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

The holidays are here, and we definitely have things to celebrate since the last issue of *365ink*.:)

You know, like Thanksgiving (albeit alone) and soon... Christmas (hopefully not alone). What did you think I was referring to?

If you read regularly, you know that I'm the jolly fat man who brings toys to thousands of kids every Christmas across the Tri-States, and since it's already Thanksgiving, I am officially up to my eyeballs in holiday... um... cheer.

Of all the things I thought would be a problem with getting toys to 5,000 kids, I never thought actually giving the toys away would be the issue, but here we are in 2020! Joy! Two of my biggest distribution partners had to cancel their distributions this year because of the threat of COVID-19 exposure. So a month out, we were wondering how we connect those 600–800 kids to the toys we were planning to give them.

The answer was to gather the minds of Dubuquers who have a vested interest in solving this problem and do just that. Enter my first real Zoom meeting of 2020. Okay, I called into a couple, but this is the first one I actually proactively organized. And by organized, I mean I was hoping it would work when I tried to invite people 15 minutes before the meeting. Thankfully, Danielle from the United Way offered to setup the meeting invite in advance so I once again dodged having to learn how to do that.

Within 45 minutes, we had a plan. A huge thank you to Beth McGorry and St. Mark Youth Enrichment, Randy Rennison at Veterans Affairs, Jacqueline Hunter at the Multicultural Family Center, Danielle Peterson from United Way, and Beverly Maas from HACAP for helping save Christmas for so many kids.

Despite being Santa in the Dubuque area for 12 years, I've never actually helped organize an actual distribution event unless you count the kids party at Five Flags. But that was just a big party where everyone got the same thing... and lot of cookies. THIS IS HARD. It's not just giving out toys; it's a crazy scheduling nightmare where you help hundreds of families without all of them coming in at the same time. After all, we can't have more than, what is it, 15 people in a room at a time? Whoaboy. This is going to be interesting. But we got it. Already, every person or company I asked to chip in to make it work has said yes without hesitation. THAT IS WHAT IT MEANS TO LIVE IN DUBUQUE! THANK YOU!

So, now that smart people are helping me with that, I can go back to just fundraising, buying, collecting, sorting, packing, and delivering 15,000 toys in the next three weeks. Piece of cake! Hold my beer!

Just last week I hosted my annual Facebook Silent Auction for Toys For Tots. Over the years, we have grown from \$7,000 to \$15,000, to an amazing \$21,000 last year. We made a LOT of money auctioning off concert and theater tickets packaged with great local dinners thanks to a lot of crazy generous partners who run those venues. Then coronavirus happened. And they took a hit. A devastating hit. So this year's auction was not going to have a huge

slate of theater tickets. Like, no theater tickets... at all. Ugh. This was going to be rough.

I thought if we expanded the auction to include some quality pre-owned items donated by Dubuquers we just might clear \$10,000 this year. Well, a lot of emails and phone calls later... and generosity far beyond what I thought we would see in 2020, something crazy happened. We did AWESOME with the auction. We didn't just beat my \$10,000 goal; we beat last year's \$21,000 haul by a couple hundreds bucks. And here's how great Dubuquers are: when people paid for their items, we got a LOT of people rounding up to the nearest \$10, \$50, or \$100 level. So we will exceed \$22,000 when all is said and done.

The ugly side of the auction is, now that we are in the full swing of toy season, I'm also trying to fulfill these auction packages. In one day, I sent toys out to two agencies, picked up five pallets of toys from Tomy Toys in Dyersville, IA using the awesome Runde Auto Group Community Support box truck, I delivered an auction air hockey table, and picked up a donated used snow blower (that got sold for \$500) to give to the winner later. I make multitasking look like a walk in the park. Note: I also managed to knock out this issue of 365ink in the same week

Of course, knocking out this issue and connecting so many auction winners with their loot could not have happened without Kristina keeping the ship afloat at 365ink while I play with toys. Someone should really buy her something nice.

So in the next few days we will attempt to safely Black Friday shop at a couple select Dubuque retailers and sort those toys with only 10 masked people, spaced out in the toy warehouse. That's instead of an army of 50 doing the job in two hours. On Dec. 5, we will be outside at Theisen's Home • Farm • Auto stuffing the truck with toys. We've been doing that for 12 years, and who knew that the safe social-distancing nature of the event would one day make sense, since we have frozen our butts off many, many times for this cause. And I think there will still be a Teddy Bear Toss for Toys For Tots at a Saints game, but it might come later in the season, and then we'll have all the plush toys we'll need for 2021 already in the bag. Like 200 bags. Glad lawn and leaf bags to be exact.

So, I KNOW you were wondering how you can help out. Hey, glad you asked. This is easy. When you are out buying toys for other kids this year, buy one more for our kids and put it in a Toys For Tots box. There are boxes all over town, but if you can't find one, we suggest Theisen's, Steve's Ace, Hartig Drug, or Dollar General. And if you ain't leaving the house until there is a COVID vaccine, you can go online to ToysForTots.org, take a few seconds for FIND THE DUBUQUE PAGE on the site, and make a tax-deductible cash donation to our program. We would really appreciate it.

And, because a few people have asked, I'm happy to say that this is the first holiday season in two years that I don't have cancer. So when I spend January in bed, it's because I earned it, not because I'm recovering from having organs removed! That's enough to be thankful for right there. But I'll still take a pecan pie or a cheesecake if anyone's offering.



Clarke University's annual For a Blessed Christmas program is scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 5, at 7 p.m. This virtual program was recorded in Clarke University's Sacred Heart Chapel throughout the fall semester. For a Blessed Christmas is a touching portrayal of the Christmas story through music and biblical narrative.

This year's program includes performances by the Clarke Wind Ensemble and Chamber Orchestra, under the direction of Dr. Rob Stull, Assistant Professor of Music and Director of Instrumental Activities; the Clarke Collegiate Singers under the direction of Dr. Amanda Huntleigh, Assistant Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities; and a vocal solo by Dr. Joshua D. Glasner, Assistant Professor of Voice. Clarke University ensembles are accompanied by Anthony Capparelli, Instructor of Music and Collaborative Pianist. The featured soloist this year is Clarke University Instructor of Guitar, Marcus DeJesus '14.

Marcus DeJesus is a guitarist originally from Brazil and professor of guitar at Clarke University and Loras College. In addition, Marcus is the music director at Chavez Elementary School in Madison, WI. In the spring of 2016, he finished a master's degree in guitar performance from Southern Illinois University (Carbondale, IL) and in the spring of 2014, a Bachelor of Arts in music performance from Clarke University. As a performer, DeJesus has collaborated with the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra,



Southern Illinois Symphony, Larry Busch Big Band, The Mistletones, Handphibians Samba, Hunter Fuerte Vintage Jazz Orchestra, and many other ensembles. In addition, he regularly tours around Brazil as a guitar performer and educator. In the fall of 2019 DeJesus released his first solo guitar album called Retratos, which combines a variety of styles: from Bach to Bachianinha: from Choro to Bossa Nova. In May of 2018, his ensemble the Blu Flame Duo, released the album Just Jazz in partnership with another Clarke alumnus, Brian Eiffes. The work includes original compositions by Eiffes, jazz standards of yesteryear, and some modern originals reminiscent of the styles of the crooner era.

For a Blessed Christmas musical selections will include works by Steven Bryant, Giovanni Gabrieli, Alf Houkom, Franscico Nuñez, Astor Piazzola, Francisco Tarrego, and Antonio Vivaldi, as well as familiar Christmas carols.





DUBUQUE FIGHTING SAINTS HOCKEYOUR HOUSE LOOKS A LITTLE DIFFERENT THIS SEASON

Much like everything else in 2020, when fans walk through the doors of the Mystique Community Ice Center, things will be different. From fans wearing masks, to social distanced seating, to hand sanitizing stations around the concourse, the Saints have had to adapt to the times as they embark on their 11th season back in Dubuque.

It wasn't easy sledding for the Saints to even get to this point. Nearly eight months ago, they unknowingly played their last game of the 2019–20 season at home against the Waterloo Black Hawks. Shortly after that the USHL postponed and ultimately cancelled the 2019–20 season.

Since then, the behind the scenes work has been in high gear to make sure things are running smoothly for the new season. As is always the case, a new season presents new challenges, but this year more so than normal.

The goal for the Saints this season is to provide the same entertainment value as years past, in a safe environment for the fans. Certain things cannot be achieved, like visits with players postgame and other group events, but by in large, the offseason work was tailored to providing a familiar product for fans while also maximizing safety.

When you come to Saints games this season, there's a lot that's new and different. As is the case anywhere

in Dubuque, masks are required at all times during your time in the Mystique Ice Center. The only people you won't see wearing masks are players, but they are required to wear masks at all times other than when they are on the ice. The Saints have also implemented a social distanced seating layout to comply with state mandates. All seats are sectioned off into "pods" so fans are only sitting close to those they ordered their tickets with.

On top of those changes, Dubuque has also implemented a few other tweaks to keep things sanitary in the arena. Hand sanitizing stations are laid out all around the concourse and other areas of the arena for fans to use frequently. The Saints have also gone to a fully mobile ticketing system this season, reducing the interaction between ticket takers and fans throughout the duration of the game.

For fans that are interested in finding out more about all the changes, they can visit **DubuqueFightingSaints.com**. There are details on mobile tickets, safety practices, and more laid out across the website so fans always know what to expect.

With all these changes in place, one thing does remain the same: the product on the ice. The Saints once again have a solid group to compete with this season. Last year would have likely been a record-setting season for Dubuque in many areas, had they been able to complete the full year. However, this season could



prove to be very successful too. Despite a slow start, the Saints have the necessary pieces to make a deep run.

They return 10 players from last year's team, making it the second season in a row Dubuque has returned double digit players. They also have brought in experience from the NCAA level and other junior leagues to even out a lineup that features five players who are 17 years of age or younger.

While this year will showcase many things that Saints fans are unfamiliar with, as the USHL tries to navigate a season during the midst of a pandemic; it will also feature one thing that Saints fans are very accustomed to, a fun and entertaining hockey team on the ice.

The Dubuque Symphony Orchestra (DSO) is preparing for its first show since the pandemic began. William Intriligator, Music Director and Conductor for the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra, is very excited about it. Two shows are planned for Saturday, Dec. 5, one at 2 p.m. and another at 7:30 p.m., and on Sunday, Dec. 6 at 2 p.m.

The DSO Christmas spirit shines bright in these holiday concerts despite the changes that had to be initiated due to the virus.

"We had to pare back the orchestra size and make sure the players on stage are all distanced from each other," said Intriligator. "So it will be a smaller group [of musicians]... and we decided to just focus only on the brass and percussion sections of the orchestra. We are tapping into an old musical holiday tradition... It's a pretty large brass ensemble and the percussion section is as well. In addition, we will have dancers from the Heartland Ballet." They will be dancing out front, socially distant from the band members.

Because singing spreads the virus, there will be no singers this year at the holiday concerts. "We can't have the Dubuque Chorale involved or a guest solo singer like we usually do, but we are finding a way to do the shows," insists Intriligator.

Joe Klinebriel, from Clarke University, will narrate a couple of classic Christmas stories during the concerts, accompanied by the brass and percussion. One of the stories will be 'Twas the Night Before Christmas as well as a special reading from A Christmas Story.

Joe Klinebriel is an actor, director, and educator who is thrilled to be working in conjunction with the Heartland Ballet and the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra. As a professor of drama at Clarke University, Joe teaches all performance courses, directs productions for the Fine and Performing

Arts program at Clarke University, and has also appeared as a guest actor in many of Clarke's productions. Joe has also had the pleasure of directing multiple summer productions for the Grand Opera House including Phantom of the Opera, Sweeney Todd, Les Misérables, The Producers, Cabaret, Gypsy, The Pajama Game, and will return again this summer to direct Brigadoon. Joe has a B.A. in theatre performance from Western Michigan University and an M.F.A. from the Alabama Shakespeare Festival/University of Alabama. Other performance experiences include productions at the Alabama Shakespeare Festival, HERE Theatre in New York City, and the Heartland Festival in Platteville, WI.

Intrilligator added that, "We will be performing pieces that are very old and Christmas themed... all the way up to more modern compositions. Some of the pieces will have more of a percussion focus... a couple will involve only percussion ("Little Drummer Boy" comes to mind). And we will also include a rocked out Mannheim Steam Roller style song."

"It will be a little different than our normal holiday production. The audience will be socially distanced, wearing masks. We still have to work out how people will enter in intervals so it is not crowded all at once. We are limiting the number of audience members. [Although] the hall seats about 711 at Five Flags Theater, we will be limiting it to 195 [so] the seats can be spaced. The show will also be shorter with no intermission."



THE 26TH ANNUAL HILLCREST REFLECTIONS IN THE PARK

As a board member of Hillcrest Family Services, Sharon Foley started Reflections in the Park 26 years ago, after seeing a similar light show while shopping near Chicago. She thought she could bring something similar to Dubuque. That first year, they had 19 displays and grossed about \$90,000 for the organization. Man, was she ever right about that idea! Today they have about 90 sponsored displays. That's not even counting the smaller side pieces. And some of those sponsored pieces are fairly huge. Last year Hillcrest enjoyed a net profit of \$162,000 plus. Let's see if we can't help them set a new record in 2020. A great way to cap off an otherwise real dumpster-fire of a year.

We sat down with Darlene Bolsinger, Mission Advancement Coordinator for Hillcrest Family Services, who, among many other responsibilities, gets the pressure of continuing the success of the lights in the park program as is starts its next 25 years. Like everyone we ask about the project, all credit goes directly to the many volunteers who make it all possible each year.

"The volunteers have stuck around year after year. Two original volunteers dropped out this year because, well, they're not as young as they were when this all started 26 years ago. People continue to be in it for the long haul."

And with so many years of experience from the volunteers, everyone already knows their role.

"Everyone has a job and they do it," explains Bolsinger. "There are two main guys at the park that make it happen: Butch and Bummy."



They have real names, but they won't let me tell you. I found them out, but I'll stick to the deal and keep them to myself. They don't want any attention or credit thrown their way. They are 73 and 84 respectively, a retired lineman and a John Deere retiree. The experience of that combo couldn't be any better.

"Those tow guys work on it Monday through Friday, and they work all year round. The three of us are definitely on the same page. We're not procrastinators. And I think that's why it works so slick."

As seems to be the case in every group like this, the best volunteers are never in it for the recognition. They just do the work because they enjoy it and do it for the outcome.

"It rolls down from those main two men, with people specializing in certain jobs," continues Darlene. "One guy is great at welding. Greg Birkett at the Dubuque Advertiser is indispensable with the marketing help and organization. I couldn't do it without those key people."

That adds up to around 300 volunteers, not to mention the over 130 sponsors contributing to the fundraiser and the 40 media partners promoting the program.

So where do all of these lights come from, and where to they go after Christmas?

"We deal with a company called Winterland out of Indiana," says Bolsinfger. "I would say a brunt of the big displays come from there. It's probably a 70/30 split. Every year the guys here are making more of their own. If you have never been through the park, it really is a celebration of Dubuque. You will find representations of Dubuque landmarks, both physically in the Town Clock and other buildings recreated in lights as well as landmark Dubuque companies celebrated in lights."

Somehow, Darlene convinced Bummy to let me ask him a few questions about the physical task of making the park come to life each year.

Actual setup in the park starts around the 1st of November, and they work in the park every weekday from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Prior to that, they work in a warehouse where the lights are stored for a few days and haul all of the gear over to the park to pre-prep while also trying to stay out of the way of

the crews from the city who are themselves finishing up the closure and winterization of the park.

"In the offseason, we rejuvenate everything that they own themselves," explains Bummy. "We have a lot of rope light displays and electrical cords. And everything gets gone over in the offseason. We have a varying crew size anywhere from a dozen to 25 people at a time. John Deere sends in a group each year for a day as well to assist."

The main group of volunteers is unique and notable as well in its median age. Bummy doesn't believe there's anyone working on the physical setup of the park that is under 70 years of age. That is simply astonishing. He has been involved since the 2nd or 3rd year of the event's existence. One of the guys involved gave him a call and said come on over and help. Well, clearly Bummy never left.

"In the park itself, we have 22 permanent electrical panels spaced throughout the park to power the hundreds of displays and probably millions of lights. And even after 25 years, each setup is a living thing needing attention to detail to get it just right. It's something the volunteers never know until they get everything set up and wait for dark to try it out."

"We're setting all this stuff up," relates Bummy, "and then comes the moment of truth—you plug it all in, and we have a walk through."

While we of the untrained eye might see the magic and wonder of it all, a long-serving volunteer like him sees the spots for improvement—filling in dark spots, adjusting displays for the best overall impact, and to balance the all-important electrical load. These are the final touches the crew does on the last days before Reflections opens to the public.

The event is done on Jan. 3, 2021, but obviously, the displays need to be struck, packed up, and put away. The answer to when that is, is it comes down when weather permits. The day after, they drop power and unhook everything. But if needed, they may not finish taking the last things down until April.

We asked Bummy back in 2008 what keeps him coming back year after year?

"I'm dumb ... just plain dumb," he deadpand then. "Hopefully it looks good and we get a lot of people through." Twelve years later, it still looks good. Heck, it looks amazing.

As perfectly suited as this event seems to be for the current situation with social distancing, there are many more factors at risk due to COVID-related shutdowns and hardships.

"It's been a difficult year," admits Darlene Bolsinger. "We've had hard times before, but this definitely takes the cake. I've been nervous and scared, but as time got closer and people thought about it, the phone started ringing with support to continue. For those who were not able to continue sponsoring because of obvious and understandable financial constraints imposed by COVID-19, others have stepped in and stepped up to ask if they could be a part of it. It's all understandable at any level from big businesses to the smaller sponsors."

For Hillcrest itself, Darlene sees the effect on their services, fundraising, and other aspects of operation as being part of the ripple effect from those most directly affected by COVID-19.

"The need is always there, but the greater need caused by current events is still building. But we remain here for anyone who needs help regardless of your situation. We are here to help everyone. We strive to be a premier health and education provider for peoples' brain health. We're famously know for what we began as our adoption program, and everything has really stemmed from that. But we have a very large variety of brain health services."

If you are a veterans Reflections viewer, you already know all the tips and tricks to getting the most out of your visit, but for the uninitiated, here's some stuff to consider, like "When is the best time to come?"

"It really depends on the night," says Bolsinger. "The closer we get to Christmas, the busier we are. Certain groups of volunteers run cars through faster than others. If you want to come on a quieter night, I would choose any Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday. Or join the bustle and excitement of a weekend."

It takes 15 minutes or less to drive through the park. Take your time and see all you want to see.

"You have the group of people that wait hoping to see the lights in a fresh snowfall. Recent years have not seen a lot of those opportunities, so don't hold your breath, and don't miss out because you wanted the perfect situation. We promise that the park display is beautiful every night, snow or no snow."

On the other hand, a blizzard can cause a closure of the display until it can be unearthed. Thankfully that has not happened in three years.

Either way, they will be ready for you. PPE is available for all of the volunteers, and they're taking all of the

precautions they can. Safety is job one, so don't feel at all worried about your own safety when you visit the display. If you don't want a program or a candy cane because of the extra touch points, simply say you don't want them. And, as always, if you'd like one, there's always treats for the dogs in the car!

The planned annual walk through event on Wednesday, Nov. 25 was just cancelled following the recent statewide COVID-19 proclamations, and the annual gala was cancelled some time ago. So sadly the only way to see the park in 2020 will be from your vehicle. Luckily for you, that is exactly the way it was setup to be enjoyed.

Vehicle traffic begins Thursday, Nov. 26 through Sunday, Jan. 3, from 5 to 10 p.m. every night. Santa Claus will also be there every Monday from 5 to 8 p.m. Admission is just \$10 per vehicle at the gate or \$8 in advance at all DB&T baking centers and all Hillcrest locations with proceeds benefiting the programs of Hillcrest Family Services. They estimate about 10,000 cars a year roll through the gate with 40 to 50 thousands visitors. That is amazing.

And Bummy really wants you to know, "All the volunteers as a group should get the credit. We couldn't do it without all of them doing it together."

Noted. And thank you all!

HOLIDAY PET ADOPTIONS IN THE AGE OF COVID-19

365ink had a cover story this time last year about pet adoptions, but with the recent surge in adoption due to COVID-19 related boredom, seclusion and loneliness, we thought it was a very good time to revisit the pros and cons of pet adoption in the age of COVID.

It is exciting to add a new pet to your family anytime during the year and especially so during the holiday season. And in the crazy reality that is 2020, COVID has affected everything, and we don't just mean getting infected. We mean getting secluded in your home while you safely ride it out. With all that in mind, plan a budget that includes pet costs, especially in this economic climate where employment is not always certain as businesses continue to face shutdowns and layoffs. If you can balance your income with pet expenses and your own spending, you can probably afford it. However, if you'd be scrounging and scraping for cash, you should save first. You don't want to deprive your new best friend of the necessities and some treats, too!

WHAT'S YOUR LIVING SITUATION LIKE?

Does your landlord allow dogs and/ or cats in the building? The answer is a critical component of whether or not you can adopt an animal. If you go behind the landlord's back to bring a pet into the apartment, you could stir up some trouble for yourself—from losing your security deposit to eviction. You're best off waiting until you move into a pet-friendly apartment to adopt your puppy or kitty. However, a smaller critter may still be an option.

WHAT IS YOUR LIFESTYLE?

Dogs and cats like to spend time with their people. When their owner isn't around, they can become lonely. You also need to feed your pets and give them exercise. This all takes time. If you're rarely home, it may not be a good time to adopt a pet. And again, are you only home now because the Coronavirus has forced you home? What happens when the world opens back up?

Dogs require more time and attention than cats and need to be exercised and played with daily. However, you can work full time and have a furry friend—hiring a dog walker, pet sitter, or doggie daycare is always an option.

If you do not have enough time for either a dog or a cat, you may want to consider a smaller animal. According to Bri Eickhoff, the Operations Director at the Dubuque Regional Humane Society(DRHS), "While smaller animals (hamsters, rabbits, guinea pigs, and even fish) require less time, they still have needs as far as clean housing, space for exercise, engagement, and proper nutrition." All animals require your time and attention, and this is an important consideration to make prior to adding a pet to your family. How active are you and your family? If you are planning to adopt a dog, you will want to get one that suits your activity level.

Also, think about how your lifestyle might change in the future outside of the COVID stay-at-home situation. Keep in mind that when you adopt a dog or cat pet, you are making a 10 to 20 year commitment or more.

READY FOR THE ROUGH STUFF?

Cats claw at furniture sometimes, and dogs might have an accident—it's just part of owning a new furry friend.

Before you bring your animal home, you should be ready to handle these issues.

Fortunately, you don't have to educate your pet on your own. Seek a training program. These guided experiences teach you, your family, and your animal.

Look into potential allergies. It is astonishing how many people are heartbroken when they have to return pets because they were unaware of their allergies. Be prepared beforehand and interact with friends' and family's cats or dogs to see if there could be an allergy issue. Perhaps pet-sitting for friends or walking your neighbor's dog would be a good test of your potential allergies.

BABY STEPS

Consider a "foster to adopt" process. Some rescue organizations allow you to essentially take a cat, kitten, puppy, or dog for a test drive before committing to a full adoption. Fostering allows you to take the time an animal needs to adjust to a new situation without committing to the adoption.

An animal that is stressed and fearful at an adoption event or shelter often turns out to be playful and affectionate in the right home.

Robin MacFarlane and the team at That's My Dog caution you from getting caught up in the thought that a "rescue dog" has something in their past that can't be left behind.

"When you adopt a dog, move forward as if it is day one and give that dog the life that he/she deserves," states Robin. "Dogs will thrive in an environment that provides them with appropriate exercise, structure, and the necessary guidance to show them what you want them to do."

Even after you have done your due diligence and followed the prescribed method above, things still might not go exactly as planned. However, Robin suggests that "if you find that you are not getting the results you want, then please seek professional help sooner rather than later." Most behavioral issues can be addressed, but minor behavioral issues can quickly escalate into major issues if not properly dealt with in a timely fashion. Please take ownership of and responsibility for your decision to adopt a new pet. Robin suggests that prospective new pet owners "evaluate their lifestyles, define their vision of what they want from a pet, do some research, and then select a pet that matches your vision and lifestyle."

We promise, it's going to change you life. Just make sure it's going to change your life (and theirs) for the better. ■



JERSEY MIKE'S SUBS

If you are coming out of hiding amid the current resurgence of COVID, you may have noticed that the much-anticipated Jersey Mike's Subs has finally opened in Warren Plaza next to Target where Radio Shack use to be (moment of silence, may it rest in peace). So the next time you have to get your Target fix, veer left and try out Dubuque's newest sandwich shop at the same time. You will not be sorry you did.

Jersey Mike's sort of started at the Jersey Shore town of Point Pleasant when CEO, Peter Cancro, started working at a place called Mike's Subs at age 14. He bought the place at 17 on a loan co-signed with his football coach (good call, coach!). In 1987, he added "Jersey" to the name and started franchising, now closing in on 2,000 stores (1,835 exactly) in 49 states (tough break, Alaska). Compare that to about 3,000 Jimmy John's and, get this, 45,000 Subways. So they are comparatively young and growing, but growing fast.

It's brand new, so the interior is obviously clean, fresh, and inviting. Right off the bat, the staff was enthusiastic and friendly. The sub prep area is behind glass but right there in front of you to see, and it looks tasty. Those tomatoes look ripe and not paper-thin. And they, of course, famously slice the meat in front of you when you order.

They claim that they are all about quality as it's the ingredients, high-quality meats and cheese sliced in front of you, store baked bread, and the authentic taste that makes it stand out in the crowd. They kind of have to though, don't they? But the thing is,

they can back it up. We tried it. A lot of it. And it was indeed the real deal.

The signature cold subs are served "Mike's Way" with white onions, lettuce, tomatoes, "The Juice" ("an exquisite splash of red wine vinegar and olive oil blend"), and always finished with spices. You might wonder why you'd want a "wet" sandwich, but hold your judgement until you try it. We think you will be converted. It's a true elevation over the dry sandwich, though taking it "Mike's way" does add over 275 calories and 28 grams of fat to the equation, if you even care about that.

One of the things that sets them aside from other shops is the freshness of the meat. They don't cut a whole bunch meat and just have it sit around till someone orders it; they wait till you order a sandwich and cut the meat fresh right then and there. And there's plenty of it with all the toppings you care to pile on.

There are three bread choices as well: white, wheat, and rosemary Parmesan. We like the classic white the best. The wheat seemed a bit dryer and not as flaky and fresh feeling. The rosemary Parmesan has a Parmesan cheese melted crust on it that flakes off fairly easily and for some, the rosemary flavor may be a bit too overpowering. You make the call. The white is a home run though. We should mention that the have gluten-free buns that they don't make themselves and it shows. They're fairy dry and no one is getting famous off of those.

The main themes of the "original nine" cold subs revolve around salty





Italian meats and provolone, roast beef and provolone, or bacon and provolone. The Number Four (provolone, prosciuttini, and cappacuolo) has the best mix of spicy without going too meat heavy. And the #6 (Famous Roast Beef and Provolone) is famous because it is "cooked on the premises using only USDA Choice Top Rounds," but also because it is super thinly sliced and has exceptional acid balance when getting it "Mike's Way" (and adding in their homemade pepper relish.)

One fan's biggest gripe was that people go for their cold subs when the truly best experience that Jersey Mike's has to offer is the Philly Cheese Steak sandwich. Another real Philadelphia, eater of cheesesteaks claims Jersey Mike's is still one of his favorites. That's some high praise. Pat's and Geno's may be boiling over with rage right now. We had one for lunch today, and he ain't lying. It's quite amazing. And one big sandwich was enough for two of us. They pile the fresh-grilled meat and onions high, and when they're done, you've got a piping hot cheese steak dripping with cheese that's totally addictive. One fan suggests to "definitely get it with the peppers and onions and extra cheese!"

The Thrillest podcast guys say a cheesesteak must posses the Hylian Triforce of elements (It's a Legend of Zelda thing):

1. The roll must be toasty and warm and able to withstand the grease of

the melted cheese, meat, and onions/peppers without sogging through.

- The chopped steak must be crispy and tender, without an abundance of the fatty, inedible bits that bounce your teeth back when you bite down.
- The cheese (Whiz or American) must be of the correct melty consistency to act as a binding agent for the meat, cheese and onions without overwhelming the entire production.

They concluded that the cheesesteak at Jersey Mike's had all of those elements.

The sandwiches come in three sizes: 5 inch Mini, 7 inch Regular, and 14-15 inch Giant. They also offer wraps, and tubs (that's a salad version), chips, desserts, and drinks. With quality comes price. Jersey Mike's Subs is not participating in the race to the bottom for cheapest sandwich on the market and thankfully so. The footlong-ish giant will set you back \$12 to \$14. Minis are around \$6 while regular and wraps hit the \$8 range. The rewards program is pretty good, too. You get 4 to 12 points per sandwich purchased and can redeem free sandwiches with as little as 48 points for a \$6 mini or 144 points for a \$12 giant sub.

We didn't have the desserts, but we saw a ranking by greatness: 1) Peanut butter KandyKakes. 2) Butterscotch Krimpets. 3) Cupcakes.

HOW TO HOST AN ALLERGEN-FRIENDLY THANKSGIVING

Thanksgiving is a time to reflect on all of the things you are grateful for, but let's be honest... it's really mostly about the food. However, for someone with food allergies, navigating a Thanksgiving dinner safely could be more stressful than celebratory. So if your guest list includes someone with food allergies, read on for some tips to help you prepare a delicious—and safe—meal that everyone is sure to enjoy.

SEND IN THE SUBS

There are eight foods that cause the majority of allergic reactions: milk, eggs, fish, shellfish, tree nuts, peanuts, wheat and soybeans. If your recipes contain any of these items, look for allergy-free substitutions. For example, if you need to replace egg in a recipe, you can use a packaged egg replacer or mix one tablespoon of ground flax seeds with three tablespoons of water. If dairy is the problem, replace cow's milk with a non-dairy milk. Just make sure that the replacement does not also contain an allergen. For example, almond milk would not be a good substitution for someone with a dairy and tree nut allergy. In that case, rice milk would be a better option.

START NEW TRADITIONS

If you don't want to modify your favorite recipes, introduce new ones into the mix. There are many resources available for finding allergy-friendly recipes. And who knows, you may just discover a new favorite. Many people associate certain dishes with Thanksgiving, so try to keep the same flavors in the new dish. For example, instead of the traditional pumpkin pie, try pumpkin mousse.

BRING YOUR OWN DISH

If you won't be preparing the meal, work with the host to make sure there will be allergy-friendly options. When in doubt, bring a dish or two that you know are safe. There are many great allergy-friendly options in the Hy-Vee HealthMarket, including egg replacers, dairy-free milks, gluten-free baking ingredients, and more. WISH UPON A STAR

We have a Humdinger with this issue's book. They have been few and far between in 2020, but this one more than makes up for it.

Edgar Rice Burroughs wrote what has come to be regarded as one of the finest science fiction/fantasy series to ever grace pulp paper. It is alternately called *John Carter of Mars, The Barsoom Series*, or simply *The Martian Series*. Earthlings call the red planet Mars, but Martians call it Barsoom. I call the series one of the greatest creations of human imagination. It is a seven book set, and the first book is the best of them all. It is a stunning achievement. Write this down, *A Princess of Mars*.

Mr. Burroughs was a strong proponent of two vile and pernicious ideas: eugenics and scientific racism. You don't have to look too hard to see these ideas played out in his most popular and famous creation, *Tarzan*. It is very interesting to me that Burroughs simultaneously wrote *Tarzan* and *The Martian Series*. *The Martian Series* contains little or none of the ideas on eugenics or scientific racism found in the *Tarzan* novels. In fact, on Mars, John Carter finds sentient beings in a wide variety of colors and remarkable biological diversity. Not stopping there, Burroughs created an astounding variety of animal and plant life.

In the beginning of the novel, Carter is described as a former captain in the army of the Confederacy. This happens only once or twice. In the rest of book

he becomes John Carter of Virginia and, occasionally, John Carter, a gentlemen from Virginia. Carter respects everyone he meets and treats all with generosity and kindness. It wouldn't be much of an adventure if there weren't characters and/or animals John Carter fears, and they are the things of which nightmares are made.


All of the adventures he has are leading him to one goal: to catch a glimpse, have a conversation, and spend time with the Princess of Mars, the incomparable Dejah Thoris. Carter is a Southern white man from Earth, and he barely notices that Dejah Thoris is of the Martian red race. He, seemingly, doesn't register the color of her skin, and throughout all seven novels of the series, his skin color and hers are of no consequence to either of them.

When the civil war ends, Captain Carter heads west to try his hand at prospecting for gold. He is chased by hostiles into an out of the way cave where he hides and spends the night. He woke up in the middle of the night to the creepy sounds of rustling leaves emanating from the rear of the cave and went outside to calm his nerves and distract his imagination. It is inky black, no moon, no clouds, a bazillion stars with one right overhead that was blood red. Being a man of war, Captain Carter readily recognized that red star—planet actually—as Mars, named after the God of War.

He gazed intently at the red planet for a long time and slowly entered into a kind of trance. He was inexorably drawn to Mars. He woke up on the ground. He was on the planet Mars, a guest of the God of War.

And so, it began.
I have decided to r

I have decided to not only confer the title of Humdinger on A Princess of Mars but also the additional title of A Ripping Yarn. I was so jazzed-up the first time I read it that I finished the last page, went right back to the begin-





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NEWS OF THE WORLD, ON PAUSE

September 16, 1926, was a sad day for my family. That's the day my grandma Maude Kress, whom I never met, lost her brother, John Stafford, in a tragic car accident. Coming across the news clipping in a box of family papers, I learned he was driving a Velie car—a model developed by John Deere in Moline, IL, named after Deere's grandson, Willard Velie. The accident was not my great-uncle's fault. Over five hundred people, including a state senator, attended the funeral.

The details of the accident and obituary are fascinating, but I found another level of news on the back of the yellowed paper. While the headline is missing, it was probably something like "Around and About" or "What Your Neighbors Have Been Up To." Organized by locale, we learn that in the Duxbury neighborhood, "Fritz Kally, who has been south working, returned last week to spend the winter at home," and "S.E. Wasson and Ed Goebel were out on a sight seeing trip Sunday." And also, "Quite a few of the folks attended the fair in Cloverton Saturday." Quite a few! So much is said: "Oscar Maygren returned Monday from Duluth, where he had been visiting his mother who was operated on last week for goiter. Mrs. Maygren is recovering as rapidly as can be expected." So much is unsaid: "A miscellaneous shower was held on Mrs. Jack Bently at her home in Keene, Tuesday." Wedding shower? New baby? How exactly was it held "on" Mrs. Bently? And did women have first names back then?

More mystery prevails in this odd announcement from Windmere Township: "Tuesday evening a charivari party called on Mr. and Mrs. Carl E. Wells at their home west of Moose Lake." A quick search for "charivari" indicates it involved a gang of noisemakers descending on a house to grab a wrongdoer and hold him or her to account, sounding uncomfortably like a non-lethal lynching, something akin to the Pilgrim custom of putting scofflaws in stocks for public ridicule. We can only hope that, in 1926 Minnesota, it was more of a fun post-wedding visit by raucous friends, like a miscellaneous shower on steroids. In my youth, we might have festooned Mr. and Mrs. Wells' house with streamers of toilet paper.

Not today, though. TP is precious, and getting more so as winter descends and the virus resurges with a vengeance. People don't change much, but times do. We still want to sightsee, celebrate the birth of twins, go south for the winter and back home in the spring. We announce our comings and goings not in the newspaper but on social media, with perhaps less gory detail about our goiters and car smashups, but just as much attention to who poured the tea (or who

made the sourdough bread, with photos) or what kind of car we've got our eye on. Back in 1926, "J.W. Pearson purchased a Studebaker Six from a party in Pine River, and it was delivered to him Sunday." What a glorious day for Mr. Pearson.

There's been a rhythm to my family's announcements all through these months of lockdown. First we checked in to see how everyone was doing, and not just via Facebook or Twitter. Like so many others, Bob and I picked up the phone and called people we hadn't seen in ages, in distant outposts like Minneapolis, Atlanta, Seattle. I sent real letters to people lacking email, and it was very cool to receive real letters back. My packages to the grandtwins increased, and we played around with video chats. Everyone is so good at Zooming now, we can complain of Zoom fatique.

It was heartening to see lists of things other folks were doing to procure groceries, pass the time, educate the kids, and stay sane. Once the weather calmed, we reported cautious in-person visits with friends in town. "Ms. Dunn had a three-hour conversation with Ms. Hill beneath a pergola of clematis at the Arboretum," the paper could have reported. "The Kress-Dunns dragged lawn chairs from their cars to look at the Lock and Dam from Eagle Point Park while chatting with the Curtises, whom they last had over for a pre-Christmas dinner."

Now winter is closing in. A group of men I know who've met at coffeehouses for years—solving the world's problems, laughing at old jokes—has relocated to one fellow's garage. My son is setting up his firepit, though there's too much COVID between lowa and Nebraska for us to gather round in his Omaha yard. Families are planning holidays in which everyone eats the same thing at the same time on Zoom, counting their blessings if none of those beloved squares is empty.

Let's salute the everyday news, and the people who make it, both now and long ago. Here's a final bit of happy gossip from smalltown Minnesota, c. 1926: "The cream route has a new driver. Hjalmar Jacobson has gone to Minneapolis to attend school, and Carl E. Wells is working in the store and driving the cream truck." Thank you, Carl. Thank you, all the essential workers who continue to staff the stores and drive the trucks. Celebrate your own little news this winter. It's bigger than you think.

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
