

"With summer theatre, if you're going to bring someone inside on a beautiful summer day -- and here in the Tri-States, we definitely have beautiful summer days -- you'd better have a good reason to do it," he says. "That's why we focus not necessarily on high art or the most deep-thinking shows you'll ever see, but we're telling great stories, and offering a bit of an escape for the audience. Really, that's a big part of what theatre is, the escapism."

Over the years, UW-Platteville has seen the success of the Heartland Festival grow "exponentially," in Hassig's words.

"In 2003, we drew around 3,000 people to the festival through the summer," he says. "In 2008, we drew 6,000. When you keep in mind that we can only fit just a few hundred people, at most, in our theaters ... well, that's a lot of people, and that continued success allows us to continue increasing the quality of our shows. For example, last year, we did a production of *I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change*, and that's a show whose national touring company we brought in a few years ago for a performance. Without a doubt, I would have put our production of it up against that professional tour."

This year, the Heartland Festival is continuing last year's mix of shows, including a children's show (*You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown*), a murder mystery (*And the Killer Is...*), a musical (*Forever Plaid*) ... as well as the hit Broadway spectacle that took home more Tony awards than any other show in history: *The Producers*.



"I always try for a little bit of growth every year, but not too much," says Hassig. "We don't want to bite off more than we can chew. This year, with *The Producers* ... well, that's a big Broadway show, it's huge, it has to be big by definition. We're sparing no expense on it, ensuring that we put on the spectacle that it deserves."

The Producers, of course, is the musical based on Mel Brooks' 1970s movie of the same name and premise, wherein a struggling Broadway producer and an ambitious accountant embark on a scheme to

Without a doubt, one of the most defining aspects of our Tri-State area is its endlessly vibrant artistic scene, from visual arts like painting to filmmaking to music to theatre, so on and so forth, it's safe to say that no matter the time of year, there's always something going on. (Heck, that's the entire reason that this fine publication you're reading exists in the first place!) But while there's always something happening during throughout the year, it goes without saying that for us Tri-State residents, the summer is something of a special time of year. The weather's great, we're out on the river, we're enjoying festivals, what have you. One such festival happens to take place up in the wild green yonder of Platteville, Wisconsin, and it's quietly become one of the biggest annual celebrations of art, music and theatre in the Tri-States. I speak, of course, of the University of Wisconsin - Platteville's annual Heartland Festival.

The Heartland Festival, now in its ninth season, traces its roots back to 1991, ac-

ording to festival director and UW-P Center for the Arts director John Hassig, who was gracious enough to take some time out of a hectic rehearsal schedule to speak with 365 about the festival.

"I think the real impetus behind the creation of the Heartland Festival was the annual Shakespeare festival that had been run yearly here at the University," Hassig explains. "There was a feeling that the festival had run its course, but without it, the summer here at the University was idle. There was kind of an outcry of need for something to be happening here on campus. Some summer concerts were held, and they got a good response, and after that, the music department was asked by the Chancellor (David Markee, who retired after the just-completed school year) to develop a new event building on that idea."

The first Heartland Festival comprised a wide variety of the arts, including a play, an art exhibit and a few other concerts. It steadily grew from there, though Hassig didn't join the festival until the second

season, when he became the director of the Center for the Arts, and didn't become the director of the Heartland Festival until the original director stepped down prior to the fourth season.

When he took over the festival in 2004, Hassig had a clear idea of what he wanted to do with it in order to move it forward.

"I've always envisioned the Heartland Festival to be a kind of mini-summer stock theatre event," he says. (Summer stock theatre is pretty much what the name suggests -- a theatrical production, or series of productions, presented only during the summertime.) "I really felt we could do a pseudo-summer stock, utilizing the cream of the crop of local talent, pairing them with regional and national professionals, and doing it all while keeping it reasonably priced."

Summer stock theatre has seen its heyday come and go, of course, with the advent of television, movies, and seemingly every other entertainment medium we see today. But Hassig isn't daunted by that.

NOW Lizards on the Loose Now Open

The National Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium's new "Lizards on the Loose!" exhibit is NOW OPEN! The exhibit will be displayed in the Norman Changing Gallery on the second floor of the Woodward River Discovery Center. Museum & Aquarium.

"Lizards on the Loose!" features 25 different types of lizards and focuses on the amazing diversity and the unique adaptations lizards have developed to survive in their varied environments. Lizards are a large and widespread group of squamate reptiles of nearly 5,000 species that range across all continents, except Antarctica. This interactive exhibit teaches visitors how lizards see each other; control their body temperature; what they eat; and how they use color for defense, mating and communication.

A public display of lizard sculptures art campaign accompanies the "Lizards on the Loose!" exhibit. Large fiberglass lizard sculptures are available for "adoption" by local businesses and groups in the Tri-state Area to decorate and display.

The Museum & Aquarium will hold special promotions and events in conjunction with the lizard exhibit and the public art display. The sculptures will be on public display throughout the summer. The "Lizards on the Loose!" exhibit will run through March 2010.








Tabor Home's Music in the Vineyards

Don't Leave Home Without It

Some people have trouble leaving home. It's not that they don't want to see the canals of Venice or the art museum in Des Moines. It's just that they can't seem to get out the door without taking everything but the kitchen sink. My husband, the psychologist, says many of us need what's called a "transitional object" – a material thing that helps us feel secure.

We all know that children have these needs. What toddler doesn't have a blankie or favorite toy that absolutely, positively must accompany them in their vast travels between home and babysitter, home and Grandma's, home and the grocery store? My own kids certainly had their requirements. My daughter had a favorite doll, Freddie, and later moved on to a pet spoon – yes, a plastic spoon – to which she gave a complete personality and history, not to mention a wardrobe crafted of whatever could be affixed to a utensil lacking arms or legs. We left him (her?) at K-Mart once, and it was touch and go until Daddy returned for a rescue mission.

My son grew attached at an early age to the silky fabric of the nightgown I wore while rocking him, going so far as to crawl to my closet on nightgown-seeking missions. I finally took him to a fabric store where I found a close facsimile that could be cut into successively smaller pieces, ensuring we always had a piece of what he had by then named his "ni-night." The moment when I showed him the bolt of fabric was hilarious. His eyes grew huge and he crowed with joy, "NI-NIGHT!" It was the mother lode, so to speak. (I hope he will forgive me for outing him here. He has grown up into a fully independent, adventurous young man who can and does go backwoods camping and kayaking and could probably splint his own broken leg after extricating it from a wolf trap halfway up a mountain.)

Years ago, I wrote an article for the local paper about women and their purses. What I didn't mention was how much of their contents goes largely unused. The bigger the purse, the more superfluous junk rattles around inside. It's all "just in case" stuff, much of it straight from the medicine chest. What if I have a coughing fit? Toss a dozen cough drops in. What if my stomach gets upset? I've got Mylanta from the Reagan

administration squirreled away in an inside pocket. What if the movie/concert/political rally gets so loud it threatens what's left of my hearing? There's a pair



of ear plugs, though the way they've been rolling around among the other stuff, it might not be so healthy to stuff them into my ears.

Despite excruciatingly detailed lists, I have forgotten things I felt were essential. Right now I am writing from the cottage where we hide away once a year in the woods of northern Wisconsin. Two years ago, I was beside myself when, shortly after our arrival, I discovered I'd forgotten my jewelry roll. For those of you unfamiliar with this object, it's not a diamond-studded pastry. It's a nice little soft fabric case with zippered pockets to carry your earrings, necklaces, and bracelets from place to place without having them get all tangled up. Why I felt I needed jewelry for a trip to the woods is anybody's guess. But I was so distraught, I ended up buying five new pairs of earrings at a local store.

This is something my husband has pointed out to me more than once, as I stand wringing my hands just before we lock the door. Most anything important can be purchased at one's destination. It's not as if northern Wisconsin, or Paris for that matter, has no deodorant for sale. And it could be really interesting to try out a French grooming product – or, even better, to forget one's jewelry roll on a trip overseas and be forced to buy new earrings in Dublin or Austria.

When my husband and his first wife were newly married, fresh out of graduate school and not yet embarked on their careers, they put their belongings into storage and traveled the globe, beginning in England and working their way through countries as diverse as India, Thailand, and Australia. To say they traveled light is an understatement. They rode third class on railways, toting their essentials in backpacks that they edited as the climate and their needs changed. As they reached the heat of Bombay, they gave away the sweaters they'd worn in London. When they finished reading a book, they handed it to a fellow traveler.

Me? I carry a small library whenever we travel by car, a box filled with books of poetry, essays, short stories, and a thesaurus for my own writing. I do not travel light, and don't even talk to me about a Kindle. So I guess books are my transitional objects. I mean, as long as I've got my earrings and toothpaste and favorite jeans and sandals and hiking boots and two tubes of my favorite kind of lip balm. That's all. Of course, we've got another trip coming up, to a place we've never been before. So let me just check my list one more time. . . .



The Great Galena Balloon Race itself will take place that night, as well, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

And finally, on Sunday, at 6 a.m., there will be one last Crack of Dawn balloon race, allowing eventgoers one last chance to see all the balloons in their natural airborne habitat.

The Great Galena Balloon Race has raised more than \$40,000 over the years for JDRF, and also works to raise funds for kids to attend Camp Hertko Hollow, a Boones, Iowa, camp for children with diabetes.





ON DUBUQUE notes from the mayor

The U.S. Army War College was established in 1901 in Washington D.C., in the words of Elihu Root, the Secretary of War, "not to promote war, but to preserve peace." The College relocated to Carlisle, Pennsylvania in 1951. As the Army's senior service college, it provides the Army and the Nation with senior leaders who understand the role of the military professional in a democratic society; who can advise civilian leaders on the use of military forces as one of several elements of national power; and who can lead those military forces in achieving national objectives.

In its annual National Security Seminar, NSS, the Army War College welcomed 160 new member guests representing a cross-section of Americans, June 1-5, 2009 to join with Army War College students in an exchange of dialogue surrounding topics of national security, civil-military relations, foreign relations, civil liberties and security, updates on Iraq and Afghanistan, stability operations, and diplomacy. I was honored to be counted among the guests this year, with sincere appreciation to Jeffrey Bullcock through whose nomination I was invited to participate.

First, the objectives of the NSS are to reach out to civilian leaders in communities across America providing them an opportunity to become better acquainted with the college, and the prospective future leaders of our Armed Forces. The War College creates an environment for guests and students to candidly evaluate current policies and strategies. And the students receive exposure to a cross section of American society perspectives.

Guests are American citizens who do not have a long time association with the military. We came from varied professions, occupations, regions, experience, age, and contemporary interests and perspectives. The Seminar is the capstone event of the academic year at the War College. Since the beginning of the NSS program in 1954, the Army War College has hosted more than 6,000 participants from all walks of life and all regions of the United States.

Featured speakers this year included General (retired) Barry R. McCaffrey, former Commander-in-Chief, U.S. Southern Command, and White House Office of National Drug Control Policy; Mr. Christopher C. DeMeuth, Senior Fellow at the American Enterprise Institute; Dr. Richard K. Betts, the Saltzman Professor of War and Peace Studies at Columbia University; Professor Susan Herman, President of the ACLU; and Representative Lee H. Hamilton, President of the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. Monday was devoted to defense issues; Tuesday to the role of government in America; Wednesday to foreign policy; and Thursday to the challenges of national energy policy.

I left Dubuque on the early flight to Harrisburg, Pennsylvania on May 31st. The flight from Chicago took us directly over the Three Mile Island nuclear facility on the glide path to Harrisburg Airport, bringing back memories of the nuclear incident of the 1970s. A bus took me to the Carlisle Hotel located six miles from the U.S. Army War College base.

That evening, NSS guests were greeted by the Commandant of the War College, Major General Robert Williams, at a reception hosted by the college's Executive Director. He welcomed us with, "Our nation and military are in a time of war and that will take precedence on the discussions this week. We look forward to getting to know you and learning from you." Great discussions ensued on strategic planning and stability operations.

6/1: I met my sponsor for the week, Colonel Ryan Kuhn. The day's seminar focused on global challenges in Iraq, Iran, Afghanistan, North Korea, China, etc. Discussions included the role of the media, e.g. the under-informing, misinforming, or slanted coverage based on political allegiance. A final question, military funding is at 4.7% of the GNP, so the question is, what level will the public support to keep citizens safe?


Bob's Book Reviews

The Eyes Have It, Forget the Smile

I get a much bigger kick out of Mona Lisa's eyes than I ever did from her smile. I'll tell you more in a bit because we have a lot of ground to cover.

On August 21, 1911 it was discovered that Leonardo Da Vinci's masterwork, the Mona Lisa, had simply vanished from the Louvre. It would be gone for 2 years. R. A. Scotti's new book *Vanished Smile: The Mysterious Theft of the Mona Lisa* is the story of what happened.



This is not so much a case of whodunit as whydunit. We know exactly who removed the picture from the wall, how it was secreted from the Louvre and what was done with it for the two years it was missing. You might ask yourself, as I did, why steal the most famous painting in the world. The minute you try to sell it the local gendarmes would be all over you like varnish on a Botticelli. There are three nearly plausible explanations for why Mona Lisa was stolen. None of them ring completely true but they are all original, highly entertaining, and only one of the explanations has anything to do with money. That Mona Lisa was stolen for money seems most logical to me but

this motive is populated with characters whose very existence seems suspect. If true than the greatest con artist of the century and the most talented forger of all time got away with the biggest swindle in history. There are some major problems here that I'll let you discover by yourself, major problems enough to cast some veracity on the other two motives which have nothing to do with money. I'm not going to tell you what they are so as to not spoil the surprise but let me just say that they are just crazy enough to be true. After all it involves hot blooded Italians and supremely arrogant Frenchmen...need I say more?

Ms. Scotti has written a thoroughly entertaining history of the art "crime of the century" and the century was only 12 years old at the time. Along the way she treats us to fascinating historical debris. A Renaissance writer gave the painting its name, Monna Lisa. Along the way her first name became one of the worlds more glaring misspellings. However, most everywhere in Europe she is not referred to as Mona Lisa. She is called "La Joconde" or "La Gianconda." Some of the first serious suspects in the robbery, to the point of being detained and questioned by the police were none other than Pablo Picasso and two men who hung around with the painter. Picasso was a compulsive collector and it was known that he owned some pieces of art whose provenance was highly suspect. It seems Picasso suggested to one of his friends that he would be interested in acquiring some Spanish carved heads that were in the Louvre if the friend were to get his hands on them. The friend did, Picasso bought them and they were caught. Picasso avoided prosecution by throwing his friend under the bus, he was that kind of a guy, a sniveling, little narcissist who happened to know his way around a palette.

The flotsam and jetsam surrounding Da Vinci is just as interesting. For a time Mona Lisa's creation was not ascribed to Da Vinci by a majority of critics. The painting is not signed, it is not dated, and neither is it titled. For hundreds of years the identity of the woman was

a matter of widespread conjecture. Now, though, we know he did paint it and she is the wife of a wealthy Italian businessman Francesco del Giocondo. Her name is Lisa del Giocondo. At one point there were at least a half dozen suggestions for her identity including that she was a self portrait of Leonardo himself, in drag. It took Leonardo as long to paint the Mona Lisa as it did for Michelangelo to fresco the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel. I mention this not because it has anything to do with anything but because I found it intriguing that one of Leonardo's best friends was Nicollo Machiavelli the author of *The Prince* and *The Art of War*. (not to be confused with *The Art of War* by Sun Tzu).

More than any other painting in history, Mona Lisa has been put under the fluoroscope, inspected, magnified, x-ray, cleaned, touched up repaired, and just plain gazed upon in person by more people than any other piece

of art...ever. Her smile and general demeanor has been analyzed hundreds of times including once by Sigmund Freud; rhapsodized in song and poem; and parodied almost as much as Grant Wood's *American Gothic*. Curious similarity there, both Mona Lisa and *American Gothic* were painted on wooden panels and not canvas.

There is, however, something almost everyone has missed. Ms. Scotti is the first person I have read to mention this bizarre aspect to Mona Lisa. Now I know I'm not the only one to have noticed that Mona Lisa has no eyebrows.

80/20 Rule: Attitudes

In 1906, Italian economist Vilfredo Pareto created a mathematical formula to describe the unequal distribution of wealth in his country, observing that 20% of the people owned 80% of the wealth. The 80/20 Rule suggests that 20% of something accounts for 80% of the results. In sales, for example – 20% of the salespeople sell 80% of the product. In a service club – 20% of the people do 80% of the work. By the office water cooler – 20% of the people do 80% of the complaining. The 80/20 Rule works and has been applied to almost everything around. Almost everything, except people's attitudes, that's where I come in.

The 80/20 Rule applied it to attitudes says – 20% of the people are responsible for 80% of the positive attitudes. I'll continue and say only 20% of people have a positive attitude 80% of the time or more. 80% of people are only positive 20% of the time. That means that only 2 out of 10 people are mostly positive (80% or more). The other 8 are mostly negative (only positive 20% of the time).

Let's test the 80/20 Rule as it applies to attitudes. I want you to write down the names of the 5 people you spend

the most time with. Go ahead, jot down their names. There is even a place to write them below. You can't use pets either; they are not people. After you have those 5 people, assign a percentage to each person's attitude. Are they mostly positive or mostly negative? Mostly Positive = 80% or higher. Mostly Negative = 20% or less.

Do you spend the majority of your time with people who are mostly positive or mostly negative? Do their attitudes influence you? I'll bet there is 1 person on your list that is mostly positive and the other 4 are mostly negative. Isn't that the 80/20 Rule?

I believe attitude is a choice! Congratulations! If you are mostly negative, you have the ability to change that. Cif you went from being mostly negative to mostly positive? Look around and see for yourself if the 80/20 Rule applies to attitudes. The 80/20 Rule should serve as a daily reminder to you that your attitude is your choice.

In conversations, after breaking the ice with small talk, fact disclosure is the next step. The purpose of fact disclosure is to find common interests and begin building a relationship. A Merry Captain the Entire Summer Through

They—whoever “they” are—once stated that too much of a good thing is a bad thing. In a way, I guess that’s a true statement. After all, if I had finished consuming in one sitting the sizzling 55-ounce Porterhouse Steak I ordered at the new Restaurant 33 in East Dubuque earlier this month, I would probably have been in pain for at least 55 hours.

My wife and I enjoy spending an occasional night at the Captain Merry Inn, but for the past couple years had been mourning that the restaurant at the bed & breakfast has been closed for “lack of a chef.” So when we heard that the dining establishment would be reopening this summer—under new management—we were eager to try the latest tri-state fine-dining establishment, located just across the Mississippi River in East Dubuque.

Of course, the classy atmosphere of the Captain Merry is a natural location for the finest of dining, as co-owner Ben O’Malley is eager to point out.

“The first time I stepped inside the Captain Merry I was hooked,” says the young-looking Ben. “The initial feeling as soon as I saw everything that Bob & Bethany had done was simply that this is going to work. Every detail seems to have been covered when trying to capture the fine-dining feel inside the building. The Captain captures everything we are going for, from the warm home feeling to a relaxing city ambiance.”

One of the first things to capture the attention of visitors to Restaurant 33 is the menus, which are bound in metal covers and highlighted with flashy graphics and catchy (even tempting) one-liners.

“A restaurant has to capture the fun side of food if they want people to really appreciate and enjoy it,” Ben explains. “The whole focus was to have a menu that people would want to read from front to back—not only to see what is

on the menu but also to genuinely enjoy reading everything in it.”

After studying the menu for a while on this particular evening we and our friends chose appetizers based on a visit I made to the restaurant the evening before to “scope things out.” Our foursome skipped over the “Shrimpus Maximus” to settle on the more moderate Shrimp Cocktail, and then added in the “Chile Gavulde—stuffed peppers done twice, and then overloaded with a bounty of fresh toppings.” (One guest referred to them as “peppers with kick—both crunchy and chewy.”)



Of course, while the appetizers were fine and dandy, I had actually been fasting for over 24 hours in anticipation of this new restaurant’s signature steak—the 55-ounce Porterhouse, marinated three days in their own Whiskey Steak Marinade. This huge slab of choice meat—which looked more like a roast when set in front of me—is pan-seared, locking in a multitude of flavors and spices. It’s then broiled and finished in a scrumptious house glaze.

With orange slices on the side, a huge baked potato as “my vegetable” and a glass or two of Pinot Noir to wash things down, I only got about one-third through the slab of meat before requesting a to-go box. If the Captain Merry is excessively classy, the Porterhouse Steak proved to be excessively huge for

a medium-sized guy like me.

Heading back to the bar, I asked Ben why he chose “Restaurant 33” as the name of the new establishment. His reasoning seemed to be that he chose the name simply because it was different than anything else in the tri-states.

“From asking friends and family and local patrons, we solicited a lot of wonderful responses,” he said. “However, we chose none of those because of the feel and look we were going for. Restaurant 33 was fashioned to become a local brand—a name associated with professionalism, consistency and excellent service. We felt it would be something different from all the other local restaurants while bringing in a big-city feel.”

In other words, maybe Ben wanted something that makes people wonder why he chose it?

Our group enjoyed a couple after-dinner drinks at the bar after our meal, and then retired to the Captain Merry’s house theater to watch an action flick

with our dates. Breakfast the following morning, served in our room—the posh Mediterranean Suite—consisted of seasoned scrambled eggs, a slice of ham, toast (with butter and a choice of jellies), orange juice and coffee for my wife.

As usual, no one leaves this establishment hungry.

“So did you finish the 55-oz steak?” my friend Dallas asked the following week.

“Of course,” I responded. “It just took me three days—plus four rolls of Rol-aids, of course.”

The next time I think I’ll stick to the SIXTEEN-ounce steak—marinated three days in a marinade saude, pan-seared to lock in a multitude of flavors and spices, broiled and finished in a scrumptious house glaze.

Of course, considering all the delicious appetizers available at Restaurant 33, I think I’ll still need a to-go box.

Eat Well, See Well

High-Quality Carbohydrates

High-quality carbohydrates with a low glycemic index (GI) such as whole grain breads, cereals, rice, pasta and lentils are healthier for your eyes than foods with a high glycemic index. Recent studies found diets with a high glycemic index, including simple sugars, increased the risk of developing signs of early AMD, as compared to a diet lower in glycemic index.

Omega-3 Fats

Fatty fish such as salmon, tuna, sardines and omega eggs are good sources of omega-3 fats. More studies are needed to determine the role omega-3 fats may have in protection from AMD.

The recommended daily intake of some of these nutrients may require additional supplementation.

RECIPE Spinach Salad with Apples and Pecans Serves 4

All you need:

- 1/3 cup whole Hy-Vee pecans
- 2 tbsp packed Hy-Vee light brown sugar, divided
- 1/4 tsp cinnamon
- 2 tbsp apple cider vinegar
- 1 tbsp Grand Selections olive oil
- 1 tsp Hy-Vee Dijon mustard
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- 1 (7 oz.) pkg fresh spinach
- 1 apple, cored, thinly sliced
- 1/2 small red onion, thinly sliced

All you do:

Coat a small skillet with nonstick cooking spray; place over medium-low heat. Add pecans; cook 5 minutes or until lightly toasted, stirring often. Sprinkle with 1 tablespoon brown sugar and cinnamon; cook 1 minute more, stirring continuously. Transfer pecans to a plate to cool.

For dressing, in a small bowl whisk together vinegar, oil, mustard, remaining tablespoon brown sugar, and salt and pepper to taste; set aside. Combine spinach, apples and onion in a large bowl. Drizzle with dressing, sprinkle with pecans, and serve.

6/2: The seminar focused on the role of government, with the two extremes introduced being libertarianism which provides the maximum amount of personal freedom; and totalitarianism where the government owns everything and attempts to control public thought. Most governments function between the two.

Discussions considered the extreme examples with Europe representing a "welfare state" and the U.S. representing a government that provides the most individual freedom. Consensus opinion was that U.S. government is too big; it should be no more than 20-25% of the total economy which amounts to half of what it is today. Three theories about the growth of government stem from (1) war; (2) growth of a highly educated middle class (e.g. Sweden); (3) active special interest groups and a passive majority. The Bush administration was considered as compassionate conservatism, with many big spending programs. After Katrina, by way of example, the degree of spending in the Bush era became greater than at any time in US history since President Lyndon Baines Johnson.

Some things to watch--: Debt (Iceland and Greece could default, and US interest rates will rise); Taxes (1/2 of US households pay no tax); International trade; Corruption (follows growth in government). Additional topics and discussions encompassed national security, border controls, and an identification system for all citizens. That evening we were hosted at the Commandant's beautiful, historic home which interestingly used to be the barracks for officers. The Army Chorus performed and they, literally, made the hair on the back of my neck salute!

6/3: The seminar focused on communication, and the fact that we have no robust back-up system in place should the internet fail. Discussions included foreseeable risks such as (1) Catastrophic terrorism, e.g. biological/nuclear with casualties in the hundreds of thousands; (2) China, e.g. as its economy enriches, it would become a "super power" rivaling the U.S. with the danger being in disagreements over Taiwan and Russia, with the latter being a country whose economy is in shambles; and (3) Interruption of oil supply with much of the supply in the unstable Middle East calling attention to the need to reduce oil consumption and invest in inventing alternative fuels. Finally, we discussed cyber terrorism and the need for alternate systems that don't depend on the internet for critical infrastructure, particularly as terrorists and insurgents hide among the populace and cyber terrorism can be launched from a place not previously considered a threat. Strategic involvement means a decision to match commitment to sufficient resources in order to achieve the goal/s.


Some interesting facts: .3% of the US population is on military active duty. That means that .3% of our citizens are defending 99.7% of us! Amazingly, 70% of age eligible citizens are not even qualified for military service which, not surprisingly, is equated with the lack of physical fitness of our youth. This means our military is not sustainable.

Discussions centered on a mutual concern for the overall moral decline of culture in the U.S. and the civilian/military divide that could develop. Finally, in discussions





about Europe, we learned that non-Muslim households have two children on average; the Muslim households have eight children; by 2030, we could see a Muslim European continent.

6/4: Today's seminar discussion focused on civil liberties and national security. The US Constitution concerns itself with the "process" for decision-making. Interrogation techniques and counter-insurgencies are very controversial topics for the military which, as a whole, believes we need a framework focused on the strategic effects, e.g. the means to erode insurgency effectiveness; to weaken the will, deter support, fragment or split insurgencies.

Also part of today's seminar was the opportunity for each member of our class to

talk about what keeps us "up at night" in our respective roles in our communities. I spoke to climate change and the need for a 30% reduction in carbon emissions by 2025 and the fact that the pace of change to date is not keeping up with the climate changes being experienced. The example I used is the "cooked frog" – if you put a frog in a pan of water and heat the water to boiling, the frog will not notice the gradual increase in temperature until right before it is "cooked." Just a 1 1/2 degree rise in temperature will result in scarce rainfall globally, putting 2/3 of the world's population under stress; glaciers will be gone, drought situations will be met with insect infestation; millions of refugees become desperate for food and water...

6/5: Today's seminar discussion focused on America's role in the world. We stand alone at the top of the key foreign policy question – sustainability, and our economies are interconnected around the globe; our vital interests must be at stake before sending troops into any foreign country; there is turmoil economically; politically with the possibility of a

shifting global alliance based on the rise of China, India and Brazil; and the possibility of how pandemics will occur and impact the world. American leadership and democracy is important to the world, yet we cannot solve global problems with military power alone, nor should we.

My last half day also allowed for some personal reflection on some of the things I learned and perhaps not known by many civilians. For example, the long deployments experienced by so many... in my seminar group, there were military personnel who were deployed for four years straight, with my own military sponsor having his daughter go all the way through high school without her father present. Who among us can imagine the impact of that kind of selfless dedication to country.

It was very hard to say good-bye today. Bonds were formed in the past five days that will be enduring. I came to a new and broader appreciation and respect for the extremely strong bond between the military services. I also learned that none

of the big issues of the day have a clear-cut answer or solution. But, the conversation is happening and the U.S. Army War College deserves accolades for fostering it across all sectors of our nation.

In final, if I had to come away with only one thought, it would be that the U.S. military is highly educated, skilled, and committed to success in its service to protect both the people of the United States and the principles upon which this country was founded and built. Those who serve only ask of their government that when called upon, they are given a clear mission with defined goals or objectives, proper personnel and equipment, and the necessary financial commitment and citizen dedication so crucial to their success.

I was honored to be in the midst of our nation's finest, and to connect with citizens from around the country in an amazing educational experience.

shock Broadway and laugh all the way to the bank. (To say anything more would ruin the surprise, now, wouldn't it?)

"For this show, we've gone to some long-term, core crew members, lighting and set people who have been with us for a long time," Hassig says. "They're go-to people, really, just a great crew. And the show is just so funny."

(Oh, and please don't take the recent film adaptation of The Producers as your baseline on whether or not to see the play. That movie was an abomination. Trust me.)

Of And the Killer Is..., a play revolving around an awards show for actors in bit roles who would kill, literally, for a moment in the spotlight, Hassig says audiences can expect to just enjoy themselves.

"It's an audience-participation murder mystery, and it's a very intimate setting," he says. "It's got just a ridiculous script, and it's a great time."



Regarding Forever Plaid, Hassig says it's a "charming standard," and also notes with a laugh that it's the one play of the year where he has a chance to sneak himself into the cast. The Heartland Festival is also showing a by-kids, for-kids production of Stephen Schwartz's Godspell Junior (the show that launched the Top 40 hit, "Day by Day") ... and then, of course, there's

the old classic, You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown.

"It's the classic story of Charlie Brown, you can't go wrong with that," says Hassig. "This is the updated and revised version that premiered in 1999. It's a great standard of theatre. And it's geared towards keeping the attention of both adults and kids ... it's very layered ... like the Shrek movies, in a way, where there are jokes aimed for adults that will fly over the heads of the kids, but help grown-ups have a good time. We have a great director on that who's adding some nice little touches to ensure that everyone has fun."

It's undeniably a big season for Hassig, who is clearly enjoying his work with the festival and showing no signs of being any worse for wear.

"I started at UW-Platteville after leaving Chicago in the mid-summer of 2001, when I took over the CFA, and at that point, marketing the festival was part of my duties," the Davenport, Iowa, native explains. "It was just a natural extension for me ... I originally went to school to be an actor, but I dropped that after deciding that I couldn't really live that nomadic lifestyle. I love the Midwest, though, so I know I made the right decision."

With a true Midwest native at the helm and a cycle of growth that can only continue to go forward, it's clear that the University of Wisconsin-Platteville's Heartland Festival is in good hands. The shows will run all summer long, beginning on Friday, June 12, and ending on August 5 -- it's definitely a summer full of fun!
