



Ever since my cancer diagnoses a few years back, we've been kicking tires on possible new homes. The hills to mow and the stairs to climb simply got to be daunting after a while. I'm better—at least for now—and it's not a problem anymore, but you never know. So the hunt for an "easier" house has been on a low simmer for what must be three years or more now.

We actually had an offer accepted on a house some years ago, and it fell through after a nightmare inspection found mold and some sketchy wiring. And we've offered on homes that we didn't get. And then, in the last couple of years, the housing market went completely batsh*t crazy. Like, off the rails nutter. We kept looking through it all, but very rarely, if ever, saw something that really spoke to us. And when, on occasion, one did, it apparently spoke to 20 other people first.

We have gone through homes the morning after they went on the market only to find out that the house had multiple offers overnight already. We have seen homes going for more than the asking price, sometimes stupidly above what the house could possibly be worth once the market calmed down. And through it all, my wife, Christy, has been a constant monitor. For a while there, her dad got into it for us from his home in Minneapolis, keeping an eye out for something in Dubuque that got us where we wanted to be. I think it became an obsession, so he had to stop looking. And we stopped telling him about leads, so we didn't taunt him.

After these three years, I think poor John Gartner, my friend and Realtor, has got to be sick of us not pulling the trigger on a house. But he swears he loves doing it, so we keep punishing him. And don't get me started on the side story of having so many Realtor friends that you don't know who to ask or who to hire. But after putting in the hours (and hours), offers and rejected offers, and really understanding what we want, it simply had to be John. All my other truly lovely Realtor friends will get pies, I guess. It really is hard because some people have done so much for me over the years that you really want to repay that kindness with your business. So it sucks a bit to have to choose.

When you really do actually love the house you are in, it's extra hard because you don't want to take a step backward, right? We're fine with a smaller house. With my cancers, we sadly can't have kids anymore, so we know that there's no longer a need for the 4-bedroom home we got when kids were still on the radar. And man, oh, man, did we ever put work into this house. Blood, sweat, tears, more blood, and some pulled-out hair all made this house what it is now. At least inside, It's still battleship gray on the outside, but when someone else has this house one day, my architect wife's demanding standards for rehab and appreciation for the historic nature of our 1911 home will make them very happy with their choice. It's a grand old girl... with some sweet new bathrooms!

So after seeing house after house sell so quickly we could not even make an offer, or just having a

pool of offers pricing us out of the game, we truly had mostly given up on even looking at houses until the bonkers housing market settled back down and made the process less painful. Christy still looked at **Realtor.com** on occasion, mostly out of morbid fascination, I think, rather than really thinking she'd find something. But the expectations were gone. And, you know, sometimes it's just fun to go to an open house on an interesting property.

That's exactly what we did two weeks ago when a house that was definitely not your average run-ofthe-mill property was having an open house. On a whim, we decided to take a peek on our way to get some Jersey Mike's subs for lunch. After all of our experiences in this journey. I don't think either of us shows our cards anymore when we look at houses, except to point out problems. So, we checked it all out, and on the way to the car, Christy asked what I thought. I said I really liked it, a lot. It ticked all my boxes: small, flat yard; single-level living (at least for two people); and not boring. I think it surprised her. But like so many other houses, there were a LOT of people touring that home that day. They were taking offers and reviewing the next week. Probably out of depression from recent experience, we didn't even offer. We just thought, well, that would be nice... if we didn't have to fight for it so damn hard.

And then it was more than a week later that we noticed it was still on the market. I totally broke the rules and texted the owner because I found out we knew each other, and just asked if it had sold yet. When I found out it had not, we decided to give it a second look. With John making room in his day for us... AGAIN... we went to kick the tires... AGAIN, and, lo and behold, we liked it even more the second time, especially after better understanding the interesting qualities of the house's unique architectural energy-saving features. We decided that this was indeed exactly what we were hoping to find before we gave up. With nervous hearts and bellies, we pulled the trigger and made an offer. An hour later, we were new homeowners. At least we hoped.

We've been here before, so we're not getting too excited. We still have inspections to get through, but it was pretty clear right away that this house didn't have the kind of red flags that past houses had. We are feeling pretty good about it. That is until you get to the part where you realize now that you not only have to pack up everything you have accumulated in the last 13 years in a house you love, but you have to give up that house and get it all to code and looking great because you have to turn around and sell that existing house now, too.

So, here we go. I guess the next two months of my column will probably focus on the trials and tribulations of moving out and moving in and all of the joys, heartaches, and backaches that come with that. But overall, I have to say, I am very excited about the future. We found what we want, and we went and got it. All I need now is a lot of very gullible, generous, and energetic friends who are free on moving day!

Join the Light Up the Night Fundraiser on Saturday, Oct. 2 from 2 to 9 p.m. at The Yardarm. Emcee Ron Steele will join live music by Mark Zalaznik and Koop and Company, a silent and live auction, and a 5K Glow run/walk at 6:30 p.m. along the riverwalk. Proceeds will go towards Cory's medical and pharmaceutical bills.

Due to malformations, Cory's heart was not able to oxygenate and carry blood as intended, so she had three open heart surgeries: the first one at 9 days old, second one at 6 months, and the last one at age 3 years. At 16, Cory discovered he had developed PLE (Protein Losing Enteropathy). Concerned that medications were not managing the PLE and

causing liver and kidney damage, in February of 2020, Cory was placed on the heart transplant waiting list.

In February of 2021, he was bumped up on the transplant list due



to the increased damage, and on June 26, 2021, Cory and his family received the call and headed to UIHC in preparation for his heart transplant. After undergoing a 12.5 hour surgery, a few bumps post-op, and emergency surgery on his leg due to a blood clot, Cory is finally home recuperating after a month stay at the UIHC. Due to his fragile state of health, Cory will be in quarantine during the summer months.

A new initiative at the University of Dubuque celebrates Black lives, creativity, ingenuity, and contributions to American heritage. Inspired by local hero Captain Robert L. Martin, the Captain Robert L. Martin Black Heritage Tribute is a new months-long initiative that will include speakers, performances, exhibits, and more. Many of the events are open to the public.

Celebrate the new initiative on Monday, Sept. 27, at University of Dubuque Heritage Center. Starting in John and Alice Butler Hall at 6:30 p.m., speakers underscore the life and legacy of Captain Martin. Speakers will include Gabrielle and Dominique Martin, two of Captain Martin's children; Kenneth Rapier, president and chief pilot of the Chicago Chapter of the Tuskegee Airmen; Kim Rowe (C'16), coordinator of the Young Eagles, a program developed by the Experimental Aircraft Association and cosponsored by the Chicago Chapter of Tuskegee Airmen; and Nelson Edmonds, dean of student engagement at UD.

Continue to the Bisignano Art Gallery at 7:30 p.m., for the opening of 12 Tuskegee Airmen from Iowa. Near the art gallery will be Unconditional Loyalty: The Military Service of African Americans, a portable exhibit from the African American Museum of Iowa in Cedar Rapids, IA. Complimentary refreshments will be available.

The evening concludes with a screening of *Red Tails*, a 2012 film about the Tuskegee Airmen, at 8 p.m. in John and Alice Butler Hall.

About Captain Robert L. Martin

Captain Martin was an original member of the Tuskegee Airmen, a Black segregated aviator group in the US Army Air Corps. The man known as "Fox" grew up in Dubuque. He graduated from Dubuque Senior High School and earned a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from lowa State University. At the age of 23, he graduated from flight training at the Tuskegee Army Air Field in Alabama.

When he arrived in Italy, Captain Martin joined the 100th Fighter Squadron, part of the all-Black 332nd Fighter Group. In 1945, while flying his 64th mission, his plane was hit by enemy fire. Captain Martin bailed out and landed behind enemy lines in Yugoslavia. After a month at an Allied mission manned by British soldiers, Captain Martin was airlifted to Italy and eventually returned home. Following the war, he received his military discharge at the rank of captain.

"As a native Dubuquer myself, it was fascinating to learn of another hometown son, Captain Martin, and his impact on America's WWII efforts through the Tuskegee Airmen," said Thomas Robbins, executive director of Heritage Center and member of the Captain Robert L. Martin Black Heritage Tribute Committee. "In order to honor his bravery and contributions,



Heritage Center and our campus partners have assembled an entire series of programming devoted to African Americans like Captain Martin who have made a positive difference locally and on the world stage. By recognizing Black leaders and recounting the story of Black heritage in America, we hope to bring greater recognition to Captain Martin, a native aviator and hero, and perhaps inspire young people."

Captain Martin received the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with six Oak Leaf Clusters, and the Purple Heart. In 2007, he was among the recipients of the Congressional Gold Medal at a ceremony honoring the Tuskegee Airmen.

"The University of Dubuque community was blessed to hear Captain Martin speak in January 2006 at Blades Hall with First Lieutenant Beverly Dunjill," said University of Dubuque President Rev. Jeffrey F. Bullock, PhD. "Captain Martin's story as one of the original Tuskegee Airmen is one of strength and courage."

After the war, Captain Martin worked as an electrical engineer in Chicago. He spent his final decade in Olympia Fields, IL, where he passed away on July 26, 2018. He was 99.

"On behalf of the family of Captain Robert L. Martin, we thank the University of Dubuque and the Captain Robert L. Martin Black Heritage Tribute Committee for its recognition," Gabrielle Martin said. "The honors for the perseverance of this hometown veteran are welcomed. Robert's curiosity led him to build and fly kites, to fly airplanes, and to serve his country as a fighter pilot when his country did not value his efforts. Robert's battles and sacrifices helped America honor its constitutional promises of equality and win the war. Robert's compassion for his fellow soldiers and his heroism in the face of enemy combatants helped ensure the many freedoms we all enjoy today. We hope this initiative lights the way for others to reach high and achieve their dreams."

The Captain Robert L. Martin Commemoration
Committee is fundraising to name the Dubuque

Film showings start every 45 minutes with screenings beginning at 4:15 p.m. on Sept. 29 through Oct. 1, and at 9 1.m. on Oct. 2 and 3.

The traveling exhibit is a 53-foot one-of-kind climate-controlled mobile theater that features the original panoramic films *Rise Above: Red Tail*, documenting the inspirational history of the Tuskegee Airmen, and *Rise Above: WASP*, documenting the inspirational history of the WASP. The films, shown on a 160-degree screen, highlight how any one of us may be able to reach beyond our grasp to attain new levels of achievement, just like the Tuskegee Airmen and WASP.

In addition to the mobile theater, the Red Tail P-51C Mustang will be on static display. The fully-restored and operational vintage aircraft was the Tuskegee Airmen's signature fighter in WWII, complete with unique red tail paint scheme.

Tuskegee Airmen refers to all who were involved in the Tuskegee Experience, the US Army Air Corps' recruitment of African American men and women to train and fight in WWII in the face of discriminatory policies and conditions. It includes not only 996 pilots, but also more than 14,000 African American men and women who served as support personnel for the airmen during the war. WASP refers to the female pilots who volunteered to fly American military airplanes during WWII. Of the over 20,000 women who applied, 1,074 earned the coveted silver wings and became official members of the WASP program.

The cook-off starts at 10 a.m. with the kids' corner, food, and beverages. The public tasting starts at 1 p.m. and is only \$5.

This one is pretty special for *365ink*. Yes, it just happens to take place outside of our front office door here on Cable Car Square, but even before we had our office here, we have ties to this event. It was at Chili Cook-Off, Oct. 7, 2000, that **Dubuque365.com** was born and introduced to the public, and 21 years later, we're still kickin' it! And we've made a lot of chili along the way. We hope to be out there making more again this year.

If you've never been to this event, you really need to come down and experience it in person. There's something

very special about the location and the weather at that time of year. It can be hot or it can be freezing, but usually, it's that perfect kind of fall coolness that makes for amazing beer and chili enjoyment. The festival atmosphere and decor are a wonderful backdrop for some downright serious chili competition. It's sooooo good. And taking it all in just requires that you pay a measly \$5 for a tasting spoon and start tent hopping to try all of the chilis.

Part of this whole endeavor is based around a sanctioned CASI chili cooking competition. CASI chili has some stringent rules. Did you know that CASI chili has no beans? Don't worry though, the gallons and gallons of chili in the open, business, and kids divisions are sure to load up on the beans and the flavor.

You can come early of course, well before the tasting at 1 p.m. There will be more food than chili available from places like Sugar Ray's BBQ, Magoo's Pizza, Sweet Memories Ice Cream Shop, and more. And there will be live music going during the tasting by The Lonely Goats. Their brand of eclectic rock, funk, jazz, zydeco, blues, gypsy, and just about everything else is the perfect pairing for the kind of palate that enjoys variety in their chili and their music. They're also the band of 365's own Mike Ironside whom we lost to cancer last month. So it will be wonderful having them playing outside the office with a little Mikey magic in the air.

Event organizer Teri Connelly from the Cable Car Square anchor business Calico Bean Market is very excited to be able to bring the event back after a year without.

"We waited until the last minute to make sure it was going to be okay, and it seems like that's going to hold for us," says Teri. "We have an outdoor venue which helps, and the whole nature of the event lends itself to the safe ideals of gathering during these times. And so many people are excited to have it back. While they could not hold the event last year, Teri created an online GoFundMe fundraiser for Hills & Dales to generate support in the name of the Chili Cook-Off anyway, and people came through for her and for Hills & Dales. The event averages \$3,000 to \$5,000 per year for the charity.

"The more beer you drink and the more chili you eat, the better the charity does," says Connelly.

Challenge accepted!

And hey, If you want to participate, you still can. Go visit Teri Connely at Calico Bean, 352 Bluff St. in Dubuque. Entries are \$25 for CASI, \$20 for open, \$20 for business, \$10 for kids, and \$5 for salsa. Yes, there is competition salsa. We can attest that being an official judge for this event is also a pretty darn good gig to get.





Wahlburgers

I'd like to use this platform that I've been given to state, for the record, that Donnie Wahlberg (Everybody's either favorite or least favorite New Kid. There's no inbetween here.) is a better actor than his brother Mark Wahlberg. I've thought so since Ransom, and his work in The Sixth Sense and Band of Brothers only confirms it. And don't get me wrong. I like Mark Wahlberg as an actor. He didn't wilt in the face of Leo's scenery-chewing in *The Basketball* Diaries, and some moments in Boogie Nights are just masterful. I just think Donnie deserves more of the Wahl-love than he gets. That's all I'll say on the matter. Now let's talk about Wahlburgers, owned by Mark, Donnie, and their brother-chef, Paul.

Does it seem weird to you that there's a friggin' Wahlburgers in friggin' Hy-Vee? How did this come to be? It seems to have started a few years ago when Mark Wahlberg started appearing on magazine covers and dietary supplements and standees exclusive to Hy-Vee. That alone seemed weird enough at the time. It's not like Mark Wahlberg is a has-been. He's A-List, y'all. So what the hell is he doing peddling his wares in grocery stores based in the most fly-over of fly-over states? The guy is more Boston than a baked bean. The guy is more Hollywood than Meshach Taylor.

I don't know. I don't have an answer, and I'm not curious enough to investigate. Maybe he doesn't think he's bettah'n me, after all. In any case, I'm glad Wahlburgers is here, and you should be, too.

If you're looking for a burger analog, Wahlburgers is more akin to a Red Robin than a Five Guys. The price point is similar as well. So if you're sick of waiting for a table at Red Robin, Wahlburgers is worth considering. Dubuquers love their gourmet burgers though, so it won't be long until you'll be waiting for a table at Wahlburgers as well.

There's a few interesting things to note when looking at a Wahlburgers menu. To highlight the humble beginnings of the Wahlburger recipes, they proudly list "government cheese" when describing the ingredients of each burger. You may be thinking, "you're taking cheese away from welfare recipients and selling it at a premium?" No. Y'all, there's SOOOO MUCH CHEESE the government buys up to keep dairy prices stable. Like... more than any welfare program could ever need. Anyway, if you think you're bettah'n "government cheese," just shut up and call it American cheese and keep shoveling it in like we always have. It's your patriotic duty. The

second curiosity is the Wahl sauce. Every burger place has their secret sauce, usually ketchup and mayo or Thousand Island. Wahl sauce is much in the same vein, except with a little Sriracha kick to it. Just a little kick. Even we Dubuquers can handle it. I think that little kick in their Wahl sauce is why the burgers don't come with mustard. Sriracha and mustard tend to fight, and Sriracha tends to win that fight. In fact, you won't find mustard on the tables alongside the ketchup at Wahlburgers. Oh, you can request it, of course. They're not monsters. It's just not the standard operating procedure for Wahlburgers. Kind of like how a lot of hot dog joints are reluctant to provide ketchup or some BBQ joints make you ask for sauce. Misplaced or not, it's about pride.

I kept it kind of basic on my burger with an Our Burger, which is Chef Paul Wahlberg's choice. The order was my own little, "come at me, Chef." Quarter-pound patty, lettuce, tomato, onion, government cheese, Paul's signature Wahl sauce, and pickles. A burger with no bells and whistles. Keep your bacon and your onion rings and barbecue sauce (for now... I'm sure I'll want them later). Just show me what a burger looks like at Wahlburgers. I am not disappointed. The patty was juicy but done. I usually tell lettuce to go screw when it comes to burgers, but the crisp freshness was welcome here. This... is a damn burger.

Jenn's Chicken Sandwich. There is a hot debate I've commented on before as to whose chicky sammy reigns supreme. One of the entrants I refuse to eat at, and that's just fine because I'm not missing anything. Jenn's Chicken Sandwich at Wahlburgers is a little small, but don't go thinking that just because they specialize in burgers that their chicky sammy is just a dried-up piece of chicken breast. I know some of you have trouble with the following words, but "moist" and "juicy" are apt here. Our own Kristina ordered this, and she reports, "I wouldn't be sad to get this again."

Mom's Sloppy Joe. Holy crap, this thing is a challenge. If you think you're getting some Manwich lunch-lady-scooped onto a pathetic little bun, you're in for a rude awakening. I mean... this thing really is almost rude. You're getting a helluva lot of saucy meat, open-faced on some kind of a grilled hoagie roll. And when I say saucy, I'm not just talking about the sloppy joe seasoning. It's drenched in Wahl sauce and their signature cheese sauce. It answers the question nobody asked but should have: What if sloppy joes were more like cheesesteaks? The answer is impressive and intimidating. Get a fork and knife ready, you're NOT picking this one up.

For those of you interested, Wahlburgers does offer an Impossible Burger option. In fact, that's Mark's choice. It tasted so animal-based that we were a little afraid we got the wrong thing. We didn't, though. Their Impossible Burger shrugs off the "government cheese" for smoked cheddar, and I think that smokiness helps it come across as real meat. Smart. It's also topped with lettuce, caramelized onions, chili-spiced tomato, and (of course) Wahl sauce. Gluten-free buns and bread are also available but were not sampled.

They got a good array of apps, too. Tater tots have kind of become a thing lately, so we gave the cheese and bacon tots a whirl. There was some good crisp to the tots that kind of got lost under the cheese, but that happens with cheese sauce. You expect it with nachos, so it only makes sense that it happens with tater tots, too. They were good, but the real crowd pleaser was the onion rings. Thin and crisp and ready to eat on their own or on a burger. I love onion rings like these.

As for the bathrooms, well... it's located in the Locust St. Hy-Vee. I'm one of those people who inevitably has to go to the bathroom if I go to the store or library or bookstore by myself, and the Locust St. Hy-Vee bathroom is almost always in good condition.

All in all, Wahlburgers does a good job of representing one of our greatest actors and Dorchester's 2nd favorite son, Donnie Wahlberg. Welcome to Iowa, boys.

Are you burned out on Zoom? The exhaustion you feel after a virtual presentation is real. Despite not having to go anywhere, virtual often demands more energy than meeting in person. It is hard to pay attention while you might be managing children, pets, or other distractions in the background.

Think of a virtual presentation when a message really stuck in your head. I bet the virtual involved participation. In-person or on a screen, participation is a key element in the communication process. It is so easy to underestimate the value of participation, especially virtually. Participation actively engages the learner and improves retention of the message. Do everyone a favor and make sure you incorporate participation into your Zooms.

Think about turning your presentations into Broadway shows with theatrical techniques, props, and even costumes. Participation makes the experience much more memorable.

You can also increase participation by limiting the use of PowerPoint. PowerPoint is a great support tool, and unfortunately the most abused. Reading text from a slide does nothing to involve your audience. In fact, it decreases participation. A successful virtual presentation is a result of careful planning, preparation, and practice. Effective communicators use a blend of content and audience participation/interaction to create a program that involves and informs. Audiences want to be engaged in a memorable experiences and meaningful participation is a key element.

Fall is Upon Us

Here's a Few Things to Think About This Season

Fall is for *Planting*

Fall is just around the corner, and while some may be panicking, I'll say what I've said time and time again: Fall is for planting. There are so many factors on your side. The ground temperatures are warm and the air temps are cool—meaning minimal stress for you or plants.

Here are a few things you can get excited about doing this fall.

- Plant ornamental grasses and evergreens to give them enough time to establish themselves before the snow flies. A good root fertilizer like Root and Grow will also help them get some really strong roots this season.
- Divide spring blooming perennials now for beautiful color next spring.
- Fertilize your lawn now. Fertilizer in the fall yields good results come next spring. Fall is a great time to start thinking ahead.

- If you have a snowblower, make sure your equipment is in ready to go. Consider getting it inspected, do a tune up, or schedule one at a place you trust.
 Don't wait until the first blizzard to service your equipment: a ton of other people will have the same idea, and it can be difficult to find an appointment. Scheduling now in fall will ensure you're ready for the first seasonally early snowstorm of the year.
- Start planning ahead for storing your lawn mower and seasonal power equipment for the season too. Clean away any brush or debris, consider

removing your lawn mower battery if it has one (negative "-" first -), and add a fuel stabilizer or safely empty the tank when it's time to store it away.

- Schedule a furnace inspection. Things get cold in lowa unexpectedly and fast. Don't get caught at the beginning of the season with furnace issues. Get ahead of the winter rush and schedule an inspection today. Furnaces should be inspected at least once a year, but preferably in the fall and spring. Regularly inspecting and maintaining your furnace will extend the life of your system and help protect your family from dangerous leaks or unexpected down time.
- Speaking of leaks... make sure to test your CO and smoke alarms. CO alarms should be placed on each level of your home and near sleeping areas. If you're unsure of where to place them, First Alert has a ton of resources for homeowners online.




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Bring on the Veggies

Shrimp Scampi & Broccoli Linguine

MAKES 2 SERVINGS

Ingredients

- 8 oz. large uncooked shrimp, cleaned and tails removed
- 4 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- ¼ tsp salt
- 2 tbsp lemon juice
- ½ cup Smart Chicken Bone Broth
- 8 oz. linguine pasta, cooked according to the
- package directions, reserving ½ cup pasta water

Where Is A Dick When You Need One?

In the last issue, we looked into the genre of combat literature. In this issue, we turn our attention to detective fiction aka private detective fiction aka private dick stories. (OK I can hear you. STOP snickering.)

Most all, interested parties give the honor of the first detective story to "Murders in the Rue Morgue" published in 1841 by Edgar Allen Poe.

In 1865, a protégé of Charles Dickens, Wilkie Collins, published what is generally considered to be this first full-length detective novel: *The Moonstone*. Twenty-two years later, there was a literary earthquake in the genre when *A Study in Scarlet* was published featuring the world's most famous consulting detective, then or now, Sherlock Holmes.

I would be greatly in remise if I failed to mention one of the most inventive, creative, clever, and successful

detective fiction writers of all time and who created not one but two iconic detectives: Hercule Poirot and Miss Marple. Of course, it's Agatha Christie.

With the exception of Edgar Allen Poe, who was an American, all these writers are British. I have read that Arthur Conan-Doyle, who was born in Scotland—Edinburgh to be precise—never accepted the honor of being British. Scotland forever!

Now for the Americans: Their contribution to the genre can be distilled down to two writers who started their careers after WWI. The gentlemen in question are Dashiell Hammett and Raymond Chandler. After these two, every American detective, even the women, all share traits and an élan that is as plain as the slugs in your .45.

It would be extremely difficult to overstate Dashiell Hammett's looming presence on novelists in the 20th century. Feast your eyes on this: Sam Spade in *The Maltese Falcon*, Nick and Nora Charles in *The Thin Man*, and the Continental Op in *Red Harvest* and *The Dain Curse*. He was a prolific and successful screenwriter. He is considered by many to be the best writer of detective fiction of all time and a favorite of mine. Let's say you aren't a fan of detective fiction. Can I presume to make a suggestion? Read *The Maltese Falcon* and *The Thin Man*. They are not very long. They ARE wildly entertaining. I once tried to count the cocktails Nick and Nora Charles consume in the novel. I don't know how they could still stand up by the end of

the book. This is humorously evident in the movie.

Raymond Chandler was every bit of Dashiell Hammett's equal both in print and on the screen. His novels include a trifecta: *The Big Sleep, Farewell My Lovely,* and *The Long Goodbye*. His Filmography is astound-



ing. It includes the screenplay for *Double Indemnity*; *The Big Sleep*; *Murder, My Sweet*; and *The Long Goodbye*.

A common opinion of Chandler's novels puts The Big Sleep at the top. The story is very intricate. Everybody double-crosses everyone else, and there are a load of secrets, nice juicy ones, that all come out in the end.
