And that is exactly what happened. I am apparently just finishing the second year of my three-year contract renewal, and thus I owe them \$1,000 for ending the service early. I understand that it was a contract and they can bend me over whatever barrel they like, but it's just bad business, in my opinion. What way is that to treat a longtime customer? And along those lines, I have Mediacom at home as well. Well, I did anyway. I'm changing to ImOn now, purely out of spite. They can take their \$1,000 pound of flesh, but they're also losing what, \$2,500 or so per year in billing to my home? So kiss that goodbye. And if anyone else in our office switches, that's another \$2,500 a year gone from their coffers per angry person changing their athome service. So Mediacom, you do your thing and trigger my thing, and now you lost way more money than you would have if you'd have had some compassion, or just plain old respect for longtime customers.

And then there was the saga of moving the 365ink office number to ring to my cellphone. What a mess! After getting my account number and PIN for my Mediacom account, I had to contact Verizon and provide them the info to begin the process. Ten minutes later, the nice guy who helped me said it was all taken care of, and in 24 hours it would all switch.

Guess how well that worked? When I called 26 hours later, that service agent could not even find any changes made to the account. Why was I not shocked? After two transfers, I got a guy who sounded like he was calling from the floor of the



stock exchange. He said in broken English that there was a birthday party happening behind him. A comedy of epic proportions ensued and as I talked to the guy, Kristina, who was sitting across from me in the *365* office, was holding back laughter listening to me try to communicate with this person.

He kept confusing which number I was porting over and which was my existing cellphone number. And then he told me to turn off the phone I was porting to and I was like, "Um... I'm talking to you on that phone." He asked me to do this three times over 10 minutes. A couple times he said, "Can you start over and tell me what we're trying to do?" Insert massive eye-roll and rage-calming exhale here. And then during pauses, he started asking me weird questions. "Oh, you have an iPhone 12, that's a very nice phone." And I was like, "Doesn't everyone have this or better?" "What's your favorite Apple product?" "Have you checked out this service or that?" I finally stopped him and said, "Can we just move the phone number and stay on task?" Rude, I know, but this was getting crazy.

It was a good 30-minute call, and at the end, he could not fix anything. He then said he needed to transfer me to another department to change a thing he was unable to before he could then help me. The new person immediately understood what I wanted to do, fixed it all in five minutes, and everything was great. But that middle guy was the most bizarre customer service call of my life. But at least **563-588-4365** still works. Get it, "588 FOR-365!" I'm so clever, it's disgusting.

Lastly, let me thank every business that donated to my annual Facebook auction for Toys for Tots and all of those great people who then bid generously on the items. We raised \$25,000 in just a few days, and now we're working frantically to get over 100 auction packages out to the winners and collect payment. This whole auction is so much busy work but clearly worth it. So, we just hunker down and git-er-done. And now all we have to do is get over 20,000 toys out to 5,000-plus kids in four counties in the next 30 days. No problemo!







She opened Goldies, a private, appointment-only studio to create an intimate experience to be tattooed. Her style uniquely pulls from a mixture of Japanese, traditional, and illustrative tattoo styles. Golides is not only for tattooing but also a place to hold space for other artists. It is a space that has been curated by collecting unique pieces open to everyone.

That's very much not the case. And even many of the traditionally spicy dishes can be ordered at lesser levels of heat. Boom. Disclaimed.

I'm super excited about Versus getting their brick-and-mortar on. Due to their popularity, the lines at the Versus food truck are often prohibitively long. The food is undoubtedly worth the wait, but I don't always have time for waiting. I'm sure you can relate. Now I can have a sit-down meal from one of my favorite food trucks. Life is good.

There's still some artifacts left from the old supper club. I didn't see the model train running, but the track is still overhead. And I'm guessing the salad bar was included in the sale of the property because it's a proper little supper club salad bar. And don't worry, there's nothing scary there on the salad bar. The lettuce might include some romaine instead of all iceberg, but other than Thai peanut being one of the salad dressing options, you're safe. Daddy won't let anything bad happen to you. Coward.

The apps. The menu stressed that we must try the chả giò, and so we did. Two orders. We're not cowards like you. But seriously, if there's more than two of you, get more than one order. One will not be enough. Oh! Are you going to let a little foreign culinary term like "chả giò" scare you? Calm down. It's just egg rolls, fool. And Versus' egg rolls have won awards, yo. If you're still a little cowardly, you can just eat the egg roll like any other egg roll. If you want your damn mind blown, however, you'll wrap that egg roll in the provided lettuce leaf along with various fresh and pickled veggies and housemade nước mắm (a kind of fish sauce) and eat it that way. So damn good. There's three to an order. Unless you're not going to share, it won't be enough. Two orders. Maybe three.

Continuing with the apps we tried, I'd like to give you a bit of advice. I know that "bulgogi," though gaining acceptance around these parts, is probably new and scary to your cowardly sensibilities. My advice is this: If you ever see anything "bulgogi" on any menu... order it. Seriously. It's Korean barbecue,

usually beef, and if you think the good ol' U.S. of A. is the only only good player on Team Barbecue, you're not watching the whole game. You're just getting the local highlights. And you're a coward. Can't stress your cowardice enough. Anyway, you've probably had and loved cheese fries. You've probably veni vidi vici'd some delicious chili fries. Just you wait until you try bulgogi beef fries. When you think "bulgogi," think teriyaki beef, but chopped up and even better. Yeah, that sirloin is nice and bulgogified, but almost everything else on this friendly monster of an appetizer are things you already know and love. The gochujang cheese sauce might stump and scare a coward like you. Gochujang is a Korean flavor that's really gained traction in the States over the past decade. Maybe you've never heard of it, but you've probably had it in some Asian cuisine without even knowing it. Just focus on the words "cheese sauce," and all will be nice and safe. Everything else you've heard of and like. Plus... it's fries. There's probably a topping that doesn't go well with fries. But I haven't found it yet.

The entrees.

Look, coward. I'll make this really easy on you. If you don't want to get anything spicy or anything too "out there" flavorwise, I highly recommend the kare raisu with tonkatsu. That's a Japanese curry with a pork cutlet. People often see the word "curry" and think "spicy." Oh, sure. It CAN be spicy. It often IS spicy. But that's not a defining characteristic of a curry. There's so many kinds of curry, it's difficult to define in general, but spicy is NOT definitive. If you're afraid, try thinking like this, you coward: When you think of "curry," don't think "spicy." Think "stew." That's it. It's a stew. Just like chili is a stew and is often spicy. And the kare raisu at Versus is a perfect example to get this across. The first word they use in their menu to

describe the kare raisu is "hearty." And they ain't kidding. So rib-stickingly hearty with potatoes and carrots and a big ol' panko-breaded pork cutlet that you can easily cut with a fork. Not spicy AT ALL. If anything, it's a little sweet. Just a little. Curries can be like that, too. It's okay. Nobody is going to make you do anything you don't want to do here. This dish is base. If you want to be safe, stay on base.

Oh, but then things get a little more interesting with gai pad med mammuong. Just kidding. It's just Thai cashew chicken. You like cashew chicken, right? You know what cashews are, and you know what chicken is because you are one so you should be fine. Think of all the cashew chicken you've had and enjoyed. Versus' Thai version isn't too far from what you're familiar with. Stir-fried chicken and vegetables with crunch cashews. Duh, right? But the Thai twist is there and worth exploring. But certainly not worth fearing. Unless you're a bigger coward than I originally feared.

Stick with these two dishes if you're afraid or are just having your tastebuds spar against Versus 2.0 instead of putting them in a fully sanctioned fight. If you want the heat, the heat is there, and it ain't hard to find.

But I want to make you feel safe and cozy, coward, because I want to spring something on you that was almost out of our comfort zone. And there's not much we won't eat. I don't like beets that much. Other than that, game on. I want to talk to you about dessert. I want to talk

to you about Mommy Ning Ning's Maja Blanca. It's a Filipino coconut pudding. Sounds good, eh? It is, but... let me walk you through it. It's a pudding, but more of a gelatin consistency. But without the gelatin flavor. Creamy like a pudding, too.

If you like the flavor of coconut but not the consistency, you might like this dish a lot. But there's a surprise. It's not the caramel sugar sprinkled on top. No. It's the whole kernels of corn throughout Now come on. This is the Midwest. You're going to let CORN scare you, of all things? I mean, I kind of get it. What the hell is corn doing in ANY dessert, let alone a coconut dessert? It lends sweetness and texture to it. And a fun texture, not a nasty texture. You know what corn is like. Prepare to taste how corn CAN be. Compared to the creaminess of the pudding, the corn kind of bursts on your tongue. I don't know why it works, but dammit it just works.

Versus 2.0 itself just works. It's their flavors versus your tastebuds. And if you're really that much of a coward, they know how to go easy on you.





# What Would Jesus' Wife Do?

Karen Armstrong wrote *The Case for God, A History of God*, biographies of Muhammad and Buddha, *Twelve Steps to a Compassionate Life*, and many others. A former nun, she said in an interview 20 years ago that she is "not interested in the afterlife. Religion is supposed to be about losing your ego, not preserving it eternally in optimum conditions." She is unconventional. She is a meticulous researcher who offers what she has found (in sometimes obscure tomes) to readers who wonder and ask questions.

In Sacred Nature, now out in paperback, Armstrong considers how religions past and present have understood the relationships between Humanity, Nature, and the Divine. This is no environmentalist jeremiad: Armstrong offers a range of options to consider when trying to understand how these three might best work together.

In some religions, there are no creation stories, no creator deities. Mystery is found in Nature—as children and scientists in our own culture know—and devotion and spirituality are a matter of studying the Tao, Buddha Nature, and Qi as others study Torah and the Bible. What are these Laws of Nature, and how do we participate in them? The Divine is "an inexpressible but dynamic inner presence that flows through all things." It is not a creator separate from its creation. (In a similar vein, Christian theologian Thomas Aquinas said "God was not a Being, but Being itself.") The natural is the conduit for the Divine; there is no concept of "supernatural."

In Hebrew scripture, Nature was separate from Yahweh, someplace the deity might occasionally visit. The Divine was experienced in human events. In Hebrew and Christian stories, when Nature revealed the Divine, it was because Nature was doing something bizarre, abnormal, against its own laws. A bush burns and speaks; a lake splits to reveal a path of dry land; men rise from the dead (not as zombies; different book); a man walks on water, restores sight to the blind, etc. Nature's laws are not the last word, in other words. If the deity wants to communicate, it does so by hijacking Nature, rather than being revealed in Nature's normal operations.

Having a creation myth means you're volunteering an explanation for how the world came to be, and in some cases, positing a separation between the deity and what they created. Not having a creation myth implies that either the world is and always has been, or that the question has no meaning or importance. In a fascinating examination

of the book of Job. Armstrong

suggests that the Bible contains another viewpoint that is called the Wisdom tradition.

The Wisdom tradition looks at Job's agony through a different lens. "This is unfair to me" is anthropocentric; the Wisdom tradition urges Job to change his view and look, not at himself, but at Nature, and how suffering and pain are just the way things work around here. People, plants, and animals have a choice to either thrive in those conditions—and they do—or to whine that life isn't fair. The deity is not our guarantee of fairness in an unfair world. Job learns this by a divine revelation about the sacredness of nature, just as it is.

"By rationalising nature and confining God to the heavens, we have so drastically reduced the divine that for many it has become incredible or imperceptible." If we exile the Divine and make Nature merely a backdrop to human affairs, we make evidence for the Divine less immanent and more abstract. We make the Divine more remote.

In contrast, "...one of the chief objectives of the Qur'an was to awaken within Muslims an awareness of the divine presence in creation." The Qur'an identifies Nature as Allah's prime miracle. "Muslims are far more impressed by the regular rhythms of nature than by the supernatural miracles celebrated in the Jewish and Christian scriptures, because in the Qur'an the natural order is the revelation of divine power and wisdom." Early on, Muslims viewed the natural sciences as sacred, akin to devotional reading and contemplation.

Armstrong discusses religions that center sacrifice in their rituals; the place of the self—is it to be elevated and saved, or transcended?—and how we are related to Nature and the Divine; the Golden Rule, first articulated, so far as we know, by Confucius, and how widely it should be applied; and much more, from both familiar and remote sources.

In the West, these questions arise urgently in diverse views of Nature in a time of climate crisis. Is this separation of humanity from both Nature and the Divine serving us? Some religious folks minimize the concerns with the climate, as they believe Jesus will return soon and bring with him a "new Heaven and a new Earth." Meanwhile, other religious folks have found in their scriptures evidence of a mandate, not so much to dominate, but be good stewards of, Nature. Karen Armstrong's readable, surprising observations may either confirm your views, or send you on a guest for better ones.

Either way, tend your garden; you never know who you may find there.





## The Green Bean Casserole Stays on the Table

Ah, the holidays. We all know what we mean by that—not Veteran's Day, not the 4th of July, not even Easter. What we mean is the march from Halloween straight into Christmas, with a major stop at what I call "Turkey Day," and the rest of the country calls "Thanksgiving." This is especially ironic because, in our house, I have roasted a turkey approximately zero times. Chicken, yes. Brilliantly roasted chicken, showered in lemon juice. strewn with fresh garlic and kosher salt, shoved into a blazing 425-degree oven and taken out, sans any kind of fussing or basting, with a shatteringly crisp skin and both white and dark meat cooked to tender, moist perfection. And get this—it takes one hour for one or two three-lb. birds.

This recipe came to me via a magazine whose title is lost to the ages and whose torn-out glory is yellowed by time and more than a few errant lashings of juice straight from a freshly squeezed lemon. It is a classic in my house, though probably not in yours. And that is the point. What matters—what absolutely must be on the table by 2 p.m. on the fourth Thursday of the month each and every November—varies by household but is all too often the stuff of high drama should someone decide to Try Something New.

So I don't. Earlier this month, I sat down to draw up the menu for the big day, and after I had done so, I wondered why on earth I'd bothered. It is the same every year. First, the roast chicken, usually two so we all get some dark meat and some light. Next, and only because I want it, a green bean casserole. While I dutifully saved a "New Healthy Take" on this staple, using fresh beans, bechamel-portobella sauce, and freshly sauteed onion rings, I just sigh when I see it. Come on, people! GBC was invented by Campbell's, and it's just wrong to not open a can, or two, or four, because even though we eat fresh beans, either lightly steamed or not-so-lightly roasted, every other month of the year, there is something special about canned green beans.

I grew up eating canned veggies, and I know they are a pale shadow of their original crunchy selves. Canned corn is awful, canned peas surely a different species from fresh or frozen. I grew up thinking I despised beets, only to discover not all that long ago, that baking them yields a sweet, earthy flavor unknown to their diced, watery cousins. But please. You need canned beans for Green Bean Casserole, and that is that.

Even better, I bake the GBC in loan's (my mom's) vintage bluestone dish, a breakable inheritance that has survived 50 years or more and brings a smile to anyone who remembers it.

What else? Rolls. Many dozens of rolls, and they must be Pillsbury crescent rolls, which I suppose is meant to evoke actual French croissants. I have made croissants from scratch, and I know how much work goes into them—folding and buttering, folding and buttering—but I also know that the kids at the table, by whom I mean my husband's 42-year-old son and my 45-year-old daughter—prefer crescents from a refrigerated container, the one you have to press with a spoon to release from its vacuum. Spoon to package and pop!—now there's a Thanksgiving tradition!

Which brings me to another ritual dish, and a parting of the ways. I love cranberry sauce, the kind made in about five minutes from fresh berries, water, and sugar. I love how they snap as they heat, and how tartly sweet they are with a bite of chicken. The kids, however, were raised on what *The Simpsons* dubbed "Cranberry Sauce à la Bart," from an episode featuring this boy cranking a can opener and sliding the round of jelly out onto a serving plate. In my house, it's Mom's cut-glass dish which comes out only on this day of days. So we have both kinds.

Sides? No one at our house cares for sweet potato casserole, with or without marshmallows, so we have potatoes. Plain potatoes, with butter and salt and pepper, no gravy. I have made gravy in the past, using chicken drippings, but it's not worth the trouble, and it never tastes like the kind Mom made. I grew up on three-part dinners: 1) canned vegetables, 2) meat, 3) potatoes, the potatoes were always smothered in gravy. Chicken gravy, beef gravy, pork chop gravy, liver gravy, in descending order of flavor. In college, I once attempted to make chicken gravy after oven frying a batch, and forgot to water it down a bit. It came out like delicious chicken fritters. My boyfriend and I ate them up, but whoa, talk about too much.

I am alone in my love of Iona's dressing, a concoction of creamed corn, celery, and crushed saltines and no sage—but sometimes pop a mini-portion into the toaster oven, just for me and my memories.

What about dessert? Here I break with pumpkin tradition, pulling out the big knife, the cutting board, and a bag of whatever apple best resembles the Jonathans of my youth. It's hard work, don't let anyone tell you otherwise. I cook the apples first, adding cinnamon and bit of vanilla, before sinking them into a generous pie crust that I no longer make from scratch. (Where would Thanksqiving be without Pillsbury?)

So there you have it—you've got your sugar, your veggies, your bread, your piquant sauces, and your perfectly roasted bird, complete with wishbone for breaking. That's our tradition. Even if I'm the only one craving it, the Green Bean Casserole is staying on the table.

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




