited was quite busy; after months of being cooped up, Dubuquers really seemed to need to eat out. As a restaurant that opened in April in the middle of a pandemic and never really had a chance to get their feet wet so to speak, they were adjusting and adapting rather quickly. The wait staff in general seemed to be cheerful even under enormous stress. Our group tried to be kind when a couple of things were off, and our waitress responded and course corrected graciously. One thing I would request of all my readers is to be kind and patient if you go out to eat, and tip well. These are difficult times for anyone in the restaurant business and the serving staff usually gets the brunt of customer churlishness.

If you do not feel comfortable going out (and me and many of my friends do not), order take out. You can order from The Vault through Eat Street and Uber Eats. One of the small grace notes I appreciated was the use of vented containers for grilled and fried itemsthe French fries stayed crisp and did not get steamed as my takeout sat in the car. It showed that the people who made the food care about keeping its quality high. The owners seemed pleased with the community support so far, and I wish them all the best. Buy local and support our local restauranteurs.

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
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STAY POSITIVE IN A NEGATIVE WORLD

It's time to celebrate this great land we live in, the USA—and what better way to celebrate than to have a backyard barbecue? Family, friends, fireworks and—of course—food is the perfect combination as we celebrate! To help you stay on the healthy track this summer, follow these dietitian-recommended tips!

Summer is the perfect time to include in the "rainbow" of summer produce! With a variety of antioxidants and healthy nutrients, now is the time to dive into all the colors of the rainbow. Here's a quick rundown of how colors from fruits and vegetables can impact your health:

- Green: protects against cancer and maintains good cardiovascular health
 Best choices: kiwi, broccoli, spinach and kale
- Orange & Yellow: healthy for the skin, strengthen the immune system, and help maintain healthy vision by reducing the risk of macular degeneration and cataracts Best choices: oranges, apricots, cantaloupe, carrots, corn and squash, bell peppers
- Purple/Blue: help with short-term memory loss
 Best choices: blueberries, blackberries, prunes and plums
- Red: lowers the risk of prostate and ovarian cancers and cardiovascular disease
 Best choices: tomatoes, watermelon, ruby red grapefruit and guava

Hummus, salsa, fat-free bean dip, or low-fat yogurt with herbs and spices make the perfect healthy dip to accompany your veggies. And explore different entrée options. 





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A RACIST IN THE FAMILY

My grandpa, Grover Ripperton, was loving, and funny, and a complete racist. He bemoaned the integration of his beloved baseball games, calling the players nasty names that must have made my parents wince, but we never talked about it. My mom said once, "I wish I *knew* some Black people," a good thing for me to hear, but our Davenport neighborhood was so white, it never happened. I had to leave town to widen my circle of friends.

Now I live in Dubuque, a town with its own segregated history. But look. Look at our amazing response to the public lynching of George Floyd, one in a long, brutal list of such murders, and maybe the one that will finally lead to change. I have never been more proud of my adopted city than now, as I see how peacefully, yet forcefully, so many people of all races are standing up to declare, "This is unacceptable."

My sister-in-law lives in a suburb of Minneapolis. We call Ann the kin-keeper of the family, the aunt who pores over ancient photo albums: Threshers bringing in the sheaves at the family farm. The twins, Billy and Bobby (now my husband), age three, wearing bubble hats as their dad sings "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles" at the St. Anthony community center. The grandkids and their kids, carrying the family forward. She sends out periodic group emails to the far-flung family, asking everyone to check in.

In March, she asked how we were coping with the coronavirus, and everyone reported back on learning to Zoom, ordering groceries, and coping with the Great TP Disappearance of 2020. Maybe this was her sneaky way of making sure we were all being smart and not marching to demand bars and casinos open long before it's safe. That's fine; that's what family is for.

She wrote again to report on the violence marring the Twin Cities' protests against racial injustice. One nephew described helping to clean up broken glass and tear gas canisters. Others checked in from Georgia, Chicago, Seattle, where protests had also gone awry. My children live in Davenport and Omaha, two cities rocked by deadly

gunfire, reportedly at the hands of a few local white men with criminal records. Both cities were put on curfew, and of course I worried for them.

Sitting down to write my reply from Dubuque, I realized how well we are doing here. I do not mean things are great because there was no looting. That misses the point. In fact this brings to mind a powerful statement someone posted on Facebook about white privilege: "You keep saying 'It's horrible that an innocent Black man was killed, but destroying property has to stop.' Try saying, 'It's horrible that property is being destroyed, but killing innocent Black men has to stop.' You're prioritizing the wrong part." Read that again.

I told the family that Dubuque's response to Floyd's murder had been peaceful, strong, and thoughtful. I took issue with the term "riot," pointing out that, at least here, the gatherings and walks seem to be true demonstrations of concern over racial injustice, not an excuse to go out and break things. I said I thought the anger has been tempered because the police at our demonstrations have been walking, or on bicycles, wearing yellow shirts and Black shorts, rather than suited up like the military, and how they have been participating as much as monitoring. I said that yes, some stores chose to board up as a precautionary measure, but there was no vandalism. And now we have had a beautiful Juneteenth celebration—a joy, tempered with deep concern.

I told them that a friend of mine was walking into Hy-Vee when the woman in front of her said, "Isn't it terrible that they have to do this?" waving at the boards over the windows. My friend just said, "Um hmm," and as the woman turned to look at her, her eyes narrowed as she saw that my friend was wearing a mask. That's a discussion for another time, but good grief. How do we respond to our neighbors about the need for protests, for masks, about anything at all without starting a fight—but also without hiding our own intelligent convictions?

One of my husband's nieces wrote from far away, "I still believe the majority of people are good," and included a photo of Fred Rogers with his famous advice to children: "When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping."

That's lovely, but white people who never hesitate to ask the police for help need to understand how it feels to be a Black person in this country, especially a Black man or teenager, who can never know if this cop stopping to question him is a helper, or a killer. The good far outnumber the bad, I know. In my domestic violence work, I befriended some police officers and sheriff's deputies I will always count among the best people I have ever known.

I was thinking that, in my first column after a three-year break, I would write about lighter things, like the artisan bread I'm baking, or the orioles and scarlet tanagers gracing our back yard. Since we can't visit, we're making goofy movies for our 4-year-old twin grand-daughters. But Vera and Jane deserve a country that is safe and fair, where the helpers can all be trusted. We all do. So in my first new column, I could not write about anything but this.



I'm a man of the people for the people.




