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Well Happy New Year everybody! Here we go! 2025! What could possibly go wrong? I know some of us are very excited about it and others are about as nervous as you can get. But we don't really have a choice. We made this bed, so now we have to sleep in it.

Before we quite got to 2025, 2024 went out on a decidedly disappointing and heartbreaking note for me and many others in Dubuque who are connected to civic and cultural organizations in the area. In just a couple of days, we lost some pretty wonderful people who made incredibly positive and lasting impacts on this community.

First, we learned of the passing of one time Dubuquer and Loras College alum, Greg Gumbel at age 78. After Loras, he went on to a Hall of Fame career as a sports broadcaster, and along the way, reconnected with his alma mater, bringing great support to the school both financially but in many other ways. He's one of those people, like Tony Danza and George R.R. Martin, who are not from here but who we point to as being an important part of our cultural history.

A day later, I learned of the passing of one Dubuque's most wonderful supporters of the arts and culture, Cindy Nelms-Byrne. As my friend Chris Wyrda puts it, "She was an amazing human in every way with a fire that made everyone glow." She was also married to Bob Byrne, one of Dubuque's most storied writers and personalities. Together again in the stars those two, which can only make them burn a little brighter.

And a day later, Morgan Frasier, director of the Mission in downtown Dubuque, was lost to cancer after a courageous fight. Though not long-serving in the role, his compassion and leadership was greatly appreciated and much missed by those at the organization. I know his mentoring support and encouragement of my friend Jeff Lenhart, who has been serving as acting director of the Mission since Morgan had to step aside to focus on his health, has been immeasurably valuable. I hope they give Jeff a chance to continue leading the organization surrounded by supportive people who understand the value that place and

the ongoing struggle that it is to keep it working for those struggling in our community.

We lost Duane Haggerty, Chief Executive Officer at Heritage Works, Inc as well today. This great organization's vision is literally to develop an authentic, vibrant, and culturally rich community with financial tools, workforce training, educational workshops, and architectural tours. Briana Thompson wrote this of Duane today, "Duane poured so much wisdom into me & was one of those most sweetest & compassionate human beings I've met in this town. He was intelligent, courageous ,motivated & ran his company with so much integrity that he never compromised."


And on the same day, we hear of the passing of one of America's true humanitarian icons. If ever there was a man whose impact on the world was greater after he left the Oval Office than before, Jimmy Carter is that man. Humble, imperfect, wise, compassionate, hopeful, and ever-giving right up to the end. His life is one that any of us, regardless of our politics, should hope to emulate.

In the greater balance of loss vs. gain in this world, Dubuque suffered a massive collective loss of talent, class, and humanity this week. It's only the night of Dec. 29 as I write this, so I hope to tiptoe out of this year without adding anyone else to this list. It feels like a series of unfair gut punches in a row. It's almost as if all of these truly fine people looked ahead and what's coming down the pipe in less than a month and decided to tap out before they have to see it happen. But I know that's not true. Given the option, each would have been on the front line to keep fighting the good fight for their community and the people who live here.

My hope for 2025 is that Dubuque is able to foster new leaders, inspirational torch bearers, and dynamic cultural catalysts that swing that pendulum to the gain side of the balance we've just lost. Whereas we can't always do a heck of a lot about what's happening in the world around us, in this small corner of the world, we all can be the change we want to see in the world, and right now, we all need to step up a little to fill the voids we see each time we lose another hero.

I sincerely hope the first week of 2025 is better than the last week of 2024 has been for our community. And may the rest of the year follow that trend despite the hurdles ahead.







Dubuque County Business Competition Deadline

MONDAY, JANUARY 6

For the second consecutive year, ambitious entrepreneurs will have an avenue to help launch their business or help it grow. The Dubuque County Business Competition, organized by The Innovation Lab and powered by Dupaco Credit Union, is set to bring together startups, existing businesses, funders, and mentors under one roof, providing a unique opportunity for them to kickstart or scale their ventures.

Entrepreneurs will be selected from applications to participate in the competition taking place on Feb. 6. Each participating entrepreneur will receive \$250 in

seed funding, and an additional \$20,000 in funding will be awarded to help fuel business growth. In addition, each participant will have the opportunity to gain insights from industry experts who will help them refine their strategies and finetune their pitches, giving their business ideas the best possible chance of success.

The competition will start with a Funding Fair on Feb. 6 at 5 p.m. where the finalists will each have a booth to display their business information and concepts. Attendees will listen to pitches from each business and vote for their favorite concept. A panel of expert judges will also listen to and score pitches. The businesses that garner the top five judges' scores will be selected to pitch at the live pitch event. The business that generates the most crowd votes also earns a spot in the live pitch event.

Six finalists will take the stage at 6:30 p.m. to deliver their compelling 5-minute pitches to the crowd. Their pitches will be evaluated by a panel of expert judges with the top three businesses receiving seed funding of \$10,000 for first place, \$5,000 for second place, and \$2,750 for third place.





While Dubuque has been on a

growth spurt for years now, we could not help but notice that it seems like there is a lot going on right now all over town and in many diverse corners of fabric that makes up our community. From new hotels and entertainment venues, to great strides in local education and child care, to new housing popping up all over, we thought it would be fun to shine a light on some of the larger projects happening right now as we enter a new year. While addressing the crowd gathered to celebrate the announcement of John and Alice Butler's

stunning \$60 million donation to the University of Dubuque to create the first medical school developed in Iowa in the last 125 years, Mayor Brad Cavanagh summed up this moment in time for Dubuque best: "With the Field of Dreams project, Chaplain Schmitt Island redevelopment, over 2,400 new housing units being proposed, numerous industrial expansion projects, redevelopment of the Central Avenue corridor, major expansion projects proposed by the Dubuque Museum of Art, the Dubuque Community Y, the National Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium, the Historic Millwork District projects, three new hotels under construction, the recent announcement by University of Dubuque of a major expansion of their Aviation Program, and now this, our region is experiencing a major renaissance. When in the 1980s they asked, 'Will the last person to leave Dubuque please turn out the lights?' could they have envisioned this 40 years later?"

So let us get out of the way and let the projects tell the story...

A New Campus for the Dubuque Museum of Art

In 2025, the Dubuque Museum of Art breaks ground on their ambitious and inspired new campus. The proposed museum campus would be made up of three buildings taking up much of the downtown block where the museum currently sits along with a fourth building, the new daycare currently under construction by Cottingham & Butler.

Building 1, The Programs Pavilion (7th & Locust Streets), would include an atrium, lobby, two classrooms, and a terrace and café with skylights allowing natural light into the building while lighting up the block at night.

Second, The Gallery Pavilion (7th & Bluff Streets) will provide space for temporary exhibitions, rotating exhibits from the museum's permanent collection, a family gallery, offices, a library, and a boardroom.

Finally, The Collection Pavilion (8th & Bluff Streets) would house the museum's collection and building mechanicals, as well as provide space for transporting, processing, and storing artwork.


With green space highlighted, the proposal includes a rooftop garden, gardens that extend into the entrances of the museum corridor with a canopy of cherry blossoms, and interactive sculptures that may, one day, close 7th Street between Bluff and Locust Streets and extend the campus into Washington Park. This would allow space to host events by the museum as well as others in the community.

The \$69 million project (plus a \$20 million endowment) has raised over \$40 million so far including an \$8 million grant from lowa Economic Development Authority through the state's Destination lowa program, plus a \$25 million matching grant from John and Alice Butler.

Construction site preparation will begin early in the new year. During that time, the museum will relocate to a temporary space at the Dupaco Voices Building. The new venues are planned to be completed in the last quarter of 2026.

Two Marriott Hotels
Coming to the
Port of Dubuque
Two new \$30 million

dual-branded Residence Inn & Courtyard hotels are coming to the Port of Dubugue by the end of 2026. The city council recently approved the sale of a 13-acre lot in the Port to Kinseth Hospitality Company. In turn, the Iowa hotel developer is building a six-story facility to house two connected hotels under the Marriott umbrella. The hotels are differentiated by their design to accommodate short- or long-term visitors across a combined 160 hotel rooms. City Manager Mike Van Milligen believes the facility will boost tourism, as future development in the Tri-State area exceeds the community's hotel capacity. For example, when the Major League Baseball stadium expansion is complete at the Field of Dreams, "it could generate an additional 40,000 hotel room nights" annually in demand. Van Milligen estimates the Dubuque area could be more than 100,000 annual hotel room nights short of demand shortly as other development projects in the community progress.



The Wanderwood Gardens, an immersive woodland playground for daydreamers of all ages, featuring 15 unique garden areas, a learning and education center, and interactive experiences, was announced to the public in 2023 and broke ground in 2024. The four-acre children's garden is inspired by Debi and Andy Butler and features a variety of different outdoor play spaces to explore, awakening visitors' connection to nature and delight for the world around them.

The amazing spaces include Wandering Waters, an interactive water adventure with a snail and wading pond; Dendy Village featuring magical homes designed to stimulate all of the senses with fragrant flowers, colorful plants, and textured surfaces; Enchanted Trail, a 100-plus yard trail challenge course that winds through the woods, in and among the trees with dappled sunlight









sparkling through; Dubuque Mine Camp where adventurous visitors can dig for treasure, fill mine carts with sand, or duck into a cool tunnel; the Canopy, whimsical tree playset with climbing structures, slides, and interactive features; and Spinning Bird Plaza with its walkthrough towering trees to operate the interactive birds sculptures, spinning in dizzying circles overhead.

The Wanderwood Gardens was designed by Jeri Deneen and Jon Powell of Deneen Powell Atelier, an immersive experiential design firm based out of San Diego who have designed works like the San Diego Botanical Gardens and the award-winning Conservation Gardens in Salt Lake City.

Jaren McGovern has been named as director of the new interactive experience. Having broken ground earlier in 2024 and with tree clearing and landscaping underway to prepare for construction in 2025, the final magical unveiling will happen in 2026. Field of Dreams

In September, local Dyersville Events Inc. bought the Field of Dreams Movie Site


from its former ownership group, Go the Distance Baseball, for \$27 million, most of which came from a state grant. Travel Dubuque will still manage the site, and planned improvements under the former owners intend to move forward. The largest projects include building a permanent baseball stadium next to the original movie site with 3,500 permanent seats and expandability for another 4,500 seats for special events, from big games to concerts and conventions. Adding a nearby youth sports complex is also top

of the list. Earthwork for that site about 70 acres away is already completed. It will feature five to seven new ball fields, restrooms, and concessions. They hope to attract as many as 1,000 teams each summer, up from about 450 in 2024. To support current and ongoing development at the site, the owners intend to launch a capital campaign in 2025.

Arena Football at Five Flags For the first time in Dubuque's history, a professional arena football team will call the city home, bringing the thrilling action of arena football to local fans in the fall of 2025 at Five Flags Arena. Dubuque's franchise will be called The Power, a member of the United indoor Football Associations, playing a unique, highenergy variation of the game with eight players per side on a 50-yard field. "This is totally a different breed of football," said John Guy, Director of Game Day Operations. "With no punting and two receivers in motion before the snap, the action is constant. Scores can range from traditional NFL levels to astronomical, basketballtype numbers." For more information visit IowaPowerFootball.com.

Culbies Event Center in East Dubuque East Dubuque, IL partners

who saw a great lack of special event gathering space in their community have done something about it. Mike Meyer, Toby Colbertson, and Todd Collen collaborated to create the new Culbies Event Center which is now well under construction along Sinsinawa Avenue in the heart of downtown. The nearly 10,000-square-foot venue will accommodate 350 seated guests for wedding and other gatherings. It also includes a beautiful outdoor beer garden with a great portion of it covered. The indoor bar, a huge rectangle in the center, will extend outside for about a quarter of its length for great indoor/outdoor entertainment during the warmer months with special heating amenities including built-in fireplaces to extend that season as long as possible. And naturally, the facility will have gaming options, and Eastside Energy will also move to that building. The group will be open for event booking by July for sure but hope to be open for general entertainment in May.

Schmitt Island & Q Casino + Resort

The Key Hotel at Q Casino + Resort If you've gone to Q Casino + Resort lately or even just crossed the Wisconsin bridge, you've seen the collection of concrete elevator shafts going up next to the casino as the exciting new Key Hotel begins to take shape. Complete with rooftop restaurant, bar, and event space, the new seven-story, 90-room boutique Hilton Tapestry-branded resort is nestled in between the casino's administrative office wing and the Hilton Garden Inn. Scheduled to be open this fall, the stunning centerpiece hotel plays on the notion of Dubuque as the "Key City." It will feature the first rooftop restaurant in the city, but details on that are still under wraps for now. We do know that there will be some additional banquet space up there at the top of the Key Hotel for small weddings or unique business dinners. The Key Hotel will be a jewel in the \$83 million-plus renovation and expansion of the property that began in September 2023.

The lowa Amphitheater
After the Key Hotel, the permanent outdoor lowa Amphitheater is one of the next big things coming to the Q Casino + Resort campus on Schmitt Island. The city has issued bonds to pay for and lead the development to be repaid by Dubuque Racing Association and Q Casino + Resort.

Q's Interim CEO, Brian Rakestraw, said, "It's time to step up and have a beautiful permanent venue that overlooks the Mississippi. I can't tell you the level of thought that has gone into all aspects of the project." The venue will accommodate up to 9,000 attendees.

If you remember where the dog kennels were, that's where the amphitheater is going to be. This new,









permanent music venue will make hosting concerts and festivals cheaper and easier, and they will be hosted with a far higher level of quality of service and experience both for the public and the crew running the events.

The hard construction should be done by the end of 2025 with hopes of opening to the public for the Back Waters Stage Concert Series 2026 season, unless the series changes its name with the new facility.

PinSeekers Golf Entertainment Venue PinSeekers, a hybrid-golf entertainment company that currently has locations in Tiffin and DeForest, WI, will bring the third of its destination venues to the Q Casino + Resort campus on Schmitt Island, offering fun and entertainment for all ages. The facility would include a driving range equipped with interactive smart target greens, allowing for year-round, day-and-night use. Additional features of the facility under consideration include 40 all-weather, luxury golf suites, an 18-hole indoor synthetic turf mini-golf course, and TopTracer Technology that tracks every shot and offers all players real-time

statistics. Multiple games include Full Swing Pro Series Simulators featuring more than 30 courses as well as 13 other interactive game experiences, a casual restaurant and bar featuring a fresh twist on American classics, versatile rooftop lounge and nightclub providing space for live music, and flexible event and meeting spaces to accommodate a wide range of gatherings.

PinSeekers joins the Iowa Amphitheater on the slate of family amenities coming soon, joining the recently opened Island Social arcade. The addition of PinSeekers is aligned with Q Casino's efforts to reshape and reimagine what Schmitt Island has to offer.


The plan now requires approval from the Dubuque City Council and the Iowa Racing & Gaming Commission. Local developer Gronen and DBQ Property Group will serve as the project's broker, contractor, and design firm. Construction is slated to begin in spring 2025, with an anticipated opening in spring 2026.

Growing Schmitt Island & Access to It Coming over of the 16th Street bridge, you will soon be able to walk and bike all the way from the bridge along the outside of the marina and along the lake by the Schmitt Island Veterans Memorial Plaza. Improvements are done to sidewalks so people who park in the Gerald McAleece Park & Recreation Complex have quality walkway access to ImOn Arena which needs spillover parking to accommodate fans as are trails and plaza with just some railing to be completed in the coming weeks.

The trailhead will jut out from that walkway overlooking the waterway. You may see these new pedestrian amenities when you take in the Memorial Day Parade, which moved to Schmitt Island last year and returns there again this season.

Granted, there will be growing pains. "It's going to take time, but literally, we're at it each and every day," Q Casino + Resort's outgoing CEO Alex Dixon reminded us in a recent interview. "We are advocating for and partnering with folks to improve the lighting, the sidewalks, the visibility, and the landscaping so that places look and feel and are safe. The way to accelerate is if more people come because the infrastructure will follow the feet of our local community, and success begets success."

Building Bridges to Employment and Equity (B2E2) Project Multimodal Transportation Corridors

As we all know, railways split downtown Dubuque and can make access from downtown to the Wisconsin bridge, Kerper Boulevard, and Schmitt Island impossible. Only two at-grade level crossings exist (the 3rd Street overpass to Port of Dubuque and Fengler Street bridge), leaving a significant gap in between.

The Building Bridges to Employment and Equity (B2E2) Project is a multimodal transportation project focused on solving this issue and more, bringing connectivity and safety for all users. Improving these transportation corridors will better connect neighborhoods and residents with economic opportunities, recreational amenities, and community resources in the Kerper Boulevard Industrial Park, on Chaplain Schmitt Island, Downtown Dubuque, the Historic Millwork District, and on the west side of the city via the downtown Intermodal Transportation Center.

In addition, due to the merger of the Canadian Pacific and Kansas City Southern railroads, train traffic in Dubuque is expected to increase from approximately nine trains per day to 18 trains per day by 2027. This surge in train activity will lead to significant delays and hinder the efficient movement of people and goods and significantly impact emergency response and key employment centers. The proposed 14th Street overpass will help avoid train crossing delays and potential negative impacts to safety and mobility in Dubuque's downtown urban core.

A \$25 million RAISE Implementation Grant will go toward construction of the initial phases of the B2E2 project including a vehicular and pedestrian overpass at the 14th Street railroad at-grade crossing, a roundabout at the 16th and Sycamore Street intersection, and a roundabout at the 16th Street, Greyhound Park Road, and Admiral Sheehy Drive intersection. It also includes Elm Street corridor and 16th Street complete streets improvements, adding sidewalks along segments without existing sidewalks and enhanced crosswalks at the 16th Street and Kerper Boulevard intersection. Look too for bridge sidewalk modifications to the Peosta Channel Bridge including a pedestrian and bike shared-use path.

The city is currently working with a team of consultants to plan



and design the initial phases of the project as well as additional safety, capacity, and mobility improvements along the designated corridors. The initial phases of the fairly long-term B2E2 project are expected to be constructed from 2027 to 2030. More construction woes in the short term, yes. But on the back end, massive improvement all around.

Central Avenue Corridor Redevelopment 2025 will see a contin-

ued acceleration for the redevelopment of the Central Avenue Corridor. The existing Central Avenue Corridor Streetscape Master Plan is in place, and the city's late 2024 decision to support a multi-modal design that supports

vehicle, bike, and pedestrian traffic sets the stage for new public and private investment in 2025. Public investments will be made in green alleys, benches, landscaping, and other amenities. New public policies on housing, incentives, outdoor dining, and facade renovations will support private investment in the corridor. That private investment will, in turn, be supported by new financing being made available in the corridor by entities such as Dubuque Initiatives, which has already invested more than \$3 million in Central Avenue projects in 2023 and 2024. These new investments coupled with the increasing capacity of local players like Voices Studios, Key City Creative Center, and Dubuque Main Street should make 2025 a watershed year for Central Avenue redevelopment.

Manufacturing

Universal Tank & Fabrication

Universal Tank & Fabrication, a key Dubuque-based manufacturer, announced a \$4 million expansion, adding 15 high-quality jobs and enhancing production capacity. This project is a win for the greater Dubuque region and reflects continued investment in innovation, workforce, and community collaboration.

Vanguard Enterprises

Another existing business expansion is Vanguard Enterprises with a 30,000-square-foot addition to their facility in the Dubuque Industrial Center West. As part of the project and growth, the company intends to create 10 new jobs. With a 60 year history in Dubuque, Vanguard is a recognized industry leading manufacturer of laminated and solid surface countertops, granite countertops, commercial cabinets and casework, and other laminated products.



Education

While both the new campus for the Dubuque Museum of Art and Wildwood Gardens could easily be listed under this growth heading, we looked at them from the fun side of things instead, so here we will focus on a couple of exciting projects on the horizon at the University of Dubuque.

College of Osteopathic Medicine at the University of Dubuque

Announced less than a month ago, the University of Dubuque is officially moving forward with the required approvals and programmatic accreditation process to open a four-year medical school. In recognition of a \$60 million gift from John (DHL'17) and Alice (DHL'17) Butler—one of the largest donations to UD in its 172-year history—the new college will be named after the Butler family.

The proposed John and Alice Butler College of Osteopathic Medicine at the

University of Dubuque will bring needed support to the physician workforce as well as provide an economic benefit to the region. The decision to pursue this critical program follows years of thorough consideration and research on behalf of the University's leadership team and Board of Trustees.

The U.S. is expected to face a physician shortage of between 13,500 and 86,000 by 2036. Doctors of Osteopathic Medicine, commonly known as DOs, use a whole-person approach to help prevent illness and injury across the full spectrum of medicine. They look beyond symptoms to understand how lifestyle and environmental factors impact well-being to help patients get healthy and stay well. Osteopathic medicine is one of the fast-growing healthcare professions in the country, accounting for around 11% of physicians in the U.S., according to the American Osteopathic Association (AOA).

U.D. is pursuing the necessary accreditation through the AOA

(Commission on Osteopathic College Accreditation) and is currently on track to open its doors in summer 2028. For more information, visit www.dbq.edu/Academics/

University of Dubuque Aviation Program Expansion This comes on the heels

of the announcement that U.D. plans to invest in a significant expansion of the Edward Babka Aviation Learning Center to support exponential growth in enrollment in the aviation program. This will double the size of the former flight center, the Babka Aviation Learning Center, which opened fall 2019. The program has grown since then from around 250 to over 400 students spurred, in large part, by a nationwide pilot shortage. The aviation expansion will impact multiple areas, from the learning center to parking lot and the flight ramp to hangars. Construction will begin once expansion plans are approved by the Federal Aviation Administration and the Dubuque Regional Airport Commission. The expansion will be accomplished through multiple funding sources, and the overall project is anticipated to be completed December 2026.





Addressing Dubuque's Child Care Shortage

A wide coalition of Dubuque-area organizations and leaders have answered the call to address a shortage of child care services by developing a new facility and by supporting existing childcare centers. In 2022, it was estimated that Dubuque County had less than half of the necessary child care spaces needed to address local residents' needs. That same year, a study conducted by Greater Dubuque Development Corporation found that the lack of child care was leading local residents to leave the workforce following the COVID-19 pandemic.

Bright Minds Campus
The new Bright Minds Campus
opened in early 2024 at the
site of the former Medline facility on Chavenelle Road in Dubuque's
Industrial Center West. This innovative workforce child care facility now
houses the Dubuque Community Y
Early Learning Center and the Dubuque
Community School District's Seedlings
Preschool Center under the same roof.

The Y Early Learning Center offers year-round child care for children as young as 6 weeks old through preschool age. There is also space for school-age children during the summer months. Meanwhile, the Seedlings

Preschool Center is a state-of-the-art, 18,000 square-foot preschool operated by the Dubuque Community School District. Being located within the same building as the Y Early Learning Center provides seamless access to wrap-around care for children outside of the school day. A portion of the building is expected to house

a combined city/county 911 operations center in the coming years.

In addition to assisting with the construction costs of the new facility, funding was also raised to help support existing area child care providers with staff recruitment, training, and retention efforts. The initial round of grants provided more than \$750,000

to 18 eligible providers. Retention for centers has improved, and 69 new childcare workers were hired under the effort. Both projects were spearheaded by Dubuque Initiatives, which provided matching funds to state grants for both efforts. Greater Dubuque Development partnered to raise funds through its Business Champions for Childcare program designed to engage employers in strengthening the area's child care system. This innovative public-private child care solutions effort builds on the strength of each partner to make meaningful progress to expand the availability of quality child care in Dubuque County.

New Horizon Academy Childcare Center New Horizon Academy is

coming soon to Dubuque. You can't drive down Locust Street downtown and miss it. It's HUGE and going up fast as we speak. The brand-new school will be a corporate-sponsored childcare for employees of Cottingham & Butler and will also serve the Dubuque community. Located on the corner of West 8th and Locust Streets near Washington Park, the facility will be managed by New Horizons Academy, a nationally recognized child care provider with more than 100 locations. Children ages 6 weeks to 5 years will be guided by skilled teachers using a comprehensive curriculum that includes social-emotional learning, STEAM, reading, motor development, school readiness skills, and more. The daycare is currently scheduled to open in summer 2025.

New Housing

A 2022 Dubuque Housing Needs Assessment found a very high need for housing units within the City of Dubuque. Subsequently, one of Greater Dubuque Development Corpopration's key goals of the 2027 YOU can be great here campaign was collaborating with cities, developers, and builders to create new, affordable middle-market housing for the region's growing workforce. And just 2 years into the 5-year campaign they are more than three quarters of the way to their billion-dollar residential and commercial construction investment goal with \$726.5 million invested as of November.

There are so many new residential projects underway and 2,400 new units proposed for the area that it would take a whole issue just to cover them, so we'll hit some highlights that exemplify the diverse types of housing coming our way as well as the diverse locations in our community where they are popping up.

Union at the Marina Affordable Housing Complex

Just announced, the Annex Group plans to build two, four-story buildings at 2660 Kerper Blvd, called the "Union at the Marina," on the site where Bowling and Beyond one stood for so many years. The \$55.1 million affordable-housing complex will feature 201 units, consisting of 85 one-bedroom, 79 two-bedroom, and 37 three-bedroom units. The Indianabased developer purchased the land for the project from the city for \$4.02 million earlier this year. Dubuque is one of the smallest communities to which The Annex Group agreed to develop a complex of this size, but they identified one vacant unit across almost 1,000 units that they surveyed which was unheard of in almost any market

they've ever worked, so the company saw it as a no-brainer opportunity. And it's next to parks, a marina, a city pool, and, of course, the Mississippi River. The 201 units will be available for households with incomes at or below 70% of the area median income. The Annex Group is getting up to \$10 million in tax incentives from Dubuque over the next 15 years if the complex is finished by the fall of 2026.

Fox Hills
Construction is beginning soon on Fox Hills apartment complex on
Plaza Drive behind Asbury Plaza on
Dubuque's west side. When complete,
Fox Hills will be home to 390 units
featuring residences from studio units
up to three bedroom apartments
including shared amenities such as
a swimming pool. For more details,

Switch Homes' The Farm Switch Home founder Matt Mulligan, also president and chief operating officer of Con-Ion Construction Co. in Dubuque, is bringing a 105-unit sustainable living community near the Northwest Arterial in Dubuque. The new community will include DOE Zero Energy Ready homes. According to the company, each of their homes will be built with highquality, recycled materials. The homes use solar panels and smart devices to save money on maintenance costs and last longer. Switch Homes also plans to build community gardens, ample green space, walking trails, and a community park within The Farm neighborhood.

The home development company is based in Dubuque. In fact, Switch













Homes also happens to be the developer that created the recent modern-looking 11,400-square-foot Stoneman Commons property next to Kennedy Mall on Stoneman Road where their local office is located. It also houses Nektar Juice Bar, Milan Laser Hair Removal, Burn Boot Camp exercise facility, and now Pizza Hut, too.

Switch Homes already has communities in Bettendorf and Davenport, IA,

but the company said the Dubuque community is the first of several proposed master-planned communities in Iowa. Switch aims to have the first 36 homes constructed in the next 18 months. The project will be developed in three phases over several years, with a total investment ranging from \$35 million to \$40 million. Prices for the homes will range from around \$325,000 to \$450,000, depending on size.

Outfly Co. Millwork **Apartment Complex** Additionally, 60 new apartments are being built across from the Dupaco headquarters downtown where the old Spahn & Rose lumber yard once stood and not so long ago was remodeled into numerous storefronts which have not taken off. Now, the structure is being torn down by Outfly Co. led by Mike Fullan from HODGE Co., in order to build a new 60-unit complex across the street from the wonderfully restored Dupaco Voices Building in Dubuque's Millwork District. The new building looks to fit in perfectly to the historic warehouse district it will call home. According to their website, "At Outfly Co., we believe that winning as a team is far more rewarding than individual success. Our 'On the Offense' approach means we don't just develop properties; we bring full-scaled development to the forefront, creating vibrant, sustainable communities through the art of placemaking."

Farley & Loetcher Building Apartments in the Millwork District

This particularly huge building always seemed to us like the most obvious next project that needed to happen in that neighborhood. The project will renovate the Farley & Loetscher building at 801 Jackson St. and a nearby property at White and East 9th Streets to create more than 120 new one- and two-bedroom, market-rate apartments and renovated commercial space. Matt Mulligan,

representing the ownership group (he's also with Switch Homes, are you keeping up?), said of the project, "The big building is going to be all housing. It will have a rooftop patio for an amenity space [and likely a golf simulator]." The smaller building, connected by skywalk, would be mixed use. "We're trying to create cool spots to hang out and open a laptop and work or kick back and have a beverage." The proposed 30-plus million project's proposed city development agreement requires them to accept applications from housing choice voucher recipients.

These kinds of projects join a number of recent apartment rehab projects of great downtown buildings that Gronen has created in recent years including the Caradco Lofts (where 365ink now operates in the lower level), Francis Apartments at Steeple Square, the Henry Stout Senior Apartments located in the former Dubuque YMCA at the corner of 9th and Iowa Streets, Washington Court in the former Dubuque Casket Company, and more. Similarly, the 48 units of the Kretschmer Lofts project brought additional loft living to the Millwork District in 2022 by the same group now doing the Farley & Loetcher building.

The former Bridge Restaurant is coming down as we write this in order to build a new 80-residence apartment complex on the site adjacent to the Illinois bridge.

And you may have also seen the new large apartment building under construction near Kennedy Mall behind Phoenix Theatres. And those are just the big ones. There is a housing boom in Dubuque and not a moment too soon.






More National Retail & Restaurant Chains

Finally, moving on from where you live to where you eat, area leaders are acutely aware of the need for more options and recognizable names in the area. On the horizon the Greater Dubuque Development Corporation hopes to add of more national retailers in the Dubuque Market. Greater Dubuque Development Corporation's contracted with consultant Retail Strategies pre-pandemic. The partnership already helped bring fast-food outlets Chipotle, Popeyes, Five Guys,

and Chick-fil-A to the city's west side before they lapsed the contract with the firm during the pandemic. A new contract will bring recommended ways for Dubuque officials to entice those additional retail businesses to our city. Instead of fast food this time, Greater Dubuque Development Corporation's Rick Dickinson is hopeful for more retail offerings and sit-down restaurants, not believing that more options would hurt Dubuque's independent establishments. The need

to grow and draw more residents is the driver for widening the variety of chain businesses, as newcomers like to see familiar brands that feel comfortable and put them at home. Dubuque's custom trade area boasts 107,000 residents in 45,000 households with a median household income of \$70,000. The U.S. national median is \$71,000. The west side of town would draw most attention where auto-oriented commercial spaces fit their corporate templates.

So there you have it... for now. Stay tuned. Hopefully we can do this all again with as much excitement for 2026! We're honestly kind of excited to hear about all the stuff we might have missed for this year's list!



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

Ruix Records

This December, Dubuque saw the opening of a business created to serve the needs of local music lovers and creators alike. Founded by well-reputed creative entrepreneurs Bob Bucko Jr. and Rick Eagle, Ruix Records opened its doors to the public on the 9th of the month.

The Ruix name was already long active in the area in the form of print zines as well as a live music series, record label, and podcast/livestream. According to Bucko, "All of these things have existed in support of Dubuque music and art, and we wanted a record store that would do the same."

Both active members of the Dubuque Area Arts Collective, Bucko and Eagle saw the significance of supporting community artists and musicians, and developed their record store in accordance with the mission of giving local musicians a space to share their works with others, as well as a place to connect with one another. "We want to cultivate a sense of community, as record stores are historically a place for creative people and general freaks to meet and hang out," says Bucko.

To this end, the record store emphasizes a section dedicated specifically to local and regional musicians, offering local music lovers the opportunity to shop for their music in the form of records, tapes, and CDs at their convenient downtown location. These formats are displayed alongside other types of merchandise

that have traditionally helped musicians to not only spread the good word about their musical projects and albums, but also generate income to aid in continuing to pursue their creative passions.

What's more, the store will also be promoting musical artists like these through features on their website and other online avenues that can help them to reach wider audiences.

Ruix Records, whose primary focus is on vinyl records, offers a wide selection of not only local music, but mainstream as well, giving shoppers the opportunity to browse for their current favorite music while discovering their next favorite. They have even placed a listening station within the store to help music lovers with those discoveries.

In addition to vinyl, they also offer CDs, stereo equipment, the items needed to care for records, vintage clothing and band merch, and books and movies about music. They even carry some of the products local musicians need to keep creating including bass and guitar strings, drumsticks, and tuners.

Though they are just getting started out, their inventory is already growing, and customers can soon expect to find more vinyl, an expanded \$5 and Under section—intended to keep the exploration of music affordable for everyone, as well as equipment such as turntables and more stereo components.

Ruix Records is open six days a week, with Tuesdays being the only day they are not open to the public. They also keep their doors open until 10 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesday through Saturday, giving locals extra time to indulge in their musical tastes. Roux & Lucia

I love having a bakery in my neighborhood. It feels more like a home. It makes every day feel like a lightly-autumnal day. Like sweater weather. Even when I'm not shopping there, it comforts me to know that someone somewhere nearby... is getting fresh rolls.

And it kind of makes me feel like I live in the kind of big-city neighborhoods you see in the movies, usually rom-coms. That's exactly how I felt walking home from Roux & Lucia one morning, right down to the fresh-out-of-the-oven baguette I had cradled under my arm. But 'cept in my case, it was a scene at the end of the rom-com where we see they'll live happily ever after because I love you, Annie!

Roux & Lucia definitely has that kind of romance about it. If you want to feel like the camera is panning in on you as you meet your off-beat bestie moments before you meet the love of your life, Roux & Lucia will make you feel that way. Nobody guarantees you WILL meet the love of your life, mind you. It's just that Roux & Lucia will make you FEEL like you're just about to get your Nora Ephr-on. And if you don't meet-cute, who cares? Fresh baked goods are better than love, ANY day.

Refuse to go in for that flowery nonsense? No problem! If you want to feel like the snarky customer in line behind our protagonist, that's fine. Just don't be a jerk cuz this "movie" isn't about you.

Hell, if you just want to feel like an extra in this movie, standing in the background looking at your phone while waiting to order, you'll get the same incredible baked goods, regardless.

I went back Sunday morning to get coffee, breakfast, and a loaf of sourdough for the family, and they already recognized me. Granted, saying something upon your first visit like, "Hi! I'm going to write about you for 365ink, what do you recommend?" is going to leave somewhat of an impression, but I ain't THAT pretty. The point is, on my second visit, they made me feel like a regular. Good, because I am.

And while, yes, Roux & Lucia has a definite "neighborhood bakery" vibe, especially since they're still finishing work on their market and cafe inside the old Milk House (again with the romantic location), it's easy to get to by just exiting Highway 20 at Bryant. Or taking Grandview Avenue. I wish I had a kid in Bryant School right now so could grab a cup and a pastry after drop-off.

Let's talk about the food.

When I described myself as walking down the street with a just-out-of-theoven baguette under my arm, that wasn't imaginary movie magic. That was real life. The steam of it literally fogged my glasses at one point. And all the way home, I could just feel how crusty it was. I kept flicking it to hear the percussiveness. Mmmm. You know that scene in Ratatouille where Colette is teaching Linguini about how the best bread makes that crispy crackling noise as you tear it open? Well... that's a bit too discriminating for me, but it's not a BAD metric for judging bread. Point is, if you want that lovely sound, you will absolutely find it at Roux & Lucia. I'm not kidding, either. The Foley artists who worked on Ratatouille got it just

friggin' right. I know because I did a sound comparison between the movie and the baguette I got at Roux & Lucia. It's just a rom-com quality baguette, friends, tastewise, too. I could have used a little more salt in the loaf I got, but I'm just like that sometimes. I'm just going to say it: It was the most perfect baguette I've had to date.

I was most excited to try the long-awaited Roux & Lucia because I knew it meant croissants for me. My favorite part about going to a new bakery for the first time is trying their croissants. Because first of all—what are you going to do, NOT order a croissant? Are you a fool? Even if croissants are something you only eat on special occasions, surely discovering a new bakery is a croissant-able occasion, yes?

Oh! Okay! Before I get in too deep here, let me ask you this: Are you like me, folks? Did you get a countertop rotating pizza oven over the holidays? Like a Pizzazz or similar? Consider Roux & Lucia just one more reason to use that thing because it's the perfect way to heat up the items that don't go home with you hot. Yes, you can microwave them and the world won't end, but putting them on the turntable and removing them





once they get as warm as you want is the absolute perfect way to do it. Especially the quiche, which I'll get to in a bit. Not done gushing about the croissants.

Speaking of gushing croissants, let's talk about the chocolate croissants at Roux & Lucia. This is one you'll definitely want to heat up so you get the ooey-gooeyness of that chocolate going. I'm totally jealous of the laminations this bakery gets in their croissants. So flaky good. Like little pastry tornados pulling apart and flaking. No butter needed. Well... no ADDITIONAL butter needed. Croissants have plenty. Take the plunge with a big, deep bite that fills your mouth right before it melts on your tongue or pull off a piece and pop it down the hatch. Or however you do it. I don't like a lot of foreplay with my croissants. The shape of the chocolate croissant (or "pain au chocolat" if you wanna be that way) is traditional for this particular croissant. More rectangular than crescent. It'll be familiar to you, but even better than what you get at your typical drive-thru coffee spot.

Let's talk now about the "everything" croissant. Now... I went into this completely blind because I've never actually had the originator of this trend, the "everything" bagel. I just like to keep it simple with bagels. Plain bagel with plain cream cheese, please. I've kind of viewed this "everything" craze through the same lens I view "pumpkin spice." Not for me, thank you, but enjoy. But... maybe I've been wrong about "everything." Because when I tried the everything croissant at Roux & Lucia, I could see my entire life documented in croissants leading up to the moment the everything croissant hit my tastebuds. And even further back than that... to me as a young child tasting a "crescent roll" popped and baked from a canister. Are those croissants? No, of course not. But I'm talking about delicious memories here and truths that go deeper than facts and definitions. Even memories of all the great garlic breads get thrown in there because... really... if I want a proper description for the taste of the everything croissant at Roux & Lucia, it's this: It tastes like the best garlic bread

you'll ever have. And I say that knowing full well how good garlic bread can be.

The rotating pizza oven was great for the pastries, but it was even better for heating the little bacon and mushroom quiche I got. My hobbit-like affinity for mushrooms is well known, and my love of bacon is second only to Bryce's. Egg it all up and throw it in a pie crust? I'll be first in line. Even heated up, the crust holds up to eating it with your hands. And there's something so great about eating a pie with your hands. And it was so filling and hearty, I had to finish it for lunch. I ate it cold that time, and that works just fine, too.

Can't tell you about the bathrooms because, as I've said, there's still some construction going on. They'll also be selling ice cream, too. So... like... my neighborhood just got a new bakery AND a new ice cream place. I'm living the friggin' dream.

1. Combine oats, peanut butter, protein powder, chocolate chips, honey, and salt in a medium bowl. Use a tablespoon measure to scoop dough, roll into balls. Store, covered, at room temperature.



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Sky Full of Elephants

Cebo Campbell's first novel, *Sky Full of Elephants*, is a fantasy or allegory of sorts, a narrative of slouching toward utopia after a long dystopia that precedes the opening pages. The premise is about as audacious as it gets: One day, every white person in America—parents, kids, CEOs, bankers, lawyers, doctors, criminals, teachers, the whole lot of us—suddenly gets a glazed look in their eyes before walking out of their homes and offices and into the nearest body of water—where they drown.

Boom. Where, exactly, do you go from there? Some will take offense and go on to their next read. But the curious may ask: Does the author soften the blow along the way? Does he say, What a shame, that the good ones and bad ones were all erased together? Or does he unapologetically say, in effect, "Ohh, too bad; what's for dinner?" What does he do with mixed-race people in this scenario? What happens to farming, to banking, to C suites across the land—all the professions that are overwhelmingly occupied by white people? Is there conflict amongst remaining races, or does the concept of race disappear with all the folks who identify as white? What is to be done with the mayonnaise, Velveeta, and Wonder Bread that no one will ever consume?

Campbell opts to tell the story through the prism of a father and daughter who had never before met. The father, Charlie, is black, an ex-con, handyman, and teacher of solar tech at Howard University. His mother once told him that "being black is being the villain in someone else's story." His daughter, Sidney, was born to her white mother while Charlie was in prison. After "The Event," Sidney contacts Charlie who goes to see how he can help. Sidney has heard that there is a remnant of white folks in Orange Beach, AL. Charlie has heard that Alabama is a kingdom now and dangerous in some vague way. But he will do anything for his daughter, and she wants to go to Orange Beach.

In Alabama, they find a thriving... what? A utopia, or a cult? It's a community with a king and queen who live in a simple home but are treated with reverence by the community. There is no palace intrigue. They were not elected to their positions but were recognized as the obvious leaders. Their children are exemplary and unfailingly wise. And they have a machine. With ghosts, of a sort. There is so little conflict—except what Charlie's and Sidney's relationship provides—that when one son swears and shows signs of individuation, it comes as a relief. The royal family is full of enlightened nostrums that would straighten everyone out—if they needed straightening out, which only newcomers seem to need.

You will find effusive reviews of this book online from outstanding authors. I'm a little sheepish about not joining them. But while I think the author's reach exceeded his grasp, let's be fair: It's one helluva premise he undertook, and there are marvelous passages, especially in the final third of the book. He has continued a necessary conversation about America's "original sin" (as Jim Wallis called it) with an audacious, if not entirely masterful, work of imagination and hope. But if you're looking for forgiveness, redemption, or olive branches offered to white folks, you'll have to look elsewhere.

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

Look What I Found at the Library!

I'm volunteering at Carnegie-Stout Public Library, where I am "reading the shelves" taking a list and checking it twice to ensure every book is in its place. It's a fascinating journey through the glorious Dewey Decimal System, and I'm finding treasures tucked into every shelf. Here are the latest ones that jumped out to me. I checked them out and took them home. You can do that, too. Isn't that amazing?

This week, I'm looking at the 770s, where you'll find everything to do with photography.



778.94 HER: Soviet Bus Stops, by Christopher Herwig

I am not making this up! British photographer Christopher Herwig covered more than 18.000 miles in 14 countries of the former Soviet Union, traveling by car, bike, bus, and taxi to hunt down and document these bus stops. They are amazing in their variety and, in many cases, beauty. One in Gudauta, Abkhazia, looks like a jewelencrusted claw, while another in Ivianiec, Belarus resembles a series of nicely decorated A-frame tents. Herwig calls them "unique, imaginative, and sometimes a bit mad." The authorities paid little attention, he surmises, so their designers felt free to choose their forms. In the book's forward, Johnathan Meades notes that few buses still stop at these places,

yet they are still used as ad hoc drop-in centers, where men (mostly) gather to open cans of beer and "set the world to rights." For people living in remote burgs lacking pubs and village halls, the bus stops have found a new and vital life.



779.092 REN: Touching Strangers, by Richard Renaldi

I dare you to look at this book and not be moved. In public places across the country, photographer Richard Renaldi asked a stranger to have their picture taken, and then asked a second person to pose with them, in close proximity. He urged them to touch in some way. This took some cajoling, and sometimes involved more than two people, but in nearly every photo, these strangers are touching in some way—a hand on a shoulder, a hug, two hands enfolded, even a kiss on the cheek. Each pair looks startlingly different; for example, a young man who might be working at the gas station with his hands on the shoulders of a woman dressed in a sari. This book made me feel hopeful about my fellow Americans. The image on the cover shows a cop with his arm around a young girl's neck—a pose that could be threatening, until you see the calm look in each of their eyes. It is beautiful, it is thoughtful, it is sometimes uncomfortable, but every page is astounding.
