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What's my role?

What do I say, what do I not say? I'm sure so many people would say that I've not held back in the past on political and social issues, but I assure you—I have. Less so on social issues. If you can't figure out on your own that all human beings are all equally worthy of life and happiness, then I don't really worry at all about making you angry. But I do bite my tongue way more than you might think on politics.

First of all, I know that a lot of what I might say here is happening in an echo chamber. I'm preaching to the choir with most of what I'd say anyway. But I have lashed out a couple of times, not recently, and I regret doing that. Mainly because when you have truth, justice, and the American way on your side, you should just be able to let the facts do the fighting for you. But some people don't like facts, and that can tend to get in your craw after a while.

I've also been threatened a couple of times. Not physically, but kind of that, "I'm going to call all of your advertisers and get you canceled for saying that", kind of thing. But then I go back and read what made those triggered individuals angry, and I think, "Go ahead. I

can back up what I wrote or defend my position." Especially when the other side of the argument is so often, well, just sad and embarrassing. And should they have to explain what they mean when they say that, it's not going to end well.

And then there is the fact that, well, to be blunt, this is my publication. I try to appeal to everyone with the events and culture we cover, but at the end of the day, I'm not going to publish things that I think will be harmful or discriminatory. But on the flip side, I decided I also didn't want to print things that were just spiteful or cheap shots, even if they were arguments with which I agree. As much as I want to show them Greener's Law in action, temperance seems the virtuous path.

I have had requests to run some ads recently that were decidedly politically motivated, and I anguished over them. In the end, I decided that if they simply made a point or defended an ideology that I find worthy, then I'm okay with it. But if the message is just a cheap shot at Trump or a mean-spirited argument, I won't run it but will ask if they'd like to rework the goal of the ad to make it a positive statement instead of a lash-out, as much as I do want to lash out at times. It's also not my job to offer up my paper's reputation for other people to launch their missiles.

I do realize that it's not people just like me who are reading my pages, and if I'm

going to sway any mindsets, the only way to do that is by presenting valid, logical arguments and not with insults. Yes, at this point I also know I'm not changing mindsets. Only a 401k going in the tank or ICE coming for your own family can do that now. So I hope I don't have such things in 365ink. I don't mean to. If someone thinks a quote from a famous and revered historical thinker about the role of a leader in a society is an attack, then I guess that's on them to break down and solve. If I say someone is doing something wrong, I'll try to say why I feel that is. Maybe it's passive-aggressive or something, but it's not just an angry job.


For example, if I quote Marquis de Condorcet who said, "A free press and free education are the guardians of liberty," I would hope everyone reading that would be like, "Well, duh!" But if you read that and feel attacked, then I think some soul-searching is in your future. Does that make sense?

I gave Kristina, who lays out the paper, a few "filler" ads to pop into those little gaps that come up in the paper here and there during the layout process. No angry attack ads but some bedrock statements of kindness, logical thought, and democracy that I hope we can all look at and say, "Duh!"

Meanwhile, like you, I'm rolling with the punches as they come. I do know that the costs for me to give you all free copies

of this paper are going up immediately because of tariffs against Canada. My paper is printed in Janesville, WI, but the paper it is printed on comes from Canada. So if that paper costs 25% more for my printer to buy and they pass that cost on to me (because that IS how tariffs work, they are a tax paid by us, the American consumer of those tariffed goods), then the overall bill from the printer is going up about 8%. I don't like that idea at all. What do I do now? Charge every great advertiser we have 3% more for their ad? Do I just eat the cost increase? Hey, does anyone out there want to start running a quarter-page ad in 365ink for a while? That would make up for my losses!

Mostly. I just hope you are all doing okay and somehow we come out on the other end of this thing without too much damage. I don't know if we can ever heal the damage that has been done to relations with our absolute best friends in the world such as Canada and Western Europe. And with literally no one in the entire world outside of 1600 Pennsylvania Ave. seeing a beneficial exit strategy to our current predicament, I just have to hold on tight and hope for a miracle. Mitch McConnell came out against it already. That's almost a miracle. But it's going to take a lot more people to decide that there is more than one man who makes the gears of our nation work and retake control of the ship.

Keynote speaker Kevin Mulcahy is a former federal prosecutor and survivor of childhood sexual abuse. Hear his story on Thursday, April 10 at 5 p.m. at the Grand River Center.

Kevin Mulcahy has had a distinguished career as a federal prosecutor handling a broad range of criminal cases including

those involving firearms, drugs, terrorism, and bank robberies. However, his primary focus was on prosecuting cases related to child exploitation, including the production of child pornography, trafficking, and other significant crimes against children.

New this year, in addition to his keynote address at the gala, Mulcahy will offer specialized training the day after for law enforcement professionals, sexual assault nurse examiners, sexual and domestic assault advocates, mental health professionals, military victim advocates, child protection center staff and others who work across Riverview Center's 16-county service area in lowa and Illinois. The training will provide vital resources and knowledge to those who work on the frontlines of supporting survivors of sexual and domestic violence. The training will be free for participants.

The Evening of Light Gala includes a formal dinner, a silent auction featuring exclusive items donated by local businesses, a raffle, and inspiring stories from and about survivors whose lives have been transformed through the organization's services. Hear Kevin discuss how we—individually and through the systems of which we are a part—can do better in preventing harm done to children.

Those are just a couple of ways community members can dream big for the Dubuque region at the Envision 2030 Night of Ideas. Everyone is invited to this fun, interactive brainstorming extravaganza, which will take place from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 17, in Q Casino + Resort's Reflection Room.

The Night of Ideas is an opportunity for neighbors to come together and generate ideas that could strengthen the Dubuque region. Attendees can play mock-casino games, use the app Kahoot, or take part in other activities designed to inspire ideas and push the brainstorming process forward. Children are welcome to attend, and they will be able to come up with ideas of their own at a drawing and coloring station.

All ideas from the event will be submitted to the Envision 2030 campaign, a community visioning



process that will help determine the next 10 great ideas for Dubuque.

Envision 2030, facilitated by the Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque and Dubuque Area Chamber of Commerce, builds on the success of Envision 2010, which led to projects like the Millwork District revitalization, Crescent Community Health Center and riverfront improvements.

The submission period runs through June. After the submission period closes, a selection committee will whittle down the ideas to a list of 100 semifinalists. This summer, the Foundation and the Chamber will host town hall gatherings where people can vote on their favorites out of the 100 and narrow the list even further to 30 ideas.

Over the subsequent months, the selection committee will review the finalists and vote on the 10 best ideas, which will be announced at an event in October and published in local media and a booklet.

"This is truly a people-driven process," Van Milligen says. "Listening to our neighbors about their needs, their hopes for the future, and their dreams for the community their children and grandchildren will inherit is the best way to ensure that the investments we all make in Dubuque today will make it stronger for tomorrow."

that made Broadway shine," said Dr. Hunter Fuerste, vice president of the Dubuque Arts Council Board of Directors.



Julien Dubuque International Film Festival

It's that time of year again—filmmakers, actors, and producers are packing their bags. Destination: Dubuque, IA. Hundreds of recently-made independent films are about to make their way onto local screens for the first time ever, and an army of volunteers alongside dozens of area businesses combine forces to put on the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival (JDIFF).

Director Susan Gorrell and her team of more than 100 volunteers have been hard at work putting together the 2025 event with great things in store for attendees. Since submissions opened in July of 2024, JDIFF received around 1,200 films for consideration from filmmakers around the world, a number which was eventually narrowed down to closer to 200 films to be shown.

Like every year for the past 14 years, the festival curates a wide variety of independent films from around the world, giving every type of audience member something they can look forward to watching on the big screen. Movie selections, of course, are dependent upon the submissions sent in by filmmakers each year, but Gorrell does her best to ensure a well-rounded selection of the best submissions from each genre are viewed and scored by volunteers. This ultimately results in a schedule of films that offers Dubuquers not only the best indie films to see locally but also provides options that appeal to a range of tastes.

Of these selections are films that will be making their world, national, or state premieres. World premiere films are those that are showing for the first time



anywhere in the world, while national premieres are showing for the first time in the United States, and Iowa premieres are showing for the first time in our state.

Potential moviegoers can expect to find options in classic genres such as comedy, fantasy, horror/thriller, drama, documentary, family, and animation, to name a few. The JDIFF website also breaks the movies down into special interest categories such as 16mm, environment, LGBTQ+, satire, student, and young filmmaker. Because the festival accepts films of various lengths, showings are also subcategorized as feature-length films or short films.

This year, lovers of laughter have several movies to choose from in the comedy and dark comedy categories. The feature-length film 5683 is one of these comedy films audiences can see during the festival. The movie, directed by Brittany Benedict, was filmed right here in Iowa and centers around the main character Vanessa and her friends who hold an intervention in hopes that she will start dating more seriously. After texting a number on a billboard that promises her the name of her true love. Vanessa and her friends go on a journey to find the man who promised to be her dream guy. 5683 will be shown at the Grand Opera House on April 26 at 6:45 p.m.

Some other comedy options include the short films *A Woman is Many Things (Just Fine Isn't One of Them)*, about a divorced woman attending her ex-husband's engagement party; *Burned*, a story within a story about the burnings of women accused of witchcraft; and *Sick Day*, about how one employee's plan to leave work early is foiled by an invasion of locusts.

When speaking with Gorrell about this year's films, she was particularly enthused about this year's strong selection of sci-fi films, which is more prominent than in years past. One of these films, *Motherland*, will be bringing some familiar faces to

Dubuque screens; the movie cast includes Nestor Carbonell, best known for his roles in *The Dark Knight* films, *Lost*, and *Bates* Motel, Holland Taylor, known for her roles in Legally Blonde and Two and a Half Men, and Miriam Silverman, who you may have seen in The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel. The film is set in a world where parents no longer raise their own children and tells the story of the person responsible for starting a rebellion. Motherland will be making its Iowa premiere at JDIFF, and audiences will have two opportunities to see the feature-length film at the National Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium's Journey Theater at 4 p.m. on April 23 and at Phoenix Theatres on April 26 at 1:45 p.m.

A few other sci-fi showings include the short films *Jump Cut*, about an actor whose life takes a disturbing turn after accepting a role in a mysterious film; *Anwar*, about a mother who has chosen to live forever and her son who wants to die someday; and *Kind Mother*, about the strange occurrences between a mother and daughter at a silent retreat.

This year's selection of horror/thrillers includes a selection of feature and short films that are sure to appeal to fans of the genre. *Holiday Seasoning* is one of this year's Young Filmmaker films and therefore included in Short Block 21. The film, directed by Lindsey Erin, centers around four students trapped in detention who are willing to survive by any means necessary. Short Block 21 will be shown in Galena, IL at the DeSoto House Hotel Parker Room on April 21 and in Dubuque in the Five Flags Center Bijou Room on April 26.

Some of the other horror/thriller short films being presented by JDIFF this year are *Neither Donkey Nor Horse*, about a young doctor during the 1910 Manchurian Plague and his quest to help; *Nebuchadnezzar*, about a stage manager who begins to think something is terribly off about the talk show she works on; and *Brett Was a*



 F^*ck , about the not-so-straightforward investigation into the murder of Brett at a college secret society alum reunion.

Always a popular genre at the festival, this year's documentary category includes approximately three dozen films to choose from, on topics ranging from street dancing to circus elephants to wild buffalo and environmental efforts. In one film, *Tinker*, University of lowa graduate Braden Dexter, who currently lives in Des Moines, shares a variety of objects he has created. This short film, directed by Ryan Adams, is a part of the Made in lowa block, also known as Short Block 19. There are multiple opportunities to see this short including at the Galena Center for the Arts, Five Flags Bijou Room, and Grand Opera House.

For anyone hoping to bring their kids to a showing, there are a handful of films in the family category to choose from including both feature films and shorts. *Piggy Duster* is a feature film directed by Jesse Stewart about a family camping in a Rocky Mountain Valley, looking to recapture memories of the past while also facing truths of the future. Amidst the family drama, the family finds themselves in the company of a grizzly bear.

These films, along with the many others not mentioned, will be shown at one or more of the locations in Dubuque and Galena that have agreed to host films for the festival. This year, Galena showings, which have expanded since previous years, will be held both at the DeSoto House Hotel Parker Room as well as the Galena Center for the Arts. Dubuque locations include those who have hosted showings in recent years: Phoenix Theatres, Five Flags Center, Grand Opera House, Hotel Julien Dubuque, and Journey Theater at the Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium. The specific location for each screening can be viewed at JulienFilmFest.com.

Users can search for showings by dates, locations, and the earlier mentioned

movie genres and categories, making it the easiest way to purchase tickets with showtime and location information right there. Tickets can be purchased online and in person at the Hotel Julien Dubuque box office; it should be noted that anyone wishing to receive a student discount—a \$6 savings for general screenings—will need to purchase their tickets at the box office with a valid student ID as student discounts cannot be received with online ticket purchases.

Carnegie-Stout Public Library cardholders can also receive a free voucher for a ticket to one of the showings by presenting their card to library staff and requesting a voucher. These vouchers are in limited supply, so time is of the essence for anyone wishing to take advantage of this offer. Once again, Runde Auto Group is generously hosting Runde Free Day at the festival, making all general screenings on Thursday, April 24 free! Similarly, GreenState Credit Union will be hosting Student Free Day on Friday, April 25 wherein students can pick up a wristband at the box office and eniov free general screenings all day.

But the Julien Dubuque International Film Festival is more than just films. The event also includes a variety of other gettogethers intended to encourage participants to meet new people and learn new skills and information. These include welcome gatherings, coffee talks, panels and workshops, after parties, special screenings, and last-chance gatherings. Coffee talks will be held every morning at 10 a.m. in the Hotel Julien Dubuque River Room on Tuesday, April 22 through Sunday, April 27.

Most of the panels and workshops will be held at the same location, and this year will include Balancing Business with Authenticity, The Heart of Networking, The Efforts and Risks of Documentary Filmmaking with Meital Cohen-Navarro, Film is Dead Long Live Film: The Importance

McNamer Foundation, will be held at Five Flags immediately following the awards ceremony. And lastly, the after party of the entire event: The Last Chance Gathering at The Lift on Sunday evening at 9 p.m.

The Moracco Supper Club

I suppose most people in Dubuque are familiar with The Moracco, one of the few remaining supper clubs in Iowa. But I wonder how many know the main dining room was once a couple of service bays for large trucks!

When the Moracco Truck Stop opened in 1945 in the Grandview Heights district of Dubuque, Rockdale Road was Old Route 151, a major truck route. It was a 24-hour diner and truck repair center. It was nearly destroyed by a devastating fire in the early 1950s but was rebuilt and continued operating as a truck stop until 1958.

The original owner was stationed in the Kingdom of Morocco in North Africa while in the US Army. When he returned, he decided to open a truck center and named it in remembrance of his time in that country. However, he apparently didn't remember how to spell Morocco!

In 1958, The Moracco was sold to Armin (Butch) and Genevive (Whitey) Herbst who operated it as a successful supper club. Butch passed away in 1966. One of his regular customers was Bert Hillary, who farmed about 5 miles south of Dubuque along Highway 52. He figured

he would help Butch's widow out, so he drove his tractor over to The Moracco and offered Whitey half the purchase price she was asking. To his surprise, she accepted, so Bert suddenly found himself in the restaurant business. He figured he could learn how to be a bartender, and his wife Hazel had some experience as a waitress at Leiser's Supper Club north of Dubuque. Besides, Hazel loved to cook, and he knew their five daughters could take care of the kitchen.

Jeanne was one of those daughters. When her parents purchased The Moracco in 1966, she was only 11 years old. She was just a kid but soon found she was cooking alongside her mother and sisters.

Jeanne and her husband Garry Heiar, who also grew up on a farm, became partners in The Moracco in 1976. They still use Hazel Hillary's legacy recipes with her handwritten notes on them.

And just as Jeanne grew up in the restaurant business, so have Garry and Jeanne's children. Tim is now business partner and general manager of The Moracco. His two brothers and sister still help out when they have the time. Greg is Assistant Men's Basketball Coach at Wichita State University. Nick is a Financial Advisor at Honkamp Krueger Financial Services. Hillary

is Epicor Eclipse Integration Trainer/ Consultant (whatever that is), at Crescent Electric Supply. Even Tim's wife, Anne, is involved in the restaurant.

Garry and Jeanne are obviously doing all the right things. They have now been operating one of the most successful restaurants in Dubuque for over 39 years. They continue all the traditions of the supper club by serving excellent American cuisine in a fine dining environment. The staff, including servers Christy, Meagan, Scott, and Terry who served me or my tasting crew, is friendly and knowledgeable; the menu offers a delightful variety of steaks and seafood; and the ambience including linen tablecloths is a bit classy. (Fun fact: Moracco has over 1,000 linen napkins dry cleaned every week).

Recently, a third dining room was added so now at least 160 people can be seated comfortably. Free Wifi is also available: the password is "1413 Rockdale Road".

The lowa Restaurant Association recognized Garry and Jeanne Heiar as their 2006 Restaurateurs of the Year. This award only goes to restaurant owners who exhibit originality, quality and exceptional service to their customers.

The Moracco was one of the 24 Supper Clubs featured in *The Supper Club Book* written by Dave Hoekstra and published in 2013 (**TheSupperClubBook.com**). If you would like one of these books, they are available for purchase at The Moracco.

For years, the relish tray on your table was one of the indicators you were in a supper club. Only a very few clubs still provide this because the kitchen staff must get rid of all the celery, carrots, radishes, cheese, and meat spreads left over from each table (86d in restaurant lingo). So while The Moracco can no longer offer the vegetables, they still serve you homemade ham salad, chicken salad, liver pâté, and their own homemade cheese spread. All of these are superb. The cheese spread is especially creamy. It is made with sour cream, cheddar cheese and a little cream cheese whipped for 45 minutes.

You will enjoy all these spreads on crackers from the unusually large assortment in the basket brought to your table. You will find saltines, bread sticks, Ritz, and wheat and Club crackers.

The Moracco is well known for Tuesday special chicken dinners. The chicken is hand coated with a proprietary flour breading and then fried in a high pressure Broaster. The chicken is moist, and the skin is delicious and not the least bit greasy. On Tuesday chicken dinner night, pickled chicken gizzards are also served. These are one of those foods

you either love or hate. But I can tell you, The Moracco's gizzards are quite tasty.

Gizzards, by the way, are muscular organs found in the digestive tracts of all birds and some other animals as well. Since birds don't have teeth they eat their food whole. Many birds also swallow small stones or sand that finds its way to their gizzards where the food they have eaten gets ground up.

A Moracco platter is an excellent way to sample a variety of the appetizers. You will notice there are a couple of unusual ones: the steak bites is an 8 oz. filet cut into cubes and fried; the fish bites are pieces of cod prepared to your liking: fried, broiled or grilled.

All beef is USDA Choice. It is hand cut and cooked on a flat top. The New York Strip, T-bone and ribeye steaks are all outstanding. I particularly enjoy the beef tenderloin. I recommend you always order this delicious piece of meat wrapped in bacon. The tenderloin is the tenderest cut of beef but since it doesn't contain much fat marbling it is not as flavorful as other steaks. So a good restaurant either wraps it in good quality bacon or serves it with a sauce.

Now, the prime rib Saturday night special is full of rich beefy flavor all by itself. It is seasoned for two days and then slow roasted for three and a half hours.

The roast beef is also splendid. It is usually offered for private party family-style dinners. However, so many regular customers insist on ordering it so you can get it as the Monday special. Inside round cuts of beef are slow roasted for three and a half hours then served with homemade gravy, mashed potatoes, vegetables, and salad.

Do you recall I mentioned Hazel Hillary's legacy recipes she first used in 1966 and Jeanne still cooks from today? Well here are a few of them:

- Homemade Onion Rings—hand dipped in a special batter
- Beef Tips—tenderloin tips browned, then simmered for two hours in tomato sauce, beef base, sherry wine, garlic, sautéed celery and onions, mushrooms, butter, and brown sugar
- Salisbury Steak—super fresh 85/15 ground beef mixed with finely ground onions and garlic and hand shaped into a patty
- Swiss Steak—pounded and marinated round steak dredged in flour and browned, then cooked in a sauce of tomatoes, tomato sauce, peppers, onions, celery, bay leaves, margarine, thyme, garlic powder, and brown sugar

The list of Seafood Specialties is impressive. You can order the seafood dinner: a sampler of scallops, shrimp, lobster, and

cod. Or feast on lobster tail, crab legs, frog legs, scallops, Atlantic salmon, or catfish.

My favorite was the splendid shrimp: I have had them as a shrimp cocktail and in scampi, and this week, I will have them fried. I call these no muss, no fuss shrimp. The kitchen staff deveins and removes all the tails, so all I have to do is pop them in my mouth!

Speaking of seafood, Friday is always busy because of the cod fish special. OK, and Saturday is always busy because of the prime rib special. But I know many of the regulars visit on Friday and Saturday nights for one of my all-time favorites not available anywhere else. I am talking about the broasted lowa chop! It is a sumptuous, magnificent, thick center-cut pork chop coated with a special breading then deep fried under high pressure. In my opinion, you haven't had the best lowa chop until you have tasted The Moracco's!

After your excellent dinner, continue the supper club tradition by enjoying one of The Moracco's fabulous ice cream drinks. I recently sampled a Brandy Alexander (cognac and Crème de Cacao) and a Grasshopper (Crème de menthe and Crème de Cacao). Or perhaps you would prefer a Charlie Brown, Pink Squirrel or Golden Cadillac!





This American Ex-Wife

"We are afraid of dying alone, but no one really knows lonely better than a married woman sitting next to her silent husband."

Lyz Lenz may not be a household name yet, but her newest book, *This American Ex-Wife*, now out in paperback, should change that. It's also available in digital and audio formats, in case you need not to reveal to someone that you're reading a book on divorce.

Forty to fifty percent of first marriages in the US end in divorce. About two thirds of second marriages come to that end. Even so, the US divorce rate has dropped precipitously since 1990—perhaps because fewer people have been getting married, and they've been marrying later.

Given how common divorce is, you'd think it would be considered a commonplace by now, accepted as a fact of life, and made easy—especially since some marriages end because of violence or threats of violence, usually against a female partner.

Lenz makes a compelling, and compellingly readable, case for a wholesale reevaluation of the institutions of marriage and divorce. Our society and government make getting out of a marriage look like a hero's journey. Lenz has written two previous books (*God Land* and *Belabored*). Her gift for weaving stats and trends into the anecdotes from her own experience shows her mastery of narrative. She uses data, not to dazzle, but to show how common are problems in marriage. One suspects marriage may be a flawed model for intimacy and parenting.

"...the project of this book is to examine the failure of the institution of heterosexual marriage—the institution that pastors laud from the pulpit, and politicians declare will save our country and our children."

Her own marriage was marked by loneliness, her husband's unwillingness to

pull his weight in household chores, and his unexamined and misplaced self-confidence in fields that were not his area of expertise. To be diplomatic. Now, Lenz is a proud liberal. Her husband was



not. If you think she just needs to meet some nice liberal feminist man... well, she has. It didn't go well. Those are some of the most jaw-dropping tales in the book.

Lenz shows how marriage is portrayed in history, law, culture, literature, and religion. But this is not a sociology book. The cumulative effect is that a woman may finally see *why* it is that she feels trapped, deprived of better options, and why understanding and empathy are hard to find. This book will be a lifeline for women who feel caught in a maze.

Some friends and family, in her experience and research, rise to the challenge and support women trying to bring about a new, better, happier future for themselves. If you think of your marriage in terms of endurance, this book may be the alternate path you've been looking for—or avoiding because you know it won't be easy.

"Whatever brokenness waited for me, I suddenly wanted. Because this wholeness, this version of home, marriage, and family, would ruin me."

Marriage doesn't work for a ton of people. It's okay if that includes you. This is a book for the married, those who plan to marry, the divorced, and friends of married and divorced people. Lyz Lenz may be the guide to lead you through—and out of—the Inferno. She makes no promise that Paradise awaits. But there are stars in the darkness. Enough to navigate by.

Apples to Apples

We've all heard it before: "That's not an apples-to-apples comparison."

What it means is simple—the comparison isn't fair, valid, or helpful because the things being compared aren't truly similar. You're not lining up two equal things, and trying to pretend you are makes the whole conversation misleading.

Let's break it down.

An apples-to-apples comparison is what we want when we're trying to be fair. For example, comparing two high school math teachers with the same experience and workload? That's apples to apples. But comparing a cashier's hourly pay to a surgeon's salary? Not even close. Different education, training, hours, and stakes. That's why people say, "It's more like apples to oranges."

And that phrase—apples to oranges has become our fallback. It means things aren't exactly the same but at least they're in the same category. You're still comparing fruit. You're still comparing living things that grow on trees, have seeds, can be peeled, feed us, and contain natural sugars and nutrients.

But here's my point: I wish most of today's conversations were even that close.

Often, in daily conversations, we're not comparing apples to apples. We're not even close to apples to oranges. It's more like apples to moon rocks.

Let's look at some real-life examples:

1. Politics

Turn on any news channel or scroll through your feed. One person is talking about economic policy and the other is yelling about conspiracy theories. A Pew Research Center study found that 72% of Americans believe people in the other political party are "close-minded." That's not disagreement. That's a total disconnect.

We used to argue over *how* to fix a problem. Now we can't even agree on whether the problem is real.

2. Parenting

One parent has their kid in private school, with tutors, travel sports, and fresh meals daily. Another is a single parent working two jobs trying to keep the lights on and food in the fridge. They're both raising kids—but their realities? Incomparable. Not apples to apples. Not even apples to oranges.

3. Morals and Beliefs

For some people, right and wrong come from a higher power such as scripture.

For others, it comes from whatever's trending online or how they feel. So when people argue about morality, it's not just different views—it's completely different sources of truth. That's not just a gap in opinion. That's a canyon.

So What Now?

Let's not pretend we're all making applesto-apples comparisons. We're not.

Most of the time it's not apples to oranges, either—because even *that* would mean we're operating in the same world, with some shared assumptions.

Instead of always trying to win or prove you are right, maybe we should first stop and ask: What orchard are you coming from? What experiences shaped your view? What values drive your decisions?

We probably still won't agree. That's okay. But at least we'll know why we see things so differently.

When everything feels this divided—when every conversation turns into a debate and every headline leads to a fight—just remember: We need shared ground to have meaningful conversations.

Because if we could get back to apples to oranges, at least we'd both be holding fruit.

Right now, it feels like one of us is holding fruit...


...and the other is holding a flamethrower.

Let's start simpler. Listen first. Ask more questions.

Then maybe, just maybe, we can at least *get back to fruit*. ■

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Wait a Minute, Mr. Postman

I'm in shock. Denmark's state-run postal service, PostNord, will end all letter deliveries at the end of 2025, citing a 90% decline in letter volumes since the start of the century. Soon, their 1,500 cute red post boxes will disappear. Is the U.S. far behind?

Letters mean a lot to me. Witness my fourdrawer file cabinet stuffed with letters both to and from me, starting with my 1960s Camp Conestoga postcards full of news about games, campfires, and flag-raising ceremonies. I signed one, "From your mosquito-bitten daughter."

The bottom drawer holds printed-out emails, mainly from my dear husband, as well as published letters to the editor of the Dubuque Telegraph Herald, Des Moines Register, even The New York Times Book Review. Next up are missives dated 1985 to infinity, while drawer two houses those from 1960 to 1984. Most treasured are those in the top drawer—every letter to and from my mom right up until 2001, when Alzheimer's stole her beautiful language. She saved my letters, I saved hers.

I have letters from college roommates, work friends, and my BFF since junior high, including some that I wrote to them and they handed back. College profs, my sister, even some famous people—they're all there.

Sorting them was a Snow Day project, a full week when I felt forced into Getting Things Done mode. I knew how to do this. Back in graduate school, I worked at the State Historical Society of Iowa, sorting letters dating back to World War II and the Civil War. Those took forever to arrive but were a lifeline between soldiers and their loved ones. Reading my own letters is another kind of lifeline, like following a rope after a blizzard to find my way home.

Let's start with a folder marked "Boys." Here's one from Gary, the guy I dated in Iowa City. It's the largest letter I've ever received, two hand-delivered pages from an 11-by-9-inch drawing pad. Gary was a difficult boyfriend. He wrote, "My mother was a loony tune!" And then, to me, he declared, "You can be a very considerate, giving person. I haven't been letting myself see that." Gosh, Gary, thanks.

Long before Gary was John, my first high school crush. He sent a charming letter when I traveled with my family to a lake in Minnesota for two weeks of fun in the sun. He wrote, in his perfect printing, "God, I'm rather depressed without ya this week, so at least write," and signed off, "With love, John." His name was in cursive and he noted, "You told me to sign my name." John was sweet, kind, funny, and talented, and this letter reminds me I was an idiot to break up with him.

The boy I met in college spelled his name "Jon," and we lived together for about a year, adopting a dog he left to me. (Thanks, honey.) From him, I have a few lines on a torn-out notebook reading, "Pam, My True Love and the woman of whom I am fondest, I is studying in da libarry. I luf you alought." Then a P.S., "Called about the jobs, making donuts at Dunkin Donuts from either 12 a.m. – 4 a.m. or 4 a.m. – 8 a.m., is that worth doing for \$1.25 an hour??!!??" This letter reminds me how ridiculously low wages could be back then and how poor we were.

Another boyfriend, Bill, rates a folder of his own from our Dubuque-Austin romance, which, like most long-distance affairs, was doomed. His last letter began, "This is going to be the hardest letter for me to write." Ouch.

These letters may seem trivial, not worth saving, but I'm glad I did. I wish I knew what I wrote back to those guys. I do have letters I wrote to my other high school boyfriend, Chris, the one I ended up marrying and then having to divorce after things got violent. It didn't start out that way, of course. So it's good to have some proof of that.

I have a small collection of cards he wrote me. One has a pink clown on the front, and

inside, my husband's words: "With love from the clown you married and because I sometimes forget what you mean to me." He also wrote this, in a plain, tiny card: "Can't think of anything bright to say. Thanks for staying. Love, Chris." And finally, a goofy greeting card with this on the front: "There are two sides to a divorce," and inside, "Yours and the sh*thead's." Under that, he wrote, "Truer words were never spoken, right?" These reveal little about the man who wrote them, except to show how complicated love (and divorce) can be. For that, I am grateful to have these 40-year-old notes.

Letters can bring back the reality of people we once knew and have lost either to death or to a parting of the ways, often in bright, specific detail. Things that might have seemed mundane at the time—the cost of a 1972 movie ticket, the name of the ballfield you went to with your dad—can light up your spirit now.



The postman brought documentation of my life, an epistolary autobiography. Let's keep writing letters, and let's save them.





Ask about partner services to get your partner tested and treated. Avoid having sex until you and your sex partner both complete treatment.


