Well, what a difference a couple of weeks make, eh? What a profound shift has occurred in the election climate. I can count on two fingers the amount of presidents who willingly gave up a chance at continued power for the sake of the nation's future. Thank you, Joe, for your service to the nation and four years of incredible recovery and growth. For a "confused old man," he sure did a lot a smart and impactful things to make America the No. 1 economy in the world again and so much more, despite the 118th Congress being the least functional in history (based on legislation passed). Anyway, in weirder news... J.D. Vance!

Moving on... I don't know about your summer, but mine is flyin' by. Regular readers know that my winters are pretty filled up with Marine Corps Toys for Tots-related activities, but never before has the program created so much work and activity for me in the apex of summer. But here we are. This is mainly due to an amazing three semi-load

sized donation of brand-new toys from the Hasbro Corporation via the National Toys for Tots Foundation. I wrote about it a of couple issue back, mostly complaining about truck drivers' unwillingness to read delivery manifests until they're at your door. It's a LOT of a few items which will be amazing for creating a base for toy distributions this Christmas season, but in some ways, it's also a lot more of a few things that we can really effectively put to good use in our community. So here's what I've been doing since then.

We had to get active and creative immediately with getting these toys to great homes and also doing some swapping with other Toys for Tots campaigns to turn a ton of a few things into a half ton of twice as many things. And that's what we're doing now. Since unloading the nearly million-dollar load of toys last month, we've already swapped more than a half semi with Quincy, IL, and between the two of us, we delivered nearly a semi's worth of toys to the program serving the Burlington, IA region. Next, we'll be making a swap with the program in the Mason City, IA area to do the same thing. Get more variety for us, and this time, give a little more than we got to redistribute the wealth. We also loaded up Carroll County, IL (Savannah) Toys for Tots with hundreds of toys and look to get some pallets to Cedar Rapids, IA, who have always been kind to us in the past.

As great as getting our hands on such an amazing gift is for us, some of the greatest joys in the gift is being able to share it wisely and make big impacts far beyond just our backyard while at the same time only enhancing that impact we make right here at home. And did I mention that I never really paid much attention to how hot it gets in the warehouse in the summer? But when an old fat guy starts spending hours there on 90 degree days, well... it's not exactly Christmas in July!

We've loaded up a number of regional libraries to support their Summer Reading Programs awards so they can divert the funds they might have used to buy those rewards and put them to use funding other programs at the libraries. We also partnered again with the Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque, this time to send hundreds of learning games to area school district's preschool programs for the 2024–25 school year.

We sent a big load of toys to the Dubuque County Fair to support prizes on Kids' Day as the fair is one of those magical family-centered community icons that will always be worth investing in. We hope they were a big hit!

On top of all of that, we're super charging some wonderful summer youth engagement programs in Dubuque, especially those targeted at at-risk and lower-income communities. In the next week, three amazing events will take



place in downtown Dubuque's north-end district: The Multicultural Family Center's July 31 Super Summer Sendoff at Comiskey Park, Resources Unite's Backto-School Bash at Audubon School on Aug. 3, and the Dubuque Police Department led National Night Out celebration back at Comiskey Park on Aug. 6.

Between the three events, Toys for Tots will be distributing toys worth over \$20,000 to the kids and families attending these events. This is a wonderful way to take a bite out of some of the specific toys that we literally got tons of, leaving a more manageable amount for the holiday season. And, I mean, come on... who wants to get a Nerf Super Soaker for Christmas anyway? That's a perfect August present, and man, we have pallets of them, and we're taking them to National Night Out. Sorry if you get a little wet down there!





Zobrist made his big-league debut with the Tampa Bay Devil Rays in 2006 and played nine seasons with the club. In 2015, he spent the first half of the season in Oakland before being traded to the Royals and contributing to the team's championship run. He spent the final three years of his career with the Cubs before retiring after the 2019 season.

Dubuque Museum of Art Previews Designs for New Arts Campus

On July 24, the Dubuque Museum of Art (DuMA) publicly unveiled the concept designs for a new arts campus that would extend Washington Park. "Every day, I come to understand more and more that the impact of this design is much greater than what you would expect from a traditional art museum," said the museum's executive director, Gary Stoppelman.

"Our intention is to connect and add to the experiences that are already happening in the park," said Paul Schulhof one of the principals of Schulhof and Rashidi Architects, the firm selected to design the new museum campus.

"Imagine," added Azadeh Rashidi, the firm's other principal, "that art festivals like DubuqueFest could happen in the park but also extend into the Museum's programs pavilion, its classrooms, performance spaces, café, and even the galleries."

"We could have artist conversations in the evening in the event spaces, artist demonstrations in the classrooms, performances on the plaza, an opening night benefit party in the lobby," added Stoppelman. "Our vision, is to host more programs, more hours, more people, more days of the week than what you expect at a traditional art museum. Therefore, not every program will be a museum-created program. We've been talking with other organizations and artists about their needs and how this could be a whole new center for our community."

"Imagine," repeated Rashidi, "Bluff Strokes teaching plein air painting in indoor-outdoor studios and classrooms, outdoor screenings on the terrace by the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival, fashion shows by local designers, chamber performances by DSO musicians on nights when the full symphony is not playing, or even full outdoor concerts—like what's happened at the arboretum—with the museum as the backdrop and historic Washington Park as the theater."

"Schulhof and Rashidi were selected for their community-engaged approach," added Stoppelman. "One of the earliest steps in their process was to convene a heterogeneous group of community members to work with them throughout the design process and the first question that they asked was, 'What do we need to know about those who are not coming?"

"Our process begins with listening," added Schulhof. "We never begin with the end in mind, but rather a series of questions to understand the needs that could be met."

"And what we heard," said Stoppelman, "was programming, programming, programming. Community members challenged us with three powerful questions that resonate with me to this day. Most directly, we heard, 'I want to know that my kids are going to be loved here."

Asked what the design means to him, community advisory taskforce member Dale Campbell Jr., founder and CEO of Positive Productions Plus, LLC didn't mince words. "For me as a black man, the campus means hope for a future filled with beauty. The approach is 'on purpose and for the purpose of' reaching out to children of color. Without that, there would be little to no opportunity to learn and be influenced by art. That would be a tragedy."

Outdoor sculptures and gardens will welcome visitors to the campus. "I want kids in this community to grow up playing on art before anyone ever tells them it's not for them," said Stoppelman. Gardens welcome visitors on all fours sides of the campus. When entering from 8th Street, the Education Courtyard playfully inspires exploration and contemplation. Inspired by the alleys in the Millwork District, a cultivated path invites visitors into the interior of the block. The Courtyard in a downtown oasis that integrates art and gardens. During weekdays, it will serve as an outdoor classroom for the 180 children attending daycare next door-and a place for parents to pause before they pick their children up.

Visitors to the museum's galleries on the west side of the courtyard can take a break from looking and discuss what they've seen. Courtyard windows allow natural light into the classrooms, and benches invite student conversation. At night, the courtyard will host

private events and receptions. Schulhof and Rashidi have brought on Michael van Valkenburgh and Associates (MVVA) to design the landscape. MVVA is known as one of the leading landscape architecture firms in the country. Signature projects include the Obama and George

W. Bush Presidential Centers, Brooklyn Bridge Park, Maggie Daley Park in Chicago, and museums like the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum in Boston and the Menil Collection in Houston.

Describing the program pavilion that will house the community programs,

Rashidi said, "We see this as a beacon that will attract the community to downtown and visitors from around the country."

"Our intention," added Schulhof, "is that what differentiates this campus is what you see people doing—indoors and out—not just that this will be a beautiful form."

The context of Dubuque presented a creative challenge. "This is one of the first major new buildings in Downtown Dubuque in over a generation. What the board has asked us to do is create something that simultaneously feels of this place but also advances the conversation." The use of native plants will be an important way to root the buildings in this place. The architects were also inspired by the historic beauty of Dubuque. A saw tooth roof on the gallery pavilion is inspired by historic Millwork District buildings. The form allows the museum to allow for natural light in the galleries—key to experience of looking at art—and limit that light to the soft northern light—key to protecting the art.

Showing more art is one of the key motivators for the museum. Currently, less than 1% of the museum's collection is on view at any time. The museum envisions that sky-lit galleries on the second floor will be dedicated to the collection. For the first time, visitors will discover the depth and breadth of the museum's holdings. In addition of some of the most important paintings by Grant Wood, visitors can also explore the entire collection of Wood's lithographs alongside his designs for furniture and jewelry. Today, DuMA hosts a small installation of four to six of Edward Curtis' masterpiece, The North American Indian. In the new museum, visitors will immerse themselves in a gallery filled with a rotating installation of the over 720 large-scale Curtis photographs that the museum owns as well as discovering work by Indigenous American artists working in our region.

The museum hopes that the permanent collection will even inspire a love for reading. DuMA holds the complete collection of works by author-illustrator Arthur Geisert whose books have been named to the list of *The New York Times* Best Illustrated Children's Books three time. In the new galleries, the designers envision immersive, interactive, multimedia galleries where readers of all ages can walk into the worlds imagined in Geisert's books.

"2024 is DuMA's 150th anniversary," says Schulhof. "We envision a building and a campus that will last for the next 150 years. But, who are we to say what audiences and artists will need 25, 50, and 100 years from now? The best that we can do is to create a flexible framework that can live, adapt, and evolve right alongside the community and its artists."

The principals of Schulhof Rashidi are Paul Schulhof and Azadeh Rashidi, architects whose practice focuses on educational and cultural facilities. In their work with the firm Tod Williams Billie Tsien Architects + Partners, they served on the leadership team for the public spaces of David Geffen Hall at Lincoln Center in New York City, the Obama Presidential

Center in Chicago, the Hood Museum at Dartmouth College in New Hampshire, and the US Embassy in Mexico City. Following a highly competitive global search, Schulhof Rashidi were selected by DuMA for the firm's commitment to building community, experience with cultural sites, and joyful approach to design.

The selection concluded a highly competitive search conducted in collaboration with Anser Advisory, a national capital program and project advisory firm and division of Accenture. Fourty-three firms from around the world responded. The project is part of the museum's 2022-2026 Strategic Plan which is available on **DBQart.org**. Prior to the selection of the design architects, a 2022 Building Operational Feasibility Study with AEA Consulting and Straka Johnson architects estimated that the campus would have a projected gross floor area (GFA) of 47,159 square feet, plus 10,000 additional square feet of outdoor space, almost quadrupling the footprint of the current DuMA.

DuMA is now engaged in robust fundraising efforts to secure support for the project and its impact on the community. To date, \$41 million has been raised towards a project goal of \$69 million and a parallel campaign to raise \$20 million for the endowment.

The urgency has been raised by a generous challenge grant of \$25 million from the Butler Family Foundation. John Butler said, "Alice and I know that art can reach and teach young people and the young at heart, sometimes in ways that nothing else can. We are inspired by the quality of Paul and Az's design. Their concept boldly exceeds what many of us thought possible when this project began. It's been a long time coming, and we invite the entire community to join us. That is why we have committed to match every dollar donated up to \$25 million. It's that important, and Dubuque deserves this."

Stoppelman added, "Inspired by the Butler Family Challenge Grant, 15 donors have already come forward to pledge \$1 million in gifts ranging from \$200 to \$400,000. We are deeply grateful for the community's embrace of this project and the response that John and Alice have inspired"

The Dubuque Museum of Art (DuMA), founded in 1874 and accredited by the American Alliance of Museums in 2004, is Iowa's oldest cultural institution. Named a national affiliate of the Smithsonian Institution in 2016, DuMA's mission is to create engaging art experiences that excite, inspire, and connect the community. The museum is open Wednesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Sunday from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. More information can be found at **DBQart.org.** ■


Please note that during DBQFest, 7th and 6th Streets between Locust and Bluff Streets will be closed to ensure a safe environment for attendees.



Health screenings help to identify diseases and chronic conditions before symptoms occur. The CDC recommends:

- All people ages 13-64 should be screened for HIV at least once in their lifetime.
- All people ages 18 and over should be screened for hepatitis B at least once in their lifetime.
- All people ages 18 and over should be screened for hepatitis C at least once in their lifetime.
- Pregnant women should be screened for HIV, hepatitis B, and hepatitis C during each pregnancy.

Talk to your healthcare provider about getting screened! Forgot if you've had a screening? Ask them to check your records!

Screenings are important because HIV, hepatitis B and hepatitis C don't always have noticeable signs or symptoms. Some people should be tested **more often**—visit the web resources below to learn more!





The more serious alter ego of comic hickhop performer Upchurch the Redneck, Ryan Upchurch established a sideline career as a singer, performing songs significantly warmer and more personable than his purposefully rowdy rap material. 

But among those go-to faves, these are some of the things we always know we're going to get when we go out. Yes, we should probably try new things at these places, but if you know what's going to make you happy, why go get all creative?

Bryce's Picks

Chicken Salad Sliders Stone Cliff Winery

One of our favorite fast and easy lunch go-tos, especially during nice weather months, is the chicken salad sliders at Stone Cliff Winery in the Port of Dubuque. It's just good ol' simple smooth and savory chicken salad served up on four freshly toasted pretzel buns. And we always split an order and call it a lunch. It's enough, but it's still light and summery and goes well with an iced tea or, we're sure, a cool white wine from Stone Cliff. The chicken salad itself just seems to have the perfect blend of sweet and a bit of spice. It's not dry, and there's a generous portion on every bun. And if you sit outside under the pergola, you can even take your dog!

Breakfast Omelettes

Birdie's Bistro

Since its recent opening, Birdie's has become a regular weekend morning treat for us, whether we're hitting the Dubuque Farmers' Market or just out running errands on a Sunday. Or heck, when we have family in town and don't want to

cook breakfast. They have a lot of lunch entrees too, but we tend to gravitate to the omelettes, always served with the signature crispy country style potatoes. And even though I'm a devout bacon guy, I really like their round sausage patties too. My wife can get lots of veggies in her omelette with feta cheese and jalapeños while I can keep it old school with cheese and mushrooms. Pancakes are crazy fluffy, and friends love the chicken and biscuits and corned beef hash. But there are plenty of opportunities for variety to hit your morning sweet spot. And they have gluten-free toast which makes my wife very happy too. And you can get a copy of 365ink if they haven't run out!

Square Pizza

Driftless Pizza Co.

It's super new, but what can I say, I'm a fan. The Detriot-inspired pizza at the new Driftless Pizza Co. in the Millwork District ranks high on my personal pizza scale. Little Caesars pan pizza would be the bastardized version of Detroit style if you're wondering what I'm talking about, and yes, I do like that too. This is that idea taken to a higher level. And truer to form, the sauce is on the top with this

pizza and not too much, but they serve it with a bowl of sauce for dipping if you want a little more. We've had a few varieties now, and we've liked them all. A thick, airy crust with a crispy bottom and a crown of fried Wisconsin brick cheese forms the base. Great quality toppings (I like a good Italian sausage) and a couple pieces will likely do the trick. Try the Hot Honey Sausage or Figgy the White! I've found the cold pizza leftovers from the fridge to also be a fine snack. And it's in a great space in a cool part of downtown.

Catfish Nuggets

Catfish Charlie's

For me, a relaxing summer lunch is a visit to Catfish Charlie's patio and a serving of their fried catfish nuggets. They can be a meal unto themselves, or, I like the entree pairing with chicken fingers. I don't know what it is about them, but I just love the flavor, and crisp-but-flaky, locally caught catfish that isn't "fishy" as it were. And a nice big pile of them to share (or not share, as the case may be) helps too. It doesn't hurt that you are also sitting on a sunny patio looking out on the water of the Mississippi either. Add an ice-cold Arnold Palmer, and I'm all set!

Crispy Brussels Sprouts

Woodland's Restaurant at **Eagle Ridge Resort**

Yeah, yeah, it's kinda high falutin' fare and a bit of a drive, but man, the drive is well worth the visit to Woodland's Restaurant at Eagle Ridge Resort in Galena, IL. And as much magic is on the menu, we kind of always have to start with an order of the crispy brussels sprouts. They're not complex, but man, they are like little bits of veggie candy. Roasted (I assume) to a crispy outer layer, they are tossed in a sweet malpey glaze with cotija cheese and scallions. Cotija is like a mild Mexican feta or a parmesan depending on if it's young or aged. But the real magic here is the Nueske's bacon nuggets in there. If you know Nueske's bacon from just north of Green Bay, WI, then you already understand what I'm talking about. If not, you have to taste it to understand the difference. It's a true applewood-smoked bacon, not smoke flavor injected. You can tell the difference immediately, and it's otherworldly. Follow up with basically anything else on the menu, and you're good to go!

Danny's Picks

Bryce just sated your hunger, so now your ol' pal Danny is gonna slake your thirst. We are in the doggiest days of summer, and since sweating doesn't help much in this kind of humidity, we're all forced to drink. I'm going to keep it all-ages, though, and showcase some of my favorite nonalcoholic summer-rebuttal beverages.

Slush with Nerds

Sonic Drive-In

It sure didn't take me long to get nerdy on you. Get it? Cuz Sonic has an option where you can order your slush with Nerds candy in it. And it's amazing. Fun fact: Did you know that Nerds were invented when they tried to find a use for the leftover rounded off bits of Everlasting Gobstoppers? Yup. If you thought slushes in general were great on a dogdaisical day, you must also know that Sonic's are some of the best around because, unless you let it sit too long, you actually drink SLUSH and not JUST the melted stuff at the bottom where your straw reaches. You're drinking slush. Not flavored sugar water with a layer of slush on top of it. And then we add the Nerds. To paraphrase Belushi, Nerds have been on my training table since I was a kid. I have a very clear memory of my older brother accidentally spilling a bunch of Nerds on the sidewalk and me coming back when no one was watching to pick every last tiny tart bastard I could find. My favorite thing to do with this treat is to take my straw, drive it down into the slush, cork off the end with my finger, and draw it back out creating kind of a slushy core sample. Then I deposit it into my mouth and give myself a point for each Nerd I capture. Pro tip: Upgrade the classic (for good reason) cherry-flavored slush to cherry limeade flavor. You'll be glad you did.

Lemon Ice Cooler

Culver's

Don't be fooled. Last time I was at Culver's, their lemon ices weren't anywhere on the drive-thru menu, but I was still able to order them. Culver's takes the classic lemon Italian ice, and instead of making it something you have to (or GET to, depending on your opinion of Italian ice) forcefully shave off layers with your flimsy-ass spoon, they blend it up sippably smooth with real fruit flavors of your choice blended all up with it. It's awesome. And if you're not familiar enough

with the classic lemon ice to get the drift, just imagine being allowed to eat frozen lemonade concentrate straight from the can. It's incredible and refreshing and it's so smooth, and the real fruit chunks mixed with the familiar artificial fruit flavors gives you the best of both worlds. Artificial cherry flavor tastes nothing like real cherries, of course, but it turns out that they're two great tastes that taste great together.

Mach One

Jumble Coffee Co.

Did you know they make tiramisu-flavored syrup for coffee drinks? I know! It sounds obvious now that I mention it. Of course they make something like that, right? But let's think about this for a second. Tiramisu is made with ladyfingers dipped in coffee. And you're putting that flavor... into coffee. So... you're adding more coffee flavor... to your coffee. You see where I'm going with this? It's a coffee turducken. But that's not the whole story with the Mach One. See, you'd think that "Mach One" might be a reference to macchiato, a popular coffee drink. Nope. Let me lay it all out for you: A Mach One features tiramisu AND caramel flavors, with two extra shots of espresso. You don't even have to ask for extra shots. Unless you have an unhealthy relationship with caffeine. The "Mach" refers to the boost you're getting. I always feel a little bad about making folks dirty another dish for me, but I recommend ordering the Mach One blended. It kicks it up to at least Mach 3.

Chocolate Malt

Beecher's Ice Cream & Yogurts

Yes, a simple chocolate malt. And when I say "malt" I mean malt. Milkshakes are boring, no disrespect to Kelis. Her particular milkshake STILL brings this

boy to the yard. Give me that malted milk powder. Give me all of it. Pro tip: Want diner-quality pancakes from your pancake mix? Add a little malted milk powder. One of my earliest memories is having a little bit of my mom's malt she made for herself when she thought I was asleep. Blender woke me up. My mom worked as a soda jerk in high school, and she was the kind who held on to her skills. Beecher's is the closest to mom's. At Beecher's, you can go ahead and get crazy with the flavors if you want to. They always have an interesting take on classic ice cream flavors (their chocolate mint comes to mind) as well as some flavors of their own device (too many examples to think straight). But for me, it always comes back to chocolate. Always. And watching the pros at Beecher's portion out the ice cream (for a simple chocolate malt they make it easy on themselves and use soft-serve), the chocolate syrup, the malt powder, and a splash of milk, and then blend it all up in one of those devices that still uses the same basic design my mom used back in her day is what summer is all about for me.

Veggie Loaded Egg Muffins

MAKES 4 SERVINGS

All You Need:

- 2 jarred roasted bell peppers
- 1 green onion
- 2 cups baby spinach
- ½ cup Soiree reduced-fat feta crumbled cheese
- · 12 Hy-Vee large eggs

Hacks for Healthy Back-to-School Habits

Camino Ghosts

Ten pages into John Grisham's latest best seller, *Camino Ghosts*, and all the pieces of a great beach read are in place. First, a beach. Then, travel to foreign lands, a wedding, professional jealousy, and a story—or two—within a story. Add a little laughter for garnish. And a curse, to add spice.


While few would call this a brilliant book, there are brilliant moments when you know you're in the hands of a well-experienced author.

The story takes place on the Florida coast in a small town called Camino Island. The focus is on a now-deserted island nearby called Dark Isle. That island was-like the island in Another Eden, reviewed here months ago—a refuge for African people abducted by the slavery industry. In this story, a ship full of misery was within sight of its destination—and then a storm resulted in some of its crew and passengers washing up on Dark Isle's beach. Fast forward two or three centuries. The island's supposed last inhabitant, descendant of those enslaved people, learns that developers want to build casinos on what she says is her childhood home. The part in which Grisham describes the work of enslavers in Africa and on the ship coming over is the most powerful of the book. The way he contrasts that passage with the modern vacation travel experience is [chef's kiss].

If you've never read A Time to Kill, Grisham's first novel, you must. It is the perfect blend of page-turner and philosophical inquiry. Where is justice when vengeance is taken instead of going through the justice system?

But Grisham passes on giving the same attention to the big questions raised here. Instead, there he gives us witchcraft, curses, and lightly drawn characters and legal processes. It's a beach read. You brought Grisham, not Aristophanes. No problem. You want a quick read that keeps you engaged and lets you leave the cares of the job or family behind. You'll enjoy it. It's fine.

But you may wonder, as you breeze through, if four seasoned mercenaries would get lost on an island so easily. You might wonder how and why people lived on the island for so long. In a legal world that depends on official documents, you may wonder how to prove when and where you were born if you have no birth certificate. How do you prove ownership if there is no title? How do we balance governmental and commercial interests that are in conflict with yours? Is it wrong to want



to use land that has been neglected by its purported owner for decades? And why would you, when a recent storm should tell you that building there is a really bad idea?

He answers some of these questions in an off-handed way, like "oh, I need to tie off this loose end before sending the manuscript in later today." And while the story moves at a decent pace, after the first third of the book, it's not clear that Grisham cared. It moves from point A to point G with all the other points in order. But it feels more like looking at the route on a map rather than taking the ride.

The main idea I wish he'd explored is this: What makes a place sacred? And if it's sacred for only one person—if, indeed, their claim is valid—what obligation does that place on everyone else? What do laws and customs have to say about this? When does respect for an individual's claim become "every man for himself?" But that's not the novel Grisham wrote, even though it's one I'd have liked to read.

Grisham has written novels that deserve to be discussed in college law and philosophy classes. This one touches on some issues worthy of that kind of treatment. But I get the feeling his heart wasn't in writing this one—except for the slavery narrative. Not saying you won't like it. But, like Chinese food leaves you hungry an hour later, you may not find this third installment of the *Camino* series terribly satisfying or memorable.



Movie Buzz

It would be contingent on reuniting the entire main cast, and since actors like Judd Nelson would not participate in Andrew McCarthy's recent *Brats* documentary, it seems there is friction in achieving that goal.

Newly leaked photos from the set of HBO's *The Last of Us* have strongly hinted at how much of the

Finding Your Piña Colada

In Rupert Holmes's classic hit "Escape (The Piña Colada Song)," the narrative unfolds with a man seeking an escape from his mundane relationship. He scans the personal ads, intrigued by a woman who loves piña coladas and getting caught in the rain. In a twist of fate, he discovers that the woman he connects with is his current partner, revealing a shared yearning for adventure and connection. Positive escapes, on the other hand, provide lasting benefits, helping us face challenges with renewed energy and perspective.

By embracing positive escapes, we can rediscover joy and connection in our every-day lives, turning moments of stress into opportunities for growth and renewal.



I heard an interview with Richard Thompson—the Scottish singer-songwriter-guitarist I absolutely adore—on "Fresh Air" the other day. When he mentioned a new album, I wondered, "How should I buy it?" On my phone? Sure, easy. But no. I'm buying the CD, and if I can, I'm buying it at Moondog Music.

I know what you're thinking. She's sooo out of date. Why purchase a physical object, one that could scratch or melt or get dropped on the sidewalk when I open the car door after a long trip? Why invest in physical objects that have to be kept track of?

There are so many ways to own music these days. I can get the CD. I can get a download. I can probably find it in vinyl.

My first album was The Byrds' Mr. Tambourine Man. Even played on my modest record player, a mono machine that folded up when done, it sounded glorious. Soon enough, I had everything by The Byrds and The Beatles, along with a smattering of Herman's Hermits, The Hollies, and early Joni Mitchell. My allowance was \$5 a week, just enough to bring home the latest Judy Collins or Buffy Sainte Marie.

We all carted our collections to college. Comparing with roommates, our young ears opened to voices we'd never heard before. Every night before my roommate and I climbed into our single beds, one of us would put the second side of Tom

Rush's No Regrets album on the stereo. What a way to drift off to dreamland. Every time a new band came to play on campus—Taj Mahal, Brewer & Shipley—another album landed on our shelves.

My first husband and I married our record collections along with our other worldly goods. He had, among other oddities, a quadraphonic solo album from Art Garfunkel called *Angel Clare*, and eventually we found two more speakers to do it justice. When he bought one of those speakers with colored lights, we lay on the floor to hear—and see—*Jesus Christ Superstar* in all its glory.

By then we had heaps of cassette tapes, which came with both a miracle and a flaw. The miracle was their ability to record entire albums, along with that essential of flirting, the mixtape. The flaw was the tapes' fragility. I'm not the only one who patiently rewound sprung tapes by hand, sticking a pencil or little finger into one of the spools to save it. But oh, the joy of creating your own tape of favorite hits, like creating your own dream radio station, long before Pandora.

Speaking of radio, here's my all-time favorite memory. I was driving around Davenport in my Buick Invicta station wagon with KSTT AM on the dial when an excited disc jockey played The Guess Who's "American Woman," the perfect song for that summer of 1970. I was just thinking, "Wow, what a song! Wish I could hear it again!" when he paused to say, "That was so good, I'm playing it again." "YES!," I said aloud. Thank you!

I remember vividly my first encounter with a music CD. I knew what they were, but couldn't afford even one as I packed to leave that first husband and start a new life in Dubuque. I was sitting in a movie theater, about to watch Kiss of the Spider Woman, when a young woman ahead of me held up a CD and—obviously showing off for those of us seated behind her—carefully opened it. First she tore off the plastic (such a pain). Then she opened the cover, unfolding it like a little book, and took out the pamphlet full of lyrics and the other inside info we used to find on the back of vinyl album covers. Wow, I thought. I want that.

Eventually, I installed my own CD player and little library of discs—The Allman Brothers, Tracey Chapman, and every single one by REM. I played them all the time at home, searing into my son's and daughter's brains the sounds of the '90s. Better yet, we could listen to them in the car. FM radio was still okay those days, but a Fairport Convention CD with 12 songs in a row could beat any station I knew. By then, radio songs were preprogrammed. Gone were the days of a renegade DJ deciding to put a great song on repeat.

Then came cell phones, and while it seemed awfully handy to buy music and listen right on your personal device—ahem, the Walkman had that beat by decades—it kind of leaves me cold. This was years before every car had not only all the bells but all the whistles, too, with a video screen for choosing


your next song as the stoplight turns green and everybody honks at you.

I wonder how my favorite musicians listen to their music—the ones born just before me, I mean. Does Richard Thompson buy Apple Music? Does Bonnie Raitt treasure her CDs? What about Tom Rush, does he, just maybe, place his vinyl records on a 1972 Bose stereo?

My husband's birthday is fast approaching, and I'm getting him some music. It has become a running joke that my gifts to him often measure five inches square and are very flat.
