

It is, without question, the busiest week of my year. While I'm often busy, this is the time of year when many of my days are scheduled down to the hour. And yes, it's mainly due to Toys for Tots. It's really a juggling game, as I have to essentially get about 20,000 toys out to four counties in five days and still make this newspaper.

The first trick in making that happen is totally relying on Kristina Nesteby to basically make this issue without me. Bless her little heart. (Even if that spoiled punk is doing all of that work from the warm confines of Los Angeles this week.) Either way, without her carrying the brunt of the paper burden this week, I'd never make it to the finish line on toys. After all, the toy's finish line is not flexible. It has to happen, and it has to happen now.

I'm writing this, or at least the first part of this, on a Saturday night sitting on my couch after a very full and fulfilling day. We were up at the crack of dawn today to get to Theisen's for another full day of Stuff the Truck madness. We've been doing this special event for 14 years now, and it's always a big boon to the program, but sometimes it can be a cold, merciless slog. Not this year. It was a darn near balmy 40 degrees, which is like a tropical paradise compared to, say, 4 degrees. So I'll take it. The Marine Corps League was out in force waving down traffic along Dodge Street most of the day, and we were collecting toys and money right out in front of the store. We indeed filled the entire length of our Runde Chevrolet box truck. Just amazing generosity from the Dubuque community, our hosts at Theisen's, and the crew of Radio Dubuque, especially Rob Anglin, who does a lot of work behind the scenes to make not only this event a success, but helps the toy program out in many ways as well.

Tomorrow we're back at it on a Sunday morning, sorting thousands of toys and packing them for distribution throughout the week. A great volunteer crew makes short work of a mountain of toys. This is one of the few times when a lot of help from many people is needed for a short time, and it's so vital to our success.

Speaking of volunteers, the crew at the Multicultural Family Center in Dubuque, led by Sarah Petersen, puts on the best toy distribution event I could possibly hope for. In addition to a wonderful toy display and a superbly managed plan to get so many families helped as efficiently as possible, there is a second group of volunteers here that are as critical as our toy sorters. Over 160 individual volunteer time slots over three weeks at the distribution event need to be filled in order to reach our goal. This year, with just a simple group email to last

year's volunteers, we filled 95% of those slots without having to beg, borrow, or cajole. What a stress reliever. My biggest thanks to our most die-hard volunteers, Paul and Sandy Meyer. Paul is also the creative master who is building us our new Santa throne to be unveiled at next weekend's ginormous kids party at Five Flags.

But first, I have to get those 20,000 toys delivered. So, Monday we will load the box truck to the brim with a huge toy load for Western Dubuque County on Tuesday. Then, to Galena for a big, wonderful toy drive dinner at Fried Green Tomatoes that would make your head spin. They really know how to throw a party! Then, on Tuesday, we actually deliver those toys to West Dubuque and come back and reload the truck for a trip to St. Olaf, IA, in the middle of nowhere in Clayton County. St. Olaf also happens to be home of the biggest pork-T I've ever had... and soon will have again (insert evil laugh here). Then home to load the truck again for a Thursday run to Lancaster, WI, for the Grant County Holiday Project. This includes an important trip to Zippy's Brass Rail for burgers (but Yoder's in Rockville has those amazing fried mushrooms—you MUST try them!) We'll hop from there to Platteville to pick up pallets of toys from Farm & Fleet and home to unload. And Friday, we load ALL of the supplies and goodies into Five Flags for Sunday's kids party. In between that, insert 20 or so smaller missions to accomplish before we pass out each day. Yeah, we got this!

After that Dec. 10 party, my life gets a lot easier, but we're still not done. But it does mean the end of the road is in sight! My knees actually still feel good this far into the season and so does my back. So that's another double-win.

And next issue, I'm going to tell you all about my new-to-me Toys For Tots pickup that we found waiting for us by the side of the road in Canton, MN, over Thanksgiving weekend. Dad's storied Chevy needs to be retired, and that's hard to admit, but Dad would love this new bright red Ford F-150 to get us through another 15 years of this.







Lorrie Morgan, the first woman in her genre to begin her career with three consecutive Platinum albums, is known for her lustrous vocal phrasing and the down-to-earth believability of her torchy performances. She is a peerless song interpreter, drawing from a deep personal well that spans

enormous tenderness to cheeky hutzpah. Whether covering a classic or sharing one of her own songs, Morgan is truly a song stylist in the grandest tradition.

She has been a daughter, a bride, a mother, a divorcee, a widow, a single mother, a breadwinner and, ultimately, a survivor. In many ways, Lorrie is a living, breathing country song, and she knows what she sings.

Lorrie Morgan has been around great songs all her life. She is a Nashville native who is the daughter of Country Music Hall of Fame member George Morgan. She made her debut on the Grand Ole Opry stage at age 13, singing "Paper Roses." Her father died suddenly of a heart attack at age 51. She was 16 at the time and just beginning her musical career. Lorrie Morgan began making her own records shortly thereafter and was inducted into the Grand Ole Opry at just 24 years old.

Morgan married fellow country singer Keith Whitley in 1986. She was signed to RCA Records in 1987, and her onslaught of hits began the following year. Whitley's tragic death of an alcohol overdose in 1989 left her a widowed working mother. Their duet "Til a Tear Becomes a Rose" earned her a 1990 CMA award.





Gyro Hub & Mediterranean Grill

I'm just going to cut the crap. If I and/or friends can't decide where to order from, the default answer is going to be Gyro Hub & Mediterranean Grill. They've got something for everybody as well as things you can't get anywhere else in Dubuque. Yes, they have gyros, and their gyros are not to be missed. But there's one thing I'm sure many of you are aching to hear, so here it is: Dubuque has a new place to get Indian food! I repeat! Dubuque has a new place to get Indian food! And that's not all, yo. Every time I look at their one-page menu I snagged from there, I keep saying, "Oh, man! They got that, too?!" Seriously. I just looked again and saw that they have Italian beef. I guess this is a Mediterranean grill, and Italy is on the Mediterranean. But Philadelphia isn't anywhere near the Mediterranean, so how can you explain a Philly Cheesesteak on the menu?

I explain it this way: They downloaded a list of the things I crave the most directly from my brain and made a menu out of it. I mean, they have chicken gizzards listed as a side! Chicken gizzards! I know other people besides me crave chicken gizzards. But I haven't known any other such people since my dad died. And he doesn't even eat chicken gizzards anymore.

But the main point I want everyone to take away from this is that glory be! Dubuque has a new place to get Indian food! The menu is about as multicultural as it gets, what with listing said Indian food under the heading "Pakistani & Indian Food" but that just makes it even better! Dubuque has a new place to get Pakistani and Indian food!

The vibe is as eclectic as the menu. Bright, contrasting colors on opposite walls augmenting the cleanliness of the dining area and prep stations. It looks kind of sports bar-ish. But oh! What's that on the TV behind the counter? Some kind of sporting event? Nope! It's a news feed from Mecca showing thousands of Muslims making the Hajj. Italian beef. Philly Cheesesteak. Gyros and shawarma. Chicken gizzards. Pakistani and Indian food. Live broadcast of the Hajj. As someone nearly three-quarters Scandinavian, I am offended that MY culture didn't make it onto this menu. Every other culture has. I'm kidding. I like lutefisk, but asking others to like it is asking too much.

And I know what you're thinking. You're asking, "But Mr. Fairchild. With all these different dishes from all these different traditions... how can ANY of them be done well?" We can do this because this is America. And in THIS country, we don't discriminate against a culture's cuisine! Just the people! And okay, sure... sometimes we discriminate against their cuisine, too. I mean how much are you willing to pay for a fine dining experience? Oh, I forgot to mention! The fine dining experience is Mexican cuisine. Does that affect your price at all, you bigot? Anyway. We live in a country where this menu is possible. Oh, you want chicken? 2 piece? 12 piece? 20 piece? Oh, you specifically want wings? You can get as many as 35 for \$34.99. That's a buck a wing, partner! What's that? You've been craving some good fried okra just like downhome? Come get some at Gyro Hub! Watch the Hajj while you're there!

Now let's get down to flavor. It's called first and foremost Gyro Hub, so I had to try me a gyro. They give you the makings, and you can construct it however you want. I got all the usual suspects, including tzatziki. In Dubuque that means lettuce, too, but whatevs. What's good is good. It's some of the best tzatziki I've had around these parts. Or any parts, really. It tastes delightfully fresh and bright. And the strips of gyro meat are loooong, oftentimes extending beyond the width of the pita. And you get to see the gyro and shawarma meat rotating and being carved. They use one of those little handheld shavers that looks almost like a tiny iron but it's actually more terrifying. You know those big spinning blades used to slice cold cuts and cheese? Those gyro shavers are like that, but 'cept in handheld form. And that's just terrifying to me. It looks like something my dad would use to shave his back. Ha, ha. Just kidding. My dad doesn't have a hairy back. Not since they cremated him, anyway.

Sorry. Went a bit dark there. But I'm talking looooong, thin strips carved off spinning cones of meat. The thinness is important in gyros and cold cuts because it allows for air pockets that aerate your food as you chew it. I have no scientific evidence to back this up. I just know that thinly sliced sandwich meat tastes better on a sandwich when it's individually loosely folded. And that's why you need special equipment to slice gyro meat so thin instead of hacking off a big chunk of it.

The meat is so flavorful, and watching it being shaved from the cone is such a treat as long as I don't think about the accidents that could happen with that little death slicer. And the pita! Oooooh, yes! I know that it seems counterintuitive to have a flatbread that is yeast-leavened. But that's what pita is. And the pita at Gyro Hub is light and almost fluffy. Definitely fluffy as far as flatbreads go.

From the Pakistani & Indian menu, I ordered butter chicken and the shish kebab.

I ordered butter chicken because it's what I often order, and it's the Indian dish I make the most. So, I felt most qualified to judge it. But if you're looking for your chicken biryani or your chicken tikka, or even your palak paneer. Gyro Hub & Mediterranean Grill has you covered. And if the butter chicken is any indication, then Gyro Hub & Mediterranean Grill has you covered WELL! Theirs is better than mine. But just barely, and mostly because they use coconut milk, and I always forget that I don't have any in my pantry and I should just go ahead and add it to my next grocery list. I make my butter chicken for myself, so it's no coincidence that I like mine so much. So, it says a lot when I say that Gyro Hub's is even better than mine.

The shish kebab. Be warned. You aren't getting cubes of meat and vegetables grilled on a skewer. What you're getting is more like the Pakistani seekh kebab. It's ground meat formed into kind of a cylindrical shape on a skewer, seasoned to deliciousness, and grilled to even more deliciousness. It's like a grilled meatloaf. How's that for a delicious image, eh? Soooo good.

Everything I've tried so far has been delicious. This is the place you suggest to friends when your friends want hamburgers but you want something more worldly. Or when you're craving anything from baklava to jalapeño poppers. It's such an eclectic atmosphere and menu that you'd think everyone would feel out of place. But everybody there seemed to belong. 



One Blade of Grass

Zen is one of those things that everyone knows a little about. We know its aesthetic is austere, spartan. We know it has some relation to Buddhism, whether it's a branch, an offshoot, or a synonym. We know it's of Asian origin (Zen is the Japanese word for it. In Chinese, it's known as Chan.). We know some famous people are practitioners, like Gary Snyder, Thich Nhat Hanh, John Cage, the Dalai Lama (nope: he's a Tibetan Buddhist. Or THE Tibetan Buddhist), and that guy in that kung fu TV show. We know that lots of Westerners are now practitioners. But what's with that question, "What is the sound of one hand clapping?" Sounds like asking, "Which way is blue? What color is stubbornness?"

If you are curious about Buddhism, and Zen in particular, Henry Shukman's memoir, *One Blade of Grass*, is an excellent introduction to the religion and its practice. For Western/American readers,

some aspects of Zen will be familiar, while some will be thoroughly baffling. Shukman emphasizes the importance of a supportive teacher, the centrality of a community of practitioners, the necessity of discipline in one's practice, and the difficulty or impossibility of comprehending the truths or realities being pursued. While one may have profound, unsettling, disorienting experiences during meditation ("zazen"), they are not proof of having "arrived." And they certainly don't solve all of your problems.

Shukman was born in Oxford, England, in the early '60s. His father was Jewish, and that is part of his identity as well. As a young man, he was plagued by a persistent case of eczema that affected his social life and self-esteem. His earliest teachers—not about Zen, but about living a life that diverges from the ordinary—were a friend of his mother named Speedy, and a Colombian priest and liberation theologian named Gustavo. Henry had his first awakening experience as a teenager on a South American beach, long before he knew about Zen. Echoing his lesson from Speedy, it gave him another glimpse of a different way of being a person. He had a sudden, new sense of belonging, of being claimed, of being loved. Then he went home, and the wonder faded and was drowned by his return to the old life. But that first taste created in him a desire to pursue it wherever it would lead.

Another friend of his mother, Flora, was a Romanian elder who knew witchcraft and fortune telling. (I know; stick with it.) She was the first to recommend that Henry meditate, but her point of reference was the Greek philosophers rather than Buddhists. A musician friend introduced Henry to Transcendental Meditation. Meditation became the still point in his life, the spoke around which things both moved and remained tethered. In time, his work as a travel writer brought him into contact with Natalie Goldberg, a writer (Writing Down the Bones) in Santa Fe, NM, and other Zen practitioners and teachers. Goldberg told him that, "Zen isn't a matter of knowing. It's a practice, it's something you do."

And that's where things really take off. Shukman is a great storyteller. He's a successful travel writer and a bestselling novelist. He tells of further awakening experiences with surprising clarity, given that they are largely encounters with the preverbal, with mysteries that are not only hard to articulate, but where any description instantly imposes distance between the listener and the experience. I know-it's self-contradictory. Get used to it. That's a prominent characteristic-but not a weakness-of Shukman's narrative. Logic and language, in addition to our cherished views of our struggling. ever-striving selves, are among the things that Zen teaches practitioners do not to rely on, or to set aside entirely. (In other words, this review is entirely superfluous. Shrug.)

Here lies mystery. Shukman is a convincing tour guide. There is neither hagiography nor evangelism here. He's not interested in making converts. It has been said that, "The Tao is not this. And not that." Shukman says that, "Gradually it became clearer how this reality got obscured: it was through thinking and then believing the thoughts." Zen, he says, "seeks to free us from a mistaken perspective generated by a misunderstanding about our sense of self: namely, that it's a thing, that *me* is a fixed entity." Like a free lunch, there is no you.

Confused?

Excellent. "It may be a little inaccurate but not unreasonable to say that in the end, all Zen is is love." Like love, it's a persistent behavior, not a feeling, and it leads way outside our comfort zones. Like love, it makes no logical, rational sense. Like love, it's about recognizing that we are all connected.

Great book. It may completely mess up your five year plan. Enjoy. ■







Asking Effective Questions

In the world of communication, asking good questions is like navigating with a compass; it guides you toward a clearer understanding and deeper knowledge. Beyond the initial question, consider how your inquiries can open up broader discussions. This not only enriches the conversation but also strengthens relationships and builds understanding between the participants.

Try to frame your questions in a way that encourages expansive answers. Open-ended questions, as opposed to yes/no inquiries, invite elaboration and provide the respondent with an opportunity to express themselves more fully. A question like, "How do you envision the future of your business?" invites a more thoughtful and detailed response than a closed-ended question.

In essence, asking good questions is a skill that enhances effective communication. It's not just about getting answers, but about fostering a sense of engagement and understanding. By honing this skill, you become better equipped to navigate the complexities of human interaction and knowledge gathering.

Things You Didn't Realize You Could (Or Should) Do in the Winter

As per typical this time of year, we have seen temperatures in the 50s and then temperatures in the 30s over the last few weeks. Welcome to the Midwest, right?!? - Keep watering until the ground freezes.
 Make sure to give any new trees, shrubs, or perennials a GOOD drink before we get into the thick of winter and the ground is frozen. The ground has been dry and if they go into the winter dry, some plants will really struggle.
- 2. Take advantage of a late season sale on trees and shrubs. Not sure if you should store or plant them? Go ahead and put them in the ground. They will fare far better in the ground than in a pot. Ideally, you want to allow a month before a hard freeze to establish roots, but it's okay to plant them any time the ground is workable.
- 3. Ensure your equipment is ready BEFORE the first big storm of the season. Don't wait to get your snowblower serviced or to realize that old rusty shovel just won't cut it this season—take care of it now. And make sure you stock up on ice salt sooner rather than later. Ice is slippery. Don't find yourself slipping your way to the store during an ice storm when supplies are slim.

- Get your HVAC system inspected/ serviced. It's so important to make sure that your HVAC system is ready and functioning properly before the temperatures drop below zero.
- 5. Check the seals around your doors and windows for drafts. Be sure to seal any leaky doors or windows to conserve as much energy and control your costs through the winter. These seals may go bad over time, yet they are easy to replace. If you have a lot of bad seals—as is common in many older homes—you can seal the entire window with a special plastic covering that you can find in ready-to-go kits.
- 6. You can still have porch pots and hanging baskets for this season. They're usually composed of live evergreen trimmings that will soak up moisture now and stay vibrant all season. They're a low maintenance way to show some color around your house—and they make great gifts.
- 7. ...Or you can bring some life inside. Grey skies and shorter days can be depressing. But studies have shown that houseplants can help prevent stress, improve productivity, and have a calming effect on people. Additionally, many houseplants like succulents or spider plants or philodendrons are really low maintenance.




