

# Winter Arts Snow Sculpting Festival

WASHINGTON PARK (700 LOCUST ST) The 2025 Winter Arts Snow Sculpting Festival takes place Feb. 6–9 at Washington Park, with community activities on Sunday, Feb. 9, from noon to 4 p.m. This free, family-friendly event is produced by the Dubuque Museum of Art in partnership with the City's Office of Arts & Cultural Affairs.

Throughout the festival, teams of professional, amateur, and collegiate sculptors will compete by carving giant snow sculptures from 6-by-6-by-8 feet blocks of solid snow. The winning team will receive \$1,000, and all teams will have the opportunity to claim the People's Choice Award, which comes with a \$300 cash prize. Entries must be received by 5 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 31.

Volunteers are needed to help prepare the snow blocks for sculptors. Snow stomping will take place on Tuesday, Feb. 4, with two shifts available: 8 a.m.-noon or 12:30-4:30 p.m. Volunteers should be prepared for physical labor. Those interested in volunteering can call the Dubuque Museum of Art at **563-557-1851** or email **info@dbqart.org**.

On Sunday, Feb. 9 at noon-4 p.m., head to Washington Park and inside the Dubuque Museum of Art for free, family-friendly activities. The community



celebration includes hands-on snow sculpting, food and beverage vendors, and the opportunity for attendees to vote for their favorite sculptures. A community snow sculpting area will be available for anyone to try their hand at snow carving, with preformed blocks of snow and tools provided.

The Winter Arts Snow Sculpting Festival is an annual celebration of community creativity, and it coincides with more than the Super Bowl this year. This year's festival theme, "Creative Community," is inspired by the Dubuque Museum of Art's landmark exhibition, *Dubuque by Design: Celebrating 150 Creative Years.* The festival also serves as the exhibition's closing event. Jon Turbett, JD, a special agent with the Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation, will deliver the Spring 2025 Michael Lester Wendt Character Lecture on Monday, Feb. 3 at 7 p.m. at University of Dubuque Heritage Center. The lecture, titled "Character Without Compartments," is free and open to the public. No tickets are required.

Turbett has spent his entire law enforcement career as a special agent with the Potato Kielbasa from Clarke University, will be back again this year. In addition to soups, there will be freshly baked bread and an assortment of cookies provided by Convivium. Hear from Kathy Hutton of RiverBend Food Bank and Leslie Shalabi (Convivium Co-Founder) about poverty and food access issues within our Dubuque community and learn what you can do to help. This means that at least once during the year, they were unsure where or how they were going to be able to secure food for themselves or their families.

Convivium was founded on the idea that a lot of our world's problems stem from a lack of connection —to ourselves, our community and to the environment. Convivium fosters this connection through their mission: to "improve life through food." They accomplish this through classes, demonstrations, and experiences, like Souper Bowl Sunday.

Proceeds for the event will go to St. Stephen's Foodbank (a branch of River Bend Foodbank) and Convivium Urban Farmstead. Tickets are \$40 and can be purchased by calling Convivium Urban Farmstead at **563-557-2900** or visiting **Convivium-DBQ.com**.

# The Power of Place

# Heritage Works & Duane Hagerty's Legacy

"If you don't know where you are, you don't know who you are." —Wendell Berry, American writer and farmer



#### As lowa's oldest city,

Dubuque is known for its authentic sense of place—enabling residents and visitors to deeply feel and resonate with the feel and brand of the community.

This is thanks in part to the city's distinct and original historic intact architecture set along the bluffs of the driftless Mississippi River; but it's also because a dynamic coalition of community members have been working to uplift Dubuque as a leader of revitalization and economic development for many decades. According to a study conducted by the National Trust, authentic sense of place is highly attractive to people under the age of 35 when they are considering where to live. And strong community identity is a major factor in retaining population.

Dubuque-based nonprofit Heritage Works is on a mission to strengthen and build upon this unique community identity. Organization leaders are transforming the general idea of historic preservation from stuffy/formal to extraordinary/full of potential—coining the term "historic activation" to denote the catalyzing economic impact and cultural vibrancy of preservation. And even further, the organization is creating pathways to more deeply connect the community to *who we are* by celebrating and activating *where we are*. This year, Heritage Works is celebrating its 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Founded by the Butler and Gronen families—the organization was inspired by a love for Dubuque and a desire to create a hub and resource that could take on smaller projects and advance a culture of energy and support around preservation. This team tapped staff and volunteers including former organization President and CEO Duane Hagerty to research the formation of a nonprofit—and Heritage Works was ultimately founded in 2015. "The rest is history," said Mary Gronen.

In the past decade, Heritage Works has made tremendous strides toward historic activation not only in Dubuque but in the region and across Iowa.

"Heritage Works' mission and work have resulted in an enormous economic infusion in the region while enhancing Dubuque's unique sense of place as a marketable community differentiator," said Dave Klavitter, a founding member of the Heritage Works board of directors. "Talk about impact. Heritage Works had base hits all the time. And when you look back over 10 years—wow—look at this impact. There are so many projects that would not have happened if it were not for Heritage Works and Duane's leadership."

As Heritage Works looks ahead to the next 10 years, it's impossible not to

look back on the journey that propelled the community, region, and state with the intentional leadership of former organization President and CEO, Duane Hagerty. Just before the new year, Duane passed away at the age of 58 at his family's farm in Bankston, IA—where his first connection to a sense of place was born. Duane's death is a crushing loss for his loved ones, Heritage Works, Dubuque, and the preservation community across the state and country.

Duane's path to Heritage Works and his cultivation of a thriving life in Dubuque is a compelling story about finding a sense of place and purpose through historic activation—and illustrates how an organization like Heritage Works deeply enriches the community and helps connect people to place.

In a piece Duane wrote for a presentation titled "Finding A Way Home: How Connection to Place Grounds Us," he touched upon growing up in rural Dubuque County: "As is typical for most young farm children, I couldn't get away fast enough to go to college and escape that life. I graduated high school in 1984 and wanted nothing to do with farming or Dubuque, which at the time was experiencing its worst economic recession outside of the great depression." But over the years, Duane's perspective evolved—he enrolled in the Historic Preservation Masters Program at the Art Institute of Chicago which led him to research St. Mary's church—what would become the Steeple Square project and campus in the heart of the Washington Neighborhood. "It made me realize that I could help people harness their attachments to their own places," he wrote.

"Over time, my image of my childhood home transitioned from one of toil and hard work to one more akin to a Grant Wood painting. How could I have ever wanted to leave it?"

Research on Steeple Square and the launch of Heritage Works brought Duane back to his home county where he said he was proud to "help people redevelop historic buildings. We help keep Dubuque's built environment speaking for future generations."

Over the last decade, Heritage Works has provided support on historic activation projects that have catalyzed over \$150 million into the greater Dubuque region. From projects including the Dupaco Voices building to SS Peter & Paul Church in Petersburg, Steeple Square and Eagle Point Park, to historic districts including Loras College and Bellevue Commercial... the impact made by Heritage Works is immense in further

carving out the distinct and authentic sense of place in the Dubuque community.

Heritage Works has a small staff but is known for punching above its weight. When the team is not busy leveraging hundreds of millions in investment into the region, mission-driven work is innovative and highly focused on partnerships and collaboration both in the Dubuque community and statewide. This includes:

- Education and outreach about the benefits of historic preservation and bolstering a unique and vibrant sense of place through symposiums, events, tours, and presentations
- Advocating and educating stakeholders about the critical resource of the State and Federal Historic Tax Credit and other economic development tools

- Providing free and accessible engagement opportunities to learn about architecture, culture, and history in partnership with arts and cultural organizations
- Partnering in vocational training opportunities to develop the next generation of trades craftspeople including reaching underserved community members

Jason Neises is a volunteer for Heritage Works, helping to lead the organization's ArchTrek tours—festive and fun social gatherings and tours that feature unique spaces and places in the region from the Central Ave. Corridor to Sinsinawa Mound. Jason moved to Dubuque from Chicago in 2011 with his family. "One of the reasons I've enjoyed being back in Dubuque is you can make such a big difference here ... your energy makes an outsized impact." Jason noted that Heritage Works helped connect him to community engagement and impact in a way that directly spoke to his connection to the sense of place in Dubuque. "... there's something here that's supposed to be celebrated. Clearly it's an important part of who we are. It's an important part of our culture."

In a presentation on the power of place, Duane wrote, "Places have been powerful for me for the way they speak and have the potential to unlock stories that develop across generations. The built environment speaks to us through the vocabulary of architecture as art." One key area in which Heritage Works has been growing its mission-driven programming is through unlocking stories to share with generations that have often been overlooked, or untold. In 2024, the organization partnered with Briana Thompson of BriX Creative Studio and Art for Us, the Dubuque Area Arts Collective, and the City of Dubuque Black Heritage Survey team to uplift and share untold stories and histories of underrepresented people. This project culminated in the Black History Month spoken word showcase titled "My Ancestor's Wildest Dreams."

Briana Thompson said, "I have the utmost respect for Duane and Heritage Works and what it stands for. I've been in Dubuque for 10 years, and this was the first time working with the CEO of an



organization that I felt I could trust with my vulnerability to share the trials and tribulations of what I go through as a woman of color serving in the arts and culture industry. This project opened up the doors to execute something that was not just for myself, but for the community and provided equitable opportunities. That created so much confidence in me."

Bill Doyle, Heritage Works Preservation and Program Director, expressed what an honor it was to work with Duane over the past decade, and he is intent to carry on his legacy. Bill moved from Denver, CO to take on a leadership role at Heritage Works. "Dubuque in many ways ... has always felt like the land of opportunity," he said.

Reflecting on what the organization has accomplished in the last 10 years, Bill said, "In some ways, working on paperwork to restore old buildings feels ridiculous. It seems much less straightforward than strapping on a tool belt and getting to work, but when I look at the investment dollars we have brought to town, I can't help but be proud of the work we have done." He added that seeing the rehabilitations completed makes the work worth it. "Dubuque has this amazing treasury of beautiful historic buildings that are just waiting to have some life brought back into them."

As the organization plans to continue to expand mission driven programming, specifically continuing to lead the state of lowa in education and advocacy, Bill and the Heritage Works board of directors see Dubuque as the statewide hub for historic activation and the resource center for preservation education and advocacy. More planning work on this is in process in 2025. Heritage Works is preparing for a Prairie School Legacy symposium in Dubuque in June—a two-day event highlighting the work of architects Alfred Caldwell and Frank Lloyd Wright and their impact on Midwestern architecture, with more details to be announced in the coming weeks. This event, supported by a grant from the Iowa Arts Council, is a taste of what programming is possible for the future.

As Heritage Works staff, board, partners, and volunteers mourn the loss of Duane's leadership—the team is grateful for the strong organizational foundation that has been laid over the last 10 years by a dedicated coalition. This legacy has ignited a new generation of historic activation advocates, and the organization will continue to grow, thrive, and make a positive impact on the community, region, and state for years to come.

Heritage Works leaders believe that the work of historic activation is critical to economic development, to cultural heritage, and to uplifting the human spirit. Duane captured this through his reflection on his home and heritage in Dubuque County—where his contributions to this corner of Northeast lowa will live on and be cherished by all those who knew and loved him.

"Place is powerful, not only in our community, but throughout the country. A strong sense of place gives a community a unique identity .. it connects us to a collective past. But most importantly, it provides all of us all with a grounding. It allows us to keep memories alive and to remain connected with loved ones both living and no longer with us.

I realized that my connections to place had made me who I am today. That place had given me the tools to succeed in life. Additionally, it was the repository of memories that I will hold on and cherish as long as the synapses in my brain allow me to recall them." —Duane Hagerty, 1966–2024, former President and CEO of Heritage Works

# Exotic Snack Guys

"I've seen things you people wouldn't believe. Attack ships on fire off the shoulder of Orion..." —Rutger Hauer as "Roy Batty," *Bladerunner*, 1982

"So damn what, skinjob! I've tasted a Kesar-Pista-flavored Snickers bar. And until you do THAT, you ain't seen... oh, NOW you die?!" —Fanny Dairchild as "Danny Fairchild," *365ink*, whatever issue this is

So... like most people of my age, I have a complicated relationship with the film *Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory.* It's mostly positive which, I know, could go either way depending on the person. But let's not get into all that and just look at the positive, fun, fantastical aspects

of the film. Exotic Snack Guys (Dot Com) takes an ordinary retail space in Dubuque's own Kennedy Mall and, without the use of (real) magic, somehow captures a "world of pure imagination" with bright, friendly lighting; full-but-not-overly-busy displays, cute candy-pink shopping bags; and all the snacks from around the world you've been missing or been missing out on. It's just a delight to pop in there and see all the different candies and chips and sodas and cookies and... and... and anyway.

I'm a man with a powerful sweet tooth. Too powerful. Like... my sweet tooth is like a really crappy superpower. I crave sweets more than any living being. My archnemesis is pre-diabetes. So, I had some things picked out and on the sales counter before I could even ask for a recommendation. I got a lot of stuff, and all of it deserves to be commented on. So let's get started.

Let's start with the product that was recommended to me. Kebab-flavored Tiger brand potato chips. This savory little delight hails from Egypt and is one of Exotic Snack Guys' best sellers. I believe it. I snagged the last bag on the shelf. As far as texture of this chip: Start with a Ruffle or similar. The potato chips with ridges. Now, make the ridges a little tighter. Like... if the ridges were a wavelength, Tiger would be a higher wavelength. Make sense? It makes it a little more brittle, but still dippable. And you're going to want to dip these, friends. Any chip dip will do. Because these chips manage to pull off the seared meat flavor of a kebab, if not a friggin' beef steak. It's amazing. It's (the flavor of) a meat-and-potatoes meal all in one chip. How friggin' Wonkaesque is that? Now imagine dipping that in French onion dip, or ranch dip, or whatever dip. The internet purports this to be a spicy-flavored chip. I didn't get much of that, so don't be afraid.

A lot of the things I bought on my way to spending way too much money on snacks were things I'd only ever heard about. Like Milkybar. This bar of white chocolate has been around since the 1930s but is only sold as an import here in the U.S., even though it's sold worldwide. And I get it. We look at white chocolate and see almond bark. The snobbiest of us look at white chocolate and say something to the effect of "Well actually, white chocolate isn't really chocolate." And to paraphrase The Dude, you're not wrong, you're just an expletive deleted. I won't yuck your yum if you like white chocolate, but with white chocolate, I generally just feel cheated. I bought the Milkybar because I thought Annie would like it. She likes

white chocolate in her espresso drinks ,so I thought that meant she liked white chocolate. I was adorably wrong about that. That said, I've tried plenty of white chocolate. It gets around in the form of gifts. As far as bars comprised of nothing but white chocolate go, this is probably the best example. It's good. Almond bark, schmalmond bark. Not my thing, but if you like white chocolate, I can't imagine you not liking this.

Kit Kat bars are just as bad, if not worse than Oreo cookies in terms of the number of largely unnecessary different flavors. By the way, Exotic Snack Guys has some of the weirder Oreos, too, though I didn't get around to them. Most of the weird Kit Kats are only available as imports in the U.S. so thank goodness for Exotic Snack Guys. I almost flippantly picked up a Kit Kat Chunky Drumstick. "Drumstick" as in a Drumstick brand ice cream cone. It was just a, "Meh... I need to try at least one unorthodox Kit Kat, this seems fine." I didn't understand the obvious implications of such a confection. Don't see it? Well let me enlighten you by asking you this question: What is the best part of a Drumstick? Oh ho! Now you get it, don't you? The best part of a Drumstick is the very end tip of the cone where the inner chocolate coating has collected along with





whatever ice cream has melted. So... with the wafer/waffle texture of a Kit Kat... with the chocolate coating of a Kit Kat and/ or Drumstick... plus the further Drumstick influence... this Kit Kat is the very best last bite of a Drumstick in full candy bar form. HOW is this just a Canada thing?!

Speaking of Canada, it turned out that many of the things I got came from our friends (for now) to the north. I'm sure you've heard of Coffee Crisp. While not generally available in the U.S., Coffee Crisps are HUGE in Canada. Like... "Official NHL Sponsor" huge. And Kit Kats are actually a pretty good segue into Coffee Crisps because again, you're getting a classic chocolate-covered wafer bar. But as the name suggests, you're getting a nice lovely coffee flavor. And you get it in the form as a delightfully foamy soft layers amongst the wafers. If you like Kit Kats even a little bit, you'll love Coffee Crisps.

Still touring Canada's snack food landscape (to the point where I feel foolish for not getting my hands on some all-dressed chips), let's talk Tim Tam. How to describe Tim Tam cookies? Hmm. Take a Double-Stuffed Oreo or similar. Make it rectangular. Make the cookie layers thicker. Now make the cream layer fluffier. Now dip that mofo in chocolate. Feel me? Because it's chocolate covered, it doesn't have the milkability of an Oreo, but it tries. And BECAUSE it's chocolate flavored AND the cookie isn't as dense as an Oreo, folks have been known to sip coffee, hot toddies or hot chocolate through a Tim Tam. I just found that out, and now all the Tim Tams are gone, and I'm pissed. Oh, well. Guess I have to go back to Exotic Snack Guys. I got regular (milk chocolate) Tim Tam cookies, but I also got the dark mint variety and... ooooooh, my friends. Here in the U.S. we, of course, have Thin Mints and similar. Dark Mint Tim Tam cookies are like Thin Mints... but thick. Thicc Mints. Again with the two thick but not-so-dense cookie layers. Again with the light cream filling. But that strong dark mint flavor we indulge heavily in during fundraising season.

One thing I picked up out of pure whimsy is the Twix Secret Centre Biscuits. Now... this is a product of the U.K., so let's just go ahead and translate "biscuit" into "cookie." If you look on the package of a Twix candy bar you can purchase at literally any store in the United States, you'll see them described as "cookie bars." So Twix Secret Centre Biscuits are Twix cookie bars... that are in cookie, not bar form. These are Twix bars still in the larva stage. I don't know if a middleman is being cut out or added in the production of this treat, but it was funny enough for me to buy.

Oh, crap. I teased you with the Kesar Pista Snickers bar and almost left you hanging. Now... I had no idea what kesar pista is before purchasing this candy bar. I just saw a Snickers that had pistachios in it and figured it HAD to be good. Oh ho! Got your attention now, don't I? This Snickers bar is imported from India. Kesar pista, if you're as ignorant as me, is a combination of saffron and pistachio that is a common flavor in desserts including, but not limited to, Snickers bars. You may recognize saffron and pistachio as two expensive ingredients. Screw giving me my weight in gold. Give me my weight in saffron ANY day. As such, you're not getting REAL saffron, and the pistachios are cut with almonds, but nonetheless, it's gotten me excited about the kesar-pistabilities. Flavorwise? Umm... kiiiiinda like eggnog. Sorta. If you don't like eggnog, you still might like this.

My legendary sweet tooth is excited about all the possibilities of Exotic Snack Guys. It's like getting a subscription snacks-of-the-world bundle that you get to pick and not have to wait for. That said, Exotic Snack Guys (Dot Com) has subscription services. Have a blast!

# The Message

#### By John McAndrew

"The American sense of reality is dictated by what Americans are trying to avoid," James Baldwin said in a long-mothballed interview.

Every Ta-Nehisi (TAH-ne-HA-see) Coates book is a major cultural and literary event. He even made a splash by writing a long series of *Black Panther* comic books – and is working on a script for a new *Superman* film for DC. His newest book, *The Message*, has been in the news for his take on the Israel-Palestine-Gaza conflagration. He has won the National Book Award for Nonfiction, been nominated for a Pulitzer, and no less than Toni Morrison compared him to James Baldwin. Let's not do him the disservice of treating a *great* book on education, writing, national myth-making, and more, as a mere headline-grabber.

In an interview with Trevor Noah (available on YouTube), Coates says, "My purpose is to make room in the frame for people who have been pushed out of it." His task, in writing this book addressed to his students at Howard University, is to do the opposite of what book bans do: He wants everyone to be heard, especially those who have been routinely silenced. And he wants his students to know how important it is to dig deeper into ALL the stories, the familiar ones as well as the suppressed ones. He strives to subvert the culture of the "hot take" that is ubiquitous in our media and social media. Hot takes usually confirm what we already think we know. Hot takes reinforce myths, are created and consumed by those who are too impatient to wait for confirmation, much less reflection.

Coates talks, in *The Message*, about his early love of books and stories; about teachers fighting book bans in North Carolina; about his trip to West Africa, to Senegal, where slave ships departed for the Americas, according to legends; and his trip to Palestine, and to Yad Vashem. In telling these particular, current, controversial stories, his goal is evidently to show his students how hard it is to get beneath the surface; how the secret is in finding out what people don't want you to know; and what the finished product of such integrity looks like.

What prophet was ever charged with making their listeners feel good? Teachers, writers, journalists, and parents should help us recognize and deal with reality. All of it. And maybe, with a lot of work, time, and help, improve it.

"It is never enough," Coates says to students and writers, "for the reader of your words to be convinced. The goal is to *haunt...*" And he says, "The danger we represent, as writers, is not that we will simply convince their children of a different dogma but that we will convince them that they have the power to form their own."

Every book lover will recognize the power Coates describes. "But the fact is that, even as I know and teach the power of writing, I still find myself in disbelief when I see that power at work in the real world. Maybe it is the nature of books. Film, music, the theater—all can be experienced amidst the whooping, clapping, and cheering of the crowd. But books work when no one else is looking, mind-melding author and audience, forging an imagined world that only the reader can see."


In the tradition of Orwell and Baldwin, we are lucky to have such a writer of principled, eloquent prose in our time.

# Default Settings

Default settings aren't just for your smartphone or that office coffee machine that somehow always breaks right before your turn. Nope, they're built into you too-your attitude has a default setting.

Picture this: You're running late for work. You spill coffee on your shirt while rushing out the door, but you decide to roll with it. You jump in the car, turn the key, and... click. Dead battery. Plan Bgrab the old car in the driveway. But of course, it's running on fumes. Your spouse throws you the, "Didn't I tell you to get gas?" glare, and then, as you frantically scramble, you realize you grabbed two different shoes on the way out. One's a dress shoe. The other? A sneaker.

So, what's your first reaction? Do you chuckle, shrug, and think, "Well, at least it's Casual Friday somewhere!" Or do you rage, slam the door, and declare the day ruined before it's even started?

That knee-jerk reaction? That's your default attitude—your go-to way of responding when life decides to mess with your plans.

#### **Positive vs. Negative Defaults**


Here's the big question: Is your default attitude positive or negative?

- A positive default might look like this: Thoughts: "Okay, not ideal, but I'll figure it out."
- Feelings: Confidence, resourcefulness, maybe even a bit of humor.
- Action: You problem-solve calmly, laugh at the mismatched shoes, and keep moving.

A negative default, on the other hand, might look like this:

- Thoughts: "Why does this always happen to me?"
- Feelings: Frustration, self-pity, maybe even full-blown panic.
- Action: You snap at your spouse, stress out the kids, and show up to work with a dark cloud over your head.

If you think this doesn't matter much, think again. Studies show that a person with a negative outlook is up to 40% less productive than someone who

Still not sure where your default attitude lands? Let's try this: Imagine your phone rings at 7:58 a.m., just as you're walking into work. You glance at the screen-it's your boss. Be honest: What's your gut reaction?

- "Oh no, what did I do now?"
- "This can't be good."
- "Great, let's add some drama to my already chaotic morning."

#### Or...

- "Huh, maybe they're calling with good news!"
- "I wonder what exciting opportunity is coming my way."
- "Hey, it's the boss—let's see what they need."

Your first thoughts and feelings in moments like this reveal a lot about your default attitude. Try the same exercise with different people: a coworker, a family member, or even that neighbor who borrows your lawnmower.

#### Attitude Tune-Up Time

If your default attitude leans negative, don't sweat it. You're not stuck that way! Think of your attitude like a thermostat-when things feel too cold (or heated), you can adjust.

Here's how to tweak your settings: 1. Pause and Reframe: When life throws you a curveball, hit pause. Ask yourself, "What's one positive thing about

- 25% happier. Stuck in traffic? Be grateful you're not the guy with the flat tire on the side of the road. Late for work? Hey, at least you have a job to rush to!
- 3. Find the Humor: Sometimes, the best way to shift your attitude is to laugh. Mismatched shoes? Own it. Tell your coworkers it's a new trend and see how long it takes for someone to believe you.

#### Let's Reset





#### 808.8 LIS Lists of Note: An **Eclectic Collection Deserving** of a Wider Audience, compiled by Shaun Usher

This book is a treasure! Usher uncovered 125 to-dos. inventories. resolutions. bestofs, pros and cons, and more lists from people you may have heard of. Johnny Cash vows to "1. Not Smoke, 2. Kiss June, 3. Not kiss anyone else." In 1788, George Washington inventoried-tragically-his 300-plus slaves. Woody Guthrie's 1941 resolutions included "Wash teeth if any," "Keep Hoping Machine running," and "Help win war-Beat fascism." Marilyn Monroe was determined to take acting lessons, noting wistfully, "Try to enjoy myself when I can—I'll be miserable enough as it is." See what Chrissie Hynde, Nick Cave, Norman Mailer, and Francis Ford Coppola scribbled down. Do not miss the 1940 list of Wartime Golf Rules in Surrey, England, during the Battle of Britain, which advises, "Players whose stroke is affected by the simultaneous explosion

of a bomb may play another ball from the same place. Penalty one stroke."



#### 811.54 RUE A Little White Shadow, by Mary Ruefle

As a poet, I'm fond of 811.54, where American poetry books live, whether famous-Robert Frost, Emily Dickinsonor simply brilliant. Mary Ruefle won the Iowa Poetry Prize, among others, and the Poetry Foundation calls her work "at once funny and dark, domestic and wild." She's not afraid of a challenge. In this tiny book-labeled by one reviewer "so small and sweet you could dunk it in coffee"-she practices "erasure" poetry. Don't be daunted-it's fun! What you do is take a book, or just a page or two of text, like the last wordy memo your boss circulated, and do away with most of the words, covering them with Wite-Out or a black Sharpie. The parts you choose to keep will tell their own story, like these three separate phrases on one page of the original 1889 text: "It was my duty to keep / the piano / filled with roses." After reading this book, I'm going to cross out most of the latest Op Ed in the local paper, and see what poetry can be revealed.






