Aside from moving out of our old Cable Car Square office, the calendar also rolled over to November, and that means Toys for Tots season has started, whether I wanted it to or not. I guess it's a magical date because without any prodding ,my phone started ringing, and my email blew up.

First, let me tell you that the new office in the Schmid Innovation Center at the Caradco Building in Dubuque's historic Millwork District is fantastic, so far. I kept waiting for that one thing we didn't think of to come back to bite me and make me regret the move, but nope. It's a wonderful space. In addition to my good friends who helped with the move, I want to give a shout-out to Errand Boys in Dubuque. They've done a few moving or labor-based jobs for me now, and every time they were stellar. The guys were nice, and they took to the task with enthusiasm, which I very much didn't have when thinking about cleaning out our basement.

When we moved to our previous office, we naturally moved a lot of stuff from the old larger office straight into the basement... and there it sat for a decade. I can't think of more than a handful of things I even unearthed from down there since we moved in. So naturally, if we were smarter than we are, we would have just thrown it all out or given it away during the first move. Instead, I have to hire a bunch of much younger, spryer guys to haul it all back up and to the dump. At least that which we could not give away.

I didn't even try to sell anything, I just gave most of it away to friends and businesses we work with a lot. I just wanted it gone, and gone it is!

So, we got moved, and then toy season dropped like a hammer. First off, we had to get donation boxes distributed across the land and thanks to Jeff and Paul, that job was accomplished. So, you can start filling them up for me! Next up, is the Toys for Tots Auction which went live on my Facebook Page tonight (it's Sunday for

me). That project is soooooo much work but also such a great boon to the program. After a week of bidding, we will likely raise close to \$25,000. And considering I did most of it all by myself, I consider it a big accomplishment. Making about 100 auction images and write-ups... and collecting the items that make up those 100 images is daunting to say the least. And if you go check it out online, consider that every item you can bid on is there because of the generosity of someone in the community. So, thank you to all of them and all of you.

The auction is live and will be open for bidding until 8 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 12 at facebook.com/Bryce365.

In addition to finishing the last of the auction items packages tonight, earlier today a stunning crew of volunteers converged on the toy warehouse to help me sort a literal mountain of toys that we've purchased or had donated since our summer sorting session. This time I thought for sure we bit off more than we could tackle in one two-hour session. But go figure, after 90 minutes, that crew made short work of that pile of toys, and it's now all tidy and packed in toy boxes so we can start delivering to distribution sites in just a few days. I want you to see what it looked like, so I might cut this column a bit short to print a bigger picture. Oh, and last night, I was honored to speak to the Dubuque Marine Corps League during their 248 Marine Corps Birthday Banquet at Happy's Place!

I would like to take one final moment to ask you to consider volunteering for a shift to help families "shop" for toys at the Multicultural Family Center this year. It's very easy and controlled. There are no lines. Everyone is there by appointment, and the shifts are only a couple of hours. With six slots per shift, you might consider getting a group or friends or co-workers together to cover a shift together and make it even more fun. Connie's decision to retire was a difficult one, but in August 2021, she and Stormy agreed the time for both of them had come—time for Stormy to take the reins and become sole owner, and time for Connie to hit the road and travel with her husband and their dog, Annie.

Opened in 2003 at 377 Bluff St.-on one side of what was Mississippi Mug House and above Mississippi Mud Studios, both owned by Ken and Mary Bichell—they represented approximately 40 local artists but soon grew to include regional artists as well.

In 2009, they moved to the main floor of 409 Bluff St. when local potters Rich and Liz Robertson bought the building.



They held bi-monthly artist receptions, and during the summer, they hosted artists on the porch shared their talent and techniques with visitors. There, they created The Great Draw Scholarship and Street Art Competition in 2011.

The gallery added a second location in 2014 on Galena's bustling Main Street which is also when Abby joined the team. In 2017, they moved the Dubuque gallery to its current location at the corner of 11th and Main Street in Dubuque.

OTLAG survived the 2008 crash as well as the 2020 COVID lock-downs and launched their online store, **shopotlag.com**, during COVID.

Since the beginning, OTLAG's mission was to provide authentic art to fit

all budgets. Over the years, they have sold thousands of fine-art and high-craft pieces created by the local, regional, and national artists that the gallery represents. Honor Flight of Dubuque and the Tri-States gives veterans a no-cost, once-in-a-lifetime tour to Washington, D.C. as a "thank you" for the service they rendered and the freedoms they secured for Americans as well as people around the globe, when


Since then, he has also chalked-up the No. 1 comedy album on iTunes with the

CAMARONES AL CHIPOTLE

Mixteca Grill & Agave House

Mixteca Grill & Agave House? What the heck is an agave house? I don't know either. My meager research turns up nothing. If it's a thing, it's beyond my ken. Officially, anyway. But with just a few context clues, however, we can clearly surmise that by agave... they mean tequila. Probably some other agave-based spirits too, but c'mon. We're all speaking the same language, and it translates to "tequila." Ergo, an "agave house" is a sheltered area where you can drink tequila. And let's just follow it to its natural conclusion. An agave house is a sheltered area where you can drink margaritas.

Oh! That got your attention, didn't it? At first glance, Mixteca seems like the cozy Mexican restaurants you love. Everything from the ice-cold margs right down to being told in no uncertain terms that the plates are very hot, so be careful. And if that's what you're in the mood for, then you've found your place. The food and the drinks are all excellent. It's very family friendly.

But I can't help but pick up that they kind of want you to party there, too. The bar is beautiful and very well stocked. And frequently featured on social media. And separated from the main dining room. Seriously, though. When you first walk in, it looks like there's about four tables and a huge bar and nothing else. But rest assured, there's plenty of seating. So

yeah! Bring your sloppy kiddos for some quesadillas. But also bring your sloppy friends out celebrating someone's promotion. Be responsible, of course, but aside from that, get on your margs, get set, GO!

Because the margs are good! And plentiful! The sizes are regular, jumbo, small pitcher, large pitcher. So... if you want... it can be THAT kind of night. Margaritas are about the only way I can drink tequila. Had a bad night of illadvised professions of love and pregnancy scares. Anyway, moving on.

So you get your chips and salsa like you do. Isn't it so comforting knowing they're on the way? You know damn well it's so that you'll order something to wash down the salty deliciousness, but so what? I'll walk into that trap willingly. They arrive at your table almost immediately after you sit down: a little tiny carafe of salsa to pour into a wee dipping bowl and deliciously warm and toasty corn chips. I've good things to report on the salsa front. It's not the thin stuff where you'd swear it's just from a can of spicy V8. Nor the superchunk version where it feels like you're eating half a raw onion with each chip. The texture is uniform, but not puree. It clings to your chip without having to scoop it. Unless you want to.

I'd be a fool to not get some guacamole to report to you folks. If you're a guacamole fan, you're in business here. It's not made for you right at the table or any such schtick, but it tastes like it was. Fresh and vibrant with the fattiness of the avocado. Nom! You'd think the serving size was too small for a table, but nope! Lots of flavor packed into that guac. It's perfectly portioned.

Next up, I got a trio of chorizo tacos. Chorizo, in case you've been culinarily asleep, is a type of Mexican sausage. I fell in love with it as a young buck working behind the meat counter at a Fareway. Now I make my own from time to time. And then try not to touch my own eyes for the rest of the day because gaaaaaaaah!

These tacos are of the street variety. No sour cream or other such supercillities. Just chorizo on a tortilla (I chose corn) with onions and cilantro (optional). The problem with corn tortillas is structural. Damn things fall apart so easily that most places double up on the corn tortilla. And if they skimp on the fillings, the whole ratio is out of whack. Somehow... I suspect alchemy... Mixteca made my tacos each with a single corn tortilla. And none of them fell apart in my hands. And I know they did something special because my entrée came with corn tortillas, and those were a bit more crumbly like I'm used to. I think they fry it up a little bit. Just a little. Not enough to make them hardshell, just to... I don't know... cure them? Tan them? Honestly, I don't know.

Shrimp is my favorite thing to get at Mexican restaurants. Throw the word "camarones" on a menu, and you'll catch my eye. It's as fun to say as it is to eat. I chose the Camarones al Chipotle (Chipotle Shrimp) because A. "Chipotle" is ALSO as much fun to say as it is to eat. And, B. Shrimp is so dang easy to overcook. So it was a good test for my purposes. If they don't overcook your shrimp, you can certainly trust them with your chicken or beef. Perfectly cooked shrimp just kind of bursts. Kind of. Know what I mean? Like, one second, it's this thing that has form and potential, and then you bite into it, and suddenly, all that potential is realized on your tastebuds, and that aforementioned form was merely something from which it yearned to be released. That was my experience at Mixteca. Perfectly. Done. Shrimp. And that chipotle sauce just opens things up in your nose and at the back of your mouth. Bringing flavors together that are smoky and tangy and earthy and briny. More, please.

And if that doesn't sound like the fajitas, burritos, enchiladas, etc. you're used to, don't be scared. All those classics are there in force. But even those can get fancy if you want. Take, for example, a fajita dish they call the Molcajete Special. It's skirt steak, chicken, shrimp, and onions served

up sizzling in a lava rock bowl... topped with Mixteca's special sauce, cheese, and avocado. You know how when you're at a Mexican restaurant and you say to yourself, "Who ordered fajitas?! That smells good!" That's not a question with the Molcajete Special. People are going to know who ordered that work of art.

As a more recent business to open, I trusted that the bathrooms would be new and clean. My trust was rewarded. Relieve yourself at ease.

All chewed and swallowed, Mixteca is immediately one of my favorite places for Mexican cuisine around these parts. In a parts where we have no dearth of good Mexican cuisine options. I can drink margaritas closer and therefore safer to home in Dubuque, but I promise you that the food is worth the trip.

John Wick filmmaker Chad Stahelski, who has been attached to direct a remake of the 1986 movie Highlander,



has confirmed that the remake will indeed feature the iconic soundtrack by Queen. Henry Cavill (*Man* of Steel) stars as the titular immortal warrior, and filming is looking to begin by next spring.

Gareth Edwards, director of the 2014 Godzilla movie, has given strong praise for the upcoming Godzilla



Minus One, Toho's 33'd Japanese-language Godzilla movie. Says Edwards, "This is what a Godzilla movie should be. It must be mentioned as a candidate for the best Godzilla movie of all time." Godzilla Minus One opens here on Dec. 1.

Filmmaker Michael Mann is looking to have a packed dance card. He's currently promoting the release



of Ferrari, he's busy writing a sequel to his 1995 crime saga Heat (which will be his next film), and now he's developing an adaptation of South Korean crime thriller Veteran. The film deals with the tyrannical heir to a mega-corporation whose wealthy family is able to buy the young man's way out of punishment for his crimes. A hardened detective won't let that happen this time.

Danny DeVito says that he and Billy Crystal are developing a follow-up to the 1987 crime-comedy hit



Throw Momma from the Train. According to DeVito, "Billy and I want to work together again. We were looking at possibly doing Throw Papa from the Train. And now Arnold [Scwharzenegger] and I want to work together."

Nearly a year before its release, the cinematographer of the *Joker* sequel, Folie a Deux, says the film



is in the final stages of production. Lawrence Sher notes that the movie is imitating the Francis Ford Coppola musical *One from the Heart* for its visual style. Lady Gaga joins Joaquin Phoenix in the movie, scheduled for Oct. 4, 2024.



What Would Jesus' Wife Do?

"Return to your longing. It will teach you everything."

Sue Monk Kidd, author of the beloved and best-selling *The Secret Life of Bees*, has written a novel about the wife of Jesus. In *The Book of Longings*, Ana's husband figures prominently, but this is her story. Familiar people and events of the New Testament appear in new contexts or connections. Judas, Herod, all the Marys, Martha, and Lazarus are here.

It is not an evangelistic tract, though it shares with devotional literature the stylized, formal language of believers. Like the heavily-mannered speech of high-society English novels, it's not how we currently talk with each other, but the reader gets used to it—if they even notice. Kidd's use of a mythic, theatrical style conveys respect for the old story and its devotees, even while she's riffing on it.

It can be instructive and entertaining, taking an old, familiar story and putting it in "new wineskins." One may respond to some episodes with, "*That's* not how it happened," or "Scripture never said that." These stories are very familiar, after all. Then you remember that some

commonly-held beliefs—e.g., how many wise men were there? Was Mary Magdalene a hooker?—are simply interpretations that are so traditional that they're rarely questioned. She provides some of her guiding ideas and principles in the book's afterword. For example, Scripture never says Jesus was married; nor does it ever say he was unmarried. Assuming that he was single is, well, an assumption. There are reasons for making different assumptions.

But Kidd's focus is Ana. She is the daughter of Herod Antipas's chief scribe, part of a wealthy and well-connected family. Like headstrong and rebellious girls of any era, Ana has dreams that conflict with the aspirations of her parents and the norms of her society. When her parents set her up with an older widower to be his second wife, she is... reluctant. She wants to chart her own path, develop her voice as a writer. Her first meeting with a young man named Jesus bar Joseph, a fellow Jew living under Roman occupation, makes an impression, and she seeks opportunities to see him again. She rejects the wealth and security of her privileged family when she decides to marry Jesus and become a part of his hardscrabble family. She sets aside her writing, too. Not because anyone asks her to, but because, when you are poor, you can't afford papyrus and quills, and the time to write is rare. There are chores. And crises.

As members of oppressed groups, Ana, Jesus, and their families suffer under their oppressors and hope for a liberator, a messiah. Kidd vividly depicts the difficulties of such lives: the way women are used by creepy men in power, the way they are subject to violence—and additional violence if they make a stink, the way they are excluded from the bounties

of society or exiled unjustly under false pretenses, and the way they bond together under these yokes. She also portrays the comfort and delight of being seized, even under oppression, in the sisterhood of women enduring the same long injustices.

The author's first responsibility is to tell an engaging story, and Kidd delivers. The Book of Longings is not pedantic. It invites dialogue with both the author and the original, canonical, stories from which hers is derived. The New Testament itself allows for at least four different narrators' versions of events in Jesus' life. And while some of the elements Kidd introduces are at least partly products of our own time, one virtue of classic stories is their ability to accommodate new applications for old lessons. The popular question, WWJD (What Would Jesus Do?), is an invitation to imagine him in novel situations and consider how he would respond.

Tweaking familiar stories can allow the reader to respond as if hearing the story for the first time. There's something deeply affecting about seeing the crucifixion from the perspective of women who had witnessed this brutality before, who knew from experience that this was an unjust yet likely result of resistance and non-conformity. One sees also through the eyes of the crucified, who felt abandoned by God,

but saw that he was not abandoned by the women who loved him, right up to the end.

This would be a great book for members of a women's Bible study group to read as a break (but not really) from Scripture. Readers won't agree with every choice Kidd makes, which is fine: She is opening up a dialogue, not making a case for a different authoritative interpretation. Different people respond differently to different situations. Perhaps as valuable, we learn that those who generally share our beliefs may still make other choices than we would in certain circumstances.

Readers interested in other reinterpretations of this story might consider the following:


- Two from Galilee and Three from Galilee by Marjorie Holmes (a Storm Lake native): imagining the relationship of Joseph and Mary, and Jesus' lost years.
- Three Gospels by Reynolds Price: an exercise in creating a single synoptic gospel, using the original gospels as sources
- The Second Son by Charles Sailor: what if a second son of God appeared? Not Jesus, but a new son for a new time.
- Lamb by Christopher Moore: an irreverent, delightful, yet still thoughtprovoking tale of the life of Jesus as told by his best childhood buddy.

Are You Ready for the Inevitable Transition From Fall to Winter?

As cold weather moves in, it is important to take a few preventative measures to protect your home. Winterizing isn't typically expensive to do and usually doesn't require much "handiness," but it can make a real difference once cold weather hits.

Here's a quick and easy Fall-to-Winter Checklist to ensure your home is ready for the bitter cold temps. Check these basic things off before the snow flies (again), you'll be saving yourself some hassle (and possibly some money, too!)

Fall-to-Winter Home Checklist

- Take care of your gutters. Fall foliage
 is beautiful but can cause problems
 over the winter months. Be sure to
 clean your gutters and remove all
 leaves from drains around the home
 (egress windows, gutter pipes).
- Make sure your furnace is ready to turn up the heat. Test your heating system so you know it will work when you need it. Make sure you replace the filter and set up the humidifier.
- Prep your pipes. No one likes dealing with frozen pipes that burst. Be sure to disconnect all hoses from outside faucets and turn off the water to prevent that from happening.
- Don't forget your irrigation system. Before it gets too cold, make sure you blow out the irrigation system so it is ready for spring.
- Prepare your AC to hibernate until spring. Before you cover your air conditioner for the winter months, turn the disconnect to the off position on the exterior of your home.
- 6. **Don't wait—Get your winter supplies now!** It's always a great idea to get your winter supplies now before the frigid cold

temps hit and several feet of snow pile up. Tune up the snowblower. Grab your salt, shovels, hats, and gloves. And make sure you have a portable heater, extra power pack, and generator handy, just in case.


A few more additional items to check:

- Check your fireplace. Animal nests in your fireplace can be hazardous.
 Conduct an inspection before building your first fire of the season so things go smoothly all season long.
- Weatherproof (especially if you own an older home). Weatherstripping or installing storm doors and windows will prevent cold air from entering your home or heat from escaping it, which may reduce your power bills. Caulk around windows and use foam outlet protectors to prevent cold air from entering your home.
- Protect your plants. If you haven't done so already, you'll want to get the plants and flowering trees inside before the next cold snap.
- Bring in the outdoors. Cold temperatures, snow, and ice can damage outdoor furniture and grills. If possible, store them in the garage or in the basement. If you have a gas grill with a propane tank, close the tank valve and disconnect the tank first. Clean and cover your grill before putting it away for the season.

While it may not quite seem like the end of fall and the start of winter, we all know that the temps can drop rather quickly and fluctuate drastically over the next several weeks. I don't know about you, but we are doing these things now while it is still fairly mild outside, so we are prepared when the low temps become consistent through the end of the year and into the new year.
