Welp... so here we are. For me it's the day before Election Day, and for you it's an entirely different world as you likely know what happened by now. Assuming you are able to come out in public unarmed to pick up the new issue of 365ink, we'll call that a win right there. I'm not sure if I envy you knowing while I don't or not. What are the odds on this thing? Can you bet on that too? I should check...

Um, yep! There are indeed betting lines on the election. Bet365 (yeah, that's a real site so I had to go with that one, right?) lists Trump at -188 and Harris at +150. That's a tremendous edge for Trump in the betting odds. But then again, what kind of people would actually put money on something like this, Trumpers or liberals? So, that may skew the numbers a lot. National polls without wagering have Harris out front by a bit. Then again, in 2016, these wagering sites had Hillary Clinton with odds -323 (that's very good for her if you don't know how it works), and well, you know how that worked out.

What I think would be most hilarious, if there is anything funny about this at all (said Bryce while giggling maniacally, curled up in a ball in the corner of the room with a worried look on his face), is what if there are betting parlays on the presidential election? What would those be?

I just hope that whatever the outcome, we have the common decency to abide by the fair and accurate results of the election as decided by the American people.





Americans With No Address

The Dubuque Rescue Mission is hosting a public screening of *Americans With No Address* on Thursday, Nov. 21 at 6 p.m. at Steeple Square. The 90-minute documentary investigates the homeless crisis in America and captures the untold stories of those experiencing homelessness while at the same time trying to find answers to the problem. After the screening, there will be a Q & A session with local leaders from the City

of Dubuque as well as nonprofit organizations dealing with homelessness.

The documentary team spent three weeks interviewing people in 20 major cities across 18 states, including top experts on homelessness, CEOs and executive directors of local and national nonprofit organizations, and political leaders. They also interviewed individuals who have experienced or are currently experiencing homelessness.

The documentary, narrated by William Baldwin, illuminates this pressing social issue. Robert Craig Films is addressing one of the most critical crises in our country today: homelessness. The human side of those experiencing homelessness is very real.

Americans With No Address documentary and No Address movie are two parts of a five-production approach that includes an interactive study guide, a novel, and a soundtrack. Their hope is that these productions will inspire all of us to engage with empathy in a deeper way to take action in our local communities.





Dave Manning, Director of Gaming Operations for Q Casino + Resort, walks us through more than 75 high-end interactive and prize redemption games. "We have 60 games that are redemption, so you can accumulate credits to redeem for prizes at The Social Post. Those redemption games include sevencoin pusher-style machines and six to eight crane-style games with more yet to arrive." Of course, they will monitor and evaluate the games to keep them fresh.

In the center of the space were a couple sets of VR-style games where players wear VR headsets and sit in cockpit-like chairs to interact with the game. I got the chance to play the King Kong VR game with Stacy Kansky, and it was incredibly entertaining. More than just a VR headset game, the chairs we sat in moved, bucked, and shook in correlation to the experiences we were having in our 3D headgear.

As a kid, I remember a game called Dragon's Lair coming out that was such a leap in animation that we all wanted to play it so badly. But it was hard and expensive to play, and as it was hard to figure out, we'd always die fast, and the game was over. King Kong is nothing like that except for the part where the user experience is so far above other video games that you don't want it to end fast. And it doesn't. That was my favorite part. Whether you are good at reaching out with your hands and claiming loot or swatting away monsters, the main point is that every player gets to experience and enjoy the full length of the "scene" for each

play of the game. So even if you stink at earning points, you'll still have 100% of the fun experience the game provides.

The floor is filled with a great mix of classic games such as air hockey, basketball shootout, and Ice-Ball to classic video game favorites like *Golden Tee Golf, Super Bikes* (motorcycle games you sit on like a cycle), and *Space Invaders* (but not like you've ever played it before). To play, pick up a game card at The Social Post or from a kiosk in the arcade, purchase credits, and use the card to track points for cashing in on prizes at the end of your visit. You can also purchase a game card online at **islandsocial.com**.

Check out the following daily specials to level up on fun. Monday: Double Your Fun (Buy \$20 game card/Get \$20 bonus arcade credits). 





Great Dragon

On Dodge Street

We've run a dining column in nearly every issue of *365ink* since February 2010 when the late, great Rich Belmont ran his first column featuring Mario's. It's the only one that received a rating (three out of four cheeseburgers). That's nearly 375 issues ago! Some are revisits, some are retired, but you can bet your belly that between Rich, Bryce, Danny, Sunil, and I, we've covered a lot of ground.

And yet, we've still missed some of those staple restaurants in the Tri-States. For me, it's Great Dragon—specifically the one on Dodge Street by Target. The buffet is long gone (thanks COVID), but the heaping portions of food are still omnipresent.

We've been fans of Great Dragon for years. In fact, they always remember to bring me hot oil without me having to ask, even if it's been months since I've been in! If I'm looking for a pile of food—plenty for leftovers or for sharing—or a no-frills restaurant to kick back and enjoy a meal, I'm heading to Warren Plaza.

At the top of our list is the black pepper chicken. Prepare yourself for a massive mound of chicken, green bell peppers, and onion. They have this special way of making the chicken kinda crispy. Like, is that some kind of cornstarch magic? Crispy chicken that's not breaded or battered? And the salty, savory, slightly sweet sauce (say that five times fast) is best sopped up with a big helping of rice. I'm not a fan of the hunks of peppers and think, at the very least, they could chop 'em up into smaller bits, but maybe that's just me. If anything, they're easier to pick out this way.

Moving on: The rangoons. Listen. I compared three rangoons back in 2019 and promised more comparisons would follow, and now it's 2024, and it's still a "to do" on my list. Great Dragon's rangoons were on that list, and here are some things that still hold true today:

"Great Dragon's crabmeat rangoons are simple and sweet. They have a smaller, thinner wonton wrapper that doesn't shatter although they do feel

fragile compared to their counterparts. They're kind of the Lay's chip of the rangoon world while most are thicker like Ruffles. The filling is very smooth and makes you wonder if there's even any crab inside, but something about its simplicity has me going back for seconds."

You can opt for rangoons instead of an eggroll if you order a lunch or dinner special, but I opted for an eggroll on my most recent visit. There's nothing too crazy or innovative here, just fried, crispy, cabbagey goodness.

And the secret sauce? Chicago-style fried rice. I'm not into gatekeeping food-stuffs, but I'm not on the TikTok, and it's not like I'm Keith Lee, so, maybe, let's just all enjoy this together. Great Dragon's Chicago-style fried rice is dark, salty, and savory. I'm not always going to order it, but it's going to be subbed in most of the time.

"But what about all the other things on the menu?" I hear you cry. We shan't forget about them. Since the buffet is gone, it's a bit more difficult to try new things in the sense that I used to be able to grab a couple of pieces of broccoli from the chicken and veggies and a mushroom from the garlic chicken to go with my lil pile of mei fun and lifetime supply of green beans, but now I'm resigned to pints, quarts, or meals. And that's a lot of food; even the lunch portion could feed two hungry college kids or three to four Kristinas.

On the noodle side, I love mei fun. It's made up of these super thin rice noodles with various veggies and meat (if you order it that way) mixed in. They're light, bouncy, and slightly salty—perfect for soaking up the sauces from your entree.

If you ask my brother, the general's chicken is the way to go. Hunks of deep fried chicken are coated in a luscious slightly-sweet and savory sauce. It's not spicy to me, but the added hot oil can kick it up a notch.

The kung po chicken and vegetable lo mein also get added to my plate when the opportunity arises, and I'll even add a cup of soup if the moment is right. With a free cup of tea in hand, I'm always full and feel well taken care of at Great Dragon.

"Cheap Chinese" is easy to come by.
And by that, I mean affordable Chinese food, regardless of the quality. But the two, quality and affordability, don't always intersect. Great Dragon offers both in addition to fast service; a large menu that covers the typical Chinese-American spread; and the option to order lunch and dinner specials (meals) in addition to à la carte pint and quart entrées.

If you haven't tried Great Dragon out, I encourage you to do so. Maybe on your next Target run or on a night when you feel like gobbling down a plate of salty goodness. Give 'em a try, and let them know 365ink sent ya!

Lemon-Chicken Vegetable Soup

MAKES 8 SERVINGS

All You Need:

- 1 (1-to-1-1/4-lbs.) pkg. Hy-Vee True boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- · 1 tsp. Hy-Vee salt
- ½ tsp. Hy-Vee ground black pepper
- · 2 tbsp. Gustare Vita olive oil
- 3 medium carrots, peeled and sliced

- Add carrots and onions to Dutch oven. Cook for five minutes, stirring frequently. Stir in the garlic; cook for 30 seconds. Pour in chicken stock. Bring to a boil; reduce heat. Simmer for 10 minutes.
- 3. Shred chicken into bite-size pieces. Add chicken and pasta to the stock mixture. Gently simmer for five minutes. Stir in zucchini, lemon zest, and juice and oregano. Simmer for five minutes or until pasta is tender. Stir in spinach; remove from heat. Ladle soup into bowls. Garnish with lemon slices, if desired.

Prophet Song

By John McAndrew

Prophet Song, Paul Lynch's Booker Prize winning novel, now in paperback, makes me wish I was a teacher so I could not just recommend but also assign it. It's reminiscent of cinematic novels like Schindler's List, The Road, and The Reader. Think of Wounded Knee, Selma, Ukraine, Warsaw, Palestine. Upheaval is part of what it has always meant to be human.

The story focuses on an Irish family in contemporary times. Eilish (pronounced AY-lish), Larry, and their children, Mark, Bailey, Molly, Ben, and Eilish's wise but aging father, Simon. Something unspecified has happened just before the novel begins. The government has assumed emergency powers and created a new secret police. Until then, it was a happy family in a happy neighborhood.


From the first page, Lynch rushes at you. His sentences barely give you time to pause for breath. He uses a form of stream of consciousness to convey the sense of confusion and urgency—panic, basically. I've rarely been a fan of stream of consciousness, but Lynch uses it with great effect.

Consider your own life. Your schedule, plans, the relationships that festoon life year after year. It has continuity, if not exactly predictability. Big changes can happen, and they're often not in our control, but they happen in a certain context. Your job and family reliably endure. You drive familiar roads to well-stocked stores. Life has a rhythm. Order.

All-of-a-sudden... prices are high, staples are scarce, people disappear without explanation. The bureaucracy becomes comically, belligerently, insistently Kafkaesque. Orwellian. "We have always been at war with Oceania."

"They are calling it an insurgency on the international news, Molly says, but if you want to give war its proper name, call it entertainment, we are now TV for the rest of the world."

Lynch's prose is dense and rich, worth lingering over. It's also like a flash flood, unexpected, chaotic, overwhelming, carrying you along, scraping, smothering, rushing you past what was familiar into territory that is strange, perhaps untrustworthy, no footholds or anyplace that



neither innocent nor presumed innocent.

The important thing with such a story is to be able to lose objectivity. Lynch writes in the present tense. This is not something that happened recently or once-upon-atime on which we now have a perspective. The challenge for Lynch is how to take us from being voyeurs, sympathetic observers, and make us participants, to make us think, "Yes, that's how it is, that's how it was for me, or will be for me." We enter the story. We understand that is not the sort of thing that happens or happened to other people. This is universal. It's just a matter of time before we, ourselves, are TV for the rest of the world. Living well is no guarantee of safety. Ask Paradise, CA. Valencia, Spain. Asheville, NC.

Margaret Atwood said of Handmaid's Tale that everything that she wrote about had already happened somewhere in the world. Same here. This is not speculative fiction. We think order is permanent, self perpetuating. How naively myopic. It is a shock when it falls away and life becomes fundamentally unmanageable. See you on the far side, I hope. Good luck.



first stages of development, with no writer, director, or cast attached just yet. However, it is said Warner Bros. is "keen" on expanding the franchise to the big screen in some way. The publication also notes the studio is working on "at least one," leaving the door open for additional films to be considered.



Knowing vs. Doing

The Golden Rule

The Golden Rule. We've all heard it, memorized it, and most of us could even recite it with our eyes closed: "Treat others the way you want to be treated." Simple, right? It's been around for ages, passed down like a family recipe for moral decency, a one-size-fits-all instruction on how to live. But here's the kicker: knowing the Golden Rule and actually "doing" it are two very different things.

In a world where we can instantly share a meme, give a thumbs up, or voice our latest opinion online, we might think we're practicing the Golden Rule just by nodding along to its wisdom. But let's be honest; putting this rule into action is tougher than it looks.

It's one thing to know you should treat others the way you want to be treated. But what happens when you're stuck in traffic and someone cuts you off? Or when the person in front of you at the coffee shop takes forever to order a triple-shot, soy milk, half-caf, extrafoam, double-whip mocha? It's easy to understand patience in theory but a



whole different thing to act on it in the middle of a morning caffeine crisis.

Consider a recent scene I witnessed at the Hy-Vee parking lot. A woman accidentally bumped her cart into a man. She apologized, but instead of simply accepting the apology and moving on, he proceeded to give her a lengthy lecture on "cart etiquette." Now, I doubt he would've enjoyed someone speaking to him like that if he had been the one with the runaway cart. In that moment, he still "knew" the Golden Rule—but he certainly wasn't "doing" it.

One of the most common mistakes people make is thinking that as long as they don't actively mistreat others, they're doing well. "I didn't yell at anyone today, so I'm good," we tell ourselves. But the Golden Rule is about more than just avoiding rudeness; it's about taking the extra step to act in a way that makes others feel respected, valued, and appreciated.

Let's take a look at social media, where "keyboard warriors" reign supreme. How many times have you seen a comment section that's become a battlefield of insults and hot takes? People say things

online they'd never say face-to-face. If we all paused and asked ourselves, "Would I want someone talking to me like this?" before hitting "post," the internet might be a kinder place. Yet, in the heat of the moment, people tend to focus on winning an argument rather than treating others the way they'd want to be treated.

Acting out the Golden Rule doesn't come naturally to everyone—it's a habit we have to build. Picture this: You're at a restaurant, and the server is clearly new. They're making a few mistakes and taking a bit longer. Sure, your food might be delayed, and your patience tested, but would you want understanding if you were in their shoes? Or better yet, if your kid or friend was in their shoes, how would you want them treated?

I recently saw a friend turn this situation into a perfect Golden Rule moment. Instead of getting annoyed, he cracked a joke to put the nervous server at ease. They ended up laughing together, and by the end of the meal, the server was visibly more confident and grateful. That's the kind of simple act that transforms "knowing" into "doing."

The Golden Rule isn't easy, especially when someone's rude or inconsiderate.

But those moments are when it matters most. If we can take a breath and treat them with kindness, we often find that kindness is contagious. A small act of patience or understanding can ripple out and improve someone else's day—maybe even their whole week.

Think of it this way: We all love it when someone lets us merge into traffic or holds the door for us when our hands are full. Those little actions are worth more than gold because they show respect, empathy, and humanity. But someone has to go first, and that someone can be us.

At the end of the day, it's easy to say we believe in treating others with kindness and respect. But knowing is passive. Doing so takes effort, patience, and sometimes swallowing our pride. Yet, the rewards are worth it. A world where people actively live by the Golden Rule is one we'd all love to live in.

So the next time you're tempted to yell at the person who's talking loudly on their phone in line, take a deep breath, and ask yourself, "Am I just knowing, or am I doing?" The answer might be just what we all need to turn a good idea into a great world.

Are You Ready for the Inevitable Transition From Fall to Winter?

As cold weather moves in, it is important to take a few preventative measures to protect your home. Winterizing isn't typically expensive to do and usually doesn't require much "handiness," but it can make a real difference once cold weather hits.

Here's a quick and easy Fall-to-Winter Checklist to ensure your home is ready for the bitter cold temps. Check these basic things off before the snow flies (again), you'll be saving yourself some hassle (and possibly some money, too!)

Fall-to-Winter Home Checklist

- Take care of your gutters. Fall foliage is beautiful but can cause problems over the winter months. Be sure to clean your gutters and remove all leaves from drains around the home (egress windows, gutter pipes).
- Make sure your furnace is ready to turn up the heat. Test your heating system so you know it will work when you need it. Make sure you replace the filter and set up the humidifier.
- Prep your pipes. No one likes dealing with frozen pipes that burst. Be sure to disconnect all hoses from outside faucets and turn off the water to prevent that from happening.
- Don't forget your irrigation system. Before it gets too cold, make sure you blow out the irrigation system so it is ready for spring.
- Prepare your AC to hibernate until spring. Before you cover your air conditioner for the winter months, turn the disconnect to the off position on the exterior of your home.
- 6. **Don't wait—Get your winter supplies now!** It's always a great idea to get your winter supplies now before the frigid cold

temps hit and several feet of snow pile up. Tune up the snowblower. Grab your salt, shovels, hats, and gloves. And make sure you have a portable heater, extra power pack, and generator handy, just in case.

A few more additional items to check:

- Check your fireplace. Animal nests in your fireplace can be hazardous.
 Conduct an inspection before building your first fire of the season so things go smoothly all season long.
- Weatherproof (especially if you own an older home). Weatherstripping or installing storm doors and windows will prevent cold air from entering your home or heat from escaping it, which may reduce your power bills. Caulk around windows and use foam outlet protectors to prevent cold air from entering your home.
- Protect your plants. If you haven't done so already, you'll want to get the plants and flowering trees inside before the next cold snap.
- Bring in the outdoors. Cold temperatures, snow, and ice can damage outdoor furniture and grills. If possible, store them in the garage or in the basement. If you have a gas grill with a propane tank, close the tank valve and disconnect the tank first. Clean and cover your grill before putting it away for the season.

While it may not quite seem like the end of fall and the start of winter, we all know that the temps can drop rather quickly and fluctuate drastically over the next several weeks. I don't know about you, but we are doing these things now while it is still fairly mild outside, so we are prepared when the low temps become consistent through the end of the year and into the new year.


