

As Toys For Tots season hits fourth gear, and the toy loads start going out, I'm also iust wrapping up my annual live Facebook Silent Auction to raise funds for my favorite charity. I think this is my fifth year of doing this, and it seems to get a bit crazier each year. People really look forward to it, and the generosity flows for one big week. If you missed it. I'm sorry. If you made it big, thank you. If you had the winning bid for like 10 things, thank you even more and I love you forever!

I have to be honest: In the midst of moving into a new house, making 365inks and getting the "giving" part of the toy season going, I went from being way ahead of the game a month ago to semipanic mode two weeks ago. Usually by Nov. 1, I have most of my auction items pulled together and ready to rock. This year, I didn't even start seriously calling around for donations until that date. But people gave, and gave big, like they always do. Consider that for all of the dollars in kindness from the bidders is an equal amount matched by the donors who gave those items people bid upon. From a \$1,200 diamond necklace from Jerry's Pawn on Central Ave., to a \$1,300 very rare bottle of Pappy Van Winkle 12-yearold bourbon from Family Beer and Liquor Store in East Dubuque, to a big stack of \$10 gift cards from Burger King and free movies at Phoenix Theatres, it all adds up big time for the Marine Corps Toys For Tots program. In seven short days online, this auction raised us over \$20,000 again this year, for the third straight year. And, in doing so, also solved the Christmas present problems for dozens of Dubuquers. Over 150 bid packages made a lot of Christmas wishes come true.

And now I'm going to bed for at least a full day. Man, while this auction is a Godsend, it is also an absolute pile of work for the week leading up to its start. It's a good thing that I am the hack-and-slash Photoshop master and wordsmith extraordinaire to whip up 150 sexy promotional images and about 10,000 words worth of descriptive package text in a single weekend. Yeah, I'm patting myself on the back. It was a slog. But I always know it will be worth it.

Just like standing in the cold for hours outside Theisen's one Saturday every winter is worth it for the kids of the Tri-States. Especially when you stop by there and drop a toy or cash off to me. Hint! Hint! Nudge! Nudge! Yes, I'll be there again this year, on Saturday, Dec. 4, along with Radio Dubuque (that's Rob Anglin) and the



gentlemen of the Dubuque Marine Corps League. Theisen's is such a great host and makes it an enjoyable day. And I can tell you already that the anonymous donor who gave us a very surprising \$10,000 in the final hour of Stuff the Truck because he heard it on the radio last year has reached out in advance this year and done it again. WOW! A Santa-sized salute and OOH-RAH to that kind Dubuquer, as well as the team behind Stuff the Truck for creating the kind of promotion and visibility that makes our efforts visible to great supporters like this. Every single donation helps. But \$10,000 is pretty incredible.

As much experience as I have now in my 15-ish years of running the program, you still never quite know how it will run you in circles from day to day. You might be picking up bags full of stuffed animals from a pet store one day, and loading 2,000 pounds of pet rock kits into a truck in Platteville, WI, the next. So you roll with the opportunities and take what you can get when you get it. After a couple hour warm-up session following Stuff the Truck, we head down to the Dubuque Fighting Saints Teddy Bear Toss night at the Mystique Community Ice Center. Make Dec. 4 the night you go see great home-ice hockey action and bring along a stuffed animal to throw onto the ice after the Saints score their first goal and contribute to the hundreds of plush toys that come in for use in just a couple minutes every year.

And as I say Happy Thanksgiving, I ask that you pivot to the next big holiday and look for those Toys For Tots donation bins all across the community or just go online to dubuque-ia.toysfortots.org and make a tax-deductible cash donation. Every penny stays local, and last year Dubuque spent every penny on toys. All overhead costs of our campaign were donated. Now that's the Christmas spirit!

His most successful single to date was 2004's "Sunshine" featuring Lea, which climbed all the way to No. 2 on the pop singles chart. Among the most prolific artists in rap history, Lil Flip has also contributed verses to songs by the likes of DMX, Pitbull, Beyonce, and Nelly.

Chicagoans Do or Die are also longtime veterans of that city's hip hop landscape. Their first mainstream success came in 1996, when their debut single "Po Pimp" reached No. 22 on the *Billboard* Hot 100 while topping the publication's Rap chart.

Devour Cafe

We've been meaning to try Devour Cafe for some time, but like many Dubuquers, we pass by the unique spot located right at the curve on Central Avenue in the main level of what was once the Rafoth Sheet Metal building at 1798 Central. After taking in a few samples of the eats and, of course, the coffee, I'm sorry I didn't get here sooner.

Though he took over the space in 2018, demolition, renovations, and costs with renovations meant it was not until January of 2020 before owner Ryan Dies officially opened with regular hours and a strong philosophy driving a killer coffee menu and a unique and delicious dining attitude. Moving from his original Galena location of the same name, Devour is open for breakfast and lunch hours, but obviously welcomes people to just come in for coffee. After all, coffee is Ryan's life, or at least it's always been a thread in the story of his life.

"I've been into coffee since I was a kid," Ryan begins. "It is a part of my world. It's what shaped me as an artist and a craftsman and everything I've got going on. Coffee has been right there next to me, and I have a passion for it." He's not shy in backing up his

skills in the coffee world.

"I have a lot of experience and skill in preparing coffee," he continues, and you can be sure he roasts his own. "There are far more drinks on my menu that come from all over the world than most places have ever seen. I've done international seminars on coffee, the history, the industry. It's the second-largest-traded commodity in the world next to oil [it's true; 2.2 billion cups a day... we looked it up!]. It's pretty vital and important

to the world. I'm a tiny part of that. No drive-thru or anything like that. Just a boutique cafe where crafting great food and coffee takes skill and care."

I, on the other hand, am a bit of a coffee simpleton. I like an iced caramel latte, and I don't apologize for it. And mine was great. Nutty and flavorful and just what I was looking for. The cappuccino looked like it was smooth as silk. Much of the coffee menu was way out of my league. I don't know a Redeye from a Blackeye and the Guzzo, a cold brew with espresso, is new to me. I don't know what a Mayan, Breve, Palazzo, Affogatto or Cortato is, but if you do, then I'll bet you're pretty excited to read this right now. I'll try to get a photo of the brewed menu in with the story. Kelli Kerrigan, who met us there, had a richly red/pink/ purple hibiscus tea that looked luxurious, and she thought it had a stellar deep flavor. Kristina also really liked her Chai.

It's not just the flavor of a fantastic cup of coffee that drives Ryan Dies, but the entire path that coffee takes from the soil to the cup.

"I care a lot about the agricultural coffee industry," he says. "The farmers that supply me. I respect the way they sustainably farm with cyclic farming, utilizing every inch of the land where this coffee grows. I source only grade-one coffee. It has a lot of labor costs and care that are involved with that. That's the way it should be. My philosophy should not just be practiced here at Devour, but all along the chain that my products take to get here. The highest quality in artistry and humanity, with great practices involved at every level."

He even carried that philosophy to the handling of waste and doing the dishes. "I don't use phosphates in my dish cleaning," he says. "I hand wash everything and put them through a hightemperature sanitizer. That's the only way I can prevent putting phosphates in the river and polluting the world."

Like the coffee, care and creativity carry through to his food. Though

the menu is small, the point is that he wants you to take the reins and tell him what you want him to make.

"The customers are the executive chef and I prepare it for them," Ryan explains. "We have a lot of ingredients. What do you like? I can make a sandwich, an omelette, a skillet and quiche, burrito or a soufflé. It's a little bit complicated. It puts some of the onus on the customer to figure it out and know what they want. I'll take the things you like and make something satisfying and creative that you will not find everywhere. There's a lot of junk out there like MSG and pesticides. Everything's natural here.

"You'll see that the ingredients in my food usually say organic on all labels, from the natural thick-cut bacon, to the greens. I do my own shopping for all of my food. I have extensive background as a chef working in a number of restaurants in the area. The space is limited here. The creativity is not."

So let's talk about our lunch. There were just a couple of specials listed on the menu when we visited, but he quickly dispelled us of those limitations and asked what we wanted. In the end we shared a few wonderful gems.

Ryan whipped us up a warm croissant with melted cheese, bacon, tomato, and hot curried chicken that was savory and delicious. On top of that, we shared one of his signature specialties, a sweet potato-crusted quiche with zucchini, mushroom, onion, cheese and finished with sour cream and fresh avocado. It didn't have any meat, but it was savory and dense and felt like the kind of bellyfilling dish that you'd expect to have meat.

I loved it, and finding that it was also naturally gluten free, I can't wait to take one to my wife one day when she's starving at work and needs me to save her. She's going to be thrilled when I introduce her to this warm delight. I think it'll prove to be even more welcome on a cold winter day.

While there, we also saw a super fresh- and tasty-looking curried chicken lettuce salad with tomatoes, red onion, and fresh avocado glide by, as well as a burrito that I think I'll have to come back for. Ryan says his skillets are pretty damn good too. Try a Customlette! Just tell him which of his natural and organic ingredients you want in there, and sit back with your coffee as he makes it happen in the tiniest little kitchen space imaginable.


He might love coffee like life itself, but he's no slouch with the omelette pan either. "I opened a great coffee shop that

Crazy for Cranberries

Cranberries are versatile and nutritious. Their tart flavor packs a punch. Try cranberries in a sauce for meat, make them into a dressing for salads, or drizzle them on a decadent dessert. Bake cranberries into goodies like scones, muffins, cakes, and breads. Pulse cranberries in a blender and use in a relish or salsa, use as a garnish on a cocktail, or chop and add to your morning oatmeal.

When shopping for cranberries, look for fresh cranberries that are plump and firm with a deep red color. Avoid shriveled berries or any that have brown spots. Store cranberries in a tightly sealed plastic bag in the fridge for up to two months, or wash, dry, and spread berries on a baking sheet to freeze.

Cranberries are a nutritional powerhouse. They are a good source of vitamin C and anthocyanins, antioxidants that may protect against certain cancers. Research has shown that cranberries help prevent urinary tract infections. Additionally, cranberries do not contain fat, cholesterol, or sodium, making them a tasty part of a heart-healthy diet.

Cranberry-Citrus Salad with Candied Walnuts

MAKES 6 SERVINGS

Ingredients

- 1 cup walnuts
- 2 tbsp light corn syrup
 1 tbsp plus ¼ cup
- sugar, divided • ½ tsp salt
- 3 cups fresh or frozen cranberries
- ¼ cup cranberry juice
- ¼ cup balsamic vinegar

Directions


- 1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Lightly grease a baking sheet; set aside.
- 2. For candied walnuts, in a medium bowl, combine walnuts, corn syrup, 1 tablespoon sugar, and salt. Spread on prepared baking sheet.
- 3. Bake for 15 minutes or until nuts are deep golden and sugar mixture is bubbly, stirring occasionally to break up clumps. Cool completely on baking sheet.
- In a saucepan, combine cranberries, ¼ cup sugar, and cranberry juice. Cook and stir over medium heat for 30 minutes or until cranberries pop and mixture becomes very thick. Set aside to cool.
- For dressing, in a blender or food processor combine balsamic vinegar, honey, garlic, orange juice, and oil. Add ¼ cup of the cooked cranberry mixture. Blend until smooth.
- 6. Line a serving platter with romaine. Add oranges, green onions, goat cheese, cooled cranberries, and walnuts. Serve with prepared dressing.

I just happen to have such a book, three in fact, because Dave Lemel has written a three-book series. He valiantly tried to hide the connection with cowboy stories of the Old West. I am here to report he comically failed. The name of the trilogy is *Star Marshals*, and it is uncommonly good.

The subtitles are #1 *Moons Of Jupiter,* #2 *Through The Bopecan Port,* and #3 *Retribution.*

With the invention of the radio in the 1890s and television in the 1920s, as many scientists point out, Earth became a very noisy place, sending out radio waves and television waves in every direction from our planet all at the speed of light which is about 182,000 miles per second, just in case you forgot. The first sentient beings to listen long enough to figure out what we were saying, aside from the ridiculous way we looked, was a benevolent race with the cutest name: Bopecans. They told us not all the species in the rest of the galaxy were friendly. Jordan and Cain have a few adventures before they meet the bad guys, and these guys are dreadful, horrific, appalling, and ghastly. They are planning a test run of a machine they have that's a planet destroyer. They are going to run it on at least one moon of Jupiter and then on to Earth. At risk is the survival of all the humanoids, all plant life, and all animal life in the sea and on land.


I love backyards. When I drive down a residential street, I can't help trying to peek at the landscapes hidden from view. What's in your backyard? I want to know!

Visiting my best friend at her first post-wedding home, she pointed out how backyards differed from front yards in her neighborhood. "If we see the neighbors when we're standing in our front yards, we say 'Hi,' or walk over to have a conversation. But if we're all in our backyards, we don't." There was an unwritten rule, she explained, that everyone pretended they couldn't see each other back there, even if there was no fence or wall. I laughed, but it made sense. It seemed very civilized.

The big backyard where I grew up was edged with split rail fences constructed by my dad. The kids on the block drifted easily from one yard to another, across the alley and back. We played red rover and wiffle ball there, slung quilts over clotheslines for tents, lay out in the sun while the sprinkler percolated. Parents waved to the other parents. There was no pretending the neighbors were invisible.

At my old house on Wood Street, the backyards, even ours, teemed with children. There was no alley, so they traveled through our backyard to join their friends. No one bothered to teach them to use the front sidewalk to get from house to house. We were the empty nesters, and watching these kids traipse over our patio and through our lawn chairs brought out the Gladys Kravitz in me. For those of you born after the millennium, she was the nosy, crabby next-door neighbor in Bewitched, the one who complained about the kids and almost figured out that Samantha was a witch. Or maybe I was channeling Seinfeld's Kramer, sitting by his new screen door yelling, "You damned kids get outta my yard!" even though he was sitting in the hall of an apartment.

Our new house came with a slice of the arboretum, edged with thickly planted shrubs and trees on either side and woods, actual woods, to the rear. It has paths and steps and rock walls and is absolutely private. We do let children in there, as long as they are descended from one of our

children. We just had the little shed near the house reroofed, painted, electrified, and furnished with an indoor-outdoor Persian rug and leaf-patterned curtains just so they can play in it. They live far away, but it doesn't matter. I put a simple desk and chair in there so that, when the weather is warmer, I can sit there and write. Don't call it a "She Shed." That icky-cutesy term makes me wince. It's a Serious Shed!

When friends from Australia visited our house on Wood Street, they were appalled when they went out back to keep Bob company as he grilled our dinner. "It's so wide open!" they gasped. In their country—and the UK—backyards are even more private than ours, lined with high walls of brick or stone. The walls of our yard are green and dense, though they need more upkeep (boy, do they) than stone. No one can see our yard, not from the street. Our house looks like any other mundane split-level in suburbia. The backyard is our Secret Garden.

I'm just so curious about the other yards I pass. In my neck of the woods, the yards behind some houses plunge like gorges, while others are edged in limestone cliffs. How do the children play there? Do their parents put up fences to keep them from the gorge, from the woods? Do teenagers dare each other to climb the limestone walls? I've heard of secret caves in backyards not far from Finley Hospital, and I wonder how many kids have gone spelunking there, unbeknownst to their parents. The house I bought when I came to Dubuque with my young daughter and son turned out to be perilously close to underground caverns where beer had been stored for the tavern on the corner where Magoo's Pizza now stands (and Nanny Goats before that). I'm relieved my son had no idea how easy it would have been to explore those vaults. The next-door neighbor told me how he and his friends knew just which manhole cover in the alley to lift. OMG.

John Cheever wrote a famous story titled The Swimmer. Published in 1964, it's the story of Ned Merrill, who decides, in the midst of a pool party where everyone is a little bit bored and a little bit tipsy, to "swim across the county" through his upper-class neighbors' backyard pools, drinking from his wine bottle along the way. Clad in just his swim trunks, he strides through the grass and dives into one pool after another, greeting his friends, sharing the day's gossip, and moving happily on. It seems like a lovely idea, a magical thing to do on a hot, bright summer day when, after all, he knows everyone he encounters. Gradually, though, the day darkens and he feels less welcome. He hears people muttering about how he lost his job, he owes them money, his children are not doing well. When at last he comes to his house, he finds it dark and no longer his.

That's a dark story. I don't want to swim in your pool. Dubuque's backyards are bright and promising. I'm just curious about your little corner of nature. I hope it's more about play than mowing—a place to play catch with the kids, and to catch your own breath.


