





The ongoing saga of Coco the miniature rescue wonder poodle, episode 253: Peanut Butter Balls.

If you've kept up with the journey, you know it took a dark turn lately. In addition to my now nearly 16-year-old dog being nearly deaf, sorta blind, and dealing with some dementia issues, he now also has cancer in his mouth. At his age, it's not something we can fix with surgery, so we're making him as comfy and happy as we can until it's time.

Things you don't think about... the breath. Oh, Mylanta, the breath. With a growing tumor in the roof of his mouth, he can't eat hard things anymore. He rejects even mildly scratchy or solid things. So, ground beef and rice, baked chicken, sausages, \$20 filet mignon scraps. You know, the food of kings. And all the ice cream he wants, of course. And he has always been a rather finicky eater. Early on, I tried to give him a McDonald's burger for his birthday, and he sniffed the "beef" patty and turned his head away. Clearly, he's smarter than the rest of us in some ways.

So, with no hard foods to rub his teeth, the cancer, and not letting me touch his mouth, his breath began to sour. And by sour, I mean pure, putrid, sewage breath. If he kept his mouth shut, I could also stand to sit next to him. Once the cancer made nose breathing a bit harder, he occasionally would pant instead. It was so bad, I had to get up on occasion and just walk around to get a breath of fresh air. I think it was killing us both, poor guy.

I talked to the vet, and we got some antibiotics, and we also started putting the breath drops in his water. But the mouth issue seemed so far advanced that I didn't know if these could be effective. We set an appointment to have him sedated while they cleaned his mouth while taking a closer look at the cancer mass. But sedating him at this point could kill him, too.

With the mouth crud, plus some occasional blood and drool, the outside of his mouth was getting crusty. So, I decided to give him a very gentle face bath in the sink with warm water and just let it run over him. And shockingly, he let me. I gently rubbed some soap on the dried crud and even was able to lightly wipe at his... well... are they lips? The edges of his mouth, anyway. He was a good boy. I dried him off and carried him to the couch in my arms. When I went to set him down, he lifted his head from my arm and... BLOOD... EVERYWHERE. OMG, I killed my dog!

OK, I didn't kill him, but I went through half a roll of paper towels as he kept bleeding for a while. It stopped after a bit, and he took a long nap. Afterwards, he went for a drink, turning his water bowl pink.



But when he was done and I held him, looking at his face from a few inches away, I noticed... nothing. No stink! No foul orc stench from the depths of Isengard. It was amazing. I guess maybe my near-murder of my dog was not such a bad idea after all. And with the meds and drops, it has remained very good for a whole week now. So good, in fact, that the vet agreed that we should just skip the sedation visit and just go back to keeping him happy.

And he is happy. I know I just made it sound like his life is a horror movie, but it's actually not. He starts each day slow, but by afternoon, you might not even know he's on the struggle bus. He still goes to work with me and loves walking and sniffing now that there's grass and warm days again.

The other night, I was giving him some of his all-time favorite peanut butter treats. They're these little disc droplets that are nice and chewable and would quickly melt in his mouth if he ever gave one five seconds to do so. But he's a dog and gives these and filet mignon the great disservice of swallowing them as fast as possible without actually tasting a damn thing.

So, I give him four or five of these treats on the couch, and he lays down and nods off. An hour later, I get up to get a fresh beverage and do my business, and when I come back, he's sitting up, and I can clearly see that one of these peanut butter treats didn't get eaten and has slid back on the couch where he lay on it. After an hour, it was mostly melted, partially on the couch and partially on him. Right on his little doggie testicles. So I say, "Hey buddy, whatcha got there?" and pointed at it closely with my finger, because, you know... deaf. He sees what I'm talking about and immediately goes to town. You know what I'm talking about. His two favorite activities in the world have just come together in one awesome experience. And though he may be nearing the end and has his good moments and bad moments, in this one perfect moment, licking away at his little peanut butter balls, my little fuzzy man is totally living his best life.







Picturing America's Pastime Events

HOTEL JULIEN DUBUQUE, DUBUQUE MUSEUM OF ART, AND DYERSVILLE, IA Cedar Rapids-born, former big leagues pitcher Cal Eldred will headline two days of programs celebrating the exhibition *Picturing America's Pastime* at the Dubuque Museum of Art (DuMA) on April 13 and 14. On April 13, the 1993 Milwaukee Brewers Pitcher of the Year will speak about his career playing for the Brewers, White Sox, Cardinals, and the University of Iowa Hawkeyes.

Also on April 13, Casey-award winning author Phil S. Dixon will lead a conversation about the history of the Negro Leagues. Dixon sits on the National Advisory Board for the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum, has authored seven books, and interviewed over 500 players and their families. Illinois-native and Major League Baseball Supervisor of Umpires Larry Young will share highlights from his career which included calling Nolan Ryan's 5,000th career strikeout against Rickey Henderson and the 1996 and 2003 World Series. Authorhistorian John Liepa will host a discussion on the origins of baseball in Iowa and author-historian John T. Pregler will discuss his research on Dubuque's role in the history of professional baseball.

All discussions will take place at the historic Hotel Julien Dubuque, site of a series of meetings that led to the creation of the American League. Tickets include lunch and refreshments, all talks, and a tour of DuMA's exhibitions Picturing America's Pastime: A Snapshot of the Photograph Collection at the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum and Picturing Dubuque Baseball curated by John T. Pregler.

On April 14, the conference shifts to Dyersville for an exclusive program

at the Field of Dreams Movie Site, the If You Build It Exhibit, and Dwier Brown's Baseball Hall of Dreams. Picturing America's Pastime: A Snapshot of the Photograph Collection at the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum is on display through June 16. Explore the cultural history of America through the lens of the sport's greatest photographers. This landmark exhibition arrives from the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown, NY. Fifty-one photographs span the years 1866 to 2012 and reflect some of the most memorable moments in baseball and American history. Highlights include images of Jackie Robinson, Dorothy Kovalchick, Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, Shoeless Joe Jackson, Roberto Clemente, and Orestes "Minnie" Minoso.

Picturing Dubuque Baseball is a companion exhibition that reveals the role Dubuque and Dubqueurs played in shaping Major League Baseball.

This program is a collaboration among the Society for American Baseball Research (SABR), Dubuque Museum of Art, Hotel Julien Dubuque, Field of Dreams Movie Site, If You Build It Exhibit, Dwier Brown's Baseball Hall of Dreams, and Travel Dubugue. 

Here are a few helpful tips to keep in mind as you and your child are browsing Dubuque's many offerings.

Consider spending time outside! Did you know that fresh air contains high levels of negative ions, which have a positive impact on brain function and well-being? Kids who get lots of fresh air are also more likely to have healthier hearts and stronger lungs. Sunlight provides Vitamin D that kids need for strong bones and protection from disease. And, just like fresh air, it can improve mental and physical health. Whether your child wants to play sports outside, read under a tree, or engage in activities the city provides through their Rock in Roll Trailer, there is no shortage of ways for kids to be immersed in fresh air and sunshine.

Summer also brings opportunities to encourage healthy habits around physical activity. Regular physical activity reduces symptoms of anxiety and depression and reduces heart disease later in life. A 2023 report from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention states that approximately 5.8 million children live with anxiety, while 2.7 million suffer from depression. While there are many factors that play into brain health, helping kids to build healthy habits is one way to provide support. Physical activities like bike rides, yoga, nature hikes and kayaking in Catfish Creek are just some of the activities available to our kids to get them moving.

In addition to physical activity and fresh air, engaging in summer programs and activities provides a chance for kids to make new friendships and learn something new about themselves. Why not use this time to encourage kids to learn a new instrument or perform in a play? Maybe they could learn a campfire song to teach their siblings when they return from their camp adventure. Regardless of what they do this summer, the point is that they have a chance to have new experiences and embrace learning for the sake of learning. Summer is a gift just waiting to be opened. All you need to do to get started is look through this guide. The outcome will last a lifetime.

EJ's Wine Shop & Tasting Room

Walking into EJ's Wine Shop & Tasting Room for the first time, I didn't know what to expect. The world of wine is often seen as elitist, where a decent bottle costs a day's wage, and the shopkeeper makes it a sport to look down on anyone with less than a wine sommelier's knowledge. This is not that shop, and owner EJ Droessler is not that shopkeeper. It took me less than a minute to spot Droessler, his enthusiasm preceded him. I watched as he buzzed around helping a client choose a selection of unique labels, with a clear passion for the art of wine and wine making, and with an innate ability to engage with patrons on a relatable level.

"Today's been a great example of how we do things differently. That gentleman just bought a case of wine and thanked me for helping him out. That's what I love to do, ask customers what style they like, and to work together with them" said Droessler. "I bring my knowledge, but it's a collaboration."

Located in shared space with Wayfarer Coffee in the Millwork District, EJ's opens after Wayfarer closes, utilizing the space to its fullest capacity, a model rarely seen outside of big cities. A retail-driven wine market and tasting lounge, EJ's is committed to providing quality, handpicked wines at a fair price with the goal of carrying unique labels unavailable locally.

"If I can get that customer who is used to the \$90 bottle of wine to come in and trust me, I'm confident I will find them an amazing bottle that they will love at a great price point," he said. "Dubuque has often tended towards its cabernet sauvignons and chardonnay, and that's ok, but I want to change the limited scope with what I offer and recommend."

With its eclectic selection, EJ's offers wine flights and wines by the glass so patrons can try new options on site. They also have light snacks to accompany the drinks and feature a selection of local beers on draft and non-alcoholic drink options to enjoy.

Having recently held its grand opening, the shop's hours are Thursday through Saturday 1–8 p.m., and Sunday noon– 4:30 p.m., occupying a key time slot that Droessler found was lacking for options.

"Maybe you want to take your favorite book somewhere and relax, but many of our local coffee shops are closed by early afternoon, so the concept of a wine shop where people can come with a book in a relaxing, family-friendly environment has been my goal."

While the bricks-and-mortar location is an idea two years in the making, Droessler's passion began in his early 20s, while he was working in restaurants during college, and continued through a stint with Galena Cellars Vineyard & Winery where he learned the finer points of wine making itself. Described as a passion project, EJ's Wine Shop & Tasting Room "has been in the works for years," accelerating after Droessler sold ownership of L.May Eatery, and with his increasing desire to bring a different spin to how wine was being presented and sold locally.

"I remember being in Madison in a wine shop, and I asked for a Virgina wine, because I've been to the state, and they make beautiful wines there. And I was laughed at by the gentleman assisting me. It made me feel like I didn't belong there. I had another experience in Iowa City that was similar, and I told my wife 'This is what I don't want."

According to Droessler, the more casual model of his shop is in keeping with a shift in the face of the wine making industry.

"If you look at Italy, wine making has been male dominated for centurie,s but now there are an increasing number of talented female wine makers in these old world wine producing countries. I have several labels here that are family produced by husband and wife duos or by female producers. Also, I have many bottles from places you might not think of which are produced domestically and many that are certified organic."

Uniquely, EJ's offers its "WINE NOT? Wine Club," an opportunity for members to discover and enjoy new wines not regularly seen on their shelves, and unique to area retailers. The club features hand-selected wines every month in three-, six-, or 12-month memberships. Members receive a thoughtfully chosen bottle or two, depending on their membership, along with tasting notes, packaged and ready for pickup on the 15th of each month. Members also enjoy a 15% discount on all regular priced items the day of pickup, with exclusive sales and first invitations for club members only.

"I'm enjoying our focus," said Droessler. "And I plan to bring in some educational courses. 

This Other Eden

By John McAndrew

REAL mixed feelings about this book. It's one to wrestle with, like Jacob and the angel. It's beautifully written, as one expects from an author who won the Pulitzer for his first book, Tinkers. Paul Harding's newest book, This Other Eden, now out in paper, was shortlisted for both the Booker Prize and the National Book Award. Reviews have been stellar.

Harding has a great vocabulary. I have a good one, if I do say so myself, but neap, hachure, tierce, madder, liquescent, turbinate, tedder, froe, collops, and wuffle were all unfamiliar to me. (Even Merriam-Webster didn't list wuffle, so I don't feel too bad.) With these threads, he weaves long, lyrical passages that help the reader see what they've habitually taken for grantedlike the visceral pleasure of a cup of cool, fresh milk, enjoyed by one who is always on the edge of real hunger, who rarely tastes such pure, complete nutritious joy.

Harding deftly works in references to the Hebrew Bible and Ovid. It's clear that there are mythic themes at stake here.

"I remember the story of the flood in Gilgamesh from my studies at the seminary and I watch the Israelites revise it, populating the ark not with a royal court but a single family, of which every soul born since is a member, every saint and drunkard, every hermit, cutpurse, prostitute, factory owner, railroad baron. Every deadbeat mule driver is your father, your brother, every wayward milkmaid your aunt, your sister. Not a hero and his entourage aloft on the waters. Not a king and his court. But a family, a wife and her husband, two parents and their children and their children's beloveds."

So here is Eden, on the coast of Maine. It is a small island to which a formerly enslaved man named Beniamin Honey escaped in 1793. With him was his wife, Patience, a recent immigrant from Ireland. Benjamin planted apple trees as an homage to a dimly remembered time with a woman who may or may not have been his mother. Consequently, it came to be called Apple Island, and his and Patience's progeny stayed there. The main story begins in 1911 with Esther, their great granddaughter and current matriarch of the island. It was by then populated with the inbred offspring of Benjamin, Patience, three Penobscot sisters, and others. One of the families is composed of parents who both have albinism, and their four children, who tend to be nocturnal and whose capacities for living on their own are severely limited.

Then comes a retired schoolteacher and missionary, Mr. Diamond, who tries to help by opening a schoolhouse and giving

challenge to find anything Edenic in the lives lived on Apple Island.

"So many freezing, starving days and nights on the island. So many weeks on end in the dark, huddled together, praying, whispering for light, a little warmth, a little bread."

Impoverished as these families are in terms of health, economic potential, and quality of life, they look out for each other and love each other-with difficulty, as always. There is nothing about their existence to make their neighbors in Foxden, ME envy them. If they are noticed at all, it is with solicitude, or revulsion. They are a problem that must be solved. For their own good. And so is raised the idea of eugenics, conceived to solve and prevent problems just like this. Who's not for forced sterilization?

Harding doesn't dwell on eugenics, but it haunts the rest of the book, asking, "Well? This IS a problem, right? What would YOU do?" What good can be done for the people of Apple Island by the wider community, by concerned or covetous neighbors, by the state? Are we to abandon them to their own devices? Look where that got them. Can we at least rescue the gifted from among them? Give them a chance? How about if we make an example of them, make fun of them? As always, racism and bigotry are the ugly and belligerent siblings of eugenics.

Harding seems to love human nature, even in its most humble incarnation, but finds society suspect, no matter how well-meaning.


This Other Eden is unsettling and begs to be discussed in a diverse class or book group. The questions it raises for anyone with a heart, who wants to help, are confounding. Harding's simple, rhythmic, haunting prose tends to make the reader relax their guard so his points can penetrate. It's a bit like being shivved by a favorite singer: REAL mixed feelings.







Time for Some Swedish Death Cleaning

Swedish death cleaning, or as the Swedes call it, döstädning, is not a difficult concept to grasp-you toss out most of your stuff

before you die, so your loved ones don't have to do it. Easy to say, hard to do.

Margareta Magnusson, the author of the book The Gentle Art of Swedish Death Cleaning, faced this gargantuan task first when she was widowed, and later when her mother-in-law died. Not only was she grieving, she was responsible for making all those decisions. You know the ones-Keep, Donate, or Trash. They're all verbs and verbs mean action, both physical and emotional. Sure, you recycle your husband's trove of "Field and Stream" magazines, you donate his big-and-tall size shirts, and you keep the letters he wrote you. But so much remains-his tools, his 1970s music videos and the VCR he kept to play them, his guitar, banjo, electric piano, alto ukulele, trumpet, melodica, and kazoo (Yes I live with a musician)

Sure, you will offer everything to your children, friends, and random acquaintances, but how? Do you have them all over for lunch and let them search the closets? Do you do what one friend's mother did, asking them what they'd like before you go and attaching post-its to each one? Do you make a long, long list and offer it on Freecycle or Facebook Marketplace, and then spend two months setting things on of the curb?

When my dad died, Mom had her work cut out for her. He was neat and organized, not afraid to throw a toaster in the trash once he'd replaced the cord himself and it still wouldn't work. She sold the car (she didn't drive), distributed the tools to her nephews, donated his clothes to charity, and at the end declared she would do her own death cleaning, even though we didn't call it that.

I like to think-maybe you do, toothat my children will have fun going through the house once Bob and I are gone. "Oh," Allison will say, "She saved all her poems!" Or, "Hey," from Dan,

"These LPs are amazing!" Maybe he'll take most of the albums, or sell a few online. But the poems? Some are published, so they're out in the world, but what about the ones I was gathering to submit to a chapbook publisher? (They know I don't believe in self-publishing.)

We have, by my last count, seven bookcases, ranging from six feet to-no. wait a minute, I left out the one with the cookbooks. And the one next to me, which includes one shelf of the journals and books where my poems found their homes. And there's one in the questroom with mostly books about writing, which can be donated, but also three little tomes-the baby books of my daughter, my son, and myself. Those are priceless!

Less precious to them are the boxes in my study closet housing English papers from way back—we're talking the treatise I wrote for Home Ec about Different Kinds of Fabric, complete with swatches-and scrapbooks I kept as a youngster which contain my ticket to the Beatles' 1964 concert at White Sox Park.

The idea of death cleaning is so simple. Get rid of all of that now, so your survivors won't need to. But I'm a writer; I never know when I'll need to consult my personal archives to support an essayor this very column!-with just the right piece of info. The fifty cookbooks? I intended to work my way through them during Covid, preparing one recipe from each, from Yotam Ottolenghi's Jerusalem to Diane Henry's Roast Figs, Sugar Snow, and hey, it's not too late. (If I start now, I can write about it next year!)

Magnusson devotes one chapter to the "Throw Away" box, a place to keep "a few things that I would like to save for myself only." Her box includes old love letters, theater programs, shells, a dried flower, and so on. I can think of things I might put into my own box-artwork by

my granddaughters, feathers from the yard, an agate my father found along Lake Michigan. Sure, those would fit. The idea is that my kids would follow the box's instructions and throw it away when I'm gone. But I have a four-drawer file cabinet of letters! Over 37 photo albums! Seven quilts stitched by Mom and Grandma! If I had a box big enough for all of them. my kids would need a forklift and a dumpster to just "throw them away."

Bob and I updated our wills last year, with detailed financial instructions regarding our real estate and any retirement funds we don't manage to fritter away. Our attorney also included a sheet of paper with numbered lines, on which we are to write any specific items we want our four children to have. Mine have weighed in a bit (the albums. some furniture) but not nearly enough.

When my husband's father died at the age of almost-90, he and his three siblings gathered at the farm. It was an easy decision to let the eldest pay the others for the farm itself; he was the only one interested. Then his sister brought out the little stuff, like their mother's jewelry. Not diamonds or rubies, but sweet things. I never knew her, but I took a necklace. Should I put a note with it, so the grandtwins could have it and know what it means? Or just let it go? My answer, and yours, depends upon your nostalgia quotient. You can probably guess how high mine is.


