

One4Water: Paddling the Mississippi with Hank Kohler

Meet outdoorsman, paddler, and fisherman Hank Kohler as he passes through Dubuque and learn more about his trip on Friday, June 18 from 6 to 7:30 p.m. at the National Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium.

Hank Kohler set out in 1979 with his brother Keith Kohler and friends Rich Wiebke and Dennis Weidemann on a 1300-mile paddling trip from central Minnesota to Hudson Bay. The life-changing trip was later detailed in Weidemann's book, *This Water Goes North*.

On June 3, 42 years after his first big adventure, Hank set off from East Leaf Lake in Minnesota—the same location he began his last adventure—and is headed south to the Gulf of Mexico.

"I want to use the unique nature of this endeavor to make people aware of clean water projects and conservation



initiatives," Kohler explains. "This paddling trip is more than a second big adventure for me. It's an opportunity to help make a difference."

National Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium curator of conservation programs, Jared McGovern, leads the organization's Take CAARE (Conservation Action through Advocacy, Research, and Engagement) initiative which is in the process of recruiting area high school youth for involvement in conservation programs and is working in close partnership with city, county, state, and federal groups to make positive environmental impact.

Kohler has raised more than \$14,000 in support of conservation efforts and Take CAARE initiatives at the NMRMA.







After much delay, production on the fifth and final *Indiana Jones* movie is finally underway 40 years





Be AWARE Program Helps Make Dubuque More Inclusively Pet Friendly

On July 1, 2020, the City of Dubuque implemented the Pets in Parks Ordinance allowing leashed pets in most city parks, parkways, trails, and open spaces. This long-discussed change to city law was exciting to many pet owners, making recreation more accessible to our four-legged friends. It also recognized that being a pet-friendly city offered many millennials, looking to move here for jobs after college, a more attractive lifestyle often found in bigger cities. But as with so many things in life, with greater freedom comes increased responsibility.

"I've longed to walk my dogs in Dubuque parks for as long as I've lived here," said professional dog trainer and animal behaviorist Robyn McFarlane, owner of That's My Dog! Inc. dog training in Dubuque. McFarlane was a volunteer on the Dubuque Pet Friendly Initiative committee and, in 2020 after recognizing a need for greater public education, she created AWARE Pet Owner, Inc., a 501c3 non-profit organization whose mission is to "Improve communities by educating citizens on how to safely and respectfully share public space with companion animals."

The mission of the Be AWARE Program, which is set to roll out with familyfriendly events beginning June 16, is to educate both pet owners and nonowners alike on how to share public space safely and responsibly while aiming to make education on the issue a fun and positive experience for everyone. "This is all about positive reinforcement," said McFarlane, noting that just like training your dog, negative reinforcement doesn't yield constructive results.

There are five basic steps in the Be AWARE Pet Protocol, and each is designed to mutually support the needs of both people and pets alike.

The goal of practicing the protocol is to help pet owners become ambassadors for responsible pet ownership and pave the way for a more pet-friendly community.

Be AWARE is an acronym for Alert, Walk, Admire, Responsible, and Educate.

- Alert. Stay alert by paying attention to your dog and your surroundings. Sudden movements or loud noises might startle your pet and cause them to behave poorly. Keep your pet secure and under control in public spaces.
- Walk. Walk away from situations that might cause your dog to feel nervous or defensive. Don't force a hesitant or shy dog to interact with others. Don't allow your overly exuberant dog to impose on others. You could be held accountable if your pet scratches or bites someone.
- Admire. Pets are not public property. Admire from a distance and wait to be invited. Never rush in to greet or touch someone's dog. If your pet is not highly social, politely decline requests for greeting.
- **Responsible**. Be responsible by always cleaning up after your dog. Don't allow your dog to jump on, sniff, urinate on, or otherwise impose on others or their property. Interrupt and control nuisance behaviors like barking.
- Educate. Lead by example. Educate yourself and others about responsible pet ownership.

McFarlane is careful to point out that the responsibility surrounding sharing public space with pets doesn't lay solely with pet owners, but also with the people who encounter these pets, and that the Be AWARE Program seeks to educate both sides. "There is a tendency for people to see a dog and automatically want to run up and pet it," said McFarlane. While this is a normal instinct for many, the program instead advises that people avoid unnecessary encounters and that owners only allow their dogs to interact with strangers

if they know their pet to be 100 percent comfortable with social interactions. It's important for owners to always be paying attention to their dog's level of comfort in any social situation and be willing to leave if a pet shows signs of agitation.

As an animal behaviorist, McFarlane advises that owners never force their animals to do something they don't want to and that instead of strangers approaching an animal to pet or play with them, that they wait to be invited over by the pet's owner. This reduces possible tension for the animal, creating a more favorable outcome for everyone involved.

Even if you're an animal lover, McFarlane advises people to always ask permission before interacting with other's pets, and if permission is denied, to then kindly respect the other person's wishes and politely admire from a distance. "Just like I wouldn't take your car for a drive without asking permission, people should always check with owners first," said McFarlane, cautioning that pets are not public property and treating pet owners with the same respect you would if someone were admiring one of your valuable possessions is important in showing respect and maintaining harmony.

Ultimately the Be AWARE Program seeks to make every experience between people and pets in Dubuque fun, safe, and positive. It's as simple as leading by example, educating yourself about how to interact with pets in public spaces, and spreading the word by sharing your knowledge of responsible pet ownership with others.

The three Be AWARE educational events are June 16 at Allison Henderson Park, July 7 at Comiskey Park, and Aug. 11 at Welu Park, all beginning at 6 p.m. They are free, family- and pet-friendly, and no registration is required. Be AWARE informational pamphlets can be found in many of the Little Free Library locations across Dubuque, and more information can be found at AwarePetOwner.com.



Styx

decade, Styx weathered the shifting winds of the public's musical taste, reconvening for a highly successful 1996 Return to Paradise tour.

Styx has continued to receive praise for its live performances into the 21st century. On the 2006 live album One With Everything, they joined Cleveland's Contemporary Youth Orchestra to create a hybrid orchestral rock blend for the ages. The band performed at its peak in tackling every track of two of their finest platinum-selling albums on 2011's The Grand Illusion/Pieces of Eight Live. Styx also re-recorded two full discs of classic material for the aptly-titled Regeneration Volume I & II, released in 2011 and 2012, respectively.

2019 was a breakthrough year for Q Casino's Back Waters Stage, presented by MidWestOne Bank. With record crowds and the books in the black, Brian Rakestraw, Vice President and General Manager at Q Casino and Hotel, and his crew were getting ready for a 2020 season to take things to yet another level. Well, you know the rest of the story, as it was pretty much the same story everyone dealt with when looking forward to an incredible 2020. But with COVID hopefully in our rearview mirrors and live entertainment roaring back to life all over the Tri-States and America, 2021 looks to be Q Casino's chance to rekindle the hopes and expectations for a summer of 2020 that never was. Coming back from not just a pandemic but also the business and cultural restrictions imposed by that pandemic has been a long and patient road. But with bullish determination, they have arrived at the light at the end of the tunnel. So now we're just going to have twice as much fun this year to make up for it.

"We had a huge lineup ready to go in 2020," shares Rakestraw. "We had 10 shows, the biggest one being the Rascal Flatts Farewell Tour. We were really excited about a huge lineup of music from multiple genres. And then March 16, 2020, came, and we closed our doors and we were shut down through June 1 (one year to the day of this interview). It's been a year since we've been open with a lot of restrictions and capacity issues, mask mandates, social distancing, and obviously no music of any kind."

"We rode into 2020 on a wave of excitement, ready to build on the successes of 2019 and have a huge year here," he continues. "The first two months of 2020 were fantastic. They were absolutely wonderful from a business standpoint, and we were confident that we were going to have an awesome year. But then we all know what happened. And now I look at this as a rebooting. We're not back at the same pace as we were in early 2020, but we're getting there. I'm very happy to be where we are now, but it was certainly a very trying time."

"Our main goal at that time was to do whatever we can to take care of our employees. I'm very proud that after our shutdown, we made sure all of our employees were paid. We even calculated the average post-tip wage for our tipped employees and paid that wage. And then we paid 100 percent of all of the health insurance. We did all of that until the stimulus passed, and then we started looking at

anybody that qualified for unemployment, and we assisted those people to get on that assistance, but we continued to pay their health insurance through everything."

So far, attendance is still down a bit, but Rakestraw reports that the people who are coming in are their regulars and true gamers: the people who root the bottom line. While ancillary revenues from such things as music and dining are not there yet, nor are the costs associated with those items, which historically are often loss-leaders, anyway. Like so many other employers, the struggle lies in replenishing staff in the restaurants.

"When we first started dealing with the shutdown as it relates to the concerts," says Rakestraw, "some of the shows got canceled while we tried to see how we could reschedule others for a later date and started pushing them back. It got to the point where it wasn't even a push-back issue anymore, we just had to start over again. Of the shows we were planning for the summer of 2020, we've now got eight announced in total, and of those shows, five are rescheduled from planned concerts last year. The other five could not find dates to work with or simply were not touring in summer 2021."

The Back Waters series itself started off slowly, growing from smaller shows up to the 2019 peak. The "Rocks the River" series in 2016 was the first outdoor concert series on the island, paving the road for the Back Waters Stage concerts held since 2017. Rakestraw notes that their mission statement is not only for the betterment of the community, government, and nonprofits but also part of the mission to promote tourism for the community.

"For me, that's the most important thing about our organization," says Rakestraw. "If we bring more people to the community, that is going to have a natural effect of allowing us to give more back to nonprofits and to the city. That's one of the reasons we started the Back Waters concerts, to see if we can bring more tourism. And if we have this long-term vision of having a nicer outdoor amphitheater, we need to make sure it can be sustainable and profitable."

One thing they learned along the way is that dates that are non-typical for gaming are the best days to have the shows. They are focusing on Sundays, Thursdays, and Fridays, with only one Saturday performance slated because people are already coming on Saturdays. So the idea is to drive tourism on other days.

"After the Kane Brown show on a Sunday in 2019, we were able to see that the hotel occupancy was just through the roof compared to other Sundays," says Rakestraw. "I talked to several people who have restaurants downtown, and they were open that night, and they saw increases as well. So, let's bring people to town. Let's bring them when they typically don't come for the benefit of not only our own hotel, food and beverage, and gaming, but for related businesses across Dubuque to take advantage."

Coming out of COVID, everyone, both in business and in their personal lives, is noticing ways that things are different now and will likely never go back to being like they were before. One way that venues are seeing a slight difference is in the buying habits for show tickets compared to the past. People are not buying tickets early right now. They're waiting until closer to the show. Some of that is out of fear of another cancellation, and some is simply the inconvenience of dealing with either a ticket refund or even a rescheduled show to a date on which they cannot attend.

"The pent-up demand is there. We're seeing shows all over the Midwest with strong sales. They are later sales, but they're strong. Ticketmaster has some policies where you can't get refunds for 30 days, and that upsets some people, so they're slower, even skittish before making investments in the future for concerts. We know the shows are great, and as we approach the show dates, with ticket sales that are already encouraging, we look at those numbers to ramp up greatly."

Coming back after a long time off is itself a growing process, and getting back into the flow of things is important. For that reason, Rakestraw and his staff have elected to book a couple of smaller shows at the front of the season.

"Kenny Wayne Shepherd and [just announced] Mitchell Tenpenny with Walker Hayes are our first two shows," he says. "That way we can gradually get into this again and dust off our cobwebs to make sure everything is running smoothly before we get into the big shows. In 2020, we switched to Ticketmaster, so we have not actually used Ticketmaster live at a show yet, and this will be our first test.

ing by audiences around the world. Several No. 1 hits punctuate his career: "Country Must Be Country Wide," "You Don't Know Her Like I Do," "Bottoms Up," "One Hell of an Amen" and "What Happens In A Small Town." Opening for Gilbert is Sean Stemaly.

"Our two big shows are obviously Brantley Gilbert and Staind. Aaron Lewis has been to Dubuque and Q Casino specifically a couple of times as a solo act with great success, but his band, Staind, has never been to our community. We're very excited to have them here as they reunite after a long hiatus. We're also excited to bring Nelly and Brothers Osborne back to Dubuque."

'80s/'90s rockers Tesla were also just announced for August, rounding out a diverse slate of performers to please many palates, including Brothers Osbourne and a trio of '90s hitmakers: Collective Soul, Better Than Ezra, and Tonic. Expect country music star Brantley Gilbert to finish the season strong on Sept. 10. One thing is clear across already-opened venues in America: People are very much ready for concerts again.

"Brothers Osborne has great advance ticket sales because they were one of the shows booked from last year that did not get canceled, but instead got moved," explains Rakestraw. "And although people had the option of getting a refund, something like 90 percent of those people opted to just hang onto their tickets and use them again this year. So that's very encouraging. People knew we were coming back."

The Back Waters concert venue setup itself will be much the same as in 2019, but this time it's not going away between shows. The rear entrance to the casino, closed since the onset of COVID, will only be open on concert nights, so there is no need to clear the back lot for parking on other days. Leaving it up also lets people see it as they drive by on Highway 151, and it's a reminder of the ongoing excitement happening on the site.

For newcomers to the series, the Turpin Tailgate area up front and closer to the stage has some seating (from 200 to 400 chairs per show) available on a first-come, first-serve basis. The front of the tailgate area is standing room only. Behind the Turpin Tailgate is general admission. G.A. is standing room, but people can bring their own chairs in if they like to sit and enjoy the show from that section, same as in the past. Q Casino does have a bag size limit, and bags are subject to search due to security issues, but you can certainly bring in your folding chair and enjoy a great concert in a seat that you know for sure is comfortable. All of the shows are rain or shine. If it's truly bad weather because of rain or lightning, that will get addressed at the time, but otherwise, the shows will go on even if there are a few fish flies.

"We're lucky that every one of our sponsors wanted to come back 100 percent this year," says Rakestraw. "Both of our beer providers returned. Lime Rock Springs (Pepsi) is back 100 percent. It made it really easy this year to come back."

MidWestOne Bank, formerly American Trust and Savings Bank, continues their long dedication to the community and cultural activity and remains the main sponsor throughout the series. Kwik Stop promotes the series with videos at their gas pumps as well as through ticket giveaways. The Turpin Dodge VIP area is now the Turpin Dodge Tailgate Area, a natural moniker change considering, you know, they sell trucks and all. The change avoids confusion with any other VIP opportunities available at a show. Verlo Mattress also returns as a sponsor.

"We also have a number of great local food trucks already committed to participate in the events," Rakestraw continues. "We're continuing our practice of inviting the food trucks without any fee to participate and offer great food to our guests, and they're enhancing their bottom line at the same time."



It's clear that the word "relief" is as much applicable to the return of music to the Back Waters Stage as anything.

"I'm just excited to finally have live music back, normalcy back, just to get out there and have an event where we can be outside and hear some great touring music together," says Rakestraw. "Even though COVID has affected so many people, for one night [or eight], we can enjoy ourselves. Let's see if we can bring more people back to our community to see that we are getting out and having a good time."

Like so many businesses, they don't have all the people they need to fully get back to normal inside the casino, especially to get the restaurants back open. Even with signing incentives and good wages, they are having the exact same pains that most other businesses are having as we try to acclimate to a "new normal" coming out of COVID. One bright spot along those lines that energizes Rakestraw is that for the Back Waters concerts, many of those employees were summer help. When they reached out to that list of people once again this year, many of those people came back on board to help make sure everyone enjoys a good show. So, staffing the outdoor shows should not be a problem.

Outside of the Back Waters concert series, things across the Q Casino and Hotel campus are nonetheless working to find their new normal as well.

"One thing we're working on right now is an enhanced outdoor dining experience at Houlihan's," explains Rakestraw. "Last year, in response to COVID, we created an outdoor patio area very simply to welcome people and make them feel safe as they dined outdoors and enjoyed what Houlihan's has to offer. Now we're looking at expanding that concept and making that a permanent place. We have architects and designers working on building plans for that right now. A portion of that, the first half, will be a covered patio area with ceiling fans, TVs, heat lamps, and other amenities to make for an extremely comfortable and inviting outdoor dining experience from spring through fall. And the rest of the patio will be an open dining space with lights above you to really be outside on a beautiful night for enjoying dinner and drinks. We expect to be able to sit 80 plus people out there. By the time we are able to get it done, half of the summer may be gone, but at least it will be there for next year and the future. We have a couple other exciting things over there we're looking at doing in the future too. So, stay tuned."

One thing that has not come back for most hotels is business travelers. And that could spark a total reset in the future for what companies do if that travel sector never fully returns. Keeping long-term effects in

mind, Rakestraw's team has learned a lot through dealing with COVID about how their business can adapt and learn from what they've experienced in order to be better in the future. Due to the many changes that COVID required, plans for the expanded hotel next to Q Casino are currently on hold. Until hotel occupancy rates return to normal and everyone gets an idea for the state of the industry, then and only then will they reassess the need and the timeline for that project.

"We really think our future is still very bright here," says Rakestraw. "Between possible hotel expansion, a rooftop restaurant, an event center, and the permanent outdoor amphitheater, we're looking at a lot of new things that we can do here over the next few years to make this place more of a resort. Again, all part of an effort to bring people in from outside the community to enjoy Dubuque. It's a slow process. COVID has stalled that process for a while, but it didn't knock us out. We stood back up, brushed the dust off, and now we're ready to go again."

You will also be thrilled to hear that entertainment will once again continue inside the Q Showroom. Expect a few "after parties" following some of the Back Waters Shows along with a steady lineup of weekend entertainers.

"This summer/fall, we will definitely go back to show-room concerts inside the Q Casino," says Rakestraw. "So long as it's clear that people feel comfortable to come back inside and of course that it's safe to be inside, you will see great entertainment return to our Show-room. It's fairly small, but we can pack 600 people in there, and sometimes we do just that. So we're going to slowly bring that back in a smart, safe, and gradual way. We won't do full capacity crowd shows right away. I already have a couple of shows booked for this fall. I can't tell you what they are yet, but the excitement certainly will continue when we come back indoors. And, of course, all of this is contingent upon staffing up to meet the needs of those new offerings."

With the retirement of America's River Festival, the Back Waters series is now the biggest outdoor concert series in the Tri-State area. And that's an understatement. It's like comparing a wedding cake to a cupcake. The truth is no other outdoor music event series even comes close to the scale and caliber of the music presented by Q Casino with the Back Waters Stage in 2021.

"Our team is really excited to get back to this," Rakestraw says. "It's outdoors. It's live music. It's cold beer. It's great food, and it's finally gathering together again with friends in the summertime!"

Gary Dolphin's Iron Bar Grand Opening

Gary Dolphin, the "Voice of the Hawkeyes," is happy to announce the Grand Opening of Gary Dolphin's Iron Bar, also known as Dolph's. The unique, upscale, and cozy destination is located on the ground level of the Novelty Iron Works building at 333 E. 10th St. in the heart of Dubuque's historic Millwork District.

Although the bar opened quietly last fall amidst the pandemic, the team is finally able to spread their wings and celebrate the moment. The weekend-long celebration includes a Dubuque Area Chamber of Commerce ribbon cutting, live music, and, naturally, appearances by past lowa Hawkeye greats and Gary Dolphin's broadcast buddies, including Ed Podolak and Bobby Hansen and former great Hawk players Nate Kaeding, Marshall Yanda, Luke Recker, and Matt Kroul. The legendary Dan Gable will also stop in to sample his new brew and christen the venue.

"They say timing is everything," muses Dolphin, talking with 365ink. "We argued amongst ourselves last summer and early fall: Do we open the bar now or wait until after COVID? We always knew COVID would go away eventually, so we decided to open then and let that slow time be our soft opening, to do it right and work out the kinks. We knew we were going to have to get great investors who trust that we're making the right call here and be patient with us, and we got just that, all Dubuquers, all local. So when the protocols were relaxed, we were already on a roll. Everybody that stopped in told 10 people and with little promotion, here we are at the grand opening, and we're rockin' and rollin' and looking forward to it."

Having had many opportunities to put his name on the shingle of bars in the past, in this case, once again, timing is everything.

"I've always been a huge historical architecture fan," Dolphin continues, "and Dubuque is such a unique town with all the modern amenities, but it has all the old buildings, and, frankly, the Millwork District is so engaging and unique and a lot of people want to be a part of it for a lot of different reasons."

"I had eight or nine meetings with the owners of the building, and I said, you know, there's a lot of sports bars, and that's not me. I'm around that enough, so we agreed that the inner bar would be free of flatscreens and jukeboxes. I wanted a place where people like me, whether they're my age or a little younger, can go and have a drink and a conversation without screaming at the top of their lungs. But yet, we would create a sports bar component, which many would expect me to have, and we've done it at the entrance hallway area to the bar as well as in the courtyard."

"I wanted the quaintness component, but who knows better than I how important a sports bar is in Dubuque, IA? And to me, the difference-maker on that front is the courtyard. And that's a big nugget. There was a lot of hand-wringing going on, should we go ahead and jump in with both feet, make that investment, mount that on a wall, and trust that people would come down, and now

that we're getting to these warm days, it's proven to be a great move. You always have to give them something no one else can, and we've done that here. So we've got the best of both worlds."

Their bar buddies across the street at 7 Hills also surprised Gary with his own namesake brew.

"Full confession," says Dolphin, "I love craft brews, but I don't know the first thing about making them. So I sampled them and picked out my favorites, and we came up with a great pilsner, and right next to it on the tap is Dan Gable's beer, which is very popular, too. And we're the only place locally with our favorite Irish beer, Smithwick's, on tap.

Speaking of on tap, here are the details on the daily activities planned for the grand opening weekend.

Wednesday, June 23: Legendary lowa wrestling coach Dan Gable will visit Dolph's at 7:30 p.m. to meet fans over a draft of his own brew, Singlespeed Brewing's Gable Munich Helles Lager, aka "Gable's Gold," on tap.

Thursday, June 24: Ribbon cutting with the Dubuque Area Chamber of Commerce, Gary and his broadcast partners Ed Podolak and Bobby Hansen, plus Nate Kaeding, Marshall Yanda, Luke Recker, and Matt Kroul at 4:30 p.m. Singer-songwriter Elizabeth Moen performs at 8 p.m. with a \$6 cover charge. Don't miss this incredible performer.

Friday, June 25: Drink specials all day. Gino's East pizza full menu served, several former lowa Hawkeye athletes mingling and available for autographs, David Mehrl playing Rat Pack classics from 5 to 8 p.m., and David Zollo, an lowa City bluesrock singer-songwriter from 9 p.m. until midnight.

Saturday, June 26: Former lowa Hawkeye Marvin McNutt, all-time leading lowa football receiver for touchdowns and total yardage, will join Gary to meet fans during the day. "Here's what I love most about it," says
Dolphin. "Most of the people who came in the
first two or three months are people I've known,
or I broadcast their kids' games growing up in
Dubuque, and they wanted to support the place.
They had no idea what it looks like, or what the
themes were in all the cubby holes and nooks
and crannies. Once they got in there and saw
the building and what was going on with us as
well as with our neighbors at Backpocket, the
women's boutiques, and now Gino's East, they
were jazzed up. And with the weddings every
Friday and Saturday, the building is really alive.

Hyatt is coming in and building a boutique hotel on the top three floors. That's the big picture. But our guests were bowled over by what the Iron Bar really is. So our original vision has played true.

"We want to give the people what they want, so between the beer and the full-service bar and the atmosphere, which is kind of like our great beautiful Gothic churches in Dubuque, people will come back just to take in the vibe and enjoy the ambiance. I grew up with live music twice a week, and I knew it was important that we get our local musicians involved, and that's really taken off. And Dubuque in and of itself is its own attraction. So it's our job to let people know where we are."







Bread and Vine Bakery

Where do I begin to gush about Bread and Vine Bakery in Galena, IL? We saw food photos online. We heard good things. But we were not at all expecting what greeted us when we opened the door at 217 S. Main St. This wasn't a quiet local sandwich shop. This place was rockin'. Well, maybe we should say it was boogying, as it was classic '70s disco pumping through the sound system. From the decor to the beautiful displays of food, to the energy of the staff, to the full room of patrons, everything about the vibe of Bread and Vine, a bakery and wine bar, felt like I had stepped off the streets of Galena and into somewhere else entirely. Not that I don't love Galena, I do. But, wow. This place is a unique experience in the town filled with unique experiences.

If I said the eatery had the feel of a restaurant chain, it sounds bad, but it has that vibe in all the best ways. There was a clear, bold, and fresh design aesthetic throughout the space, modern and bright with orange accents.

The staff was all in similar uniform, and the entire process seemed well-practiced and organized despite being a fairly new venue. In total, it is a feast for the senses ... all of them. It's bad enough having to look at a menu where everything sounds delicious, but here you are bombarded with the sights of those offerings right behind the glass. So now you have to choose among tasty treats that you can lust after with your own two eyes.

The new restaurant concept is the brainchild of Eric Bonnetain, a wonderfully fascinating native Parisian, who, thanks to fate, stumbled upon Galena during the COVID summer that never was in 2020. Clearly, I was on the right track when I noted the vibe that seemed to match the best franchises out there, as this establishment is the first of many more to come. By the way, you'll want to just go ahead and apply a cool French accent to anything you read here in quotes that follow.

"A lot of people tell me that about the atmosphere because I used to create building concepts all over the world," says Bonnetain. "This is the first one, but I'm going to be opening other locations in Austin, TX; Nashville, TN; Charleston, SC; Lexington, KY; and Naples, FL."
If anything good came out of COVID-19, look to Bread and Vine as one of those happy accidents.

"When COVID hit," Bonnetain begins, "I was in China working on a massive project involving a Chinese restaurant, a Japanese restaurant, a Korean restaurant, an American Brasserie, a French restaurant, and a nightclub, and suddenly I lost my job with COVID last year. So I took a sabbatical here with my wife, who is in Chicago, to think about my future. We were traveling here to Galena over a weekend and this little town was on fire with activity last summer while everyone was complaining in New York and Chicago. I was next door having a drink at Jamie's Wine Studio, and Jamie introduced us to the building owners here, John and Doug, who knew we did work in opening new places and said, 'Can you look at my little space here and give me some ideas?' I told him to give me a couple of weeks to come up with a concept for you and discussed with my wife that maybe it's something we should look to do for ourselves. And the rest is history."

Six months of construction later, after gutting the whole place, Bread and Vine is very much a reality.

"It's good energy," says Bonnetain. "It's good music. We play disco music because all different ages come into this place from you young kids who want macarons to the grandma who wants to have a patisserie, so we make the energy work for everyone. In the morning we have the coffee and croissant. For lunch, the locals come in for a sandwich and come back again for a drink and a small plate.

"All the sandwiches are made here in the kitchen. My chef Manny and pastry chef Laura used to work for me. I called her and said I need you, I'm opening this business. And she called the next day and said okay, you put a lot of pressure on my shoulders, and after 28 years in Chicago, she decided to move to Galena and is very happy. We have about 20 employees now and everyone is happy. I had no problems finding staff."

And that staff was one of the things that immediately stood out when we entered the restaurant. Vibrant enthusiasm is how I would describe their attitudes. They truly seemed excited to help us discover all of the hidden treasures they have behind the counter.

So now the problem is, how do we attack this menu in words without filing the whole issue?! We've had one meal there so far, and I think my next three visits are already mapped out in my head (and in my heart and my belly as well).

We're going to go out of order, because how do we talk about Bread and Vine's delectable eats without starting with dessert? It is, after all, staring you in the face when you stand at the glass windows at the counter. Each thing looks more inviting than the last.

We had four different flavors of macarons, which leaves just about 20 flavors we didn't try yet. Not to be confused with macaroons that are coconut-based, French macarons are almond flour-based. They are clearly a main feature of Bread and Vine, prominently displayed at the center of the counter in a rainbow of pastel colors and flavors. The nutty almond base of the cookies is accented with everything from coffee to berries, chocolate, caramel, citrus, and more. There IS a flavor for you. And hey, they're naturally gluten-free!

Drool-worthy pastries include three tartelettes: salted caramel chocolate, seasonal pastry cream with berries, and lemon custard with Italian meringue. You can't go wrong with a classic NY-style cheesecake, a flourless chocolate cake, tiramisu, or chocolate mousse. You likely have not tried a hazelnut cream "Lola Bun" (named after Eric's dog), which is a cream puff with caramel filling, and éclaires never disappoint. There is a strawberry lemon confit and mascarpone cream or Valhrona dark chocolate. Win and win. Or you could just be super boring and have a croissant. (Just kidding.) They look like little flaky morsels of love, and you can even get ones with almonds, chocolate, or a savory version. You can also just let go with La Pompadour, which features four of the signature desserts with a whimsical display of freshly spun cotton candy.

Consider, also, that you might want to try to actually eat a sandwich before you even get to the desserts. Of course, it's Galena and the rules are off, so dessert can be a meal for sure. The menu is big. Almost too big for me to make a decision that I fear I'll regret because I didn't get those other three sandwiches I wanted. But I can't indulge my desire to have it all.

To make for a speedy transition from your desirous glances to your watering mouth, most of the sandwiches appear to be pre-assembled in a delicious display at one end of the counter. So when you order your croque monsieur, they simply pull one out of the array of sandwiches and complete it by toasting it to perfection and serving it in just a couple of minutes. What is a croque monsieur? Only the best ham and cheese sammich you've ever had.

The BVB Chicken features grilled marinated chicken, Russian dressing, and Parmesan cheese. The chicken

Milanese's panko-coated chicken comes with confit red pepper, tartar, and romesco sauce on a baguette. A steak baguette boasts pesto, caramelized onions, and brie cheese. The Parma has that fragrant rosemary focaccia bread with ricotta, mozzarella, prosciutto, and more. We've been told that Miami regulars say their Cubanito is the real deal Cuban, with roasted pork, ham, Swiss, mustard, pickle, and mojo butter on true Pan Cubano bread. That croque monsieur I raved about has this rich béchamel sauce and gratinated Gruyère cheese. The French Hotdog is a huge seller, also with the béchamel sauce and Gruyère. The Pan Bagnat is a sexy name for a killer tuna sandwich. We also had the smoked salmon on a croissant with cream cheese, cucumber, red onion, and capers for a fresh, light flavor. You can also get a breakfast omelette on a savory croissant for the meat-free crowd. The Veggie sandwich puts roasted veggies, tomato concasse (rough chopped sauce), and pesto on rosemary focaccia.

They are all freshly prepared daily in the kitchen using high-end local and European ingredients and made ready for a rush of customers over the lunch hour: a smart, time-saving prep decision that has no downside in the quality and flavor of the sandwich when it's finished a short time later. They guarantee freshness by baking their bread and pastries multiple times throughout the day.

Yes, the salads were big and beautiful, and maybe one day I'll have that goat cheese and pear or salmon and quinoa, but it is not this day. One look at those truffle oil and Parmesan french fries and you can forget that salad. They even have poutine, bless their souls.

Perhaps you are afraid that a whole sandwich won't leave room for that desert? Never fear, the small plates and boards are here! Classic cheese and charcuterie boards are joined by blue cheese bruschetta. And then it gets really fancy with foie gras au toucheon (duck or goose liver with local pineapple jalapeño pepper jam and baguette slices), quiche Lorraine, and Cuban croquetas. How about

deep-fried beer-tempura mini burgers? And one of my all-time favorites, pork belly bao buns (SOLD!) You might also choose to share or hoard your own pizzette. Choose a veggie version, a salmon with caramelized onion and horseradish créme fraiche, or the classic French Alsacian Flammekueche with créme fraiche, caramelized onions and bacon. Who cares if you can't pronounce it? You shouldn't talk with your mouth full, anyway.

A full bar features a number of wines and spirits from local creators. Supporting local and appealing to the local population is of utmost importance to Bonnetain, not just the tourist crowd. Their goal is to make the greatest wines accessible to as many people as possible, offering a large selection of wine by the glass, beautiful labels, and famous winemakers, but also little nuggets. You will find the most interesting wines to please the most delicate palates. Their knowledgeable bartenders will help you pick the right wine by the glass to pair with either a French quiche or your selected cheese or charcuterie board. And we didn't even get into the mixed drinks. But, hey, it was lunchtime. We had to go back to work after.

There's so much to offer in this not-sobig space. Fast, friendly, and delicious. You'd wonder how they pull it all off until vou consider the resume of the man with the plan. Eric Bonnetain was born in Paris, where his parents owned two restaurants. He became the chef there and moved into management when he was very young. He then decided to move to the United States, working in New York for 25 years focused in Manhattan at 2- and 3-star Michelin restaurants under esteemed chefs such as Éric Ripert at Le Bernardin. Then onto Miami where he was vice president of a hotel company on the food and beverage side, doing a lot of openings for them for concepts and in charge of 57 restaurants and nightclubs, before tackling the project in China just before COVID.

So yeah, I'd say he sort of knows his stuff. And Bread and Vine Bakery proves it. We know you'll love his stuff too. As always, tell 'em 365ink sent you!





In the last issue of *365ink*, I wrote part one of a two-part book review concerning the three novels making up *Dark Matters* by the mighty impressive Michael Dow. So impressive, that I gave him the Bob Gelms personal Humdinger Award; which is the only one I have given out in all of 2021.

I was reluctant to read *Dark Matters*. The bad hype was me and my negative feelings about starting a series with three novels. It waters down everything in the story. On the other side, it picked up at least three awards that I am aware of. I didn't buy all three novels; I only bought the first one. Caution is the better part of an empty wallet.

I couldn't believe myself. I read the first book in two days and books two and three in about five days; all three in a week. *Dark Matters* is outstanding, over the top, clever, smart, provocative, a top-notch thriller, a murder mystery, and it has surprises galore. You can


ask but usually never get writing this good. Now that I think about it, maybe it's a Humdinger with a big kapow. There is something else that cannot be overstated: *Dark Matters* is a whole lot of fun to read. It's almost as much fun as being attacked by 12 golden retriever puppies.

Mr. Dow has a number of characters gathered together in small groups. They don't know each other until halfway through the second book when two groups band together for self-preservation. They know, then, that they are all in mortal danger.

This is a techno sci-fi thriller of the first order. Rudy Dersch is the new CEO of GRI, history's first trillion-dollar conglomerate. Professor Jonas Hanson is head of Hanson Scientific, and Monique Durand, with her little band of friends, is on the hunt for the meaning of her visions. Enter stage left: the bad guys. They call themselves The Consortium, a group of uber-rich multi trillionaires who have been directing all things on Earth: economies, wars, political machinations, worldwide food production, transportation, and outer space. They have mining operations on the moon and Mars and two orbiting hotels along with a mysterious Chairman and an equally mysterious end game that has nothing to do with chess. At the same time, it is breathing and evil. Rudy to the rescue.

In addition to these matters, we get a bird's eye view into the most compelling mystery the universe has waiting for humanity. It's called Dark Matter, with no "s" and along with it, a primer on quantum mechanics.

Monique discovers the meaning behind her visions. On a basic simple level, I am reminded of the great Catholic theologian and paleontologist Pierre Teilhard de Chardin who said, "We are not human beings having a spiritual experience. We are spiritual beings having a human experience." I think that just about covers Monique Durand's job in this story. She is also responsible



for applying Charles Darwin and his theory of evolution to all of humanity, and it is monumentally exciting.

If you are going to the stars or staying on Earth, wherever you go, there you are. Throwing another inscrutable quote in here, this one from the enlightened Lao Tzu, "If you do not change direction, you may end up where you are heading."

All will be made clear after reading *Dark Matters* (with an "s") by Michael Dow.

Oh gosh, I have to mention this. The titles of both my reviews of *Dark Matters* mention nine billion dead when Earth's population was 10 billion. Thinking on it, I am not so sure that's a bad thing.

- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 tbsp Mrs. Dash Italian Seasoning
- 1/8 tsp black pepper
- ¼ Ib fresh green beans, trimmed



- 1 pint grape tomatoes
- 2 (5 oz) boneless pork chops

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 425°F. Spray a large rimmed baking sheet with cooking spray.
- 2. Cut potatoes in half. Place the potatoes on the prepared baking sheet.
- 3. In a small bowl combine olive oil, garlic, Italian seasoning, and black pepper. Mix well. Drizzle ½ tablespoon of the mixture over the potatoes. Toss the potatoes to coat.
- 4. Bake for 20 minutes. Meanwhile, trim green beans.
- 5. Remove the baking sheet from the oven and add the green beans and tomatoes. Drizzle 1 tablespoon of the olive oil mixture over the top. Toss to coat. Place the pork chops over the top of the vegetables. Pour the remaining olive oil evenly over the pork chops. Bake an additional 15–17 minutes or until the potatoes are soft and the pork reaches a minimum internal temperature of 145°F as measured with a food thermometer.
- 6. If desired, at the end of cooking time, turn oven control to broil. Broil 4–6 minutes

Here is the Church

I went to church the other day, opened the door, and walked right down the aisle. It wasn't a Sunday, and the only other person there was my husband, who's no preacher. We've been in there a handful of times since in-person services were canceled for the you-know-what. He's the head of the program committee, and I run the small but well-curated library, so we both have keys. It's been strange, walking into this place our members and friends miss so much.

Our church—the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Dubuque, UUFD for short—is small. We have about 50 members and friends, and "friends" is not a word we use lightly. Some of our most supportive congregants choose not to become members, which means they cannot serve on the board or vote in elections, but they can do everything else. We are a welcoming church—and that word is not used lightly, either. It means we receive you no matter your beliefs, your sexual orientation, your race, your color, your creed. Atheists, Christians,

Wiccans, Agnostics, Humanists, Bewildered Seekers-we welcome everyone.

Quite a few of the key-holding volunteers have been in and out of our building at the corner of 17th and Iowa since March 2020. Someone has monitored the HVAC. Someone has thrown out the trash. Someone has cleaned out the refrigerator. That would be me, and it was an adventure. A stick of butter stuck to a plate, a bucket of something or other, maybe pawpaws? One member brings those from his rural home. They are delicious, but not after 15 months. Slices of molding banana bread on plates, unopened bottles of lemon-lime Hard Soda and two bags of Chips Ahoy. Adhering as closely as I could to our fellowship's Green Sanctuary commitment, I recycled the plastic and glass, threw the foodstuffs into my city compost bin, and offered the hard soda and hermetically sealed cookies to our group of under-40s known as YoungUUns, for their monthly moon circles.

Honestly, I loved doing that. Show me a mess, and I will spring into action,



though I did not scrub the fridge. I have my own at home and that, thank you very much, is enough.

We are a hardy group that began meeting in people's homes, then moved to a high-ceilinged room in the Masonic Temple, then to a spare room at the old Xavier hospital where the padded folding chairs we splurged on had to be set up and returned to the closet every Sunday. When the little church next to Hoffman-Schneider Funeral Home (now the private home of new UUFD member, glory be) went on the market in 2004, we took a leap, signed a mortgage, and moved into an honest-to-goodness church.

This structure, built in 1885 as a German Episcopal church, is about to undergo a transformation, thanks to a capital campaign that raised funds to restore the exterior to its former Carpenter Gothic beauty, including a belfry that mysteriously went missing. The interior, too, will be spruced up and made more accommodating, lovely, and, yes, welcoming.

But it's the people who count. The people who founded the church, a few of whom are still around. The people who serve on the committees-Social Action, Finance, Membership, Building and Grounds-all the work that could be a slog but feels like a spirited mission most of the time. Our services are unlike any other in Dubuque. We have rituals absent of dogma. We have Joys, Sorrows, and Concerns, during which people voice their worries and triumphs as a small stone is put into a bowl of water. We have readings—sometimes from the Bible, more often from a poet like Mary Oliver—and we have a speaker who shares a reflection, not a preacher delivering a sermon. We find people of all kinds—environmentalists, theologians, musicians, teachers, city council members-willing

to get up and tell their story, their personal, spiritual, and vocational journey.

The closing circle is a cherished ritual. With the pandemic closing in at our last gathering in March 2020, we stood and did not hold hands, for the first time ever. But we still said together, "Now, let us take into our hearts the flame of our togetherness. May its warmth be with us throughout the coming week. Go in peace." Everyone smiling, it's a wonderful benediction.

Before COVID, we would squeeze the hands of the people on either side of us as we said that last sentence. When we return later this month (we hope) we won't do that. Nor will we crowd together into the pews and chairs. Families and friend groups will do that, but we will do our best to be somewhat socially distanced. And we won't all sing the hymns together, but one of our splendid musicians will sing from the stage. And the vaccinated will hug, I know we will. Try and stop us.

It's funny, but even as we joyfully gather together again, we will lose a few things. Through the magic of Zoom, people have joined us from all over the worlda beloved daughter in Germany, a dear friend in Ireland, a much-missed former member in New York City. We hope to find a way to retain that far-flung inclusion. We want everyone we can get. You know how the hand game goes: Here is the church. Here is the steeple. Open the door, See all the people. May it be so.


