people. But you can still read it on my

personal Facebook page if you like.

Let me tell you about Mavin Ney. Yesterday, he got back from Florida where he just spent days ferrying health-compromised people from the west side of the hurricane-ravaged state to safe lodging on the east coast in his Paramount Ambulances. Tomorrow, he's hauling 24 pallets of Hasbro toys from my Toys for Tots Dubuque warehouse to Cedar Rapids where he'll drop half, and then on to Mason City where he'll deliver the other half to Toys for Tots up there. And then back to Dubuque with four pallets from Mason City for us. It's a pre-Christmas miracle, and I could not be more appreciative as, I'm sure, are the kids of Cedar Rapids and Mason City!!!

Why am I giving away a semi of toys? Well, I was very fortunate to receive not one, but THREE semis of Hasbro toys from the manufacturer through the Marine Corps Toys for Tots Foundation in August. One or two pallets of any toy is amazing! Five or six pallets of the same toy gets to be a LOT of one thing. So I have a LOT of about a dozen different wonderful toys from Nerf guns, to Transformers, to My Little Pony and Monopoly games. So without taking anything away from my Dubuque Toys for Tots Program, I can augment other great programs in Iowa. We already traded Hasbro toys with Quincy, IL in August to give us both more variety, and as part of that swap dropped pallets off to Burlington, IA Toys for Tots. We've also sent smaller loads to Carroll County, IL and soon to Jones County, IA. Thanks to me having access to a warehouse year-round, we're all benefiting from this massively generous donation. It just means a little

extra work to manage all the logistics, but it's totally worth it for the end payoff. No local funds or toys purchased or donated locally are leaving town. Well, 1 of 6 pallets of vintage TOMY die-cast airplanes I got from Iowa Die-Cast Toys is headed to Cedar Rapids. So all of your dollars are still here and doing great things, just like Marvin's doing great things! And now I have room in the warehouse to breathe and plan for the chaos of the coming months.

And now turning back to politics but staying positive with great people, let me tell you about State Representative Chuck Isenhart. I first met Chuck many years ago when he was running the Dubuque Area Labor Management Council, and we keep crossing paths and working toward common goals of improving our community ever since. He even calls his role in Iowa State Government the Campaign For the Common Good, and he continually backs that up year round with his actions, not just in the State House, but with his real life presence in the community.

You will regularly find Chuck at diverse community events where he makes himself constantly accessible to his constituents. From arts and music, to diversity issues and at-risk populations, and especially a dedication to our natural resources, parks, and green spaces, Chuck Isenhart walks the walk in Dubuque before he goes to Des Moines to talk the talk. or shall we say, "Roll Em' Up" and fight the good fight for the common good.

All I honestly know of his opposition is the attack ads put out on her behalf when she comes out of a silent retreat every two years, but the platform seems to be pretty much toe-the-line Republican agenda if that's your thing. She also dropped out of the League of Women Voters' public forum at the last minute. I believe that if you believe in your platform, it is imperative that you allow the public to ask you about it. This year's attack ad, which illegally uses unapproved copyright images, is naturally a gross misrepresentation of Mr. Isenhart and ignores his strong advocacy for public schools and educators, including fighting for increased school funding, supporting the AEAs, summer meals for school kids, funding for school lunches, and countless other issues. KCRG TV even saw the egregious misrepresentations in the ad worthy of reporting on. Teachers in Dubuque County support Chuck and appreciate his advocacy for them-period. I don't think diverting public school funds so wealthier people can have the cost of their kids' private school education discounted is a good use of tax dollars. And I sure don't think that if this is your platform, that putting the word "EDUCA-TION" as one of your campaign's priorities is telling people what you're really about.

Chuck Isenhart was also just endorsed by the Iowa Farmers Union, the premier assembly of family farmers in Iowa for over a century. Yeah,

farmers supporting a Democrat... in IOWA. That should tell you something.

Chuck is also the legislator who recently identified a bill that would have created a big loophole in Iowa open meetings law, allowing elected officials to meet secretly. Not until the media brought the issue to the attention of the public did Iowa Republican legislators believe him. It forced our Republican Governor to have to veto the bill. The same governor, by the way, that barred the State Auditor from taking state agencies to court to force them to turn over documents in order to keep them honest. We need guys like Chuck and Auditor Rob Sand to keep checks on power and guard against efforts to legislate corruption.

Chuck has been an open and accessible advocate for all of Dubuque's residents for some time and is a respected Democratic voice in Des Moines, and to say that he deserves to continue doing his work is itself an egregious understatement. And he's just a nice man. That matters.



# Dubuque's First Fridays Get a Fresh Spotlight

For art lovers and culture enthusiasts in Dubuque, the first Friday of every month brings something special. First Fridays have long been a way to immerse yourself in the local art scene, with galleries, studios, and venues showcasing new exhibits and performances. Now, a community-driven initiative aims to broaden the reach and engagement of these events. At the heart of this effort is a newly launched online resource—**firstfridaysdubuque.org**, a one-stop hub for all things related to Dubuque's First Fridays.

This new platform was developed through the efforts of the Dubuque Forward Arts Passion Team, a group of local artists, advocates, and community organizers. Their goal has been to build on the momentum First Friday events and venues have cultivated since their post-pandemic resurgence. However, the team recognized a key challenge: fragmented information.

# A Central Hub for Art Enthusiasts

Before **firstfridaydubuque.org**, there was no single interactive online resource for finding information about all First Friday events. Each venue—whether a gallery, studio, or pop-up space—handled its own marketing. For those familiar with the scene, keeping up with events meant following individual social media accounts or websites. But for tourists or newcomers, there was no unified source to discover everything.

The Arts Passion Team sought to address this gap. The new site features event listings linked to Facebook events created by venues, an interactive map to help plan your evening, and images from past events to give a preview of what to expect.

#### Leveraging the AllTogether Dubuque Platform

The First Friday landing page is part of the AllTogether Dubuque platform, a broader arts initiative born from the City of Dubuque's Arts & Culture Master Plan. Supported by CARES Act funding and an lowa Tourism Grant, AllTogether Dubuque was launched in 2024 and serves as a central directory for local artists, arts businesses, and cultural organizations.

By integrating First Fridays into the AllTogether platform, the team can tap into a larger network of local artists and organizations, increasing visibility and engagement. Visitors can navigate easily between event listings and artist directories, making the platform a powerful tool for both locals and tourists.

# Supporting Both Art and Economy

The goal of the new platform goes beyond promotion—it's about attracting visitors and boosting the economic impact of Dubuque's arts scene. First Fridays are organized by a mix of for-profit businesses and nonprofit arts groups, each handling their own marketing and planning. The Arts Passion Team's aim is to unify these efforts under one platform, helping to drive tourism and support local businesses.

Local favorites like Planted., the Dubuque Area Arts Collective at the Smokestack, Stoned Art Studio, Voices Studios, Outside the Lines Art Gallery, Widdershins Artisan Gallery, Carnegie Stout Public Library's Art @ your library, and The Stu regularly participate in First Fridays. These venues showcase artworks in all variety of medium by both established and emerging artists, most often creatives hailing from the Greater Dubuque region. The November lineup will also include the Dubuque Museum of Art and exhibits by University of Dubuque and Clarke University students at pop-up locations on Locust Street and Main Street.

"First Fridays have always been a grassroots effort," says Ivonne Simmonds-Fals, a member of the Dubuque Forward Arts Passion Team. "We wanted to make it easier for everyone—not just insiders in the arts community but also tourists, new residents, and those curious about the arts. We want them to feel comfortable attending these events, supporting local venues, and hopefully buying art from the talented artists we have in Dubuque."

By making First Fridays more accessible, the team hopes to increase foot traffic at venues, which could lead to greater sales for artists and more economic activity downtown.

#### **Next Steps for the Initiative**

With limited seed funding from Dubuque Main Street, Clarke University, Stoned Art Studio, Dubuque Area Arts Collective, Dubuque Museum of Art, and Voices Studios, and significant time investments from members of Gigantic Design and Mike Williams, an intern with the City's Office of Arts and Cultural Affairs, the Arts Passion Team is investing in digital advertising to broaden the reach of the new online resource. However, the team isn't stopping there.

They are actively seeking broader funding to support a full marketing blitz that includes digital marketing, print advertisements, and evergreen way-finding materials to promote First Fridays throughout the community and the region. There are also plans to hire photo and video professionals to visually capture the experience of attending First Fridays for future marketing efforts. These efforts aim to create long-lasting awareness and engagement with the arts, benefiting both the cultural scene and the local economy.

# Expanding Participation and Engagement

The promotion of First Fridays as a unified event opens the door for more venues to participate. With over a dozen locations already involved, the Arts Passion Team hopes that the new platform will inspire even more locations to join. The website provides a platform for both established venues and new ones to reach a wider audience, contributing to the growing momentum behind these events.

Organizers are also collaborating with local businesses, media outlets, and cultural organizations to ensure that First Fridays remain a key event in Dubuque's cultural calendar. Whether you're an art connoisseur or just looking for a fun night out, these events offer something for everyone. The diversity of offerings—ranging from fine art exhibitions to live performances and pop-up shops—is part of what makes First Fridays so special.

#### **Looking Forward**

As the initiative moves forward, there's much to look forward to. The new website and promotional efforts set the stage for even greater success. Whether you're a seasoned art lover or someone new to the scene, First Fridays are an opportunity to explore the cultural richness of downtown Dubuque and the talents of artists that call our region home. # Local Ghost Stories

For thousands of years throughout human history, storytellers have crafted ghastly tales to send a shiver down the spines of their audiences through the use of subjects feared in daily life such as punishment, predators, the unknown, and especially, death. These four elements make ghost stories particularly chilling, not only raising questions about what happens after death but also about what it wants to do with us. Many of these spectral stories, historically, were also framed within the context of actions and their consequences; because people sometimes need a little more motivation than religion-based consequences in the afterlife to behave well right now, many tales were also passed on with the intention of motivating good behavior via grisly tales of what might happen in the current life if one isn't careful. What's more, as it turns out, a lot of

people enjoy being scared, as is evidenced by the weight of a domestic horror movie industry worth nearly \$1 billion annually.

These now-lucrative ghost stories have evolved over the centuries, adapting to the times and the current standards of human fear. However, with the idea of ghosts predating even the first written language, thereby transcending oral storytelling in pre-history to written storytelling first seen in ancient cultures to the visual storytelling of modern times, it's actually quite remarkable how largely similar the concept of a specter has remained not only over time but across cultures.

On a global scale, this simultaneously transcendent and transcultural quality has allowed, for instance, the traditional ghost stories that inspired the Japanese horror films Ringu and Ju-On: The Grudge to be interculturally and intergenerationally relevant, spawning the creation of the popular Western reincarnations, The Ring and The Grudge, and relaying these old legends to younger generations across the Pacific Ocean. On a smaller scale, the same is true of the classic ghost stories from homethose passed on to us from our parents who learned from theirs before them, are now being passed down from us. These haunting tales, such as that of Bloody Mary, are so embedded into our culture that sharing them

in the dark at sleepovers, Halloween parties, and around campfires is all but a canon event for many American kids and teens.

But as popular as is the legend of Bloody Mary, despite the disputes about the origin of her story, tales of local hauntings perhaps still pack a greater punch with anyone who really wants to get scared. One might even say they just haunt closer to home.

As the oldest city in the state of lowa, and with a significant number of historical buildings, it comes as no surprise that there are so many stories of ghosts in Dubuque. Beyond standard residential sightings, there are numerous legends of hauntings sprinkled throughout some of the other buildings throughout the city.

The oldest theater in the state, The Grand Opera House, opened in 1890, and for the next 38 years, it was home to more than 2,600 live performances such as those of touring Broadway shows and some of the biggest names in show business at the time. These include Jack Benny, John Philip Sousa, and the Boston Opera Company. The theater's performances were considered to be high-end productions and boasted feats such as the regular production of new plays, performed every week, and over-the-top show elements such as live horses and chariots on treadmills and onstage sandstorms. In 1928, the theater shifted focus to showing movies instead of live performances, which they didn't resume until the '80s, under new ownership, despite the glory of the "Golden Era" of The Grand. Today the venue, still outfitted for live performances since reopening in 1986, remains historically accurate while providing a home for new generations of performers, designers, producers, and audiences—and apparently old ones too.

As one might expect, a building that made such a tremendous impact as a temporary home to countless musicians, actors, directors, costumers, and other talents who brought their passions and hard work to its

stage, is bound to have a ghostly presence or two. Or in the case of The Grand Opera House, perhaps more like a dozen or two, as suggested by the Transcendent Paranormal Group's 2020 investigation into the building which resulted in claims of numerous EVP readings of spirits with something to say.

While many of the spooky occurrences started happening following the 1986 reopening of the theater—thought to be a result of bringing back live performances that would be alluring to the spirits of their past performers—others date back to the early days of The Grand, such as those witnessed by multiple theater cleaning ladies throughout the 1930s. The police were called more than a few times after some of these women heard voices coming from the stage area despite being there alone to clean. Over the years, many others have come to hear the same voices projecting from the empty stage, while reports of onstage singing from invisible vocalists also having been witnessed since the 1980s renovations.

Like these mostly innocent manifestations, most of the other hauntings at The Grand Opera House seem benevolent enough, with motivations that appear to be centered around performing and seeking a bit of the spotlight for themselves, giving a grisly new meaning to the adage "the show must go on."

Stories surrounding these spirits who wish they were still on stage to perform for Dubuque audiences include those of at least one who is particularly proficient at playing with the lights. Perhaps the actions of a former stagehand, eager to contribute efforts to another production at The Grand after 58 years of operating as a movie theater, or maybe simply those of a prankster with a peculiar sense of humor, all lights in the building except those on stage suddenly went out following the commencement of the first show since reopening. And though it might not be unusual to need a little

troubleshooting here or there following a renovation, further investigation into the electrical workings of the building suggested that nothing was actually wrong with any of the wiring, leaving the cause of the partial blackout unknown. During a different production, one of these spotlight specters kept themselves busy by moving the lights up and down their stands, and even knocking them down at times during the play. Electrical manifestations like these, as well as unexplainable flipped light switches and unlikely camera and tape recorder malfunctions were especially prominent in the first year of reopening, though there are claims that they still occur to this day.

In addition to spirits presenting themselves through mysterious voices and electronic device interference, The Grand Opera House's hauntings have appeared to the living in other ways including cold gusts of air, moving objects, phantom scents of cigars and perfume, disembodied footsteps, and the feeling of a presence nearby watching. Shadowy figures, misplaced items, and even physical contact also occur. More intuitive guests even claim to have seen human

apparitions in audiences and on stage. One actor reported to have seen an apparition of a redheaded man, David, standing next to him during a photo session, as well as a grouping of specters in old-fashioned clothing standing in the back of the audience during a different performance.

A spirit called Sarah has also been known to be seen, or sometimes felt, by guests of the theater. Sarah, one of the not-so-friendly ghosts, is thought to hold a grudge towards other women after having been left by her lover. Supposedly, via an Ouija board session, a spirit who was also referred to as Sarah claimed to have been murdered near The Grand Opera House in the early 1900s, though no evidence found this to be true. Regardless of the truth of her fate, Sarah has been known to shove women, particularly on the fifth floor, and even caused one woman to fall down the stairs. Definitely not a girl's ghoul.

Other phantom regulars include an angry man often seen pacing on the balcony and watching rehearsals with judgment, as well as a lady in white, frequently seen by staff and guests alike. Two

women sit in the audience after hours waiting for shows to start; either they are more polite or more shy than some of their other cohorts, disappearing immediately upon approach and causing nobody any trouble.

Only one thing is certain: No matter when you are at The Grand Opera House, you certainly aren't there alone.

Like The Grand Opera House, Hotel Julien Dubuque is the oldest building of its type in the state of Iowa. The hotel, then named Waples House, was first built in 1843, though records indicate that a hotel had been set up at that location for four years prior. In 1854, the hotel was purchased by new owners who then renamed it Julien House, a moniker it possessed until being rebuilt in 1914 following a fire and reopened in 1915 as Hotel Julien Dubuque. Its name was changed again to Julien Motor Inn under new ownership in 1962 but was reverted back to Hotel Julien Dubuque when it reopened in 2009 following a major historic restoration of the interior and exterior of the building.

Despite all the name changes throughout the years, Hotel Julien has remained iconic from back when it was the first building visible in Dubuque when crossing over the Mississippi River, to modern times wherein it is known for its elegant renovations, famous historical guests, and as one might expect of an old hotel, a good old fashioned haunting or two.

It comes as no shock that a hotel that boasts a historical guestbook including the likes of Abraham Lincoln, Buffalo Bill, Mark Twain, and Al Capone might experience some paranormal activity every now and then. Capone, in fact, has become so locally synonymous with Dubuque and the Hotel Julien that the hotel dedicated a suite on the second floor to him. The suite, decorated in an Old Hollywood glamour style, is oversized, tucked away, and outfitted with a giant safe in which Capone is rumored to have hidden within when authorities searched for him. The stories say that Capone regularly chose Dubuque as a place to hide out from trouble in Chicago with eyewitnesses to confirm. It's even purported that Capone


is the man behind the "unnamed Chicago interest" that possessed shares of the Dubuque Hotel Company that took ownership of the hotel following the fire in 1914.

With such dramatic and historically relevant events having occurred there, it's hard to speculate the exact reasoning behind the hotel's ghostly guests. Fortunately, nobody is thought to have been killed in the building fire, though at least one apparition has been present since the renovation. Both staff and guests have reported seeing a man dressed in period clothing walking, and sometimes floating, around the upper floors; some believe this ghost to be Mr. Capone, whose spirit might understandably wish to visit one of his worldly safe houses even in the afterlife.

Other guests have reported usual paranormal occurrences in a haunting. Some guests have reported odd sensations, such as the feeling of a cloth being dragged across their skin while laying in bed at night, while others have claimed to hear odd noises and footsteps.

Another notable local ghost story is that of the Mathias Ham House. Today a museum, the eponymous house was once home to one of the most influential people of his time, as well as his wife and six children. Ham came to live in Dubuque permanently in the early 1830s, and the original house was built in 1839, with additions added later to accommodate his growing family. Over time, Ham, his wife, and one of his daughters all passed away in this home, as well as an intruder said to be a pirate, who was shot and killed by another daughter.

The Ham House is particularly notorious for its haunting and has been a popular ghost story local teenagers share with their friends for generations, perhaps because activity is reported to sometimes be seen even from the parking lot. Typical manifestations at the Mathias Ham House involve music coming from an inoperable organ, malfunctioning lights inside the house, misplaced objects and furniture, and the sound of footsteps. Some have reported seeing shadowy figures in windows at night, feeling



cold breezes touring the house, and seeing doors and windows open suddenly when the museum is closed. A few people have even claimed to see the streetlights outside flickering on and off. Some others have seen a strange orb of light float over from the river to the property, while others yet claim that there is a door inside the house through which the blood of the slaughtered intruder continually seeps through the paint no matter how many times it is painted over.

Another building from the late 1800s, The Redstone Inn, was built by Augustin Cooper as a wedding gift for his daughter. Aptly named, the red brick and sandstone structure is really a duplex, intended to provide Cooper's daughter and her husband with the option for some rental income. The extravagant size and design eventually led to the necessity of historic preservation efforts and the use of the property commercially rather than residentiallythough Mr. Cooper undoubtedly still feels otherwise about its use. When staying at The Redstone, now a bed and breakfast, it is not uncommon to see the well-dressed entrepreneur wandering around the property or joining guests for breakfast.

According to The Des Moines Register, two reported hauntings have taken place at the Fischer Building. In the basement maintenance staff offices, a tall man walks a short distance from one room through a larger room to the next. Many people have reported him walking in the same direction, and he has been seen only from behind. On the fourth floor, in the northwest hallway, a woman wearing a dress, fur and high heels, appears near the center of the building and walks north, turns to the right and goes in the last doorway. Her style of dress suggests she is from the 1920s or 1930s. Some people report that she opens the door and enters the last office, even though the door is locked.

While we don't have stories of ghosts at Union Park in Dubuque, the tragic history of the park and the ruins of its once greatness which can still be found in "horseshoe hollow," the valley below the Dubuque Y Camp on JFK Road. It makes for a spooky and fun place to visit, especially with a reference book showing where everything once was. A number of concrete foundations including the massive swimming pool are still there as are recognizable trees from hundred-year-old photos.

What would a college town be without an academic apparition for students to talk about? Clarke University, Loras College, and the University of Dubuque, three major higher education facilities in Dubuque, all have their own lores shared with and by alumni.

At Clarke, Mary Frances Hall, named after the school's founder, is frequently mentioned as experiencing ghostly behavior. Students often report feelings of being watched, as well as visions of a figure near the chapel, who they believe to be Mary Frances herself. The fourth floor of the hall is also claimed by some to be haunted by a nun who passed away under unfortunate circumstances; students have reported seeing the words "help me" written onto the glass of the windows of this floor. Other versions claim the haunting is the result of a nursing student who befell the same fate and suggests it might be her cold breath students sometimes feel on their necks.

The students who live on the fourth floor of the University of Dubuque's Cassatt Hall experience somewhat similar occurrences, with cold rushes of air and the feeling of a strange presence following them when coursing the hallways.

At Loras, however, the hauntings are a little more bone-chilling. Legend says that sometimes late at night, students can hear Flora Wahlert, whose body is buried below the Christ the King Chapel next to her husband, Harry, playing the organ. While Mrs. Wahlert plays music for him, an apparition of Mr. Wahlert can be seen listening to her in his wheelchair. Another piece of Loras lore is that of the priest who died prematurely, now hosting midnight masses at the school.

More terrifying yet, the second floor of Keane Hall is supposedly the former home to a student who tragically took his own life on campus following a bad breakup. Though the door to his room has since been replaced, legend says that anyone who holds a black light up to the door of his old room will see a sad face crying tears of blood.

Another of Dubuque's more horrifying ghost stories is one of Mount Carmel, a nunnery that has been around since the late 1800s. The convent, after housing so many nuns for so many years, has understandably experienced sisterly paranormal activity in the form of turning lights on and off, moving objects around, and apparitions.

Tragically, the Mount Carmel property is rumored to have experienced a terrible fire in the past, during which a room full of schoolchildren suffered horrible fates. Now, the story says, that on certain nights, you can hear the sounds of their cries and screams amongst the crackles of a fire.

Being the oldest, and perhaps the most haunted city in lowa, it stands to reason that Dubuque would be filled with ghastly tales of all shapes and sizes, ranging from instances of innocent, invisible interferences to the pranks of poltergeists to the manifestations of malevolent monsters from the afterlife. Like death itself, some varieties of ghost stories are more pleasant than others, but in the end, they all offer us important lessons to remember: Respect life, respect death, respect others, dead or living. And always leave home dressed in your best because you never know when it'll be your turn to get your ghost outfit.



# Kelly's Cafe

"You would." —Bryce Parks

Kelly's Cafe is a cafe, not a café, and that's awesome. Don't get me wrong, I love me a café. Can't say you love food and say you don't love a café. But when I want a cafe, don't piss on my head and tell me it's raining by taking me to a café. Because a café wants to tantalize me with their take on cuisine. A cafe wants to get a hot meal in me that's friggin' delicious. And maybe some pie, if I've saved room for it. A café will happily have their barista brew you the perfect espresso drink exactly to your liking. A cafe refills your mug of strong-and-black over and over again like an attendant pouring more hot water into your old-timey bath. A cafe will serve you some of the very best pancakes you've ever had. A café will serve you some of the very first crepes you've ever had.

But, aha! That's where the distinction between cafes and cafés breaks down a little with Kelly's Cafe. Because Kelly's Cafe serves pancakes AND crepes. AND waffles. AND French toast. So don't take the fact that Kelly's Cafe serves crepes as an indication that they're a café. They're definitely a cafe. Instead, you should take it as an indication that Kelly's Cafe serves absofriggin'-lutely everything. But that doesn't mean it's not there. It just means that I didn't see it among the skillets and omelets and burgers and pastas and steaks and appetizers and stir fry! Yes, Asian-style STIR FRY! You know what you'll never see at a café? Stir fry. But a cafe? All bets are off at a cafe. If it's a craving, a cafe is liable to have

it. And that goes double for Kelly's Cafe. Kelly's Cafe is the kind of place that has both Tabasco AND Cholula on the table for ya.

In the past, I've believed that any restaurant offering such a wide range of menu items can't possibly do them all well, and probably can't do ANY of them well. That might be true of fine dining, but with a cafe, it doesn't have to hit my palate; it has to hit the spot. And besides, I want a cafe like Kelly's Cafe to throw their proverbial crap against my proverbial wall and see what proverbially sticks. Because when I go to a cafe like Kelly's Cafe, I often have no damn idea what I'm hungry for. And if I can't figure it out, I can do what I've been doing since I was a kid and order a Belgian waffle. Because there are no words in any tongue of men or elves sweeter than "All-Day Breakfast." But you know what? A good stir fry may be exactly what I want. That happens a lot. No, seriously... a lot.

But... can you trust something as American as a cafe to make an Asianstyle stir fry? You're going to be at least a little skeptical, yeah? Ah, but here's the thing: We're talking about a place well-equipped to make all your breakfast dreams come true. Why WOULDN'T you trust them to cook something hot and fast like a stir fry requires? If you trust them to make a breakfast skillet, why wouldn't you trust them to make a stir fry? Hell, a stir fry is easier than a breakfast skillet.

So yeah, it's still kind of a weird place to start, but let's talk about the stir fry at Kelly's Cafe. We got the shrimp stir sry. Yup! Even went so far as to order the shrimp. And why not? You can rest assured that if a cook can reliably cook eggs all day, any style, made to their ordered hardness, you can trust them not to undercook or overcook your shrimp. And that's what I surprised me most about Kelly's Cafe. The shrimp were probably some of the most perfectly cooked shrimp I've had in a while. A little toothiness before kind of bursting in your mouth. Num. The veggies were done perfectly, too. Again, any cook who can perfect a breakfast skillet isn't going to have much trouble stir-frying vegetables. A nice, balanced, Asian-inspired flavor, too.

Alright, let me get the liver and onions out of the way. Most of you want nothing to do with liver and onions. Ever. It's a non-starter. And that's okay. I'm not here to sell you on liver and onions. Even if you've never had liver and onions, if you think you won't like liver and onions, you're right. You won't like liver and onions. And again, that's okay. But this is for that kid in the corner... ashamed to admit that they like liver and onions and are wondering where to get some of that painfully acquired taste. If you're like me and you crave liver and onions once every 2 to 3 years, probably due to a need for more iron or something, Kelly's Cafe has exactly what you need. Thinly sliced and lightly breaded and smothered with those well-sauteed onions. Oh, but what's this? At Kelly's you can add bacon for a few bucks more? Don't mind if I do! It was everything my tastebuds were missing and my body needed. And the portions were enough that I took them home for leftovers and made a sandwich out of them that night. That was a friggin' gooood sammich. And remember, friends: Just

The gyro! I didn't grow up around these parts, so one of the things that impressed me when I settled here was how our cafes and diners often feature Greek cuisine. That's NOT a universal thing. Now... it's fair to assume that with all they've got going on in the kitchen, Kelly's Cafe doesn't have a classic cone of gyro meat spinning back there. It's not fair to hold them to that standard. The gyro meat is clearly formed in too-perfect strips, but so what? It's formed to suit the purpose and the pita. And just because it wasn't carved from the loaf, doesn't mean it's not delicious. It is. It more than scratches your gyro itch.

because it's offal, doesn't mean it's awful.

Meatloaf. I love meatloaf and I love it when restaurants have meatloaf on the menu. Even fine dining establishments get in on the meat loafin', and I think that's delightful. I never order it because it's just meatloaf, but I still like that it's on menus. So I didn't order it. Paul did. Why have I been denying myself happiness by not ordering meatloaf when it's on the menu? It's so versatile flavor-wise, and I should be excited to see what chefs bring to this

humble dish. So yes, the meatloaf is everything you want from a meatloaf, right down to that beef gravy we all know and love from every hot beef sandwich ever made.

Oh yeah! We didn't try them, but Kelly's Cafe has the usual hot sandwich suspects: hot beef, hot turkey, hot meatloaf. If you're confused, I'm talking about those open-face sandwiches with meat topped with mounds of mashed potatoes and smothered in gravy.

And that's just the start of all the classic sandwiches at Kelly's Cafe. Reuben? Yup. BLT? Of course. Pork T? This is Iowa. French Dip? Mais oui. Philly Cheesesteak? Boy howdy. Monte Cristo? Oh, yes. Yes, they have a Monte Cristo sandwich for you. Not quite familiar with that one? We're talking about grilled ham and turkey with melted American and Swiss on French toast (yes, French toast) and dusted with powdered sugar. Nothing unlovable about that.

Again, no disrespect to cafés. But when I want a cup of coffee I never see the bottom of, and just about anything I could possibly ever crave... it has to be a cafe, not a café. That's what Kelly's Cafe is there for.



First, check labels and ingredient lists to ensure that the treats are free from your allergen. It's best to avoid treats that do not have an ingredient label. Get in the habit of checking every label, and never assume something is safe to consume. Candy that may not appear to contain your allergen might. For example, some brands of candy corn contain egg whites and sesame. Just because candy was safe for you last year doesn't guarantee it will be safe for you this year because food manufacturers can change their recipe.

Second, your local Hy-Vee HealthMarket Department is home to many allergy-friendly snacks and treats. Brands such as Smart Sweets, Yum Earth, and Rotten make candies and gummies that are free from the top nine allergens and gluten-free. Partake, Blake's Seed Based, and Allergy Smart offers a variety of different flavors of bars or cookies that are also allergen-friendly, gluten-free, and contain no artificial food dyes.

The talk on whether it's safe to consume artificial food dyes is a popular topic right now, and you may have seen headlines or heard claims that ingesting these dyes can cause adverse health effects such as hyperactivity in children. If you are in the habit of looking at food labels, you might have seen these dyes listed at the end of an ingredient list: Red 40, Yellow 5, or Blue 1. Synthetic food dyes are found in various products throughout the food system. You may think of candy, sports drinks, and even vitamins containing these dyes to enhance the color and overall marketability of the food item. Although there is no conclusive evidence that artificial food dyes cause adverse health effects, several studies show an increase in hyperactivity in sensitive children.

# **Time to Freaking Carpe Diem**

You've heard it a million times: Life is short, time is limited, and you should live like today's your last. You know, the whole "YOLO" thing. And, logically, it's true, that death is a fact of life. But let's be real, most of us are pros at avoiding the thought of our own death, especially if we're still in the "I can eat an entire Happy Joe's pizza and not gain a pound" stage of life. For young, healthy people, death feels distant. It's easy to push it to the back of your mind and keep doom-scrolling.

But here's the thing: We're all living on borrowed time, and the clock's ticking. Are you halfway through your life or closer to the end? Do you have 10 or 40 more years of tomorrows? Heck, do you have tomorrow at all? The truth is, none of us knows. And waiting until you've had a health scare or some major wake-up call to start thinking about death, and how it impacts how you're living, is like waiting until the last five minutes of a Packers game to start paying attention. It's risky, and you might miss something important.

Look, death isn't picky. It doesn't care if you've checked off your entire bucket list or if you're still binge-watching Netflix. It doesn't care if you're a nice person or a total jerk, rich or poor, kind-hearted or grouchy as a snowplow driver in February. It just shows up whenever it pleases, like the in-laws on Thanksgiving.

When I stop to think about my death (yeah, I go there), it makes me do stuff I might otherwise put off. Like calling my mom more often. Playing cards on the floor with my boys even when I'm tired. Telling my wife, Joie, I love her (and grabbing her some concert tickets—bonus points, guys). Thinking about death gets me thinking about what matters in my life, which isn't how many emails I can answer in a day.

And then there's my friend Ray Stoffel. Ray is 84 and facing cancer. Only God knows how much longer he will be with us,

and it's a hard reality. Ray and his wife used to own a shop here in Dubuque called Truffles and Ruffles. Every time I think of my old buddy Truffle, I'm reminded how precious our time is. He's a guy who's lived fully, loved fully, and, even in his hardest days, keeps showing up for life. We all could learn a thing or two from Ray.

Now, I can hear you saying, "Come on, Matt! I don't read Dubuque 365 to get bummed out!" Well, guess what? I'm being positive here. I'm 100% positive that you and I are both going to die. That's not me being morbid; it's just the truth. The real question is: Knowing that you're not getting out of here alive, how are you going to live? Don't wait until you're 40, 50, 84, or, heaven forbid, until after you've had a heart attack or a cancer scare to get serious about living. Time is shorter than we think, and it's not guaranteed.

Embracing the fact that we're all going to die one day gives us the power to live. And I don't just mean to exist—to really live. When you live with the end in mind, you realize that life has meaning because it's temporary. Imagine you could just kick around on this planet for centuries, like some kind of immortal being. # The Small and the Mighty

Sharon McMahon has a *NY Times* No. 1 best seller in *The Small and the Mighty: Twelve Unsung Americans Who Changed the Course of History, From the Founding to the Civil Rights Movement.* In the last four years, this former public school teacher has exploded into a cultural force. She is a podcaster (*Here's Where It Gets Interesting*), author of a newsletter (*The Preamble*), and a leader for readers who call themselves Governerds. She and the Governerds have raised millions to help folks in need and retire their medical debts.

NEVER underestimate a teacher.

The Small and the Mighty hit the best seller list upon release. And no wonder: The teacher tells a good story. She likens the people in her book to the aurora borealis, the Northern Lights. We can't see them often because of the brightness of daylight and their usually limited reach. But if we can see behind the brightest lights—Lincoln, Washington, et al—we find that the less familiar stories eclipsed by them are also inspiring and sometimes more relatable than those near-mythic figures.

She starts with Gouveneur Morris, one of the lesser-known founding fathers. He wrote the Preamble of the Constitution. The "We the People" part. He made more speeches than anyone at the Constitutional Convention and was on the committee that wrote the Constitution's final draft. He lived a rambunctious life... right up until giving himself an infection in a most memorable and cringe-worthy manner. Uff da!


From that aristocratic life, we go to Clara Brown, an enslaved woman. As a young mother, she and her family members were sold to separate owners and lost to each other. Clara made a small fortune after walking from the Midwest to Colorado during their gold rush. She helped many other emancipated people to make their way there. She was a cook and a laundress. From a humble station, her tenacity changed the trajectory of many lives and the history of Colorado.

Paul Revere makes an appearance. McMahon says, "For all the things one could learn about Paul Revere, [the fact that] he rode a horse and shouted at people is perhaps one of the least interesting." You'll learn about educator Virginia Randolph, a friend of Booker T. Washington. Also Katharine Lee Bates, author of *America the Beautiful*, which was almost our national anthem. We learn fun facts: The Pledge of Allegiance and brownies were both created on the occasion of the Chicago World's Fair.

McMahon relishes a good detour, sometimes to a fault. Occasionally her "aw, shucks" tone can seem a bit much, and some detours feel like distractions. That's a minor quibble, especially in a first book.

The colloquial tone she adopts may lull readers into underestimating the challenges her subjects confronted. That could be a good thing. While she

relates the playful lifelong friendship of Norm Mineta and Alan Simpson, a well-entertained reader may be caught unawares by the repeated appearance (always in quotations from the time) of a common epithet used against



people of Japanese descent. Every appearance of the word is shocking, and should be.

McMahon's real gift for nuanced storytelling is seen in her discussions of suffrage and Black education. There were good and bad people in these movements—often the same people. Advocacy for suffrage did not include Black women. Susan B. Anthony infamously said, "I will cut off this right arm of mine before I will ever work or demand the ballot for the Negro and not the woman." Thousands of schools for Black children were created without an eye toward equality, much less integration. Yet many Civil Rights leaders were educated in those schools.

McMahon honors moral complexity. She won't dismiss someone's contribution to the American story just because they were flawed, even deeply flawed. As Margaret Mead famously said, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed, neurotic, awkward citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the only thing that ever has." Something like that.

You'll recognize the names and stories of many people in the book. But if you don't already know of Anna Jeanes, William James Edwards, Sam Armstrong, Julius Rosenwald, J.B. Peckham, Glenn Livingston, Claudette Colvin, and Oliver Brown, you will remember meeting them here.

These folks are just like us. We can be reassured that, if we, too, are "just" teachers, hairdressers, or baristas; if we are flawed, not always saintly; that we, too, have our parts to play. What we do in the face of pain, oppression, or challenge may be pivotal. We'll never know. As she says, "The American experiment is full of ill-equipped people, people with the 'wrong' faces and the 'wrong' life circumstances, who just went for it."

McMahon makes history a kick: Little things and little people sometimes make big differences. Even better, she doesn't give us dates to memorize.

Let's make some history now: Please go vote!
Congresswoman Miller-Meeks won election to the
US House in 2020 by only six votes out of almost
400,000 cast. Those who are faithful in little
things... may end up in the history books.





# Cooking the Books

I did a terrible thing last week. You might not think it's so awful to print out a new recipe, but for me, it's ridiculous. I already own—let me count them—71 full-size cookbooks. I am writing this at the dining table, and there they all are, displayed on a nice bookcase I stole from my husband.

In addition to these bound volumes, many of them hardcover, is another collection you might call cookbooklets, all of them inherited from my mother's kitchen. These priceless pamphlets range from "Twelve Pies Husbands Like Best," "Brer Rabbit's New Orleans Molasses Recipes," and "All Kinds of Cookies" to "Kate Smith Chooses Her 55 Favorite Ann Pillsbury Cake Recipes," "Bake the No-Knead Way," and "Fleischmann's Bake-it-Easy Yeast Book."

Obviously, these little leaflets were lightly-disguised PR promos, designed to make our mothers buy the brand of yeast, flour, or molasses hawked in the recipes. These days, such largesse is superseded by what I like to call Stuff About Food on the Web.

This brings me back to those recipes I printed out. These were created by

a cook I know, or feel like I know, having subscribed to her newsletter/blog, Smitten Kitchen, for years. Her kitchen is a tiny one stuffed into a corner of a New York City apartment. I have watched Deb Perelman's baby boy turn into a teen, and collected her recipes for years. Her first cookbook, *The Smitten Kitchen Cookbook*, and second one, *Smitten Kitchen Every Day*, share space with the rest of my collection, and now I'm itching to buy her latest, *Smitten Kitchen Keepers*.

I know what you're thinking. I need a new cookbook about as much as I need another set of measuring cups. (Is three enough?) I have cookbooks focusing on Indian cooking, bread of all kinds (pita! braided challah! naan!), Southern pies. American cakes through the ages, Midwestern prizewinners, one-pot Asian meals, roasted everything, and even The New Yorker Book of Food and Drink, which is recipe-free. Julia Child's Mastering the Art of French Cooking sits snugly between Samin Nosrat's Salt Fat Acid Heat and Dan Pashman's Anything's Pastable. They are in no kind of order, but I know where to find them.

Pashman, a food podcaster, set out to create an all-new pasta shape, one that would hold as much sauce as possible, and he succeeded; his cascatelli pasta is now available for purchase. Julia Child's editor, Judith Jones, wrote a lovely book in her later years called *The Pleasures of Cooking for One*. I have a book about cheese, a book about eggs, a book about milk, a book about knife skills and the priceless 1982 *Will it Freeze*? that I still consult to this day.

But here's the deal: Rather than wow you with my vast collection, I am setting up a project. Over the next few weeks (ahem: year), I plan to cook a recipe from every book I own. This would have made a great Covid pastime, and it did occur to me back in March 2020, but I had other plans (ahem: none). After all, I have cooked at least a few things from—well, okay, not from every single book. But several.

What have I already cooked? Asian sloppy Joes from Simply Ming's One-Pot Meals. Cherry clafouti from Mastering the Art of French Cooking. Individual meatloaves from the gargantuan Cook's Country Cookbook. Pulled pork from Cheater Barbecue. From-scratch chai from At Home with Madhur Jaffrey. Waldorf salad from the 1975 Doubleday Cookbook. The gravity-defying stacked pancake cake with maple frosting from The Beekman 1802 Heirloom Dessert Cookbook.

Well, wait. I never made that. It's on the cover, and I always meant to, but no. I've also never cooked from *Russel Wright's Menu Cookbook*, a gem from the 1940s I had to own because I love his china. You

must understand, some cookbooks invite reading as much as cooking or baking.
Take these four exquisite tomes: Purple Citrus & Sweet Perfume, Rosewater & Orange Blossoms, Crazy Water Pickled Lemons, and Roast Figs Sugar Snow. That's a poem, a fragrant ode to eastern Mediterranean, Labanese, North African, and English food.

One recipe I printed out the other day is for soup, glorious soup, because even though the daytime highs are still pretty high, it feels like time for Black Bean Pumpkin Soup to me, once dinnertime rolls around. But we won't talk about my boxful of single recipes, from cake to vegetables, not now.

Funny thing, I've got two books called *Plenty*. One is by British chef Diana Henry, the other by Israeli-born Londoner Yotam Ottolenghi. A Doublemint gum wrapper marks his two-page spread for stuffed eggplant with lamb and pine nuts. Did I make it? Maybe. It looks familiar, and there's a little stain on the page with the picture.

This brings up the story of my copy of *Anything's Pastable*, which I checked out of the library. There I was, drinking

my tea while paging through the book, when wham! the tea mug went flying. The professional librarian sitting next to me—my daughter, who works at the Cedar Rapids library—sprang into action with a roll of paper towels. Once dry, it looked fine to us, but not to the local librarian. I got to pay \$45 and add it to my personal collection, Dewey Decimal Number and all.

So that's the plan. I am going to cook or bake something from every book on my shelf. Stay tuned to hear about my exploration of Persian rice, vintage cakes, easy Thai, Dorie Greenspan's French kitchen, Venetian stew, and even a little something from Nigella Lawson's book, How to Be a Domestic Goddess. That'll be me, once this project is complete.


