



I've occasionally updated you on the chronicles of Coco the miniature rescue wonder poodle in this column. He's a 15-year-old rescue that we got when he was 9, and since then, he's become the center of our little world, bringing us joy and laughs on a regular basis.

Not so long ago I talked about the beginning of his health slide as he gets to be an old man (108 years old if you use the dog years math). His sight is bad, and his hearing is about gone, and in the last year, he's started showing signs of cognitive issues. We believe he's got dementia. He flinches at hands that move fast to pet him, and later at night especially, he becomes very moody. I believe they call it sundowning. So, we're extra careful with him. Slow and deliberate and with extra love.

We just accepted that he may not have a long time left, so we're going to make sure he's comfortable and happy. And he is. Every morning, I wake him up by picking him up from his bed and laying him on my bed and give him a good rub and, his favorite, butt scratches, as he burrows his nose into the blankets. And then, a big, big yawn tells me he's ready to get down and go outside to do his business.

Well, two weeks ago, after the aforementioned butt scratches, he looked at me and gave me the big yawn, giving me a big eyeful of his wide-open yapper. But this time, I saw something on the roof of his mouth that was very much out of place. Like it was stuck to the roof of his mouth. I thought... food? Maybe bugs like I've seen on the internet. So, I took him to the vet the same day and got the news I didn't even consider for some reason. Coco had cancer.

Floored is all I can say. I think it hit me harder than finding out about my own cancer. And it did the same to Christy. So, we're in this terrible spot where we know that due to his age and declining health that invasive treatment, surgery, chemo, even just putting him under for a biopsy, can kill him. So, at his place in life, the kindest thing we can do is not give him any pain or suffering that he doesn't have to have if we can help it. That means putting him on steroids and making him as happy as we can until his condition gets to the point where he'll let us know that days are no longer better than worse.

We dread that day. I've had to do that only once before in my life, over 25 years ago, and it remains one of the saddest and most painful experiences I can remember. Christy has not had to face it before. She tries not to think about it. But her heart is huge, so this is going to be so hard on her.

Coco's been a daddy's boy since he arrived. He gets excited when Christy



comes home from work, and he loves to take walks with her, but at the end of the day, he only wants to snuggle up next to me on the couch. And as his dementia gets worse, his evening mood swings and grumpiness are pretty much aimed at Christy, mostly when she comes near us on the couch, growling and, occasionally when she gets real close, a snarl. Never a bite or violence. Just confused fear.

This would likely piss off most people or sour their attitude to the little guy, but Christy is a freaking saint. She only ever talks to him with loving words and tones. When he won't eat sometimes, she will sit and hand feed him one piece at a time, and it always works. She can even make him eat when I can't. She should be mad at him, but she never ever blames him for his actions or attitude. She just loves on him 100% of the time.

It's easy to love on him when he's your snuggle buddy and shows you the love and trust (that would be my role). So, to see Christy never vary from the way she loves on him, especially when sometimes he can really be a jerk and not deserve it, is amazing to witness. I already couldn't love her more, but to see the compassion and patience she shows him day in and day out makes my heart hurt in the best way.

As she's allergic to most dogs, finally adopting one was out of left field and all her idea (poodles are hypoallergenic). She deserved a dog that would spend as much time as possible in her lap. She didn't get that. But he's just too damn adorably cute to hold it against him.

We don't know what the first nine years of his life were like. We can tell some things happened that left him skittish. But coming into our lives was the best idea ever for all of us, I think. And now our job is to show him how much he means to us until the day we have to say goodbye. Conveniently, that's pretty much already describes everyday since we first met him almost seven year ago. So, more of the same. Hug your puppers tonight! I guess cats too... if you must. ■







#### Dubuque County Business Competition

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 1 @ 5-7:30 PM THE INNOVATION LAB (210 JONES ST. SUITE 100)

On Thursday, Feb. 1 from 5 to 7:30 p.m. at The Innovation Lab, ambitious entrepreneurs will compete for seed funding at the Dubuque County Business Competition. The competition, organized by The Innovation Lab and powered by Dupaco Credit Union, is set to bring together startups, existing businesses, funders, and mentors under one roof, providing a unique opportunity for them to kickstart or scale their ventures.

Entrepreneurs were selected to participate from more than 45 applicants.

The competition will start with a Funding Fair at 5 p.m. where the finalists will each have a booth to display their business information and concepts. Attendees will listen to pitches from each business and vote for their favorite concept. A panel of expert judges will also listen to and score pitches. The businesses that garner the top five judges' scores and the business that generates the most crowd votes earn a spot in the live pitch event.

The six finalists will then take the stage at 6:30 p.m. to deliver their compelling 5-minute pitches to the crowd. Their pitches will be evaluated by a panel of judges with the top three businesses receiving seed funding of \$10,000 for first place, \$5,000 for second place, and \$2,750 for third place.



The Cab Calloway Orchestra will replace the Stan Kenton Legacy Orchestra to bring an unforgettable sensation of a modern jazz orchestra in full flight to the University of Dubuque Heritage Center stage on Friday, Feb. 9 at 7:30 p.m.

Patrons won't soon forget the shiny instruments all in a row, the soloist singing and playing their hearts out, the silkysmooth ensemble passagework, the spicy brass harmonies, the whole room bouncing and swaying to the irresistible rhythm, and everybody singing "Hi-De-Ho!" The Cab Calloway Orchestra, now under the baton of Cab Calloway's grandson, Calloway Brooks, delivers both the authentic sound of a hot jazz orchestra and a snazzy stage style—bringing out a jump, blues, and boogie experience that has been described as "Swing that is king and Jazz that's alive."

The Calloway family has been dazzling audiences since the 1920s, and the orchestra uses the Calloway bands original vintage orchestrations as a starting point, coupled with the incredible musicians who have played with this big band for decades.

Calloway Brooks started playing guitar at age 7, won his first musical awards at age 9, and went on to become a graduate of the prestigious New England Conservatory of Music. He credits the many years of experience with his grandfather Cab Calloway as a cornerstone of his musical education. Brooks has performed with jazz orchestras such as the Duke Ellington Orchestra, the Lionel Hampton Orchestra, and, of course, the Cab Calloway Orchestra.

Cab Calloway passed away in 1994. He was inducted posthumously into the International Jazz Hall of Fame in 1995.

### Black As You Are

## Inclusivity and Evolution of the Local Arts

Dubuque has a rich art history, from visual arts to symphony, ballet to local indie music scene. But there's long been a gap in representation, and now local black artists are carving out a bold place to express themselves, inviting the larger community to participate in a diverse celebration of all the things that make the black experience so rich. The latest exhibit, in honor of Black History Month, opens Friday, Feb. 2, at the Dubuque Area Arts Collective (DAAC) Gallery at The Smokestack. A collaboration between Art For Us and the DAAC, the second annual Black As You Are exhibit will include visual works, along with "Our Ancestors Wildest Dreams" poetry segment in partnership with Heritage Works Dubuque. The exhibit pays tribute to local and regional black artists and allies, as they share inspirations, perspectives, and narratives through the platform of art. While in honor of Black History Month, there is no denying the growth of

the local blacklead arts scene in recent years.

Briana Thompson has been an instrumental figure in this movement. Owner and founder of Art For Us, a marketing, consultancy, and talent acquisition company located in Dubuque, Thompson has been involved in the creative community for the past decade, first as the area's only black woman fashion and editorial photographer. As a creator, she quickly realized that

those in the black community lacked a voice and creative outlet, and looking to help provide opportunities for them, she held the first "Black As You Are" event one year ago, then curated six shows throughout the remainder of 2023.

"We had 2,200 people attend them, 85% were black," said Thompson, explaining that the community she now represents wants to participate in the arts but needs community partnerships to pull it off.

"We've had no venues, no platforms, nothing. So, I got into the art industry

because we needed representation, and I was losing many talented friends in this city who went elsewhere for better opportunity."

The response to the second *Black As You Are* show has exceeded everyone's expectations, restoring faith that black artists will not only want to stay here, but that Dubuque is becoming a hub for guest artists from other regions as well.

"This year, we had over 40 artists submit work, which is

crazy because last year, I had four," said Thompson, citing a blend of local and regional artists from Rockford, IL; Madison, WI; and Des Moines and Cedar Rapids, IA. "We had people driving three hours to drop off their work, just for this show," emphasizing how vital the local scene has become. "We turned away people from New Orleans and other locations because we just couldn't get the art here."

This highlights something that Thompson herself has only recently realized, that many other regions lack a cohesive black arts scene, and that Dubuque can

fill that gap, becoming a desired location for national artists to exhibit.

"Even a place like Madison doesn't have a venue for spoken word, so those artists want to come here to perform because we do." Thompson cites places like the first-floor stage at The Smokestack and her intention to continue to partner with the DAAC for upcoming performances there.

With various exhibits and performances planned, the next step for Thompson is building a local creative infrastructure where Dubuque-area artists are paid properly for their work.

"Being an artist is a profession because it's one thing to be creative, but are you a creative professional? Have you been given the skills to make it in the business sense? As a community, we should be showing our artists how to do that. They deserve to make a living." This is something Thompson plans to do with a project currently in the works. Until then, she and the artists participating in the Black As You Are exhibit, along with the DAAC, are looking forward to sharing the creativity of the black community with all of Dubuque.

"Art literally saved my life," said Thompson, pointing to a camera tattooed on her bicep in tribute. "It's such a beautiful and profound thing to be able to do something that you love. Everybody deserves to feel that liberation, and we hope that everyone who comes to the exhibit does."

Black As You Are runs from Feb. 2 through Feb. 24, with an opening reception Friday, Feb. 2, from 7 to 11 p.m. at the Dubuque Area Arts Collective Gallery at The Smokestack, 62 E. 7<sup>th</sup> St. in downtown Dubuque. ■

## 55 Years of Transformative Arts, Music & Education

or more than five decades, the Dubuque Arts Council has been a dynamic force, shaping the cultural landscape of the Tri-State community. In this exploration of their journey, we'll delve into the profound impact of performances in schools, making art accessible, and why it's crucial for the growth and development of young minds.

#### The Beginning: 1969 to Today

In the late '60s, a group of passionate individuals in Dubuque set out to ignite inspiration among the youth through the arts. Fueled by a generous donation from John Deere, their modest goal was to bring outstanding performers to local

schools. Little did they know that this initiative would evolve into the transformative Artist in Residence program.

Fast forward to today, and the Dubuque Arts Council stands proud as a champion of cultural diversity, bringing international sensations to area schools. This visionary initiative goes beyond entertainment; it fosters a symphony of cultural experiences, from enchanting sounds to pulsating beats. The goal is to weave a rich tapestry that transcends borders and generations.

#### Performances in Schools: Making Art Accessible

One of the cornerstones of the Dubuque Arts Council's mission is the belief that





APPLE CRISP SALAD

#### Refresh

How to describe Refresh Food, Juice & Boba. Well first, let's get the pronunciation down. Is it "RE-fresh" or "re-FRESH?" I'm choosing to put the emphasis on "fresh" because so do the good people at Refresh. But beyond that, how would you describe a sandwich et. al. shop with a painting of Anthony Bourdain displayed religiously prominent, with Japanese sodas and candies available for sale, situated right next to a brewpub? You know what it's like? Think of a legendary college town sandwich shop. The one that alumni talk about to identify one another. Now imagine that it hasn't been around long enough to officially gain legend status. And it's not that close to a college campus. But you still got the care and passion and menu that MAKES a place like that legendary. Imagine you could be one of the people to say, "Oh hell yeah. I've been eating at that place since Fairchild wrote about it." Yes, in this scenario, I'm pretending that my name means something to you and your acquaintances. I want to be a legend, too.

So yeah. I think I just effectively described Refresh.

Let's get back to the painting of Bourdain. My apologies to the artist if it ISN'T a painting of Anthony Bourdain, but I like to think I know Bourdain when I see him. When you have a painting of the late chef, author, and travel documentarian, you're pretty much setting the tone: You're showing that you're proud of the food you make, and you're going to take the food you make seriously, but not so seriously that you fall victim to snobbery.

There. NOW I've effectively described Refresh. Ready to talk about the food? Me, too.

I'm sure this is a shortcoming on my part, but... for the most part, I've always been disappointed by panini sandwiches. Yeah, I don't understand it, either. It's toasty. It's melty. It marries flavors beautifully. It isn't a mess to eat. So, I don't know. I guess maybe I expect more from something that's toasty, melty, marries flavors beautifully, and isn't a mess to eat. You know what also often disappoints me? Pesto. With that much damn basil, I expect to taste the basil. Is that too much to ask? Yeah, there's all sorts of other good stuff in pesto but like... basil makes it vibrant. I want to taste that color of green, dammit!

So, when I asked for a recommendation and was hit with a sunflower pesto panini... well... I agreed, but... I had a feeling I was going to be mostly dining on the other things I ordered to try. But when what can only be described as a coital grunt escaped my throat when I first took a bite of the toasty, melty chicken, cherry tomatoes, provolone, and balsamic coming along on a magic carpet ride of pesto... well... nobody was more surprised than me. The basil! Oh, the basil! It's there. It's there in force. And it's not ALL you taste, of course. Nobody wants that. But like I said... panini sandwiches are good at marrying flavors together. When they're in the panini press, they just can't escape each other. THIS is what I want from a panini. Thank you, Refresh.

Now, if you're a panini skeptic like I tend to be, know that any of their sandwiches can be ordered as a hoagie. So, not only can you get a sunflower pesto hoagie, you can bring the entire state of Pennsylvania to its knees by ordering a Philly cheesesteak panini. The world is yours.

I still had room to house most of the falafel bowl I ordered. Boy howdy, if there's one thing that could make me go vegan, it's falafel. Seasoned fried balls of chickpea? Doesn't sound like something that can satisfy someone like me who considers eating meat at least a small part of my personal and cultural identity. It honestly gets the job done, though. It's filling and tasty. I love it. That's why I ordered it, sans recommendation. So, what are we talking here?

We're talking falafel (duh), quinoa, hummus, tomato, cucumber, pickled onion, black olive, and several triangles of naan. You get to assemble everything with just the right proportions of everything. I love taking a meal into my own hands when I have a meal in my hands. So good! And again, it was so fresh tasting. Probably because it's fresh. That's how fresh tends to work. Those cukes certainly helped. So did the acidity of the pickled onions. And if you're looking for someone to eat your olives, I'm that person. Send them to me directly. Or email me, and I'll come pick them up.

Finally, I got myself the Apple Crisp Salad or, as I'm going to call it, "The salad for people who think they don't like salad." I know that sounds like it's a few greens with a huge helping of apple crisp on top, but come on. Be reasonable here. We're talking a nice, crisp spring mix of greens with crisp apples, crisp candied pecans, and crisp... okay the dried cranberries and feta are NOT crisp, but do you really want them to be? This salad still comes by the name "crisp" honestly. Just like Refresh comes by the name "fresh" honestly. And oh! Did you think I forgot to mention the dressing? I did forget, thanks for reminding me. This beauty is dressed with a maple vinaigrette. I've had lots and lots and lots of different vinaigrette. Lots. Why, oh why has it taken almost 45 YEARS for maple vinaigrette to enter my life? Such a perfect dressing for this salad. Inspired, really. Kind of makes me want to explore a bit more with vinaigrettes in my own kitchen.

I'm going to have to go back and explore the milk tea and juices and boba. I just know it's awesome to have a new place to get boba in downtown Dubugue. If you're looking to keep it simple, no problem. Just grab a can of Coke products from the fridge. Want to know what Skittles taste like in Japan? With Refresh, now's your chance without paying shipping.

As usual, when I can, I'd like to mention the restroom situation. It's important to people, I know. There's only one restroom

to keep clean at Refresh, and it absolutely is clean. Just pass to the right hand side of Anthony Bourdain, and potty in comfort. The building is old. You can tell by the Old Downtown Dubuque ceilings. But the potty is REFRESHed. See what I did there?

## Understanding Through Listening

For over 20 years, I've been traveling around our country and the world speaking from stages. I've worked in all 50 states and six out of the seven continents. Do you know anyone in Antarctica? If there's one thing I love to do almost as much as speaking, it's listening. Over the years, I've had the opportunity to listen to thousands of leaders and speakers.

Recent studies indicate that a mere 10% of us are effective listeners. Amid the constant buzz of notifications, social media alerts, and our ever-expanding to-do lists, our capacity to focus and listen to others is being severely challenged. Even when not hindered by technology, our own preoccupations and internal dialogues often prevent us from truly hearing others. Many times, we mistakenly believe we are listening, but in reality, we are just waiting for an opportunity to interject, offer advice, or pass judgment. The core issue in modern communication is that most of us listen with the intent to reply, not to understand.

True listening requires a shift in mindset. It's not about mentally preparing your response while the other person is speaking; it's about fully engaging with what they're saying. This means observing not just their words,

but also their body language, eye contact, and tone of voice. Effective listening is an active process, one that, when practiced, significantly enhances understanding.

Here are three straightforward strategies to help you master the art of listening for understanding:

- Avoid Interrupting: The quickest way to make someone feel unheard is to interrupt or speak over them. Fully listen and wait for them to finish before posing questions or sharing your views.
- 2. **Reflect Before Responding:** Instead of immediately voicing your thoughts, demonstrate that you've heard and processed their words by paraphrasing their message.
- 3. **Resist Judgement:** Strive to suspend your personal biases and emotions unless they are explicitly sought. Not everyone is looking for advice; sometimes, they simply need to be heard without the expectation of a solution.

Adults often exhibit greater patience and attentiveness when listening to children, recognizing their potential difficulties in articulating thoughts and feelings. We afford them the time and effort needed to understand their emotions and thoughts. This approach should extend to our interactions with adults. Rather than interrupting to steer the conversation, we should listen to assist in clarifying their thoughts.

Embracing a listening-oriented approach will improve your relationships. It fosters trust, diminishes conflict, and boosts your ability to motivate and inspire. Engaging with others' stories, and sharing our own, allows us to step into another's world, fostering a deeper sense of connection. Shift from listening to reply to listening to understand—it's a transformative step in enhancing your communication skills!

## Backyard Foraging

#### By John McAndrew

It's really cold—which makes it a perfect time to go through seed catalogs and dream of spring and sprouts and savory simmering dishes. If you're wanting to do something a little different this year, Ellen Zachos will open your garden gate and lead you into the land beyond, where you can explore and bring home new ingredients with novel flavors that you will never find in stores—or even at the farmers' market.

Zachos is an experienced forager and author of *Backyard Foraging* and *The Wildcrafted Cocktail*. She finds food to forage in fields and forests wherever she has lived—including in the high desert of Santa Fe, NM. She is a careful, entertaining instructor, eager to share the joys of finding and cooking free foods. She also gleefully busts myths as she goes. Before you believe something is dangerous or disgusting, check in with her.

In How to Forage for Wild Foods Without Dying, Zachos writes for the absolute beginner who has walked past flowers and trees all our lives without having a clue about their names, growth habits, or even if they are poisonous to touch or eat. She is one of those experts who is an a conversational, understanding, engaging writer. The book has photos or drawings on almost every page, which helps the novice have a sense of confidence when setting out.

Many of these plants are quite common: milkweed, mallow, lamb's quarters, dandelions, Queen Anne's lace, Siberian elm, locust, sumac, oak, and more. (If you're looking for a Valentine's Day gift for the Master Gardener in your life, this is the one. Don't forget to add chocolate, though. Always add chocolate.)

Zachos covers:

**Motivation:** Why would you forage when you can just, you know, run down to the grocery store or the farmers' market?

**Selection:** Generally, foods with no poisonous lookalikes, available all over the US, with multiple uses.

**Hardware:** What tools for harvesting, preparation, and preservation will you need?

**Basic plant info:** The kinds of things your grade-school textbooks covered, like roots, stems, leaves, fruits, flowers, and seeds, in all their variety.

**Sustainability:** If you harvest ALL of a favorite plant, neither you nor any other forager—biped, quadruped, or other—will have any next year.

**Safety and Ethics:** Don't harvest by a roadside or from someone's property without permission.

Let's take an example: milkweed. Zachos gives the scientific and the common names, the best parts to eat. and when to harvest them.

"There's a lot of misinformation out there about milkweed. Some people swear it's bitter; others claim it's poisonous. Neither is true. When properly harvested and prepared, milkweed is tender, delicious, and versatile. If I had to choose just one wild plant to eat, it would probably be milkweed. That's how good it is."

She talks about harvesting, discussing stems, leaves, flowers, pods, and

buds separately. She explains how to cook it and debunks another myth along the way:

"You may read that milkweed requires boiling in three changes of water, but this is not true. I bet the person who started that rumor harvested dogbane instead of milkweed."

Milkweed is one of the exceptions to her poisonous lookalike rule, so she thoroughly describes how to correctly identify it and provides clear, detailed photos of dogbane, its poisonous doppelgänger, and how it compares to the real thing.

Zachos's friendly conversational style is one way she keeps this new skill fascinating to newcomers.

"Lamb's quarters is cultivated as a vegetable in Asia and parts of Africa. In Europe and the Americas, it's considered an annoying weed. Go figure."

"You may read that the white, immature silk inside milkweed pods tastes like cheese. I'm here to manage your expectations. It does not taste like cheese."


"Acorns are one of the most versatile wild foods you can harvest. They can be made into a gluten-free flour that adds richness to sweet and savory baked goods, or they can be eaten as nuts, mixed into burgers, or used as a soup base. They're an excellent source of starch and fat. You will never starve if you have acorns."

You will like her and want to go foraging with her. (She does travel to foraging and book conferences, so you never know!) She writes like a good friend would, and she would approve of your having a small glass of homemade apricot liqueur on the table beside you as you read her book in front of the fire.

Like most things, foraging is more fun with friends. Zachos encourages foragers to find each other. There's a reason community gardens are a popular way to build and bind a community. Anyone interested in bringing people together over food and plants—Master Gardeners, teachers, parents, restaurateurs, survivalists, ecologists, managers of public lands—will find a companionable ally and teacher in Ellen Zachos. And you and your family are unlikely to die in the process—always an appealing characteristic of a new hobby.

## Winter Blues Got You Dreaming of Spring?

We are in the thick of winter, and with those last two big snow storms, I'm dreaming of spring! One of the best ways I find to get through the challenges of the *winter blues* and *bitter cold* is to immerse myself into one of my favorite hobbies—house plants!

Caring for houseplants can be fun, challenging, inspiring, and a great way to involve your children or grandchildren in learning to care for something delicate. Houseplants also bring fresh air into the home which is perfect this time of year when we don't dare open our windows, am I right?!?

#### **Houseplant Hobby Tips**

**Effort and Ambition.** Are you eager to learn and willing to commit time every couple of days to water and care for your new plant(s)? Are you looking for just a touch of green but a tad bit forgetful with your schedule? Look for the plant specific to your needs. Some of the best options for beginning a beautiful friendship are pothos, ZZ plants, and snake plants. Most of these are hearty and only like to be watered weekly. They are forgiving if you miss a week, too.

**Lighting.** Pick the location you'd like to have a plant at *BEFORE* you go shopping. Determine how much sunlight it will receive daily. Consider moving the plant outside during summer months as well. Too much light or too little light can take a toll on your newfound friend if you aren't careful. Ideally, you should choose an area where you'll have bright, indirect light for at least six hours.

Types, Sizes, and Drainage. Picking out the right pot and soil for your plant will be your first priority. The most important thing when selecting a pot is for you to understand the impact it will have for growing conditions of your plant. There is an abundance of options to choose from when selecting your new pot: clay, plastic, ceramic, concrete, self-water, and the list goes on. You should also use the correct size pot; too small can stunt growth as the roots have nowhere to go, and if using a pot quite larger than the

plant, you will risk overwatering which may cause root rot. Make sure to chat with someone well-versed with houseplants when making these decisions so you are set up for success when bringing your new plant home. Perhaps, stop by Steve's Ace on JFK and speak to our Floral Associates—they certainly know how to help.

Routine. Set a plan. This is a perfect way to get your special helper involved! Every Sunday after dinner, water your plant. Each Wednesday, have your child(ren) or grandchild(ren) come water your plants after school. Whatever you decide, document it. Have fun with it! A piece of advice when starting out is to mark your calendar each time you water. That way, even if you forgot to water on your regular routine, it's documented when you last did it, and you aren't over watering. Maybe you'll discover during a mistake that your plant thrives from being watered every 10 days instead of weekly.

Pet- & Child-Friendly Options. If you have young children or animals in your home, I'd recommend reaching for a non-toxic house plant. That way, in case your little one decides to take a nibble or if your cat won't stop rubbing its face against the plant, you know they are at least safe to ingest. Peperomias are easy to care for, and they enjoy low-light areas. African Violets are delicate but beautiful additions to brighten your home. Prayer plants tolerate inconsistent watering schedules.

Most importantly, make sure to have fun starting this new venture. Plants can be exciting and a great way to develop new friendships. Consider joining a community online for trading clippings, sharing pictures of struggles and triumphs, or learning from others about their favorite rare and unique plants.






