Happy fall! Since we last talked, I've mostly been holding down my bed and my couch as I continue to heal from my lung cancer surgery. While there are some annoying, weird, fluttery feelings and coughing associated with the lung itself, it's clearly the broken rib they had to give me in order to access the lung that hurts the most. But at this point, it's more of a sore inconvenience than real pain.

You know what the real pain is? Let's not gild the lily... it's wiping my own butt. You'd think that's a small issue, but I assure you, when you can't do it with a broken rib and massive swelling on your side under your arm, it's a huge deal, a massive embarrassment, and causes you to plan carefully when leaving the house.

I thought about this in advance. While meeting with my excellent surgeon at Mayo a couple of days before the procedure, as my wife is asking astute medical questions about the surgery and recovery, my only question was, "Will I be able to do my own business?" you know, after. And with one swing of the ax to my ego, she assured me that I would not be able to. This is not good news.

Now, as you know, I'm a total genius. So this is why, in the car on the way home to Dubuque from the pre-op appointment, I went online and I ordered a super-fancy bidet toilet seat that attaches to my existing throne. And I must give super mega massive props to my friend and Jedi plumber Shaun "Gilly" Gilligan, who came to the house while I was at the hospital and masterfully installed that glorious device onto our toilet so it would be there for me when I finally got home from the hospital.

And "here for me" it was, and still is. Once you get a bidet seat and tell people about it, it's funny just how many people I apparently know who already have them and swear by them. Needless to say, it solved an issue that was weighing on me and also saved me from having to rush the healing issue. Call it a pride thing, or a guy thing, or maybe it's just a self-sufficiency thing. What it is now is a thing to not worry about. Best \$300 I spent all month! Well, I suppose the likely \$100,000 I spent on surgery to save my life was a pretty good buy too, but since insurance will cover most of that, I'll stick to the things that I can see on my credit card statement.

And this baby has all the bells and whistles. Hot water, heated seat. It even lights up the bowl for some reason, and there's a fan so, I guess, if you take your time, you can be all dried off before you get up. You can, um, aim it. You can even



choose to up the water pressure. They thought of everything. I'm telling you, if you have mobility issues or just like the idea of being squeaky clean, here's your next Christmas present to yourself. I got a Brondell LE99. Thank me later!

The only thing that gave me greater joy in recovery was my CPAP machine. I've had one for 25 years, and when they said I could not use it for a while after lung surgery, I had no idea how awful that would be. I didn't sleep at all for three nights in the hospital. Like, AT ALL. Each morning they came in and asked how I slept and I said, "I didn't," and they were like, "Oh, why not?" as if I didn't tell them the same thing everyday. It got so bad that I am convinced that my last night in the hospital was a detriment to my health, because of my total inability to sleep on my back.

So when I came home, I dialed back my CPAP machine pressure and used it earlier than I was supposed to. I was super careful and spent a while getting a feel to see if it felt wrong, and it only felt amazing. It was a saving grace and, I believe, the No. 1 tool I had for getting on the healing path. I never took the oxycodone they gave me. The pain was just mild. It was sleep that I desperately needed, and when I got it, it was so wonderful that it was practically an emotional experience.

You know what I didn't need? While sort of drugged up in the hospital, I watched *A Dog's Purpose* on TV. It's a story of a dog living multiple lives to find its way back to its original owner. So, yeah... the dog dies four or five times during the movie. What kind of cruel bastard makes a movie that kills the dog five times? And then lets a semi-lucid surgery patient watch it in the hospital?! Jerks. Oh, and there's a sequel, a *Dog's Journey*. Double jerks.

So now that you have way too much info, just know that I'm doing pretty good. My side is still very sore, and I try not to do things to make me breathe very hard, but I'm basically back at it and glad to be. Cancer-free in '23!





In his 20th year as a pastor, Drumwright is one of America's most promising rising public theologians and served a national following during the activism of 2020. Through his work as clergy to the George Floyd family during the Derek Chauvin trial, Drumwright found himself on the front lines of the call for justice when he and his followers were pepper-sprayed and jailed, three days before the 2020 elections. After being charged with two felonies and four misdemeanors, Drumwright and Justice 4 the Next Generation were unanimously cleared of all charges by a jury in a neo-confederate stronghold in the South.

Dr. Cirelli will discuss her current work as well as her future research plans.

Dr. Cirelli has published over 150 papers on sleep and received many awards for her original and sustained contributions to sleep research, including the 2017 Farrell Prize in Sleep Medicine from Harvard Medical School, the 2022 Pisa Sleep Award from Pisa University, and the 2023 Distinguished Scientist Award from the Sleep Research Society.

Vesperman Farms Fall Season

Now through October 29 Vesperman Farms (8149 Stage Rd, Lancaster, WI)

Vesperman Farms opened for the season early this year to meet customer demand for its landmark 20th anniversary year. Located at 8149 Stage Rd. just outside of Lancaster, WI, the fall season runs from now through Sunday, Oct. 29. Weekday hours are noon–7 p.m., Saturdays 10 a.m.–7 p.m., and Sundays 10 a.m.–5 p.m.

There are always new amenities on the farm, adding to a selection of choices that will make your head spin. If you and your kids can't find things that you like to do here, then you clearly don't know how to have a good time!

Okay, let's run down the options.

There are hay wagon rides out to the famous pumpkin patch where you can pick your own pumpkin. Or you can stop by the retail area for pre-picked pumpkins and gourds. The pumpkin cannon and trebuchet that get fired every hour are always fun to see. Kids can ride the popular ziplines, run up and down Tire Mountain, compete in duck races, ride the wagon train, and pose for scores of family photo ops against great backdrops all across the acreage.

Kyle Vesperman shared some of what's new for 2023 with us.

"We have taken one of our old grain bins and added stairs and decks. You go 15 feet up into the air, and the longest of three new tube slides coming out of the top of the grain bin is 40 feet long," he says. "I've wanted a slide for 10 years, and I finally got around to actually devoting the time and the energy and the money to build it, and we think that's gonna be just a huge hit, just like our zipline."

"We took another one of our grain bins, and we actually increased the size of our

corn box bin," Kyle adds. "So we took a 20-foot-diameter bin, and we put a foot of corn in that, so that'll be bigger, allowing more kids to get in and play in there."

Kyle continues: "It's all a part of a neverending goal to add more things for people to hang around and just kind of extend their visit at the farm. That's what the people want. You know, you give them 100%, they want 110%. We're just always adjusting to the crowds. And that's part of the appeal that gets people to keep coming back. People that literally walk out of that ticket barn and go, 'What's new this year?'"


The biggest new thing on the farm is the biggest investment they've ever made at the farm, and that is bringing a historic century-old round barn to the grounds.

A planned project since 2020, "People didn't quite grasp it at first," notes Kyle. It made a headlinegrabbing, three-mile journey across open fields to get to its new home.

"When we moved it, then people were like, "Oh, oh wow, that's really cool," says Kyle.

And though the barn made it to the grounds last year, this is the first year it is completed on its new foundation and open for visiting. Just walking in and looking up unveils a spectacle of classic carpentry.

"For the money I've got tied up in this barn," says Kyle (who notes he's invested \$120,000), "we could have built a much, much bigger building, but nobody would care. The Wisconsin State Journal would not come down. Nobody would have cared. When the Telegraph Herald posted it to the AP in February of 2022, the picture that those guys had taken with the drone of it crossing old Potosi Road, I mean, that was the picture that became the quirky news story that went all over the U.S. But I bet we could turn this into a heck of a lot of publicity that we would never be able to buy any other way."

And that's just what they got.
What's the main use of the barn now?
"Well," says Kyle, "we're gonna put
people in it. It's there to absorb extra
people on peak days. Our food area in our
big main event barn is now too small on our
really busy days, and that big, new kitchen
is already working as efficiently as possible. I'm hoping that this barn helps take
some pressure off. You don't want to have
people miss out on the great food available
because the line is long, so this will make
sure more visitors have quick, convenient
access to treats and more. But even if people get the food faster, we're out of seats."

Enter the round barn.

Kyle is looking for people to come play live music in the round barn on busy afternoons for a couple of hours.

"I've put a new food stand up there next to it with pretzels and nachos, pulled pork and mac and cheese, soda and more," he says. But most importantly, it gives a lot more seats for people to fill to eat, chat or just rest for a bit.

Live farm animals are always a huge reason to visit Vesperman. The goats, baby chicks, miniature horses, donkeys, baby calves, and kittens are always a big draw. And the whole farm itself is one big piece of country farm tradition to take in visually and physically.

No, we didn't forget the corn maze. One of the largest in the Midwest, it's always a marvel to see and then to attempt as a visitor. There's also a little corn maze for the smaller tykes. This year's 20th anniversary design is pretty fantastic from the sky, but can you find your way out from ground level? There's only one way to find out.

So much of the tremendous growth and fabulous new visitor amenities at

Vesperman Farms was designed to make the venue a year-round resource for the region. The giant dining barn also serves to host scores of weddings, parties, reunions, and meetings throughout the year. Being in a great farm setting makes for a wonderful backdrop for all of those events. It could also be a great change of pace for your company's next big gathering, too.

Speaking of the dining barn, we must not overlook the food. How could we possibly? The already famous homemade ice cream is featured, plus apple cider donuts, caramel apples, and kettle corn are seasonal must-haves. And thanks to the giant catering kitchen, you can also get burgers, hot dogs, and fries hot and fresh. It's all made there to-order including really good chicken strips from scratch. They also added soft pretzels, pretzel bites, and nachos this year. So, please, don't eat before you go, or you'll miss out on half of the fun of visiting Vesperman Farms. Maybe bring along a cooler to take home some of the already famous Vesperman Farms ice cream by the pint for sampling at a later date.

The whole farm is open and running at full steam every afternoon, but most amenities are also available everyday.

Says Kyle, "I've heard a few people say if their kids are out of school for an afternoon, they'll come up here because it's been so much nicer because they don't have to fight with any of the crowds. They might have to ask us to run the wagon train or fire a pumpkin, but we'll do it. If you see something that's not running and you want it to, you just ask us. We try to make sure we treat everyone the same. Whether it's one person or 20, we want to give the best experience. That's what we build this business for."

For Kyle Vesperman, this fifth-generation farmer, turning a few acres of land into a magical getaway for families is all in a day's work, and it really does deserve your visit. To keep up with all of the year-round activities of the multifaceted venue, Kyle no longer farms traditionally: just pumpkins and corn for the fall season using around 40 acres for his growing, for the parking lot, corn maze and activities, and then the rest of the 160 acres is rented out to a local dairy farm. That's actually super-helpful in the whole process as a partner. They not only chop corn to allow Kyle to have overflow parking, they also loan him larger farm equipment that he may only need a couple of days per year. That farmer also brings calves every year for six weeks to be part of the attraction.

Between all of the new amenities, upgrading, fixing and general maintenance of existing amenities, and the minutiae of things that spring up on an average day, it seems like Kyle's life from September through November is a constant series of 10 to 20 minute projects... about 10,000 of them, to keep Vesperman Farms humming on all corn-fed cylinders.

The growth has been stunning in the two decades that Kyle has pursued this dream.

"When we started in 2003, we were just open on weekends," he says. "And then as more cars started stopping on closed days, I saw that if I could just have a handful of cars stop in an afternoon, we could justify having a person there to serve customers. And then school groups started coming to the farm."

Fast-forward the years, and now they are open all day, everyday, and employ around 75 seasonal people every year. So you can visit the farm every single day from now until Oct. 30.

"We're hoping to see somewhere around 23,000 visitors here in the next six weeks," says Kyle. "On a good busy Sunday, if the Packers aren't playing, I think we hit around 2,800 people. That's amazing, considering Lancaster is a town of 3,900 or so."

Even with all of the great food available on site, they know they're causing upticks in business for other area businesses and eateries, from A&W to Yoder's on the way to Dubuque. Kyle doesn't claim to put Lancaster on the map, but a lot of people do know of the town because they've been to Vesperman Farms.

And when you become one of the area's top employers for a while each year, it doesn't hurt the word of mouth. The majority of the seasonal help works on weekends, and a lot of them are retirees and high school kids.

"It's a fun gig," Kyle says. "You're dealing with families. You're dealing with people who are here to have a good time. And so the customers are generally all in a great mood, and that makes the job a lot more fun."

Kyle doesn't know how much economic benefit he brings to the area, but certainly Lancaster's name recognition in the region has gone up because he is here.

"I mean, at least it's something, you know, otherwise we're just another little small town," he says, both humbly and proudly.

Admission is \$14.49 per person, and ages 4 and under are free. Day passes purchased online are just \$12.49, and season passes are available online for \$29.99. Parking is free. Birdie's Bistro

I think it's probably true that most people have a "Birdie" in their family, if not in name then certainly in spirit. "Birdie" is a cutesy nickname for Beatrice, Elizabeth, Bridget, and Bertha, so it spans many grandma names. I know I have a Birdie somewhere, though I'm having trouble remembering whereabouts she appears on my family tree. "Birdie" is kind of the relic saint of your family's culinary history. If you have a family biscuit recipe, it's probably Birdie's. If you have a sourdough yeast starter, Birdie probably started it. That Jell-O salad your mom would break out at potlucks? Birdie's recipe. Not one of her best.

Anyway, if you understand the concept of Birdie as an archetype, then you understand the concept of Birdie's Bistro. And you're going to love it.

Birdie's Bistro is now my favorite Texas toast diner. "Texas toast diner" is a term I just coined, feel free to spread it around. But you know what I mean,

right? Hearty food where Texas toast isn't the ONLY bread option, but it's kind of the default. The kind of place that only serves breakfast and lunch because the sun doesn't always shine during that time. You get it, right? Okay, now take that but make the food actually memorable. Oh! Did I just pinch your nipple?

Don't get me wrong, Texas toast diners almost always have food that's good. But it's not that memorable. I'm trying to think of a dish that sticks out as memorable from a Texas toast diner. I know I've had many a good meal at such places. I mean, duh. But right now, other than the newfound eats at Birdie's Bistro, the only dish that sticks out in my memory are the french fries with sausage gravy from a truck stop in my hometown. I'm going to remember Birdie's.

Here's what I'm going to remember:

The Mississippi Pot Roast Sandwich. This thing of beauty scratches so many itches. Got an itch for an Italian beef? With a slow roast of beef infused with savory herbs, au jus, butter, and pepperoncini, this thing is almost an Italian beef on sourdough. Craving a hot beef sandwich? This thing eats like a hot beef sandwich, but 'cept without the mashed potatoes and gravy. It's a wet sandwich to be sure, but get this: I took mine home and threw it in the fridge for a few days. close to becoming one of the many leftovers I never got around to. But I rolled the dice on it and damned if structural integrity was still pretty tight. Apparently their sourdough is a miraculous sandwich building material. You guys caught that "butter" is part of the pot roast recipe, right? Not sure if that's totally why this sandwich is so good, but it sure as hell can't possibly hurt.

I'll also remember the Cream of Mushroom with Sausage soup. Which was the soup of the day on our adventure. It's because I kind of filled up on this soup and the accompanying Texas toast that I had sandwich leftovers to begin with. I suspect that the preparation of this soup is just a continuation of the prep for their sausage gravy (more on that later), but that's just fine. Kind of brilliant, honestly. The mushrooms are legibly sliced mushrooms. I love mushrooms so much, you guys. And I love mushroom soup, too. Most people buy condensed cream of mushroom soup only to put in their casseroles. I do that too. Or I would if I didn't just keep eating it as soup. Just had a can for lunch yesterday, in fact. So the bar is set kind of low for me for cream of mushroom soup. You have me at "mushroom" no matter what. But then you make it absolutely dense with mushrooms and then have the courage to also be about sausage?

How many of my favorite things can you fit in a dish? Note: Mushrooms take up at least two slots in my top five favorite things. You know what? I'm calling BS on this soup. This isn't a mushroom with sausage soup. This is a mushroom with sausage chowder. Boom. Now go eat it.

I'll also fondly remember the Chicken and Biscuits. I know, I know. Chicken and waffles are kind of the hip thing these days. Look, I don't know what YOUR family "Birdie" was like, but I'd reckon she didn't often mess with a waffle iron. Not when you can prepare such good biscuits. We're talking two pull-apartable biscuits with housemade sausage gravy and topped with hand-breaded chicken. Turns out you CAN fit a few more of my favorite things in a dish. You know how sometimes a restaurant claims to hand-bread their chicken but then you look at it and you've never been more sure of anything in your life that this chicken came off the Sysco truck pre-breaded? No? Just me? Then don't worry about it. You certainly don't have to worry about it at Birdie's. Look, our respective Birdies weren't above a shortcut when it came to cooking for all those sons and daughters (YOUR aunts and uncles) but she'd never do that for guests. And you're a guest here. Prepare to be treated warmly like one.



CHICKEN AND BISCUITS

I'll remember the country potatoes. And I'll never forget them. I used to think that some culinary experiences were universal. For example: No matter how good coffee tastes, and it tastes amazing, it will always SMELL better than it tastes. Or that no matter how good country potatoes (also doing business as: home fries and American fries) are, they'll never be as good as french fries. My friends, I was wrong. The country potatoes at Birdie's taste better than most french fries I've had. I didn't get a chance to try their french fries, but the only way the universe will make sense again is if Birdie's french fries are even better than their country potatoes. They highly recommend their country potatoes, and you'd do the right thing by listening to them.

The bathrooms. So clean, you guys. Remember, this location has housed several restaurants over the years. Most restaurants like to start with an immaculate bathroom. So I'm guessing this bathroom hasn't been anywhere near sketchy for decades, if ever. Pee and poo freely.

In short, Birdie's is my favorite place for breakfast, and I'm certainly throwing it in the rotation for lunch. I've loved the food at every restaurant that has inhabited this location, and Birdie's continues the tradition and builds on it. You're going to love it.





In Bet the Farm, Beth Hoffman tells the intertwined stories of how she'd like farming to change and how farming has changed her.

"Our farm would become an ecological nirvana, with many different enterprises all working together but owned separately, creating jobs for many people along the way. The vision was ridiculously idealistic."


But let's not criticize her for having an idealized view of an undertaking before embarking on it. Don't most of us do that at times? Whether it's the unknowns of a new career or the mystery of a new relationship, it's often the potential of the thing that enchants us—and that's just fine. We like being seduced. It's how we roll. Reality sets in soon enough.

We are profoundly dependent on farmers, but most of us know little of their lives and work. "When Leroy [Hoffman's father-in-law] sold cattle back in the 1960s, customers spent close to 20 percent of their income on food, and farmers received almost one-third of that. Today, although Americans' incomes are much higher, they spend only 10% of it on food, and farmers receive eight cents for every dollar spent." We are spending less of our income on food—in spite of rising prices—and farmers are getting less of it.

Debt for farmers, like that for students, is huge and looms over the entirety of their lives. Their work creates just enough income to keep up payments on the loans. "I didn't really understand how financial problems exist not just for poor farmers in developing nations, or for a smattering of American farmers once in a while, but for the vast majority of them every year. I did not realize the amount of debt farms carry today—the average farm in Nebraska owes \$1.3 million..." And you thought your credit card debt was high.

How do they cope? "Behind every successful farmer is a woman who works in

town." A majority of a farm family's income is not made by farming. In order to make a living and make debt payments, farmers give up freedom. Their relationships with the big producers



of animals, seeds, or farm equipment seem always to result in maximizing profits for those companies while minimizing flexibility, profit, and time off for small farmers.

There are many communities within the community of farmers. The existence of each is evidence of a struggle against the way things are.

- SILT, the Sustainable lowa Land Trust. is for lowa farmers who want to help make land affordable for future farmers
- Landback encourages farmers to return land to Native Americans
- The Freedom Farm Cooperative started by Fannie Lou Hamer, helps African-Americans get into farming

Hoffman is particularly attuned to how our system, historically and currently, favors farmers of European descent. She draws our attention to it repeatedly, in different contexts, like someone mentioning the annoying whine we've been teaching ourselves to ignore. This is not to say that white farmers have it easy. White farmers struggle mightily, constantly. People of color are, more often than not, simply excluded. We're not talking cross burnings; it's mostly just delaying paperwork for needed loans. Passive aggressive stuff, all plausibly deniable. And loans (ergo debt) are the lifeblood of American farming.

Hoffman has the temerity to propose solutions to the systemic problems that plague farmers. This is not the safe option: as soon as you propose solutions, people will fly from the bleachers to tell you why you are wrong. Maybe this is why Americans have become so good at diagnosing and so bad at actually addressing problems that are begging for solutions, even imperfect ones. A reader gets the sense that ain't nobody happy with the status quo. Not farmers, not government employees, certainly not the animals, and unequivocally not the environment. Maybe bankers like it.

Erma Bombeck on the farm this is not. There are not a lot of laughs. This is more Barbara Ehrenreich, with an unflinching view of a systemic problem that, really, we ought to have addressed long before now.

Hoffman will be appearing at the Dubuque Museum of Art on Saturday, Oct. 28. If you care about eating, and farmers, get yourself there.



As for Borders, I can't even talk about it. I mourn it to this day.



Soul agents, as defined by a band known as Cross Canadian Ragweed, are individuals who feed communities, friendships, families, etc. with good. Bryce and Kristina fill our community with good. As the air begins to chill a bit, I find my mind drifting to December and the rolling plains of South Dakota. The prairies transform into a snow-covered tapestry that beckons late-season hunters from around the world. The land becomes a backdrop for a tradition—pheasant hunting. A tradition with my dad and our trusted English Setter, Annie. Pheasant hunting is more than a sporting event; it's a coming together of skill, luck, bonding, and irreplaceable memories.

South Dakota is known as the "Pheasant Capital of the World" for a reason. The mixture of farmland and prairies offers a fertile habitat for these vibrant birds. However, December brings with it a unique set of challenges and rewards. The snow might look nice, but it also makes it harder due to reduced visibility and increased physical exertion.

The dynamics between a dad and son reach new dimensions when bound by the rituals of hunting. My 76-year-old dad normally takes on the role of the experienced guide, imparting wisdom and tactical knowledge. In the quiet moments between the shots, when I stand beside my dad and watch Annie breathe visible puffs of air in the cold, I realize this is much more than a hunting trip. It's a pilgrimage, a tradition, and an unparalleled experience set against the stunning December backdrop of South Dakota's sprawling lands. It's very basic—much like the bonds we've created.

In the middle of the snow-covered plains, a distinctive scene unfolds as our hunt transcends the typical father-son outing. It is a poignant moment and the making of another cherished chapter. As we stood on the prairie, anticipating the moment, our eyes met, and an unspoken understanding passed between us. We both knew this could be our last hunting trip together, but neither of us needed to say it. When he takes his shot, skillfully and respectfully, it is as if time paused to acknowledge the culmination of years spent together.

We don't just bag pheasants; we bag a lifetime of respect and love. It is a bonding experience that I'll carry with me, a lesson in humility and the brevity of life. It serves as a vivid reminder that moments like these are the cornerstones of genuine relationships.

I hope to experience the snow-clad fields of South Dakota this December, flanked by my dad as we watch Annie work to find some birds. This isn't just a hunting outing; it's an exercise in living that is, simply put, incredible.
