

I didn't even get to Florida yet, and I think I got mugged by Betty the barista at the coffee hut. I even asked for a printed receipt. Do you think it was itemized so I could see which item was the killing blow? Noooooo! I'm torn, as there's clearly still a good dollar's worth of that \$6 muffin still stuck to the paper cup wrapper. Maybe I should eat the wrapper to get more value out of this thing.

So, yes, I got away for a few days, 10 to be precise, in the lovely Caribbean. And I'll be happy to share the highlights of the trip with you. But that'll have to be next time because right now I feel like whining, so here goes.

This was my first time on a discount airline like Spirit or Avelo. In this case, it was Allegiant Air, where a lovely \$59 ticket magically becomes \$350 after picking a seat and wanting to bring a bag. Brilliant!

My Allegiant Air flight swiftly took off a mere three and a half hours after it was scheduled to. It was foggy at 8 a.m., but I guess after that it was just way too clear and sunny out, and they didn't know how to handle that rare situation. They later said an air show in Miami was causing a massive delay in Iowa. It makes me wonder if major carriers like American get preferred placement in getting assigned new flight schedules. No idea, I just get that feeling.

The best part was that half of that three-hour delay came after we all sat on the plane. They rolled us out to the end of the runway, and they said since we're there, we should try not to use the bathroom. So, naturally, the first lady to get up and use the bathroom happened before he was even done talking. But alas, they fired it up, and up we went with a good 20 seconds of fairly uncomfortable shaking and the sound of a loud weed wacker running at full RPM in the middle of my skull. I didn't know they made 2-stroke jet engines, but here I am, living my worst life.

The flight attendant guy, can I call him a steward? He's preparing to serve drinks, but first he's draining off all the water from the bags of ice that are now half empty from sitting on the tarmac since 10:30 a.m., and now it's 1 p.m. I think they said I get a free drink with my Allegiant Airlines credit card. Ugh. How embarrassingly depressing would it be to have an Allegiant credit card? But at least we got to hear a super long sales speech about signing up for this amazing credit card.

OK. So they didn't bring a free drink right away. First, after an hour and a half in my seat without being offered anything to drink, they first come through and ask if I'd like to buy a nice salty snack. Not free. Purchase. So, I held back for a salty retort like, "I'd love whatever snack you'd like to give me enduring this three hour delay." Welcome to discount air travel, because that free beverage I was patiently waiting for shows how naive I am. Oh, and there's no free beverage coming ever, you silly idiot, no matter how long we made you sit on the runway. Not even water.

All of this after my TSA PreCheck didn't not show on my ticket, despite absolutely positively entering it on the Allegiant website. And when I go back to the website, I can't do anything unless I first choose my seats... which I chose over a month prior. But they still want me to choose my seats again, and I can't proceed to another page of the booking info unless I pick new seats... again. So, I definitely did not do that since I had "good" seats. The narrowest, most cramped airplane seat I've even been in. Anyway, whoever's kid made the website, they should go back and look into that.

But I arrived in one squished piece. Thank heavens there was an open seat in our row so we could put it in the middle and not hate life. The same relief was allowed to us on the way back when we had seats in the exit row. But then this happened: Across the aisle was an entirely empty exit row. These rows have another foot or so of leg room. The plane was loaded, and there were empty seats scattered around the flight. A very tall man a row ahead of me on the other side of the aisle asked the flight attendant if he could just scoot back a row to let his very long legs have a fighting chance. And she said, "We can do that, but it will be an additional \$30."

I was stunned. Is this the bottom of the barrel of corporate greed and the death of customer service? I could not believe what I heard. The guy should have not even said anything and just moved when he had the chance, but by being polite, he got the smackdown. I don't care if that's company policy, that's just terrible business. If they'd have asked every one of us who apparently paid more to sit in these coveted seats if we cared if this big guy took one in an empty row for free, we'd have all said, "Of course, go ahead." Because we're human beings all suffering through this together.

I just hoped they wouldn't charge me to hand my trash to the flight attendant before preparing for landing. At least I knew well enough on the return flight to bring a bottle of water on the plane with me. I just don't think "discount" has to come with a lack of common sense and basic human kindness.

It's too bad that enjoying a vacation inevitably involves enduring the trip to get to it. But the Princess Cruise Line was lovely. They get it. I'll tell you about that next time! ■





# Together We Rise at the Dubuque Pride Festival 2024

The Dubuque Pride Festival returns to downtown Dubuque Saturday, June 1, from noon to 4 p.m., in what promises to be the largest ever Pride Month celebration in Dubuque history. After gaining consistent momentum over the previous two years, the outdoor street festival is again expanding to feature multiple entertainers, more food trucks, vendor and resource booths, and an increased footprint occupying the side street and parking lot alongside the Multicultural Family Center located at 1157 Central Ave. and 11th Street.

"This is for the future generations of our LGBTQIA+ community. I want them to see they have a place in our town, to know that they are safe, welcome, and wanted," said committee volunteer and Dubuque City Council member Danny Sprank. "I believe Dubuque as a whole supports the queer community. Folks see many of us in various aspects of everyday life. We are your family members, and we work in so many parts of the Dubuque community from health care workers to teachers, and as owners of small and large businesses."

Proof of both the need and the community support for the festival is the record-breaking crowd of more than 850 that attended the event in 2023. It was the largest of any Pride event in the city's history to date, and as a result, the planning committee knew it once again had to increase its offerings, a good problem to have, in order to provide the local LGBTQIA+community with the caliber of event they have long asked for and deserve.

Often represented by an array of rainbows and parades, June's Pride Month is so much more. It's a time for fun and festivities and an opportunity to celebrate the progress for acceptance made by the queer community, but it's also a moment to reflect on the origins of the tradition, one born of struggles for civil rights and the Stonewall uprising of 1969. While this year again saw a spate of proposed anti-LGBTQIA+ legislation in Iowa, mostly directed at transgender individuals, many of it never came to pass but caused much upheaval within the lives of many, so this local event offers an opportunity for the gueer community to enjoy themselves in a safe, accepting environment, and for local allies to stand in support. "I'd like people to know that our community is here and

always has been. Asking us to hide isn't good for our mental health, and events like ours show others that we are just regular people living healthy, productive lives in this community," said committee member and MFC board member Chuck Harris. "Studies show that having just one positive adult role model supporting them allows an LGBTQIA+ person to become a more well-adjusted, invested community member. This festival goes far to dispel the myths the media often portrays us as."

While no longer the small family picnic that began more than a decade ago, this year's festival is still accessible and family friendly. Planned by a small, dedicated committee of volunteers, it was obvious to all involved that another expansion was necessary to accommodate the growing crowd. Planning began in the fall of 2023, with the committee securing an impressive list of local sponsors whose financial contributions almost solely fund the block party. "I think this year's boost in support is due to the political environment and the fear that we will lose rights," said Sprank. "We truly cannot thank our sponsors and donors enough for their support of the festival. They recognize the need for resources and community conversations

and have stepped up to help in a meaningful way, which should be commended."

This year's expanded entertainment features DJ Buck spinning tunes, with performances by Dubuque's very own Cirque du Bugue drag troupe, and a dance segment presented by longtime supporter of the festival, Adam's Dance Connection. There are more than 40 vendor and resource booths from local and regional organizations including Hillcrest, Crescent Community Health Center, One Iowa, the LGBTQ Iowa Archives and Library from Iowa City, Iowa City Pride, and Cedar Rapids Pride. Businesses include numerous local LGBTQIA+ owned or supportive favorites like Planted., Chain Vintage, and creatives like ceramicist Tab Link, local maker AliRags, and inclusive salon Ritual Beauty.

There will be bounce houses, a Rec-N-Roll activity trailer, and face painting for children, and a limited number of free picnic-style lunches with vegan and gluten-free options available. There is limited table seating, with the addition of standing tables for mingling, and a tented area in front of the stage perfect for dancing in celebration with friends. This year's food vendors include Myson's Tacos and Burritos, The Tangy

Loaf serving up baked treats, Steadyhoggin offering their BBQ favorites, the Sweet Sugar Shack serving ice cream treats, and the Hibachi Time Japanese food truck, all with options for purchase.

A brand new DBQ Pride Festival T-shirt design will also make its debut. Already garnering buzz on the group's social media accounts, the T-shirt pays tribute to the Dubuque city scape with the festival's new slogan, "Together We Rise," and can be purchased at the festival in an array of sizes, but consider getting yours early because quantities are limited at this time.

This year also sees two exciting collaborations, the first between DBQ Pride and the Dubuque Area Arts Collective (DAAC). The Art of Pride: Midwest Queer Perspectives art exhibit opens June 7 at the Smokestack, 62 E. 7th St., and will feature works which embody the queer experience from local and regional LGBTQIA+ identified artists and allies. Submissions are open through May 23 at **DubuqueArts.com**, with guest co-curation by DBQ Pride Festival committee member and author of this feature, S. Eliot Steuer. As a volunteer-driven nonprofit arts organization, the DAAC strives to give a home to artists of all levels and mediums, and DBQ Pride and the Multicultural Family Center are thrilled to be able to showcase the art of our queer community with their generous assistance.

They will be in Dubuque on the evening of the Pride Festival, from 5 to 8:30 p.m., at the Alliant Energy Amphitheater, 600 Star Brewery Dr. Featuring Love Letters, Artistic Director's Tom Mattingly's ode to the LGBTQ community of lowa, this event also includes free family activities and an excerpt from Ballet Des Moines' A Midsummer Night's Dream.

"We're excited for this year's again expanded event" said Sarah Petersen, Assistant Director of Dubuque's Multicultural Family Center, the nonprofit organization responsible for the festival. "Last year's event was incredible, and the previous year, the first in this format, was amazing so we know 2024's crowd is going to be big." Petersen and the committee estimate upwards of 1,500 people could be in attendance but admit numbers could exceed that. "The desire for this event is there in a big way, and the Dubuque community in general wants to celebrate LGBTQIA+ people and support their rights, which aligns with everything the MFC values," Petersen continued.

As a free, family-friendly event funded primarily by community donors, T-shirt, and yard sign sales, all additional funds raised go towards helping finance future yearly Pride celebrations in addition to the adult and teen bi-monthly support groups and future initiatives such as ally training, quarterly youth and adult social events, safe zone training, and more through the MFC, all vital opportunities that enrich the entire Dubuque community, not only the lives of those who identify as LGBTQIA+.



# All Generations Converge at the Dubuque Arboretum and Botanical Gardens

We recently profiled the growing opportunities for residents 55+ to engage in the arts in Dubuque. But that engagement extends far beyond arts and crafts. Did you know that the Dubuque Arboretum and Botanical Gardens are almost entirely maintained by volunteers? Operating on grants and donations, the Arboretum relies on its dedicated volunteers, an estimated 90% of whom are aged 55 or above. "We have over three hundred volunteers who maintain and care for our grounds. The average age is probably around 65 years old, which means that many of them are retired and wanting to stay busy and connect with others," said Jenna Hirtz, the Arboretum and Botanical Gardens' Executive Director. Each of the floral beds at the arboretum is adopted by a volunteer or group, without whose help the well-tended plant and floral specimens wouldn't exist as an oasis of calm for local citizens and visitors alike.

"I feel like the 55-plus age group are from a generation of people who want to give back to society. They saw their parents do it, so it was embedded in them to care about the community, to make a difference and an impact for future generations," said Hirtz. Arboretum visitors who come out to enjoy the grounds, go on daily walks, and take advantage of the yoga

practices offered at the Arboretum, are also from that demographic; it's their volunteerism that allows people of all ages to have such a beautiful place to retreat to.

"Everyone loves it here," said Jeanne Eudaley, a longtime volunteer and common face at the counter in the gift shop and visitors center. "Everybody who volunteers gets along well, and the people coming in to enjoy the gardens love it here, too." Having lost her husband and being retired from her job, Eudaley takes great pride in the connections she's made in her time at the Arboretum, both as an

ambassador for those who visit and from her time spent enjoying the grounds.


"Jeanne is very dedicated to us," said Hirtz. "She definitely knows her way around here. She's a great helper and indicative of our core volunteers in terms of passion and age demographics."

Staying physically active and socially engaged while aging has become a top priority amongst the so-called Baby Boomers generation, with the Arboretum offering the perfect place to take a mental health break in nature while offering the ability to connect with other people in the process. In the past year, more accessible walkways and paths have been added making the space more user friendly for all, and the paved driveway loop is exactly a half mile, making for a safe and easy spot for seniors to get in their daily steps outdoors, in all seasons, as the Arboretum is open 7 a.m. to dusk, 365 days a year.

"When they come here, they tell us they feel like they're at home. They've had these outdoor experiences all their lives, unlike younger generations who are engaged heavily with technology, and coming here, they get to continue to do that," said Hirtz. "We are connecting with a lot more people, having hired our first events coordinator last year, so in addition to the things we've been doing forever like our Music in

the Gardens concert series which is especially popular with that age group, we're adding over 30 different events for all ages, and a lot of educational events which we find the 55+ demographic is engaging in either by themselves, with friends, or with other generations of their families."

Of these events planned throughout the year, there are a variety of new summer offerings designed to appeal to an array of interests, many shared by the demographic. On June 11, the Herb Society of Dubuque will sponsor an educational session, Basic Culinary Herbs, in the Heinemann Visitor Center, a lead-up to HerbFest 2024, which is held on June 23. The festival features a silent auction, herb garden tours, tasty treats, handcrafted items, herbal sample plants, and more. In July, the Arboretum will host Dr. John Brennan for the educational session Gardening with Native Plants on the 11th, a Pressed Flower Art workshop will be held on the 21st, and a session on Seed Saving: From Vegetables to Medicinals, with clinical herbalist Briana Cushman, is scheduled for the 25th.

On Aug. 1, there is a session on Herbs for Relaxation, also with Briana Cushman, and then the Sundaes in the Gardens Ice Cream Social on Aug. 4. This event includes free sundaes from noon to 1:30 p.m., plus food and coffee for purchase, an arts and crafts sale, and more. There is an educational session on the 15<sup>th</sup>, Herbal Immune Boosters, just in time for autumn, and then capping off summer is the session Tree Problems + Maintenance with Ray Kruse on Sept. 5, which is sponsored by the Dubuque County Extension Office. Of course, there is the ever-popular, long-running Music in the Gardens

concert series. Though open to and heavily attended by all generations, it's a mainstay event that's especially popular with the 55+ crowd. Presented for 13 weeks every year, it takes advantage of the area's beautiful, short-lived warm weather by offering an array of quality musical acts ranging from big band to blues, rock, and an ever-popular selection of tribute bands. This year's options guarantee there is something for everyone, and as always, all concerts are presented free of charge thanks to a long-standing partnership between the Arboretum and the Dubuque Arts Council (DAC). Happening every Sunday evening from June 2 to Aug. 25, dancing is encouraged, as is bringing your own lawn chair or picnic blanket to spread on the grass as bench seating is limited. There is also an array of food trucks and vendors that change weekly, so guests can enjoy dinner, a snack, or a beverage while outdoors enjoying the live music.

Known for its plentiful summer festivals, cultural events, and Art on the River sculpture installation, Dubuque has a reputation for community enrichment through investment in the arts, and Music in the Gardens has been a long-running fixture on the scene since its inception more than 25 years ago. The concert series continues to provide a unique listening experience with concertgoers treated to great music while enjoying the lush beauty surrounding them. It's not unusual to see adults dancing along with their kids, and grandparents dancing with their grandchildren. It's long been described by Arboretum members as "the place to be on Sunday evenings."

As always, Music in the Gardens 2024 remains committed to being a concert


series for everyone, drawing a diverse crowd that spans the generations, from children and families to couples and the 55+ population alike. By keeping the event free, it affords the entire community an equal opportunity to enjoy the arts in Dubuque, with the ultimate mission being to provide cost-free, high-quality entertainment that the entire family can enjoy.

This year's offerings include several tribute acts including Elton Jeff & the Honky Cats: An Elton John Experience; Sail On, a Beach Boys Tribute Band; a Rat Pack Tribute Band called the Ocean's Rat Pack: and Anthem's Grand Illusion: A Tribute to the Music of Styx. In addition to its tribute acts, Music in the Gardens will also feature The Dubuque Symphony Orchestra: Hunter Fuerste's American Vintage Orchestra; and acts like Whiskey Road, who combine the best of classic, southern, and country rock; and 10 of Soul, a high-energy, 11-piece band who perform a dynamic range of classic soul, funk, and pop. Rounding out the lineup are lowaborn singer-songwriter Luke Viertel and singer-cabaret vocalist Amy Friedl Stoner with the Skyline Band; Secrets, playing a variety of '60s, '70s, and '80s covers; Kids from Wisconsin, a song-and-dance band; and Jonny Lyons & the Pride playing electrifying old-time rock'n'roll and soul.

People sometimes arrive as early as 3 p.m. to stake out their favorite spot, with past events having drawn from 1,000 to 3,000 in attendance each Sunday. It's advised to arrive early to ensure a good spot, but not to let the numbers intimidate you since the beauty of this outdoor venue is that the music can be heard throughout the sprawling garden complex, ensuring there is always a comfortable spot to enjoy the band, with attendees free to wander the property, taking in the sights while enjoying the music.

Proving there is no age limit on social engagement, enjoying the outdoors, or rocking out to the songs of your youth or those of the symphony, The Dubuque Arboretum and Botanical Gardens is a home to all, but it's an especially enriching option for those nearing or in retirement who are looking for ways to stay engaged, to gather with their friends, or to serve their community through the love and care of nature. "Our seniors have the flexibility that allows them to be our backbone," said Hirtz, "and we're here doing what we do largely because of them."



Deneen Powell Atelier shares their vision: "Our inspiration has been years of studying children's behavior through the lens of children's garden design. For our futures, our children's futures, our children's children futures and so on, we desperately need to create places where we can engage in outdoor exploration, discovery and physical nature play, not only to properly develop bodies and minds but to gain an appreciation and love of nature, to preserve what we have, and rebuild natural spaces for the future."


A year after its announcement, construction is currently in full swing for The Wanderwood Gardens, where imagination and nature will soon come together to create a vibrant and magical space! Crews have started to mark out structure sites, remove trees, and clean brush away at the site. We're so excited to watch this project take shape.

# Millennium Bar & Marina

My friendlies, have you ever been "boat hungry"? Yes, I'm going to explain what I mean by that! Let me have my damn intro, Mom!

Boat hungry is when you've spent all day out on the water having all the fun that comes with it, and SOMEHOW the coolers ended up with way more beers than food, so you just kind of forget to eat. Or that hunger is a thing. Not until you come into the marina and smell what's sizzling in the kitchen do you realize you have probably never been more hungry in your life. And then you realize that this hunger has progressively been altering your mood for the worse all day. And then you realize that you owe your dear friends some apologies and appetizers. And you're not getting off with an order of cheese curds, jerk. Oh, no. You're buying steak bites for the whole table. AND cheese curds.

One might call it "hangry," but that's been trademarked, and I respect people's intellectual property, dammit. And it isn't nautically themed at all. Oh! We can portmanteau "hanker" and "anchor"! Starting again...

My friendlies, have you ever been hanchored?

I ask because when you're hanchored... well... the food doesn't HAVE to be all that great to satisfy, does it? Anything off the frozen food truck will be juuuuuust fine, thank you, and I'm not kidding, either. And so a marina restaurant is more than cool, in my book, to serve the same seasoned fries you've had at dozens of places before. They're a classic for a reason, and running a marina can't be all that easy, so why make it harder by instituting a scratch kitchen in your restaurant? Pretty much ALL food tastes a thousand times better after a day on the water, so why bother making it from scratch, right?

Right. But also wrong.

Because take that hanchored feeling we've been workshopping here. Imagine how eager you are and how you're going to attack that burger or go into business with that steak, or jump that shrimp po'boy's bones. Now imagine satiating that hunger NOT with "good enough" but with "Why would we stop at our food?" What if that hunger was reined in by a scratch kitchen that gives a damn?

That's Millennium Bar & Marina.

As a man of the world, I have experienced this hanchored feeling I speak of and have also heard tell of and witnessed it. That said, I'm not a frequent boater. I like being on boats, but it's just not the life I lead. The point is, if I'm at a marina, I'm probably there for the food. So as one of the guys who probably drove to get to the marina, I do appreciate the care with which Millennium prepares their menu. And I'm here to share with you some of my favorites from that menu. Ready? Go.

The Seafood Boil Bag, Ding-dingding! The match is over, and we have a clear winner. The seafood boil bag is my absolute favorite thing to get at Millennium. In my bill-paying life, I'm an advertising copywriter. Several of my clients are Louisiana casinos, so I'm forced to write dream-haunting things like "All-You-Can-Eat Crawfish Boil!" or "Add a pound of crab legs for..." whatever ridiculously low price. But that stuff is way down in Louisiana. I live in Dubuque. Not that we don't have good seafood available around here. Fools will try to tell you we don't. Don't let them. It's just not AS available around here. So when I get that feeling, Millennium's boil bag is what gives me my seafood healing. And bonus: I don't have to go anywhere near the state of Louisiana to do it. So what do you get in it? Well! For \$24, you get your choice of three: shrimp, mussels, sausage, mini scallops, or a whole catfish! You can add snow crab legs or another item for an additional charge. Accompanying your seafood on this journey will be red potatoes and a seasonal veggie. All that is boiled up to perfection, obscenely drizzled with butter, and seasoned with vour choice of garlic, Caiun, or Old Bay seasonings. I mean, be sensible here. This is not a clean eat. Stuff is going to drip down your chin and possibly your wrists. But you just got off the river, and you're famished. People here understand.

It's not a regular menu item, but if it's a special when you go, I also recommend the open-faced hot beef sandwich. Oh how I love a good hot beef sandwich. So friggin' rib-stickingly hearty and savory! Yeah, hell yeah. Not familiar? See if you can follow: You take a slice or two of bread, sometimes toasted. Usually thicker than a regular white bread. Think Texas toast. Then throw some thinly-sliced roast beef on there. Or if it's cooked to fall-apart yumminess, just let it fall apart. It'll hardly be seen under the huge mound of mashed potatoes you're about to scoop on top of it,

anyway. Then on top of all THAT, a healthy (and by "healthy" I mean "unhealthy") ladling of brown gravy. Now... remember several years ago when people were making fun of the gluttony of KFC's Famous Bowls? We've been making hot beef sandwiches like this for generations. So what did we expect? Anyway, you can see how you could easily put that dish together with ready-made components, right? I mean it's a way to get rid of leftovers, for goodness sake. And it's probably a way to get rid of leftovers at Millennium, too. No shame in that game. Wasting food sucks. But the roast beef, the mashed potatoes, the gravy? All made from scratch. No jars, cans, or dehydrated "buds." And it's so much better for it. The hot beef sandwich is one of the all-time classic sandwiches, in the hall alongside sandwiches like the reuben and the muffuletta. Respect it. Millennium does, and you can taste it.

Oh, but maybe you smelled someone grilling while you were boating, and now all you want in this world and the next is a friggin' burger. Well, prepare to bless the day you docked up at Millennium. #### **Grilled Zucchini Boats with Greek Salad SERVES 4**

#### All You Need:

- 2 (9 to 12 ounce) zucchini, cut in half lengthwise
- ½ tsp kosher salt, divided
- ¾ tsp Hy-Vee coarsely ground black pepper, divided
- ¼ cup Chosen Foods Lemon Garlic dressing

- 2. Cut zucchini lengthwise in half; season with ¼ teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon black pepper.
- Place zucchini, cut sides down, on the grill rack. Grill for 12 to 15 minutes, rotating occasionally, until slightly tender and with grill marks. Remove from grill; cool slightly.
- 4. Scoop out flesh from each zucchini half to make ¼-inch thick shells, using a ½ teaspoon measuring spoon. Reserve scooped-out zucchini flesh for another use. Season shells with remaining ¼ teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon black pepper.
- 5. For salad, place Chosen Foods Lemon Garlic dressing in a medium bowl. Add garbanzo beans, cucumber, tomatoes, olives, red onion, feta cheese, 1 tablespoon oregano, 1 tablespoon parsley and remaining ¼ teaspoon black pepper; gently toss to coat. Let stand for 10 minutes, tossing occasionally.

# Lessons in Chemistry

A friend sent me Bonnie Garmus's book, Lessons in Chemistry, after she'd read it. The paperback should be coming out soon, since the hardcover was published two years ago, has since sold 6 million copies, and has been made into a TV miniseries starring Brie Larson. It's very unusual for a book to make the leap to film within a year of publication. Stunning achievement for a first time novelist.


This is not the best book ever written. I need to say that now because I'm going to swoon about it for the rest of this review. It was rejected 98 times before someone saw the best seller within. There are some anachronisms and loose threads. But there are many reasons why it has become and deserves to be the phenomenon that it is.

Remember the Reese Witherspoon classic Legally Blonde? Think of Lessons in Chemistry as "Chemically Blonde". It's a story about issues that we may wish were relics of history but are all too contemporary. The Kansas City football team's kicker, Harrison Butker, recently gave a headline-worthy commencement speech. In it, he dismissed women students' professional aspirations while elevating their potential as wives (presumably of men) and baby makers. He could have been a character ripped from this book. Mr. Butker's faith-based misogyny is exactly what Elizabeth, the book's hero, resists. But the misogyny isn't just of religious origin. It's everywhere. However, this is not an anti-religion screed. One of the pivotal and most sympathetic characters is a minister, a former student at Harvard Divinity School.

Elizabeth is a free thinking brilliant chemist researching abiogenesis. (No, you don't need to know chemical jargon, but it's fun to learn interesting new words). She was pursuing her PhD when one of the worst expressions of misogyny derailed her career. In addition to being brilliant, she was also distractingly beautiful. This impeded, rather than advanced, her opportunities. She went to work in a research laboratory, where she met Calvin. He was another brilliant chemist with a mysterious, possibly tragic, past, who understood and respected her work. They hit it off in a big way. They had a daughter, adopted a dog, and things were sailing along until they fell apart. Elizabeth presses on, with help from a neighbor and unexpected friends.

One of Garmus's strengths is her grasp of character complexity and development. Do not expect your first impression of a character to lull you into thinking you know what role they are there to play. People change, sometimes dramatically. It's nice to see a writer who knows that.

Garmus's writing may remind you of John Irving or, more classically,



Kate Chopin (*The Awakening*) or Sigrid Undset (*Gunnar's Daughter*). Or another author of page turners whose female protagonists combine strength and humor.

"Like so many undesirable men, Mr. Sloane truly believed other women found him attractive. Harriet had no idea where that specific brand of self-confidence came from. Because while stupid people may not know they're stupid because they're stupid, surely unattractive people must know they're unattractive because of mirrors."

Her esteem for education and intelligence is reminiscent of Robertson Davies or Chaim Potok. Or, if you're talking street smarts, of Ann Lamott's *Rosie* or *Operating Instructions*. (One of the great things about the book is how many other favorite books and authors it brought to mind.)

Lessons in Chemistry strikes many resonant chords—as did the miniseries, apparently. If you search for the title, one of the frequent questions asked is, "Will there be a second season?" One element that defies stereotypes is that, while Elizabeth is gifted in the kitchen, her gift flows from her expertise in chemistry. She did not learn to cook, or go to school, in order to hook a man. And she makes a mean cup of coffee, even if she doesn't want to be her male coworkers' "make me a sandwich" girl. You may take inspiration from her method of kitchen remodeling. Or not.

Garmus gives us characters who are good company. Wouldn't you want to join the coffee klatch in which the following exchange took place?

"My suspicion? [Dr. Spock's wife] wrote the whole thing, then put his name on it. A man's name gives it more authority, don't you think?"

"No," Elizabeth said.

"Agreed."

You're going to love this one. Perfect airplane or beach read. Thanks, Lorraine, for sending it along. ■

# It's In The Eyes

Next to breathing, smiling is the most important and simplest action you can take. Now, to create a truly powerful tool, combine that smile with eye contact. When you do, you build a communication technique so effective it's practically been outlawed in elevators, airports, and used car lots across the country. Eye contact determines the difference between a successful encounter and one that leads to embarrassment or even rejection.

Eye contact with a smile is the quickest, easiest, and cheapest way to get what you want. Ninety percent of people say they are more likely to trust someone who maintains eye contact. It's the No. 1 form of nonverbal communication and the best way to get someone's attention. It lays the foundation for communication and is a terrific step toward making a positive first impression, forming friendships, and building business relationships.

Trust and eye contact are closely related—almost like peanut butter and jelly. Failing to make eye contact causes

suspicion faster than a politician's promise. The eyes speak silently, but they speak truthfully. Avoiding eye contact sends a negative message, making you appear shifty, sneaky, guilty, bashful, or frightened. If you have a habit of looking away while listening, it shows a lack of interest. Failing to maintain eye contact while speaking at a minimum shows a lack of confidence in what you are saying and at a maximum indicates that you are not trustworthy.

While using eye contact, be careful not to stare, squint, or blink your eyes rapidly—you're not in a staring contest, after all. Consider how long you look into someone's eyes when you speak. Eye contact expresses intimacy, and as a direct glance becomes longer, the feelings become more intense. Because of the intimacy and openness involved with eye contact, some people often have trouble with it. Eye contact does not come naturally to everyone. About 60% of people report having difficulty making eye contact. If you find yourself nervous about making eye contact, start small and keep working on improving. With practice, you will become more comfortable with giving people direct eye contact, and you'll enjoy the benefits—plus, people will finally stop wondering if you're hiding something!

Each program's performance was evaluated through assessments conducted by the organization's personnel and board of directors, and their Coordinating Program, which works in partnership with Main Street America to identify local programs that meet rigorous national community evaluation standards. These standards provide the Main Street America network with a strong foundational framework to review progress, recognize strengths, understand trends, and identify strategies that move Main Street programs forward. To quality for designation, communities must demonstrate a strong commitment to the Main Street model, meet a set of baseline



requirements, and achieve outcomes in six areas: broadbased community commitment to revitalization; inclusive leadership and organizational capacity; diversified funding and sustainable program operations; strategydriven programming; preservation-based economic development; and demonstrated impact and results.





# Summer Gardening Success

### Tips for Cultivating a Thriving Garden

Gardening during the summer months presents unique challenges and opportunities, with its blend of warm temperatures, occasional bouts of humidity, varying soil types, and hopefully some rain periodically throughout the season. 
