Also new to this year's event is the Dubuque Bean Bag Championship Tournament, sponsored by Courtside Sports Bar & Grill. The entry fee for two-person teams is \$20. Pre-registration is available at Courtside Sports Bar & Grill at 2095 Holiday Dr. in Dubuque. Prizes will be awarded to the top bean bag throwers in this first Dubuque Bean Bag Championship. Speaking of dancing, though, dancing of a different kind is likely to occur in front of Taste's two entertainment stages featuring live music just about all day long, including The Brews Brothers, 98 in the Shade, and headline act Doug Allen & the Chicago Mob Band.



Attendees at last year's Taste might recall that parking was extremely limited at the time, but that's not necessarily the case this year, thanks to the presence of the Port of Dubuqe Parking Ramp Facility. In addition, thanks to Fountain Park Trolleys, free rides from downtown parking ramps to the event and back will be available to the public from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. Trolley stops will be located at the Welcome Center at 3rd and Main Streets, 5th and lowa, and 7th and lowa Streets.



Now in its 56th year, the annual Dubuque County Fair is a time-honored celebration of arts, culture, music, agriculture, and just about everything else that makes a county fair, well, a county fair! Scheduled to run until July 26 (hopefully all this rain we've been getting decides to finally go away), the Dubuque County Fair promises to have something for everyone -- so there's still time to go!

Daily attractions at the Dubuque County Fair include a mega carnival provided by North American Midway Entertainment, featuring all your favorite rides. We're sure there will be a Tilt-A-Whirl there; after all, what's a carnival without a Tilt-A-Whirl?

And what's the Dubuque County Fair without some great live music? Friday, July 24, will be the Fair's night of country music, with superstars Billy Currington and Lee Ann Womack taking the stage.

Over the course of six years and three albums, Currington has made a name for

himself in country music, scoring such hit singles as "Doin' Somethin' Right," "Don't," "Good Directions" and others. Lee Ann Womack first emerged as a country music star in 1997, and became a crossover sensation in 2000 with the song "I Hope You Dance." Racking up five Academy of Country Music Awards, five Country Music Association Awards and two Grammy Awards, Womack took a brief hiatus from music before returning to the scene last year. Tickets for Lee Ann Womack and Billy Currington are \$30 for stage front, \$25 for reserved seats and \$15 for the upper grandstand.

Saturday, July 25, features the return of the Fair's "hard rock" night, one that's become an annual tradition for the last couple of years. This year's rockapalooza features the music of Staind and Shinedown. Both bands have been making some noise as of late, with Shinedown a relative newcomer to the scene and Staind a mainstay in hard rock for a decade.

Shinedown, formed in 2003 (when it

launched the Platinum-certified record Leave a Whisper), has seen its biggest success come of late with the release of the single "Second Chance," which has been ripping up radio airwaves and sales charts since it was first released several months ago. As part of its current tour with Staind, the band is releasing its older albums in digital form with previously unreleased tracks.

Staind, formed in 1995, has returned to prominence as of late with the release of its newest album, The Illusion of Progress, which has launched several charting singles, including "This Is It." Of course, the band may be best remembered for past hits such as "It's Been Awhile," "Price to Play" and "So Far Away.' Tickets for the Staind and Shinedown concert are \$35 for stage front, \$30 for reserved seats, \$20 for the upper grandstand and \$5 for hillside seats. For both the country and rock shows, if tickets are purchased before July 18, the ticket will cover gate admission, as well.



Otherwise, fair admission is \$8 for adults, free for children 11 and under, and free if in before 3 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday. All tickets are available online at www.dbqfair.com, or by calling 563-588-1406.

Get ready for the fifth annual Wingfest, East Dubuque's legendary chicken wing cook-off, scheduled for Saturday, August 8, from 11 a.m. - 11 p.m. on East Dubuque's strip of Sinsinawa Av-



As always, Wingfest will feature a wide variety of chicken wings prepared by some of the most talented cooks in town. Wings will be judged according to the best traditional wing sauce, the best barbecue wing sauce, the most unique wing sauce, and other categories. One of the best aspects of Wingfest is the wide variety of entries that come into the field, from traditional hot sauced wings to Asianthemed flavors, Caribbean jerk-style wings, old-style barbecue and more. No matter what kind of wing you prefer (and you do prefer a wing, otherwise that's just plain un-American), there's always something for everybody at Wingfest

wings will begin at 2 p.m. Visitors can buy a punch card, which will allow sampling of wings -- one punch for one wing. During that time, visitors can place their votes for the People's Choice part of the competition.

In addition to the chicken wings, delicious Coca-Cola and, er ... adult beverages will be available for purchase. There will also be games and other entertainment for kids ... as well as one of the best parts about Wingfest: Live music!

And concluding the festivities will be The Tasties, one of the newest groups in Dubuque's music scene (recently profiled in the pages of 365ink), playing from 7 - 11 p.m.

Other Wingfest activities include free rides for the kids from noon - 6 p.m., a free corn boil at 5 p.m. and a bean bag tournament at 6 p.m.

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The popular Mud Lake Bluegrass series of Sunday concerts returns for a second installment, Sunday, August 2. The free concert promises to be a popular one with the return of Finders and Youngberg featuring area favorites Mike and Amy Finders, with "Driftwood" Denny and the Hip Waders opening.

Finders and Youngberg - not a law firm, as the group's web site notes - is of course the bluegrass and country folk foursome made up of two married couples, Mike and Amy Finders and Aaron and Erin Youngberg. The two couples first met at a show in Chicago in 2005 when Mike and Amy opened for the Hit and Run Bluegrass Band which featured Aaron and Erin.

After playing a few shows together, the foursome eventually got together to record what has become a very well-received CD, Keep your Suitcase Packed, at Aaron Youngberg's Swingfingers Studio in Fort Collins, Colorado in early 2008. The Finders moved from lowa City to Fort Collins last summer, so the Mud Lake performance will be a homecoming of sorts.

Held at Mud Lake Park, just north of Dubugue on the banks of the Mississippi River, "Bluegrass Sundays" concerts are allages, free and open to the public, though donations are accepted to help support the cause. Entertainment at the main stage gets underway at about 2 p.m. with the opening act, with headliners taking the stage at about 3:30 p.m. Performances usually last to about 6 p.m. Sponsored by the Mud Lake Music Society, in cooperation with the Dubuque County Conservation Board, the Mud Lake Bluegrass summer concert series is now in its eighth season.

Guests are encouraged to bring a picnic lunch and show up early to catch the "Pickers Picnic" starting at noon. Bluegrass pickers from novices to pros sit in on the impromptu jam sessions. Guest instructors help out beginners with any questions they might have as well as organizing the various groups.

The third and final installment in the summer bluegrass concert series is scheduled for Sunday, August 16 and will feature Springfield, Missouri band The Hillbenders with area pickers Free For the Haulin' opening.

Camping is available for those wishing to stay overnight at Mud Lake Park. The park has both primitive and modern camping, along with playgrounds, modern bathrooms and river access for those who would rather arrive by boat. Organizers do have concession stand selling some food and ice cream, but if you want to drink beer you are advised to bring your own cooler.

Mud Lake Park is located just a few miles north of Dubuque. Take Highway 52 north to Sageville, turn right on Mud Lake Road and follow the signs to the picnic at the park. 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Outside the Lines Art Gallery continues its summer series of demonstrations by area artists on the broad front porch of the Bluff Street gallery, every Saturday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Next in the series will be stained glass artist Mark Stevens, Saturday, July 25. A different artist will be featured each Saturday through August, giving guests an opportunity to meet the artist and learn more about their technique and process. Some will exhibit additional artwork to that carried by the gallery.

Glass artist Mark Stevens creates oneof-a-kind stained glass windows and lamps. Maybe best known for his glowing art lamps, Stevens incorporates a variety of types of glass and translucent stones into his unique designs. His work often mixes geometric shapes with organic curves reminiscent of nature into surprising abstract patterns.

In recent work, Stevens has collaborated with Dubuque metal sculptor Gail Chavenelle. Working from a sculpture created by Chavenelle, Stevens traces the openings toward fitting each space with glass. "I look at the flow of the sculpture and lay out several pieces of glass on my workbench," Stevens explains. An accomplished glass artist, Stevens counts his creation of a 4' x 6' stained glass window depicting Saint Michael the Arch Angel for a church in India as one of his greatest artistic moments. "Being able to travel to India

and see the church was a moment I will always remember."



Other upcoming artists in the Saturday series include jewelry maker and OT-LAG co-owner Connie Twining on August 1, printmaker Lori Biwer-Stewart on August 15, painter Cindy Nelms-Byrne on August 22, and clock maker Terry Allendorf on August 29. Mark Stevens will make a second porch appearance on August 15.

In addition to the porch series, Outside the Lines Art Gallery presents a new exhibit for July and August inside the gallery featuring the pastel drawings of Marcia Wegman and the ceramics of Roberta Polfus. The artists reception for the exhibit, usually held on the first Friday of the first month of the exhibit, is scheduled for Friday, August 7, from 7 to 9 p.m. Free and open to the public, the casual reception hosted by gallery owners Stormy Mochal and Connie Twining, will feature hors d'oeuvres and beverages and is kid-friendly. The exhibit will be on display through August 2009.

Outside the Lines Art Gallery is located at 409 Bluff Street (the corner of 4th and Bluff Streets) in historic Cable Car Square. Featuring the art of local and regional artists, the gallery offers fine art, stained and blown glass, jewelry, ceramics, baskets, sculpture and more. 

Regarding Forever Plaid, Hassig says it's a "charming standard," and also notes with a laugh that it's the one play of the year where he has a chance to sneak himself into the cast. The Heartland Festival is also showing a by-kids, for-kids production of Stephen Schwartz's Godspell Junior (the show that launched the Top 40 hit, "Day by Day") ... and then, of course, there's the old classic, You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown.

I'm sitting in a cabin in Crested Butte, Colorado, surrounded by the most spectacular scenery you could hope to vacation in. We've got mountains to the left, mountains to the right, and some of them are even snowcapped, right in the middle of summer. We picked this cabin, as we often do, from its web page description, and it sounded just right for our needs. We really don't ask for much - running water, a stove and fridge, reliable electricity, things like

As you know if you've been reading this column for any amount of time, my husband and I have been going to a cottage in the woods of northern Wisconsin for the past five years. We go in mid to late May, right when his college teaching duties are done for the year. So this year, we've already been and gone. It was as lovely as always.

My more alert readers will notice that I just called the place we go to in Wisconsin a "cottage" and the place we're in now a "cabin." How do I explain the difference without sounding, ahem, like a spoiled princess? In Wisconsin, the cottage is larger and furnished with overstuffed furniture and finely polished tables, yet nothing overly fancy. The floors are all natural wood, as are the walls and ceilings, and the windows have mini-blinds and lace valances. There's no dishwasher – what a thing to expect! – but the sink is a double one.

Here, the floors are dark wood planks, and the railings to the loft look like tree trunks. Perhaps they once were. The curtains are homespun cotton and don't exactly fit. The sink is a single, which I find challenging to do dishes in. The décor is Wild West, featuring Annie Oakley, Roy Rogers and Dale Evans, a sign over the toilet that declares "Cowboys Leave the Seat Up!" and a sign advertising for a "Good Woman" that is so lame I am not going to dignify it by quoting it here. There are also two cow skulls and four cowboy hats on the walls.

To me, we're roughing it. Having no microwave means we have to put food in a pot or a skillet and reheat it, then wash the pot or skillet in the aforementioned single sink. Also, there are no non-stick skillets or pots here. I know this sounds whiny, but have you tried frying an egg lately in a regular skillet? Trust me, it can't be done. No matter how low I keep the flame or how much butter I throw in the pan, the egg sticks to the bottom and turns to an unholy mess when I try to flip it or remove it. Maybe it's the altitude.



This morning I was so desperate that I made my first old-fashioned poached egg. At home, I have this cool little egg poacher that consists of a base where you put the water, a cup where you put the egg (after first buttering the heck out of it), and a lid. I may be the only person in Dubuque who owns one of these, let alone uses it every morning, but trust me, it's great. I would have brought it along, but my kitchen is undergoing the Joy of Renovation (remind me to write about that later) so it was nowhere to be found.

I had just purchased a new cookbook and actually read about poaching eggs the old fashioned way, so I thought I'd give it a whirl. After bringing

a skillet of water to a simmer, with great trepidation, I slid a raw egg in. Fearing I would have tasteless egg drop soup, I watched the whites turn whiter and the yolk just sort of sit there. As it happened, the yolk stuck to the bottom of the skillet a bit I swear, this skillet has it in for me - but in the end, it turned out okay. Edible, which is all I ask for.

I'm trying to be a good sport and get into this roughing it thing. I am a former Girl Scout, after all, and I went to Camp Conestoga for six years running and found it enjoyable, at least when I wasn't crying myself to sleep because I missed my mom, dad, cat, and sister, in roughly that order.


Which reminds me. One of the coolest things I learned how to do at camp was to make bacon and eggs over a campfire. Here's how you do it. First you get some bacon, an egg, and a paper lunch bag. You cut the bacon so it just covers the bottom of the bag. Then you break the egg over the bacon. Finally, you tie the top of the bag with twine and attach it to a long, substantial stick, which you hold over a bed of coals. You dangle it there until the bacon cooks, which also cooks the egg. When it's done - don't ask how you know when this is; I had counselors to advise me - you peel away the top part of the bag, put the bottom part on a plate, and dig in. Yum.

Now that I am married and take less camp-like vacations, I do have options. Just last night, we drove into town and I had Rocky Mountain trout and roast fingerling potatoes, and a lemon tart with fresh blackberries for dessert. Then we went to see "Public Enemies" at the local theater, because there's no TV at our cabin and we were hungry for some AV entertainment. After a week of Roy Rogers, seeing Johnny Depp was a treat for the eyes. Isn't roughing it fun?



Dr. Horrible's Sing-Along Blog. For some people, particularly some of our younger 365ink readers, the very title inspires feelings of joy and excitement. For those of us on the 365ink editorial staff ... well, let's just say we had no idea what was going on when we got word that a new independent theater company is staging a production of the musical at Mindframe Theaters at the end of July.

Penned by Joss Whedon, of Buffy the Vampire Slayer, Angel and Firefly fame, Dr. Horrible's Sing-Along Blog was originally conceived as a project for Whedon and his brothers to create for Internet distribution as a way of circumventing the issues that were permeating Hollywood at the time of the Writers' Guild of America strike last year. Done on the cheap, the producers were nonetheless able to procure the acting talents of Neil Patrick Harris

(How I Met Your Mother) and Nathan Fillion (Firefly) for the lead roles in the musical, which was originally released in three 14-minute parts.

The story revolves around Billy and his alter ego Dr. Horrible, a supervillain of the mad scientist variety with "a Ph.D in Horribleness". He desires to become a member of Bad Horse's Evil League of Evil and use his inventions to take over the world and enact social change for the betterment of humanity, whom he sees as ignorant to the problems of the world. As Billy, he struggles to make a romantic connection with Penny, the love interest in the story. He is constantly stymied by Captain Hammer; Hammer is a self-centered superhero possessing super-human strength and near-invulnerability. He enjoys harassing Dr. Horrible even when the situation does not warrant it, and is just kind of an all-around jerk. Freeze rays, wonderflonium, video blogs and a laundromat later (I'm not joking, I'm really not), the story comes to a close. How? Well, I suppose you just need to see the play adaptation.

The local production of Dr. Horrible's Sing-Along Blog is being developed by Trainwreck Productions, a new summer theatre organization in Dubuque. Providing increased outlets for Dubuquearea theatre artists, the group bills itself as an an avant garde organization looking to produce meaningful, unique, superior-quality theatre, making a statement in theatre with both the material it performs and the way it is performed.

Scheduled for Friday, July 31, and Saturday, August 1, the 12th annual Prairie Dog Blues Fest is set to host a full lineup of great blues musicians, all on an island in the middle of the Mississippi River. How cool is that?

While we don't have room to give you the rundown on all the performers (check www.prairiedogblues.com for that), Friday's lineup includes blues vocalist and harmonica player Curtis Salgado, the funky horn-driven sound of the Groove Hogs, and Yugoslavian singer and guitar phenom, Ana Popovic. Saturday's program starts at noon and continues into the evening with performances by Jimmy Thackery & The Drivers, Johnny Rawls, Lil' Brian & the Zydeco Travelers, and a young and very talented guitar player by the name of Davy Knowels with his band Back Door Slam.

DUBUOUE AUTO

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Dubugue has a pretty active live music scene. It might be a surprise to former residents or new visitors, but with two casinos and multiple clubs hosting live music on a regular basis, residents and visitors alike have plenty of opportunities to see and hear live music.

But that was not the case ten years ago when a young, would-be promoter named Aaron Hefel started Counterproductions. Begun as a vehicle to promote his friends' bands and to invite to Dubuque some of the indie rock bands he was driving to other cities to see, Counterproductions has grown over the past decade to become an established production company working with bands ranging from metal to hip-hop, high school garage bands to touring national acts.

To celebrate the milestone, Hefel will host a special Counterproductions show at 180 Main, on Saturday, August 8. The lineup will include popular Indianabased indie rock group Magnolia Electric Co., San Diego keyboard-driven indie rock band The Donkeys, and one of Hefel's own project Old Panther.

The anniversary show falls on the exact same date as Counterproductions' first show ten years ago, August 8. An allages show on a Sunday, the event was an AIDS benefit hosted by One Flite Up.

"This is the first show I did under the Counterproductions name," said Hefel showing me a copy of the original flier, "reasonably priced at four dollars." The flier lists co-headliners Nat Love and Beneath, with special guests Hot Carl, and the Atavists.

Hefel relates that the first event went so well that One Flite Up owner Kevin Menning agreed to let him host other shows at the bar. "And it never went as well ever again," he added laughing.

Undaunted, Hefel continued in his quest to provide local kids an opportunity to see both local and touring bands.




"The next show was this band that I had just seen probably a couple of days before that in Iowa City called the Vida Blue and they blew my mind," he explains. "I was like, 'Would you guys play Dubuque?' And that's kinda how it really started."

Using local bands as opening acts for touring bands, Hefel continued to book all-ages shows at One Flite Up over the next two years. Notable acts from the time included Sweep The Leg Johnny, Ten Grand, and Lifter Puller, a band that featured two members of the now-popular band The Hold Steady.

"And what's funny is that during this entire time pretty much, I never had a band," notes Hefel, now known for his work in Grainbelt and Old Panther. "I had been in a band in high school called

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

The Amsterdam Dream, I'd kinda given up on playing guitar, mostly. After the One Flite Up days, I started a band called Lebowski, but during the first year and a half, I was not playing any of these shows. My dad was running sound with the little PA setup that he has ... and I had to pay him, every freakin' time."

At one point, a particular show did not draw all that many people. "There was nobody there and he was like, 'You don't have to pay me,'" he said, mumbling in a somewhat defeated tone. "Thanks Dad," he added laughing.

Hefel also tells the story of how the night before a particular Lifter Puller show, his dad broke his leg. Without access to a proper PA he had to run vocals through a guitar amp. "It was so bad. I was so, so embarrassed."



After a couple of years at One Flite Up, Hefel moved Counterproductions shows to the basement of John Hackett's new and used CD store CDs 4 Change, which at the time had a location on Central Avenue. The location apparently suited a developing punk, metal, and indie rock scene, hosting bands like The Detachment Kit, The Mountain Goats, Victory At Sea, and Check Engine, until the Fire Marshall found a show flier, investigated the space and shut down the shows as unsafe. Because the first floor – the record store itself was in compliance, CDs 4 Change owner Hackett allowed Aaron to host shows in the store.


"It was really cool," Hefel says of the scene that was developing at the time. "There was at least 20 to 30 kids at every show and that's kinda like the first wave of kids that now have bands." Regardless of what genre of music they most related to, the DIY (Do It Yourself) spirit of punk rock was finally inspiring young, would-be musicians in Dubuque.

Hefel explains that his own inspiration came from other local or area promoters who brought shows to the Dubuque County Fairgrounds, the American Legion Hall, or the National Guard Armory as far back as 1993.

"There was a lot of really cool things happening but they were few and far between," he explains of that time, "but I started realizing that the people doing it were just like regular people. They didn't have that much money ... but it was very nice to know that regular people were doing this."

Working to further promote Counterproductions shows, Hefel worked out a deal with former classmate and artist Victor Cairo. Cairo had developed a bizarre and sometimes even grotesque style of il-



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

ON DUBUQUE notes from the mayor

"Main Reasons for Renewable Energy...Our Children" By Mayor Roy D. Buol

Experts abound on this topic and not surprisingly, many represent energy companies. In lowa, there are those that believe it important to have a variety of energy sources...hydro, wind, geothermal and more. No one source, but many renewable sources!

In speaking about renewable energy, Bill Brown, Chairman of ABI, the Voice of Iowa Business, recently shared "The federal stimulus bill contains many provisions affecting renewable energy.

The most significant items are:

A new 30% investment tax credit in certain "advanced energy" projects; An increase in the credit for energy efficiency improvements to existing homes;

The addition of a "small wind energy property" tax credit for smaller wind energy installations;

A plug-in electric vehicle tax credit;

Permitting producers who are entitled to renewable energy production tax credits to instead obtain an investment tax credit—which would grant a tax credit prior to the production of energy rather than having to await the successful production of energy to generate a tax credit."

As reported in ABI's recent edition, the VP of Strategic America, Lore Mc-Manus Solo, reported "businesses need to recognize the 'triple' bottom line in becoming sustainable. Bob's Book Reviews

Carpe Manifestum



Malcolm Gladwell has written two runaway bestsellers, The Tipping Point and Blink: he just made it three in a row with his latest, Outliers: The Story of Success. Mr. Gladwell sees things we don't; no, not dead people, but connections between things that don't seem to have any relation to one another.

For example, I think everyone would agree that Wayne Gretzky is one of if not the greatest hockey player of all time. Mr. Gladwell sees this as well in addition to making a very convincing argument that Wayne Gretzky's success has a lot more to do with the fact that he was born in the month of January than any other single factor, even including his prodigious talent. I know that sounds ridiculous but the argument is so convincing that I'm completely convinced that it's true. All successful Canadian hockey players are born in the month of January and you'll have to read the book to find out why.

Outliers is filled with stuff like that. I had about a bazillion "Oh Wow" moments when reading the book.

Bill Gates is the richest man in the world. That can be directly traced to three things that happened to him when he was a teenager. If any one of these three things wouldn't have happened, Mr. Gates would guite likely, today, be in his garage fiddling around with an Apple computer. I'll tell you what they are but I'm not going to tell you why because I don't want to ruin your "Oh Wow" moment. One, his high school just happened to have a big lumbering teletype machine that was connected to the University of Washington's mainframe computer. It was the only one at ANY high school anywhere in North America. It was 1967. Two, they had to buy time on that computer so his Mom corralled some of the other Moms and they raised money for that purpose, much like Moms raise money for the soccer team or the cheerleaders' uniforms. Three, the time was very expensive and the money ran out quickly but the boys hacked the mainframe at the U of W and figured out a way to use all the time they wanted without being billed. To this day Bill Gates donates huge sums of money to the University of Washington, in part because he's guilty about stealing all the time on their mainframe when he was a teenager.



This also allowed Mr. Gates and friends to apply themselves to the 10,000 hour rule that Malcolm Gladwell discovered about successful people. It goes something like this...all successful people at Gretzky and Gates' level spend 10,000 hours applying themselves to their area of interest. This is uniform across all kinds of occupations... 10,000 hours! In some cases like Bill Gates, for instance, he spent his 10,000 hours learning how to program computers while he skipped his high school classes and eventually dropped out of college in his second year. His obsession didn't produce a job, or money, or any kind of self sufficient means of support. How did he become the most successful businessman on Earth? Let me just say that Bill Gates didn't create the



computer business but the computer business suddenly found itself in dire need of people who had Bill Gates' peculiar blend of skills ... skills that maybe only 5 or 6 people on Earth possessed at that time. Gates didn't build a better mouse trap. The mouse trap came to him.

Success works in mysterious and captivating ways. How does the rice paddy explain the extraordinary success in mathematics relating to Oriental students? Why does the garment industry in New York City hold the secret to the most successful law firm in the world? What does the ethnicity of an airplane pilot have to do with his chances of crashing the plane? Why is having a genius IQ almost worthless in predicting success? You think the Beatles were an overnight success? Just read this book.

Outliers has a dozen more questions that are answered in most unusual ways. In the end it is heartening to know that successful people don't make it on their own. They have lots of help. It is true, however, that if you don't have Wayne Gretzgy's hockey ability even if you are born in January and you put in your 10,000 hours you are not likely to reach the level he did as with the likes of Tiger Woods, Michael Jordan, Joe DiMaggio, John D. Rockefeller, and Barack Obama.

All of us have thought that in some ways it does matter where you were born, when you were born, to whom you were born and how much money your parents had. Accidents also help like Gretzky's birthday and Bill gates high school computer. In a lot of ways Mr. Gladwell has taken a firm grasp of the obvious and made it riveting...Carpe Manifestum.



Dubuque's Finest Shine at the Right Time

I have a new respect for the Dubuque Police Department after a break-in two weeks ago in the building where I work. All four suspects were apprehended and arrested, thanks to the efforts for the local cops and an effective police canine.

My cell phone suddenly began ringing at 2 o'clock in the early morning hours of this particular Wednesday, jolting me from my sleep and causing me to abruptly sit upright (awakening my wife). The Caller ID read "Alarm," and although the lady on the other end of the line couldn't hear me—I was vacationing in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains in southwest Virginia that week, with poor reception—her message was clear indeed: "We've just received a report of an alarm going off in your building, indicating an intruder in Zone 5."

Because I was 1,000 miles away at the time, there was little I could do. I could lie awake in bed, however, wondering and

worrying if this was a true break-in or just another false alarm.

Ever since I began working in the Historic Millwork District last September, managing tenants and projects for Sustainable Neighborhood Builders, we've had unsolved break-ins. Most of the time intruders have snuck in during the middle of the night, hurrying off with a little cash or an item or two they've managed to locate in the dark. A couple months ago, however, thieves stole computer systems out of two of our offices, so I finally got the green light to have a high-tech security alarm system installed by A-1 Security.

For the first couple of weeks after Jeramie installed the system, I would receive a phone call from the monitoring company nearly every day, warning of an alarm going off. Most of these alerts came when our buildings were being opened and closed, however, so I naturally began to fear the police department would grow wearing of responding to false alarms in our buildings. When "the real thing" happened, I

worried, would law enforcement respond with enough cars and personnel to secure the building and apprehend the intruders breaking in and stealing our stuff?

The building where I work actually consists of seven buildings built over the past 100+ years, and today houses six separate businesses including a recycling center, a home interiors import shop, an architectural salvage business, a fitness center, a storage business and an art gallery. It took several weeks of working there last year before I could find my own way around without getting lost, so I can only imagine how difficult it would be for a group of police officers to find their way through basements and rooftops and staircases

and elevators and fire doors in the blackness of night.

But find the intruders they did, and as a result four teenagers were all arrested and charged with third-degree burglary. A-1 Security was successful in placing motion sensors and cameras and sirens where they'd be most effective, and our police department proved themselves successful in apprehending four teenage criminals in an expansive warehouse facility.

Kudos are deserved all around, and now I hope I can sleep a little more soundly at night—especially when I'm on vacation, halfway across the country in the quiet foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Look at the shelf tag for a number from 1 to 100. The higher the score, the more nutritious the food. NuVal is a super simple and speedy way to choose the best foods for you and your family. Why do so many similar-sounding yogurts vary so widely in scores?

Despite the fact that milk is its main ingredient, yogurt is a complex category. Fat levels vary as does sugar content (with some yogurts using high-intensity sweeteners). Some yogurts include fruit or other particulates (clusters, cookie crumbs), all of which can impact the product's nutrition. Additionally, some products have nutrients added to them, such as Vitamin D



or fiber. The NuVal score factors in more than 30 nutrients, and in one number, can help you find your favorite flavor of yogurt with the best overall nutrition.

For yogurt, what determines a higher or lower score?

In general, the products with the highest scores use high-intensity sweeteners, have no saturated fat and may include fiber. Scores on the lower end include products with more sugar and saturated fat, less vitamin D and less protein for their calories.

Are "probiotic" drinks and yogurts scored differently?

No. The NuVal score is based on nationally recognized and federally regulated dietary guidelines as well as evidence-based science. Today, the science supporting a role for probiotics in health and disease outcomes is not strong enough to be included in the scoring process.





lustration that was always eye catching, even when photocopied on the cheap and stuck on lampposts. It was a perfect pairing of original poster art and indie rock promotion. Because Cairo's CD collection was lacking, he agreed to draw the poster images in exchange for new CDs. It gave Cairo, who now lives and works in New York, an opportunity to further develop his style and the confidence to continue, not unlike many of the young local bands that played Counterproductions shows.

In fact, a number of young musicians who played in bands over the past decade of Counterproductions have moved on to other, sometimes larger markets, forming successful bands and continuing and expanding on their early experience.

Unfortunately, when Hackett closed CDs 4 Change's Central Avenue location, Hefel lost a venue for Counterproductions. He produced a few shows at Muddy Waters Coffee Shop on Central Avenue and at the Conquest in Dyersville, but ultimately, neither location proved to be the best. Hearing from friends about a bar that hosted live music on Main Street in Dubuque, Hefel finally paid a visit to The Busted Lift (now, of course, known as 180 Main), where he convinced thenowner John Finn to let him try an all-ages Sunday showcase. His first Counterproductions show at the Busted Lift featured Suck Creek Cannonball, his own band Grainbelt, and William Elliott Whitmore, a solo blues performer who has gone on to sign to the same label as Tom Waits, Nick Cave, and Neko Case.

Despite early challenges with a barebones PA system, Counterproductions shows worked at the Busted Lift. In addition to Sunday all-ages shows, Hefel began booking Friday and Saturday night headliners, greatly expanding the range of music offered in the local scene. Later upgrades in equipment raised the bar on productions, making the basement pub, now part of the renamed 180 Main restaurant and entertainment complex a regular destination for live music fans.

Realizing that different acts might work better in different venues, Hefel has also booked shows in the more intimate spaces of Isabella's and Monk's Kaffee Pub. "Any place where there's a good room and the owner will accept it," he says. It's pretty clear he's motivated by bringing good music to Dubuque stages.



In recent years, those opportunities have expanded. Volunteering as a coordinator of an all-ages band showcase at DubuqueFest led to a position as director of the annual arts and entertainment festi-


Bull Dyke Rodeo CD Release Party With Nevervoid, Dredge, and Gorgon Sunday, August 9, 5-9 p.m.

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val put on by the Dubuque County Fine Arts Society. When the Fine Arts Society had an opportunity to organize the popular Voices From The Warehouse District art exhibit last year, Hefel stepped up as part of a team of co-directors that included Paula Neuhaus and Rich Rossignol. While not technically Counterproductions shows, his experience and industry contacts have proved to be invaluable assets.

He admits collaborating with a non-profit arts organization, co-directors, and volunteer committees has been a learning experience.

"It's been really eye-opening and really helpful to learn how things really work," he says of the collaborative process, "because I'm so used to just putting things together by myself, and hoping that the people I'm working with understand where I'm coming from, and just making it work."

Looking back on ten years of booking and promoting shows, Hefel recognizes both accomplishments and disappointments.

"There are things that I would have hoped to have accomplished by now," he admits. "In '99 I contacted Calexico, but that was right at the time they started to get noticed ... and we probably could have gotten Calexico for two or three grand. And from what I understand now, they'd ask for 20 and they'd probably do it for 10. So that was one thing that I really wanted to try and have done by ten years. That didn't work out so much, but it's fine 'cause I've actually done a lot of other stuff that I never thought I would – booking a festival – I never thought I would do something like that. These other opportunities being a part of the Voices thing is pretty neat."

While it's true that nobody works in a vacuum, Hefel's efforts have contributed to the overall vibrancy of the local cultural and entertainment landscape. So much so that last year Dubuque Main Street awarded him the Russ & Ruth Nash Cultural Corridor Award for his work. He admits he is "amazed" that people in the community even know who he is. "I never set out to become someone important in the music community in the city," he said. "I set out to be a person who did shows."

That's exactly what he's been doing for the last ten years. And while the live music scene in Dubuque has certainly expanded over that time (just look at the entertainment listings in this issue of 365ink or click on Nightlife or Entertainment on Dubuque365.com) Aaron Hefel is still motivated to bring more good music to Dubuque stages.

"There's no reason that Dubuque can't have good music," he states. "No reason."



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Paul Fonfara brings his "sad bastard heroin klezmer spaghetti western eastern european emo cabaret chamber folk" back to Monk's with his band Painted Saints on Thursday, July 23. Fonfara played a solo show at the Gazebo at DubuqueFest this summer, weaving intricate loops of guitar, squeezebox, vocals, and gypsy clarinet with the aid of a looping pedal, creating woozy, swirling film sequences that shimmered between the spots of sun that made it through the leaves. Until they ended leaving us to realize we were actually standing in the middle of an art

Fonfara stretches Eastern European vio-

lin melodies across gothic Americana country folk, twangs spare, Western guitar, plays pumping squeezebox conjuring a carnival both nostalgic and a little creepy as he whistles down the alley toward the dusty lot where the factory used to be. I've said it before, but if you like the idea of Bowl of Fire era Andrew Bird playing gypsy violin in the shed where Tom Waits' percussion tracks are assembled, you should probably check out Paul Fonfara and the Painted Saints.

Paleo Just Got Evil Friday, July 24

To say that the myspace page of the per-

former who goes by the name Paleo is cryptic would be an understatement of grand proportions. With nothing more in the "About" section than a link to another site and a quote from Charles Darwin ("Would any one trust in the convictions of a monkey's mind, if there are any convictions in such a mind?"), listing "the easter bunny" under band members and "your mom" under influences doesn't really help much. But what I like even better than "the devil and i are keeping our options open" under record label is Paleo's music. The usual ploy of revealing nothing to force you to actually listen to the music works in this case. Beautiful, delicate, and intimate, the songs invite further exploration.

So I bite. I click on the link (www.paleo. ws) which leads to a web page with Paleo's "real" name (David Andrew Strackany) an email signup, and rows and rows of dates and locations in a plain courier-like font. It looks like some kind of catalog that a librarian or historian might understand, but after poking around a bit, I figured out that a portion of this list links to 365 songs that Paleo wrote over a one year period, one every day. Some have a recording you can listen to, but some are just the lyrics. Further research on the interweb confirms this exercise in songwriting. While he was at it, Paleo played 215 shows that year (April 16, 2006 to April 15, 2007) and put over 54,000 miles on his car. So if you're intrigued, as I was, and if you're wondering what sort of person would do such a thing, check out Paleo at Monk's.

Miles Nielsen Friday, July 31

Monk's Kaffee Pub hosts another performance by songwriter Miles Nielsen Friday, July 31. Undoubtedly best known as the son of Cheap Trick guitarist Rick Nielsen, Miles is making a name for himself with the songwriting he's been practicing since he was a kid. While some Cheap Trick influence would not be unexpected, Miles seems to have incorporated more of the melodic sense his father's band inherited from the Beatles without the power pop arrangements of the '70s super-group. Indeed, his selfdescribed "Beatlesque Cosmic Americana" embraces arrangements that range from quiet, alt-folk ballads to pop songs with psychedelic flourishes reminiscent of the Fab Four.
