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WINNING IS JUST THE BEGINNING.

A few weeks ago, some items were stolen from the Toys For Tots Warehouse. Needless to say, I was equal parts disappointed and furious. In 15 years, as far as I know, this has never happened. It causes so many ugly feelings. Who would steal from a kids' charity, right? The fast-moving roller coaster that evolved around this theft over a few days was an eye-opening experience for me in a couple of ways, and probably not in the way you might think.

When I saw the giant \$850 LEGO Millennium Falcon that was gifted to our program directly from the LEGO corporation was not where I put it in the warehouse one day, my stomach sank immediately. There was no plausible explanation for its moving except that someone took it. I got mad later, but right out of the gate I was just gutted at the larger implication of the theft. I felt like this safe toy place was violated. I started making some calls to see if anyone knew anything that could help me. And this is where the crime started to solve itself, or so I thought,

A nonprofit that shares my space with me had a similar sinking feeling after having been told just days earlier by a worker for a regular business in a space nearby, with a history of financial struggles, that the LEGOs were a tempting enticement for stealing. So immediately, the nonprofit owner felt he needed to share this with me. Very few people even have access to this space, so the suspect list has got to be pretty short right? And in just a few minutes, I had a suspect.

My colleague approached the individual and basically said it if comes back, no harm, no foul. But it did not come back, and the person clearly denied taking the item.

Just a few hours later, the exact same item shows up for sale on Facebook Marketplace nearby listing the name of the person selling it. Not the same person. But now we have an obvious suspect selling the item as well. This case is pretty open and closed, right? You don't have to be a genius to put two and two together.

The giant LEGO set is one of the most expensive and rarest ever made. It's like seeing a unicorn online. It kinda stands out. They just don't show up very often. This is one reason it would make a great charity auction item for us come fall. So now I go to the police to put the pieces together and solve this thing that clearly I solved myself in a couple of hours, right?

And then things go sideways. The person selling a giant Millennium Falcon apparently has a receipt for their purchase. It's legit. They don't have mine. It's just a case of all-time bad timing on putting it up for sale. The police talked

to her, but then I also messaged her and apologized for any inconvenience, and she was wonderfully cool. She was actually glad I followed up as she didn't know for sure that the cop that called wasn't himself a scam. Welcome to life in 2022!

Now we're back to a missing toy, so I turn to the cesspool that is Facebook for the one thing that it's still good for, mob justice! I put the pic of the Falcon on there with the words **STOLEN** in bold type over the image. Just a couple of hours later, I get a message from Allied Pawn in Dubuque. The owner, Amber Smith, had it in safekeeping and was eager to get it back to us ASAP. How awesome is that, and how cool is she? She contacted the police and gave them the info on the piece and who sold it to her. Within another day or so, they gave her the OK to release the item back to me, and now it's back in my possession, safely hidden away, and going into our Toys For Tots Facebook auction next week. It's not all of the things taken, but it's the big one.

So now we just had to follow the breadcrumbs and see who took it. I'm not going into details, but in the end, it was NOT the obvious suspect we assumed took it in the first place. It was still a crime of opportunity and not a break in, but I fully admit I was wrong to jump to conclusions. So both of the suspects who were surely in cahoots just a day earlier are now exonerated. Thus the innocent until proven guilty mantra of our justice system.

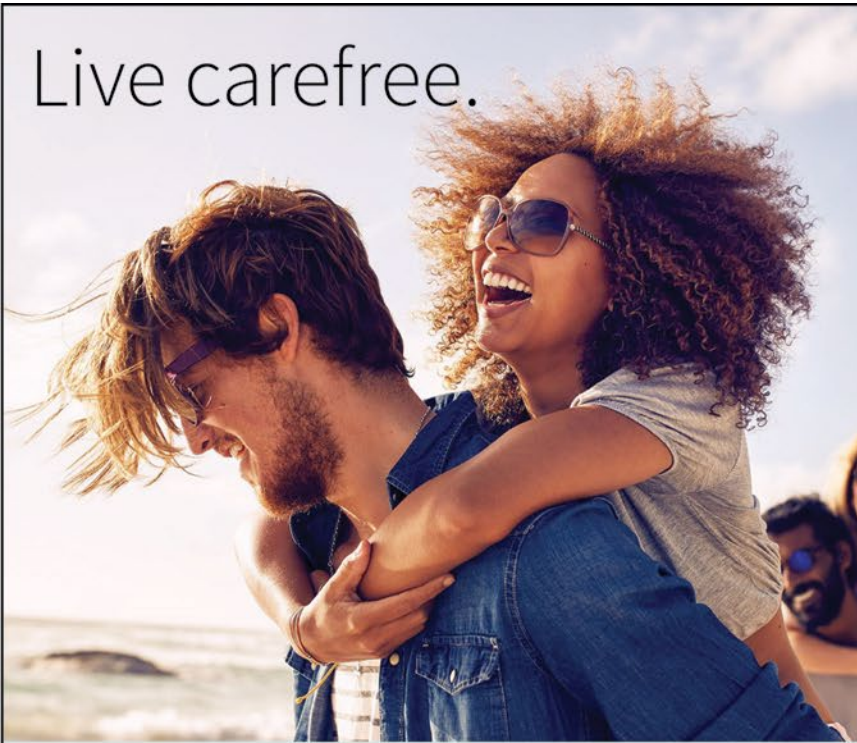
The man who took the items lost his job immediately upon being identified. I did not want to press charges as I think losing his job was enough of a punishment. But he also apparently still denied having anything more than the Falcon which we know is a lie. So I was extra nice and asked them to give him the option of giving back anything else he took to avoid being charged. He did not. So he was arrested and now I have a lot of paperwork to fill out.

It's a sign of the times, I guess. Yes, we now had to spend some money to install security cameras in our space. Thanks to our neighbors at Hirschbach Motor Lines for running us a Wi-Fi signal to connect the cameras. It's so sad that it's necessary, but we're not going through this again. Fool me twice, shame on me.

I want to thank Allied Pawn, the Dubuque Police Department, and friends on Facebook who shared the post about the theft so it got to the eyes of Amber at Allied Pawn. Oh, and Rita for baking me cookies that I was able to take to Allied Pawn to say thanks.

Movie Buzz

"I wanted to make it official—I am back as Superman," actor Henry Cavill said in a video, confirming his commitment to play the DC hero in future films after returning for the mid-credits scene in The Rock's *Black Adam* movie which was released over the weekend. It marked Cavill's first time in the role since 2017's *Justice League*. Though there are no writers or director attached, the intention is for Cavill to star in at least one solo Superman movie, his first since 2013's *Man of Steel*. Other movie appearances could potentially follow as DC Films gets an overhaul under new Warner film bosses Michael De Luca and Pamela Abdy.



A new report reveals that higher ups at Disney told Lucasfilm head Kathleen Kennedy to stop announcing *Star Wars* projects and the creatives involved. Lucasfilm has earned a bad reputation by hiring high-profile filmmakers onto *Star Wars* projects only to have them fired or quit at various stages of production. Some names include Colin Trevorrow, David Benioff, D.B. Weiss, and Patty Jenkins. While they currently have many films in development, including one from director Taika Waititi, it appears the studio is trying to find the right project to mark *Star Wars*' return to the big screen.



That said... Lucasfilm is in development on a new *Star Wars* film by Damon Lindelof and one of the directors of *Ms. Marvel*, Sharmeen Obaid-Chinoy. Since *Star Wars: The Rise of Skywalker* in December 2019, there have been no new *Star Wars* movies. The franchise has continued to live on through various Disney+ streaming series. With creative difference troubles of late, it was important for both Lucasfilm and Lindelof that a director be brought on board so the filmmaker's vision could be incorporated into the script. The next *Star Wars* film was originally set to be *Rogue Squadron* by *Wonder Woman* filmmaker Patty Jenkins, but the project suffered delays and was taken off of Disney's release schedule. Marvel Studios Kevin Feige is set to produce a *Star Wars* film and has brought on Michael Waldron to pen the screenplay. *Star Wars: The Last Jedi* director Rian Johnson is set to direct his own *Star Wars* trilogy.

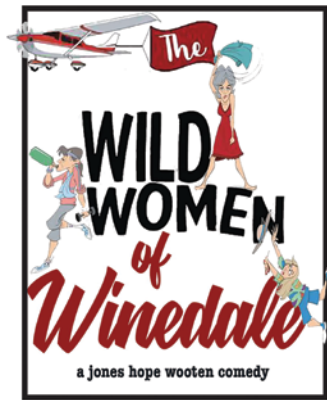

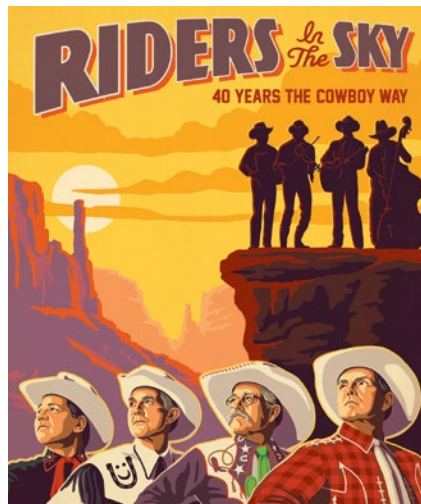

To the best of their recollection, the Riders last played Dubuque in the late 1980s.



Riders in the Sky have accumulated numerous honors including membership in the Western Music Hall of Fame, numerous Wrangler awards from the Cowboy Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Museum, awards from the Academy of Western Artists, enshrinement in the Walkway of Western Stars, and more.

The quartet is made up of lead singer Ranger Doug (born Douglas B. Green), Woody Paul (born Paul Chrisman) on fiddle and vocals, Too Slim (born Frederick Owen LaBour) on string bass and guitar, and Joey the Cowpolka King (born Joey Miskulin) on accordion.

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A New Rink in a Renewed Arena and a Step Forward for Schmitt Island

"It's an exciting time for Dubuque, and we're getting ready on Nov. 4 to welcome the Fighting Saints back into their home arena," Q Casino Alex Dixon celebrated when we sat down to discuss current events on Schmitt Island.

At first glance, the return of another Saints hockey season, aside from the excitement of league play, would not be something that carries a particular weight, but the last two years have not been normal years. Thanks to the fast action of the City of Dubuque fans have enjoyed uninterrupted seasons of hockey on our own home ice. Making that possible has indeed been a journey worthy of a story. So, let's tell that story now.

In June of 2021, DICE (The Dubuque Community Ice and Recreation Center, Inc.), the nonprofit organization that operated the Mystique Community Ice Center, approached the City of Dubuque, and requested to relinquish their right to the lease. Financial woes in making the center viable were compounded by the sinking fact—pun intended—that the settling issues with the building were going to require a big investment to keep the facility open long term. DICE did not see a way forward to make that possible.

"There was a pecking order we went through to see if an existing partner would take on the facility under the same terms that DICE had," explains Marie Ware, City of Dubuque's Leisure Services Manager. "Q Casino and Northern Lights Hockey were not interested in taking things over under the existing terms, so it falls to the City. With the hockey season upcoming last year, we as a city felt that we had to take it on to preserve an important community resource. We had to turn it from a nonprofit to a city facility, switching over everything from employees and bills to managing the place to be able to have a season."

Had the City not done that, they would have had to shutter the facility, which then has a domino effect down the line, likely ending Saints hockey and all other active users' seasons and plans for the year.

"That just wasn't an alternative for the city," Mare continues. "This community has valued having a team and the amenities that come with this arena. More facilities are becoming specialized. So having a dedicated ice sheet is important."

"But at the same time, we had to ask, 'What's a better long-term solution for this facility?' It's much cheaper for a nonprofit to run a facility than a city, and as a parks and rec person I can tell you

that ice centers around the country are subsidized facilities. That's why a majority of the time they are associated with a park and rec department. They are a quality-of-life amenity, and there are costs associated with being able to do that just like city parks or Five Flags."

"We put a band aid on it to keep it open last year and then got conversations open with the relevant entities. As we continued to talk to the DRA, we realized there were a lot of synergies there. Yes, you need to know how to specifically run an ice facility, but there's a lot more to it than that. There's managing a building, hiring, managing people, running food and concessions, selling alcohol, and more. All of those are things they do in the facilities they have now."

The relationship started with an interim staffing agreement that allowed the facility to open and operate last year. This gave the city and the DRA time to develop a full-blown all-inclusive management agreement, with the complexities which are being finalized now. It will remain a city building like Five Flags Center and Grand River Center, but the staff will be that of the DRA.

"The mission of the DRA," picks up Alex Dixon, "is to lessen the burden on local government, and we do that not only by

the checks we write, as it relates to the Q and the Diamond Jo working collectively together, but a portion of those funds go to the city to effectively buy down property taxes. That's how we have a 501(c)4 organization because the money goes to the community. But at our core, we think about what we're good at: We're a management company. We manage a casino, a hotel, and more. So, part of our commitment to Chaplain Schmitt Island, taking a broader role outside of the four walls of the casino, is to step up and make sure we have a great institutional relationship with the other entities that are on the island."

Dixon was sure to honor the work that came before as he looked forward to what comes next.

"I'm thankful for DICE and having a group of unpaid volunteers coming together and rallying to get this facility built. There were some shortcomings, but what's great is that the city recognized that this is a critical asset and beyond enduring that we reinforce it. We made an investment in other amenities, food and beverage, and the HVAC systems, so that we can have air conditioning which opens year-round use for the building. This made it easier for us as the DRA to step in and help provide the day-to-day management and leadership of it. We have an HR

department, finance, marketing, and we have safety. We can support the community not just by financially contributing, we can step up and make this facility be the best it can be for the community.”

There’s a lot to look forward to, and I promise we’ll get to that. But going from knowing we need to save the facility to where we are today was both a concerted investment as well as a yeoman’s effort on the part of many entities working in sync.

“Life safety was the most important component to the rehabilitation,” emphasizes Dixon “As we all know, this island was once upon a time the city dump which makes it challenging for anyone here on the island who is developing. There is settling that takes place. It’s literally just trash, and over time, it settles.”

It is important to note that the building was never unsafe. “We had an engineering firm monitoring it on a regular basis and doing the inspections to make sure things were ok,” ensures Marie Ware,” but it was heading in a bad direction. If you didn’t address it, over time, it would become a facility that was not safe.”

“We did an interim fix to stabilize the facility last year,” she continues. “Then we looked at long-term solutions, and it was going to need deep core pilings to permanently stabilize the floor.”

The City of Dubuque budgeted \$6.6 million for all the projects related to the Dubuque Ice Arena for Fiscal 2023. The bulk of that, \$4.6 million, going to the floor settlement remediation. The remainder covers safety updates, a generator, dehumidification, and concession re-design.

Everything was taken out to accomplish the remediation of the rink, the ice, the refrigeration tubes under the ice, dasher boards, the first couple of rows, and all the seats were removed. A specialized firm came in and dug deep pile foundations throughout the entire facility.

Not just under the ice but under everything—from hallways to locker rooms and meeting spaces, from corner to corner.

Mark Plantery joined the team as General Manager of the arena in April 2022, bringing years of experience in ice centers and hockey operations to the table from his years in Chicago. He walked us through the process of saving a sinking floor.

“Keller Construction out of Colorado has a lot of specialized experience and success in this. They drill a hole 3 to 4 inches in diameter and put a pipe in the hole and introduce a grout mixture into the pipe. Then, they lift the pole up, and the concrete and grout then spread and condense the soil. They’d bring the pole up some more, another layer of condensed soil, and finally balance that off at the top with some injected poly foam to find all the loose holes. The combination would lift the floor.”

“The holes are drilled about 10 feet apart across the entire surface of the floor from exterior wall to exterior wall, 482 in total, most to the depth of about 30 feet. The problem was that the exterior wall was already columned and supported properly. You won’t see a crack in any exterior wall. All the settling was in the interior floor. The shell was fine. It was just the floor that was the issue, and the north end of the rink was worse than the south. That introduces some structural issues, but the big problem they were having was maintaining the ice. The piping that contains the refrigerant settled and was further away from the ice sheet. The compressors had to work harder and the ice isn’t as good.”

The old floor of the rink itself was sand, as many lower-budget rinks are. The new rink is all concrete, and that will make all the difference.

“The sand is adequate, but the concrete floor is the best,” Plantery assures us. “It just changes everything. We have

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the pilings under the floor of the ice now, and then there's a 3-foot concrete base on top of the columns. The rink is an interesting combination of a heated floor and a cooled floor. Most people would never think about that. But you don't want to cause permafrost in the ground underneath the rink. You want the cold to go up, so there's a heated floor, and by heated, we're talking 42 to 44 degrees. Too hot would compromise the refrigerant above it. It's complex. The heated floor has 8 miles of tubing, and the refrigerated floor has 12 miles of tubing in continuous loops."

"The next level of fixes included some safety issues," Ware continues, "creating some egress walkways and solving some water holding issues by the Zamboni area. That is now leveled but also has drainage to keep it dry in the future. We also have some money to do some concession upgrades in the next couple of months."

While the average visitor won't notice most of the fixes to the building, hockey fans will notice that the previously carpeted entryway, which has issues with rationing tracked-in salt, was replaced with durable rubberized flooring.

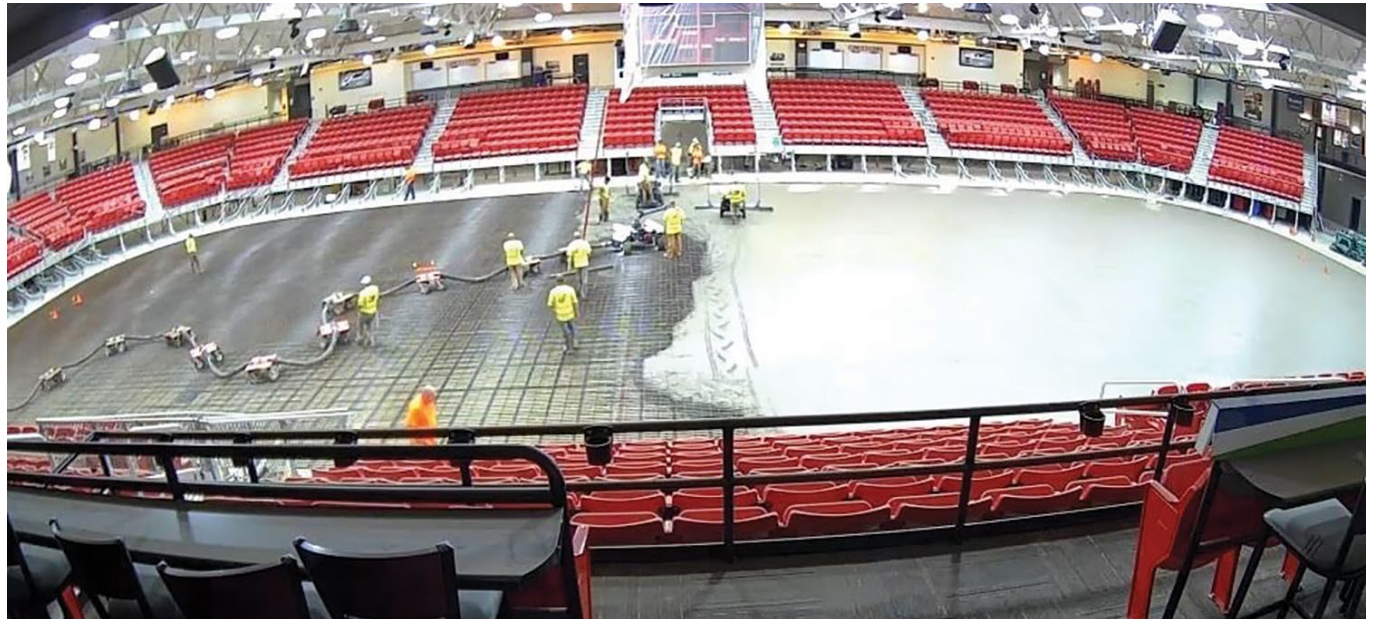
"I think people will definitely notice the new dasher boards," Mark offers enthusiastically. "Nice, clean glass, the top of the boards are now black instead of red. The contrast of the black against the ice is good from a fan viewing experience, the ice pops more, and there's no color interference with the red seats all around it. The black back of the boards won't show scuffing like the white did. Black doesn't fade either. When I see it in there, I know we made the right decision."

The fans will also appreciate the new sound system. Mark notes that the new management group from Q Casino was responsible for that. There were 26 speakers, and 10 of them were dead, causing buzzing and feedback, and you could not turn it up all the way. The new system itself is temporary with 8 speakers, but these 8 speakers are lightyears ahead of what was there. They can get really loud and have a nice range of sound, not just tinny horns you might think of from a hockey rink.

They will thump and bring another level of excitement to games and other activities. And then next year, they too are getting replaced with a permanent system that we assume is going to blow your socks off.

"They'll notice a difference in concessions as well as greater variety and quality of offerings," added Mark. "I'm not giving away too much, but John Torres, Hospitality Director from Q Casino, has worked very hard on the menu and brings a ton of experience. He's the best."

The setting remediation project was managed in tremendous detail by the City of Dubuque Engineering Department with

a daunting schedule of carefully timed contractors coming and going to get their work done on time to allow the project to stay on schedule. Everyone we talked to raved about the work of the engineering department led by Bob Schisel.

Next up is upgrading the HVAC which traditionally happens at this time of year. That didn't need to happen under the tight deadline of the rest of the work, so it can happen over the winter and be ready to keep the rink running next spring.

"First and foremost, it was built as an ice rink, but what they're doing and what we encouraged the Q Casino management team to do is look at what are all the other things you could do," says Marie Ware. "We made it so there is a concrete floor instead of sand, so now the ice can be removed to have a concrete floor. Whether or not they use that opportunity is up to them."

"The HVAC and dehumidification coming next is the key to maintaining quality ice in the summer," explains Mark Plantery. "You have to adjust the temperature of the ice based on the humidity of the facility."

Mark notes that once in place, the facility can easily manage an ice sheet all summer long and still host events on top of the ice using a protective covering they lay down over the ice.

"You can put down concert seating, or a trade show can bring vehicles onto the ice. Then you just run the Zamboni on the ice a couple of times afterwards and it's like new. Taking the ice down and putting it back is a two-week process. And our user groups will still want to use the ice, so we'll continue to maintain the ice all summer. We'll bring camps in, and hockey leagues will host periodic skates, just not on the same frequency as in the fall season."

Marie Ware foresees a variety of creative uses for the new year-round facility. "In addition to the rink, there is a great concourse that can host activities and a big meeting room that might host off-site retreats for business. It's all in your imagination."

Q Casino General Manager Alex Dixon sees a lot of potential for the main floor.

"Imagine if we were to work with the folks here in the community to put on a boat show and other things that are more water-based, beer festivals, graduations, concerts, parties, and summer camps. What we want to encourage is for the community to see this venue as a community venue. To do this right we need to increase the occupancy of the building. The more people that attend Saints games, youth hockey, and existing user groups is great, but to also spur the imagination in other ways that we can utilize this great investment that we're all made as a community."

"They'll be doing things that make sense," adds Ware. "What events make sense and what don't fit? It might need other upgrades to do some kinds of things. The building was originally built to be an ice center and nothing else. So, as we look at things, there are still issues like giving up seats to put in staging, the cost of covering the floor, or the limitations due to ceiling height that might make some best of intentions and ideas just not viable for the building. Everyone finds their niche and there will be the possibility of duplicating amenities just like with Five Flags and Grand River Center. It's the right size community to work together versus compete. They've got some really talented people, and if they can come up with some ideas that nobody else is doing in town, the better off it is for all of our citizens."

"The city did a great job of delivering this project on time and under budget to help to reinforce the building to mitigate the settling", notes Dixon. "It's not sexy, but it's the kinds of things you must do. The community rallied around what was formerly known as the Mystique Community Ice Center, which will now be called the Dubuque Ice Arena."

Alex emphasized the word "arena" for the new name.

"Arena" is important. Arenas are places where communities come together and celebrate their professional sports teams. That's what the Fighting Saints are for us. But it also houses a number of other user groups, youth hockey, figure skaters, and more teams that play there that can leverage the ice arena. This is a new modern take on the investment the community has made."

As part of the new branding, the staff at games and events will have new uniforms that tie them to the facility as an entity and bring a new sense of pride to the arena.

"We are the proud home of the Saints, but it's also Dubuque's Ice Arena for all of the other purposes it serves," explains Alex. "The Casino, DICE, and the Saints made a big investment in the building originally, but this is a new era. It was important that there was a brand that stands alone from the Saints but is complimentary to it. Q Casino wants to put our stamp of management and structure and support behind it."

We'll come back around to the opening of the Dubuque Ice Arena before we sign off, but since we've got these people in the know in the room, we've gotta ask what's next. No one knows more about that than Alex Dixon.

"In the future, we will be engaging in a larger public input process so that as we

make improvements to the island and as we plan for the future, we start to get the input of the entire community. It's important for our leaders to know that we are taking into account a process by which we have good robust public comment and input on the changes we make into the future."

But before the rest of the island springs to life, Q Casino has exciting plans for its own backyard. Plans are well underway to introduce an awesome permanent outdoor concert amphitheater where the Greyhound Park used to sit, to replace the annual temporary site that has hosted the Back Waters Stage for several years.

"We've submitted our application to the state for the Destination Iowa Grant with the City Council's full approval and blessing. Now we all need to cross our fingers and hope we are awarded the funds to create this great outdoor amphitheater.

While everyone is cautiously optimistic about state funding, they are ready to begin the demo immediately should that funding not come through.

"Because we submitted, we purposely have waited because we can't do the demo and get the credit of the investment until we get some indication of the award. If the City of Dubuque gets the award, they—not DRA—will be the ones going through the bidding process. So that all affects the timing, but we're ready to go, and it is shovel ready. We're really starting to see things move and move quickly."

A permanent amphitheater would be a game changer for summer festivals and big-time outdoor concerts with facilities and amenities always in place. Besides looking great and making these events more economical and streamlined, it

will free up a lot of parking so they can consolidate parking in a safer manner.

Chaplain Schmitt Island grows and evolves and as the City recently dedicated one-third of the funds generated by the DRA to go back into the development of the island, it was important for the City and all of the parents involved to create a dedicated nonprofit organization to lead this effort.

Kathy Buhr is the Director of Strategic Philanthropy and Schmitt Island Development for Q Casino. She oversees all the charitable giving for the DRA, managing the funds that go out to the nonprofits. She also now serves as the President of the Board for the newly created Schmitt Island Development Corporation. That is the 501(c)3 nonprofit that was created to help implement the Master Plan created by the city.

"We'll be their ambassadors to help with the development on Schmitt Island," explains Buhr, "raising funds to make additional improvements to the ice arena and additional assets on the island."

"The new nonprofit allows us the ability to expand," explains Marie Ware. "The city owns the whole island and has lease agreements with all entities on the island. This entity sets it up so that as other plans get added, one can add new amenities to the island."

The reason for the 501(c)3 is to be that resource that people can donate to so the nonprofit can start fundraising for future projects.

"We have ball fields with multiple different user groups, Loras College and Wahlert High School, and all of the municipal softball and baseball leagues

that are playing there," says Buhr. "Right now, there is not a resource if Loras College wanted to do a campaign to raise money to do field improvements. We can take in those donations and run the campaigns, and people can write off those donations. And we can be the middleman that helps implement those projects."

The Destination Iowa Grant application that Alex Dixon referenced would also cover trails, accessibility issues, and signage on the island as well as work to continue to connect the two sides of the island.

"We have been very lucky because the City of Dubuque is an incredible partner. The City did receive a D.O.T. Raise Planning Grant that helps with both pedestrian access to and vehicular traffic on the island."

"One of the most beautiful spots in Dubuque is the north point of the island at the end of Miller Riverview Park. A lot of people don't know what we have down here. We're working on the marketing side too to make people aware of the trail, and we'd like an app and website to make people aware of the amenities on the island."

And yes, they're finally looking at getting a real beach in town!

"We need to get people to be able to touch the water. It's a dream that may still be years off, but I compare it to LaCrosse, WI, and that public beach that they have at Pettibone. The Port of Dubuque is along the main channel of the Mississippi. We have the Peosta Channel, which is off the main channel and creates that opportunity to develop a beachfront that would be safer for people to enter to water."

The group has also contemplated a water taxi to connect the island to the different marinas in town, the Port of Dubuque, and even across the river to Illinois.

The City's Schmitt Island Master Plan was created in 2014 and revised in 2017, and this group will continue refining it to make sure that what's in it is speaking to people today and not people 10 years ago. Burn believes that if any upside can be taken from the pandemic, it is that it's made people want to get outside for activities, camping, and hiking.

Want to know more? Head to **SchmittIsland.com**. "Get involved," implores Kathy Buhr. "Many hands make light work. We need people that are passionate about different amenities to step up and get involved."

Ok, back to hockey.

"Before the Saints start the season, we will have a community open house," promises Alex Dixon. "We need to make sure everything is ready to go!"

So is it ready to go?

The Dubuque Ice Center Open House will be on Wednesday, Nov. 2 from 4

to 6 p.m. There will be a ribbon cutting ceremony, arena tours, ice skating, cake, refreshments, a cash bar in the lounge, and DJ music. The event is free and open to the public. Go check it out!

Rink Tech is building the ice now, slowly bringing the ice rink down to temperature. It has to go slow over two or three days to get to 28 degrees, so they won't compromise the concrete. Water will go on just before this issue of *365ink* hits the street. About a half-inch of ice, then they paint the lines and the logos and corporate sponsors, and then more ice. The total thickness will be around 1.25 to 1.75 inches. That is a lot thinner than they have to put down on sand, especially because of what the settling had caused.

The sand also had some issues with soft ice at the edges because you can't put dashers on sand. The refrigerant lines must stop just before the edge of the rink. Now the lines extend under the dashers, so the ice quality extends to the very edge. That's a better experience for the players and skaters.

"I've been on the best ice in the world, and that's our goal here, to have the best ice in the USHL and in North America," Mark says with pride.

"I've scouted for the Saints for 7 years, long before I came here in April. This is a great junior hockey facility. It's a great facility for the community. Most kids aren't fortunate enough to grow up in a facility this nice. It's a real asset to the community. One thing I've found out since I've been here is how important this building is to a lot of people in the community. When it's done, this is something they can be really, really proud of."

Marie Ware concurs, "Today's Dubuque leaders talk to us about the life lessons they learned on the ice. It's an important rite, like our ball diamonds or soccer fields. Each of those helps form our young people into our leaders of tomorrow. So some piece of this is our investment into our future."

"Come early, come often," suggests Alex Dixon. "I really want to thank our whole team, our new G. M. Mark Plantery, Jody, and everyone over there at the arena for all the hard work that they've put in. Our family is excited to get back to Saints games, we have a lot of fun. We as a community have to make sports and ice activities successful."

Mark Plantery sums it up, "The commitment the city has made to the project is huge. This will be a quality cornerstone, a launching pad for the rest of Schmitt Island."

And most of all, we've now got a quality facility that's good to go for decades to come. ■



A New Season of Saints Hockey

Dubuque Fighting Saints Coming Home to a New Rink

If you just read the 4,500 words I wrote about the Dubuque Ice Arena, you'll notice that we didn't quote the Saints in the story. Never fear: We've got all of their feelings about that, and a whole new season of hockey already underway, right here.

With the team on the road so much for games and practice as they wait for home ice to open up, I sat down with Robert Miller, President of Business Operations for the Dubuque Fighting Saints. Miller joined the team in April 2021 as things were still up in the air for the future of hockey in Dubuque because of an ailing facility.

"The building had some severe issues, and there was definitely a time last year we were nervous about the future," admits

Miller. "I think our fans spoke up pretty handily. I know right before Marie Ware made the presentation to the City Council, our fans wrote letters, emails, and called council members. I think the response was surprising to them. To hear stories of hockey's history since the '80s in Dubuque and what it meant to bring the Saints back in 2010, it's a part of the culture of the city."

"This ice arena is not just for us, it's youth hockey and high school hockey and figure skating. It's such a part of the community but also has such room to grow."

Miller joins others involved in the effort to revive the arena in lauding the efforts of Bob Schisel from the Dubuque City Engineering department.

"When the city stepped up and what Bob Schisel has been able to do at the City Engineer's office is incredible," says Miller. "Seeing him here nearly every single day working with these crews, making sure everything's done right, attention to detail, and staying on schedule. Bob and his crew have done a fantastic job and we're very excited about the future."

Miller says discussions about the work being done on the arena not really being visible is the reason they call it the foundation year: The start of something special, bringing the facility to a place where they can build up.

"Hearing the plans from Q Casino and the entities involved in running the facility," says Miller, "the future is bright, the cosmetics are good, and I really think we can make this building something that the people of Dubuque can be proud of."

And with a big island with lots of potential, it's not lost on Miller how special it is that the future is beginning with them.

"We're very lucky that the crew running the Schmitt Island Foundation and those putting the money into the island wanted to start with us first," he says. "That also goes to the importance of this building. We are part of Dubuque. We're the only dedicated ice sheet in the city. The ice has been shut down for so many months. Groups are going to Cedar Rapids and Madison and other places to get on the ice, and it shows how much it's needed here."

His excitement grows every time he's part of an event where future ideas are discussed.

"When you do an event with Alex [Dixon, Q Casino General Manager] and Q Casino, and he shows the future planning, it's like an escalator effect," Miller says. "We're at the bottom of the escalator now, and each year, something is going to change. And what's happened so far, as critical as it is, is nothing compared to what they're going to see in two, three, four, five years down the road. But the project now was to get this thing squared and level, and that's what we've done and, now we're ready to build on it."

It's funny that when you ask about how the year is going, you get a very different answer from the coach than you do from the President of Business Operations. For the coach, it's all about the team. But Miller must keep the lights on, so for him it's all about community engagement.

"The new dashers are sold out for sponsors, which is great, and they look great too," notes Miller. "The black top edge of the dashers will help the players see the puck better against the glass."

New coach Kirk McDonald is personally enjoying the challenge of coaching

at a new level and the opportunity to coach some of the best junior players in the world. These are his words:

"We're focused on improving as a team every week. I think the most important thing is to focus on the task at hand which is helping each player get better every day. We believe that if we have good habits and a strong work ethic in our process, then the result will take care of itself."

But just being able to be back home again for practice, games, and a taste of normalcy will be a great relief for the team.

"Adversity brings opportunity," says Miller. "And we've certainly had our share of adversity this year. From a business standpoint, there's a lot of stuff we've had to take on when normally we can just do everything here."

Every morning, the coaches are up at 5:30 a.m. The players are at the arena before 8 a.m. They're on a bus to Madison for an hour and half, doing their schoolwork on the ride. They do their training as soon as they get there. They're on the ice for two hours, then they work out, and they get back on the bus and come home. Do that 35 times. It gets daunting. But the good thing is that this goes to the camaraderie of the team.

"I think through this adversity," says Miller, "it gives these guys a chance to really and truly grow together and become a unit. And I'll tell you, it's hard in the USHL, because every year there's a lot of new players. You're bringing in new guys coming in from all over the world. We've got kids from all over America and Canada. We've got four kids from Sweden. It takes a minute for these teams to gel, get good, and learn each

other. This adversity gave those kids a real opportunity to gel and get cohesive with the trips back and forth. It'll make us a better team and a stronger team, but it's been very difficult for the players, and I'm very proud. The drive those guys have to do it every day shows that they really love what they're doing, and they're around to be Dubuque Fighting Saints."

Coach McDonald continues, "We're excited about the fact that we don't have to drive 90 minutes to practice every day. We're eager to get back in our building and get on the ice. The modern sheet will allow us to practice better and longer, which will really help our players develop."

You'll already know from the new coach's quotes that since last year, the team lost coach Greg Brown to Boston College after just one season. He was a B.C. Hall of Famer, so the draw to go back "home" was strong for the former New York Rangers assistant coach. They bounced back with a tenacious new personality behind the bench.

"We've got Kirk McDonald in from the ECHL in Reading, PA, a big team in the league, and he had a lot of success there," says Miller. "To bring a guy like Kirk in, I think he's going to align himself well with the people of Dubuque. A blue-collar guy who likes to get physical, get up in people's faces, and control the puck. It's kind of fun to have two different coaching styles two years in a row but to see the success that both could potentially have. Coach Brown had over 40 wins, but we fell out of the playoffs a bit early. Then for Kirk to come in and have so much adversity thrown at him and to see what he's done at the beginning of the season, the sky's the limit. He can definitely do it."

If you wonder why good coaches are drawn to Dubuque, their curiosity is not there for Miller.

"Coach Brown came from the NHL," he notes, "Coach McDonald came from the ECHL, that shows a testament to the USHL and the trajectory it can put you on. It is a tier-one hockey league and one of the premier leagues on the planet."

You can get a sense of the quality of the product in Dubuque and in the USHL by the sheer quantity of resumes that come in from people that want to be here. Miller says the hardest part for the team's managing partner and G. M. to do was to choose from all those quality people.

"I think the people of Dubuque are going to love his coaching style and his playing style," Miller says of the new coach. "And among our players this year, there's some major skill on the ice. It shows that we pull from the best talent in the world to come and play here."

The coach is loving what he's seeing already from his players. "Their eagerness

to be on the ice and get better every day, and to see their growth as players," says McDonald. "It's great to see their improvement and to be rewarded for their hard work with opportunities down the road at the college and professional level."

Great players are not a new thing for Dubuque Fighting Saints. You can watch Johnny Gaudreau play for the Columbus Blue Jackets right now. Zemgus Girgerson is on the ice in Buffalo with the Sabres and doing pretty good. The Saints had six players drafted last year.

"You have people drafted every year, and it takes time to build them up, but to turn on the TV and see players that you know were on the Dubuque ice and are now playing at the highest level in the world is so cool to see," says Miller. "And players like Steven Holiday and Connor Kurth who have the same opportunity coming up, it's a really cool thing."

The businesses of Dubuque have really shown up for the team on the new ice this year as well.

"We're on a heck of a run for partnerships. It has been an amazing summer for us to build partners. We're about sold-out on signage and a lot of our community initiatives. The people of Dubuque have given us the ultimate support. The tickets start to pick up as the season goes, and we're expecting some big crowds and a lot of great things going on this year."

With the work still underway on the home ice, the team's home games are back loaded this season, but they didn't lose any.

"We gave the USHL fair warning that this was going on, and they worked with us on the schedule," says Miller. "And it was lucky, we had the three road games in September, but we only have five in October. For us to only have five total games in the month of October is a blessing. We haven't had to stay overnight very much. Most of them are day trips."

Miller believes back-loading a lot of home games late when things are gelling will bode well for having a lot of success late in the season giving them a leg-up. And it just might be a karmic balance for all the strife they've endured during training season.

And as always, they're doing a lot of cool stuff community-wise. Maybe more than ever.

"We're working with Hormel on a 'Compleats' initiative," he says. "They have a Compleats meal, so if we have a complete game where we control three facets of the game and win, they will donate 100 meals to local people in need. We're working with Dubuque Screw Products to build up the Dubuque Youth Hockey Association, so we have the One Goal promotion. Every time we score a goal, they donate money to the DYHA."

"We're working with April Finnin on 'Finnin the Food Bank,'" he continues, "which is a big local food bank support night. Rainbo Oil is helping us collect school supplies. Of course our big Teddy Bear Toss for Toys For Tots is a popular night [You know I'm a big fan! —Bryce]. Our Veterans Game raises money for them, and then there's our cancer night and March of Dimes Night."

"Almost every one of our games has some kind of theme to it that hits home."

"One of the ones that I'm very excited about is the Red Basket Project: We'll be collecting feminine products for middle school and high school girls in partnership with Miss Lidia and Mario's Italian Restaurant. That's where businesses of Dubuque can put a lot of trust in us to help them with their initiatives. It's going to benefit a lot of people in Dubuque, and I'm really proud and excited about that."

Now Miller and everyone in the Saints organization just wait with bated breath for the first home game to finally arrive.

"Nov. 4 is the reopening of the building," says Miller, "and the Q Casino has become a major partner of ours from a business and arena level, and we want to showcase what Dubuque is all about as the casino stepped up to take this building to

new places. The more people we can get out here on opening and fill this place up to get this off to a great start, that's all we want. We want to pack this place!"

As of printing, the Saints are currently 3-3 on a somewhat grueling all-road-game opening to the season. Expect that to change... and soon.

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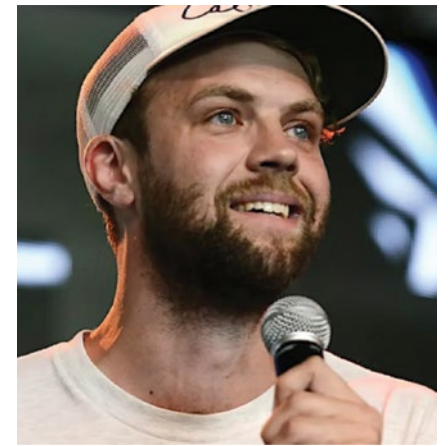

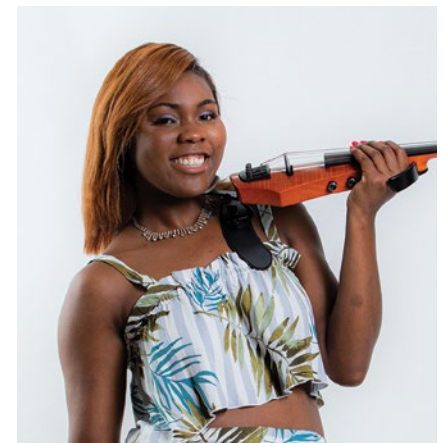

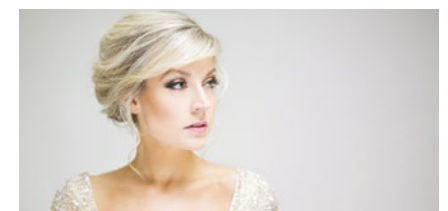

Shugga's Soul Cafe, Frannie's Barbecue, and Catfish Charlies: Fried Catfish

I've been on a fish kick lately, and these three places all serve up some ridiculously easy, crispy, and not-too-fishy catfish. Birds. Food Truck: Spicy Bird Sandwich

These hefty chunks of chicken are fried to a golden perfection and plopped on a squishy-yet-substantial Hokkaido bun. Bread and butter pickles and mayo are peeking out of this stack, but the spice comes in with a slathering of Cry Baby Craig's Minnesota Hot Sauce. I don't find the heat to be overwhelming, but I also don't find black pepper to be spicy. Served with a side of fries, this chicky-potato combo is more than enough for a meal. Could I finish it in one sitting? Sure, maybe with some encouragement, but I'd be happy splitting it with a human friend.



Village Bar Supper Club: Chicken Parmesan

When you hear "Village Bar," you probably picture a cow-sized portion of prime rib, AYCE fish, and grasshoppers. But what about pasta? Specifically, chicken parmesan? Would you eat it in a bowl? Would it go in your mouth hole? Would you get it grilled or fried? Would you hope it'd be your bride? I'd wife it if I weren't already committed to some pocket shrimp. Wedding bells or not, I suggest transferring your chicken to the plate instead of trying to cut it up in the bowl. The sauce does the tomato good and isn't littered with bell peppers. It's a safe bet, and a filling one at that.

Yen Ching: Twice Cooked Pork
One of the first things I ordered when I moved to Dubuque was the twice-cooked pork at Yen Ching. That might be why it tastes like home to me, even though I claim no Chinese heritage. Because, you see... like the protein featured in this dish, I'm the other white meat. Twice-cooked pork at Yen Ching is absolute proof that there's no such thing as too much garlic. The sauce is more garlicky than garlic but also has some outside spiciness and well balanced acidity that elevates every piece of pepper, onion, carrot, and cabbage. And the veggies are still toothy, if not still crisp, like a stir-fry should be. And those tender morsels of pork taste like they've given you their all, what with being cooked and then cooked again. It's one of the most common cravings for me, and I'm not sure I could live without it. Nom.



Shot Tower Inn: Broasted Chicken
Lately I've been crushing on the broasted chicken at Shot Tower Inn. I've had an on-again, off-again relationship with their chicken dinners for years. When I worked in offices downtown, I would order it at least once a week for lunch or dinner depending on what shift I was working. I let the habit terminate with my employment, however. But my partner has been frequently craving Shot Tower Inn lately. She crushes hard on their boneless wings and, as a result, I've rekindled the affair with their broasted chicken. The chicken dinners are served with those good Shot Tower fries, coleslaw, and a dinner roll. Combine all that with some tender-to-the-bone broasted chicken, it's like eating at a supper club, but 'cept without grandma. I'm sorry. I know you miss her. We all miss her.

Big Apple Bagels: Mediterranean Veg-out Sandwich
If I need a sandwich for lunch, the Mediterranean Veg-out sandwich from Big Apple Bagels is perfect. 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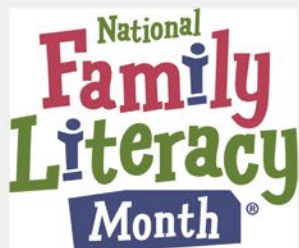

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All We Can Save

Why is that just when we're going into fall football season, food feast time, holiday family gatherings, and important holy celebrations, Dubuque's Sustainability office is kicking off a book group to discuss *All We Can Save* edited by Ayana Elizabeth Johnson and Katharine K. Wilkinson in relation to Dubuque's Climate Action Plan?

In 2006, sustainability was named a top priority by the Dubuque City Council. In 2013, the Dubuque City Council adopted a 50% by 2030 Community Climate Action & Resiliency Plan. The Plan was updated in 2020 as the Dubuque Climate Action Plan—2020. ("lock-down" year) You can find a link to that plan here: cityofdubuque.org/1374/50-by-2030-Plan. How important is the climate topic? Ingram, the independent booksellers' distributor, currently lists more than 10,000 titles on climate change. In 2020 alone, the same year the City of Dubuque updated its climate action plan, more than 2,600 books on climate-related topics were introduced.

So, what makes *All We Can Save* worth reading? And why now?

A woman I know was just told that her furnace, installed in 1960, needs to be replaced. It has served her well over the decades but is hardly energy efficient by today's standards. She can't afford to pay for a new furnace right now. At one time, Iowa's energy efficiency program may have helped offset the cost, but Iowa lawmakers made steep cuts to that program in 2018.

Throughout Dubuque, there are aging water heaters, furnaces, poor insulation, and unsound windows. Updating these addresses a need to be far more energy efficient at the local level. There are brownfield sites and rooftops that would be perfect for solar and battery storage. There are wooded areas that should be preserved and protected to provide cooling in summer and sequester carbon, among other things.

A community conversation is important to talk about and explore all the ways we, as community, can make a difference to improve our land, water, air and personal lives. If not now, when?

All We Can Save contains a diverse collection of artwork, essays, and poems selected by Ayana Elizabeth Johnson and Katharine K. Wilkinson. While all of the contributors are women, speaking as women engaged in science, culture, equity, and climate action, the topics are for anyone interested in climate issues.

The writing is at times breathtaking, at others gut-wrenching.

"This book imparts the minds and hearts of women leading the way on climate and using their diverse gifts to," as Adrienne Rich writes, "reconstitute the world."

All We Can Save is organized into eight sections: Root, Advocate, Reframe, Reshape, Persist, Feel, Nourish, and Rise. The essays in each section are related to the section title, interspersed with poems to allow a breathing space and moments of reflection. The essays do not always agree with each other—a key element of good dialog.

The points of view are diverse, ranging from philosophical to hard science, covering a broad range of ideas and issues. I think the editors missed at least two important aspects of climate conversation when they didn't include any essays on disabled and climate crisis. Nor did they include any essays on the environmental and health impacts of large-scale utility renewables on rural communities.

In an essay titled "Wakanda Doesn't Have Suburbs," Kendra Pierre-Louis uses humor, such as the following tweet from Mika McKinnon, a Canadian field geophysicist and science communicator to illustrate her points: "Earth is Easy Mode. If we can't maintain habitability here, we're utterly f-d trying to pull off long-term survival anywhere else."

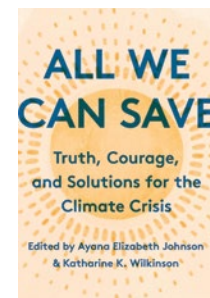
Author Favianna Rodriguez points out in "Harnessing Cultural Power" that, "Culture is power. The music we listen to, the social media we consume, the food we eat, the movies and television shows we watch—these inform our values, behaviors, and world views. Culture is in a constant battle for our imagination."

Katherine Hayhoe shares insights in how to talk about climate using the Rotarian's ethical guidepost: "Is it the truth? Is it fair to all concerned? Will it build goodwill and better friendships? Will it be beneficial to all concerned?"

Kate Knuth, in her essay "Becoming a Climate Citizen," states that, "Citizenship, at its core, is a sacred trust between the individual and the collective. As we face the climate crisis, this trust—and how we understand and act on it—is more critical than ever."

The Sustainable Dubuque Circles Book Group will be leading a series of community discussions on *All We Can Save* at local area restaurants beginning Nov. 2. The last session is scheduled for April 2, 2023. More information can be found at SustainableDubuque.org/circles.

Save the planet, turn out the lights, plant a tree, and join a book group. ■



Sweet Treat in Season

Plus, the flesh and peel are packed with disease-fighting antioxidants and phytochemicals that may protect against breast and lung cancer. These disease-fighting nutrients work best when the peel and flesh are eaten together.

Wondering how to find the perfect Honeycrisp? When shopping for a Honeycrisp apple, look for those with a vibrant red blush color against a rich, golden yellow background. Fruit should be large and uniform and without bruises or cuts. Once home, place apples by themselves in the refrigerator crisper in a plastic bag with ventilation holes. Honeycrisp will store for at least seven months refrigerated at 37°F, according

to the University of Minnesota. Purchase these sweet treats in season (September through November) for best quality and longest storage potential.

These are just a few of your Hy-Vee dietitian's favorite ways to enjoy a Honeycrisp apple:

- **Raw:** Skin on or skin off, solid or cored, apples are tailor made for eating fresh out of hand. You can also slice them and dip in yogurt or nut butter as a snack.
- **Pureed:** Peel, core, and chop apples. Place in a large pan with an inch of water; cover. Cook for 15 minutes, then purée in a food processor. Serve plain or add your favorite fall spices such as cinnamon for a warm treat.
- **Baked:** Core apples, stuff desired filling in hole, and place in baking dish with ¾ cup boiling water. Bake at 375°F for 30 to 45 minutes.

Moving, in Fits and Starts

Everybody knows that moving from one home to another is challenging—if by “challenging” you mean, as I do, exhausting, enraging, endless. Helping others move is the height of altruism, even if you don’t own a pickup. What I have is a 22-year-old RAV4, plus a Subaru with fold-down back seats. My daughter has a smallish Corolla, plus a mountain range of stuff.

Claire’s move from Davenport was for a wonderful reason—a job as Materials Librarian at the Cedar Rapids Public Library, which involves stocking the adult fiction and nonfiction shelves at this welcoming building, which rose from the mud after the 2008 Cedar River flood devastated much of the city’s downtown. What a fate for a library, all those waterlogged books and floating computers.

But that was then, and this was now, or rather the future, when she would open her boxes, retrieve a work outfit, and arrive at her shiny new job. All we had to do between the job offer (Aug. 11) and her first day (Sept. 6) was install her in a new home. She submitted her two-week notice, began an online apartment search, called the movers, and purchased enough U-Haul boxes to relocate from the Taj Mahal into slightly larger quarters. Meanwhile, I examined my calendar. I could help; sure I could.

Together we traveled to inspect two townhomes, a nice change from her usual one-story two-bedroom, and fell for the second one. (The others she identified as pet-friendly, affordable, and reasonably library-adjacent had nothing available, not even to show, until October, but we eyed them anyway, noting desperately, “It has a deck! It faces east!”) She signed the

lease the next day, scheduled the movers, and began building a Legoland of empty and full boxes for the older cat to flinch from and the baby kitten to gnaw.

Bob and I went down to help for a day, talking excitedly about how cool it would be for her to have a basement during derecho warnings. After an Iowa City appointment, we even drove up to inspect her still-occupied place. The bashed-in doorframe and neglected toys looked sketchy, but the agent had promised this one would be just as nice as the show home.

I spent a four-day weekend with her filled with packing, Panera, and panic. Facing up to the fact that we couldn’t possibly be ready on time, Claire received two extra weeks from her nice new employer and canceled the CR Airbnb she’d booked, for the gap between job start and move-in. We talked and talked. That part was great, a real balm for a mother’s soul when her firstborn no longer lives nearby.

By Sept. 16, I was back home, nervously awaiting her call as she entered her new abode. We connected as she walked in, giving me a play-by-play, our hearts sinking in unison. “Oh, Mom. It smells weird. They didn’t replace the carpet. This door is broken. The washer is rusted. The dryer exhaust isn’t attached. The sinks are covered in burn marks. The walls weren’t painted. The dishwasher—wait—won’t turn on.”

Claire is good in emergencies, like when her dad died and she booked me a free flight from her airport job to get her brother from college. She regrouped, casing new listings even before she drove home. I snagged the only pet-friendly Airbnb still available, down in North Liberty. I met her there two days later to look at another townhome. It was miles from her job, expensive, and lovely. She said “yes” to the two guys renting it, and we settled into our New Liberty digs. When she started work the next day, everyone there was sympathetic to her dilemma. (Thankfully, she loves her job.) A day later, she read the lease and balked. These guys were amateurs or swindlers, possibly both. Always read the lease, all 764 pages!

I made chili that night, tuna casserole the next—comfort food for a trying time. Five weeks into this quest and days before her old lease ran out, the movers agreed to put her stuff into temporary storage, thus doubling the price, but oh well. Bob and I drove down the night before—her bed, after all, was still there, along with the cliffs of boxes—to finish packing, clean what we could, and direct the nice guys with the great big truck.

On Claire’s second day of work, I found the perfect 2-BR 2-BA, pets welcome, pool and clubhouse included. She’d

rejected it early on as too fancy, i.e., costly, but desperate times call for expensive measures. The fact that I considered starting a GoFundMe is Exhibit A for the state of my scrambled mind by then.

Meanwhile, the condo in North Liberty was getting less habitable by the day. The patio door wouldn’t open, a closet door fell off, the kitchen sink backed up, and from the bathroom wafted the unmistakable odor of, yes, that’s sewer gas. After pleading with Airbnb Help, we decamped to an adorable mid-century modern bungalow in central CR that allowed two increasingly confused cats.

At some point, Allie made one last trek to Davenport to vacuum and bid farewell to her life there. At some point, Bob transferred her towering Ficus tree to

Dubuque and turned in her keys. At some point, the same super movers sprinted up and down the 20 steps to deposit her things at their final destination. I stayed on two more days—to recover, admire the woody view off the deck, and finish the ice cream Drumsticks that sustained us on our long journey. We hugged goodbye. Six weeks, three moves, and she’s home. ■

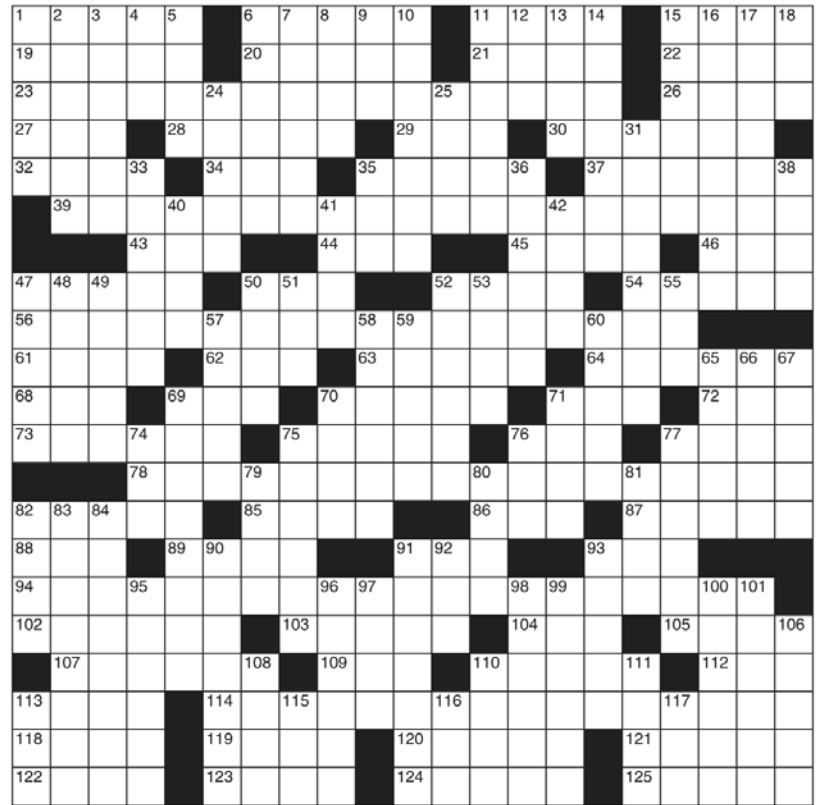

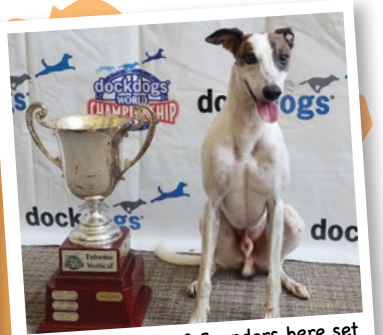
