



The Duke Ellington Orchestra

The Duke Ellington Orchestra will perform with a 15-piece band on Friday, Feb. 11 at 7:30 p.m. at University of Dubuque Heritage Center.

The Duke Ellington Orchestra has been performing worldwide for the past 88 years under the guidance of three generations of the Ellington family.

Born in 1899, Edward Kennedy "Duke" Ellington is still regarded as one of the most prolific American composers of the 20th century. His career spanned more than 50 years and included leading his orchestra, composing an inexhaustible songbook, scoring for movies, composing stage musicals, and performing on world tours. Ellington called his music "American music" rather than jazz, and he liked to describe those who impressed him as "beyond category." Ellington remains one of the most influential figures in jazz, if not in all American music, and he is widely considered as one of the 20th century's best-known African American personalities.

As both a composer and bandleader, Ellington influenced millions of people. He gave American music its own sound for the first time. In his 50-year career,



Ellington played over 20,000 performances in Europe, Latin America, the Middle East, and Asia. He led his band from 1923 until his death in 1974 at the age of 75.

At this point, his son Mercer Ellington took leadership of the band. Mercer was an accomplished trumpet player and composer who wrote many songs for his father's orchestra including the standard "Things Ain't What They Used to Be." In the early 1980s he became the first conductor for a Broadway musical of his father's music, *Sophisticated Ladies*. Under his direction, he toured and recorded the orchestra for the next 22 years until his own death in 1996.

The baton was then passed to Mercer's youngest son, Paul Mercer Ellington, who had been

leading the orchestra and fearlessly preserving the music and legacy of Duke Ellington. For the past three years while Paul is at New York University studying for his master's degree in film production, Charlie Young, the talented sax player and arranger and professor at Howard University, has been acting as the conductor touring the world with the famous Duke Ellington Orchestra.

EVOLUTION WEEKEND AND THE SCHEMMEL ENDOWED LECTURE IN THEOLOGY

Dr. Ilia Delio Lecture

THE POSTHUMAN IN THE SECOND AXIAL PERIOD AND THE REBIRTH OF RELIGION THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 24 @ 7 PM VIRTUAL

On Thursday, Feb. 24, Clarke University combines two of its most esteemed academic events, Evolution Weekend and the Schemmel Endowed Lecture in Theology, to explore the relationship between science and religion. The free online lecture begins at 7 p.m. and features acclaimed speaker Dr. Ilia Delio, OSF, discussing the need for a rebirth of religion in an age of artificial intelligence.

Delio is the Josephine C. Connelly Endowed Chair in Christian Theology at Villanova University. She holds doctorates in both pharmacology and historical theology and has authored over 20 books, including the awardwinning *The Unbearable Wholeness of Being* and *Re-Enchanting the Earth*.

Her lecture, *The Posthuman in the Second Axial Period and the Rebirth of Religion*, focuses on the shift in consciousness brought about by the impact of technology and mass communication, and the irony of resistance to accepting evolution despite this ongoing human development. The timely topic is meant to drive discussions within the classroom at Clarke and throughout the greater Dubuque community.

"As a Catholic institution, Clarke University values opportunities to promote dialogue," said Bill Gregory,



Associate Professor of Religious Studies at Clarke. "Through genuine dialogue we explore how faith and reason complement each other. We host conversations, including lectures like this one, within our own Catholic intellectual tradition, with other faith traditions, and with science, culture, and politics."

Evolution Weekend is an international movement that seeks to demonstrate that religion and science can be compatible and elevate the quality of discussion around these issues. It is an opportunity for serious reflection on the relationship between religion and science and aligns well with the intent of the Frederic and Emma Schemmel Endowed Lecture in Theology. Forty classic photographs by Thomas D. Mangelsen, which the renowned photographer himself refers to as his legacy photographs, have been personally selected for a retrospective traveling museum exhibition titled Thomas D. Mangelsen—A Life in The Wild. It is scheduled for display at the National Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium from Feb. 5, 2022, through Feb. 1, 2023.

Photographs included in the retrospective include "Polar Dance" from 1989, which features two polar bears appearing to dance; "Mountain Outlaw" from 2014 portraying a grizzly bear charging head on through the snow; and from 1988, "Catch of the Day," which captures the exact moment that a spawning salmon, trying to leap over a waterfall along Alaska's Brooks River, soars right into the waiting jaws of a massive brown bear.

One of the most prolific nature photographers of our time, Thomas Mangelsen has been described as a spiritual descendant of pioneering American nature photographers Ansel Adams, Eliot Porter, and Edward Weston. Bill Allen, the now

retired Editor-in-Chief of National Geographic, considers Mangelsen to be one of the most important nature photographers of his generation. In addition, he is as much a conservationist as he is an artist.

Mangelsen was named the 2011 Conservation Photographer of the Year by Nature's Best Photography, placing his work in the permanent collection at the Smithsonian's National Museum of Natural History in Washington, D.C. He was named one of the 40 Most Influential Nature Photographers by Outdoor Photography, and one of the 100 Most Important People in Photography by American Photo magazine. The North American Nature Photography Association has named him Outstanding Nature Photographer of the Year; while the British Broadcasting Corporation gave him its prestigious award, Wildlife Photographer of the Year.





REO Speedwagon

Legendary Midwest rockers REO Speedwagon make their fifth appearance at the Five Flags Center on Wednesday, Feb. 23 at 7:30 p.m.

Formed in 1967, signed in 1971, and fronted by iconic vocalist Kevin Cronin since 1972, REO Speedwagon is a band where the main constant over the decades is a never-ending desire to give their all to their fans, year in and year out. Formed loosely in the late '60s at college in Champaign, IL, REO (named after the precursor to the light truck) rode to gigs in station wagons, hopping from small gigs to even tinier gigs, just to get their name out. It worked, as fans quickly realized there was much more going on here than your average college party band.

By the early '70s, the band's unrelenting drive, as well as non-stop touring and recording, jump-started the burgeoning rock movement in the Midwest. It carved a path that was eventually followed by Styx, Kansas, Cheap Trick, and more.

Platinum albums and freeform FM radio staples such as "Ridin' The Storm Out" followed, setting the stage for 1980s explosive Hi Infidelity (which received the Recording Industry Association of America's 10X Diamond Award for surpassing sales of 10 million units in the US). REO rode the top of the charts with a RIAA-certified 22 million albums sold in the U.S. and 40 million around the globe, with a string of gold and platinum records and international hit singles.




The band's younger fans might not realize the sheer impact REO has had on music and the culture of rock 'n' roll. Hi Infidelity's millions in sales were fueled by massive hit singles such as "Keep On Loving You" and "Take It On the Run." All these years later, the nearly 10-times platinum album still remains a high-water mark for rock bands.

At the center of REO's desire to keep it rocking for the fans is Kevin Cronin. who looks like he's found the fountain of youth-along with the secret to penning some of the biggest hits in rock. With bandmates Bruce Hall on bass, keyboardist Neal Doughty, Dave Amato on lead guitar, and drummer Bryan Hitt, REO has remained busy since the band celebrated its 40th anniversary in 2007. After an 11-year break from recording, REO Speedwagon released Find Your Own Way Home in 2007, marking the band's 15th studio effort.

The members of REO Speedwagon have also been voted the top musicians in Illinois history by participants in the "Illinois Top 200" project, a part of the state's bicentennial celebration. The band played the bicentennial party in December 2018.

Nathaniel Morgan Memorial Auction and Fundraiser

Saturday, February 19 @ 1-3 PM University of Dubuque Judge James L. Martin Multicultural Student Center (2000 University Ave)

The Nathaniel Morgan Committee (NMMC) hosts an auction of art and more on Saturday, Feb. 19 from 1 to 3 p.m. in the Judge James L. Martin Multicultural Student Center at the University of Dubuque. The committee is raising money for a memorial dedicated to Nathaniel Morgan, the victim of an 1840 lynching in Dubuque.

Auctioned items include beautiful, dynamic, and challenging artwork and books that educate toward equity and justice. A highlight will be the auctioning of a 30" x 30", brilliantly hued, mixed-media work titled *Hidden Emotions: Anxiety* by UD alum Norlis Spencer. Donated by the recent graduate, this powerful work graces the NMMC's website and Facebook page and currently is on view at the University of Dubuque.

Donated by the Des Moines Art Center, one-of-a-kind works on paper by notable Midwest artists include a watercolor by Karl Mattern (1892–1969), who studied at the Chicago Art Institute under George Bellows; Vivian Torrence (born 1945), whose work is in the collections of the Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden in Washington, D.C.; and Paul R. Smith (1912–2003), whose work is in the collection of the Minneapolis Institute of Art. The museum also donated three antiphonal prints.

Other works to be featured in the auction include original work by Assistant Professor of Digital Art and Design Jean Holdener; work by Lenore/Phillip Metrick-Chen; African sculptures; cups and plates by St. John's University potter Richard Bresnahan; books donated by community leaders; and an annual family membership to the National Mississippi River Museum and Aquarium, which generously serves as the NMMC's fiscal agent.

The NMMC aims to raise at least \$5,000 in order to bring artist Jordan Weber to Dubuque, where he will meet with local residents, see the memorial site, and then draft artist renderings.

Weber brings exceptional creative vision, experience with connecting and engaging diverse groups of people, and

a passion for social justice. He recently served as an artist-in-residence at the Walker Art Center and currently is a Loeb/ArtLab fellow at Harvard University. He will discuss his work and vision for the memorial during the auction via Zoom.

Dubuque was Iowa's earliest non-Indigenous community, and its first residents included Nathaniel and Charlotte Morgan, an African American couple. The Morgans secured good work, purchased a home, and attended the first church in Iowa to erect a church structure, a building funded by donations from both Black and White residents. On Sept. 6, 1840, a group of White men accused Nathaniel of theft and proceeded to whip and kill him in public. The leaders of this lynching were acquitted of all charges. News of Morgan's unaddressed murder spread rapidly and helped thwart Dubuque's early promise of being a peaceful interracial community.

All proceeds will fund essential steps in creating the Nathaniel Morgan Memorial "in a prominent, historically relevant site that promotes reflection and sustained educational activity," according to the committee's mission statement.



Dubuque Bets on Betting on Sports

Currently, there are about 30 states where sports betting is now legal, including 18 that allow online sports wagering, and yes, mobile sports betting is legal in lowa. The

legislature approved legal sports betting in the state, including mobile betting, in 2019. For nearly two years, lowans had to register for a sports betting account in person at a casino. However, that rule has been lifted, and anyone within state lines can sign up, deposit, and bet online as of Dec. 31, 2020. No sports are off-limits (relative to other legal U.S. markets). The only bet type that's not allowed is college player props.

In lowa, each licensed casino is permitted two individually branded sports betting apps/websites, or "skins", or host their own independent sportsbook. Major sportsbook operators cannot operate within the state without one of these partnerships. While Q Casino has opted to

host an independent sportsbook managed in-house, Diamond Jo Casino in Dubuque is partnered mainly with FanDuel, the No. 1 sportsbook in America. So any online wagering through, say, FanDuel, anywhere in the state is all tied to Diamond Jo Casino in Dubuque. The same holds true for any major sportsbook like MGM or Caesars. If they are operating in the state, they have a casino partner somewhere in our borders.

Now, if you're looking for an exposé on the evils of sports betting, you're reading up the wrong tree today. It's legal in lowa, and many people love it. But others don't know enough about it to try it. With the practice exploding in popularity, it seemed like a good time to look into what

it is, how it works, and how you can try it if you like. We will then leave it to you if you think it's for you or not, and well, we're not really going to concern ourselves with whether you think it should be for others to not. That ship has sailed. Sports betting is 100 percent game-on in lowa!

How big is sports betting? Apparently, it depends on who you ask. Grand View Research, Inc. said sports betting accounted for about \$70 billion in 2020 and projected \$140 billion by 2028. While just across the internet at Statistica, they just said the global sports betting industry reached a market size of \$203 billion in 2020. And **LegalSportsBetting.com** conservatively estimates that \$165 billion



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is bet legally in the United States alone and projected \$44 billion in gambling revenue for 2021. That's revenue, not bets placed. So, let's just say it's huge and getting huger. And among sports betting nationally, football is definitely king.

During lockdowns, the online sports betting industry witnessed an increase in participation as users had more time to spare on their phones and desktop computers, making it convenient for them to place bets. In 2021, 23.2 million Americans planned to bet a total of \$4.3 billion on the Super Bowl according to American Gaming Association (AGA) research. Among Super Bowl bettors, a record 7.6 million would bet with online sportsbooks, up 63 percent

year-over-year, generating the largest single-event legal handle in American sports betting history. Look for that to get much bigger with this year's game.

With the Super Bowl approaching, it seemed like a good time to inform those who have not yet dipped their toe into the waters of sports betting how it works, what the options are locally, and why it's still fun to go make your bets in person at our local casinos.


We met with both Diamond Jo and Q Casino personnel to talk sportsbooks and how the new gaming option is attracting a whole new group of gamers to their world.

They all agree on one thing for sure: To bet in person and enjoy the game at the casino adds the "experience" to the bet. Both casinos have made significant investments to build attractive, convenient, and comfy sportsbook venues on the gaming floors. They include walk-up cashiers to take your bets and answer your questions as well as tons of TV screens playing all of the major games going on and comfortable seating to take it all in along with many more fans just like you.

"You get the camaraderie of fans cheering together and that human interaction," says Marty Maiers, Director of Marketing for Diamond Jo Casino. "If you have questions, we have experts that can talk to you about anything. You can make the same bets online, but we're focused on

creating a great experience here in person, especially when there's a big game on and everyone cheering or a big fight and everyone around you has money on the game. There's a great sense of sportsmanship."

"One of our best attributes is our retail side," says Lance Carnahan, Director of Casino Operations at Q Casino. "We have a very wide-open sportsbook with great viewing areas, and our staff is really good about helping everyone out. We get a lot of novice gamblers from lowa, Wisconsin, and Illinois who have some very simple questions but are often afraid to ask, but we aren't afraid to answer them, break it down into simple terms, and give a point of view on decision making.



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A lot of clientele enjoy that and come back because of the ease of betting and access to our staff's expertise."

Lance also notes that Q Casino's Sportsbook being right next door, attached to the Q Sports Bar, is a big plus for customers who can make bets and enjoy dinner at the same time with access to updating or adding bets mid-game just a few feet away.

"Eighty percent of people don't really know sports betting well. That's the ratio I see," suggests Justin Banks, Manager of FanDuel Sportsbook at Diamond Jo Casino. "We see a lot of new faces, and our cashiers and supervisors are very educated and know the process and are happy to teach you everything we know to get you started. From simple bets to win down to player props (one player achieving a goal), there are so many options, we can find something to make you feel comfortable with it."

Marty Maiers suggests that the easy way to get in is through the simple bets first, who's going to win or bet on your favorite teams. "It enhances the viewing to have money on the game, even if they're teams you don't care about as much."

We can attest to the fact that a \$5 bet on a game in which you have "no dog in the race" suddenly makes it so much more exciting to watch. And for \$5 with a chance that you could double that money, you just make a 3-hour football game into a good time. You might consider that equal to the value of a movie ticket.

As you read above, sports betting is all big money. But how does that translate to profit locally?

"We're a regulated industry, and all revenue figures are online," shares Marty Maiers. "You can see how many people are betting and how much they are betting online versus retail bets inside the casino, and it's remarkable how much this has skyrocketed."

If a sportsbook takes in tens of millions in total wagers in a month, that sounds staggering, as though they are rolling in the revenue. But remember that is the amount bet without counting paying the winners, revenue split, and expenses. The actual revenue for the local casino on that mega-million dollar handle (the total amount wagered) is likely closer to the tens of thousands. Yes, a nice little profit, but nothing compared to their regular casino revenue. In December at Diamond Jo Casino, for example, the very successful Sportsbook business still only amounted to around 5 percent of their revenue for the month. So when the newspaper publishes those giant handle numbers, be aware of what they really mean. It's a function of volume, not of profit.

"It's a nice piece, but it's far less than our other gaming revenues. Sports betting is a big added value to our customers, and it's driven people down here. It's the big buzz item right now, and it creates a lot of excitement."

The two models of sportsbook in Dubuque represent the opposite ends of

how sports gaming can operate in lowa. While Diamond Jo partners with the biggest sportsbook in America, FanDuel, Q Casino operates a fully independent sportsbook that they manage in-house.

For Diamond Jo Casino, this means that they benefit from the massive expenditure of advertising spent by FanDuel as well as the experience of that well-oiled machine.

"The advantage with FanDuel as a partner is that they are the experts at this, notes Maiers. "Our ads spend for sportsbook is minuscule because FanDuel does so much marketing for us. I mean, they're sponsoring halftime shows! And we benefit from all of that. I see the numbers here in lowa and what FanDuel spends in marketing, and they've got to be playing the long game. I don't know how they make any money, but it's great for us."

Up the river a bit, Q Casino takes a different approach.

"Our sportsbook is 100 percent Q's Sportsbook," says Lance Carnahan. "We run it and manage it and take on 100 percent of the risk. We have technology partners to help us follow the lines, but we're one of two in the state that does it that way. We really try to promote the Dubuque market only. We keep it in our Tri-State, Dubuque, and Southwest Wisconsin focus. We just try to be more guarded on what we do and make sure we make good business decisions."

With 100 percent of the risk comes 100 percent of the reward. So while

the piece of the pie overall is much smaller, it's all their pie. But it's also their overhead and marketing. So there is risk and reward for both strategies.

As a big player in the gaming world, Diamond Jo Casino's parent company Boyd Gaming's strategic partnership with Fan-Duel also gives them an ownership stake in the company overall in addition to local spilt in gaming revenues, so any FanDuel bets anywhere benefit the bottom line.

But what does all that mean to you as the one placing the bet? For the average wagerer, purely by numbers, it actually doesn't matter much where you place your bet on most wagers. A \$20 bet on the Rams to beat the spread in the Super Bowl will pay the same amount at either sportsbook if their odds are posted the same. One does not pay more because they work from a bigger pool of money. One big difference, however, is the kinds of bets that can be offered.

"The kiosk software is really the same," explained Maiers. "When you go to the kiosk, our kiosk looks just like a lot of other casinos. The difference is the type of bets. At FanDuel, because of their company size, they can take on some riskier bets."

This is what Q Casino's Carnahan was referencing when he talked about "being more guarded and making good decisions."

"There are a lot of skilled oddsmakers utilized by the sportsbook industry," notes Maiers. "Across the board, odds



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are mostly the same or have very little variation. You may have one book call an NFL game's over/under at 54 points while another has it at 54.5. Savvy bettors try to hedge their own bets against that, but mostly it's an even field. They do react to certain conditions. If there is an injury or there's a lot of money going to one side, they'll change the odds. It's a money-making business, so they want to encourage people to bet both sides."

One short-term but profound benefit to any of the big national sportsbooks is the enticements they can offer to try their app for the first time. Most of them, including FanDuel, offer up to a \$1,000 risk-free bet on your first wager with their sportsbook. That's a risk a standalone sportsbook can't take. After the first bet, that's not an advantage that endures. But it's a pretty attractive perk.

Have you ever considered what happens as sportsbooks leave Las Vegas and come to the Midwest in terms of affecting wager lines? Are a lot of people betting loyalty to local teams going to drive the lines?

"You do see that here and there," says Maiers. "A sportsbook in a Super Bowl winning team's region may get crushed that day because their numbers were skewed to that winning team out of loyalty. Regional bias is interesting. If the sportsbook operates in both team's regions, it balances out."

While Vegas odds do not play favorites as they set the post spreads, when you get to Dubuque and have a glut of

Packer to Bears fans betting heavily one way or the other, those bets might vary widely from the odds set forth by Vegas.

"In the national franchises, not everyone is a Green Bay or a Wisconsin Badger fan," acknowledges Q Casino's Lance Carnahan. "We definitely live and die by the success of those teams. It's great to have a lot of crowds because of them, and as they succeed, a lot of fans are going to bet on them, but it's kind of the nature of the business. I do believe we get more regional risk than properties that can offset the risk with their other sportsbooks across the nation."

Both casinos agree that we are coming into the peak season for sports betting right now.

"Football and March Madness are about tied for us on traffic, but certainly the Super Bowl is the granddaddy of them all," says Carnahan. "You get a lot of futures wagers and propositional wagers going on during the lead-up to the game. And then right into the Big Ten Basketball championship and March Madness which are almost as big."

Diamond Jo's Marty Maiers concurs, "The Super Bowl and March Madness are huge. We heard early on from industry peers how crazy it is, but then when it happens the first time, the number of people that want to come in and watch the games... wow! It's great viewing, being able to watch all of the March Madness games at the same time." FanDuel Sportsbook manager Justin Banks has some advice for the season. "For a lot of people, a lot of it is, 'I just want to watch the game and make the game more interesting.' It even makes a round of golf interesting if you have \$20 on it to win \$100. So if you're good at doing the March Madness brackets, you'll likely be good at this. You can bet as little as \$5, and you're good to go. The game just got that much more exciting because you have \$5 riding on it."

The demographic definitely skews toward men, but there are more women bettors all the time according to Justin Banks.

"In the end, it's a form of entertainment, so it attracts all types of people," adds Maiers.

We asked everyone for some basic advice for the first-time sports bettor.

"I think it's best to get with a good teller who can guide you and help you understand everything and make choices that you feel good about," says Lance Carnahan. "We have the odds sheets, and a lot of people like to sit down and study those and get their master plan mapped out before they make their wagers. Odds makers know what they're doing, so odds are close to a 50/50 split on any game so even a novice can get up there and make a wager and feel good about it. Lines aren't skewed to win one way or another. We're also working on a class to teach novices about getting

into sportsbooks and answer all of the questions most people have about it, and we'll have an information booth at the Mystique Community Ice Center in the future as well to do the same thing."

"Don't be scared. Ask questions," says Justin Banks. "People may sit here and watch the game and see all these numbers and don't know what it means. So we always try to have someone by the kiosks ready to help. You can make bets where you get a real quick outcome, or you can make bets that last a whole season. Like I said, a \$5 bet turns a nothing game into one you care about. Make every game fun. This brings a whole new group of people into the casino who may not have otherwise been here, and it bleeds over to the traditional gaming."

Everyone also notes that they are big promoters of responsible gaming and want to make sure everyone is betting within their means. If you have trouble with that, you can ask them about that as well.

Justin wraps it up pretty well.

"The best time for me is when we have a UFC fight or a good crowd for a game with a buzzer-beater... to see the fan reactions. The pride and excitement at winning. People like to get the actual ticket in their hands, and the retail side of sports betting is where we try to inject the fun into the experience. It's more fun being around other fans and even better when you win!"



How to Get Started in Sports Betting

Sports betting is what it sounds like. You place a bet on a sporting event and win a set amount of money if the team or player you bet on wins. If the team or player you bet on doesn't win, you lose your bet. You can place a wide range of different bets and find many different places to bet and ways to make the bets.

Let's talk about the terms, the numbers, and how different kinds of wagers work. Like any sport, you'll want to know the playing field before you start the game.

Plus and minus in betting/point spread

This can mean two things: They can denote how much a \$100 wager will pay out if it wins (when a plus sign is used) or how much must be staked to win \$100

(when a minus sign is used). Plus and minus are also used in point spreads. Point spreads are among the most common wagers in sports betting, and the lines for such wagers are displayed using plus and minus symbols. Most games are listed with a favorite and an underdog. The favorite gives points or runs and the underdog receives points or runs.

For example, (examples here are based on \$100 bets for ease of description, but you do not have to place bets at that level) let's say the odds on a game are listed like this: Chicago +3 (-110) Green Bay -3 (-110). The home team is usually listed second, and in this case. Green Bay is the favorite and Chicago is the underdog. If you bet on Green Bay, you give 3 points. This means that for you to win, Green Bay has to win by 4 or more points. If you bet on Chicago you get 3 points. This means you win if Chicago wins the game outright or if they lose by 1 or 2 points. You also win if the game ends in a tie. If Green Bay wins by exactly 3 points, you don't win or lose.

The -110 for each team is the odds. In this case, you have to wager \$110 to win \$100.

Lines aren't always whole numbers. Half points are often part of a plus or minus line wager. This makes a tie or push impossible.

For example: Chicago +4.5 (-110) Green Bay -4.5 (-110). If you bet on Chicago, you win the bet if they win the game outright or lose by 4 or fewer points. When you bet on Green Bay they have to win by at least 5 points for you to win.

Moneylines

The moneyline is the odds of a team or player winning the game or tournament outright without using the point spread.

For example: Minnesota (-200). This means that you have to risk \$200 for the chance to win \$100. On a moneyline with a positive number for an underdog, the number is the amount you win if you bet 100.

For example: Detroit (+180). This means that if you bet \$100 you win \$180 when San Diego wins. In evenly matched games or contests, you might see a moneyline with both teams at -105 or -110. This means you can bet on either team by betting \$105 to win \$100 or betting \$110 to win \$100.

Again, note that you definitely don't have to bet \$100 on the plus lines or the total amount on the minus lines. You can bet any amount between the minimum and maximum amount the sportsbook will accept. The numbers are adjusted to fit your wager size. So it's okay to test the waters with a \$5 or \$10 bet.

Over/Under

This is a bet on the combined score of both teams in a game. If the over/under is 35.5, you bet on whether the total score of both teams will be over or under 38.5 points. If you think the two teams will score more combined points, you bet on the over.

You bet on the under if you think the final scores will total less than the line. Over/ under bets are an easy way to get started betting on sport, but sportsbooks are good at setting these lines, and you may quickly learn that picking winners is harder than it looks. You can find over/under lines on basketball, baseball, American football, soccer, and many other sports.

Parlay

A parlay is a wager which combines two or more wagers; to win the parlay, all the wagers must win. If the player loses one wager, the player loses the entire bet. You can even play multiple parlays in a Round Robin, but we're not digging that deep today.

Proposition betting

A "prop" bet is a bet that is on the outcome of events within a game.

Futures

A future bet is a wager on an event far in the future such as a team winning next year's championship.

What is the vig?

The vig (vigorish or "juice") is the main way sportsbooks make a profit. It's what you pay the "house" when placing bets. It's not critical to betting, but it's good to know what this is and how it works. This fee is built into moneyline bets and

is represented by the difference in the lines. If the favorite is listed at -200 and the underdog is listed at +180, the difference between what you can win and what you have to wager to win is what creates an area of profit for the book. The most common form of vig is when you bet on point spreads. You usually need to risk more than you can win in these situations. Common vig numbers are betting \$110 to win \$100 and betting \$105 to win \$100. When the sportsbooks accept the same amount of bets on each side of a contest, they lock in a profit.

Sportsbooks rarely receive the same amount on each side of a contest, but over the course of hundreds or thousands of games or matches, they lock in a profit as long as they post good lines. The books also adjust the line when they get too many bets on one side of a game. They move the line to encourage more bettors to place wagers on the side they have a lower amount of money bet on. When they move the line this way, it also discourages more bets on the side they have more money wagered on.

How to place bets in person

As long as you're 21, you don't need to sign up for anything or log in anywhere to make a sports bet in person at a casino.

The first thing you need to do is look at the posted lines; decide which team you want to bet on; and whether you want to bet on the plus and minus line, the moneyline, or the over/under line.

In person at Diamond Jo Casino or Q Casino, you go to a betting window and tell the person the team you want to bet on; whether you want to bet the point spread, the moneyline, or the over/under; and the amount. Some books offer betting papers where you can mark your selections, but most simply take bets by you stating your intentions. When you place a bet and hand over your money, the book gives you a betting slip. It lists the bet and amount. You must turn the betting slip back in to get paid when you win.

For example: You might say any of these things:

- Chicago at +3 at 110 to win 100.
- The over for 100 on the Minnesota Detroit game.
- 100 on the money line on Green Bay.

Different sportsbooks have slightly different preferences on how they take bets. Ask a book employee if they have a standard method or ask the first time you place a bet at the window. Locally, both casinos have staff on hand to answer your questions and make sure you understand how everything works. Don't be afraid to ask for help. That's what they are there for. And by all means, both Diamond Jo and Q Casino have nice Sportsbook areas with comfy chairs, many TVs, and access to refreshments. So sit back; enjoy the game, match, or fight; and take in the energy of many people watching together to add another level of fun and excitement to the experience.


Online sportsbook

If you place bets at an online book, you find the game you want to bet on and click the bet or team you want or check the box beside it and enter the amount you want to risk. Most online books then take you to a confirmation screen where you verify your bet.

To bet online through the Diamond Jo Casino, their partnership is with FanDuel. Simply visit fanduel.com (or download the FanDuel app), click the Sportsbook tab at the top of the page, and then the "join now" button. Choose "Iowa." This links you to Diamond Jo, the only Iowa casino affiliated with FabDuel, and then fill out the usual personal information; pick your login and password, etc.; and of course, a credit card. Once you are logged in, you can browse to your sport, find your game, and place your bets. Then watching the game gets even more interesting, even for games where your favorite teams aren't playing. FanDuel is currently America's No. 1 Sportsbook app. They have a promotion right now to get your first bet risk-free up to \$1,000 when you sign up. So, maybe forget what we said about testing the waters with a \$5 bet. Do that with your second bet!

To bet online through Q Casino, visit **qcasinoandhotel.com** and click the Sportsbook tab at the top of the page. You'll want to download Q's Sportsbook app (there are links on the website). You can also wager online at **qcasinosportsbook.com**. From the site or the app, you can register and enter all the pertinent information and begin your Sportsbook experience. Q Casino's Sportsbook is fully managed in-house and not affiliated with any major national sportsbook company.

Above all, this should be fun and make the sport more exciting as a fan. Bet within your budget, and don't make stupid risks.







Betty Jane Candies

Not just for holidays anymore... but okay, for holidays too!

There's no time like Valentine's Day to find out what that hold up is on the new Betty Jane Candies retails store that has been coming soon... for some time now, to JFK Road in the previous IHOP restaurant location. So we snuck up on owner Andrew Siegert when he wasn't looking and put him to the chocolatey

interrogation. You'll be happy to hear that soon means, well, maybe today!

"We thought we'd open in October," laughs Siegert, from behind the desk we promised to not tell anyone about that showed, um, visual proof of just how busy he is these days.

"It's been goofy stuff like... we're waiting five months on a door. Five months! We had to do quite a lot of renovations over there, and with that many contractors, things happen. And they're busier than ever too. We really hope to open by the end of January in time for Valentine's Day. We don't want to do it too close to the major holiday, so if it gets too close, we'll wait until after Feb. 14 to open. But everything's now ready. We should be able do the inspection this week, and assuming there's no more issues with things not showing up, we can get it opened. We have a little luck on our side because Valentine's Day is basically a three-day storm of guys coming in for chocolates right before the big day. It's not like Christmas and Easter that last for a month of craziness. If we can get moved in with a week to spare before Valentine's Day, it'll happen."

The big, fabulous, new retail location is just the next step in what has been somewhat of a behind-the-scenes transition

to a whole new business model for the venerable Dubuque sweets landmark.

"We're always going to be loyal to and appreciate our local customers," assures Siegert. "They're still our main customers, and they started all of this. But we're fortunate that we're now a semi-national company. We're in 120 plus Sam's Clubs all over the country as well as Hy-Vee and Fairway stores, and our e-commerce is reaching every state in the nation."

It represents a lot of growth and trying to keep up the last five years that you may not have even known was happening.

"When we launched the snack line, that's the cornerstone of our wholesale department, and that's where we're seeing the massive growth and having trouble keeping up," explains Siegert. "So we actually added even more new equipment this year, and we actually just purchased a second chocolate line to be installed this fall.

Go figure, but with supply chain issues, a four-month wait is now about a 10-month lead time to get that equipment. That line will be installed into the existing Betty Jane Candies building on Asbury Road.

"That should more than double our output when it arrives in the fall, and we're really excited about that. It gives us some exciting opportunities that we've not been able to take advantage of because we're maxed out on production and space."

Being maxed out on space has everything to do with why there is soon to be a big beautiful new retail location on JFK. Yes, the street gets 4,000 more cars a day than their already busy Asbury Road location, but that reason is secondary to simply needing every inch of the original space to prepare for the future.

Did you even know that they did a significant addition to the Asbury Road location about five years ago already? It was at the back of the property, so it may had slid past your attention like a Gremlin on a dashboard on a hot summer day. That expansion made it possible to really launch the snack line of Betty Jane's treats, and that snack line is the driver that has turned the company in the major "minor" player in the chocolate scene. More on that later.

"Without the expansion, it would have been tough to do much more than we were doing. More raw materials on hand, more finished product on hand. Moving retail will free up space we desperately need. Our volume has gone up so much that some of our suppliers have had trouble adapting to our increases. COVID and supply chain hurts too, but when raw material needs goes up 40 percent a year, it can







be hard to keep up. Cost increases due to COVID were a reality too, but the supply chain was not an issue until now."

But you can only control what you can control. So grow-on they must.

"We're excited for the additional exposure and a much larger store inside on JFK," shares Siegert. "We'll have more storage, so our shipping department can run out of there as well. When COVID happened, we saw a huge shift to online orders, even locally, and that hasn't changed as things have otherwise come back to normal. And the new store is bigger than both of the old stores combined anyway."

Once moved in, the entire space of the current building on Asbury Road will fully transition to production and storage and will have no retail. They added production space as well as a bigger than ever store which means more jobs too, on top of the crew that just grew to 40 and is still looking for more to add.

This will leave just one lone, dedicated, local retail space in Dubuque, but and that's largely due to the shift in the business model. Instead of three stores with their name in it, they now have hundreds of stores focusing on their key products. Even inside Dubuque they have a lot of wholesalers carrying their more popular lines including Hy-Vee, Fareway, Hartig Drug, and local hospital gift shops.

"When we get the second new line in, we'll be able to bring back some products we put on the shelf because we have to focus on the top sellers simply because production is maxed out."

Nice problem to have.

"There are probably 20 plus products that we make but have not been able to make in a while, explains Siegert. "So that will come back as well as ideas for new products. Ten years ago, 300 pounds of Gremlins in a day would be a good day for production. Now, we are regularly cranking out 2,400 pounds of fresh Gremlins a day, and it's still not enough to meet demand. But the second line will be 33 percent bigger than our currently line, so we'll be able to more than double our production."

Wow. Oh, and don't worry. Many of your favorites are still in production including the chocolate caramels, chocolate covered nuts, cream centers, truffles, and toffee. It's all on the website, and reaally soon, in the new store too!

So what's the difference between a classic Gremlin and the snack line version? Gremlin Snackers are mainly different from traditional Gremlins in terms of how they are produced. The Gremlins you know and love are hand-dipped, polished, and hand-packed neatly in the famous Betty Jane Candies boxes. High on presentation but also high on manpower. The Snackers have the same great ingredients, but they are simply produced by a machine on a production line and packaged in a bag without the polish or handling, so there's significantly less labor involved, allowing for the price to be lower.

The Gremlins you love are exactly the same as they ever were, and if you get a pound for your loved one (or the loved one you pretend to have so you can get them for yourself), they'll still be beautifully packed in a one-pound white box, milk or dark chocolate, and polished to perfection before you polish them off the rest of the way. And hey, if beauty and presentation are not a big deal, you can get the same delicious taste in the snack version at a discount. Close your eyes, and you can't tell the difference!

The same game plan goes for their whole snack line which is now the focus of

growth for the future. Those include the addictive Betty Bites which are pretzels, Gremlins, caramel, and Betty Jane milk chocolate topped with sea salt. 6 oz. for \$6, 12 oz. for \$11. Sold! As for the Chocolate Pretzels, you can get a 10 oz. bag for \$5.49.

"Christmas is by far the biggest holiday for us. Noting else is even close. Then Easter and then Valentine's Day. But keep in mind that our wholesale business now does well more than all of our holiday business combined and keeps us busy all year long. It used to be kind of nice to have these peaks and then we could rest a bit, but those days are over, everyday is like Christmas anymore. It's a nice problem to have".

Hey, we just said that!

Betty Jane Candies has been in gift bags for the Grammys, named Top Culinary Gift in Iowa and Top 50 in the nation by *People* Magazine, named one of the top chocolate shops in the nation by *Taste of Home* Magazine, and less-surprisingly, a 20 plus year BestFest winner.

As big as they've be getting, Andrew laughs at the idea of taking over the chocolate world.

"I see lists of the production of some of these big boys in the business, and it's staggering. It would take a whole lot to come even close to touching their coattails."

So instead, Betty Jane Candies will focus on being the best and on smart growth that gains them new fans while never sacrificing the quality that made them famous in the first place.

Happy Heart

February is the month of love. It is also American Heart Month, a designation intended to raise awareness of heart disease and focus on prevention. Approximately 1 in 4 deaths in the U.S. are caused by heart disease. This February, give your heart the attention it deserves. Show this vital organ some extra love with nutritious recipes, shopping tips, and food swaps.


First, start with cooking substitutions. Making some easy swaps can help protect the health of your heart.

- To reduce sodium, use less salt than called for in recipes. (This works better for cooking than baking, which requires exact amounts.) Try unsalted chicken stock in place of chicken broth, and use no-salt-added canned vegetables. Explore alternative ingredients, such as coconut aminos a lower-sodium alternative to soy sauce.
- To reduce sugar in baking, replace 1 cup
 of sugar with ²/₃ cup of agave nectar, ³/₄ cup
 of maple syrup, or ¹/₂ cup of stevia.
- To increase vegetable amounts, serve 1 cup
 of vegetables instead of ½ cup. Swap in spiral vegetable noodles for pasta. Blend plant
 and animal proteins—combine black beans with
 ground beef in tacos, meatloaf, or burgers.

Next, keep these heart-healthy tips in mind when shopping.

 Read food nutrition labels. Look for foods with 2 grams or less of saturated fat, 0 grams of trans fat, and fewer than 140 mg of sodium per serving. Choose foods that have at least 5 grams of fiber per serving.

• Buy frozen when fresh isn't available. When buying frozen or canned fruits and vegetables, look for products without added sauces, salt, sugar, or syrups. Plain frozen and canned produce is just as nutritious as fresh.




• Choose whole-grain foods. Look for the word "whole" as the first item in the ingredient list. Whole grains contain the entire grain and are a better source of dietary fiber.

There were a lot of spinning cogs and intricate pieces to fit together in



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Succulents are all the rage right now!

The good news is for you "black thumbers" out there, indoor succulent plants require a certain amount of neglect. In fact, typically over watering is the major reason people can occasionally struggle to grow them. Here are a few tips to help you enjoy these textural beauties....

Choose a well-drained potting soil such as a ready-made cactus mix. Consider adding extra pumice, sharp sand, grit, or perlite to help drainage while not breaking down with time.

Succulents often have very shallow and brittle roots. If you want to repot them, gently loosen other soil and sift new soil around the roots. Using your fingers or blunt end of a pencil to tamp it lightly as you go. After you cover the surface with sandy soil, allow the plants to dry a few days before watering.

Succulents typically develop their best foliage colors with at least a few hours of direct sun. Try to locate them in a east, south, or west window that gets a few hours of direct sun or bright light. Provide a sheer curtain if you notice any leaf scorch happening.

If you notice them getting leggy, simply prune stems back to where you want new growth to emerge. You can even train some to grow in different directions by cutting just above a small branch or bud that is pointing the right direction.


In many cases, the cut-off portions can be allowed to dry a few days and then rooted in well-drained potting soil, or stuck into a planter or wall hanging for rooting right in place.

Many succulents grow very slowly indoors, especially in the cooler, darker winter months. They don't need much, if any, fertilizer other than a light feeding in the spring or summer. Choose fertilizer specifically designed for succulents or cactus.


The final tip I suggest is to give your plants a shower occasionally. Take them to the sink or tub and spray them gently with tepid water. This cleanses their pores and improves their appearance.

Was that super gross and earnest? I meant it, but uh, something about anime body pillows or, uh, Lindsay Lohan in *The Parent Trap*. Sorry.




